Putting 'light in dark places'

Area in need: The Rev. Jesse Jackson made a stop on his speaking tour at Transylvania University to promote overall improvement in the lifestyles of people in Appalachia

Five hundred people stood on the lawn of the Old Morrison building at Transylvania Univer-sity to listen to the inspired words of one the most respected politicians in America.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson visited the campus yesterday to give his speech, "Leave No American Be-hind: A March for Appalachia." "We need to go to Appalachia

and put light in dark places, heat in cold places," Jackson said.

He said politicians and religious leaders consistently "ignore the plight of the impoverished in Appalachia."

He discussed several of the most pressing issues in the region, including the high mortality rates, short life expectancies and poor quality of education.

These issues result from a fail-things," he said.

Aylesford district deemed H-1 zone

8-3 vote by commission has officials saying all those in area benefit from modified proposal

Months of planning, research, public hearings and debate over the proposed Aylesford Neighborhood historic district zoning overlay culminated last night in the city council's 8-3 in favor of H-1. The proposal, approved by the Fayette County Planning Commission, was bounded by Euclid Avenue, Rose Street, Rodes Avenue,

Clay Avenue, Main Street, and Old E. Vine.

But several owners of property in this area were concerned that the H-1 zone overlay would nega-tively impact their investments.

These concerned owners hired lawyers, who worked with the members of the neighborhood as-sociation, to come up with a modi-fied district that would benefit everyone involved.

The compromise, which eliminates all properties to the west of Rose Street, and the Woodland Triangle business district, was the proposal that ultimately won the vote of the city council.

Bill Lear, an attorney for several property owners who were opposed to the original H-1 zone overlay, said the compromise has more support from the people who will be affected by it than did the original proposal.

LOUISVILLE — The Louisville men's basketball team was banned from postseason play for
one year and placed on probation for three years
by the NCAA on Tuesday.

The NCAA released its findings in April in a
letter of inquiry that labeled the alleged violations as "major," including a claim of "lack of institutional control."

GOP to bring inquiry to House floor

WASHINGTON — Republicans intend to bring a formal inquiry of impeachment to the House floor within the next two weeks, GOP sources said Tuesday. But Democrats renewed talk of a lesser sanction for President Clinton, perhaps a censure along with a financial penalty. The maneuvering in Congress unfolded as the White House, after digesting nearly 3,200 newly released pages of Kenneth Starr's evidence, Lished out at the independent counsel for ignoring "all reasonable standards of faitness in preparing and drafting" his highly publicized report to lawmakers citing evidence of impeachable offenses.

In particular, Clinton's lawyers wrote the Judiciary Committee contending that Starr's report included 150 pages of "gratuitous and graphic sexual details." At the same time attorneys David Kendall and Charles Ruff wrote, Starr excluded this statement that Monica Lewinsky made before the grand jury: "No one ever asked me to lie and I was never promised a job for my silence."

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic — After plowing through the northern Caribbean, Hurricane Georges carved into the Dominican Republic on Tuesday, uprooting trees and churn-ing the sea as Dominicans and tourists alike fled

The mammoth storm was on a trajectory that could send it crashing into the Florida Keys by late Thursday or early Friday. Authorities urged tourists to leave the island chain, as residents began boarding up windows in anticipation of Georges fury.

The storm caught the Dominican capital of Santo Domingo almost entirely unprepared Tuesday. Forecasters had expected it to hit only the northern coast, but Georges, which killed at least 10 people in its furious march across the Caribbean, changed course and headed straight for the tropical capital of 3 million people.

ambassador to Greece, to be deputy prime minister in charge of social policy, one of the tougher

Dreamworks close to studio deal

LOS ANGELES — Steven Spielberg's Dream-Works and a developer have agreed on most of the terms for building a studio and corporate headquarters on sensitive wetlands near Los An-geles. Environmentalists fear the project on the 1,087-acre Playa Vista site could upset the ecolog-ical balance of the area. Under the deal, more than half the site will remain open space. The agreement came yesterday, just three weeks after DreamWorks threatened to pull out of the devel-opment in a dispute with the land's owners. DreamWorks hopes to have its first sound stages ready for use toward the end of the year 2000.

Crawford show triggers lawsuit

NEW YORK — A television producer who says he's not getting what he deserves from "Sex With Clind Crawford" — a prime-time show that airs on ABC Tuesday — has gone to court. Ty producer Peter Stuart has filed a breach of contract suit against the supermodel, saying the one-hour special breaches a deal he and Crawford had made, to make just such a show. Neither Crawford's agents nor those for producer Peter Stuart returned calls for comment.

Student in police custody dies

Strangulation and blunt-force injuries cause of University of S. Alabama student's death

MOBILE. Ala. — Joseph
"Boston Joe" Annis, a 27-yearold engineering student at the
University of South Alabama,
died Sept. 11 in police custody
following an incident on Government at George streets
near downtown Mobile.

Strangulation and multiple blunt-force injuries have
been ruled the cause of death
by the Alabama Department
of Forensic Sciences.

An investigation is now
being conducted to determine
whether Annis's death is the
result of police brutality.

Annis was only at Haley's for a few minutes when he ran out of the club and headed toward Government Street, where he was reportedly not wearing a shirt and was seen charging at vehicles shortly

before 3 a.m.

There was a reported struggle when police arrived on the scene, during which officers allegedly used batons, pepper spray and prone restraint to subdue Annis.

By this time, Annis had removed the rest of his clothes.

One of the officers, who was not identified, reportedly suffered a broken arm as a result When the police finally had Annis shackled and hand-cuffed as he was lying face down, he began having trouble breathing.

He was taken to Mobile Infirmary Medical Center where he was pronounced dead on arrival.


Annis's parents have retained the services of a Mobile-area lawyer and are claiming the arresting officers used excessive force in arresting their son.

An autopsy found Annis' blood-alcohol level was 20, more than twice the legal limit, when the clash occurred.

The four Mobile police of ficers involved in the incident have been placed on administrative duty while the death is investigated by the state crime lab.

Miller asked those in favor of the compromise to stand. Only 15 out of over 75 people were left stiff.

It was a sign that the people of the Aylesford Neighborhood Association were really in favor of the compromise, but when people started approaching the microphone to speak, a different impression was quickly formed.

"Many people living in this area have the proverbial gun to their heads because while many of us don't want to cut out the areas outlined in the compromise, we feel we have no choice," said Joan Gaines, Lexington resident.
