Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Monday, June 24, 1985.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 9 a.m. (Eastern Daylight Time) on Monday, June 24, 1985 in the Board Room on the 18th Floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the Lexington Campus.

A. Meeting Opened and Acting Secretary Elected

Mr. Robert T. McCowan, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 9:02 a.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Mr. T. A. Lassetter.

The Chairman, in the absence of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, Mr. George W. Griffin, appointed Mr. William R. Black as Acting Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

B. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. Robert T. McCowan (Chairman), Mr. Thomas P. Bell, Mr. William R. Black, Professor Timothy A. Cantrell, Governor Albert Benjamin Chandler (Honorary Trustee), Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Tracy Farmer, Mrs. Edythe Jones Hayes, Mr. Henry E. Hershey, Mr. Brereton C. Jones, Mr. R. Larry Jones, Mr. T. A. Lassetter, Mr. W. Bruce Lunsford, Mr. James L. Rose, and Professor Constance P. Wilson. Absent from the meeting were Mr. Timothy B. Freudenberg, Mr. Ronald G. Geary, Mr. George W. Griffin, Professor James D. Kemp, Mr. Frank Ramsey, and Mr. Bobby Watson. The University administration was represented by President Otis A. Singletary; Mr. James O. King, Vice President for Administration; Chancellors Peter P. Bosomworth, Art Gallaher, and Charles T. Wethington; Dr. Raymond R. Hornback, Vice President for University Relations; Mr. Henry Clay Owen, Controller and Treasurer; Mr. Edward A. Carter, Associate Vice President for Planning and Budget; Dr. Wimberly C. Royster, Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School; and Dr. Paul G. Sears. Special Assistant for Academic Affairs. Members of the various news media were also in attendance. A quorum being present, the Chairman declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 9:10 a.m.

C. Minutes Approved

On motion made by Mr. Rose, seconded by Professor Cantrell and passed, the Minutes of the May 7, 1985 Meeting of the Board of Trustees and the Minutes of the June 7, 1985 Special Called Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky were approved as written.

D. Nominating Committee Appointed

Mr. McCowan appointed Mr. Frank Ramsey, Mr. William R. Black, Mr. Larry Jones, Mr. T. A. Lassetter, and Professor Constance P. Wilson to serve as the Nominating Committee to recommend officers of the Board and members of the Executive Committee of the Board for 1985-86. Mr. Ramsey will chair the committee, and its report will be presented to the Board of Trustees at the meeting on September 17, 1985.

E. Mr. Timothy B. Freudenberg Recognized

Mr. McCowan expressed appreciation for the contributions made by Mr. Timothy Freudenberg during his tenure as Student Trustee and extended best wishes on behalf of the Board.

F. President's Report to the Trustees

President Singletary called attention to his monthly report to the Trustees, copies of which were distributed earlier, and recommended that the report be accepted. Without objection, it was so ordered.

G. Governor Collins' Education Improvement Program

President Singletary indicated his "wholehearted support" of the Governor's school-improvement proposals, and urged the Trustees to give their support publicly to those plans. He then read the following statement:

For the past ten or twelve days, one of the principal topics of conversation among Kentuckians has been the future of our public schools.

The reason for this unaccustomed talk about schools lies, of course, in the announcement by Governor Collins of her plans for improving the State's system of public education and her proposals for financing those improvements. Let me say that I welcome the Governor's announcement and the widespread public attention that it has prompted.

It should be thoroughly understood that every Kentuckian has a stake in the Governor's proposed upgrading of our educational system,

It now has been a full twenty-five years since Professor Tom Clark, then head of the U.K. History Department, observed that "Kentuckians must be prepared to perform highly technical services if they are to compete successfully with people from other states." "Heretofore," wrote Dr. Clark, "we have thought in the outworn frontier terms that every Kentuckian could find his niche if he worked hard enough with his muscle." That is no longer true, Dr. Clark noted in 1960. "The specialist and the machine have displaced muscle," he wrote. If that was the case a quarter of a century ago, when Dr. Clark first sounded the warning, it is demonstrably more so today.

Although Governor Collins' plan focuses upon elementary and secondary schools, it will ultimately provide a sound undergirding for the State's entire system of public education, from kindergarten through the university. While the primary emphasis is on elementary and secondary education, Governor Collins did recognize the need for more adequate funding for higher education.

Let us remember that all boats rise on a high tide. If the tide that is running today in Kentucky will reach the elementary and secondary schools before it reaches the universities, it is nonetheless beneficial for all of us.

I am pleased at the opportunity to offer my whole-hearted support to the Governor's school-improvement proposals. Moreover, I would urge you members of the Board of Trustees--both as private citizens who are not without influence in your respective communities, and as men and women who manifestly are interested in the advancement of education--to publicly give your support to those plans.

Mr. Brereton Jones said he would like to go on record as supporting Governor Collins' program. Following a brief discussion during which a number of Trustees also expressed their approval of the Governor's proposal, Mr. Jones moved that the Board of Trustees endorse the Governor's Education Improvement Program. His motion was seconded by Mr. Hershey and unanimously carried.

H. Consortium for Fossil Fuel Liquefaction Science

President Singletary announced that the U. S. Department of Energy has accepted the Institute of Mining and Minerals Research proposal for the establishment of a Consortium for Fossil Fuel Liquefaction Science. He informed them that the University expects a grant to be made subsequently. The level of funding is anticipated to be \$980,000 for the first year with an increase to \$6 million per year by the third year of a five-year program.

I. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

In recommending that the appointments and staff changes in PR 2 be approved, President Singletary called attention to two items: (1) a leave of absence for C. Leslie Dawson, Director, Management and Organizational Analysis, for special assignment with state government for one year, effective May 10, 1985, and (2) a change in title for Robert A. Babbage, Jr. from Assistant to the President to Director of the Equine Research Foundation, effective July 1, 1985. President Singletary explained that the Equine Research Foundation is the fund-raising arm of the Equine Research Center and that Mr. Babbage's role is to head the fund-raising drive of the Foundation. He also pointed out that Mr. Babbage will have no responsibility for the programs in the Research Center. On motion made by Mr. Larry Jones, seconded by Mr. Black and passed unanimously, the appointments and staff changes recommended in PR 2 were approved. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Supplemental Recommendations of the President (PR 3A)

There were no supplemental recommendations.

K. Proposed Amendment to the Governing Regulations (PR 3B)

President Singletary recommended that the proposed amendment to the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky as presented in PR 3B be received for consideration and placed on the agenda for action at the next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees. On motion made by Mr. Clay, seconded by Mr. Brereton Jones and passed, it was so ordered. (See PR 3B at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Appointments to the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation (PR 3C)

President Singletary recommended that approval be given to (1) the appointment of Mr. Vernon Winkle (citizen member) and (2) the reappointment of Mr. Thomas Bell (Board of Trustees member) and Dr. Fred Zechman (faculty member) to the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation for three-year terms ending in 1988. Mr. Black so moved. His motion was seconded by Mr. Clay and unanimously carried. (See PR 3C at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Operating Budget for 1985-86 (PR 3D)

In opening his budget presentation, President Singletary informed the Trustees that the proposed expenditure level of of \$455.7 million represents an increase of \$32.2 million (7.6 percent) over the 1984-85 Operating Budget. Using a series of charts, he reviewed the major sources of income, expenditures by program, and history of faculty salaries relative to the University's benchmark institutions. He pointed out that Lexington Campus and Medical Center salaries are projected to fall \$3,116 below the median of the benchmark institutions in 1985-86 and the Community Colleges faculty salaries will fall \$2,694 below their benchmark median. He said, "At the very time when the quality of our student body is improving substantially beyond the national averages, and far beyond that of other Kentucky institutions, we find ourselves least capable of supporting our existing faculty at a competitive salary level, or of recruiting new high quality faculty members. The rapid deterioration in our relative faculty salary position is accompanied by a similar salary problem with our support staff." He reminded the Trustees that the faculty salary problem has been a priority with him for years and added that it continues to be the most pressing internal problem of the institution.

Following his presentation, President Singletary stated that he believes the budget to be consistent with the Five Year Plan and with the dollars appropriated for the University by the 1984 General Assembly. President Singletary then recommended approval of the 1985-86 Operating Budget. Mr. Farmer so moved. His motion was seconded by Mr. Hershey.

