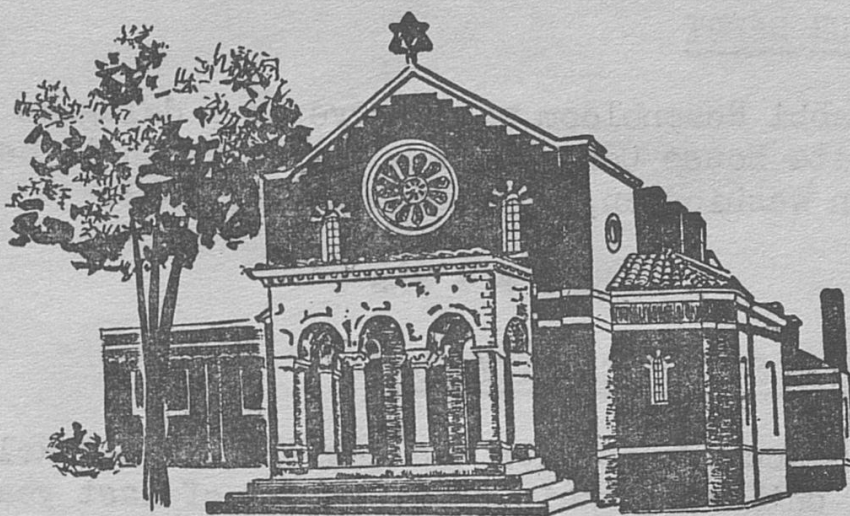

(From a talk delivered by Linda Kanner during our College Night Services)

Two visions--one of a single community, the other of the world as a whole. Does accepting one necessarily mean forsaking the other? Our schools--the ones to which you, our parents, have sent us--stress universality, and the principle that all men must live together, in peace, lest we die together, in war. We have learned that the world is our home--and we have learned that someone has scattered gunpowder in every corner of this home. You fought for freedom in Germany, Japan and Korea. You are pleased with local progress against segregation. But in spite of all this, the task left for the future is appalling. Perhaps you have done all that is humanly possible; yet we feel that we can, and must, accomplish much more.

Are we frightened of mere chimeras?--Are we just too inexperienced and too gullible to realize that all is not as gloomy as the politicians would have us believe? NO! There is doubtless some exaggeration. But as long as the bombs and the nuclear submarines continue to grow larger and more deadly efficient, we cannot be satisfied. Even our jokes have a grim note: the optimist teaches his children to speak Russian; the pessimist teaches them Chinese.

Within our own communities we can act; but what of the larger vision? Is it too great for us? Shall we wait until we are older, and have gained wealth and respect, and very possibly have lost our devotion to the vision? We are accused of apathy, and all too often the charge is true. We forget, or don't bother, or haven't time; but most of all, we are overwhelmed by the magnitude and complexity of the world, and fear that we are not strong enough to act. If one rabble-rouser can stir up riots in the South, cannot we make our voices heard

in a more noble cause? Voices have been raised-- and they have not always gone unheeded. Throughout the nation students have protested racial segregation by sit-ins and picketing; have worked within their own schools to abolish fraternity and sorority bias clauses, and discrimination in housing. Indignation at the Un-American Activities Committee's policy of "guilty until proven innocent" has been expressed by riots in San Francisco and petitions in other schools. We did not originate the idea of a Youth Corps; but after John Kennedy and Chester Bowles challenged us to serve our country and the world, it was our wildly enthusiastic response which persuaded Senator Kennedy to make a public commitment to study the program. The very name of the group formed to support the Youth Corps proposal expresses the reason for our enthusiasm: Americans Committed to World Responsibility.

We have idealism, altruism, and great eagerness; we lack the wisdom gained only through years of experience. For this, we ask your help and guidance. We know that our dreams far outweigh our abilities; but don't tell us to stick to the smaller, more immediate problems at home--remember, our home is the world. Don't laugh, or remind us that we can't fight city hall or change human nature, or that after a while we'll get tired of beating our heads against the wall. We ask encouragement, not ridicule, or a patronizing attitude. Give us constructive criticism, all you want; but respect our visions.

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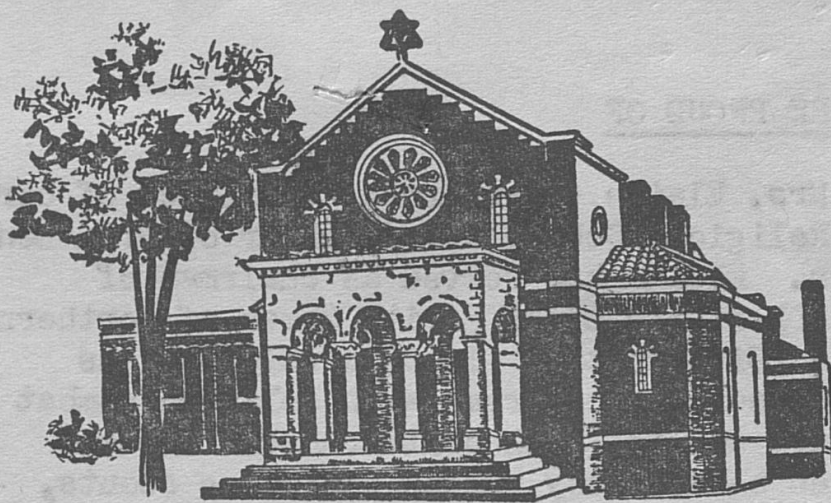

PTA MEETING

The parents and teachers of our Religious School are urged to attend a very important meeting to be held at 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, January 17th, in the Temple Vestry.

(From a talk given during our College Night Service by Lance Liebman.)

We have studied. We have learned. We have traveled. We have seen. And now we sit in our ivy-covered dormitories, and we meditate on the world and on our place in it.

Our mind is torn by a dual vision. On the one hand we see this world, its problems, its challenges, its opportunities. From our Gothic vantage it is easy to behold it all. The world is nuclear disarmament, secretaries of state, Algerian wars, lonely crowds, wave theory, Jackson Pollack's painting, and Fidel Castro. Those are the problems, the challenges, the opportunities. And we are the generation about to inherit them. A few years in grade school and out we'll go to solve those problems or at least, by God, to go down trying.

That, however, is only half our vision. Where we saw the world—indeed the universe—now we concentrate on a tight geographic bundle—Lexington, Frankfort or Winchester, Hamden, Worcester or Winnetka. Where the questions engaging our attention qualified quite neatly as News That's Fit to Print, now we see things that hardly rate the society page of The Herald. It is 9-5 jobs, forms in triplicate, diapers, nursery schools, country clubs, board of directors meetings, grocery bills. It is the stuff of life, and we see it, and know that someday soon we will settle into it, but why.

Neither one of our visions presents a very satisfactory picture. But somehow we feel that if we had the chance we could solve the big problems—could bring sense to the world and achieve disarmament and integration. For it only takes a little common sense and some

knowledge of history to see the obvious solutions. And even if we didn't succeed completely, at least the tasks would be worthy of us, of our ability, and education, and training. But because of our educations and our realizations it may be that we can overcome them, can at least make this world a bit better than we find it. Two factors give us the chance, the ability to do so. One is the possibility that we will be able to merge our two visions, the all-encompassing picture of universal events and the specific view of unimportant routines, that we will be able to apply what we know of the world to our actions in that tiny fragment of it that we are able to affect. If we could, for example, apply our knowledge of great men and great issues to the choices we make in voting booths, rather than determining those choices on parochial bases of self-interest; if we could act in our personal race relations the way we are sure people "over there" in Little Rock, New Orleans and New Rochelle should act; then we can certainly make things better.

Our other possibility is that we shall be able to preserve the objective, even academic, method of analyzing a problem and a situation that is perhaps the finest skill that modern higher education teaches. Surely a substantial part of the difficulties of this world are due to man's inability to use his rationality once he becomes personally involved in a situation. It is so easy to see the world in blacks and whites, with ourselves always among the whites, but crises, demagogues, and fear mar the only results of this absence of the gray from our worlds.

In a speech at Yale recently, Archibald Macleish commented on the general willingness to agree that we are now in a "time of crisis," saying that, "to all opinions the crisis is a crisis in the sense that fire is a fire; something to get at

fast--something that has just now befallen us-- something which, if we will only deal with it expeditiously and intelligently, can be put out-- eliminated. We may not say it as baldly as that," MacLeish went on, "but the assumption of most of our talk is, precisely, that if only the Russians or the Communist Party or the underdeveloped areas or the Bomb would go away, there would be no crisis left and we would all wake up to find ourselves back in 1910--with modern plumbing and imported sports cars added, of course."

We have, I think, a somewhat broader view of things, and if we can preserve that view, and the methods of analysis that produced it, we will make this world more livable.

To charge head on into this evening's subject then, I think "Can We Return to Lexington in Five Years?" a valueless question. For Lexington is really not substantially different from the other cities of this country, and the deficiencies of this city and its people that could be cited are found elsewhere also. We are more aware perhaps of this area's weaknesses, but that does not make them localized inadequacies. The question is really whether we will be able to settle into the daily routine anywhere. The answer is that we will have to. It is up to us to do what we can to make this a more bearable fate. Perhaps making use in our everyday lives of the broad outlook we have developed, and by maintaining our ability to see problems accurately and rationally, we can make things a trifle better. I hope so.

(From a talk by Richard Munich on College Night.)

Some of us are beginning to think now about our futures. One of those questions that invariably runs through our minds is where we want to live. Naturally, for those of us who have grown up here, Lexington lies first in our hearts. So we turn our thoughts homeward and like the good scholars we consider ourselves to be, we begin to weigh the pros and cons of Lexington. What kind of place will it be in five years? Will some of those values we have learned so laboriously in college turn out to be just mythical? Or is there a possibility that our college experience was not just a four year kick? For you see, those of us who made college an intense experience learned many things that are not congruent with what we see around us.

On the positive side, we see a great deal. Physically the town is almost ideal -- there is a university with a number of easily accessible and startlingly bright men. There are a number of satisfying social outlets -- enough sports to assuage the most avid sportsman, a concert -- lecture series that has brought the finest entertainment to those who care about it, and just enough people so that a certain degree of intimacy on many levels may be found. Economically, Lexington seems to be fertile enough and finally.. it is home. There is a vast amount of personal vigor that exists in potential and in reality; there is a feeling of dedication -- if only to the most personal of goals. There is a good feeling in the whole atmosphere, a cosmopolitanism, fostered by the relatively high degree of education and a vigorous transient population. At the same time the smallness of Lexington keeps us away from that horrible big city onrush of social bombardment and oppressive competition.

But there are some dark spots on the Lexington

horizon...spots that make some of us wonder. We have a race problem which is far from over — even though not as noisy, perhaps, as New Orleans or Atlanta — but just as deep and just as pernicious. Most of the people I have talked with don't seem to care about this — "maintain the status quo — we can't do anything about it, integration will come by itself." The city seems run by the staunchest voices of concern and the long dead confederacy. Downtown luncheon clubs that throw mottos around like "service above self" only listen to what they want to hear and walk out after their hour of ego building with a stultifying security. Other organizations seem worthless — the same people doing all the work and something as important as the UJA has gone begging for leadership for as long as I can remember.

Since most will always say that those kind of problems are way beyond their responsibility — although in fact they are not — let us muse about some of the more tangible projections. When will the petty, yet curiously pernicious pockets of nasty gossip and muckracking about those from whom we are supposed to be deriving some measure of satisfaction stop? Why is everyone around here afraid to tangle with some of those questions they put away with their textbooks twenty or thirty years ago? Why is it so easy to get a card game going and so difficult to find competent leaders for community work? If the youth see now how difficult it is to cultivate any kind of community feeling, what will it be like for us and for our children in the future when our elders have shown us "the easy way out" of responsibilities and obligations?

