UNDERSTANDING PEACE, NOT PEACE AND UNDERSTANDING

THE PRESERVATION of international peace is a vital problem at the present time. The desire for peace is wide-spread, but the ability of the nations of the world to keep out of war is being generally questioned.

Experience has taught us that peace cannot be maintained by a vague desire. The forces that draw nations to war become too strong in times of international stress to be resisted effectively by an unwilling but uninformed people. The war hysteria is far too potent.

It is the duty of every intelligent student to give time and thought to the study of the causes of war and to reach a definite position of understanding the underlying factors and attendant circumstances of war.

The convocation Thursday morning and the forums to be held tonight and Thursday night at Patterson hall are planned as a part of the national student movement to face the war question candidly and intelligently. Thinking students will attend these meetings.

When you make a mistake, they will laugh and tell you about the time they got scooped or the time they pied a form or messed a line up in a climatic editorial. Just why pigmentation of a man's skin is taken as a criterion of his worth still remains unexplained. It is also interesting to know that the bill now before Congress in regard to mob violence such as demonstrated in Mississiph is lacking support of many of the "honorable" senators and representatives of the southern states. They are too much concerned in saving the constitution.