Several members of the Board expressed concern about the erosion of faculty salaries in relation to the benchmark schools. President Singletary explained that the statutory three percent cap and the limited increase of State appropriations made it impossible for the University to improve its standings. He repeated that improvement of faculty salaries has consistently been his top priority for the institution and added that were the cap to be removed he would review the budget for any possible reallocations to support salaries.

The question was called. The motion was voted on and unanimously carried. (See PR 3D at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Commendation on Management of University Hospital

Mr. Black, Chairman of University of Kentucky Council of Supervisors, commended Chancellor Peter P. Bosomworth and Mr. Frank A. Butler and his staff for the tremendous improvement in the management of University Hospital. He reported that a few years ago the financial picture was distressing and the problems were mounting much faster than the solutions. He added that under the supervision of Dr. Bosomworth and Mr. Butler and his staff, there has been a tremendous turn around and today the picture is entirely different. He then recommended that the Board commend them for the improvements and the efficient management of University Hospital. Mr. McCowan thanked Mr. Black for his comments and asked that they be so recorded in the Minutes. On motion made by Professor Cantrell, seconded by Mr. Brereton Jones and passed, it was so ordered.

O. Appointment of Director, Hazard Community College (PR 4A)

Upon the recommendation of Chancellor Wethington and with the concurrence of President Singletary, Professor Cantrell moved that Dr. G. Edward Hughes be named Director of the Hazard Community College, effective August 1, 1985. The motion was seconded by Mr. Larry Jones and unanimously carried. (See PR 4A at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Appointment to University of Kentucky/Business Partnership Foundation (PR 5A)

President Singletary recommended that approval be given to the appointment of W. T. Young to membership on the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky/Business Partnership Foundation for a four-year term beginning July 1, 1985 and ending June 30, 1989. Mr. Lunsford so moved. His motion was seconded by Mr. Farmer and unanimously carried. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Patent Assignments (PR 5B) and Correction of Inventorship in Patent Assignment (PR 5C)

With President Singletary so recommending, Mr. Farmer moved approval of the patent assignments in PR 5B and the correction of inventorship in the patent assignment as presented in PR 5C. His motion was seconded by Mr. Rose and passed without dissent. (See PR 5B and PR 5C at the end of the Minutes.)

R. Approval of Agreement Between University of Kentucky and University of Kentucky Student Agencies, Incorporated (PR 5D)

Dean Joseph T. Burch commented briefly on the University of Kentucky Student Agencies and indicated the program which has now been in effect for three years was moderately successful during 1984-85. He said the program provides a good working experience for the students. On motion made by Mr. Lassetter, seconded by Mr. Hershey and carried, the Board approved the agreement between the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees and the University of Kentucky Student Agencies, Incorporated. (See PR 5D at the end of the Minutes.)

S. Acceptance of Gift from the Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust (PR 6A)

On motion made by Mr. Brereton Jones, seconded by Professor Cantrell and unanimously carried, the Board accepted the gift of \$3.1 million from the Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust, and authorized the Treasurer to transfer \$1,073,781 of the aforesaid sum to the Ephraim McDowell Cancer Research Foundation to be used to effectuate the purpose of the gift. (See PR 6A at the end of the Minutes.)

T. <u>Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Nursing</u> (PR 6B)

With President Singletary so recommending, Professor Wilson moved that the Board approve for submission to the Council on Higher Education a new doctoral degree program, Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Nursing. Professor Wilson's motion was seconded by Mr. Black and passed without dissent. (See PR 6B at the end of the Minutes.)

U. Establishment of Department of Physician Assistant Studies (PR 6C)

Without discussion, on motion made by Professor Wilson, seconded by Mr. Bell and carried, the Board authorized the establishment of the Department of Physician Assistant Studies. (See PR 6C at the end of the Minutes.)

V. Abolition of Department of Dental Hygiene (PR 6D)

President Singletary recommended that the Board authorize the abolition of the Department of Dental Hygiene. The motion, which was made by Mr. Black and seconded by Mr. Clay, passed without dissent. (See PR 6D at the end of the Minutes.)

W. Amendment of Bylaws, Rules and Regulations of the Medical Staff, University Hospital (PR 6E)

With Chancellor Bosomworth so recommending and with the concurrence of President Singletary, Mr. Black moved approval of the proposed amendment to the Bylaws, Rules and Regulations of the Medical Staff, University Hospital, as presented in PR 6E. Mr. Black's motion was seconded by Mr. Clay and carried. (See PR 6E at the end of the Minutes.)

X. Approval for the Construction of the Dorothy Enslow Combs Cancer Research Facility (PR 6F)

Mr. Brereton Jones moved that the Board of Trustees approve the construction of the Dorothy Enslow Combs Cancer Research Facility on the Medical Center Campus by the Ephraim McDowell Cancer Foundation, Incorporated, using private funds. His motion was seconded by Mr. Larry Jones and unanimously carried. (See PR 6F at the end of the Minutes.)

Y. Agreement Between the University of Kentucky and Kentucky Medical Services Foundation (PR 6G)

Chancellor Bosomworth explained that the terms in the document are essentially the same as those in the agreement approved by the Board on June 19, 1984. He added that the document has been updated to reflect dates in the new contract period and to revise the dollar amounts due the University under Sections 5.C. and 18.A. He also informed the Trustees that the amount for professional liability insurance is incomplete because the University to this date has not received bids for its excess umbrella insurance. The University is pursuing the purchase of the excess insurance and KMSF will bear 48.45 percent of the total cost.

Mr. Black moved approval of the agreement between the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and Kentucky Medical Services Foundation, Incorporated as presented in PR 6G. Mr. Black's motion was seconded by Professor Cantrell and carried without dissent. (See PR 6G at the end of the Minutes.)

Z. <u>Final Report of the Ad Hoc Advisory</u> Committee--University of Kentucky/University of Louisville Merger

Mr. McCowan asked Mr. Clay to assume the Chair. The Chair recognized Mr. McCowan, Chairman of the Ad Hoc Advisory Committee--University of Kentucky/University of Louisville Merger. Mr. McCowan reminded the Trustees that the ad hoc committee was appointed approximately one year ago to assist the President in responding to the resolution of the Council on Higher Education regarding a common governance structure for the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville. He reported that the committee held five scheduled meetings throughout the year and, at its meeting on the morning of June 24, approved the Final Report. Mr. McCowan then read the committee report (copy attached), following which he moved adoption. The motion was seconded by Professor Wilson and unanimously carried. (See Final Report at the end of the Minutes.)

AA. Interim Financial Report (FCR 1)

Mr. Clay said that the Finance Committee did not meet today since the items on the agenda were routine. He then moved that the University of Kentucky Financial Report for the ten months ended April 30, 1985 be accepted. The motion which was seconded by Mr. Larry Jones, and it was so ordered. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

BB. Disposal of Personal Property (FCR 2)

Mr. Clay moved, and Mr. Rose seconded, that the Board approve the disposition of obsolete and surplus equipment as recommended in FCR 2. The motion carried without dissent. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

CC. Report on Leases (FCR 3)

Noting that the leases in FCR 3 did not exceed \$20,000 in value, Mr. Clay moved that the Board accept the report as recommended. The motion was seconded by Mr. Black, and it was so ordered. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

DD. Capital Construction Report (FCR 4)

Mr. Clay recommended and so moved that the capital construction report for the nine months ending March 31, 1985 be accepted. His motion was seconded by Mr. Lassetter and passed without dissent. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

EE. Contracts with Administrative Officers

Mr. Clay moved that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to negotiate and execute contracts with the administrative officers providing for the terms and conditions of their employment and benefits. The motion was seconded by Mr. Farmer and passed without dissent.

FF. Land-Use Committee Meeting

Mr. Clay announced that the Land-Use Committee would meet in Room C immediately following the Board meeting. He also indicated that the Committee hopes to present its report at the Board meeting scheduled in August.

GG. Resolution Commending President Singletary

The Chair recognized Mr. Bell who voiced his concern over recent newspaper articles concerning President Singletary and the University. Mr. Bell moved that the Board adopt a resolution recognizing President Singletary's excellent leadership in the past and expressing its full support and confidence in his continued leadership. Mr. Bell's motion was seconded by Mr. Farmer and unanimously carried.

President Singletary expressed his appreciation and thanks to Mr. Bell for his comments and to the Board for the Resolution.