All of us are getting educations. But what for? Is it just so that we can develop a mind — or is it to use? I am enough of a materialist to want to use what I've spent a lot of time and effort in

getting. Where do we turn when at every step we are met with pettiness, rotten values and a surprising amount of apathy. A breed of sensitive children searches for identity, and the whole population sits back and tells them it is only a phase. Maybe what exists is right, but the great questions of our troubled age can only be approached by people who know why and what they are doing. Lexington is doing nothing and gives only graveyard silence and reactionary precepts to help us.

What do you want us to do? Shall we apologize for not grinding through the depression? Shall we apologize for not fighting in the war? Thankfully we haven't had to weather any of those storms. Perhaps this is the only reason we can question what we have and look for better answers. But we are looking and we would like your help, not your disillusion, not your laughing scorn, not your smugness and not your condemnation. But suddenly we see the irrelevance of Lexington's petty judgments for our lives and losing the security of home like that, we are no longer smug.

If some of our elders would only ask themselves what am I and why -- and in searching for those answers turned to their neighbors, can you imagine the transformation? Pettiness would dwindle. Gossip would have no value for then we would be saying something about ourselves. When we realize how much we need each other, then we won't have to put ourselves above those about whom we talk. To know that gossip and bigotry only betray the highest forms of insecurity and loneliness becomes, in the end, our greatest victory ... our highest beginning.

Then community responsibility becomes a lot more significant than "four dot, five crack," or three spades, six hearts, Weimun or Goren. Because through community comes the ultimate realization

of self. Then all the textbooks of the world open to us and illuminate our lives more than a fifth of scotch, a hole in one or an overflow of sales.

We must learn to live with people in an honest way .. for in the foreseeable future — not only in Lexington, but in the whole world we will be fighting for room to stand upon. But before we learn to live with people, we must learn to live with ourselves. Integration must first come in our own hearts and personalities. The time has come to turn ourselves inward and develop a more sophisticated and more mature self-knowledge — a knowledge which negates the false idols of our civilization and points us toward the only real and enduring object — Man. Knowing that only through man can we ever find ultimate justification, we shall certainly find more humility and brotherly love. Man's need of man does indeed constitute his highest perfection, for in the realization of this need and the positive action necessary to fulfill it comes that subtle fusion of thought and emotion, of maximum satisfaction and ultimate justification.

Thomas Wolfe wrote a book called, You Can't Go Home Again. I'm not so sure I agree; but I will be forced to if the love and respect that all of you so desperately want is forever destroyed by your silence. You are driving us away. We do not stand in condemnation; we stand pleading for your help. You say that it is up to us to make Lexington live in the future, but I say that it is you who must do it. Generations follow generations more than chronologically — apathy follows apathy and value follows value. It is up to you to see what is happening and begin plowing the fields in which our seed must ultimately grow. We will do the cultivating, but we need some fertile soil. Perhaps then our children can, with the same Thomas Wolfe, Look Homeward!

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

The following supplements my comments of last week about the U.J.A. The budget below was adopted by American Jews after a Study Mission in Israel:

1961's SPENDING BUDGET - \$72,740,000.

For a program encompassing the reduction of the ma'abarot population by at lease 2,000 families; for the continuation of child care and youth services through the Youth Aliyah centers at the 1960 level of 12,000; for the transport, reception and processing of a minimum of 30,000 new immigrants; and for the first phase of its consolidation program on behalf of the 485 farm settlements - the Jewish Agency in 1961 must receive from the U.J.A.....
\$51,095,000.

For its program of welfare services on behalf of 200,000 Jews in Europe, in the Moslem lands and underdeveloped countries, and for the care in Israel of a minimum of 29,000 sick, aged and handicapped immigrants by its Malben network of homes, hospitals and other institutions, the Joint Distribution Committee must receive through U.J.A.....
\$17,200,000.

Plus allocations to NYANA for the absorption of immigrants entering the United States through the port of New York, to HIAS, and for the operating expenses of the United Jewish Appeal nationally, which amount to.....
\$4,445,000.

The sum of \$72,740,000 which the Mission voted to submit to the UJA's Annual National Conference in New York is approximately 15 percent higher than the amount the UJA expected to raise in 1960.

WITH OUR RABBI

UNDERSTANDING THE PARABLE OF THE DRY BONES

Ezekiel propounded his basic convictions in the vision of the Valley of Dry Bones (Ezekiel 27), one of the most electrifying passages of the entire Bible. Israel -- in this vision -- had ceased to be a living nation. Her people had lost faith in God and in themselves.

To dramatize their plight, Ezekiel likened them to scattered heaps of bleached bones, lying in a valley.

But the Lord, who had brought this terrible curse on His people, promised to bring the dead bones to life and to restore a unified Israel to its own land under a descendant of King David, saying, "And I will make a covenant of peace with them and it shall be an everlasting covenant with them; and I will establish them and multiply them and will set My sanctuary in their midst forever..." --
Dr. Harry Orlinsky, in the book "Ancient Israel."

PURIM NOTES

Purim falls on March 2nd, this year.

WHY WE OBSERVE PURIM- Purim, called "the Feast of Lots", is observed for one day, from sundown until sundown the following day. The story of this happy festival is based upon the account found in the Book of Esther, depicting the triumph of the Jews of Persia over their enemies. In brief, Purim commemorates the heroism of the Jewish queen Esther and her guardian cousin, Mordecai, in defeating the plot of the vizier Haman to exterminate the Jews of the Persian empire. At the last minute, Esther revealed the diabolical schemes of Haman to her husband, King Ahasuerus, and the result was a happy ending for the Jews. Haman and his family were hanged from the gallows, and the Jews of the empire were given the opportunity to defend themselves from the attacks of the anti-Semites of that day. Because of the universal appeal of the Purim story, and because the Jews of every generation had to contend with their own Hamans, Purim was celebrated with great rejoicing and enjoyed wide popularity. In contrast with the deliverance of Judaism as commemorated by the Chanukah festival, Purim is observed as a holiday symbolic of the deliverance of the Jewish people. Thus, as long as Jews suffer from the attacks of their enemies, Purim will live on as our Festival of Rescue.

MEANING OF THE TERMS PURIM - Derived from the Hebrew word "pur", meaning "lots". Haman cast lots to discover the day most favorable for his plan of destroying the Jews.

SH'LACH MAW-NOS - The sending of gifts either to family, friends or to the poor. On Purim it was obligatory upon the poorest Jew, even on one who was himself dependent on charity, to give to the other poor.

M'GIL-LAH -- Hebrew word for Scroll. The word is frequently used as referring to "M'gil-las Esther" Scroll of Esther, i.e. the book in the Bible containing the Story of Purim.

GREGGER -- (Haman Klapper) Noisemaker used on Purim. In the Synagogue, the Megillah is read as part of the Service. Every time the name of Haman is mentioned, the children swing their Greggers creating a terrific din.

HAMANTASH -- A three-cornered Purim pastry filled with poppyseed or other fillings, whose form represents Haman's tri-cornered hat which he wore when he became Prime Minister.

SHUSHAN -- The capital of Persia where the main events of the Purim story took place.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

We are privileged to have as our pulpit guest this Friday evening, one of America's foremost authorities on religious liberty and the relationship of the church and state in America.

Needless to say, the Jewish interest in this area is vital. We should fill every pew this Friday evening to become better informed by this outstanding specialist.

Following are pertinent items from his biographical sketch:

A list of the cases in which he has appeared as counsel read like a roll call of the outstanding issues affecting freedom of religion and separation of church and state in America over the past fifteen years. Mr. Pfeffer wrote the brief in behalf of every major national Jewish organization in the famous McCollum case before the U. S. Supreme Court, which ruled that it is unconstitutional to teach religion in public schools. He represented a Jewish parent and a Catholic parent in the famous Gideon Bible case, in which the Supreme Court of the State of New Jersey, in a unanimous decision, held that a public school may not distribute religious tracts such as the Gideon Bible.

He is chief counsel in the Miami religion-in-the public schools case, one of the most important and comprehensive church-state cases to reach the courts in many years.

He was the first attorney to present to the United States Supreme Court the position that compulsory Sunday observance laws violate the religious liberty of Jews and others who observe a day other than Sunday as their day of rest.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK (CONT'D)

In 1956 Mr. Pfeffer wrote "The Liberties of an American," a chronicle of United States Supreme Court decisions interpreting the Bill of Rights. Mr. Pfeffer's latest book, "Creeds in Competition," a study of religious conflict in America, was published by Harper's in 1958. He is at present engaged in writing a history of the United States Supreme Court to be published by Harper.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FOR PURIM

1. Question: What does the word, Purim, mean?
Answer: Lots.
2. Question: Where is the Purim story told?
Answer: In the Book of Esther in the Bible.
3. Question: What is Shalach Monos?
Answer: Gifts. Shalach means, "the sending of", and Monos means, "gifts."
4. Question: Explain the origin of the word Hamentash.
Answer: It has something to do with Haman; exactly what is not clear. Some say Haman's hat, because the cakes are shaped like a three-cornered hat; others say Haman's pocket. It symbolizes, however, the ability of the Jew to overcome his bitterest enemies....if only he is true to his faith and will make the necessary sacrifices to vindicate it.
5. Question: What is the Hebrew date of Purim?
Answer: The fourteenth day of the Hebrew month of Adar.
6. Question: In the Purim story there is a rare instance of humor in the Bible. Recount it.
Answer: Haman suggests that the king should honor him by clothing him with royal garments and have him paraded through the capital. It turns out that the king had Mordecai, not Haman, in mind for this distinction and Haman is ordered to carry out this suggestion....in favor of Mordecai.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON PURIM (CONT'D)

7. Question: What is the significance of the the Purim story today?
Answer: It teaches us that tyrants and bigots must be vigilantly and valiantly resisted.
8. Question: The Purim story does not contain the name of God. Does it have a spiritual note at all? Explain.
Answer: It does, for the story is precipitated by Mordecai's insistence that, as a Jew, he can bow only to God.
9. Question: What is a megillah?
Answer: A scroll.
10. Question: When is Purim celebrated this year?

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THE THREAT OF OUR TIME

Delivered To The Rotary Club
of Lexington, Kentucky
On February 2, 1961

One of the vital roles of religion is to challenge its communicants. Too often a challenging message is diluted by the beautiful surroundings of the sanctuary and the enchanting melodies of the music. Too often a clergyman feels too dependent upon his members to challenge them effectively: what if they are insulted and take offense at what he has said? Too often when a religious group is too powerful, its own growth and institutional success takes precedence over its mission to challenge and inspire.

None of these factors was operative when the simple trimmer of sycamores and herdsman of Tekoa, Amos, thundered at Beth El as a spokesman of God. Twenty-seven hundred years ago Amos stood before a powerful, proud and confident Hebrew nation. The people expected to hear prophecies of further triumphs. But Amos declared that their doom was imminent because of their sins: "You sell the righteous for silver, the needy for a pair of shoes, you oppress the poor, crush the needy, you pray empty prayers." "The Lord God hath spoken, who can but prophesy?" The congregation was stunned at first, so unexpected was this message. Then they chased the prophet who had to flee for his life.

The similarities to our own time are obvious. We, too, are blessed, affluent and proud. We, too, believe that God is on our side—otherwise, how could we prosper so? While I am not a prophet nor the son of a prophet, I am compelled to point out that God is not on our side or on the side of anyone else. He is on the side of the righteous and the presence of grand churches and temples with their pomp and prayer is no insurance against His judgment. I hope that we can learn more from history than that we do not learn from history.

