Rape Crisis Center can be vital lifeline to victims of crime

Rape is a crime of violence which one out of every four women will face.

Many rapists are acquaintances of their victims.
Only one of every 10 rape victims reports the crime, presumably because of unease at making such a revelation to a male-dominated police force.

It is difficult to imagine a more degrading crime than rape. A victim of robbery loses only material possessions, which amounts to a personal insult and a feeling of helplessess. The rape victim loses both pride and a sense of physical privacy, as well as the ability to trust in humanity.

A murder victim is at least beyond misery, but the rape victim must bear the always emotional and often physical scars of the crime for a lifetime.

With so much justifiable fear and potential shame surrounding one of the most misunderstood of all crimes, one has to wonder why Lexington has had its Rape Crisis Center for only 10 years

Doubtless this is less the fault of the center than the environment in which it functions. Lexington, as most residents will agree, is rarely on the cutting edge of any social

advance.

Unfortunately, as crime statistics in general and recent horrors at the infamous "wall" area in particular suggest, this city is by no means out of the race when it comes to

this city is by no means out of the race when it comes to violent crime.

Rape victims suffer an intense humiliation which words are inadequate to describe. The helplessness they feel is perhaps the greatest horror of the crime.

That helplessness is intensified by the awareness of a social structure which until recently relegated even the discussion of rape to the political and medical back rooms, and left many victims drowning in a backwash of self-mutilatory hostility. Their bitterness was made only more painful by the knowledge that they had nowhere to turn for guilt-free solace and psychic convalescence... not to mention justice.

This is a classic case of "better late than never." The Rape Crisis Center is to be highly commended for its support of rape victims and its efforts to eliminate sexual violence.

But we must never lose sight of the fact that the battle

But we must never lose sight of the fact that the battle against rape is an ongoing struggle. More centers will have to be opened and other. new efforts — from foot patrols to escort services — will have to be implemented as the

More must be done, not just until the victims of rape are given consideration equal to their attackers, but until the crime of rape can be called a rarity instead of a likeli-

More bang for the buck isn't always best when the bang can be always best when the bang can be a struction. Faulty seat armiests may cause a sore elbow or two. But the misfire of a few nuclear missiles is not an acceptable margin of error. If it does nothing else, spending huge sums on coffee makers and armrests limits what can be spent on defective weapons capable of killing millions.

Becoming a coffee achiever may not be a cheap proposition, but Mrs. Olson will never die because there are too many, or not enough, crystals in her coffee.



Soviets blame U.S. 'imperialism' for increased arms race

VIENNA, Austria — The U.S. delegation threatened yesterday to withdraw from the International
Atomic Energy Agency if Israel is not recognized.
The Soviet Union later told the agency's amual
conference that "aggressive circles of imperialism'
are responsible for the arms race.
The agency's main aim is peaceful use of nuclear
energy, technical assistance to member countries
and international controls to prevent diversion of nuclear material for non-peaceful purposes.
But the weeklong meeting that opened yesterday at
Vienna's Hofburg Congress Center was expected to
be faced with other political issues, including the
participation of Israel in conference proceedings
throughout.
As in past years, delegates from some developing

nroughout. As in past years, delegates from some developing ountries, which are a majority, might decide not to ecognize Israel's credentials for attendance at the

meeting.
"If rights and privileges are denied (to Israel), we have to leave the agency." Richard S. Williamson, deputy head of the U.S delegation, said.
In his address to the opening session, U.S. Ambasador Richard T. Kennedy said, "Nothing would more discredit this agency... than for it to surrender to a process of politicization and to turn its back on the original ideals and principles of its founders."

Nerve gas poses threat to Harvard University

MAILBORO, Mass. — Cambridge officials asked state judge vesterday to halt the testing of deadly nerve gas and other chemical warfare agents at a private laboratory bordering a busy intersection less than two miles from Harvard University.

Attorneys for the city asked Marlboro Superior Courl Judge Robert Hallsey to rule that the city has the right to order a halt to the tests, being conducted by the Arthur D. Donor ready for transplant

Donor ready for transplant

A 23-year-old British clerk says she is ready
to cross the Atlantic if it means she can help
save the life of critically ill Anthony Bergamo
at the UK Medical Center.

Vivienne Turner of South London says she
was pleased to learn last week that her tissue
matches Anthony's.

The 22-month-old boy from Bethel, Vt. is
suffering from juvenile chronic mylogenous
leukemia — a form of the disease that is
usually fatal in children — and needs a bone
marrow transplant to survive.

Turner, a government payroll clerk, says she
learned of Anthony's plight after his parents
started an international search for a tissue
matching their son's. A match was found last
week at the Anthony Nolan Institute in London, a registry that keeps the tissue types of
55,000 potential donors on file.

Cigarette compromise reached

A compromise agreement has been fashioned on legislation replacing the general health warning on cigarettes with four alternating specific warnings, Sen. Wendell H. Ford, D-Ky, said yesterday.

Ford said the agreement appears satisfactory to all aspects of the tobacco industry — growers, distributors, retailers and manufacturers — as well as to health groups.

The House has passed legislation that would replace the 13-year-old health warning on cigarette packages and advertising with four alternating warnings about the specific dangers cigarettes pose to smokers and their future children.

The bill had been held up in the Senate by tobacco-state legislators concerned that it did not meet the approval of all segments of the industry.

Drug smuggler sentenced

LOS ANGELES — William Morgan Hetrick, the admitted drug smuggler who was indicted with John Z. De Lorean, was sentenced Monday to 10 years in federal prison after prosecutors said he had "cooperated handsomety" with the government.