HH. Faculty Members Recognized

Professor Wilson recognized the large number of faculty in attendance and said their presence indicates the level of concern held by faculty about the draft of the Council on Higher Education Strategic Plan. She recommended faculty involvement in responding to the Council's attack on the University.

II. <u>Resolution --Council on Higher Education Draft of Strategic Plan</u>

President Singletary discussed the newspaper stories about the first draft of the Council on Higher Education Strategic Plan and expressed his serious concern about the implications of the draft for the University of Kentucky. Mr. McCowan also voiced concern about the draft and read the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Council on Higher Education has circulated a draft of its Strategic Plan in which are included several proposals that are directly damaging to the University of Kentucky (e.g., a recommended action to close the University of Kentucky College of Dentistry and a proposal to either dismantle the University of Kentucky Community College System or to remove it altogether from the administrative supervision of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees); and,

WHEREAS, the Plan, as circulated can only be interpreted as harmful to the present operation and future prospects of the University; and,

WHEREAS, no assurances have been forthcoming from Council staff or members that these specific provisions will not be included in the final plan; and,

WHEREAS, it appears that the Commonwealth's principal university for statewide instruction, research and public service is being singled out for potential dismemberment without regard to quality of performance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by this Board of Trustees that any such proposals to dismantle the University of Kentucky are unacceptable to the Board and will be vigorously opposed. The Board directs the administration to make its position known throughout the Commonwealth;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Board hereby urges the Council on Higher Education to exercise its leadership to foster and promote higher education rather than to create unnecessary divisiveness and conflict. The Council's Strategic Plan should be a positive document that will serve to unify support for the enhancement of quality education;

FURTHER, it is directed that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to each member of the Council on Higher Education and to the Governor of the Commonwealth.

Several of the Trustees spoke in favor of the resolution, following which Mr. Bell moved adoption. The motion was seconded by Mr. Clay and unanimously carried.

JJ. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 11:15 a.m.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS

Recommendation: that the following amendment to the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky (December 1984) be received at this time for preliminary consideration and, at the next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, be included on the agenda for action.

(Note: Proposed additions are underlined; proposed deletions are bracketed.)

Amendment -- Change Part X.C.6 to read:

X.C.6. Faculty Members as Candidates for Degrees

Members of the faculty, except those in the Community College System, having a rank higher than that of instructor may not be considered as candidates for degrees in the discipline in which they are employed and hold academic rank [or as candidates for degrees above the master's degree at the University].

Faculty members pursuing degrees above the master's degree at the University of Kentucky may not hold more than a half-time work assignment either during the two full-time, consecutive resident semesters preceding the qualifying examination or during the two semesters of full-time dissertation study immediately following the qualifying examination.

Background: Interest in revision of this part of the Governing Regulations was stimulated by a suggestion in the Visiting Committee Report of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in 1982. Following a report of an ad hoc study committee, the Senate Council solicited information from the Lexington Campus and Medical Center sectors about the apparent need for such a modification and, finding considerable supporting evidence, coordinated the development of the proposed amendment. The Graduate Council was unanimous on the recommended work load assignment during the semesters of full-time residence preceding the qualifying examination and believed that a similar work load following the qualifying examination would encourage faculty working toward a doctorate to complete the doctorate as quickly as possible. The University Senate approved this proposed amendment in the Governing Regulations at its meeting on May 6, 1985.

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STUDENT SERVICES AGREEMENT

This is a Student Services Agreement (the "Agreement") between the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees (the "University") and University of Kentucky Student Agencies, Inc. ("UKSA") dated as of June ____, 1984.

Recitals

- A. The University has observed the recent reduction in funds available from governmental sources for financial aid to students. Due to the need for alternative sources of financial support to enable students to finance their education, the University has adopted a policy statement that establishes a student services program which will provide both practical job experience and extra income for students at the University.
- B. UKSA, a non-profit corporation which qualifies as a tax-exempt educational organization under 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, desires to operate a student services program that will fulfill its educational objectives.
- C. The University recognizes UKSA as a "qualifying entity" as described in the policy statement adopted by the University establishing the student employment program.
- D. The University and UKSA desire to enter into this Agreement, whereby UKSA will operate a student services program, in order to advance the goals set forth above.

SECTION 1

Definitions

As used in this Agreement, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

(a) "Campus" shall mean the University campus in Lexington,

Kentucky including any dormitories, classrooms or other instructional facilities, student center, offices and any other areas over which the University has authority.

- (b) "Coordinator" shall mean the full time staff member to be hired by UKSA who will act as the chief operating officer of UKSA.
- (c) "Program" shall mean the student services program that was established by the University pursuant to a policy statement dated May 4, 1982.
- (d) "University Contracts" shall mean any contracts for goods or services between the University and any other entity other than UKSA.

SECTION 2

Nature of Agreement

The University hereby gives UKSA full authority and the exclusiveright to operate the Program and UKSA agrees to operate the Program subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

SECTION 3

The Program

- 3.1 Scope. UKSA shall develop student employment opportunities for the Program that will aid students in financing their education. These jobs shall be designed to provide goods and services to the University community, and to provide education related work experience for students.
- 3.2 Administration. UKSA shall assume all responsibility for the Program including the payment of wages to students and the payment of all expenses incurred in the operation of the Program. UKSA shall keep all books, records, and other documents which are necessary for the proper administration of the Program, and shall make necessary filings with federal,

state, and local agencies.

3.3 Revenue. Any revenue from the operation of the Program which is in excess of wages and other operating expenses shall be used to increase the rate of wages paid to students and to explore and develop other employment opportunities. UKSA may invest available funds in short term securities from time to time at its discretion.

SECTION 4

Covenants of UKSA

- 4.1 <u>Non-Profit Status</u>. UKSA shall be organized and operated as a non-profit corporation pursuant to Chapter 273 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes at all times during the term of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Personnel</u>. All officers, members, and employees of UKSA shall be University students except for the Coordinator who may or may not be a University student.
- 4.3 <u>Wages</u>. Wages paid by UKSA to its employees will be equal to or greater than Kentucky's minimum wage as set by Chapter 337 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.
- 4.4 <u>Prior Approval of Campus Services and Solicitation</u>. UKSA shall secure prior written approval by the University Dean of Students for all services to be provided on Campus pursuant to the Program and for any solicitation on Campus.
- 4.5 Equal Opportunity. UKSA shall not discriminate against any student, or anyone with whom it does business, on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, or handicap.
- 4.6 Availability of Records. UKSA shall make available all of its books, records, and accounts for inspection and audit by representatives of

the University within forty-eight hours of receiving written notice by the University.

- 4.7 Annual Audit. UKSA shall have an annual audit to be conducted by a firm of Certified Public Accountants approved in writing by the University. An audit report and any compliance letters shall be submitted to the University.
- 4.8 <u>Fund Raising Efforts</u>. UKSA shall coordinate all of its fund raising efforts through the Vice President for University Relations.
- 4.9 Organizational Documents. UKSA shall not amend or otherwise alter its Articles of Incorporation or adopt any bylaw or other operating practice that would alter the character of UKSA without the prior written consent of the University.
- 4.10 Merger. UKSA shall not merge with any other corporation or convey any substantial portion of its assets to any other person, corporation, partnership, or other entity.
- 4.11 <u>University Contracts</u>. UKSA shall not provide any goods or services or take any action that would conflict or interfere with any University Contracts.

SECTION 5

Right to Bid on University Contracts

The University shall allow UKSA to submit bids on contracts for the furnishing of goods and services to the University.

SECTION 6

Indemnification

UKSA shall indemnify and hold the University harmless for the full amount of any loss, claim, damage, liability, or expense resulting to the

University either directly or indirectly from (a) any breach of the covenants by UKSA set forth in this Agreement, and (b) any injury to any employee during the course of his or her employment with UKSA.

SECTION 7

Dissolution of UKSA

In the event of the dissolution of UKSA pursuant to Chapter 273 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, the assets of UKSA shall be applied and distributed as follows:

- (a) First, liabilities and obligations of UKSA shall be paid and discharged, or adequate provisions shall be made therefor,
- (b) Second, assets held by UKSA upon a condition which occurs by reason of the dissolution, shall be returned, transferred, or conveyed in accordance with such condition,
- (c) Third, the remaining assets of UKSA shall be transferred or conveyed to the University, or its successors, to be used for the financial aid of its students if the University, or its successor, qualifies as an instrumentality of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and an organization described in Section 170(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended. If the University, or its successor, does not so qualify, the remaining assets shall be distributed to some other organization or organizations that are organized exclusively for educational purposes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended.