The greatest challenge for us as a nation is more than the threat of inflation or depression, large or small margins of profit — it is PEACE, for all of these and any others which might be mentioned are worthless without peace. Just when we are about to create a device to take us to the moon and beyond, we seem to be preparing to destroy the launching pad. Nothing else that we do or want makes sense if anything we do diminishes our chance for peace. I cannot say with the false prophets: Peace! Peace! when it is obvious to all who would look that there is no peace.

Our nation is the most powerful in the world. We are the leader of the West; whether we desire this leadership or not, it has been thrust upon us. And we have the obligation to preserve peace. We will be judged for our failures to do so.

There has been too great an inconsistency between our nation's ideals and actions. This is the harshest indictment that can be made against us. We say that we cherish religious idealism and spirituality and despise the atheistic materialism of the Communist nations. Yet we find the American's devotion to nation and principles sacrificed on the altar of personal aggrandizement while the opposite is true with the Communists who seem to be willing to sacrifice individual needs for those of the nation. We in America fought a Revolution for democracy and freedom, yet we join those who would deny them. Why is it that we seem to support almost every reactionary tyrant in Africa, Asia and South America: a Batista who made Fidel Castro inevitable, Trujillo who will soon discover his own Castro, Chiang Kai-shek, Generalissimo Franco, and the Fascists in Laos and the Union of South Africa, not to mention our ally, France, in Algeria. Must we always align ourselves with the forces of reaction? Why do we forget that it is our Revolution which has inspired the revolutions which we now help to suppress?

We have also been blind to changing world factors. Current technological advances make the continuance of the ban on A bomb testing essential. Each passing day illustrates more and more the folly of resuming testing. Already the atmosphere is poisoned threatening life as we know it and each day seems to bring another atomic power: yesterday

France joined the Atomic Club and tomorrow it will be Red China, then Sweden and Holland and Israel. When a Lumumba in the Congo and a Castro in Cuba have the bomb, how safe can mankind be? We also perpetuate the farce of non-recognition of Red China. It is the government of 700,000,000 people. Perhaps there will be no peace even if we talk to them but at least we must try. We need not agree with their philosophy of government or their economic system, but do we agree with every nation we have recognized? I hope not. Yet we seem determined to repeat the error of 1917 when our troops marched into Russia in the attempt to defeat their Revolution. We refused to recognize them then, yet we did so in the 1930's and they have yet to forgive us the indignities perpetrated against them. World disarmament is impossible without agreement with China.

We must also stop the double standard perpetrated against the ten percent of our population whose skin is a different color than our own. Most of the world's color is different than ours. Here is something which we can do today right here: offer free and equal opportunity in every sphere of public life to every citizen now.

At home there are two other factors which deprive us of our full potential. Anti-intellectual feeling is still strong and this denies us of one of our major sources of understanding our problems and resolving them. This is seen in the meager rewards given to teachers. An unskilled laborer earns as much as a university instructor and a carpenter as much as a professor. It is seen in our lack of reading: 6 of 10 Americans do not read one book each year other than the Bible. The suppression of free thought so essential to a democracy which was perpetrated by McCarthyism is not yet dead. We see its scourge in the continued exile from government work of Dr. Robert Oppenheimer and Dr. Linus Pauling.

There is not enough emphasis on the general welfare in this land of plenty. Our entire economy is geared to the premise that if each individual and corporation is permitted to pursue its own best interests, the general welfare will be aided. Yet in the midst of our dollar crisis one large American corporation sent more than \$300,000,000 overseas to buy a plant and give jobs to Europeans at a time when

more than 5,000,000 Americans are out of work. Too many other American dollars are going overseas seeking an extra percent of interest while they could be providing jobs at home. The growing recession, the dollar outflow and automation make it essential that a crash program be instituted immediately to retrain and redistribute our under-and unemployed.

These are but a few of the staggering problems facing us. We cannot afford a "business as usual" approach. We all have two urgent hopes: SURVIVAL and LIVING A FULFILLING and REWARDING LIFE. The responsibility to achieve these and resolve the problems of our nation and world are ours as well as our leaders. We are a part of the nation and the world. There is no refuge left on earth for escape and it is unlikely that the entire population of the world will be able to get to the moon soon. Our problems must be solved here and now.

While our problems may not be new they are more desperate than in former times. In Genesis we read of the Tower of Babel. It was built by men whose ambition was so large and whose moral understanding so small that they proposed to become gods by building a tower with its top in heaven. You know the end. God confounded their language and frustrated their arrogant ambition. We have pushed our tower beyond what the men of Babel thought was heaven. And we will not succeed in deposing God anymore than they did. If He finds it necessary to rebuke men on the same account again, this time we must not expect to just be scattered on earth but blasted from it. God does not need us. But we do need Him for hope and inspiration. I pray that we may find Him.

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FROM A REPORT SUBMITTED TO RABBI ROSENBLUM

"I gave the second talk for the Junior Jewish Chatauqua Society on Sunday, February 5th to the youth group of Broadway Christian Church (fundamentalist). There were approximately fifty people in attendance including four adult advisors.

I gave the basic outline of: (1) What is a Jew? (2) What are the basic Jewish beliefs as to life, God and man? And (3) What do the Jews believe about Christianity and Jesus.

The outline was designed to take a short period of time with the prime emphasis on questions. The question and answer period was very successful and lasted an hour over the time which constitutes the usual time of their meeting.

Although we were nowhere near answering all questions that had arisen, it was necessary because of the late hour, to close the meeting. Since there was more material to be covered, I was asked to return at a later date. This group was perhaps the most responsive I have encountered".

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Occasional notes from our far-flung college students keep me stimulated and encouraged. Let me share one recent letter with you.

"Criticism of our elders as petty and bigoted, who do nothing and give graveyard silence and reactionary precepts to help us, seems uncommonly bitter and one-sided. These deplorable and unforgivable conditions exist, but set against them are the positive achievements of these same people - the most important being the raising and educating of their children, us, so we could realize our personal dreams. We should condemn, and never condone, these grave weaknesses, recognizing that as we do we are obligating ourselves to remedy them. Our elders have singularly failed in these questions, but thankfully, they have solved the greater questions that confronted them, eg., The depression and two fighting wars, and have built our secure and prosperous society. Nevertheless, this gives them no right to ignore the problems that confront us now, indeed to solve them they need our help as badly as we need theirs.

Now let's be realistic. I do not believe there will be any substantial improvement or newly-found, action-provoking idealism simply because our society by its very affluent and artificially secure nature will not risk losing any minute part of these material benefits in order to correct certain other social inequalities. Certainly all the moralizing that may be done will have even less effect. Does this leave us with only the possibility that there will be snail-like progress and this only by elephantine efforts? Yes, if my generation is content to let apathy follow apathy and false value follow false value. But we are not so content. We will not solve the great questions in days or months or years perhaps, but we are determined to recognize them and begin doing something about them not tomorrow, but today."

SOCIAL ACTION CENTER IN WASHINGTON, D. C.

The decision of the 1959 Biennial Assembly of the UAHC to create a social action center in Washington D. C., was historic and significant. However, it was not the unusual and unprecedented step which some persons unfamiliar with the history of the UAHC believed it to be. The nation's capitol has played a prominent role in the work and planning of the UAHC since Isaac Mayer Wise first called the Union into being in 1873.

It was apparent that only the practical difficulties of funds and staff prevented the Union from implementing the long-cherished project. Addressing the 45th Biennial Assembly held in Miami Beach, Fla., in November, 1959, Dr. Eisendrath said:

"We have long anticipated and dreamed of a center of social action there in the heart of the free world where the life - and death - struggle between peace and war, justice and tyranny, brotherhood and bigotry, requires desperately the conscience, the conviction, and the concerted action of our prophetic Reform Jewish faith. Here we are not called upon to lead, to 'stick our necks out,' as it were. The voice of every other religious movement, save our own, is heard in Washington. I have been chided more than once concerning our conspicuous silence, therefore it is with consummate joy that I am privileged to announce that due to the magnanimous gift on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Kivie Kaplan of Temple Israel of Boston for the specific purpose of establishing such a center, we need procrastinate no longer. With gratitude to these far-visioned donors let us proceed forthwith."

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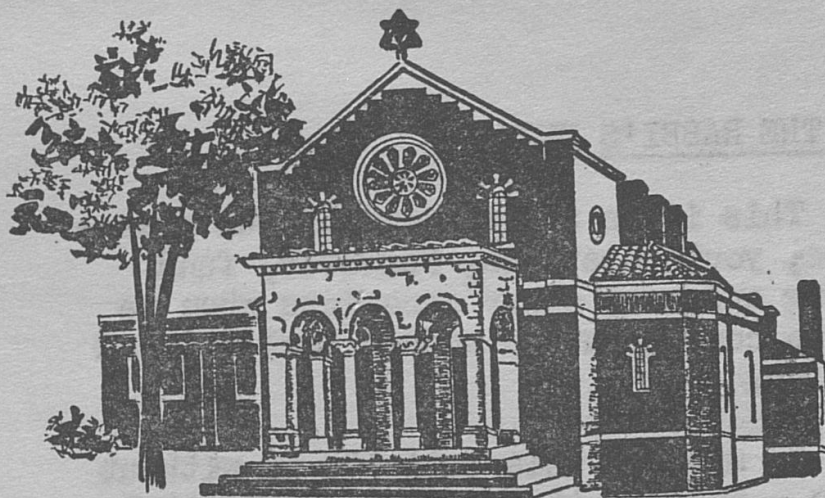

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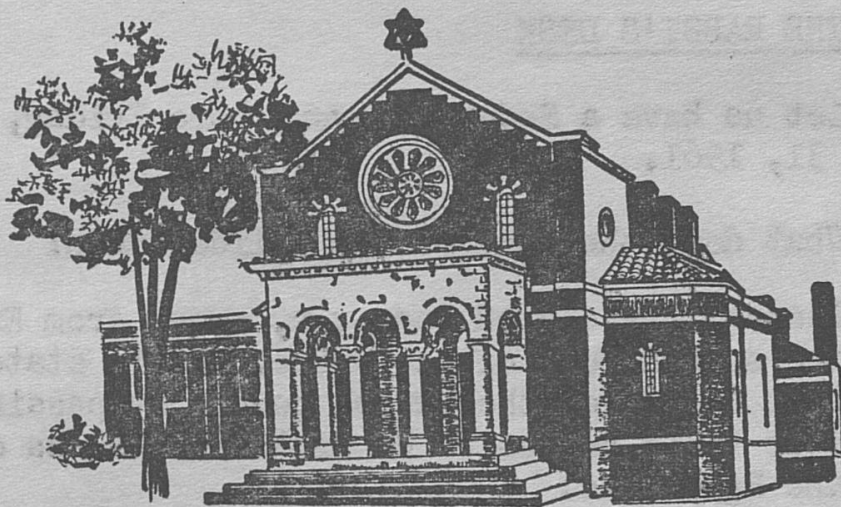

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Let us have a Seder in every home Friday,
March 31, 1961.

Q. What does the name of the holiday mean?

A. Pesach, translated Passover, comes from Exodus, the second Book of the Bible. It is stated that God saved the Jewish people by passing over their houses as He smote the houses of the Egyptians.

Q. What is the significance of the Passover holiday?

A. Around the 13th century B.C.E. the Jewish people were living in Egypt. A new Pharaoh ascended the throne and engaged in a series of wars with his neighbors. Fearful that the Hebrews might join his enemies, he enslaved them. Forced to make the bricks for the tremendous pyramids that were being built, the Jews led a bitter life, until they were rescued by Moses, who led them out of Egypt. The Passover holiday commemorates this deliverance.

Q. How is Passover observed?

A. Matzo is eaten during this time instead of bread. On the first night of the holiday an elaborate family ritual, known as the Seder service, is held. Special foods, symbols of the Egyptian bondage, are prepared, and the narrative of the enslavement and deliverance are read 'round the family table.

