

"UNITY, BY GOD!"

The passage in Genesis to be read this Sabbath contains one of the most moving pleas in all of Biblical literature. Judah, one of the more responsible sons of Jacob, appeals to Joseph, Pharoah's minister, for the return of Benjamin. Not knowing that the King's minister was none other than Joseph, his brother, Judah offers himself in place of Benjamin in order to spare his father the anguish of this loss. Joseph reveals his true identity finally and unites with his brothers.

All of this narrative directs itself to an ideal which is uniquely Jewish. In his sermon of Friday, January 4, at 8:00 P. M., the Rabbi will discuss this theme which he has entitled: "Unity, By God!"





"AFFIRMATION"

By Debby Milner

(From a sermon preached at our Temple on Friday, December 28, 1962)

Perhaps you have wondered how a Confirmand from our Sunday School and a graduate of our Youth Group feels about a new life away at college. Has his preparation for becoming an adult Jew been adequate and what part has it played in his life? How different are the prejudices and challenges?

In order to properly present my answers to these questions let me start at the beginning. As a child, I don't believe I thought too much about God or Judaism. Nightly prayer was an excuse to delay going to sleep. Badness was associated more with punishment than with wrong, and services were something to sit through with the reward of a tasty reception.

I don't remember worrying and wondering about being Jewish at that stage either. I accepted being Jewish in the same category as being a girl or living on Fithian Avenue. In a small town the size of Paris there could be little anti-semitism personally directed against me. Since I was the only Jew in the school system, anti-semitism among my colleagues could consist only of whether or not they liked me.

Sunday School could be fun or boring, much depended on the teacher. I only saw the students in my class that once a week. They weren't as much Jewish friends as Sunday School friends.

Later Sunday School began to mean much more to me. The history of our people, their achievements and martyrdom made me proud to be a Jew and very thankful to be an American. It has left me with the still unanswered question of why has the Jew been subjected to persecution and cruelty in every age. Sunday School was teaching me to understand the meaning and beauty of the ritual, the poetry of religion. Culminating with the Confirmation Class I began to realize the bedrock of Judaism on which everything else stands, the true meaning behind the history and ritual, that of ethics and ideals.

As an adolescent, God and Judaism took on a more personal meaning. Friday night services ceased being a bore and became thought provoking and inspirational. I developed a belief in talking to God which I wish I still could believe in.

My Jewishness became more a part of me although most of my friends were not Jewish and I still hadn't experienced any anti-semitism.

During my Confirmation year many of my ideas about Judaism and life were formed. After Confirmation, Sunday School was replaced by the Youth Group which gave me the chance to meet and work with Jews my age from many places. This experience in meeting people and making friends, whose friendships I still value, was good practice for life at college.

The Youth Group gave me opportunities to participate in and observe special study sessions, worship services, and good deeds which had a great part in making Reform Judaism more meaningful to me. I can never forget the fine people I met

and the wonderful things I saw and did at OVFTY-toots and Institute. The Youth Group also gave me my best experience in leadership, its duties and responsibilities, joys and frustations.

During my Youth Group years I began thinking in terms of ethics...honesty and justice...and I began choosing my friends and heroes accordingly. I also became aware of the character of my parents, how it met and indeed helped to form my own standards.

Faced with going away to college last summer, my main emotion was one of fear; fear that I wouldn't measure up socially or academically. I was the victim of a last minute panic at the thought of this total loss of security. I worried about whether or not people would like me and wondered if I would get along with my roommate.

All my fears were quickly eliminated, except the academic ones, which still haunt me. I get along well with my roommate, a Protestant who is converting to Catholicism. We have a mother-daughter like relationship, and I love her dearly. The girls in the dorm are just plain wonderful. Never before have I made so many strong and good friends so fast, and again the majority of them are not Jewish. Any anti-semitism has been well hidden. My views in bull-sessions concerning religion or morality are, like everyone else's, listened to with respect and interest. If you are looking for prejudice you might find it, but I haven't.

I don't get to services as often'as I should. I was disappointed in the regular Hillel services, which are Conservative, closer to Orthodox than Reform. It is as much my fault as theirs that they do not inspire or help me.

I do like to get out my prayer book and have my own service. This personal private service always leaves me with a peaceful and rewarded feeling.

One's religious ideas are supposed to change radically during the college years. Mine have changed very little so far. It is true that I have discarded answers to some questions, but I still haven't found the right answers. There are questions about God, death, and evil which I may never resolve to my own satisfaction.

Most of the ideas I went to college with have been proved and further cemented in my mind by dorm life and college life in general. Truth and justice are still important to me and my standards of honesty and goodness for measuring people have not changed. It is more necessary now than ever to judge people on their own merits and not by their status, skin pigmentation, or religion. I honestly believe I am being judged this same way.

Time and time again it has been proved to me that honesty and consideration of others are rewards in themselves and must be present for peace of mind. Also, they are almost always returned.

I went to college with some pretty definite ideas about intermarriage, civil rights, prejudice, and what constitutes right behavior. Although I haven't been away long enough to become really cynical or radical, I don't believe it will ever happen. If one's religious ideals are strong enough, if they have a firm enough foundation in truth and reason, they will withstand almost any test. I only hope mine can meet the tests to come as well as they met those which are past.

This speech is especially fitting for Chanukah, a time of rededication and reevaluation to the ideals and history of Judaism. We should all take the time to reevaluate our feelings about life, God, and Judaism, especially in this time of confusion about purpose and identity. I want to thank this congregation, my first and closest link with Reform Judaism, for all the opportunities and training it has given me through Sunday School, Rabbi and Youth Group.... all of which have helped make me what I am. May all your children be fortunate enough to have the same opportunities.



"WHEN IS A JEW NOT A JEW?"

On December 6, 1962, the Israeli Supreme Court ruled that Brother Daniel, a Jewish-born Roman Catholic monk, now residing in Haifa, Israel, could not be called a Jew under the Law of Return. The questions dealt with in this case centered about the following: Is anyone who calls himself a Jew automatically Jewish? Does a Jew who converts to Christianity remain a Jew? Can one be a Jew and a Christian at the same time? Is it true that "once a Jew- - always a Jew?" The Rabbi will discuss these questions in his sermon of Friday, January 18, entitled "When Is A Jew Not A Jew?"

