More discussion of rec center held

At 6 o'clock yesterday evening, various student leaders from organizations across camps were given the opportunity to see a presentation of the Student Recreational Facilities Task Force's proposal for a new \$15.4 million recreation center.

Bill Pieratt, director of campus recreation, and Ron Lee, associate director of campus recreation, used both a short video and a PowerPoint presentation to show-case the vision for the new center.

The biggest concern by far was students having to pay an estimated \$50 more

in fees to pay for the new center. The over-whelming response from campus groups such as the Lamboth of the strength of the such as the Lamboth of the strength of the theory of the strength of the strength of the by the Student Government Association, was that most students were for it, but that few wanted to have to pay for it before the doors open.

Lee said the Department of Campus Recreation will do everything within its power to make sure students don't have to pay until the doors open. Pleratt said there is the hope of securing private donations, perhaps even donations from some of UR's former athletes who have gone on to professional careers.

In exchange for their donations, athletes could get various sections of the facility med after them. As a political science junior of SGA's governmental concerns committee, was rather pleased at the prospect of not paying any fees until the doors open. "We've got the (new) library, now we need the gym to go with it," she said. "But I graduating in 2000, and I'm glad that I don't have to pay for a facility that I'm not going to use."

Lee said that after the doors open, though, UK and Lexington Community College students will more than likely

have to pay the \$50 fee (\$25 for part-time students), unless enough outside funds are found to completely finance the project.

Lee said 90 percent of the institutions built recently, or currently being built, he been financed in such a cine. "If it's being done, it's being done hrough student funds." Lee said. Pieratt stressed that even when students do have to pay the fee, it will still be very reasonable. The average student fee for institutions with new recreation centers is \$131 a year, while UK students will only be paying \$100 a year.

Trust assists college funding

The Kenting the goal of higher education just became easier.

The Kentucky Educational Savings Plan Trust recently became a qualified state tuition program, which means savers now receive federal, as well as state, tax benefits.

Plan Trust recently occame a quantical state tuition program, which means savers now receive federal, as well as state, tax benefits.

The Trust was created in 1988 by the Kentucky General Assembly to encourage families to save for higher ductantic costs.

Current studies show that while almost 90 percent of families want their children to go to college, the majority have saved only a quarter or less of total college costs for their children by the time they graduate high school.

The Trust, overseen by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority — he state agency that also administers loan, grant, scholarship and work-study programs to help with college expenses — is trying to help families save money more efficiently for higher education costs.

The Trust guarantees at least a 4 percent rate of return, and no management fees are charged.

Joc Carole Ellis, assistant program administrator for the Trust, said the current rate is about 6 percent, which is higher than both regular savings accounts and certificates of deposit.

Any amount saved by an individual under the Trust, as long as it is used for educational purposes is exempt from state taxes. And now that the Trust is a qualified state tuition program, federal taxes are derived the cost of higher education, you need to plan ahead, "said Dean of Students David Stockham. "This is a viable option for people who want to anticipate the cost of college."

Another plus to the Trust is that the money saved under the program is excluded from calculation of state student aid eligibility for need-based grants such as the College Access Program Grant and the

Horizon gleams opportunity when abroad

Want to broaden your horizons and study in a foreign country? If so, the options are many and the opportunities unlimited. "We literally have programs to offer around the world," said David Bettez, study abroad adviser.

He said the study abroad office is more than willing to help students find a program they will enjoy, advise them on how to begin and work with them when they return from their trip.

"There are many options for students," Bettez said. "Lots of colleges and departments on campus are involved in our program."

One benefit for students is that they do not have to go to several different colleges to find out what is offered overseas for a

particular subject, such as history, math, foreign language. A simple trip to Bradley Hall will put students on their way. Study abroad programs not only offer students the chance to study during the summer, but also during the fall and spring semesters. Students receive academic credit when studying overseas. "We try to help students decide how many credit hours they want to take and what will benefit them," Bettzes said. Bettze said that although some students might be concerned about funding for these programs, the costs are reasonable. "We have exchange agreements with other countries that we didn't have a few years ago," he said. "Students are basically paying the same amount they would to attend UK for that period of time, with only the cost of transportation added."

ATLANTA — Kentucky leads the pack when it comes to smoking, with nearly one in three adults lighting up in 1997, the government reported yesterday. The lowest smoking rate was in Utah, where the Mormon stance against tobacco has kept smoking down to about one in seven adults. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimated that 23 percent of adults nationwide smoke.

Philly hosting GOP 2000 convention

WASHINGTON — Philadelphia will be the site of the Republican presidential convention in 2000. The decision must be formally approved by the RNC membership in January, but officials said the matter was settled for all practical purposes. The other finalists were San Antonio, New York, New Orleans and Indianapolis. Meanwhile, officials close to the decision-making process said doday that Los Angeles is almost certain to be the Democratic convention site.

Greenspan finds investors calmer

WASHINGTON — Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, who last month warnad about fear gripping the world's financial markets, said today he saw evidence the "investor fright" was lessening. In remarks for the convention of Securities Industry Association, Greenspan said he believed the panic atmosphere that followed the collapse of the Russian economy was abating.