Q. What does the word Seder mean?

A. Seder is a Hebrew word meaning order or procedure. On the first evening of Pesach, a

special order or service known as the Seder is conducted. When our ancestors left Egypt they celebrated their freedom with a special ceremony and it has come to be called the Seder. The Seder is not merely a dinner. It is a religious celebration.

Q. And what does Haggadah mean?

A. It is a Hebrew word meaning "The Story." It is also the name of the book from which we read the service of the Seder.

Q. Why do we eat Matzos instead of bread on Passover?

A. When our ancestors left Egypt, the Bible tells us, they had no time to bake their bread in an oven so they took along dough and baked it in the sun while travelling. The matzos remind us of the bread of affliction or suffering which our ancestors ate in Egypt and of their haste to flee from the land of slavery.

Q. What is Afikomon?

A. Afikomon, meaning "dessert or after-meal" is a special piece of matzo which is hidden at the beginning of the Seder. At the end of the meal the children are given the opportunity to find it. A Prize may be given to the child who finds it. Then the Afikomon is distributed to all present. After partaking of the Afikomon it is customary to eat nothing else.

Q. When does Passover begin this year?

A. On the evening of Friday, March 31st.

Q. How long does it last?

A. The Bible stipulated seven days; later it became an eight-day holiday outside of Palestine; and Reform Judaism has reverted back to a seven-day observance.

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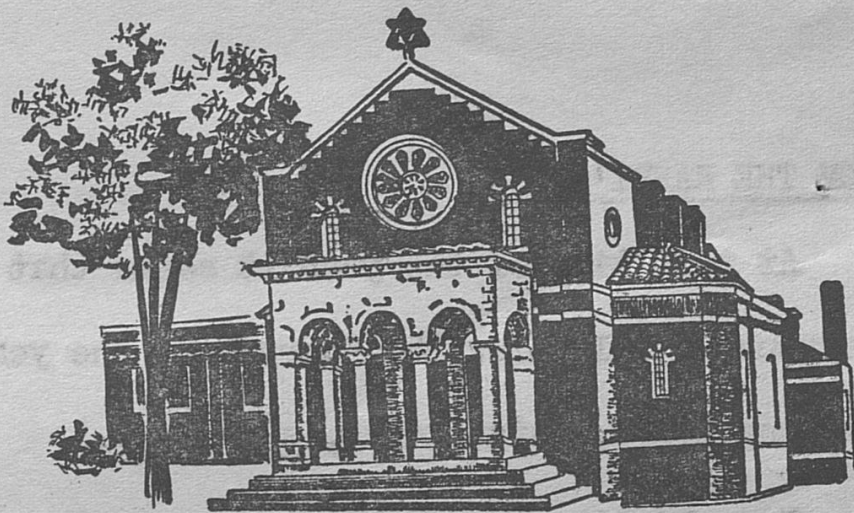

Dear Jimmy:

This is one of the most difficult letters which I have ever had to write. Upon being called to the pulpit of Temple Emanuel of St. Louis, Missouri and accepting, I must tender my resignation to the Board of Trustees of Temple Adath Israel.

This decision was made particularly difficult because my family and I have grown to love our congregation and community very much. However, the great challenge and opportunity afforded by Temple Emanuel made it impossible for me to pass it by.

I am asking that my tenure with Temple Adath Israel be terminated on June 15, 1961. 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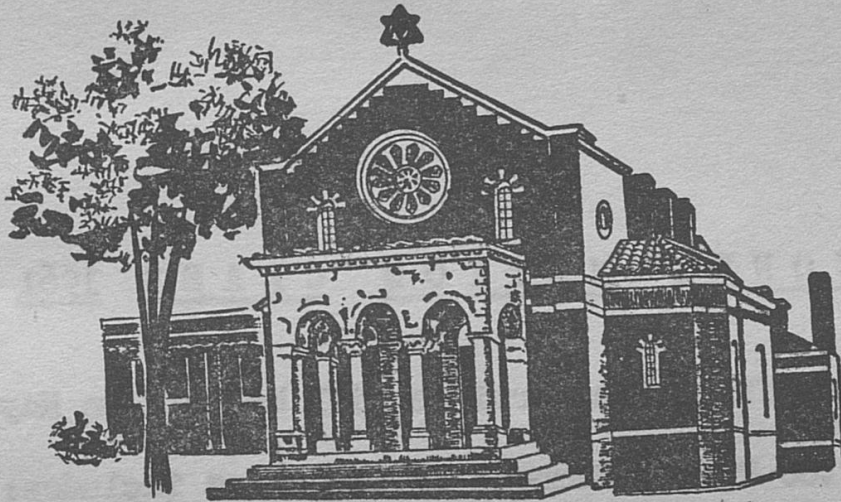

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati will soon have one of the most advanced language laboratories in the country, designed to make instruction in foreign languages, primarily Hebrew, as thorough and intensive as possible. Through the use of dual channel tapes, a student can compare his performance to the instructor's, even in the latter's absence, and can improve his reading ability and comprehension of Hebrew in all its periods - Biblical, Rabbinic and Modern. Two lab rooms and twenty-one tape recorders, with a unique control room, from which the instructor can listen and speak to any one of the positions, and other new developments in audio-visual techniques which help vary and enlarge the material used in classroom instruction have produced a flexible system which serves not only the students at the College - Institute but also several other institutions interested in modernizing Hebrew instruction.

The Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion is now the largest and oldest major rabbinical school in the world. The Cincinnati school, Hebrew Union College, was founded in 1875 and for the first six years classes were conducted in the vestry and basement rooms of Bene Israel congregation, moving in 1881 to a converted private house in Cincinnati's West End, where it remained for the next 32 years. In 1913, it moved to the present 18-acre site on Clifton Avenue. The Jewish Institute of Religion was founded in 1922 and the two schools

merged some ten years ago to consolidate and strengthen the basic forces of Reform Judaism. The combined school now has four sections -- in Cincinnati, New York, Los Angeles and Jerusalem (now under construction).

Dedication of the new buildings on the Cincinnati campus of Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion June 1 - 4 will mark the first construction to take place there in some thirty years. The old dormitory, a gift to the college from the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, opened in 1924, has been completely remodeled, except for floors and staircases, and now has new electrical and heating systems, an enlarged dining room and air-conditioning. A second dormitory has been built to house the growing number of students and a new library which has a capacity of 230,000 books and can be enlarged to contain 300,000, has been built on the site of the tennis courts. The dormitories will be dedicated on the evening of Thursday, June 1. On Saturday night, June 3, dedication of the new library will take place.

The Hebrew Union College has invited Reform congregations representatives for the week-end of June 1-4, to participate in the dedication of the new buildings on the Cincinnati campus. Dr. Nelson Glueck, president of the College-Institute, will entertain these lay visitors at the President's Brunch, Sunday morning, June 4, at 11 o'clock.

Rabbi and Mrs. Rosenbloom will represent our congregation at the dedication services. They will also attend the Ordination services. Members of our congregation who would like to accompany Rabbi and Mrs. Rosenbloom, are asked to call them immediately.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

OF

RABBI ROBERT A. ROTHMAN

Rabbi Robert A. Rothman was born in New York City and received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from the Yeshiva University of New York. He attended the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, receiving his Bachelor of Hebrew Letters, his Master of Arts Degrees and Ordination from that post-graduate institution. While at the Hebrew Union College, he served as student-Rabbi of the Congregations in Martinsburg, West Virginia, Jonesboro, Arkansas, and Kokomo, Indiana.

After his Ordination in 1957, Rabbi Rothman enlisted as a Naval Chaplain and following his initial training in the Naval Chaplains' School, Newport, Rhode Island, was ordered to serve as the Jewish Chaplain for the entire island of Okinawa while attached to the Third Marine Division, FMF. Upon completion of his tour of duty in the Far East, he was ordered to serve as the Jewish Chaplain for the United States Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois, where he also functioned as assistant Brig and Hospital Chaplain. In February, 1959, he was promoted to the rank of full Naval Lieutenant.

Rabbi Rothman was released from Active Duty in May, 1959, and assumed the position of Assistant Rabbi of Temple Israel, Columbus, Ohio, in June of that year. In March, 1961, he was promoted to Associate Rabbi of that Temple.

He is a member of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, B'nai B'rith, The Association of Jewish Chaplains of the Armed Forces, The Academy of Religion and Mental Health, and is Honorary Chaplain of the Ohio Senate. In addition, he is a member of the United States Navy Ready Reserve, The Columbus Jewish Community Relations Committee, The Ohio State University Hillel Advisory Board, The American Jewish Committee, The Columbus Community Services Council, Speaker's Bureau of Central Ohio Chapter of the American Heart Association, The Church Cooperation Committee of United Appeals, The Speaker's Bureau of United Appeals, and the Legislative Committee of the United Community Council. Rabbi Rothman is an active candidate for the degree of Doctor of Hebrew Letters from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, and a member of the Clergymen's Advisory Committee of the Planned Parenthood Association of Columbus.

PAPA'S ONE-TRACK MIND

A SHORT STORY ABOUT HORSES AND HOLINESS

Mama bit her lip over the morning paper. She frowned so deeply her curly bangs touched the bridge of her nose. I could guess what she had seen to upset her. In searching for the Funnies I had leafed through the sports section; the Trots were to start tomorrow.

Mama liked most animals. She was tolerant of our thirteen cats of assorted sizes and shapes, and of the Murphey's dog who preferred the shade of our lilac bushes to theirs. She even put up with the rooster who roused her at daybreak and his retinue of hens that sometimes pecked at the flower beds. But horses were different.

Horses were anathema to her, which would have seemed peculiar to anyone not knowing the reason, for we lived in the Bluegrass Region of Kentucky where the horse is generally pampered and petted. She did not hate all horses. Exempt were those that served some useful purpose such as pulling the Adams Express dray or the huckster's wagon of summer vegetables. Her distaste was for thoroughbreds. Not all of those, either, for she could enjoy a running race at the county fair or even at Churchill Downs. She detested trotting horses.

When she first began to I do not know, for I grew up knowing exactly how she felt about them. I knew why, too. Papa preferred trotters to all other equines. Every so often he attempted to explain his liking to Mama. When he had come to Kentucky as a youth, the first friend he made was

a man who owned a small trotting track and a few horses. Papa was persuaded to buy an interest in one of the trotters. Though it had never won a race, Papa had been proud of it, and continued to feel he had a sort of vested interest in all trotters ever after.

Mama tried to redirect his interest, pointing out the speed and grace of horses that ran instead of trotted. She could not, however, change his mind, centered on the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association track in Lexington.

That was the reason for Mama's resentment, and the cause of her deep frown that September morning. Though the running races were in the spring, the Trots were annually in the fall, overlapping the High Holy Days, often including both Rosh Hashonah and Yom Kippur. This year they started on Yom Kippur.

As she read THE LEXINGTON HERALD that morning, though, Mama saw something I had missed, "They never did this before," she complained, "put in a notice about Yom Kippur. It's not bad enough everybody at Temple will want to know why your father's not with us tomorrow," Mama said to Terry and me. Papa sat placidly eating hot baking powder biscuits topped with country butter and strawberry jam. "Now," she added, "Everybody here in Valance will know he went to the Trots on the most holy day in the year. This makes me feel worse than ever."

Papa took another biscuit. "Who here in town besides us knows what Yom Kippur is?" he asked.

"Mr. Goldberg does. He came from an Orthodox family."

"He couldn't care less," Papa said. "He won't pay any attention, anyway."

Mama sighed. "If only you'd go with us this year."

Every year we started out for Lexington with

Papa carrying prayer books with the stars. Mama was always hoping each year it would be different, that he could go to Lexington in Trots time and go to Temple instead of to the racetrack. It never happened in our memory, and Terry and I were sure it never would. To us her belief that he might change his habits was as unrealistic as the "next year in Jerusalem" wish some older members of the congregation made during this season.