FROM THE PRESIDENT OF HEBREW UNION COLLEGE-JEWISH INSTITUTE OF RELIGION (Excerpts from a recent report)

Dear Friend,

... This last June, thirty-one students were ordained as rabbis. Seven took pulpits of their own, mostly in young congregations; ten became assistant rabbis; another ten entered the military chaplaincy; and four accepted other positions or decided to pursue advanced specialized study. Their places were taken, on our Cincinnati, New York and Los Angeles campuses, by new students coming from many sections of the United States and abroad.... Presently, the 211 students forming the student body of our Rabbinic Departments come from 30 states and eight foreign countries, some as far away as India and Japan ...

During the past few years our admissions office noticed that a steadily increasing number of inquiries was being received from high school students express-

ing a keen interest in a rabbinical career ...

From the interviews and correspondence we have with these students it is evient that this trend is mainly due to two factors. One is the growth and increasing impact of NFTY, the National Federation of Temple Youth; and the other is the ersonal influence of the local rabbi....

We are glad that so many more boys growing up in the milieu of Reform Judaism begin to think of becoming rabbis before they enter American colleges and universities. We have always insisted that the students whom we accept for rabbinical training must have a full secular college education; we therefore advise the boys to get a broad liberal arts education rather than to focus their studies in a narrow utilitarian sense to their future rabbinical career ...

Our rabbis are not merely preachers, but educators, administrators, social workers, leaders and counselors in the complexities of modern life. Our expanding curriculum reflects this broadened scope. Our students receive intensive instruction in the field of human relations and group psychology, study the family and other groups of our modern social system in the light of the rabbi's function as a community leader, and become acquainted with the principles and methods of mod-

ern teaching and school administration.

We of the College point with pride to our up-to-date training facilities.... We take advantage of technical advances, yet we know that our aim is not the training of technicians, but the education of Jewish men of God. This education rests on Jewish learning and ideas. Only such an education leads to Jewish expression full of power and conviction. It molds men in whom the spirit of Jewish religion acts as a life-force, and the ideas of Judaism live with an immediacy which creates inner authority, recognizable and therefore recognized ...

Today the majority of our professors are graduates of our College. The destruction of the European centers of Jewish learning and the rapid coming to world leadership of American Judaism have made it our responsibility to train our academic teachers. Thus a threefold, yet interwoven task has been entrusted to us: securing the sacred continuity of learning, learners and teachers. It can be fulfilled only if American Reform Jews acknowledge the vital importance of rabbinical training by continuous support.



The Sabbath Theme



"IN GOD'S NAME"

The Bible contains many names for God, each one implying a unique approach to God. Different strata of the Bible speak of God as a source of power or love, mercy or harsh retribution, kindness or vengeance; a seeming contradiction. 

"ONE IF BY GOD"

We, as Jews, pride ourselves on our belief in one God. We claim the distinction of having originated what is commonly called ethical Monotheism. To posit these distinctions implies an obligation to principles and commitments attributed to them. What difference if there is one God or many? How does the one God idea relate to man, if at all? Is Judaism the first religion to conceive of the one God idea? These and questions related to them will be discussed by the Rabbi on Friday, February 1, in his sermon entitled "One If By God."

"RELIGIOUS WEAKNESS"

It seems to me that I could dramatize the weakness of religion in American life by showing a mother driving her child to church or to synagogue and leaving that child at the entrance of the sanctuary. If you ask me "what is wrong with church or synagogue or religious school?" the question could be answered in just this way: Too many people leave their children at the gate. They do not accompany them into the sanctuary as fellow-worshippers or fellow-students.

(From the Bulletin of Temple Emanuel, Worcester, Massachusetts)

I have heard people try to excuse their absence from synagogue worship for any one of a large number of reasons. Some say they are "good Jews" without coming to the synagogue because they lead clean and moral lives. Others say the synagogue service doesn't give them enough "inspiration." Still others offer the excuse that they have social obligations to family and friends. Seldom does the question of commitment and duty come into their minds.

Why do people come in such large numbers on the High Holidays? The prayers are very much the same as they are on the Sabbath. So are the cantor, the choir and the preacher. Actually, no one comes to be "inspired," and no one with any degree of self-respect would give a social engagement priority over a Rosh Hashana or Yom Kippur service. The High Holidays still retain their hold over people because there is a sense of duty and commitment which impels them to honor these days. Duty and commitment are also the basic ingredients for Sabbath observance.

The synagogue service cannot offer entertainment which, in reality, is what those who seek "inspiration" are looking for. It cannot, without losing its dignity, cater to those who find value only in sensationalism. All it can offer is an opportunity to Jews, who are grown-up and mature enough to know what Jewish duty and commitment are, to "remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy."





(Exerpted from a recent letter from the Union of American Hebrew Congregations)

A new storm is brewing over the issue of religion in the public schools and from advance rumblings it may evoke more fire and thunder than did the recent Supreme Court decision on the New York State Regents' Prayer.

The Supreme Court announced that it will rule on two more profoundly controversial issues. 1) The Lord's Prayer and 2) Bible reading in the public schools.

Both of these practices are widespread and deeply rooted. The Regents Prayer, on the other hand, was a recent innovation and limited to one state. Further, no one contended that the Regents' Prayer was important to any denomination. It was attacked, among other reasons, because it watered religious expression down to a meaningless platitude.

If the Supreme Court rules in a spirit consonant with its recent decision on religion in the public schools, it will declare as un-constitutional the recitation of sacred Christian practices in the public schools of the nation. These practices are drenched with tradition and religious emotionalism. The conflagration which might be touched off will find much tinder and as Ben Sira put it, "According to its fuel, so will the fire rage."

It is incumbent upon each congregation, therefore, to conduct a careful campaign of education for all its members, for its children and youth as well as adults, for those involved regularly in the congregation's program and those whose participation is limited. No congregation should be left ill-prepared informationally and emotionally. In addition a program which involves the

entire community in dialogue should be undertaken, aiding everyone regardless of faith or point of view to understand the issues involved.

There has always been almost complete unanimity in the organized Jewish community in its opposition to the practice of religion in the public schools. There is now evidence of dissimilar views from some small segments of Orthodoxy, especially those involved in the day-school movement who are sincerely concerned with finances and see no hope for assistance from the local welfare funds. They are re-appraising their attitude toward government aid to parochial schools and with their attitude toward all Church-State issues.

