HERE SHALL THE KERNEL ALL STUDENT RIGHTS MAINTAIN

IS THE UNIVERSITY READY FOR OPTIONAL CLASS ATTENDANCE FOR SENIORS?

OPTIONAL CLASS ATTENDANCE
FOR SENIORS?
For a long time THE KURNEL has weighed the
possibilities of the chance for success or failure
of the optional class attendance plan for seniors.
The definite conclusion which has been reached
is that such a plan is highly feasible and that
this campus is fully prepared to receive it.
First of all, this newspaper wishes to assure
its readers that the idea is neither original, radical, nor of the harum-scarum variety. It has
been successfully tried in other noted institutions and has been shown to be highly satisfactory, both in its practical workability and in
other and important intangible phases.
The idea is an outgrowth of general educational practices and theories in the West and
Mid-West, where, most of the best ideas which
hend to set education upon a higher level, are
being originated. In every university which
has tried the optional attendance plan, it has
worked, surprisingly and gratifyingly well.
There can certainly be no argument that

worked, surprisingly and gratifyingly well. There can certainly be no argument that seniors are able to handle the individual problems involved in such a plan. Class room descipline is a valuable and necessary element in the making of educated people. It is far more useful and appropriate to the needs of students than is, say, military discipline, but surely it is an easily seen fact that seniors should not need to be placed under such jurisdiction. If such is the case, the University should heistate in granting degrees to seniors and sending them on out ing degrees to seniors and sending them on ou into the world, where they will be one short

years from now.

On the campus, the more theoretical results would be three-fold. Firstly, it would set up a new responsibility for seniors, giving them need-ed and, we believe, rightful preparation for the days after graduation; secondly, class room technique of teachers would have to be improved to attract seniors to class. This improvement would spread itself into the lower division and alleviate to the contract contract of the contract would be a contract to the contract of the contrac

spread itself into the lower division and alleviate one of the more serious problems of the campus; and thirdly, and of equal importance, the scholarly aspect of the campus, not any too great at present, would be stimulated more by a movement of this nature than by any other method.

Actually, there would be little transition from the present system to the non-compulsory idea. Seniors usually are aware of the number of cuts which are good for them. They also know that classes they can cut and they know when to cut without losing any of the more vital aspects of a course.

tional system. We ask only the thoughtful con-sideration of the proper authorities in weigh-ing the merits and faults of this plan. We be-lieve in a none too distant future this idea will become an integral part of every educational institution worth its salt.

institution worth its salt.

The higher education interests in this state should and do look to the University for efficient and progressive leadership in educational methods. Surely if the administration should see fit to pass the optional attendance law for seniors, it would enhance its position as being that rightful leader.

If the University made such a move at the present time, it would without doubt stamp it as being the far-seeing and progressive institution we hope and believe it is.


