An undercurrent of student protest has been felt against the fact that classes are meeting one week later this spring than they did in the spring of last year. In order to clear the matter up, we are taking this opportunity to explain the sit-uation.

Last December University officials were asked to arrange the holiday schedule so that as little congestion as possible would be caused by stu-dents going home for Christmas vacation. At that time a group of students mer with the schedule committee and decided to lengthen the holiday period by four days, thus eliminating the spring vacation, which was to have been two and a half days.