Mama was not one to concede defeat easily, though. That Yom Kippur morning she brought forth all her old arguments, none of which had ever been availing against the lure of the Trots. "Lee, you will go with us this once. What you can see in horses hitched to sulkeys walking around a track I can't imagine. For the girls' sake, if not for your own, you should go. What kind of example are you setting them?"

We had heard it so often before we hardly listened. Papa would go his way, and we would go Mama's. Impressed by the holiness of the day, I would have never have considered going to the races with him; I'd have feared punishment, immediate and dire, had I gone to such a place on such a day. But Terry would have gone eagerly if he had asked her. He never had. He believed little girls should go to Temple with their mother.

Papa always held out hope without making any promises. "Wait and see how it is when we get to Lexington," he said that morning. If it rained, the Trots would be postponed, but never in our memory had it rained on a Holy Day until after the Trots were over. Mama scanned the sky as we started walking down Rose Hill to the interurban station, but the fine fall day was cloudless from zenith to horizon.

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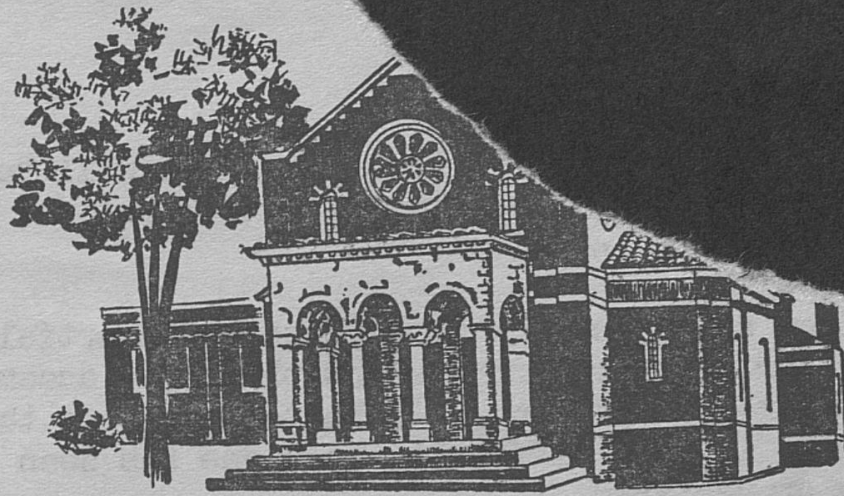

Mr. Goldberg cupped a hand around his right ear to hear better. "Hello, Lee" he greeted Papa. "Mattie's got this bee in her bonnet I should go to services because it's Rosh Hashonah."

"Yom Kippur," Papa said.

"It's been so long since - I've forgotten," Mr. Goldberg explained. "Never went much anyhow. Never since I've lived here. I get along without it. Whu'd Mattie take it in her head to get me to go now? I'll never understand women."

I tried to listen to everybody at once. "I know he'll never go alone," Mrs. Goldberg was saying. "If you'd only take him with you?"

Mama pursed her lips. Trying to get Papa to give up the Trots for Temple was one thing; Trying to persuade a reluctant Mr. Goldberg to was something else. With all the dignity she could command, she said, "I'd be glad to have him go with us, if he wants to." She spoke slowly, distinctly so Mr. Goldberg could hear.

"But I don't want to go," he insisted. "It was Mattie's idea, not mine."

Mama flushed. "It's too late," he continued, "much too late. I don't belong there any more. I don't belong anywhere." I heard neither apology nor regret in his tone.

When the car came, we boarded it, as did Mr. Goldberg. "Was nice of you to ask me," he told Mama as he passed us on the way to the smoking compartment.

When we got off in Lexington, Mama held out her hand for the prayer books. Papa kept them in his

pockets. "I'm going with you," he said, "this time."

Terry demanded, "Why aren't you going to the Trots like always?"

Papa cleared his throat before saying, "I want to go to Temple with you."

She didn't believe him. "You'll get awfully tired. I do, even when Mama gives me a pink peppermint pattie to keep quiet."

Though I could not see how, then, I knew Mr. Goldberg had influenced Papa as Mama had never been able to do. His influence was lasting, too. In all the years that followed, Papa chose Temple over the Trots.

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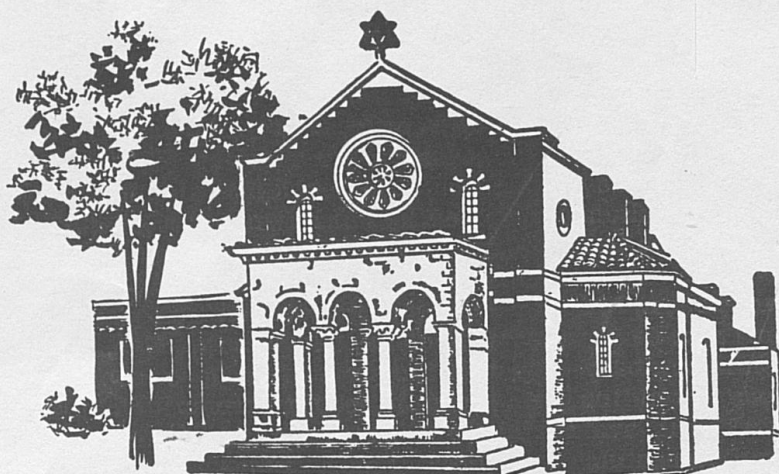

ROSH HASHONOH

On Sunday, September 10, Jews throughout the world will begin the celebration of the High Holy Days: ten days filled with prayer and meditation. In the course of these worship services we will hear and read the word "Teshuva," meaning "redemption" or "salvation," repeatedly. Yet the interesting thing is that Judaism is not constructed around any drama of redemption in spite of the use of this word. There is no term in the Hebrew language for "salvation" in a sacramental redemptive sense. In Judaism, the soul of man requires no "liberation" because the soul of man is not enchained. The idea that man needs to be saved either from the toils of life or from some Original Sin or from the prison house of matter or from baleful astrological influences is not part of Judaism.

Then of what value are these High Holy Days? What is it that makes them so significantly "High?" Why do we indulge in all the customs and ceremonies that set this day apart from every other festival and Holy Day? Do we blow the Shofar, for example, only because the Bible says: "In the Seventh month, in the first day of the month, shall be a solemn rest unto you, a memorial proclaimed with the blast of horns, a holy convocation." (Lev. 23:24) The blowing of the Shofar, the most outstanding symbol of the High Holy Days, has a deeper meaning for us.

It says to us, in the words of Moses Maimonides: "Awake, ye slumberers from your slumber and rouse yourselves from your deep sleep. Search your deeds and turn ye in repentance. Remember your Creator, ye who forget the truth because of the vanity of the hour; who go astray all through the year in pursuit of trifles which can neither profit nor save. Look to your souls and mend your ways and your deeds. Let every one of you forsake his wicked path and his evil purpose."

It is a time of re-evaluation of past deeds. A time of future commitments within the framework of goodness and love. For is it not aptly said in the Midrash; "I call heaven and earth to witness that whether it be Jew or non-Jew, man or woman, free or bondsman, only according to their acts does the Divine Spirit rest upon them!"

All of us in Temple Adath Israel join together in praying for a year filled with deeds worthy of our heritage, for a year filled with peace and for a year filled with happiness.

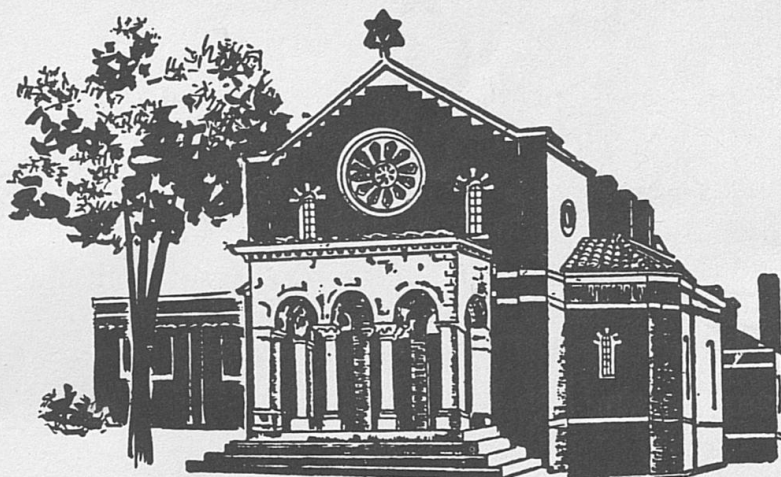

TEMPLE ADATH ISRAEL RELIGIOUS SCHOOL CURRICULUM

The purpose of our Religious School is to help our children participate happily, intelligently and creatively as Jews in modern life. The Religious School aims to help the child.....

1. To develop a religious approach to life.
2. Be provided with wholesome and satisfying Jewish experiences.
3. Associate himself with fellow-Jews in religious, social and educational activities.
4. To develop a sound respect and understanding of all the children of God.
5. To integrate Judaism with American life.

NURSERY: The child meets a school and a class: This is the first contact that a child has with a group within the framework of the Temple. The Temple and all it represents is integrated into the child's play, games and songs.

KINDERGARTEN: The child discovers himself: Starting with his own first-hand experiences in Religious School, the Temple, home and the observance of holidays and customs, the child gains an orientation to his religious heritage.

FIRST GRADE: Recognition of God, prayer and ethics: Through games, stories, ceremonies, songs, plays, films and charity, the child is aided in his grasp of a concept of God and His service through ethical conduct and prayerful attitude.

SECOND GRADE: Jewish holiday cycle and Biblical heroes: The child begins a systematic study of Jewish holidays and Biblical heroes with some depth.

THIRD GRADE: The Temple, prayer and ethics: Starting with our own Temple, its history, its physical qualities, its activities and leaders, the child progresses to the study of prayer and its role in Jewish life. Bible stories, events and personalities continue to be presented to the child.

FOURTH GRADE: Jewish life-cycle and American Jewish history: Starting with his own experiences with the life-cycle ceremonies of his religion (birth of a new baby, consecration, Bar Mitzvah, weddings, etc.), the child studies the history and development of these practices through Jewish history and their function today. The child is introduced to American Jewish History.

FIFTH GRADE: Jewish history and ethics: The beginnings of Jewish history are presented in a systematic fashion. Jewish ethics are presented through story illustrations.

SIXTH GRADE: Contemporary Jewish life: Jewish life in our times is discussed and analyzed together with a continued systematic study of Jewish history.

SEVENTH GRADE: Reform Judaism: The growth, development and history of Reform Judaism is studied with an eye towards an appreciation of the purpose of Reform Judaism's existence. Recent Jewish history is presented.

EIGHTH GRADE: Teen-age religious problems: The religious problems and concerns of American Jewish teen-agers is studied with the aid of Dr. Sylvan D. Schwartzman's volume, "Meeting Your Life's Problems." Greater comprehension of the Bible is considered.

CONFIRMATION: The aims of this class are to present a broad understanding of Judaism and other religions and to encourage the practice of Judaism. This is achieved through discussion and preparation for Confirmation including appropriate readings.

THE HEBREW DEPARTMENT: A voluntary course of study beginning with the Fourth Grade and containing two divisions: Beginners and Advanced. Its aim is to develop facility with and comprehension of the Prayer Book. All classes meet every Wednesday afternoon.

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PARKING FOR SERVICES

With the innovation of two services for Rosh Hashonoh Evening the matter of parking becomes of some concern. In order to help alleviate this difficulty you are urged to join in car pools when driving to the Temple. Each family that joins with another instead of driving its own car, eliminates that much extra congestion.

To aid those who will be arriving for the second service, those who attend the first service are urged not to delay or tarry in the area but to vacate the parking space they hold in order to permit others to park without undue difficulty.

