AUSTIN, Texas — Bob Dole watched two GOP rivals fall by the wayside yesterday but two more made it clear they weren't ready to fall in line with the Kansas sentor's self-proclaimed "mission to unify the Republican Party."

The withdrawal of Lamar Alexander and Dick Lugar from the race prompted House Speaker Newt Gingrich to pronounce that "Dole is nominated."

But Pat Buchanan said he was in the race to stay, even if Dole's nomination now "appears inevitable." And publisher Steve Forbes vowed to press on as well, picking up the endorsement of former Housing Secretary Jack Kemp.

Dole, rolling off an eight-state sweep of primaries, obtained the endorsement of one George Bush and got some kind words from another.

Texas Gow. George W. Bush, son of the former president, put his support behind the Senate majority leader at a news conference on the lawn of the state capitol.

Report: China situation 'nightmarish'

NASHINGTON — The State Department outlined what it described as a nightmarish human rights situation in China yesterday, with increased repression of dissent and widespread mistreatment of prisoners, including torture and forced confessions.

mistreatment of prisoners, including torture and forced confessions. Despite the harsh words, the administration said it has no plans to renew thereats the Clinton administration voiced in 1993-94 to condition trade privileges for China on its human rights performance.

We think there is little evidence that denying trade to China would lead to major improvements in human rights, "said John Shattuck, assistant scretary of state. "In fact, it's possible that the contrary could occur." The report said China's rights problems stem from intolerance of dissent and inadequacy of legal safeguards for basic freedoms.

"Abuses included arbitrary and lengthy incommunicado detention, forced confession, torture and mistreatment of prisoners," the report said. The 42-page review on China was part of the State Department's annual report on humar rights conditions in 194 nations and territories worldwide.

Study says families becoming stable

Study says families becoming stable

WASHINGTON — Despite a widespread belief that the American family is disintegrating, family patterns in the 1990s are showing much more stability than they were 10 years ago, according to a private study.

One reason: The baby boom generation has reached middle age.

The American family of the 1960s was a married couple with two or more children in which the husband was the sole breadwinner, says the study by the Population Reference Bureau.

The family of the 1990s "rypically has only one or two children and both parents work outside the hume," it says.

"Changing marriage and divorce patterns, the influx of married women into the labor force, the stagnation of men's wages, and the aging of the baby-boom generation all have played a role in the transformation of the family."

SGA votes to support child care endowment

Student Government Association presidential candidate Phil Curtis apparently got his campaign off to a running start with running mater Tim Niebel at last night's Senate meeting, although their intentions fell under question by fellow senators.

Curtis and Niebel co-sponsored and helped pass a bill which would establish a quasi-endowment fund for child care grants.

Currently, approximately \$2,000 every year are directly given to students for child-care purposes, but a quasi-endowment fund would give SGA an account in which to place that \$2,000 and supplement it with further donations and solicitations.

The account would be provided through an action from UK's Board of Trustees. A resolution needs to be presented to the

Board for the action to be approved.

"It will save (SGA) money because after this year we won't be directly giving money for child-care grants out of student fees," Niebel said.

Niebel also said the endowment offered a five percent annual rate of return, which means the money in the account won't diminish yearly under current inflation rates.

Niebel said he wanted to establish a base for the endowment before going out to organizations and soliciting funds.

NFL scouts taking notice of Williams

When Moe Williams declared for the NFL draft back in January, he said he would have to go through a series of combines for various teams, even though he knew nothing about them.
Well, he found out. On Feb. 8 through 12, Williams went to Indiananois to participate in the

to time, tested his strength in the
bench-press and showed off his
vertical leap to the scouts from all
30 NFL clubs.
Afterwards, the scouts were
impressed with Williams' abilities
and showed optimism in his
chances of being drafted.
"We think that Moe is 'a very
talented back," New Orleans
Saints Director of College Scouting Bruce Lemmerman said. 'He's
not going to the type of back that
would get the ball 25-30 times a
game. But he has other attributes,"
"He has good vision, runs to
daylight. He uses his blocks real
well," Lemmerman said.
Lemmerman said if
he waf
drafted by the Saints, he could
possibly see playing time as a
receiver in third-down situations
especially since Williams displayed great ability to catch the
football.
The slashing, running style of

The slashing, running style of Williams, which helped him to lead the Southeastern Conference in rushing with a school-record

1,600 yards, also impressed some scouts.

"Moe has the chance to become a complete back. He's a hard runner," said Terry Bradway, director of scouting for the Kansas City Chiefs. "He doesn't have the credibility of some of the other backs out there."

Nevertheless, the ability to catch the football is the part of Williams' game that really has the scouts interested.

"He can catch the football," Bradway said, "which makes him a valuable asset to any team."

