

FRANKFORT — The federal government
made direct farm payments totaling nearly \$238
million, much of it as income subsidies to producers of corn, wheat and soybeans, especially in
western Kentucky. The money was spread
among 75.700 recipients, not all of whom were
farmers. The list included payments based on
dozens of tracts of cropland that actually were
owned by cities, counties, school boards, industrial authorities, colleges, churches, cemetery
companies, golf courses, hunting clubs and state
agencies, most receiving modest, even negligible
amounts. Big payments were made to a relative
few. Former Gov. Wallace Wilkinson, before he
slid into bankruptcy, was paid \$82,351. Payments
included subsidies for corn and wheat on his
farms in Mercer County. But Wilkinson ranked
only 320th among individual recipients.

Study links birth control pills with protein

Study links birth control pills with protein CHICAGO — Dutch research links birth control pills and menopause hormone supplements with small amounts of protein in the urine that may signal an increased risk of kidney and heart disease. Women who used hormone supplements for more than five years faced the greatest risk, about 2 1/2 times that of nonusers, according to the study of 4,301 Dutch women in Monday's Archives of Internal Medicine. While women weren't followed long enough to see if they developed kidney or heart disease, the findings support other research suggesting that long-term use of oral contraceptives or hormones at menopause may increase the risk for cardiovascular disease. Protein in the urine is thought to be an early sign of kidney disease.

Universities receiving tax-funded farm aid

Universities receiving tax-funded farm aid URBANA, Ill.—When it comes to harvesting subsidy checks from the federal government, few farms in this state are doing better than the University of Illinois. Agriculture Department records show the state's flagship university and its foundation got \$71,000 last year from a network of federal subsidy programs meant to protect the agriculture industry from the perils of volatile commodity markets. An AP review of \$27 volatile commodity is not the only government or educational institution collecting hefty payments. More than 1,200 cities, schools, prisons and universities combined to collect at least \$23 million in farm aid. In some cases, government or university farms were among the top recipients in their states because they did not have to abide by the payment caps that apply to privately owned farms.

Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle said Sunday that administration's actions are directly responsible for the current downturn. White House officials have said the tightening economy just puts more pressure on Congress to spend prudently. Privately the administration is considering calling for across-the-board budget cuts next year if the economy worsens, Bush advisers said last week. Bush aides did not immediately return messages Sunday. Democrats blame Bush's 10-year, \$1.35 trillion tax cut for the nation's economic woes sunday. 





Instead, it serves as a reminder of how divid-