There are others who feel that prayer uttered anywhere is beneficial regardless of formulation or where recited, and do not accept our contention that religion belongs in the home and house of worship and not in the statesupported school system. They do not fear either the possible abuses that may and frequently have occurred at the hands of the over-zealous teachers nor the serious chilling at the wall of separation between Church and State which religion in the public school affects......





RABBI PERLEY TO PREACH



Rabbi Martin M. Perley of Temple B'rith Sholom of Louisville, Kentucky, will occupy our pulpit on Friday, March 8, at 8:00 P. M. Rabbi Rothman will, in turn, be in the pulpit of Rabbi Perley's congregation at the same time in this planned exchange for Friday evening.

The Rabbi has served Temple B'rith Sholom in Louisville, Kentucky, since August 1946 and is a member of many religious, civic and social organiza-

tions in that city, representating the Rabbinate and the Jewish community in their efforts. He is the President of the Ohio Valley Region of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

JEWISH FESTIVAL OF PURIM BEGINS SUNDOWN, MARCH 9

(Prepared by the Commission on Information on Judaism of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Central Conference of American Rabbis.)

A struggle to worship free from political oppression will be retold as Jews throughout the world observe the ancient Festival of Purim beginning at sundown, March 9, with the reading in synagogues of the Megillah, a scroll containing the biblical Book of Esther,

The story relates the struggle of the Jews in ancient Persia to free themselves from the ruthless prime minister, Haman. The holiday derives its name from the Hebrew word for "lots" referring to the manner in which Haman chose the day on which he intended to destroy the Jews.

The heroine of the narrative is Esther, Queen of King Ahasuerus, who, with the aid of her cousin, Mordecai, saved her people from destruction.

The festival lasts until sundown, March 10, and is celebrated with special religious services. The holiday is also marked with gift-giving, costume balls, carnivals, games, and playlets dramatizing the story.

Children derive special enjoyment from the religious service. They are provided with noisemakers during the reading of the Megillah, so that when the name of Haman is mentioned, they can stamp their feet and wave the noisemakers to obliterate his name. A special tast treat is hamantaschen, a three-cornered pastry filled with mohn (poppy seeds) or prune jam, named after the Persian dictator.

A typical passage to be read during the service from the Union Prayerbook is:

Grant us, we beseech Thee, the vision to see and the courage to do Thy holy will. Imbue our hearts with the

The Sabbath Theme

"PASSOVER'S FOUR FREEDOMS"

Four seems to be a recurrent theme in the Passover Seder ritual. There are four cups of wine, four questions and the four sons. But, unquestionably freedom is the underlying theme that ties all of the Passover symbols and rituals into a unit. In his sermon of Friday, April 5, the Sabbath just prior to Passover, the Rabbi will speak on "Passover's Four Freedoms."

THE PASSOVER PRAYER AT BERGEN-BELSEN

One of the most treasured exhibits in the Katnnelson Museum of Relics of the European Holocaust, at the Ghetto Fighters' Kibbutz in the Galilee, Israel, is a tear-stained piece of paper with a prayer penned in Rabbinic script.

On Passover when no mattzoth were available, and the devout Jews had decided to fast, the Rabbis in the camp decided to permit the eating of chametz, but enjoined the following prayer to be recited before meals:

"Our Father in Heaven, it is known to Thee that it is our will to do Thy bidding and to celebrate the Passover by eating Matzah and by abstaining from Chametz; but to our great sorrow our enslavement prevents us from carrying out Thy commandments, and we are in great danger of our life. We, furthermore, wish to fulfil Thy precepts "And ye shall live by them and not die by them"; 'Take heed and preserve thy soul."" Our prayer goes out to Thee, Father in Heaven, that Thou mayest preserve us and keep us alive and redeem us speedily in order that we may keep Thy commandments and do Thy will and serve Thee with a full heart. Amen."

PASSOVER

With its colorful ceremonies that mark the flight of the Israelites from ancient Egypt, as related in the Book of Exodus, Passover begins this year on Monday evening, April 8th.

The most singular feature of the Passover holiday, which is observed seven days by Reform Jews, is the Seder. This is a worship service of exceptional dramatic content. The table is set with foods and objects that symbolize the deliverance of the Jews from Egypt. There is, for example, the matzoh... the unleavened bread... to recall the bread baked in haste as the Israelites took flight. There are the bitter herbs as reminders of the hardships undergone .v the slaves under Pharaoh in the years or their oppression. There is a sprig of parsley on the table to remind the assembly that Passover is also a festival of spring. A roasted shank-bone is an emblem of the paschal lamb and the haroses, a mixture of apples, nuts, raisins, cinnamon and wine symbolizes the mortar from which the Israelites made bricks for the Egyptian pyramids. The youngest child asks four traditional questions about the holiday and the remainder of the service is devoted to a response by the family group out of the Haggaddah, or narrative. There are also traditional songs to delight and instruct the children.

Moses is the great figure in the saga of Passover, yet it is not his life's story that preoccupies the worshipper in this holiday observance. Passover is the time when Jews celebrate the joys of liberty and draw parallels between the hardships they underwent in Egypt and in later persecutions during the thousands of years of their history. The emphasis, however, is always on ultimate deliverance and hope for the future.

EXODUS 13:8



THE "EXODUS" And thou shalt tell thy son in that day, saying:

"It is because of that which the Lord did for

The theme about which Passover is centered is that of the exodus from Egypt. The means of celebration of this significant event in Jewish history is through the Seder and the recounting of the story through the reading of the Hagaddah. Thus is preserved the perpetuation of the Jewish dream of freedom and peace for all of God's children.


Dr. Abraham Wikler to speak on

"A MEMORIAL TO THE WARSAW GHETTO"

The week of April 19 marks the 20th Anniversary of the beginning of the heroic Jewish uprising in the Warsaw Ghetto of which nothing now remains. There is a monument to the Jewish fighters who challenged and withstood the German savages for over six weeks... longer than did France in World War II.

During his travels abroad in 1960-61 Dr. Abraham Wikler's interest in the battle of the Warsaw Ghetto was aroused by a visit to this monument. Upon his return to Lexington he made a special study of historic sources pertaining to that momentous event. The books he used were: "Notes From the Warsaw Ghetto" by Emanuel Ringelbaum, "Five Years In the Warsaw Ghetto" by Bernard Goldstein, "The Destruction of the European Jews" by Raul Hilberg, and others.

