## And They Still Don't Realize It

Russia is vulnerable to a flanking movement from the south.

Struggle to keep up your sense of concern, tell yourself that there's nothing to get excited about. Even go so far as Roger Babson (See *Sour Notes*) and advocate "getting your share" of the consumer goods left, hoarding if necessary. And some day you'll wake up with the British and French fleets, Axis-controlled, shelling New York City.

No, my good coke-sipper, America is far from being "all out." America's people still think they are impregnable (so did they at Pearl Harbor), still aren't ready to put out for the war effort (neither was France), still want to hang on to their last bits of "normalcy."

The corporations are still holding out in many cases for that last nickel of profit, government officials are still fumbling around about getting all-out production under way, America's people are still snug and complacent, expecting things to break their way any day, now but not awake enough to make their own breaks.

America still doesn't know she's at war.

During the three years the Student Government Association has been in operation, no major change has been made in its constitution. The founding fathers still remaining on campus tell us that they were none of them satisfied with it either at the time it was ratified or at any time since then.

It was the result of many compromises between the students and the administration, between various groups of students, and even between various administrative officials.

As a matter of record, the system set up by the fathers (who are the first to admit it) never has worked satisfactorily. The committees have been unwieldy, hard to convene, and essentially irresponsible.

There was no way to decide who was supposed to make them work, and no one to enforce any specific rules for student conduct.

Everyone remembers last year's legislature, which spent most of the winter term working on the budget. Finally, it became obvious that a few changes would have to be made before the students at the

University of Kentucky could be said to have an efficient and democratic system of self-government. The amendments which are now being proposed by a committee appointed by student president Russell Patterson are designed to correct as many of the defects in the present constitution as possible.

The form in which they are printed elsewhere in this issue of The Kernel is the result of much careful work and of a long series of discussions between the members of the amending committee and the administrative officers of the university.

The changes are designed to do two things: fix responsibility for committee work, and make it possible for the Student Government Association to make and enforce rules governing the conduct of its constituents, within the framework of the University administrative set-up.

Heads of committees will be students, and they will be responsible directly to the president of the student body. If they or their committees do not do the work they should, he will have the power to remove them, or to change them in favor of someone who will see that the work is done.

If this system works as it should, and there is reason to think it will, the business of student-government will round that well-known corner.

It is well to keep a year's supply of soap in the house. . . . Stock up now on the kitchen utensils which you'll need for the next two years. Always keep a good advance supply of canned goods on hand as well as a new oil stove for use in an emergency. —Roger Babson.

## SGA Constitutional Amendment

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 22  
ARTICLE ONE. One, Two, Six, Seven, and Nine of Part Four of this Constitution are to be non-effective.  
ARTICLE TWO. 1. The Student Government Association shall have power to regulate the financial matters of the student body.  
2. A budget shall be adopted by the Student Legislature for the expenditure of all Student Government Association funds, and all other funds under its jurisdiction, which shall go into effect as soon as approved by the President of the University. No money shall be expended unless approved by the Student Legislature, either by the budget or in special appropriation.  
3. A expenditure shall be made upon the approval of the Student Treasurer and a member of the faculty.  
4. All student organizations having monies in the Organizations Fund shall deliver audits and accounts of funds into the hands of the President of the Student Body, along with the expenditures and financial condition of the Student Government Association, shall be published at the end of each quarter.  
ARTICLE THREE. The Student Government Association shall have power to regulate the social activities of the student body as follows:  
A. A social calendar shall be prepared by the Student Legislature, and the student social functions may be approved by the Student Legislature before the social calendar goes into effect.  
B. To have other powers at any time to time shall be given it.  
ARTICLE FOUR. 1. There shall be a Judiciary Committee composed of five student members elected by the Student Legislature.  
2. One of which shall be designated the Chairman of the Legislature.  
3. To be a member of the Judiciary Committee, a student must have at least a junior standing and one year's residence at the University of Kentucky. Members shall serve as long as they are resident students of the University.  
4. The Judiciary Committee shall interpret all laws and other acts of the Student Government Association, and it shall try all cases of violations or infractions of the Student Government Association.  
5. There shall be a Student Standards Committee composed of the following members: the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee; the Student Treasurer; the Student Standards Committee; two members to be elected by the Student Legislature by the Chairman to serve during the following year; the Student Treasurer; the Student Standards Committee; two members to be elected by the Student Legislature for a term of one year.  
6. The Student Standards Committee shall try all cases covered by Student Government Association legislation; and it may deliver an opinion in disputes between or among students, or between students and non-students.  
7. In case of disputed jurisdiction, the Judiciary Committee shall decide whether the Judiciary Committee or the Student Standards Committee shall hear the controversy.  
8. Cases of a nature best resolved by non-student judges shall be referred to the Student Legislature, except, if necessary, the President of the Student Body shall decide with the approval of the Student Legislature.  
9. The President of the University shall appoint with the approval of the Student Legislature the student members of the faculty to bring the number to three.

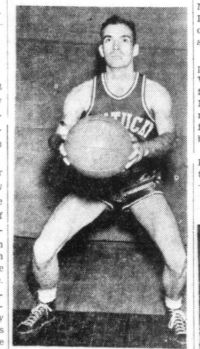
## Intramural Basketball Begins As Pre-Season Favorites Win

while his teammate, Robertson, gathered seven points.

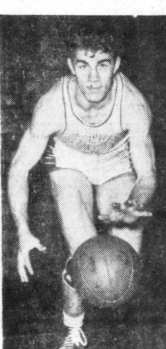

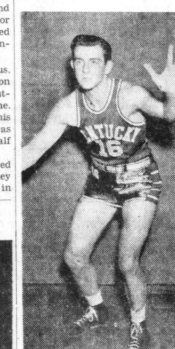
