Spanish speaker fills a niche

Turn the dial: UK student and communications specialist provide local media with programs translated into Spanish

UK's Cooperative Extension Service is reaching out to Kentucky's Hispanic population through its Spanish radio programming.

The Extension Service and College of Agriculture

provide the local media with informational programs. With the Spanish-speaking population continuing to grow across the state, the Agricultural Communications department decided to use radio to bring information to Hispanic listeners.

In a corner room of Scov-

Alzheimer's study looks at proteins

Research: UK and U of L researchers say study may have 'significant impact'

Two UK researchers, working with another from the University of Louisville, have discovered what could prove to be a key to understanding Alzehimer's disease, a degenerative brain disorder that affects thinking, speech and memory.

Dr. Allan Butterfield, director of the Center for Membrane Sciences, and Alessandra Castegna, a graduate student in themistry, worked on a project that identified three oxidized proteins that are found in the brains of people with Alzehimer's.

Proteins that have been oxidized undergo chemical changes that affect their composition and function, Butterfield said. In some of the oxidized proteins that were found in patients brains, there was up to a 90 percent loss of former activity, he said.

"I believe our research, coupled with others, will lead to therapies that will make a significant impact on this disorder," he said.

was wnich ones." To figure this out, Butterfield and Castegna employed a technology known as proteomics, which is used to study how proteins affect the behavior of cells, tisses and organs. They were assisted by Dr. John Klein, director of U of L's Core Proteomics Laboratory.

"This is a very targeted approach," he said. "(It's) an ability to find a needle in a haystack."

Klein said the research is an example of what can be accomplished when UK and U of L combine their resources.
"It's really been a joy (to work on this project)," he said.

"For me, it's very important to give a contribution," she said.

Although Butterfield said he thinks a cure is far away, he said the focus right now is on delaying the disease, and allowing people to live into old age with their mental capacities intact.

"You have to start somewhere and (our research) is the first step," Butterfield said.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Hundreds of protesters gathered in downtown Louisville Thursday, decrying President Bush's threats of war against Iraq. Bush, in Louisville for a \$1,000-a-plate luncheon for U.S. Rep. Anne Northup, never appeared before the approximately 300 protesters, and entered the Seelbach Hotel through another entrance.

Dietary study calls for more exercise

WASHINGTON — People who want to stay healthy need to exercise for at least an hour a day, according to new dietary guidelines on fat, protein and carbohydrate intake. Independent advisers to the government, in a report Thursday, avoided setting strict amounts for each of the three major commonents, proposing ranges so people strict amounts for each of the three major components, proposing ranges so people can balance their diet. The Institute of Medicine committee added an exercise recommendation to its dietary advice. "To reduce some of the main killers of America we will have to increase the level of physical activity," said Dr. Benjamin Caballero, director of the Center for Human Nutrition at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.

Bush will OK guns in cockpit

WASHINGTON — Reversing course, the Bush administration said Thursday it would go along with arming commercial picts, provided a long list of safety and training concerns are addressed. The administration wrote two senators outlining specific recommendations, such as issuing pilots lockboxes to carry their weapons so they are not left in the cockpit. The letter said only pilots who volunteer to carry weapons and receive training should be armed. The administration suggests a "detailed, effective" training program be designed from scratch and tested before an estimated 85,000 pilots are allowed to carry weapons.

Afghan president survives attack

KANDAHR, Afghanistan — An assailant dressed in the uniform of the new afghan ampy fired on a car carrying President Hamid Karzal on Thursday, hours after an explosives-packed car tore through a crowded Kabul market, killing at least 10 people. The violence was the most serious challenge to Karzai's government, which has been struggling to bring order and security to the country. Afghan officials were quick to blame Osama bin Laden's al-Qaida network for the violence. "Terrorists are behind both attacks, there is no dout about it. And terrorists in this region are led by Osama and his associates," said Foreign Minister Abdullah.

