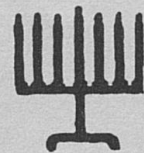
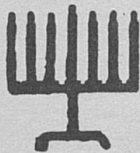

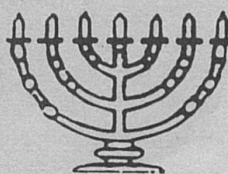

Prez Sez



In view of AP-UP-Wall Street Journal article on Negro-Jewish Relations, the following is quoted from a recent American Jewish Congress newsletter written by Mr. Arthur Goldberg:

"As I pointed out in my address to our Executive Board in Atlanta, the American Jewish Committee does not believe that manifestations of anti-Semitism on the part of black extremists are representative of the great body of the Negro community of the United States, any more than it believes that manifestations of anti-Semitism by white extremists are representative of the overwhelming majority of our white population. The fact that there have been such manifestations - among white and black extremists - should intensify rather than deter our efforts to bring justice and equality to all Americans, black and white. Our organization, founded on the concept that human relations is the keystone of a democracy, must not, whatever the provocation, relinquish its commitment to that ideal. And while we must not minimize the dangers inherent in any manifestation of anti-Semitism, we must be equally alert to the danger in exaggerating such manifestations when they occur.

For example, we have had a number of deplorable incidents of synagogue desecration in New York City during the past few weeks. These are monstrous acts deserving of every condemnation by decent human beings, Jewish or non-Jewish. But they do not, as a few Jewish spokesmen have stated, compare with that night in Hitler Germany when Jewish synagogues were burned down with the approval and under the sanction of the German authorities. The authorities in New York are doing everything within their power to find those responsible and bring them to punishment. And as a responsible organization - responsible to the American community and responsible to the Jewish community - we must remind our own Jewish citizens, when they over-react, of the vast difference between government-sanctioned intolerance and the wanton prejudice and hatred of lawbreaking individuals."

Rabbi's Message

Once again the situation in the Middle East seems to be reaching an explosive state. The incidents of violence and destruction are occurring with increasing frequency and the spectre of another war looms large. Such a possibility is most disheartening for us all.

But as I read of the events in that troubled part of the world, one of the things that strikes me is the double standard which is being applied to the nations involved. The destruction of Israeli life brings silence. The destruction of Arab property is decried. The attacks by Arab infiltrators and extremists against Israeli settlements bring silence. The reprisals by Israeli forces bring loud outcries. The reasons for this disparity are not hard to understand in the political arena.

On the other hand, the reactions of the official church groups to this situation are far more distressing, because they ought to be more attuned to the moral aspects of the conflict. Yet when the Pope sends his sympathy to the Lebanese and not to the Israelis, one can wonder about the impact of Christian ethics upon his own views; that the Council of Churches is silent because it considers this a political issue, begs the question. So was Hitler. To say that they do not wish to offend, means that they do not have the courage to offend some of their constituents.

Many times in our history, we Jews have had to face the forces of the world alone, without the support of those who were supposed to exhibit a moral concern for their fellowman. Let us hope that the current situation in the Middle East will not prove to be one more event in this unhappy necessity for us as Jews.

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MISSION: POSSIBLE

The initial step in the fulfillment of Israel's Mission as a people is the realization that it is a Mission which is possible. It is not "too hard for thee, neither is it far off. It is not in heaven...neither is it beyond the sea...It is in thy heart, that thou mayest do it." (Deut. 30:11-14).

The Mission of Israel does not propose inconceivable chores or improbable assignments. It does not suggest, for example, the conversion of the world to one Universal Jewish Faith. We do not pray in the climax of the Adoration, "On that day, all will be Jews". Rather we pray, "On that day, the Lord shall be one and His name one". If any conversion is to be done, it is to be the conversion of the world to God, not necessarily to Judaism.

The Mission of Israel is a possible one, for it entails the transmission of Jewish values, the sharing of Jewish ideas, the application and execution of Jewish affirmations in the world - affirmations which maintain that man is born with Original Virtue, not original sin; that for man to be saved, society must be saved; that the deed, not the creed, is primary. These are truths which are thrilling and invigorating, and these truths, because of their appeal, make the Mission possible and attainable.

Let us not pray for a task equal to our power, but for a power equal to our task, the task of fulfilling the Mission of Israel. And may it be said of us as Emerson described another: "I do not hear what you are saying because what you are speaks so loudly."

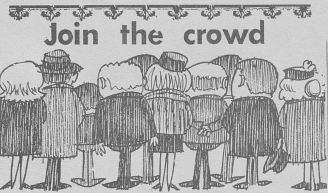

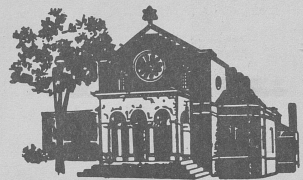

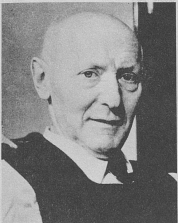

And we also plan on incorporating into the service music from the Abraham Masic Library, a collection which continues to grow and which is receiving increasing use within our congregation.