SECTION 8

Miscellaneous

8.1 Entire Agreement. This Agreement incorporates the policy statement by the University of May 4, 1982 that established a student services

program. The Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior understandings with respect to the subject matter hereof. No change, modification, addition or termination of this Agreement shall be enforceable unless in writing and signed by the party against whom enforcement is sought.

- 8.2 Notices. All notices and other communications required by Section 8.1, shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if mailed by registered mail, return receipt requested, postage pre-paid, to the addresses set forth below or to such other address as to which a party has given the other parties written notice:

- 8.3 <u>Headings</u>. The headings used in this Agreement have been included solely for ease of reference and shall not be considered in the interpretation or construction of this Agreement.
- 8.4 <u>Waiver</u>. No waiver of any of the provisions hereof shall be effective unless in writing and signed by the party to be charged with such waiver. No waiver shall be deemed a continuing waiver in respect of any breach or default, whether of a similar or different nature, unless expressly stated in writing.

- 8.5 <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement or its application shall be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, the validity, legality and enforceability of all other applications of that provision and of all other provisions and applications thereof shall not in any way be effected or impaired.
- 8.6 Governing Law. The validity, construction and interpretation of this Agreement shall be governed in accordance with the law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
- 8.7 Term. The term of this Agreement shall be from July 1, 1984 to June 30, 1985. This Agreement may be renewed on an annual basis upon the mutual agreement in writing of UKSA and the University.

ACCEPTANCE OF GIFT FROM THE LUCILLE P. MARKEY CHARITABLE TRUST

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees accept the gift of \$3.1 million from the Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust, and that the Treasurer be authorized to transfer \$1,073,781 of the aforesaid sum to the Ephraim McDowell Cancer Research Foundation to be used to effectuate the purpose of the gift.

Background: The Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust commenced operations in November, 1983. Under the provisions of the will of the late Lucille P. Markey, who died in Miami, Florida in 1982, the Trust's assets are to be used "only for the purposes of supporting and encouraging basic medical research". In its first year and one-half of operations, the Trust has made two types of grants: first, to complete projects initiated by Mrs. Markey during her lifetime; and second, to support fellowships and related grants. During Mrs. Markey's lifetime, she contributed to the construction of the Lucille P. Markey Cancer Center at the University of Kentucky which was created to provide educational, diagnostic, and treatment facilities for cancer care and to conduct research in cancer related areas. The financing of the diagnostic and treatment facilities was largely completed before Mrs. Markey's death. Since the establishment of the Charitable Trust under her will, the Trustees have made grants toward completion of the Center. On May 20, 1985, the Medical Center received a gift of \$3.1 million to purchase research instrumentation for the magnetic resonance imaging center. Of the total gift, \$1,073,781 will be transferred to the Ephraim McDowell Cancer Research Foundation which will donate to the University a 4.7 tesla animal care unit and a Varian XL-300 Spectrometer for use in the Lucille P. Markey Cancer Center. The total gifts received to date from the Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust are nearly \$14 million.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY DEGREE IN NURSING

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board approve for submission to the Council on Higher Education a new doctoral degree program, Doctoral of Philosophy Degree in Nursing.

<u>Background</u>: The University of Kentucky has the only National League for Nursing accredited master's degree program in the state. In 1978, a report of a Nursing Study Group of the Council on Higher Education involved in comprehensive planning for higher education addressed the issue of doctoral preparation in nursing. The group included representatives from all levels of nursing education, representatives from nursing service, and other people knowledgeable about nursing from all regions of the state.

The group determined that there was an insufficient number of nurses in Kentucky to assume leadership roles in education, administration, and clinical practice. One recommendation was that the University of Kentucky should expand its graduate program to help meet pressing statewide needs for nurses with advanced education. In discussing graduate education, the group noted an acute shortage of available Ph.D. faculty in nursing. The need for a doctoral program in the state has been further documented through other sources.

The doctoral program in nursing will build on the present master's degree program in nursing. The master's program is well received and is recognized as a quality program. More than 500 individuals have completed the master's program since its inception. Fifty-eight percent of the graduates are employed in Kentucky, based on a recent evaluation of the program.

This proposed program, which has been approved by the University's Academic Councils, is consistent with the University's statewide education mission in that it is a unique program not available elsewhere in the Commonwealth. Deans of colleges of nursing in states contiguous to Kentucky have written letters of support for the program. A federally funded planning grant of over \$500,000 over a three year period has been awarded to the University. The proposed program is a part of the Medical Center's Five-Year Plan. Resources have been allocated for three faculty members to implement the program. Facilities are available in the College of Nursing, therefore, no new facilities will be required.

This course of action is fully supported by the Department of Allied Health Education and Research, appropriate faculty bodies and administrators, and the University Senate.

AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS, RULES AND REGULATIONS MEDICAL STAFF, UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL

Recommendation: that the following proposed amendment to the Bylaws, Rules and Regulations of the Medical Staff, University Hospital, be approved.

Section 13. Committee for Special Service and/or Function

D. Ethics Committee

The Ethics Committee shall be Ad Hoc, called and chaired by the Associate Dean for Clinical Affairs.

The Committee shall include the following representation:

- A. Medical Staff
- B. Nursing
- C. Hospital Administration
- D. Social Services
- E. Chaplain
- F. Legal Staff
- G. Ethics or Philosophy

When specific patient situations are to be discussed additional representation may be invited.

The function of the Committee shall include the following:

- A. Recommend policies regarding foregoing life sustaining equipment for life threatening situations in infants, children and adults.
- B. Review of cases where physicians or families propose the withholding or withdrawal of life sustaining treatment for an infant, child and adult that do not meet the Hospital Death Policy or subsequent appropriate specific policies that would make review unnecessary.
- Center Colleges and Community for medical ethics education and information programs.
- All discussions, records and reviews shall be kept strictly confidential. The Risk Management Office shall treat all patient specific materials as "request communications" to the Legal Office.
- If the Committee has recommended courses of action these should be recorded briefly in the chart by the Committee Chair.
- If the family desires to continue life support its views will be carried out unless legal custody is changed by the court.

<u>Background</u>: This proposed amendment has been approved, in conformance with the Bylaws, by a two-thirds vote of the Clinical Board and by the Council of Supervisors, University Hospital. It becomes effective upon approval of the Board of Trustees.

Approval for the Construction of the Dorothy Enslow Combs Cancer Research Facility

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees approve the construction of the Dorothy Enslow Combs Cancer Research Facility on the Medical Center Campus by the Ephraim McDowell Cancer Foundation, Inc., using private funds, with the expectation that the President of the University will transmit this proposal to the Council on Higher Education for their action.

Background: The University of Kentucky, in its continued quest for excellence in discovery, learning, and patient care related to cancer, has made significant progress in the development of its cancer research, education and patient care programs. Phase I of the Lucille Parker Markey Cancer Center, primarily a cancer patient care facility, is expected to be completed and in operation in September of this year. Private fundraising for this project and for Phase II, the research facility, has been completed, in that the Ephraim McDowell Foundation has raised in excess of \$20 million for these two projects.

The Phase II project, to be known as the Dorothy Enslow Combs Cancer Research Building, is under design by the Ephraim McDowell Cancer Foundation. This new research facility will contain specialized "core" laboratories utilizing state-of-the-art research instrumentation as well as standard research laboratories. This new building will significantly enhance space available for research, and will help solve crowding currently apparent in our laboratories. Extramural research funding will support the direct research to be carried out in the building. Funding for additional research faculty has been obtained, and additional resources and research expertise will be, and has been, attracted because of the enormous potential this facility presents. We would hope the Council on Higher Education support can be achieved for construction of this facility and for its attendant maintenance and operations expenses.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY AND KENTUCKY MEDICAL SERVICES FOUNDATION

Recommendation: that the Board approve the attached agreement between the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and Kentucky Medical Services Foundation, Inc. which was negotiated pursuant to the "Board of Trustees Resolution Regarding Medical Practice Plan" adopted on June 20, 1978.

Background: The Board action on June 20, 1978 provided that:

"The President is authorized to negotiate and execute a contract subject to approval of the Board of Trustees, with an appropriately qualified organizational entity for carrying out necessary functions and assuming the responsibilities involved in the administration of income for professional services under the plan."