The story of that event and a brief discussion of its significance for us today will be presented by Dr. Wikler, a Psychiatrist with the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital and a prominent member of our congregation and community, during the Memorial Services for the Jewish martyrs on Friday, April 19, at 8:00 P. M.

An Appeal to the Conscience of the American People

From the National Conference on Religion and Race

WE HAVE MET as members of the great Jewish and Christian faiths held by the majority of the American people, to counsel together concerning the tragic fact of racial prejudice, discrimination and segregation in our society. Coming as we do out of various religious backgrounds, each of us has more to say than can be said here. But this statement is what we as religious people are moved to say together.

I

RACISM is our most serious domestic evil. We must eradicate it with all diligence and speed. For this purpose we appeal to the con-

science of the American people.

This evil has deep roots; it will not be easily eradicated. While the Declaration of Independence did declare "that all men are created equal" and "are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights," slavery was permitted for almost a century. Even after the Emancipation Proclamation, compulsory racial segregation and its degrading badge of racial inequality received judicial sanction until our own time.

We rejoice in such recent evidences of greater wisdom and courage in our national life as the Supreme Court decisions against segregation and the heroic, non-violent protests of thousands of Americans. However, we mourn the fact that patterns of segregation remain entrenched everywhere—North and South, East and West. The spirit and the letter of our laws are mocked and violated.

Our primary concern is for the laws of God. We Americans of all religious faiths have been slow to recognize that racial discrimination and segregation are an insult to God, the Giver of human dignity and human rights. Even worse, we all have participated in perpetuating racial discrimination and segregation in civil, political, industrial, social and private life. And worse still, in our houses of worship, our religious schools, hospitals, welfare institutions and fraternal organizations we have often failed our own religious commitments. With a few exceptions we have evaded the mandates and rejected the promises of the faiths we represent.

We repent our failures and ask the forgiveness of God. We ask also the forgiveness of our brothers, whose rights we have ignored and whose dignity we have offended. We call for a renewed religious conscience on this basically moral evil.

OUR APPEAL to the American people is this:

SEEK a reign of justice in which voting rights and equal protection of the law will everywhere be enjoyed; public facilities and private ones serving a public purpose will be accessible to all; equal education and cultural opportunities, hiring and promotion, medical and hospital care, open occupancy in housing will be available to all.

SEEK a reign of love in which the wounds of past injustices will not be used as excuses for new ones; racial barriers will be eliminated; the stranger will be sought and welcomed; any man will be received as brother—his rights, your rights; his pain, your pain; his prison, your prison.

SEEK a reign of courage in which the people of God will make their faith their binding commitment; in which men willingly suffer for justice and love; in which churches and synagogues lead, not follow.

SEEK a reign of prayer in which God is praised and worshipped as the Lord of the universe, before Whom all racial idols fall, Who makes us one family and to Whom we are all responsible.

In making this appeal we affirm our common religious commitment to the essential dignity and equality of all men under God. We dedicate ourselves to work together to make this commitment a vital factor in our total life.

We call upon all the American people to work, to pray and to act courageously in the cause of human equality and dignity while there is still time, to eliminate racism permanently and decisively, to seize the historic opportunity the Lord has given us for healing an ancient rupture in the human family, to do this for the glory of God.



SCHOOL AND HOME

It would be a waste of time and money to send your child to a piano teacher and not require daily practice between lessons.

It is also a waste of time and money for children to be brought to a religious school, unless there is a daily practice of religion in the home. The lighting of candles and saying of Kiddush on Friday evenings is but one such practice. The decoration of the Succos table, the Seder service, the lighting of Hanukkah candles are but occasional observances that are "practicing Judaism".

Can we not practice Judaism daily? Should we not have a prayer before each meal? There are countless opportunities for the discussion of ethical problems that touch both the child's and the parent's life...problems of integrity, of compassion, of fair play that, in the warmth of the family circle, can build Jewish character. The child's religious lesson is not just another lesson to be learned; life can be lived without knowing the poetry of Tennyson, but life cannot be successfully lived without a knowledge of devotion to the Ten Commandments, the Twenty-Third Psalm, and preaching of Micah.

That our education is effective, let us "speak of it when we walk by the way, when we lie down and when we rise up" to the end that we and our children together may observe God's commandment and keep His laws.



On Sunday, May 5, at 2:00 P. M., the Temple Youth Group will conduct its monthly afternoon meeting and will feature as its activity of the day, annual elections. All TYG members are urged to attend this most important meeting in the Temple Vestry.

One of our new members came to me the other evening and told me how much he enjoys our services. He had gone to other synagogues spasmodically in the past, mostly on Yom Kippur. Since joining our Temple, he had come every Friday evening without fail. I asked him whether it was Reform Judaism or our particular approach to it, whether it was the sermon or the forum or the sociability afterwards, which caused his change in attendance. He replied that he liked all of these, but they did not constitute the major reasons. He then said something very significant (and I silently wished that other members could have heard him when he verbalized his feelings): "I derive benefit and satisfaction from the services because of what I myself bring to them. When I come, I come ready to be inspired by prayers and music, ready to be instructed, ready to feel the quiet and the meaning of the Sabbath. In all due respect to you, the Rabbi, the Cantor, the prayerbook and the people present, it is I who constitutes the key to the entire process. I expect to enjoy services, therefore, I enjoy them!"

Here indeed is a much-needed lesson. The congregant at services must not be a passive receptacle or a funnel through whom words and music pass like a sieve. He must be active, even though he may say very little. He must listen, concentrate, be sympathetic and reverent. He must participate and pay as little attention as possible to the mundane things about him. To a measure, he must shut them out. Above all, into all the elements of the service - prayer, song, Torah, sermon - he must invest part of himself.

Do you want to enjoy services? Then come not to be convinced nor be "sold." It simply will not happen, for no one can wave a magic wand which will cast a mystic spell over you. Come ready to leave part of yourself; come to give, and you are bound to receive. As is true with so much else in life, "according to the effort is the reward."



"WHO SPEAKS FOR JUDAISM?"

(From a sermon preached by Rabbi Robert A. Rothman on Interfaith Sabbath, Friday, April 26, 1963).