Bush making his case for moving into Iraq

Building allies: Bush tells Louisville audience he will contact foreign leaders Friday to discuss Iraq

WASHINGTON — The Army recently moved weaponry and war supplies from Qatar to a base in Kuwait near the Iraqi border to check their condition and test procedures that would be used in the event President Bush orders preparations for war, the Army's top civillan official said Thursday.

Army Secretary Thomas White said the movement to Camp Doha in Kuwait was a training exercise designed to periodically validate the condition of war materiel and practice loading and offloading it. "We have done a let with

whatever the president wants to do," White said in an inter-view with a group of re-porters.

"But we've done nothing specifically against any par-ticular scenario" for war, he

ticular scenario" for war, he said.

President Bush, who has said he will outline his case against Saddam Hussein in a Sept. 12 speech at the United Nations, said during a rally in Culsville, Ky, that he would discuss Iraq on Friday in calls to the presidents of France and Russia and the premier of China.

"I will remind them that history has called us into action, that we love freedom, that well be deliberate, paptient, strong in the values we

adhere to. But we can't allow the world's worst leaders to blackmail, threaten, hold free dom-loving nations hostage with the world's worst weapons," Bush said. As for Saddam, "I take the threat very seriously," he added.

Iraq also was discussed in a meeting on weapons proliferation that top administration officials held with senations at the Pentagon Thursday, Vice President Dick Cheney, Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld and CIA Director George Tenet met with two dozen senators, including many members of the Senate Armed Services Committee.
For several months, officials have been briefing members of congress in such measures of the senate Armed Services Committee.
That is what Thursday's meeting was for, officials said, acknowledging that Iraq's

weapons program was among subjects discussed. White stressed that Bush has made no decision about war against Iraq and that it would be inappropriate for him to discuss possible scenarios or timelines for an Army buildup in the Gulf. Bush has eased tensions with Congress by assuring lawmakers he would seek their approval before invading Iraq.

JOHANNESBURG, South Affrica — Unfurling banners and shouting "Shame on Bush." dozens of activists at the World Summit heckled Secretary of State Colin Powell on Wednesday as he defended America's record on the environment and helping the developing world. Thirteen activists were dragged from the room.

Boos from the rear of the summit's main hall repeatedly interrupted Powell's five-minute speech to an audience of 1,500 government leaders and delegates.



Only a month left to register to vote

'Exercise your right to vote' is a sermon as trite as 'eat your vegetables.' Those who don't vote probably know why going to the polls matters. For many, registering to vote and then actually doing it falls on the same to-do list as quitting smoking, exercising and eating more spinach.

Yet if you plan to vote this Nov. 5— either in Lexington or your hometown—there's only a month left to register. And in Lexington, there is more than just the usual cliché list of reasons to vote this year.

The new mayor and urban county council members will inherit a city with the potential to develop a thriving college district. It seems that as long as President Lee Todd leads UK, the town and gown could mesh even more. As students and future alumni, we should leave UK in better shape than we found it—and electing responsible and innovative city leaders is one way to do that.

And, as the recent Lexington Area Party Plan proved last year, the Lexing-ton-Fayette Urban County Council couldn't care less about the college students in this town. Why should they, if we never show up at the polls? Third District Councilman and party plan proponent Dick DeCamp said last year: "I don't represent students." DeCamp's running for re-election, and maybe this year would be a good one to prove him wrong—he won't be representing anyone if he's not re-elected.

Many organizations push students to change their voter registration to Lexington. But for some students, sayeing registered elsewhere makes sense. Both Rep. Anne Northup (R) of Louisville and Rep. What matters most is knowing enough about the candidates and their positions to cast an educated vote, regardless if it's in Lexington or Owensboro.

To register to vote in Kentucky, visit http://www.kysos.com and click on the elections link. From there, you'll find links to voter registration cards. The last day to register to vote in order to be eligible for the General Elections is Oct 7

The deadline for applying for a paper absentee ballot is seven days before an election. You may request an absentee ballot application from your County Clerk's office in person, by mail, by phone or by fax.