Kentucky Medical Services Foundation, Inc. meets the "criteria" specified under Section III Λ for the appropriately qualified organization. The attached agreement conforms to the provisions of the June 20 Board resolution and specifically satisfied the "conditions" set forth in Section III B.

The terms of the attached document are essentially the same as those in the agreement approved by the Board on June 19, 1984. The document has been updated to reflect dates in the new contract period, revise the dollar amounts due the University under Section 5, C and Section 18A. The dollar amounts have been revised to reflect the increased costs for 1985-86. The amount for professional liability insurance is incomplete at this time. We have not received bids for our excess umbrella insurance policy to this date. The University is pursuing the purchase of excess insurance and KMSF will bear 48.45% of the total cost. The amount for expenses attendant to the production of clinical income has been increased from \$2,148,067 to \$2,204,241.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this _____ day of _____,

1985 by and between the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, a

statutory body corporate existing pursuant to Section 164.100 et seq of the

Kentucky Revised Statutes (hereinafter referred to as the University) and

KENTUCKY MEDICAL SERVICES FOUNDATION, INC., a non-stock, non-profit

corporation formed pursuant to Chapter 273 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes

(hereinafter referred to as the Foundation).

WITNESSETH:

Section 1. RECITALS

- A. Foundation is organized for the purposes stated in its Articles of Incorporation as a non-stock, non-profit corporation and will use and apply the whole or any part of its income and principal exclusively for charitable, scientific, or educational purposes at or for the benefit of, the University of Kentucky Medical Center.
- B. A substantial number of University's faculty in its College of Medicine have heretofore executed agreements with Foundation, known as "Practice Agreements and Assignments" whereby said faculty have assigned to Foundation their professionally generated clinical income.
- C. The recruitment and retention of the members of the medical faculty of the University will be improved by permitting the said members to supplement, by income from the practice of medicine, the salaries provided by the University.

- D. The University recognizes that the medical practice activities of its faculty members can be conducted in a more efficient and economical manner if those faculty members who produce income are permitted, through the medium of the Foundation, to exercise a larger voice in the expenditure of the funds so produced.
- E. The University has heretofore established, in addition to its previously adopted Physicians Service Plan, a "geographic full-time medical service plan", the said geographic full-time plan having been adopted on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984; said action is hereby incorporated by reference as is set out in full herein.
- F. The aforementioned action of University's Board of Trustees authorized the University's President to negotiate and execute a contract, subject to the approval of said Board, with an appropriately qualified entity for carrying out necessary functions and assuming the responsibilities involved in the administration of income for professional services under the plan.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Section 2. DEFINITIONS

A. "The Plan" means the geographic full-time medical service plan for the University of Kentucky College of Medicine established by action of the Board of Trustees of said University dated June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984.

- B. "Clinical Income" means (1) all payments for professional services rendered to or with respect to patients whether denominated as diagnosis, treatment, evaluation, or consultation and whether said payments be characterized as fees, retainers, or otherwise, and (2) all payments whether direct or in kind, (excluding actual travel costs) for oversight or administration of, or consultation with, facilities, programs, or other operations providing care, services or evaluation relating to patients, and (3) witness fees or other payments relating to depositions or other evaluations in the capacity of an expert witness. Provided, however, that nothing contained herein shall be deemed to include in the term "clinical income" any item excluded therefrom by paragraph II, B of the plan.
- C. "Practice Agreements" means those documents, denominated Practice Agreements and Assignments heretofore executed by certain members of University's faculty, the University, The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center and the Foundation.

Section 3. NATURE OF THE AGREEMENT

Pursuant to Paragraph III, A. of the aforementioned action of University's Board of Trustees dated June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, University hereby recognizes Foundation as an "appropriately qualified organizational entity"

as described therein for carrying out necessary functions and assuming the responsibilities involved in the administration of income for professional services under University's "geographic full-time medical services plan".

Section 4. BILLING AND COLLECTION

Foundation agrees that it will accept, pursuant to practice agreements, the assignment of all clinical income by participants in the plan and, in accordance with such assignment, agrees to bill the amount of duly established charges for professional services to parties determined to be responsible for payment of such charges.

Section 5. REIMBURSEMENT OF UNIVERSITY

- A. In accord with paragraph II, D. 2 of the plan, the parties recognize that Foundation must reimburse University for actual expenses incurred by it which are attendant to the production of clinical income.
- B. To provide for said reimbursement, Foundation agrees that it will, on or before the first working day of each month in which reimbursable expenses are due as provided hereinafter, deposit the funds necessary to make such payments in a separate account maintained by it and that funds held in the said account will be invested only in accord with the provisions of Section 17 hereof.
- C. Foundation agrees to pay to University, from said account, as reimbursement for the remainder of the expenses attendant to the production of clinical income, University's actual annual costs, as determined by joint evaluation of Foundation and University, the sum of Two Million Two Hundred Four Thousand Two Hundred Forty—One (\$2,204,241.00) Dollars, composed of \$2,204,241 as reimbursement of personnel expenses and other current expenses, in direct support of the operation of the AMS Clinic.

Payments hereunder shall be in the following manner:

- 1. Twelve (12) monthly installments of One Hundred Eighty-Three Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-Six and 75 Cents (\$183,686.75) each on the last calendar day of each month beginning July 31, 1985.
- 2. Any increase in direct costs of personnel and current expenses will be additive to the \$2,204,241.00 annual amount and will be borne by the Foundation. Likewise, direct cost savings in personnel and current expenses experienced through mutual management efforts of University and Foundation, will be deducted from the \$2,204,241.00 yearly reimbursement as adjusted and the monthly payments to University will be adjusted accordingly. Within 30 days of the end of each quarter, University and Foundation officials will reconcile the direct cost expenditures for clinic operations to determine if direct cost expenditures exceed the \$2,204,241.00 yearly amount or if direct cost savings have been experienced. If it is determined that direct cost savings will be experienced during the last quarter of the 1985-86 fiscal year, Foundation will hold an estimated amount in escrow from the last monthly (June 1986) payment until the final quarter reconciliation is made.
- D. In addition to the above, Foundation agrees that it will reimburse University for all "plan income", as that term is defined in paragraph II, C., 2 of the plan, paid to faculty by University.

Section 6. REIMBURSEMENT OF FOUNDATION

A. The parties recognized that University receives certain services from Foundation, for which it is due reimbursement as specified hereinbelow.

- B. University agrees to pay to Foundation on behalf of members of the Department of Diagnostic Radiology for the provision of x-ray interpretation services to the University Student Health Service during the period July 1, 1985 June 30, 1986 a sum not to exceed Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars.
- C. University agrees to pay to Foundation on behalf of members of the Department of Surgery, for the harvesting of transplantable kidneys from appropriate cadavers, for University Hospital, the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred (\$1,200.00) dollars for each kidney harvest. In addition the University also agrees to pay for appropriate professional fees as defined by Medicare, Part A reimbursement regulations for live donor kidney acquisitions and cadaver kidney acquisitions.

In the event Medicare reduces Hospital reimbursement for professional fees paid as outlined above, the Foundation agrees to refund said amounts.

- D. In consideration of the furnishing of a computer prepared listing of Outpatient Diagnosis by Foundation to the Department of Patient Accounts of University Hospital on a monthly basis, University agrees to pay Foundation its actual cost.
- E. University agrees to pay to Foundation on behalf of members of the Department of Neurology, for provision of EEG interpretation services to the University Student Health Service, a fee of Forty-Five (\$45.00) dollars for each such service rendered.
- F. University agrees to pay to Foundation on behalf of members of the Department of Medicine, for provision of executive physical examinations to certain University employees identified by the University President, a fee for each examination.

G. University will make payment to Foundation monthly, on the last calendar day of each month beginning July 31, 1985, for services as described in paragraphs B, C, D, E, and F hereinabove.

Section 7. ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT FUND

A. Consonant with Section II, D. 3 of the plan adopted by
University's Board of Trustees on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984,
Foundation agrees that it will pay to The Fund for Advancement of Education
and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center (hereinafter Fund),
an amount equal to three (3%) percent of the actual clinical income collected
by said Foundation. The Fund will deposit said payments in an account
maintained for the purpose of providing an academic enrichment fund to be used
by the Dean of the College of Medicine in support of the programs of said
College and for related purposes. Amounts due hereunder will be computed by
Foundation on a monthly basis as income is received and remitted to the Fund
within twenty-five (25) days after the close of each monthly accounting period.