I am privileged to represent Judaism on many campuses and before various church and civic groups. Each is interested in a broader understanding of its neighbors and the world around them. On every occasion, I try to permit some time for questions so that areas concerning these groups more deeply will be brought into the open and expressed.....perhaps even clarified.

Invariably, a question will be asked which begins something like: "What does the Jewish Church feel about....?" or "How do Jews feel about....?" The questions are usually penetrating and most interesting. But the premise by which they are asked is a fallacious one. The questions posed stem from a context often very foreign to Judaism.

NO MONOLITHIC STRUCTURE

There is no such thing as a Jewish Church. There is no such thing as all Jews believing in some point of view because a hierarchy hands down a decision and establishes an attitude. Judaism does not operate within the framework of some super power-structure that dictates policy and perspective. The Jewish congregations are independent and join together in a loose confederation that is not so much binding as it is helpful. This union of congregations serves as a clearing house for new ideas, for a pooling of various experiences, for guidance and assistance. All of which must be absorbed by the individual congregation which then establishes its own policy and means of implementation of that policy.

For example: The national organization encourages congregations affiliated with it to have some program of interfaith interest during the year. This is no mandate to us. It is just a helpful suggestion. This kind of suggestion appeals to us and so we have an interfaith program geared to what we feel are our needs. There is no rigid fashion in which this is to be implemented. This year we have invited foreign students to join with us in worship and discussion; another year, women's clubs are invited, and so on. We conduct this activity to suit our own desires and as we see fit. We are an independent congregation which joins voluntarily with other

congregations of similar interest without losing our freedom to operate and act. Judaism is not fashioned in a monolithic mold.

But certain beliefs are basic to Judaism: Much of what we hold as dear to us we possess in common with all Jews. Take the Synagogue, for example. Our Temple stands for three things: A house of worship, a house of study, and a house of gathering and assembly.

HOUSE OF PRAYER

As a house of prayer, Judaism believes in the importance of communal and personal prayer. Each Jew prays to God directly; there are no intermediaries in our religion. Prayer is the soul of man turning to God his Maker in a search for strength and purpose. Our God is one and alone, a Creator who infuses our lives with creativity. In praying to God, however, we do not believe that prayer will change things through God's intercession. Rather, we believe that prayer helps to change man and man changes things. Dr. Barnett Brickner, late Rabbi in Cleveland, Ohio, put it this way: "For me prayer has become meditation upon the best we know, communion with the noblest that we understand, and reaching out of what we are to what we yearn to be."

The Hebrew word for prayer can also mean "to think, to hope, to judge." Prayer is a means of thinking about our highest ideals; it serves as a reminder of the ethical goal of perfection towards which man should constantly be striving. Jewish prayer demands of man a personal inventory of religious conduct.

HOUSE OF STUDY

Judaism has always placed great emphasis on the ideal of study....learning has always been a vital part of our religion. There is a Rabbinic quip which says: "To be wealthy is a matter of luck, but to be ignorant is a sin." The center of our sanctuary is not some sacred object that is to be feared or kept in isolated holiness. It is our Torah....the Five Books of Moses....the first volumes of our Bible.

There is nothing that is a secret in Judaism. Nothing is hidden; all is open and available. All are encouraged to participate and share in its heritage. Learning is second only to prayer as a major part of Jewish activity. As a matter of fact, there is not one

Temple arm or organization in our congregation that has not conducted some study program for its members this past year. Learning in our congregation has not been limited only to Torah or Bible. We have studied post-Biblical Jewish literature, Jewish thought, customs and practices, holidays and festivals....we even had a study series of other religions. Maimonides summed up the Jewish position when he said, quoting from the Ethics of the Fathers: "Possibly you may say: When I shall have accumulated money, I shall resume my studies; when I shall have provided for my needs and have leisure from my affairs, I shall resume my studies. Should such a thought enter your mind, you will never win the crown of the Torah. 'Rather make the study of Torah your fixed occupation' and let your secular affairs engage you casually, and do not say: 'When I have leisure I shall study'; perhaps you may never have leisure!"

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

The Synagogue as a house of assembly grants us a much needed opportunity for fellowship....for joining together in friendship. It is within this third category that our Temple serves as a house of and for all people. Through Sabbath socials, meetings, holiday celebrations, the gathering of groups and arms of our Temple, through civic organizations using our facilities....through all of these and more our Temple truly fulfills its function as a place of gathering.

This concept of the Synagogue cuts through all three groups in Judaism. The Orthodox, who are most rigid and traditional in their beliefs, adhere to this view, as do the more liberal Reform and the in-between Conservative. The difference between the three groups lies in the implementation and practice of these ideals together with others.

JEWISH RELIGIOUS GROUPS

Orthodoxy is a more fundamental approach to Judaism which believes that the Bible was revealed and written by God. It is more resistant to change and less likely to introduce innovations either in worship or belief. Reform or liberal Judaism is less resistant to change and believes that the Bible was written by man through God's inspiration. It selects meaningful sections of the Bible and tends to by-pass parts that have no contemporary application or relevancy. Liberal Judaism will institute changes and reforms as times warrant. It tries to meet the needs of the day. Conservative Judaism rests in the middle with some congregations tending more toward the Orthodox and with others closer to Reform in both practice and belief.

NOT A RACE

While we may all believe more or less alike, Jews are not members of any one race. Judaism is not a racial designation. It is possible to convert into and out of Judaism, but one cannot convert into or out of being a negro or caucasian or oriental. As a matter of fact, there have been and still are Jews who are negroes, Jews who are oriental and Jews who are caucasians. The bulk of Jewry is composed of caucasians, but not all, and there is no restriction prohibiting the inclusion of others into the larger family of Jewry.

A racial designation implies a certain skin pigmentation, hair growth or bone structure. These qualifications do not apply to Jews. We are an historic people with a common national or tribal origin who have passed from that stage of nationality into a religious and cultural association. What unites us as Jews is either a religious affiliation or a cultural tie or both.

FREEDOM TO FIND GOD

Above all, Judiasm believes that every person has a right to draw closer to God in his own way. That while religion or religious belief may have greater meaning and value to one person, it may not necessarily serve another the same way. The road to heaven, the approach to God, must be individual and religions have no right to impose their beliefs upon others except where freely invited to impart them.