Jim Lippincott, director of scouting for the Cincinnati Bengals, said the style of offense that a lot teams are running now, where passing to the backs or tight ends is emphasized, explains why Williams is an attractive prospect for a football team.

"That (catching the football) is a strong asset to have," Lippincott said. "That would be where he would fit in the offensive scheme."

Since Cincinnati is only 78 miles from Lexington, Lippincott said the Bengals had seen Williams play early on in his career, but never actually went to specifically scout him.

"We got an opportunity to see Moe play," he said. "But when players are freshmen and sophomores, you don't go to scout that player. Not until their senior year do you actually look at a player as a true prospect."

"So all we really ever knew was that Kentucky has a good back,"

Lippincott said.
Williams did have a couple of flaws in his performance at Indi-

Haws in his performance at Indianapolis.

In the 40-yard dash, he only ran a 4.7, not exactly what is required to be a running back in the NFL. But scouts all seemed to discredit the time, claiming a variety of reasons for not worrying about it.

"There's a difference between track speed and game speed," Lippincott said. "He plays the game a lot faster than he runs the 40-yard dash."

Bradway compared Williams'

dash."

Bradway compared Williams' time to that of Chiefs' great, Marcus Allen.
"Marcus Allen, when he came into the league, ran in the upper 4.6, and may even still run that,"
Bradway said. "Teams will come back and time him on campus, and he's sure to run a faster time then.

He should end up running in the high 4.5 to 4.6."
One setback which Williams himself admitted to when he declared for the draft was that he was undersized in terms of weight.
But the scouts don't seem to agree with this attitude, saying that the workouts he'll go through once he is drafted will put weight on him.

"He's only going to get bigger once he gets into the NPL." Lemmerman said. "Guys, even offensive and defensive linemen, naturally gain about 10-20 pounds just because of the regimented work-out."

"He'll end up growing more once he gets into the league," Bradway said.

Archer arrived in Lexington in
1993 after spending two seasons
as the linebackers' coach at Virginia.

Archer was head coach at SEC rival LSU from 1987-90, where he posted a 27-18-1 record. He also led the Bayou Bengals to the 1987 SEC Championship, as well as a pair of bowl appearances. Smith will continue to coach the Cats' defensive secondary, a position he has held since coming to UK in 1990, the same season Curry was named head coach. "Rick is a special person and an outstanding coach," Curry said of Smith. "He's ready to be a coordinator. He has worked with some very good coordinators during his career." Smith coached at Baylor from 1987-89 before coming to UK. He has also coached at Alabama, Georgia Tech and East Tennessee State.






When the generations that follow our own look back on black history in America, Nation of Islam leaders Malcolm X and Minister Louis Farrakhan, and their effectis on the Nation of Islam's beliefs, will certainly be remembered.

It was there he realized that people of all races were the creations of God, of Allah, and could live together in peace as equals.

The haji, one of the Five Pillars of Islam, is required of all Muslims who can make the journey. Strangely, the Nation of Islam does not require its memory require its memory. Nation of Islam does not require its members to make a hajj, although it is as important to Islam as baptism is to Christianity.

It believes that Fard was also a role model for Muslims and that the Prophet Muhammad was merely one of many prophets. It believes the true role model for Muslims is Elijah Muhammad. Another one of the Five Pillars the Nation of Islam rejects is sawn, or daily fasting during the Muslim month of Ramadan, which ended just a few weeks ago. The Nation of Islam only requires fasting during the Christian month of December, and Ramadan fasting is optional.

Zakat, a purification tax on accumulated wealth that is given to the poor, is another Pillar of Islam. The Nation of Islam rejects it, cynically viewing charity as a way to benefit the dominant classes of the culture.

Muslims are known for their rigorous prayer schedule. They are required to perform the salah five times a day and to do it standing, bowing, prostrate on the floor and sitting.

Green has a good shot at playing on the 1996 Olympic Team.
To compliment Green's speed, UK has the powerful duo of Jay Tadesco and Pete Pryor. Last season the two combined for 27 home runs and 99 RBI. Tadesco finished



Miller could help Cats in the field

UK ace could be ready by the middle of this month

At this point last season, Scott Downs was a promising left-handed pitcher who people were counting on to help the UK baseball team.

But last Tuesday, Downs was inside the Shively Training Center trying to rehabilitate his left shoulder. It was the shoulder he injured early last season, dashing his hopes for a successful season last year.

Now, he's trying to come back strong.
"It's feeling pretty good right now," Downs said. "It's not where I want it to be, but it's coming along good."

Last season, Downs suffered a rotator cuff injury, and some scar tissue built up. He did not pitch again following last season's South Carolina series in which he admitted to throwing some pitches he probably should not have.