B. Foundation further agrees that it will deposit, in an account maintained by Foundation, on the same basis as provided in subsection A. hereinabove, an additional amount equal to six (6%) percent of the actual clinical income collected by said Foundation, said funds to be used by the Dean of the College of Medicine for the enrichment of the programs of the College and for related purposes in his sole discretion.

Section 8. PARTICULAR COVENANTS OF THE FOUNDATION

- A. Foundation's Articles of Incorporation, as filed with the Secretary of State of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on June 19, 1978, have been inspected by the University as a condition precedent to University's entry into this agreement. Foundation covenants that it will not, absent the written agreement of the University, amend or otherwise alter said Articles or adopt any by-law or other operating practice which would effectively alter the character of said Foundation.
- B. Foundation covenants that it will not engage in the practice of medicine, nor will it solicit, administer, receive, perform or accept any gift, grant, devise, bequest, contract or other arrangement with or from any governmental unit, entity, or subdivision or any person, corporation, partnership, association or other entity whatsoever except as specifically permitted herein. Provided, however, that nothing contained herein shall be construed to prohibit the Foundation (subject to the approval of the Dean of the College of Medicine) from negotiating and executing contracts providing exclusively for professional services by faculty who have executed practice agreements.

C. Foundation covenants that it will not merge with any other corporation or convey any substantial portion of its assets to any other corporation, partnership, or other entity except as specifically provided herein and that, in the event of its dissolution its Board of Directors shall cause its assets to be applied and distributed as follows: (a) all liabilities and obligations of the corporation shall be paid, satisfied and discharged, or adequate provisions shall be made therefore; (b) assets held by the corporation upon a condition which occurs by reason of the dissolution, shall be returned, transferred or conveyed in accordance with such requirements; and (c) all of the remaining assets of the corporation shall be transferred or conveyed to the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, or its successor, to be used for medical education and research, if said University or its successor, shall qualify as a public corporation and an instrumentality of the State of Kentucky or as an exempt organization under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended; and if said University or its successor shall not so qualify, then to some other organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, or scientific purposes in the field of medicine as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended.

Section 9. MEMBERSHIP AND BENEFITS

A. University agrees that it will assist the Foundation to enforce the terms of the practice agreements entered into by members of University's clinical departments of its College of Medicine by requiring adherence to said agreements as a condition of continued employment as a member of University's faculty.

- B. University agrees that it will require, as a condition of employment as a member of University's faculty in a clinical department in which a majority of the faculty members have executed practice agreements, that new members of its faculty execute said practice agreement in form identical to said agreements heretofore executed or as the form of same may be modified by mutual agreement of the parties hereto from time to time.
- C. Foundation agrees that it will not, absent the written consent of University, bill for, collect or administer any item of income for any person or entity not holding membership in the plan, nor will it permit persons not members to serve on its Board of Directors, nor will it provide any benefit or other thing of value to any person or entity not a member of the plan except for (1) termination benefits to former members as provided by action of Foundation's Board of Directors, (2) incidental benefits indirectly accruing to employees of the Medical Center by virtue of Foundation's activities, (3) students and House Staff of University, (4) payment to nurses incident to their recruitment to the University Medical Center, (5) education and technical training costs of persons involved in patient care activities or (6) education and technical training costs of persons indirectly involved in patient care activities if approved on a case by case basis by the Dean of the College of Medicine or the Chancellor for the Medical Center.
- D. In order to provide University of Kentucky Health Plan patients with a unified bill, Foundation is authorized to bill and collect the following items: clinic Pharmacy changes, patient deductible and non-covered items, and oral Surgery fees. The collection and billing shall be in accord with that certain contract entered into between the University and the Foundation.

- E. Foundation shall on or before November 1, 1985, assume responsibility for the costs of drugs and supplies to be used in the patient care programs in the clinics and is hereby authorized to bill, collect, and deposit in foundation accounts revenue from these non ancillary items.
- F. Foundation agrees that it will strictly enforce the terms of its practice agreements, report promptly to University in the event any individual fails or refuses to abide thereby and join with University in any appropriate action, in law or equity, necessary to secure compliance therewith.

Section 10. PERSONNEL

The parties recognize that the Foundation must employ various individuals to carry out its functions hereunder; however, the parties also recognize, and hereby declare their intention to adhere to, those provisions of the plan adopted by University's Board of Trustees on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, particularly those portions which provide that University must retain

responsibility and authority for the appointment of faculty and house staff, the determination of institutional staffing patterns and the maintenance of balance among programs and their component activities.

Accordingly, with respect to employment of personnel by Foundation, the parties agree as follows:

A. Foundation staff

The Foundation may employ an executive director and such assistants, including secretarial and clerical personnel as may be determined by its Board of Directors to be necessary to permit said Foundation to bill and collect

professional fee income and to administer its funds in accord with the terms of the geographic full-time plan.

The Foundation is authorized to house computer equipment as may be required to communicate with its central computer and house two FTE employees in the University Medical Plaza building for the purpose of providing billing and financial information to patients of University physicians who are members of KMSF.

B. Other personnel

During the term of this contract Foundation agrees that it will not employ persons other than the two FTE Employee authorized in Section 10.A. to perform services in University's patient care or college programs. Provided, however, that this provision shall not be construed to prohibit specific agreements between the parties whereby University will employ personnel for such service and/or research duties with reimbursement of salary, fringe benefits and other direct costs by Foundation. Where such personnel are employed for service in a specific department or unit, employment will not occur unless (1) the department or unit where service is to be performed has consented in writing to said appointment, (2) the Dean of the College of Medicine has approved the employment and the job description related thereto and (3) funds for the salary, fringe benefits, and other costs related to said employee are either on hand or reasonably anticipated in the departmental or unit budget.

C. Equal opportunity--affirmative action

Foundation agrees that it will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or handicap. The Foundation agrees that it will take affirmative

action to ensure that applicants are employed and employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or handicap. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other compensation; and selection for training. The Foundation agrees that it will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or handicap. The Foundation agrees that it will indemnify and save harmless the University, the Board of Trustees of the University including the individual members thereof, officers, agents and employees of the University by reason of any action at law or equity or by reason of any administrative proceeding initiated by any person arising out of any such employment action or practice of Foundation, including the payment of attorney fees and other costs of such action or proceeding.

Section 11. USE OF UNIVERSITY FACILITIES

The parties recognize that paragraphs III, B. 4, b, d, g and i of the "geographic full-time plan" adopted by University's Board of Trustees on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, require that institutional control be maintained with respect to direction and supervision of institutional activities and programs, assignment and use of space in institutional facilities, determination of goals, objectives and priorities and the maintenance of balance among programs and their component activities.

Accordingly, Foundation and University agree that University will provide space for the Ophthalmology Clinic, the Chambers Building, appropriate assigned space in the University Medical Plaza and the Emergency Room (exclusive of faculty offices and classroom space contained therein) and other space officially designated for the conduct of the patient care operation.

With respect to any other facilities which University may from time to time provide to Foundation, Foundation shall be deemed a licensee without any property right whatsoever in said premises or facilities and shall, upon demand of University, vacate same.

Section 12. MEDICAL RECORDS

The parties agree that all medical records relating to the care of patients in University facilities or as a part of University programs, are and shall remain the property of University and that Foundation has no right or property interest therein. Provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed to limit access to said records by members of University's faculty, staff, and students pursuant to existing University procedures. Provided, further, that University agrees to provide or make available to Foundation such information and data from patient records and program data maintained by University as may be necessary for Foundation to perform its billing and collection functions herein provided, including such information and data as may be necessary to meet the requirements of third-party or other payors as the basis for payment for services.

Section 13. INSPECTION AND AUDIT

- A. Foundation agrees that, in accord with paragraph II, B. 1, of the action of University's Board of Trustees dated June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, its books, records and accounts are open at all reasonable times to inspection and audit by appropriately designated University representatives.
- B. The parties agree that the University's Internal Auditors will conduct an audit of Foundation's operations and accounts for the period ending June 30, 1985 and such other audits, including audits to determine compliance with this agreement, the terms of the action of University's Board of Trustees on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, and the terms of the departmental agreements referred to in Section 19 hereof, as may be specified by the University of Kentucky Controller and Treasurer, and that Foundation's agents and employees will cooperate to the fullest extent possible with University's auditors designated to conduct same. Further, the parties agree that a firm of Certified Public Accountants, mutually agreeable to the parties, will be employed by the Foundation to perform an independent audit of the Foundation's books, records and accounts for the year ended June 30, 1986.
- C. The Parties agree that Foundation will be furnished information by University sufficient for Foundation to verify the nature and detail of expenditure of funds paid to University under the provisions of Section 5.c.2. hereinabove.