Hyde to call Starr as witness

WASHINGTON — Rep. Henry Hyde, the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, anchairman of the House Judiciary Committee, announced yesterday that prosecutor Kenneth Starr will be his only major witness at the impeachment hearings set to begin later this month. Starr, who has been sought by Democrats seeking to focus on the prosecutor's conduct during his probe of President Clinton, would testify Nov. 19. Speaking at a Chicago news conference, Hyde also raised the possibility of the case ending in a censure — but cautioned that any such deal could come only after the House approved articles of impeachment.

U.N. demands resumed cooperation

UNITED NATIONS — The Security Council unanimously demanded yesterday that Iraq immediately resume cooperation with U.N. weapons inspectors, but Baghdad has already announced it won't comply. The legally binding resume the control of the council o



olution adopted by the council didn't include a timetable for lifting crippling economic sanctions, which Iraq has demanded as the price for reversing its decision to cut all dealings with the inspectors. The Security Council made no explicit threats to use force if Baghdad doesn't comply, but the U.S. and Britain say they have the authorization to take military action against Iraq from previous council resolutions.

13,000 Mitch victims still missing

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras — Hondurans buried more of Hurricane Mitch's victims and formed block-long lines to get rationed water and gasoline, while officials tried to account for the estimated 13,000 people still missing in the aftermath of the storm. All told, officials say Mitch killed nearly 9,000 people in Central America. President Clinton today ordered that 89 million in Defense Department equipment and services and \$56 million in food, fiel and other aid be provided to Honduras, Nicaragua, El Salvador and Guatemala. Meanwhile, a revived Tropical Storm Mitch hit southern Florida today with heavy rain, 55 mph winds, flooding and tornadoes.

Israel cabinet debates peace accord

ISTACL AVIV. Israel — Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said today he was confident that his 17-member Cabinet would approve the latest Mideast peace acord, despite the vocal oposition of at least four and the indecision of several others.

After several delays, the Cabinet began amarathon session expected to last through the weekend, before a vote is taken to approve the land-for-peace agreement with the Palestinians. Leaks from the meeting indicated the session was stormy, with hard-liners accusing the government of selling out and signing a vague agreement lacking tough security clauses.



"Anyone can afford to save with this plan, and there are so many good benefits; it just makes sense to open an ac-count," Ellis said.

"The Trust can help families make their hopes of a college education for their children become a reality."

Subsidies spark protest at Harvard

National debate overshadowed by universities subsidies of abortion procedures for students

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—
While national debate about a woman's right to choose—and who should foot the bill for her choice—has been raging, farvard has quietly subsider over a decade.

But after Daniel H. Choi '94 informed students in an Oct. 30 opinion piece in The Crimson that they subsidize abortions performed by the University Health Services (UHS), anti-abortion students balked at the long-standing policy.

balked at the long-standing policy
Each semester, UHS reEach semester, UHS reEach students to pay a Health Service Fee of \$823.
According to UHS officitals, Harvard pools this money into a budget, from which money is withdrawn to finance all students' medical treatment at UHS facilities. Within this budget, money is allotted to finance abortions for students seeking to terminate a pregnancy.
Although UHS's health plan policy is published in annually its Guidebook, few

students know that part of their required Health Service Fee may eventually finance abortions.

And for years, according to UHS Director David S. Rosenthal ('59 graduate), the policy has provoked few ques-tions.

tions.

The Guidebook, which officials say is distributed to students every year during registration, outlines UHS's policies and the distribution of the Health Service Fee.

policies and the distribution of the Health Service Fee.
Rosenthal said in an interview that only "a few pennies" from each student's Health Service Fee actually go towards abortions.
"The number of abortions among our students has thankfully gotten smaller and smaller each year," he says. "We are finally servicing a health literate population that listens and understands about safe sex, birth control, and condoms. This is a new era."

era."

Rosenthal says UHS's current system of providing abortion subsidies has been in place since before his tenure began in 1989.

According to the policy, a Harvard student deciding to have an abortion and take advantage of a subsidy from UHS must first consult one of UHS's primary health care physicians.

"Any pregnant person—considering an abortion or not—needs to seek counseling," Rosenthal says. "This is a medical standard and the women need it."

With a physician's referral, UHS provides \$275 toward funding the procedure. According to the Feminist Health Center, an advocacy organization for women, first trimester abortions usually cost between \$400 and \$600, and second trimester abortions usually cost between \$400 and \$600, and second trimester abortions usually cost between \$500 and \$5.000. Students are expected to pay the difference between UHS's subsidy and the actual cost of the abortion, UHS officials say.

Even though UHS's subsidy alone will not pay for an entire abortion procedure, Aisha M. Thompson (99 graduate), director of Peer Contraceptive Counseling, says the monetary support is significant.

"UHS's subsidy is a good policy because it does not take away the choice of an abortion from those who can't afford one." she says.