I must agree with Ghandi when he put it this way: "I believe in the absolute oneness of God and therefore to humanity. What though we may have many bodies, we have but one soul. The rays of the sun are many through refraction. But they have the same source. I cannot, therefore, detach myself from the wickedest soul nor may I be denied identity with the most virtuous. I am endeavoring to see God through service to humanity, for I know God is neither in heaven nor down below, but in everyone."

BASIC JEWISH PRINCIPLES

Our Judaism is the product of four thousand years and more of development. And we pride ourselves on its ongoing, continuous growth. It changes as times warrant and as sober judgment dictates, but its constancy, its bed-rock principles remain forever: One God, the brotherhood of man, ethical relationships and a mission to live the best possible life permitted, so that we can thereby justify the gift of life granted us and help to make this world a little better place for having been privileged to live in it.

SHEVUOS

Shevuos, the festival commemorating the end of the period of seven full weeks from Passover, will be celebrated by Jews throughout the world beginning at sundown, May 28th.

Shevuos, originally a harvest festival, recorded the time when, seven full weeks after the planting of the first grain, the first fruits of the field were harvested in Palestine and the choicest of these were taken, in a religious pilgrimage, to the Temple in Jerusalem where they were offered as a sacrifice to the Lord. Shevous was, and is today, one of the major festivals of the Jewish religious calendar.

In time, the agricultural nature of the day was pre-empted by a more spiritual meaning as it became identified with the time when, seven weeks after the Exodus from Egypt, the newly-freed Jewish people stood at the foot of Mount Sinai and received the Ten Commandments for themselves, their unborn generations, and for all mankind. Shevuos, originally known as "Chag Ha Bikkurim" the festival of the first fruits, became known as "Z'man Matan Torasenu" the time of the giving of the law.

In this spirit, Reform Judaism vested the holiday with even greater significance when, 150 years ago, it introduced into the observance of the festival the ceremony of Confirmation. At this ceremony Jewish youth of both sexes stand on the alters of their congregations before the Holy Ark and in formal ceremony are inducted as full members of the household of the Jewish People. The symbolism is rich in traditional meaning. These young people, the fruit of their parents' love, now receive the Torah for themselves and, as their forefathers at Sinai, in solemn vow pledge themselves to its ideals and to its preservation. Confirmation marks the successful completion of their required years of basic, formal religious education.

One of the main features of this holiday is the reading from the Book of Ruth in the synagogue. Ruth, originally a non-Jew from the land of Moab, voluntarily cast in her lot with the Jewish faith when her husband died. Eventually she re-marries Boaz, a kinsman of her deceased husband. So highly was she regarded that legend has it that the great King David was descended from this union.

The Book of Ruth is associated with Shevuos to remind us that just as the Torah is for all men, so God is a universal God, and Judaism is a universal faith for one and all. Any person, any group wishing to become Jewish may do so and are readily welcomed.

In an age of increasing democratization, this great message of the universality of God and the conviction that moral law is for all men has poignant significance.

- 1. If you arrive after the service has begun, do not walk down the aisle when the Congregation is standing. Remain standing in the rear until the Congregation is seated and then proceed to a seat.
- 2. Do not take back seats. Come forward.
- 3. When the organ music begins, the service has started. All Conversation should stop.
- 4. One greets friends in the Synagogue after the service, not before.
- 5. Sing out in congregational singing.
- 6. Extend a welcome hand to strangers; make them feel at home. Speak to them. No formal introductions are necessary. Besides, they may be your fellow-members whom you have not yet had an opportunity to meet.
- 7. It is courteous to wait until the service is entirely over before putting on your wraps. The Benediction is part of the service. Until the final "Amen", the service is not over.
- 8. The Rabbi usually stands at the door to greet the worshippers at the close of the service. Do not rush from the Temple without extending to him and receiving from him the warming courtesy of a greeting.
- 9. It is in accordance with the traditions of Jewish life that an engaged couple and their families attend the Sabbath service before the wedding day. The same rule applies to Bar Mitzvah boys and their families.

CONSECRATION SERVICE

It is a custom in most Religious Schools of Reform congregations to observe the Succos Season with a special consecration of children entering the Religious School for the first time. The Service will be held on Friday, October 4, at 7:30 P. M. in our Temple Sanctuary.

JEWISH FESTIVAL OF SUCCOS
BEGINS WEDNESDAY EVENING
OCTOBER 2

The Jewish Festival of Succos began a week-long observance on Wednesday Evening, October 2. The holiday, which during Biblical days marked the in gathering of the harvest, now symbolizes the giving of thanks for Divine gifts.

Succos means Booths and is symbolized by a temporary wooden structure, covered with greens, as well as fruits and vegetables of the season. Jews are enjoined to visit the Temple Succa, or to construct their own, as a remembrance of the time past when pilgrims to Jerusalem at this season of the year dwelled in booths.

Additional symbols are the Lulav and Essrog, the former a combination of branches of the willow, myrtle and palm and the latter a Citron. These too, are ritual reminders of the harvest season celebrated by the Jewish community of many hundreds of years ago whose primary occupation was agriculture.

Reform Temples have introduced the ceremony of Consecration, for children entering the Religious School for the first time. This rite takes place before the Holy Ark where each child, bearing a tiny Scroll of the Law, a Torah, receives a blessing from the Rabbi and is welcomed into the program of learning, which, according to Jewish tradition, never ends. The Consecration Service in our Temple will be held on Friday evening, October 4, at 7:30 P. M.

REVERANCE IN THE SYNAGOGUE

The spirit of holiness requires an attitude of reverance and silence. The time for fellowship and conversation is during the social hour on Sabbath Eve. Temple Mail July 19, 1963

Dear Congregation,

I have just returned from twelve of the most wonderful days of my life. The days, spent in Cleveland, Georgia, in a National Federation of Temple Youth Leadership Institute (NFTY) were filled from morning 'til night with discussions, programs, the most beautiful and meaningful creative services and a spirit of love. It was an atmosphere, to quote our dean - Rabbi Davis - where one could be unashamedly good and have the highest aspirations. The twelve days were the equivalent of twelve months in an average Temple Youth Group.

I want to thank you for this experience and for allowing me to represent our Temple in the national camp. I hope that I will live up to this honor and transmit the enthusiasm and inspiration to our TYG that I received. Thank you again.





'WHAT IS REQUIRED OF A REFORM JEW?'