Surgery was performed Sept. 10 to fix the minor tear and, almost immediately, Downs was working to regain strength in the arm.

"As soon as they woke me up, they had me doing some stuff. Stretching it, just to try to get some movement back in it," Downs said. "Three or four days later, they had me doing some light rehab, and now I'm up to just about anything."

However, he was not able to start throwing until almost three months after the surgery.

When faced with a long rehabilitation, many athelects tend to rush through the exercises in an attempt to get back to the playing field.

But not Downs.

"I wanted oo, but I didn't want to try to go through it again," he said. "We've been taking it slow, and I'm not doing anything that might end up hurring it again."

When Downs started throwing again, he warmed up with some change-ups and tried to improve the speed of his fastball. The curve comes last in the rehab schedule because of the amount of strain it places on the throwing again.

"My curveball is going to come to me easier than any of the other ones," Down said.

"It's not really a big concern to me."

The shoulder injury was not the only problem he faced last season. Downs had an appendectomy earlier in the season, and that surgery weakened an already thin frame.

"He's gained some weight," UK coach Keith Madison said. "He's gained some shoulder strength. We feel good about that because once he gets back, (the injury) probably won't happen again."

Downs is expected to return this weekend.





array of patterns and moods.



What happens when you mix three studio producers and one fiery lead singer and put them all in a band? You get Garbage, that's what you get.

With popular songs such as "Queer" and "Only Happens When it—Rains," the band is hitting the airwayes with

the airwaves with full force. Their self-titled debut album from Almo Sounds/Geffen Records is slowly but surely topping nationally recog recognized charts

nized charts.

In a recent phone interview from Austin, Texas, Duke Erikson, guitarist/bassist/keyboardist of the band, talks about inspiration, planning, and the making of some fabulous Garbage

Q: I read that you worked a lot with the production of music. What made you decide to become a part of a hand?

Duke Erikson: I started out as a musician. I played in bands for years and years before I became a

I just like working in the studios with other bands and helping them get good sound and stuff like that. I don't really consider myself a producer as much

as I do a musician who works in the studio.

So, the getting of all the Garbage is something that Butch (Vig) and Steve (Marker) and I have been talking about for the left three feet three feet. last three, four years — we started to write all the songs and using the studio as a songwriting tool, basically.

Q: What finally got the Garbage project in motion?

D.E.: I guess our schedules just coincided and we just all happened to be hanging out in Madison and in the studio at the

same time and just started talking earnestly about it. I think one thing that led to it was the remixes we did as sort of a team for U2, Depeche Mode, House of Pain and Nine Inch Nails

The approach we used there was to erase everything but the vocals and basically to reconstruct a new song structure and a whole new atmosphere under-neath the lead vocals. I think the process we used doing that was something that made us feel that we kind of wanted to do our own material

usic and production?
D.E.: (pause) The Beatles, I guess. Being impressed enough

to take the time and the energy into learning the guitar and the piano and even my uncle bought me a drum set. And then I got encouragement to keep going and just had this drive to do it I guess. It's rather unexplainable,

Q: Where do you want to see the band in five years?

D.E.: I would hope that we're still doing this. The chemistry that the four of us have between us is really kind of a fluke. I don't think it happens a fot and I think we all feel pretty lucky to be a part of this and I think it's something that won't just disconcer. thing that won't just disappear. We'll see.

We'll see.

Q: If you weren't in Garbage, what would you be doing now?

D.E.: Oh, I'd probably be doing music of some sort — writing a song or something, or strumming on the guitar.

Q: Now that the album is finally out, are you satisfied with it? If the idea's been in work had for for

idea's been in your head for a few years, you must have had some high expectations

D.E.: I'd say we're more than happy. In a lot of ways, we're surprised of the response we've got-

We just locked ourselves up in the studio for a few months and made an album that we liked and it turned out a lot of people are liking it. That's surprising and very exciting to have that hap-

pened.

Q: Is Garbage just a one time thing or do you plan to continue the

D.E.: No, this is not a one time thing. We're already tossing around ideas for the next record and we have a lot of touring yet and we have a lot of touring yet to do in conjunction with this record being out and we're really enjoying that. The first show in Dallas last night on this leg of the tour was really good, the crowd was really responsive, but we felt we were a little shaky. We're incorporating some new things into the show ... As long as people want to come and see as people want to come and see

us we're going to play.

We're talking about the next record already. I'm not sure when we'll start it, it depends on how long we're on tour.