Section 14. DEFAULT

- A. In the event of any failure of Foundation to pay any sum due to University hereunder within thirty (30) days after written notice of such default shall have been mailed to Foundation, or any failure to perform any other of the terms, conditions or covenants of this agreement to be observed or performed by Foundation for more than thirty (30) days after written notice of such default shall have been mailed to Foundation, or if Foundation shall become bankrupt or insolvent, or file any debtor proceedings, or take or have taken against Foundation in any court pursuant to any statute either of the United States or of any State a petition in bankruptcy or insolvency or for reorganization or for the appointment of a receiver or trustee of all or a portion of Foundation's property, or if Foundation makes an assignment for the benefit of creditors, or petitions for or enters into an arrangement therewith, then University may terminate this agreement. Provided however, that should any default occur which cannot reasonably be corrected within such thirty (30) day period then Foundation shall have such additional time to correct said default as may be reasonably necessary if Foundation promptly initiates, and expeditiously carries out, appropriate action to correct such default.
- B. University may at its election terminate this agreement with respect to any department without termination of the entire agreement for the same reasons and in the same manner as provided hereinabove.

Section 15. PROFESSIONAL LIABILITY

Nothing contained herein shall be construed to provide that any member of University's clinical faculty, house staff or student is acting as an agent of Foundation when providing care to patients in University facilities or as a part of an approved University program. University agrees that, when so acting, said faculty, house staff and students shall be considered agents of said University and that payment of claims or judgments may be made on their behalf from the fund provided pursuant to KRS 164.941 or other University funds or funds provided through any policy or policies of insurance maintained for said purpose.

Section 16. APPLICATION OF INCOME

University agrees that it will not, during the operation of this contract, cause charges for services rendered after July 1, 1978 by members of the faculty who have executed Practice Agreements and Assignments to be deposited in the accounts of the Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky pursuant to the provisions of University of Kentucky Administrative Regulation AR II-4.0-1; deposits of such charges attributable to faculty who have not executed said Practice Agreements and Assignments shall continue pursuant to said regulation.

Section 17. MANAGEMENT AND INVESTMENT POLICIES

A. The parties recognize and agree that the reimbursement of .

University costs incurred attendant to the production of professional income

and the provision of a sum equal to nine (9%) percent of Foundation's gross income for the purpose of providing an academic enrichment fund for University's College of Medicine constitute the second and third charges, respectively, upon Foundation's gross income, the first charge being Foundation's ordinary and necessary expenses incurred in billing and collecting said income and providing for the central administration of Foundation. The mutual goal will be to raise the College of Medicine Academic Enrichment Fund tax to ten (10%) percent, but this is dependent upon the outcome of the bids we are seeking for umbrella medical malpractice insurance.

B. Accordingly, Foundation agrees that it will deposit the funds necessary to meet its obligations for reimbursement of the University and the provision of the aforementioned academic enrichment fund in a separate account as received and that the funds in said account shall be invested only in the following: (1) direct obligations of the United States Treasury; (2) other appropriate securities issued by federal agencies (including the Federal National Mortgage Association, the Export Import Bank, Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, Federal Home Loan Banks, Federal Land Banks); and (3) certificates of deposit collateralized by direct obligations of the federal government, federal agency obligations which qualify for direct investment under this recommendation, general obligations of the Commonwealth of Kentucky or obligations of the University of Kentucky.

Foundation shall be entitled to the investment income derived from said account, provided however investment income derived from balances attributed to the academic enrichment fund identified in subparagraph A. and Section 7, paragraph B. hereinabove shall be credited to said account.

Section 18. PROVISION OF PROFESSIONAL LIABILITY INSURANCE

- A. Foundation agrees that it will pay to University, as reimbursement to University for its portion of costs attendant to (i) payments required pursuant to KRS 164.941, a sum certain of One Hundred Thirty—Nine Thousand Three Hundred Forty—Three (\$139,343) Dollars, (ii) costs of claims administration, the sum of Thirty—Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty (\$38,760) Dollars in Twelve (12) equal installments, the first said installment being due and payable on July 31, 1985 and monthly thereafter until June 30, 1986 and (iii) 48.45 percent of cost of the premiums to be paid for excess aggregate professional liability insurance yet to be determined which insurance is to be procured by the University of Kentucky, and payable when premium(s) is(are) due from the University of Kentucky.
- B. In addition, Foundation has agreed that between July 1, 1985 and June 30, 1986, it will cause to be deposited in a separate account the sum of One Hundred Forty-Five Thousand Four Hundred (\$145,400) Dollars, said account together with interest accruing thereto to be held solely for the purpose of payment of claims or judgments arising for liabilities defined in KRS 164.941 (3). No monies in said account shall be expended for any other purpose than as provided in this Section without the written agreement of University, nor shall such monies be encumbered, pledged or otherwise hypothecated. The monies in said account shall be invested only as provided in Section 17 hereof. Payment to the separate account may be in equal installments, provided that the full \$145,400.00 is deposited by June 30, 1986.

Section 19. ADMINISTRATION OF DEPARTMENTAL FUNDS

A. Foundation agrees that it will, after making provision for: (1) the costs of its administration and costs relating to billing and collection, (2) reimbursement of University expenses pursuant to Section 5 hereof and (3) the College of Medicine Academic Enrichment Fund pursuant to Section 7 hereof, maintain its accounts in such a manner that income attributable to the professional clinical activities of each of the following departments or divisions shall be shown separately on books maintained by the Foundation from any other fund or funds held by said Foundation:

Anesthesiology

Diagnostic Radiology

Emergency Medicine

Family Practice

Medicine

Neurology

Ob/Gyn

Ophthalmology

Pathology

Pediatrics

Preventive Medicine & Environmental Health

Psychiatry

Radiation Medicine

Rehabilitation Medicine

Surgery

B. Thereafter, Foundation agrees that it will expend the funds maintained by it in the aforementioned accounts only in accord with the departmental or divisional agreement relating to each department or division. Said departmental agreements are recognized as a material portion of this agreement. Therefore the parties agree that University shall retain custody of all funds accruing to the account of departments for which an approved departmental agreement has not been executed. Said departmental or divisional agreements may be amended from time to time, as provided in said agreements, with the approval of the Dean of the College of Medicine.

Section 20. NOTICES

All notices, demands and requests hereunder shall be in writing and shall be given by United States Registered or Certified Mail or by messenger delivery, in the case of University to:

Each party may from time to time change its address for purposes of notice by giving to the other party notice of such change of address. Any notice, demand or request given by United States Registered or Certified Mail, as provided herein, shall be deemed served on the date it is deposited in the United States mails properly addressed and with postage fully prepaid.

Section 21. RECORDS ACCESS

Pursuant to Public Law 96-499, Section 952, the Foundation agrees to make available upon written request from the Secretary of Health and Human Resources, the Comptroller General, or the Department of Human Services of the State of Kentucky or any of their duly authorized representatives, access to this contract and all other service agreements written or oral entered into or renewed since December 5, 1980, and access to books, documents, and records necessary to verify costs of services provided by such arrangements exceeding \$10,000 in a 12-month period. Access will be permitted until four years have expired after completion of services furnished, and in accordance with the applicable federal regulations.

If the Foundation carries out any of the duties under this contract through a sub-contract with a related organization, with a value or cost of \$10,000 or more over a 12-month period, such sub-contract shall contain a clause to the effect that until the expiration of four years after the furnishing of such services pursuant to the sub-contract, the related organization shall make available, upon written request from the Secretary or Comptroller General, or any of their duly authorized representatives, the sub-contract, books, documents and records of such organization that are necessary to verify the nature and extent of such costs.

Section 22. TERM

The term of this agreement shall begin on July 1, 1985 and end on June 30, 1986.