The second service will begin exactly on schedule and we would prefer that no one be unnecessarily delayed in joining and participating in the entire Worship Service. Your cooperation is needed if we are to successfully effect these plans.

YOM KIPPUR

The most sacred day of the year for Jews is the day of Atonement...Yom Kippur. It will be observed this year beginning sundown September 19, for one full day.

During this period the Jew not only reaffirms his belief in the Temple, but he also re-evaluates his own personal deeds and behavior and re-examines ways in which he may, during the coming year, improve his service to God, man and family.

The services begin with the Kol Nidre prayer which states in essence:

"For all our sins during the past year, Oh God, please forgive us." On Yom Kippur, the Jew customarily abstains from food and drink, thus indicating the solemnity of the occasion and the serenity with which he evaluates his life.

Judaism places great emphasis on man's deeds on earth and his ability to use wisely gifts given him by God. For this reason, the Yom Kippur prayers, sermons and meditation direct the worshiper to an intensive reappraisal of his life.

AN OPEN LETTER

Dear Temple Member,

With the approach of the High Holy Days our hearts and thoughts become more deeply attuned to matters religious. The Temple, its activities and religious programs seem to stand out more clearly and with heightened interest.

But even at this important point in our annual cycle of religious introspection and concern, we have a tendency to take what is ours for granted. We often forget that were it not for the generosity and participation of the past and current members of this Temple, its program would not have been possible. In order to assist in the fulfillment of visions that can be realized with some effort, the leadership of Temple Adath Israel established last year, a permanent Endowment Committee with a rotating membership. This Committee serves as the guardian and administrator of funds and property which may be contributed to the Temple for the purpose of perpetuating and meeting its programs and needs.

The funds placed in the care of the Endowment Committee will be utilized in accordance with the terms, provisions and stipulations imposed in writing by the donors of such gifts, and in accordance with the needs of the Temple as determined by the Committee with the approval of the Board of Trustees. This has been assured by the Congregation's adoption of a comprehensive amendment to its By-Laws.

The Endowment Fund will include gifts of money, property, life insurance, etc., and the Committee will be responsible and answerable to the Congregation for the manner in which it administers the assets which it holds.

Any of the undersigned members of the Committee will be happy to explain more fully the purposes and manner of its functions. Substantial gifts have been gratifyingly received to date. Your thought in this matter is encouraged. At this season of self-renewal, how comforting it can be to aid in the perpetuation of the ideals represented by your Temple and with which you have allied yourself.

CONSECRATION SERVICE

In Reform Judaism, the Feast of Conclusion, marking the end of the Sukkot season, is observed with a special Consecration of children entering the Religious School for the first time. 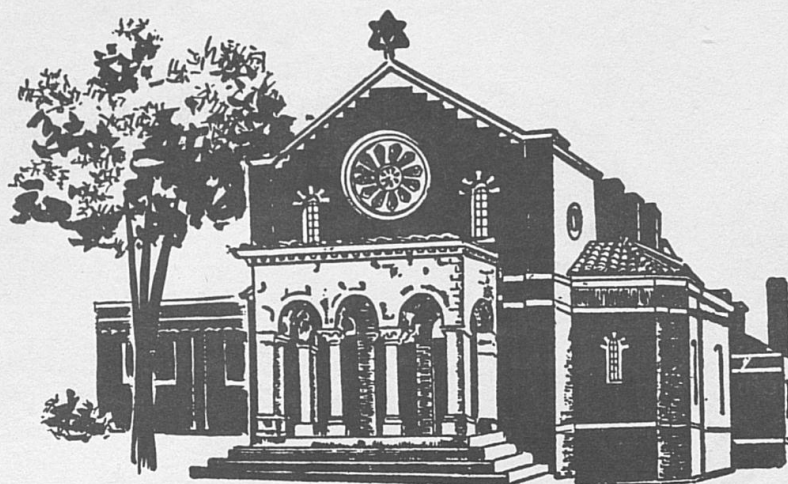

CONSECRATION SERVICE

In Reform Judaism, the Feast of Conclusion, marking the end of the Sukkot season, is observed with a special Consecration of children entering the Religious School for the first time. This service will be held in the Temple Sanctuary on the evening of Sunday, October 1 at 7:00 P.M. It will be conducted by Rabbi Rothman.

An important feature of this annual service will be the presentation of a miniature Torah to each Consecrant. These Torahs will be the personal gift of the Rabbi. They will be carried by the children in a procession around the Sanctuary, led by representatives of their predecessors. A grandfather of one of the Consecrants, a father and an older brother will be selected to represent the three generations and to lead the procession. At the conclusion of the service, a photograph of the Consecration Class will be taken so that it can become part of the photographic history of Temple Adath Israel.

Every child entering the Religious School in the Nursery, Kindergarten, or First Grade, for the first time, is invited to participate in the Consecration Services and to receive his miniature Torah.

BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

The highly successful book discussion group, under the direction of Dr. Michael Adelstein, will meet again this year. Last year's study focused on the portrait of the Jew in such recent American works as, "The Assistant," "Marjorie Morningstar," and "Good-bye Columbus." This year's project, according to Co-Chairmen Mr. Samuel Milner and Mrs. Edward Munich, will include Law, Psychology and Sociology in addition to fiction. The first work, Arthur Miller's modern classic, "Death of a Salesman,"

may be purchased for 95 cents from the Temple Secretary, Mrs. Waits. The group's first meeting will be held at 8:00 P.M. on Tuesday, October 10, in Mr. Milner's home, 706 Brookhill Drive. All of the Temple family is encouraged to read the books to be discussed and to attend the planned meetings.

SUKKOS

The longest of Jewish holidays is Sukkos, which is ordained in the Bible to last eight days. It is concluded with Simchas Torah "The rejoicing over the Torah" where the readings from the Torah Scroll are completed with the last part of Deuteronomy and are immediately resumed with the reading of the first chapter of Genesis. The Sukkos Festival receives its name from the Hebrew word Sukkah (booth). This Sukkah is constructed of wood and symbolizes the 40 years of wilderness travel by ancient Israelites under the leadership of Moses, on their way from Egypt to the Promised Land.

Sukkos is the holiday after which the Pilgrims patterned Thanksgiving Day. It was a week of great rejoicing and thanksgiving for the harvest coupled with a prayer for divine bounty in the new year.

The symbols of the Festival include the Sukkah, the Esrog (a citrus fruit), the Lulav (a palm branch), the Hadas (Myrtle twigs) and the Aravah (a willow of the brook). These symbolic items represent the agricultural harvest and the different elements of society ideally working together in close harmony. Because the element of gratitude was regarded as an ineradicable element in every sensitive soul, Sukkos was held by the rabbis as the most joyous and lasting as well as the longest of Jewish holidays.

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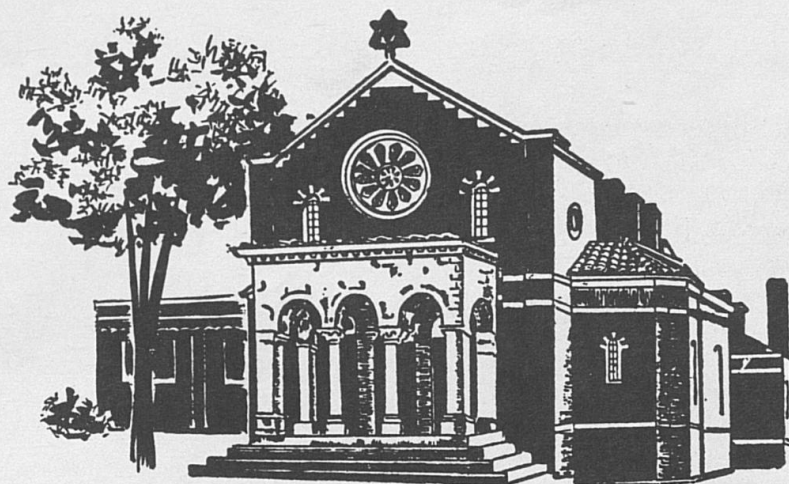

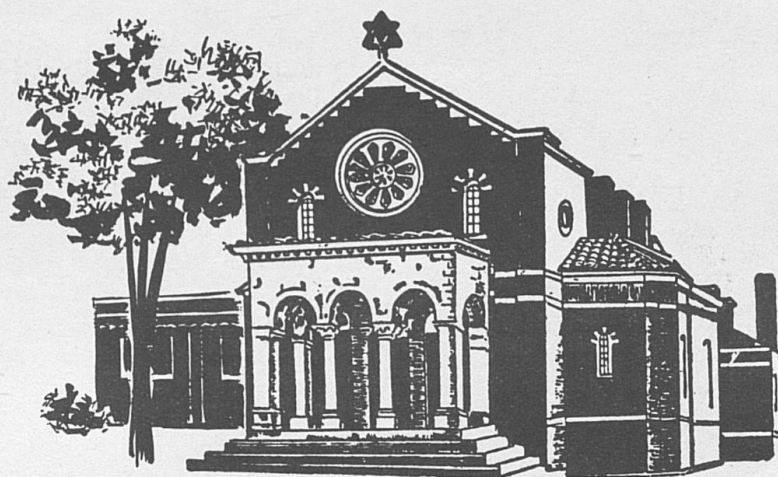

Mr. Weil is, among other things, a past President of Temple Adath Israel, a past and present member of the Board of Directors of our Temple and a past President of the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference of Congregations. He participated actively in the building drive for the Religious School building, served as Chairman of the Golden Jubilee for the

Temple, as Chairman of the Future Planning Committee and was Chairman of the Lexington Jewish Tercentenary Celebration held in Memorial Hall at the University of Kentucky.

Mr. Weil served as a member of the Executive Board of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, on the Commission of Jewish Education, on the National Council of the Joint Defence Appeal and the American Jewish Committee, and on the National Finance Committee of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. In 1957 he received a citation from the Lexington Chapter of the NCCJ. He has served as state and local Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal and in 1956 received a community award from the UJA.

In the community, Mr. Weil was a member of the original seven man steering committee which started the movement for the University of Kentucky Medical Center in 1954. He has served in various capacities on the Lexington Community Chest, on the Child Guidance Board and on the Board of the United Community Services. He also furnished a camp site for Lexington and Central Kentucky Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts.

He married the former Janice Metzger of St. Louis and they have three children: Jonas, Walter and Ellen.

HISTORY

How old is American Reform Judaism as an organized religious movement? This question occurs from time to time, and the answers tend to vary. There is, however, a precise birthday. American Reform Judaism as a movement dates from July 8, 1873--the day 48 American Hebrew Congregations came together and founded America's first national federation of synagogues, our own Union of American Hebrew Congregations. The new Union was given this mission: To create with all possible speed a seminary for the training and ordination of rabbis drawn from American youth. Two years later, on October 3, 1875, in the city of Cincinnati, there was opened America's first rabbinical seminary--the Hebrew Union College. Seventy five years later, in 1950 the HUC of Cincinnati and the Jewish Institute of Religion, which was founded in 1922 in New York, were merged into a single rabbinical seminary, and in 1954 the merged College-Institute established itself in California. And just several months from now, the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion will open its fourth school--The Graduate School of Biblical Study and Archeological Research in Jerusalem, Israel. American Reform Judaism, after 89 years, has grown to a movement of 629 congregations embracing more than 1,000,000 men women and children--with more than 800 rabbis and thousands of lay leaders dedicated to the perpetuation of our faith.