U.S. District Judge Robert Takasugi, who presided over De Lorean's trial, imposed a series of concurrent sentences on charges that include conspiracy to possess and distribute cocaine, occaine possession with intent to distribute and income tax evasion.

UAW president defends contract



Candidates discuss foreign policy

As President Reagan proposed regular high-level meetings between the United States and the Soviet Union, Democratic challenger Walter F Mondale urged overs yesterday to elect a president "who knows what he's doing in foreign policy."

Reagan told the 38th session of the United Nations General Assembly, "America has repaired its strength. We are ready for constructive negotiations with the Soviet Union."

"Outside this room, while there still will be clear differences, there's every reason why we should do all that is possible to shorten that distance. And that's why we're here," Reagan said.

Reagan, devoting most of the week to foreign policy, scheduled no campaign appearances until Wednesday, when he travels to Ohio and Wisconsin. He will meet with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko on Priday — one day after Mondale holds his own talks with the Kremlin official.

Mondale, campaigning yesterday in Texarkana, Texas, wondered whether Reagan's decision to sit down with Gromyko for the first time less than six weeks be-fore the election amounted to a "deathbed conversion." He said he was glad Reagan had improved "his rhe-toric. On Friday he has a chance to improve his re-cord."

The Democratic presidential nominee also accused
Reagan of letting terrorists: "humiliate us and push us
around and kill our people" in Lebanon — a reference
to last week's bombing of the U.S. Embassy in Beirut.
"Elect me and let's have a president who knows what
he's doing in foreign policy." Mondale told a crowd of
several thousand.

He belittled Reagan's comment Sunday that security was incomplete at the new embassy, quoting the president as saying, "Anyone that's ever had their kitchen done over knows that it never gets done as soon as you wish it would."

icized Reagan's remark as "totally inappropriate" and said it "reflects the fact that this president does not un-derstand truly what the situation is in the Middle East."

While Reagan adopted a more conciliatory line to-ward the Kremlin during his U.N. address, Vice Presi-dent George Bush said Americans "still have that ugly feeling" about the Soviet attack last year on a Korean airliner.

He said the destruction of the jet, which was carrying more than 60 Americans, "made it extraordinarily diffi-cult to move anything forward" in agreements between the superpowers.

U.S., Syrian officials plan Israeli withdrawal

BEIRUT, Lebanon — A senior U.S. envoy yesterday conferred with Syrian President Hafez Assad in Damas-teas about security arrangements necessary for an Israeli withdrawal from Lebanon, then flew to Jerusalem. Lebanese Prime Minister Rashid Karami, expressing confidence about the diplomatic effort of U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Richard Murphy, was quoted by Beirut newspapers as saying. "It has been detected from the talks with Mr. Murphy that he was bringing the good tidings of an early breakthrough." The Israelio occupation of south Lebanon "will not last long." he was quoted as saying. "I am confident of what Lamsaying."

Israel has indicated a readiness for the United States to negotiate with the Syrians for a plan to secure Is-rael is northern border in exchange for an Israeli pullout from Lebanon.

The official Syrian Arab News agency said the two-hour taiks in the Syrians capital between Murphy and Assad focused on Lebanon and "ways to bring about an Israeli withdrawal from occupied Lebanese territory." It did not elaborate.

Vice President Abdul-Halim Khaddam, Syria's top expert on Lebanese affairs, took part in the talks at Assad's Mohajerin Presidential Palace. Murphy then left Damascus without speaking to reporters. The conference with Assad was held a few hours before President Reagan indicated in New York that the United States was ready to begin a new diplomatic ini-

tative aimed at bringing peace to Lebanon, torn for nine years by civil war.

"All of Johanno's frends should work together to help end this nightmare." Reagan said in remarks to the 3th session of the U.N. General Assembly.

In Washington, State Department deputy spokesman Alan Bomberg appeared to minimize the significance of Murphy's visit to Damascus. He said that while the Lebanon issue came up in Murphy's discussions, it would not be correct to describe his visit as a negotiating mission.

Court says parents killed child in religion-related death case

COLUMBIA CITY. Ind. — A hus-band and wife whose faith-healing religious sect taught them to shun medical care were sentenced to five years in prison yesterday for allow-ing their infant son to die at home of untreated pneumonia. "We can't tolerate human sacrifice in the name of religion," Judge Edward J. Meyers of Whitley Cir-cuit Court said in sentencing Gary Hall, 33, and his wife, Margaret, 27.

The Halls are members of the Faith Assembly Church, a sect based in Noble County which shuns doctors and medicine. They had acted as their own attorneys during their August trial.

A second Indiana couple who be-long to Faith Assembly face sen-tencing next month after being con-victed Sept. 11 for letting their 9-month-old daughter die from an un-treated bacterial meningitis.

Meyers, who sentenced the Halis to five years for reckless homiciand two years concurrently for child neglect, said the penalty gave him 'more concern' than any he has handed down in 20 years on the bench. The maximum penalty possible was 12 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Before he sentenced Margaret Hall, who is pregnant with her fourth child, Meyers asked if she could ever provide medical care for

her children. "On the basis of my convictions, and of my fear of God almighty, I could not provide medi-cal care," she said

The Halls, in their unsuccessful defense, told the jury the state had no authority to compel its residents to seek a doctor's care.

They cited an Indiana child ne-glect law that allows parents caring for a sick child to substitute prayer for medicine in the "legitimate practice" of religious beliefs.

The Rev. Hobart E. Freeman, founder and leader of Faith Assembly, teaches followers that doctors are tied historically to witcheraft. According to church doctrine, members who seek medical help for illness or injury lack faith in what Freeman says is God's promise to heal.