FINAL REPORT

Ad Hoc Advisory Committee
University of Kentucky/University of Louisville Merger
June 24, 1985

On April 27, 1984, the Council on Higher Education formally adopted a resolution requesting that the Boards of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville give serious consideration to the feasibility of merging the two institutions and asking the two presidents to report back to the Council not later than July 1985. In response to this resolution, an ad hoc committee of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees was appointed by Chairman McCowan, composed of the following members:

Mr. Robert T. McCowan, Chairman Mr. Albert G. Clay Mr. George W. Griffin Mr. Brereton C. Jones Professor James D. Kemp

The committee held five scheduled meetings, including a hearing which specifically provided an opportunity for members of the faculty, student body, alumni and general public to express their views and concerns with respect to the question of merger. This report, submitted by the ad hoc committee to the full membership of the Board of Trustees, represents the conclusion and recommendation of the committee.

In its deliberations, the committee (1) reviewed the various forms of institutional governance and statewide coordination, (2) examined the perceived advantages and disadvantages inherent in the merger concept, (3) enumerated a set of basic principles upon which any discussion of merger of the University ought to be considered, and (4) identified numerous specific problems and issues that would have to be dealt with if a merger were to occur.

In its overview of institutional governance, the committee attempted to maintain a distinction between institutional governance and statewide coordinating systems, although this line is not always clearly distinguishable. Public institutions of higher learning generally fall into one of the following categories:

- 1. Free Standing Institutions Where each institution has its own separate Board of Trustees. (Kentucky institutions generally belong to this group.)
- 2. Several Campuses Under One Board This is a form of merged campus governance. Examples are University of Texas, Louisiana State University, and what was formerly known as the Consolidated University of North Carolina.

3. All Institutions Under One Board - In our region, examples of this can be seen in Florida, Georgia and more recently, North Carolina.

The various mechanisms for providing statewide coordination and governance are as follows:

- No Agency of Any Kind In this arrangement, institutions and their own Boards of Trustees deal directly with the Governor, Legislature and state agencies. Almost all states have abandoned this approach.
- Coordinating Boards Each institution or group of institutions continue to have its own Board of Trustees. The coordinating board normally has responsibility for long-range planning, program review, budget review and data dissemination.
- 3. Coordinating Boards with Specific Governing

 Responsibilities Same as above, except the

 coordinating board is assigned certain specific
 functions that are normally considered to be part of
 the governing boards authority (e.g. tuition and
 fees, admissions standards, and program approval).

 (Kentucky's present structure fits into this category.)
- 4. <u>Several Coordinating/Governing Boards</u> Groupings of institutions are placed under the control of boards which oversee their operation. (Maryland, Tennessee and California offer versions of this approach.)
- 5. One Central Governing Board (Super Board) Institutions no longer have their own governing boards,
 unless they are advisory to the central board. One
 board exercises the governance function over all the
 public institutions within the state. (Examples are
 Florida, Georgia and more recently North Carolina.)

The committee discussed these various structures and mechanisms at considerable length and attempted to place the State of Kentucky and the University of Kentucky into perspective relative to the current scene.

From the very beginning of its deliberations, the committee wrestled with the need to identify possible advantages and disadvantages of merger. While our list is by no means all encompassing, we did pay particular attention to the following:

1. Economy - Proponents of merger apparently think that there is a great dollar savings to be made as a result of merger. The committee was not able to ascertain where or by what means such savings would occur. We were not convinced that there would be any significant

immediate savings as a result of merger, and could only speculate that long-range savings might come from the elimination of unnecessary duplication in programs at the two institutions. The committee concluded that at best only modest dollar savings (if any) would result from merger.

- 2. Effectiveness In all likelihood, some improvement in effectiveness might well result from a merger of the two institutions. One central administration, operating under the authority of one Board of Trustees might improve the decision-making process.
- 3. Allocation of Function Placing the two universities under one board could, indeed, make it easier to allocate and assign functions between them. To some, this prospect was seen as the most significant argument for merger because it offered an improved means of dealing with future questions of duplication, especially in graduate and professional programs.

The committee also discussed a number of perceived disadvantages and concerns expressed in opposition to merger. The following were included in the discussion:

- 1. Loss of Institutional Identity The fear of being swallowed up in a new organization and losing the historical identity of the University.
- 2. Equity How the institution would be treated under a new governance structure.
- 3. Budget Would the University of Kentucky fare worse under some new structure than it already does?
- 4. Program What are the implications for the University of Kentucky's academic program in a merged arrangement?
- 5. Development Would the University of Kentucky's private fund-raising efforts be combined into one overall fund-raising effort?
- 6. Structural Implications Would merger simply be the first step in the ultimate move toward a single, central governing board?
- 7. Intercollegiate Athletics Would the varsity athletics programs at the two institutions be merged into one?
- 8. Faculty Morale Possible negative effect on faculty morale.
- 9. Other Various concerns by faculty, students and alumni (role of faculty and students in the new governance structure; appointment, promotion and tenure of faculty; joint academic appointments; other).

Such a list might go on and on, but the concerns listed above at least give some indication of the range of issues that were considered by the committee.

In the course of its proceedings, the committee also attempted to address the more fundamental question of principles upon which any proposal concerning merger could be based. Several such principles were identified and were agreed upon as essential elements in any proposal to be given serious consideration. Among those principles were the following:

- 1. Maintenance of the historical identity of each institution. Each institution should preserve its own identity.
- 2. No dismantling of the existing system. Neither institution should be penalized for its efforts on behalf of merger. In the case of the University of Kentucky, this means, specifically, opposition to any effort that would attempt to alter the University's relationship with its Community College System or any effort to separate the Medical Center from the University.
- 3. A Single Board of Trustees for the merged university.
 This was seen as absolutely essential in order to deal with future decisions as to allocation of functions and resource allocation.
- 4. Single Central Administration The committee felt that a single administrator (President) reporting to a single board was the only workable structure. Each major unit would have a chief academic/administrative officer who reported to the Board through the President.
- 5. Faculty-Student Participation The committee supported the concept of continued student and faculty participation on the Board of Trustees as well as a continued involvement in such matters as curriculum approval; appointment, promotion and tenure of faculty; the selection of academic administrators; etc.

There was general agreement among committee members that these principles should be at the core of any proposal dealing with merger of the two institutions.

In addition to these more general statements, the committee recognized that there were specific issues and problems that would, of necessity, have to be dealt with if a merger were to ever occur. Those identified were:

- 1. Name of the new entity.
- 2. Administrative Structure of the new entity. .

- 3. <u>Location</u> of seat of governance of the new entity.
- 4. Composition and selection of Board of Trustees for the new entity.
- 5. Governing and Administrative Regulations for the new entity.

It was recognized by the committee that each of these was a potentially difficult problem; that each would require careful thought and attention; and that any one or any combination of these could be a stumbling block to merger. It was the considered judgment of the committee that there was little point in attempting to settle these problems until an answer was provided to the basic threshold question: Does the committee favor a recommendation of merger? Are the advantages to the state greater than the known problems inherent in merger?

The ad hoc committee, after careful consideration, has reached a unanimous recommendation that it would not be advisable, at the present time, for the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to propose a merger of the two universities. In the view of the committee, the advantages to be gained are more than offset by the disadvantages, most especially the strong opposition of faculty, students and alumni and the probability of serious political controversy.

The committee does note, however, the marked increase in voluntary cooperation between the two institutions in recent years. We believe that such cooperation is desirable when it promotes quality and efficiency in the two institutions.

The committee also recommends that the Board urge the Council on Higher Education to provide aggressive leadership in the promotion of excellence in higher education. Cooperation within the system is needed to achieve this goal. Actions that are divisive make this goal more difficult to reach and are harmful in the long run. Structural or organizational changes, including the one studied by this committee, do not necessarily mean improvements nor guarantee the enhancement of quality.

We believe the focus should be on substantive measures to improve quality and that structural changes should be supported only when they are demonstrably beneficial in achieving excellence in higher education.

Background: Under House Bill 622 enacted in the 1982 session of the Kentucky General Assembly, the University is authorized to enter into architectural and related consultant contracts for the purpose of accomplishing capital construction at the University of Kentucky.

The report shows that during the nine months ending March 31, the University has:

- 1. Awarded thirty-one (31) consultant contracts.
- 2. Made thirty-five (35) changes to consultant contracts.
- 3. Made four (4) final payments on consultant contracts.
- 4. Awarded forty-four (44) construction contracts.
 5. Made thirty-three (33) change orders to construction contracts.
 6. Made fourteen (14) final payments on construction contracts.