Is is a common experience to meet Jews who justify their lack of observance on the grounds that "I'm Reform." Being a Reform Jew becomes not an affirmation, but an excuse.

Let us clear the record as to what a Reform Jew really is and really does. The first expectation is that Reform Jews will understand the essence of Judaism, that without ethics there can be no religion. Man's primary way of serving God is through righteousness. Reform Jews are expected to understand that religion is related to life and are expected to practice their religious ideals in every phase of their lives whether it is convenient or inconvenient; comfortable or uncomfortable. Reform Judaism reiterates that which has always been essential in Judaism, that ritual without ethics is profanation of God.

What then is the place of ritual? Reform Jews are expected to observe those rituals of Judaism which represent our ethical ideals, which link us with the Jewish past and present, which add beauty to our lives. Such rituals become a link with God. This means that Reform Jews fast on Yom Kippur, observe the Sabbath with prayer and with song, observe Holy Days in synagogue and home, not in a fearful and superstitious way, but with warmth and joy and love!

Reform Jews recognize the value and importance of religious institutions: they recognize

the need to restore the quality of sanctity to these institutions. They therefore support synagogues with their presence as well as with their substance. They support Jewish schools and the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. They seek to restore dignity and true piety to synagogue life: no selling of tickets, no "schnorring." They seek to restore the principle that Jews support religious institutions "according to their means."

Reform Jews participate in all phases of Jewish life. They support the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, the United Jewish Appeal and the variety of organizations through which the American Jewish community expresses itself. Reform Jews participate in the tasks of citizenship: the Community Chest, the hospital, the causes of peace and the United Nations.

Last, but by no means least, Reform Jews believe in Jewish education for themselves and for their children. They send their children to a Jewish school and take an interest in their learning. They read and study and strive to translate the Jewish tradition and experience into living terms.

Are you then a Reform Jew? Or, are you simply enrolled on the lists of a Reform congregation?

Being a Jew and being a Reform Jew requires practice and commitment, effort and expense—and it's worth it.



RUSSIAN JUDAISM BEING LIQUIDATED

Jews of the world, particularly of the United States, are becoming gravely concerned for the plight of their fellow Jews in Soviet Russia. Information from various sources indicates that a massive and systematic attempt to eliminate the religious and cultural heritage of Russian Jewry has been under way for some years.

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, one of America's most distinguished scholars, expressed his concern in a recent address to a gathering of Rabbis: "We are all involved in a great battle for equal rights being waged in our country, and rejoice in the fact that millions of Americans are wholeheartedly taking part in the effort to eliminate the inequities that result from prejudice and discrimination.

While this victorious drama has electrified all Americans, another drama is being enacted which, though agonizing and heart-rending, and perhaps more tragic than the story of the Negro people, is being ignored. I mean the plight of the Jews in Soviet Russia....

East-European Jewry vanished. Russian Jewry is the last remnant of a people destroyed in extermination camps, the last remnant of a spiritual glory that is no more. We ask for no privilege, all we demand is an end to the massive and systematic liquidation of a religious and cultural heritage of an entire community and equality with all other cultural and religious minorities. Let the 20th century not enter an annals of Jewish history as the century of physical and spiritual destruction:

Dear Friends,

People give to charity for many reasons: to stop being pestered, to gain community recognition, to take income tax deductions, to avoid being coerced, and to help others in need. The Central Kentucky-UJA-Federated drive seeks to raise funds mainly by appealing to the last form of motivation. More money might be obtained by allowing the 25 charitable organizations to solicit separately. Fundraisers know, for example, that a houseto-house canvas even for donations to the Aged Parents of Orphans would bring a dollar or two from most people. By rejecting such methods, we are appealing to you to shoulder your responsibilities in an adult manner.

An added fillip to this year's giving is that money raised above last year's total (\$36,000) and up to \$40,000 will go into a local fund for emergency family use and for a proposed Lexington Jewish Community Center. Additional money will be divided according to a 70% (UJA)-20% (Federated) - 10% (Local) formula. Although charity in Lexington may not begin at home, in a sense - it ends there:





TAKE A MOMENT

In the morning hours of a new day we take a moment to give thought to what this day may mean for us. What is a day in a person's life? Isn't it the most precious treasure that can be given to us? If we are denied this day in which to live, you know full well, all of our possessions would mean nothing, our fondest hopes and plans would be of no avail. First and foremost, therefore, is a gift of a new day, one more day of life.

Therefore, let us begin the day properly. Let us thank God for this won-derful gift. Let us resolve not to waste one hour of it. Let us resolve to share happiness with those who are closest to us - our family; our neighbors; our associates. This is the greater meaning of the verse we read in the Holy Bible: "So teach us to number our days that we may get us a heart of wisdom."

Excerpts from the Guiding Principles of Reform Iudaism

NATURE OF JUDAISM

Judaism is the historical religious experience of the Jewish people. Though growing out of Jewish life, its message is universal, aiming at the union and perfection of mankind under the sovereignity of God. Reform Judaism recognizes the principle of progressive development in religion and consciously applies this principle to spiritual as well as to cultural and social life.

COD

The heart of Judaism and its chief contribution to religion is the doctrine of the One, living God, who rules the world through law and love. In Him all existence has its creative source and mankind its ideal of conduct. Though transcending time and space, He is the indwelling Presence of the world. We worship Him as the Lord of the universe and as our merciful Father.

MAN

Judaism affirms that man is created in the Divine image. His spirit is immortal. He is an active co-worker with God. As a child of God, he is endowed with moral freedom and is charged with the responsibility of overcoming evil and striving after ideal ends.

TORAH

God reveals Himself not only in the majesty, beauty and orderliness of nature, but also in the vision and moral striving of the human spirit, Revelation is a continuous process, confined to no one group and to no one age. Yet the people of Israel, through its prophets and sages, achieved unique insight in the realm of religious truth. The Torah, both written and oral, enshrines Israel's ever-growing consciousness of God and of the moral law. It preserves the historical precedents, sanctions and norms of Jewish life, and seeks to mould it in the patterns of goodness and of holiness.

ETHICS AND RELIGION

In Judaism religion and morality blend into an indissoluble unity. Seeking God means to strive after holiness, righteousness and goodness. The love of God is incomplete without the love of one's fellowmen. Judaism emphasizes the kinship of the human race, the sanctity and worth of human life and personality and the right of the individual to freedom and to the pursuit of his chosen vocation. Justice to all, irrespective of race, sect or class is the inalienable right and the inescapable obligation of all. The state and organized government exist in order to further these ends.