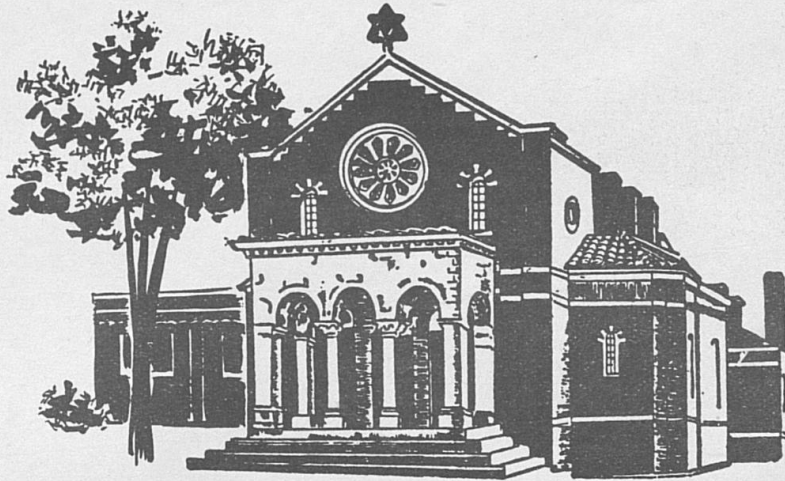

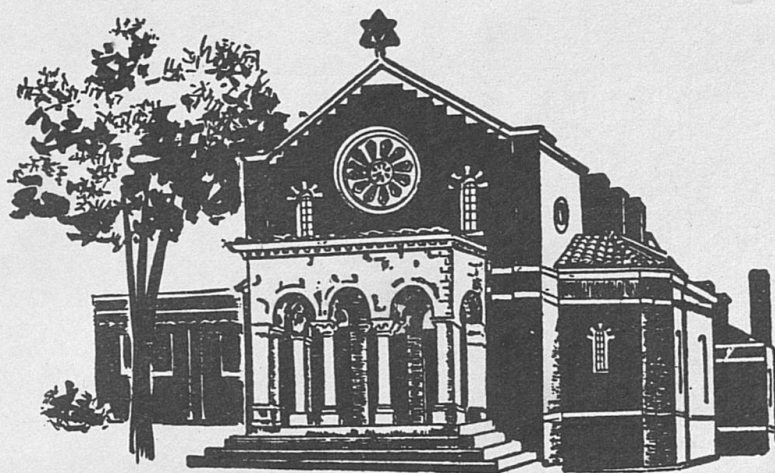

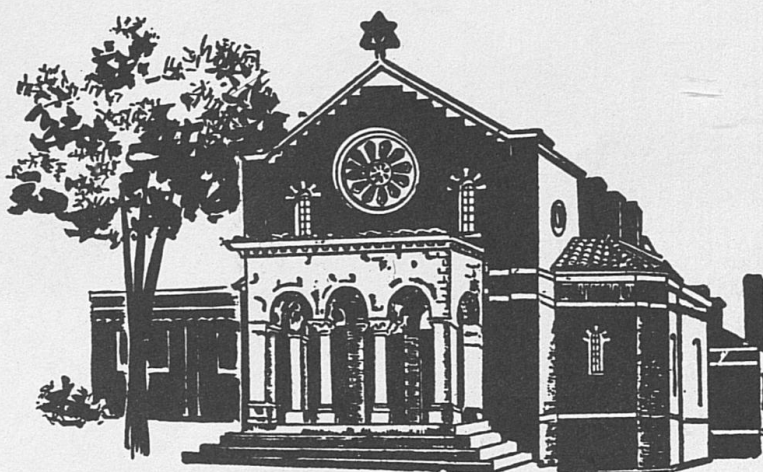

"THE LAST OF THE JUST"

Jewish history is marked by horrors of persecution, intolerance and oppression. Yet somehow, the Jewish people has miraculously survived. A fictionalized account of this historical phenomenon has been published during the past year under the title of "The Last of the Just," by Andre Schwarz-Bart. On the jacket, the book is described as "... a drama of Jewish suffering, martyrdom and transfiguration which begins with a pogrom in the twelfth century, ends in a gas chamber and grips the reader throughout with its narrative strength, its humor and its understanding of people. It has been called an epic, and as it appears in different languages all over the world it may achieve that rare distinction."

This book will be reviewed by Rabbi Robert A. Rothman on Friday evening, November 17, at 8:00 P.M.

WHAT IS A JEW?

What is a Jew? This question is not at all as odd as it seems. Let us see what kind of peculiar creature the Jew is, which all the rulers and all nations have together and separately abused and molested, oppressed and persecuted, trampled and butchered, burned and hanged—and in spite of all this is yet alive. What is a Jew, who has never allowed himself to be led astray by all the earthly possessions which his oppressors and persecutors constantly offered him in order that he should change his religion?

The Jew is that sacred being who has brought down from heaven the everlasting fire, and has lighted with it the entire world. He is the religious source, spring, and fountain out of which all the rest of the peoples have drawn their beliefs and their religions.

The Jew is the pioneer of liberty. Even in those olden days, when people were divided into but two distinct classes, slaves and masters—even so long ago had the law of Moses prohibited the practice of keeping a person in bondage for more than six years.

The Jew is the pioneer of civilization. Ignorance was condemned in olden Palestine more even than it is today in civilized Europe. Moreover, in those wild and barbarous days, when neither life nor the death of anyone counted for anything at all, Rabbi Akiba did not refrain from expressing himself openly against capital punishment, a practice which is recognized today as a highly civilized way of punishment.

The Jew is the emblem of civil and religious toleration. "Love the stranger and the sojourner," Moses commands, "Because you have been strangers in the land of Egypt." And this was said in the land of Egypt, in those remote and savage times when the principal ambition of the races and nations consisted in crushing and enslaving one another. As concerns religious toleration, the Jewish faith is not only far from the missionary spirit of converting people of other denominations, but on the contrary, the Talmud commands the Rabbis to inform and explain to everyone who willingly comes to accept the Jewish religion all the difficulties involved in its acceptance, and to point out to the would-be proselyte that the righteous of all nations have a share in immortality. Of such a lofty and ideal religious toleration not even the moralists of our present day can boast.

The Jew is the emblem of eternity. He whom neither slaughter nor torture of thousands of years could destroy, he whom neither fire nor sword nor inquisition was able to wipe off from the face of the earth, he who was the first to produce the oracle of God, he who has been for so long the guardian of prophesy and who transmitted it to the rest of the world—such a people cannot be destroyed... The Jew is everlasting as eternity itself.

It begins in the home where, in the deepest layer of child's developing personality, are woven strands of devotion to the collective life of the Jewish community.

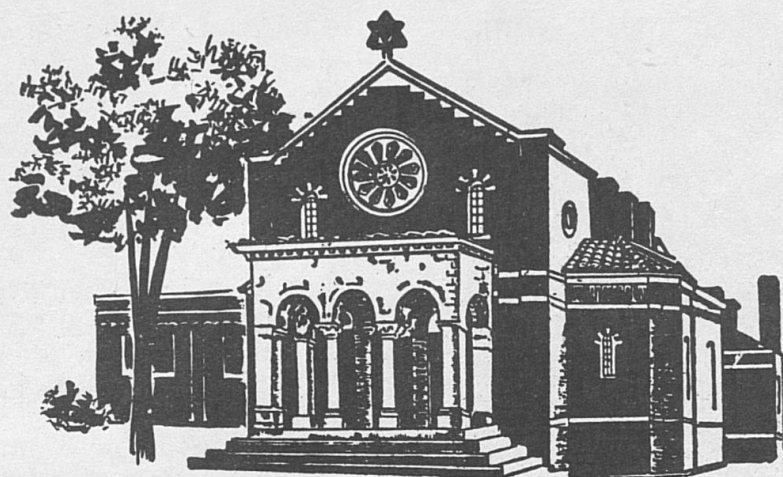

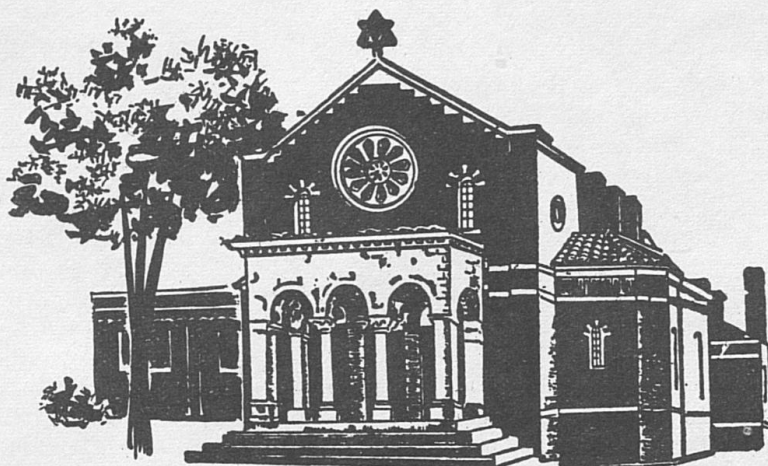

"WHAT IS HANUKKAH?"

The Talmud (b. Shabbas 21b) asks the question: "What is Hanukkah?" This is a strange question to ask in Babylon, possibly four or five centuries after the Maccabees had lived and fought and achieved religious liberty for their people. Did they not know what Hanukkah was? The Rabbis surely had in mind a deeper question than the literal Talmudic text implies. Perhaps they wanted to ask why it is not ever preserved in our Bible, as it could well have been. Hanukkah is clearly a festival which sprang up out of the affection of the people and was not imposed by the mandate of their leadership. Therefore, the Rabbis, in some bewilderment, must have asked, "What is all this enthusiasm about Hanukkah?"

What was lovable about Hanukkah is revealed in the prayer that developed for reading during the week. In that prayer there is gratitude for the courage of "the few against the many." Hanukkah is a tribute to courage. Which human being in the vicissitudes of life does not need the example of courage to lift him to his feet again? This courage is described as having led to the purification of the Temple. It was an heroic struggle for the purity of ideas and the cleanness of conscience. This reminds us that the inner treasure of conscience, self-respect, and the obedience to the inward mandate of God can be precious enough that, in the words of Talmud tradition, a man should be "rather willing to die than to violate." There is enough cowardice and enough cynicism in the world for our spirits always to be uplifted by the memory of heroes of the spirit. The Talmudic authorities ask, "What is Hanukkah?" and the spirit of our people answers, "It is the light that we always seek to lead us on the road of moral and spiritual courage."

NFTY OVERSEAS TOUR FOR 1962

The National Federation of Temple Youth announces its Third Annual NFTY Antiquities Tour of 3 weeks in Israel, 4 weeks in Greece, Rome, Paris, London, Amsterdam, Switzerland and 5 days on a Mediterranean cruise. 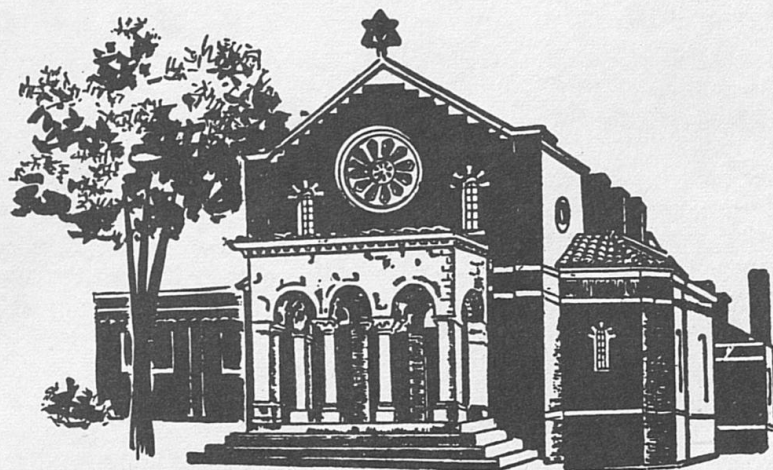

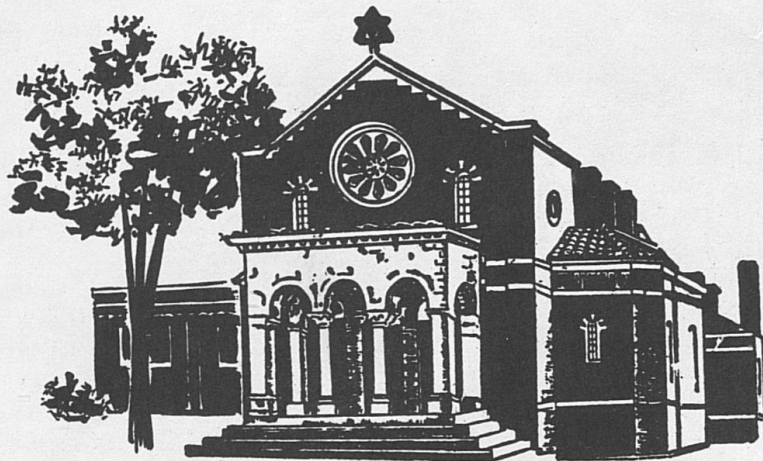

AN OPEN LETTER FROM THE TEMPLE PRESIDENT

Dear Temple Member,

"Judaism and Democracy: Our Common Mission" was the theme of the 46th General Assembly of our Union of American Hebrew Congregations which held its Biennial in Washington, November 11-16. My capsule report of this very interesting and stimulating meeting would be "Emphasis on Social Action."

