TWENTY-FIVE YEARS OF TYPOGRAPHY AND BOOK DESIGN IN THE MIDDLE WEST.

The 25th Anniversary of the Midwestern Books Competition will be marked with a Seminar on book design in the Department of Special Collections on Saturday, November 14th. The program, open to all, begins at 9:30 in the Gallery, King Library - North.

Special guests include Dwight Agner, award-winning book designer at the LSU and University of Georgia Presses. He is a well-known private press bibliographer and owner of the Press of the Night Owl. Also speaking will be Alexander S. Lawson, Melbert B. Cary Professor of Typography at the Rochester Institute of Technology. Lawson received the Annual Award of the American Printing History Association in New York in September.

Other speakers include Dr. Lawrence S. Thompson, Professor of Classics at the University of Kentucky and founder of the Midwestern Books Competition. The program will include a presentation by W. Gay Reading, Director of the King Library Press, and a demonstration using the antique equipment of the Press.

Also slated is a panel discussion on books of the present and future. Panelists include Kenneth Cherry, Director of the University Press of Kentucky; Mr. and Mrs. Charles Farnsley, Louisville microform publishers, and Caroline Sommons, Assistant Director of the Lexington Public Library.

There will be an exhibition of books from past years of the competition. The archives of the Midwestern Books Competition are housed in the Department of Special Collections.