THE RELIGIOUS LIFE

Jewish life is marked by consecration to these ideals of Judaism. It calls for faithful participation in the life of the Jewish community as it finds expression in home, synagogue and school and in all other agencies that enrich Jewish life and promote its welfare.





A CREDO OF REFORM JUDAISM

The basic principles of Reform Judaism are as follows:

ONE—Judaism is the historic religious experience of the Jewish people, the soul of which the people Israel is the body.

TWO—Judaism welcomes all truth, whether set down in script or deciphered from the data of science.

THREE—The heart of Judaism is the One Living God who rules the world by law and with love.

FOUR—Man is created in the Divine Image; immortal.

FIVE—God reveals Himself not only in the wonders of nature, but in a still greater wonder: the vision and mortal striving of man. Revelation goes constantly, and is not confined to one age or one group. The special insight of the Jewish people, through its prophets and sages, has been recorded in the Torah, which includes our Bible, its commentaries and Israel's vast religious literature up to the present hour.

SIX—Certain of the laws in the Torah have lost their force with the passing of the conditions which produced them.

SEVEN—Dwelling everywhere on earth, the Jewish people has been held together by common history, above all by the heritage of faith; it has lived through and for religion. The non-Jew, therefore, who accepts our faith may become a full member of the Jewish community.

EIGHT—In all lands, we Jews participate gladly in the duties and responsibilities of citizenship. At the same time, a powerful historic and spiritual bond links us to the Holy Land, and we are deeply intertwined with the upbuilding, security and future of the State of Israel, hallowed by memory and hope.

NINE—The Messianic dream of Judaism rests on the attainment of universal brotherhood, truth and peace—the Kingdom of God, in whose behalf mankind must labor and strive together.

TEN—The foundations of human conduct are love of God and culminates in love of man; the sanctity of human life, which abhors tyranny, man-made poverty and racial prejudice; and social justice, which, as the Hebrew prophets showed, issues from the will of God.

These 10 are the Liberal's definition of Judaism.

A WORSHIPFUL ATMOSPHERE

"I have always felt that the devotions in our synagogue were marked by a most decorous spirit, and I am sure that some who indulge in conversation before the commencement of the Service are unaware that others are being disturbed by it. These are precious moments of quiet meditation before the spoken prayers, and get us in a receptive mood for the Service itself.

"When a Rabbi was once asked: 'What do you do before you pray?' he answered, 'Before I pray, I pray that when I pray, I will pray with all my heart.'.... The right attitude, the proper frame of mind, is as indispensable to prayer as the prayer itself.

"We have the pleasant custom of greeting our friends after the Service - which is much to be encouraged; but the moments before the Service should be spent in silence, getting ourselves into a receptive, prayerful mood. We can all contribute to the dignity and impressiveness of our worship together."







#### A BOOK SPEAKS

We have long known that the American library as such has disappeared from the blue prints of the modern home. However, it came as a shock to note a recent Gallup poll which indicated that 12 per cent. of recently built homes lacked even a "built-in" book case. And we know what a built-in bookcase means today: three books standing up, two lying down—and a whole forest of grotesque glass animals, African tribal gods and peasant figurines.

There was a time, just a short generation or two ago, when a visitor in one's home would stop to scan his host's books, to glow over their titles, fondle a new volume. There was conversation about the merits of the classics and the new books just published. It helped to increase knowledge and the art of conversation—let alone the encouragement of study for study's sake.

Books have a soul of their own, and they speak a "language of their own." A good book—one that stimulates and teaches—can say: "By day and night I am ever at your side, waiting for you to listen to my voice. At an instant, I am ready to amuse, entertain and guide you. Between my covers you will find heartaches, passions, dreams, struggles and aspirations of mankind.

"I bring you laughter and tears, amusement and learning, gaiety and wisdom of the ages. Neither time nor space exist for me. The ancient past, the fleeting present, the marvels of the future—all are inscribed upon my pages. At your command, I transport you to great cities which time has destroyed, or project you into the vastness of the future. I am both the bright lamp of knowledge for the little child and the understanding companion of the aged.

"What men prize above all else is written with me. The ideas for which wise men risk their lives, the discoveries achieved by scientists with toil and years of struggle, the splendid lines written with heart's blood of unrecognized poets, the revelation of the prophets, all are of my vast treasures—waiting for you.

"And I am a reflection of the moods of men. Sometimes I endure for a century; again I may fade in a single year. Yet, though I live for generations or brighten but a tiny moment of time, I add value to the lives of all men. The keys of hope and curiosity and ambition unlock my vault—and all are welcome to the treasure within.

"Many have feared and hated, loved and honored me through the centuries. I have incited revolutions and shaken the foundations of societies. At times men have sought to destroy me "forever." They burned and degraded me—but all such efforts proved to be failures. I will not die; I will live in the minds and hearts of men.

"I am a book—your friend, guide, entertainer, counsellor—always your servant. I wait for and upon you. I am yours to command. I am waiting. How long? It is your decision. Don't wait too long."



HEBREW UNION COLLEGE STUDY PILGRIMAGES TO ISRAEL AND EUROPE

The Hebrew Union College Biblical and Archaeological School has announced two study pilgrimages to Israel and Europe. The Spring Study Pilgrimage will leave on March 22, 1964, and return on April 12, 1964. The group will visit Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, Haifa, Caesarea, Upper and Lower Galilee, Safed and Tiberias. Beersheba will be used as a base for several excursions to the Negev, including a tour guided by Dr. Nelson Glueck through the Nabatean-Byzantine ruins at Avdat. Plans also include a Passover Seder at the Jerusalem School of Archaeology. The group will leave Tel Aviv on April 9 for Athens. A threeday program has been scheduled for excursions and visits to historic sites in Athens, Thebes and Delphi.

The Summer Study Tour (July 1-August 1) will visit Jerusalem, Haifa, Tel Aviv, Caesarea, the Upper and Lower Galilee, and historic sites in the Negev. Dr. Nelson Glueck will guide the group through the Nabatean-Byzantine ruins. The group will proceed to Europe on July 18, to spend three days in Athens, "our days in Rome, three days in Copennagen, and three days in London. Sightseeing will include all the major points of interest in these cities.
