To Ascertain the Efficiency of Heating and Power Plant

A boiler test to ascertain the effi iency of the heating and power plant of Mechanical Hall was made by the mechanical engineering Seniors on Monday. The Senior engineers are to design a new heating and power plant for the whole University and this test was made in order that they might get a line on the degree of efficiency needed in the new plant.

A clean grate was used, all coal was weighed and a chemical analysis of it made to learn the amount of heat it should produce. The ashes were also weighed and an analysis made.
