Corvin's daughter, now a 39-year-old bartender in Florida, told police last weekend that her father killed her newborn children in 1968 in Boynton Beach, Fla, and in 1970 in Scottdale, about 35 miles southeast of Pittsburgh.

UNITED NATIONS — Foreign ministers from "north" and "south" drew the lines yesterday for a diplomatic battle over the treaty that has kept nuclear arms in check for a quarter-century. In the second day of a conference to renew the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, Nigeria's foreign minister, Tom Ikimi, staked out the position of Third World hard-liners.

"The trouble in all merit policy is the difficulty in applying it," Kennedy said.
Committees have a hard time deciding which professor's work has been more valuable.
Therefore, AAUP's proposal is a compromise between the administration's stance, and a full merit policy. It would guarantee that 80 percent of available money be channeled into both a cost of living increase program, and a merit fund. The rest would be left basically to the discretion of the administration.



"We're going to play all of our games at home," Pitino said, "We want to make sure we win all of these."

The JV Cats would likely play some games at Memorial Coliseum and some at Rupp Arena prior to the varsity team's home games, Pitino said.

*Who would coach?

That would depend on the situation. If the team was playing a home game at Memorial Coliseum with no varsity game to follow, Pitino himself would take the reigns.

"But for games before a regular game at Rupp," Pitino said, "I'd probably let (assistant coach) Winston (Bennett) handle it."
Having a JV team would solve a few of Pitino's problems where splitting minutes are concerned, but not all. If Rodrick Rhodes doesn't return after the June NBA Draft, UK will have no fewer than 16 players on its roster.