You might remember Carey playing second-banana on The Good Life, an NBC sitcom which came and died quickly a couple of years ago. Now he's the head of his own bunch of fruitcakes. The Drew Carey Show is set

of his own bunch of fruitcakes. The Drew Carey Show is set in Cleveland, where Carey plays the assistant manager in charge of personnel at a large department store. Unlike many shows of this genre, in which the star retains his or her real name and assumes a fictional

name and assumes a netional surname, his character is also named Drew Carey. It is an admirable choice; I've always thought choosing a I've always thought choosing a fictional surname was a dopey thing to do — as if doing so would somehow disguise the fact that having a sitcom generally exists only to give the star a chance to retell old jokes. I mean, as good as "Roseanne" is, it's a retread of the "Domestic Goddess" routine she perfected on stage.

Carey spends most of his free time hanging out with his three best friends from high school (played by Ryan Stiles, Diedrich Bader, and Christa Miller). They're not so much real characters as they are life-like machines programmed to spit out witty repartee. They're pretty good machines, but machines nonetheless.

I know that it isn't realistic to expect the supporting characters on a sitcom to be multi-dimensional, enigmatic personas, but these three aren't fleshed out well enough that we want to care about them. I

would like to see where they live, for instance, or in the case of Bader and Stiles, where they are employed (Miller and are employed (Miller and Carey work at the same store,

so we've seen her working).

Kathy Kinney is the garishly unfashionable secretary whose

overdone makeup makes her look like an angry reject from clown school. I thought rocker P.J. Harvey's new maquillage was painful to look at, but Kinney does Harvey

one better.
Kinney and Carey cultivate a Tom and Jerry kind of relationship. They openly dislike each other, but not so much that they would do anything truly harmful. It's a classic love-to-

hate story.

The show has, like a major league ball club bringing up minor league prospects, done a good job of developing new characters to supplement the

original core.

Kelly Perine has worked his way into the fold as an oddly efficient security guard. Perine executes his deadpan delivery

like a pro.

Kay Selverstone Kay Selverstone plays Drew's new girlfriend. Their relationship has had a rocky start because he's management, start because he's management, she's not, and the company has rules against those two camps romantically fraternizing. She likes guys who don't have especially good table manners (and my dreams of finding a similarly tolerant woman for myself could be the real reason I bother to tune in). er to tune in).

UK student exhibits art work locally

A group of recent sculptures by William Raney, a junior Fine Arts major at UK, is being shown at Artists' Attic, located on the fourth floor of Victorian Square, this month. Some of these works are already included in various local private collec-tions, attesting to the talent of

this late-blooming artist.

"I really didn't have much of a creative outlet in high school or when I first went to college," says Raney who started out as a soccer player at Transylvania University.

soccer player at Transylvania University.
Only when he transferred to UK and took one of the beginning level art classes did he realize that he could really express himself through art, an ability of which, he said, was only a matter of time before surfacing.
Metal sculpture is the primary medium which he uses to explore different manipulations of space and the subconscious.

"I make pieces for myself first and foremost," said Raney, "but

others see it and bring a totally different perspective which I hadn't considered."

These works really deny the steel medium out of which they steel medium out of which they are made, seeming as if they rise up and take flight. "Table Top Fury" is one piece which sits, tenuously balanced, upon thin, curvilinear supports which sweep up and encircle large, amorphous masses of tightly constructed metal.

metal.

"The real challenge," said Raney, "is to make a piece dance and look like it is ready to

Creative manipulation of rust, heat (which is unfortunately impermanent), paints and var-nishes (to preserve the piece), are used to create different tonali-

ties.

Texture, created with a "mig gun" and through the use of steel mesh and shiny metal balls, is also a defining aspect of these

"Each piece is a statement or a visual cue to my "self" and cer-tain feelings I have at a given point in time," said Raney. "So

each piece is really a self-por-

He also feels that these messages are accessible to anyone who simply looks at them closely. Starting with pre-drawings or a maquette (a three-dimensional

Starting with pre-drawings or a maquette (a three-dimensional mock up of an idea), Raney works with tangible ideas to create a dialogue with himself. After the work is completed, he can always look back and see different correlations between the original idea and what was happening in his life at that period. One piece, "Campus Fury," which isn't in the exhibit but located on campus between the President's home and the Fine. Arts building, would be impossible to fit in most exhibit space. According to Raney, the piece presented one of his biggest challenges, further defining his personal language.

This search for a personal language and vision and the act of constantly pushing the limits of what is possible seems to characterize Raney's works and proves the power and possibilities of creative expression.

attempting to take control of the gang and Jinbao. Tang, in fear of assassins, takes Xiao and Shuisheng to a remote island to live in captivity. It is here that she realizes that her life is expendable when she is of no further use.

Unfortunately, this may mark the last film Li and Yimou work on together. For together. For years, they had been lovers as well as colleagues, and a recent split

will perhaps break the tie of the long time companions. Shanghai Triad opens tomorrow night at the Kentucky Theatre. If you're leaving for Spring Break, don't worry, the film will play through March 21.