The actual business of the UAHC took many hours of debate and discussion... both on the floor, in hotel rooms and over meals. Many changes were made in the by-laws. The most controversial of these was the elimination of roll calls because of the continuous growth of the assembly.

However, the most important business was the "Resolution on the Religious Action Center and its Activities." Because of the importance of this resolution it will be reprinted in a forthcoming bulletin. The proponents won an overwhelming victory.

Hereafter, the Commission on Social Action will concern itself with those subjects which fall within the scope of resolutions adopted by both the General Assembly of the UAHC and the Convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Therefore, the resolutions passed at the Assembly, take on added importance over resolutions passed in past years. We plan to publish as many of the resolutions as possible in the bulletin over the next two years.

The main speakers included Rabbi Maurice Eisendrath, President UAHC, Maurice Samuels, author and lecturer, and Arthur Goldberg, Secretary of Labor and a member of one of Washington's Reform Temples.

Below are a few quotations from the "Message from the President:"

"How can we speak on the one hand of the separation of church and state and, on the other, couple the words 'Judaism and democracy' and attribute to them a common mission?"

"The riddle is easily solved, the paradox clearly resolved, if we understand one principle."

"We must continue to separate church from state, but may not separate religion from life."

"Liberty, justice, and mercy are mere words... unless we live by them."

Daily workshops and seminars were held and the eleven Lexington representatives... the Kannors, Hymsons, Rothmans, Weils, Helen Paritz and the Bakers, found that attending a UAHC Assembly was definitely not a vacation. The five days were crammed with action.

The workshops included "Adult Education," "What is Judaism's Relationship to Non-Jews," "The Revolution in Industrial Relations," "Ritual," "Religious School," "Youth," "Finance," "The Conduct of Government," and "The Changing Role of the Family."

The national trend in adult education is toward more formal types of adult education. There are many congregations like ours who have informal lectures as part of their adult education. But, in addition, many of the congregations are establishing formal classes with textbook assignments and a regular school course of instruction. The UAHC is strongly encouraging adult education on a local, regional and national basis.

Victor Reuther, Walter's brother, was one of the discussants in "The Revolution in Industrial Relations" workshop. The session was most interesting. Mr. Reuther presents his side very, very capably. James Landis participated in "The Conduct of Government" workshop which was conducted at the same time.

The next Bi-ennial will be held in Chicago and the next Ohio Valley Regional Bi-ennial will be held next October in Toledo.

I feel strongly the necessity of our officers' attendance at national meetings. I think this should be understood as part of a President's responsibility before acceptance of office. Therefore, I plan to propose to our Budget Committee that funds be allotted to pay our President and Vice-President's travel, registration and hotel accommodations for future meetings.

The Lexington delegation was very proud of the election of Helen Paritz to the National Board of Sisterhood.

The Reform Movement is growing at the rate of approximately twenty-five new congregations each year. Our Temple is now one of 650 members of the UAHC and you individually are one of approximately one million Reform Jews.

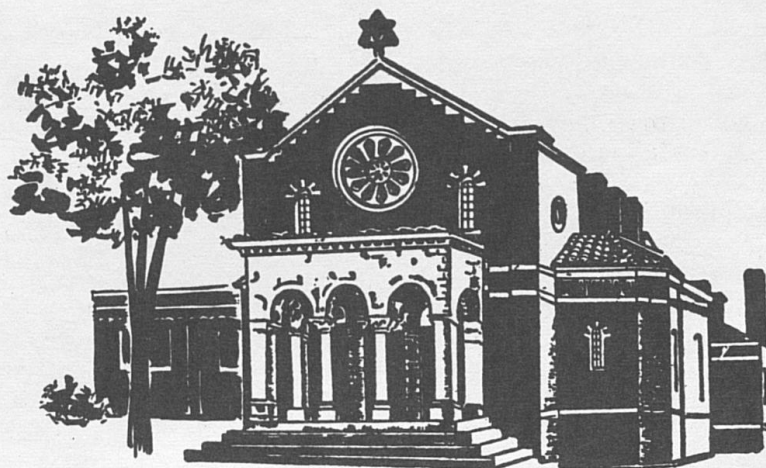

FROM THE RESOLUTION ON THE RELIGIOUS ACTION CENTER AND ITS
OPERATION

The 46th General Assembly of the UAHC herewith declares:

1. We commend the Commission on Social Action for its creative programming, for providing moral leadership and guidance to the Reform movement, and for strengthening the hands of the Rabbis in quickening the social idealism of Reform Jews.
2. We urge that the decision of the 45th General Assembly of the UAHC in November, 1959, concerning the establishment of a Center for Religious Action, be carried into effect as promptly as possible.
3. To assure the increasing effectiveness of the social action program, and at the same time to continue to safeguard congregational autonomy and the right of dissent, we affirm these guiding principles:
 - (a) The Center for Religious Action is an agency of the Commission on Social Action and is to function under the direct supervision and control of the Commission on Social Action.
 - (b) The Commission on Social Action, as heretofore, will concern itself with those subjects which fall within the scope of resolutions adopted by both the General Assembly of the UAHC and the Convention of the CCAR. Statements will be made in the name of the Commission and not in the name of the Center for Religious Action.
 - (c) Public statements shall reflect points of view and programs adopted by a majority of the delegates of Reform synagogues at biennial assemblies of the UAHC. Such pronouncements, resolutions, and other actions of the general assemblies have, in the nature of the case, the status and weight of being neither more nor less than the corporate decisions of such a representative assembly. They are useful to the extent that they serve as a moral guide to our congregations

and their members, to the nation, and to the world. Such statements speak for the UAHC. They are not binding upon every Reform synagogue, each of which is autonomous, or upon every member of a Reform congregation. Every congregation and every member has the right and the duty to express conscientious dissent within the framework of our common commitment to Reform Judaism and to one another.

4. Social Action will succeed to the extent that in our synagogues, individually and collectively, we have the understanding and the daring to make Judaism relevant to the great issues of our times.

We, therefore, call upon every Reform synagogue which has not yet done so speedily to create a Committee on Social Action or Community Affairs. The historic imperatives of our faith, the insistent moral challenge of the contemporary world and the ethical commitments of our own beloved America - all combine with fresh urgency to enjoin us to "do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with our God."

5. In order to implement and amplify these principles, be it resolved that:

- (a) The Religious Action Center shall service the Social Action Committees of the UAHC congregations, its national affiliates, federations and regional councils, along with their Rabbis, sisterhoods, brotherhoods, youth groups, educators, and administrators.
- (b) The service generally shall consist of furnishing informational materials about subjects best researched in Washington, suggestions regarding education of, and action which might be taken by local, regional and national Social Action Committees, sponsor seminar workshops, pilgrimages and gatherings for youth and adult leaders of Reform synagogue bodies; establish and maintain a library; as occasion may require, representatives may appear before Congressional Committees or other governmental bodies but in such event only in the name of the Social Action Commission and subject to all other regulations governing the Religious Action Center and the Social Action Commission. The foregoing shall not be considered to exclude other undertakings within the purview of actions taken by both the UAHC Biennials and the conference of the CCAR.
- (c) (1) There shall be established an Advisory Committee of 6 persons, which committee shall be charged with the responsibility of counseling and guiding the staff of the Center in connection with its operations. The said committee shall be a subcommittee of the Joint Commission on Social Action. Three of the members of said committee shall represent the UAHC and their appointment shall be by the chairman of the Board of the UAHC and three of the members shall represent the CCAR and their appointment shall be by the president of the CCAR.
(2) The Advisory Committee will counsel with and advise the director in developing the program of the Center. In connection with testimony before congressional committees or governmental departments where a public record is to be made, the director of the Center shall consult with the Advisory Committee except that in the case of emergencies consultation with the chairman shall be deemed sufficient.
(3) Public pronouncements shall be made only in the name of the Social Action Commission of the Union and the Central Conference of American Rabbis, and shall be confined to resolutions previously adopted by or actions taken at both the UAHC Biennials and CCAR Conventions.

IT IS the confident belief of the UAHC that these Principles will enable the Commission on Social Action and its Washington Center to make an even greater contribution to Reform Judaism, to America, and to our sacred mission.

RELATIVE CONTENTMENT

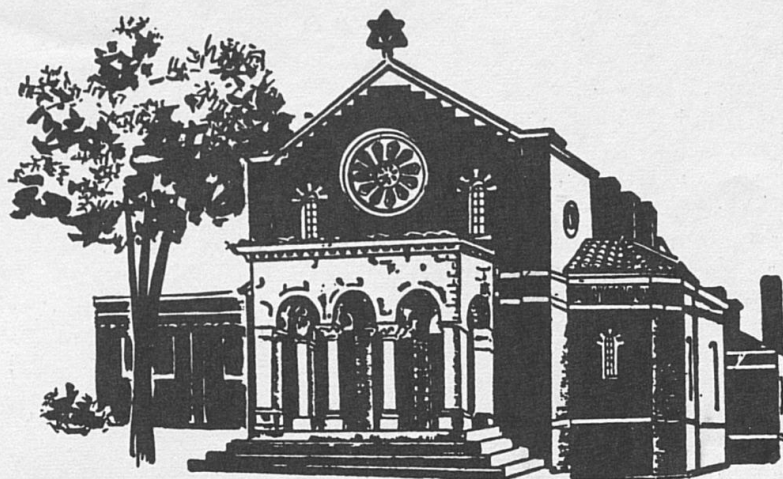
MARK TWAIN'S COMMENTS ON THE JEWISH PEOPLE

THE ART OF LIVING TOGETHER

Throughout the ages, Judaism has been vitally concerned with the ethics of human relations. Possibly as a result of this preoccupation with the fundamentals of civilized living, the Jewish contribution to abstract philosophy, science, technique—not to mention art—has been modest. To be sure, standard works on the "Jewish Contribution to Civilization" adduce commendable evidence that Jews have contributed their due share to all departments and spheres of culture and civilization. But the fact remains that collectively the Jews have made only one truly great contribution: they have evolved the ethics of human relations and have taught mankind all that ever will, or can, be known, of the theory and the practice of the good life. Judaism has not excelled in the sensate realm of art and technique, but it has created, single-handedly almost, the art of living together. Judaism has not inspired beautiful statues and imposing structures of architecture. In fact, it has been all but indifferent to the fine arts, for it has invariably concentrated its efforts and given its strength to the cultivation of the arts of peace and social justice.
