

Much has changed since the UK art department formed as part of the College of Arts and Sciences in 1917.



I have a dream today. I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

On Aug. 28, 1963, Martin Luther King Jr. told his dream to thousands at a civil rights march in Washington, D.C. Twenty-four years later, King's dream has come much closer to being a reality, but there is still a long way to go.

SDI really offensive strategy

So say the proponents of SDI. Never mind that many scientists have pointed out that SDI would have to work the first time—something no advanced weapon system has ever done. (It takes time for the bugs to be worked out.)

Also never mind that SDI might be fooled by decoys, letting a much higher percentage than 5 percent through.

be tooted by decloys, letting a miled higher percent through, there is something much more fundamental to consider here. Even if SDI were 100 percent effective against incoming warheads, which we can readily detect on radar, what about objects we can't detect, a la cruise missiles and Stealthcruise missiles?

The cruise missile is one of the most formidable weapons in our arsenal. You wouldn't think so to look at one; they look like a small model airplane (about 15 feet long). Nor is ts speed very impressive — about 600 miles per hour, tops. Why then are they so potent? Because of their unparalleled ability to avoid detection.

are they so potent: psecause or the upparalleled ability to avoid detection they fly at treetop level (below most radars with a "terrain hugging", guidance system that scans the ground below and compares that with the information stored in its computer and follows a predetermined path to the target. Because of their small size, they would be extremely difficult to detect visually and their small size, they would be extremely difficult to detect visually and their small cool running turbofan engines would eliminate the possibility of infrared or heat detection.

U.S. requests suspected hijacker

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department announced yesterday that it won't seek the death penalty against the suspected hijacker of a TWA jetliner if the suspect is extradited from West Germany and convicted in U.S. courts.

The U.S. announcement ended an impasse between the two nations caused by the earlier refusal of the United States to rule out the death penalty in the case of Mohammed Ali Hamadi. West Germany, which has no death penalty, has said it would not allow Hamadi's extradition until it was assured that no capital punishment would be imposed.

A Justice Department statement said the United States now will formally ask for the extradition of Hamadi, who was arrested last Tuesday at the Frankfurt airport.

Railroad shuts down from strike

NEW YORK — The nation's busiest commuter railway shut down yesterday when contract negotiations failed between the Long Island Rail Road and 11 unions, idling 6,600 workers.

The effects of the strike, which began at 6:01 a.m., were minimal yesterday, a light ridership day, and were not expected to be fully felt today, the federal holiday honoring the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

But if the strike lasts until tomorrow, it will force nearly 150,000 passengers between the Long Island suburbs and New York City to seek alternate transportation. The rail-

road averages 272,000 trips per weekday.
