

MEET THE GOVERN PUBLICATIONS DEPARTMENT GOVERNMENT (by Sandra McAninch)

GPD (as we are better known) is really a library within a library. In that regard, we are more like a branch library than many of the other King Library Departments. We do most of our own acquisitions work,

almost all cataloging and classification, all materials preparation, shelving, public service and circulation (except ILL). All of these activities are handled by a staff of two professional librarians, four library technicians, three graduate assistants and 70 hours/week of student assistance. We are assisted in several areas by Gwen Curtis, the Map Collection technician. In return, map questions may be directed to the staff in GPD when the Map Collection is closed.

We serve as a regional depository for United States Government publications, and a selective depository for Canadian documents. Parliamentary debates, papers, and bills are the only documents collected for Great Britain. Publications of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and those from other states, particularly those neighboring Kentucky and those in the Ohio Valley and Appalachian Regions, are also collected. Our primary mission is to make these materials available to as many Kentucky citizens as possible. Therefore, most of our materials circulate for four weeks to anyone with a valid Kentucky driver's license. Although most of our holdings are in a closed stack area, users may sign in at our desk to go down and use the collection on their own. Each collection uses a different classification system so some instruction or orientation is usually necessary when a patron uses our material for the first time.

Government publications

are documents (paper microform) issued governmental agencies. They provide up-to-date information in many fields, especially those of science, politics, economics and social welfare. Frequently they also contain useful statistical data. If you are unfamiliar with documents or encounter any difficulties in using documents, please ask at the GPD desk for assistance. Since most of the government publications handled by our department are not yet included in LS/2000, all of our shelflist records are internal. We answer around 15,000 questions, circulate approximately 5,000 volumes, and process over 150,000 annually, all at the same time with the same staff.

Several branch libraries also collect government publications in their subject areas, e.g., the Law, Geology, Education, Agriculture, and Medical Center Libraries. Some of these government publications represent portions of our depository collections, e.g., Agriculture's USDA collection, but others duplicate what we have, e.g., Medical Center. In addition, not all government publications are housed in GPD, e.g., many World Health Organization publications are only in the Medical Center Library, and Food and Agriculture Organizations publications are generally in the Agriculture Library. For those materials in the branches which are part of our depository collections, we acquire them, process them and send them to the

branches.

Finally, we hope that within the next year we will be able to begin adding GPD holdings to the LS/2000 database, and open the basement stack area to public use, so look for more GPD news in a future Green Bean! By the way (for those of you who have been holding your breath), we passed our GPO inspection with room to spare. Our thanks go out to everyone who helped us get through May and June, 1986. Come see us in Room 116, King south, and we will be happy to give you a tour.