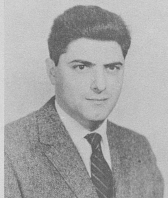
I know that March 28 seems a long way off, but if we are to plan congregational events properly, we must start early. You start early also. Mark your calendar for this special worship service.

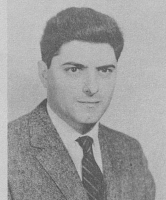
D'nai B'rith

RABBI JAKOB J. PETUCHOWSKI TO SPEAK

Rabbi Jakob J. Petuchowski, Professor of Rabbinics and Jewish Theology at the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati will be with us on Friday, February 28. Rabbi Petuchowski holds a BA in Psychology from the University of London and was ordained at the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati. He is the author of the book "Ever Since Sinai" and of a forthcoming book on the Reform Jewish Liturgy. In addition, Rabbi Petuchowski was the first director of Jewish studies of the HUC Biblical and Archeological School in Jerusalem, Israel.

Rabbi Petuchowski will speak to the Confirmation Class at 4:30 from the subject, "There's More Than One Way To Read The Bible" and at 8:30 he will address the adult congregation, his subject being, "The Dynamics Of Prayer Book Reform."



At a quick glance, one might say that we Jews have some rather unusual holidays, and perhaps one of the most unusual is Tu B'Shevat, the New Year of the trees, which occurs this year on February 3. It is not a Biblical holiday, but comes from the early period of the rabbis. We know nothing of its origin except that perhaps it was a set time when our ancestors would go out into the countryside to plant trees.

The holiday has taken on new significance today with the need for reforestation in Israel. It is the time when young Israelis go out en masse into the barren, rolling hillsides and plant trees. In a land which is semi-arid, as Israel is, every tree is precious. They hold the water in the ground, they keep the soil in place and offer shade from the heat of the tropical sun. It is at this time also, that we Jews in this country generally contribute funds to support this worthy effort.

But as I think of it, even though we used to celebrate Arbor Day, Tu B'Shevat might also be a good holiday for us Americans to observe - though perhaps not in February.

Soil and water conservation are vital to our country too. This past week we have seen in California the damage which excess rain and inadequate soil cover can do to an area. We know of the need to reclaim the land decimated by strip mining. We see new subdivisions naked of trees. Just imagine how much more lovely and less susceptible to the ravages of nature America might be if as a nation we cared for our trees with the spirit of Tu B'Shevat.

Perhaps Tu B'Shevat is a minor holiday, but the concern for nature which it reflects is one which all peoples ought to exhibit.

Rabbi's Message

This Sabbath is Race Relations Sabbath, and as you can see from the cover of our bulletin, I shall be discussing the subject of Negro-Jewish relations from the pulpit. This new turn of events in intergroup relations is causing us to rethink many of our old attitudes, a process which often upsets people.

Enclosed in this issue of our Bulletin is an article by Robert Belfroner on the subject of stereotypes. We all have them. We think in categories and categories help make strange people and situations seem just a little less strange to us. Yet categories also have their shortcomings. They cause us to lump people together and overlook their individual traits and differences, they cause us to prejudge people - redheads have quick tempers, poor people are indolent, New Yorkers are loud.

As we celebrate Race Relations Sabbath, we ought to give thought to our own stereotypes - to the attitudes we have about other groups, to the words we use when we speak about other groups. We cannot prevent our stereotypes, many of them are necessary. But we also need to think whether we would like it if others categorized us using the stereotypes which we have of them. Stereotypes are a two-edged sword which have to be used with care.

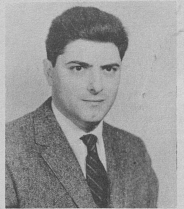

A couple of weeks ago, LARC, of which our congregation is a member, had a General Assembly meeting, at which time some of the accomplishments of LARC were reported and a few of the areas of our future concern were presented. Although the meeting lasted too long (few do not) it was an exciting evening. About 70 persons were present, representing religious groups of many sizes and persuasions, to discuss matters of mutual religious concern within Lexington - Child Day Care Centers, problems of housing for the poor, foreign students at UK, religious celebration of national events, inter-religious discussions - to cite only a few. Theological and doctrinal differences were of no concern to us. 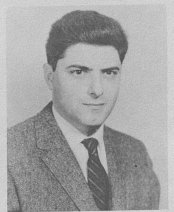

PURIM

The colorful Jewish Festival of Purim which recalls the ancient Biblical story of Queen Esther and her fight to save her people from Haman, the Persian tyrant, will be marked by Jews all over the world in religious services and ceremonies beginning at Sundown, March 3.

The one-day holiday contains a contemporary message universally echoed at this time - the dedication to assure religious freedom for all individuals.

The word "Purim" means "lots" and relates to the method devised by the Persian Prime Minister, Haman, to select the day on which the Jews would be destroyed. Queen Esther, the wife of King Ahasuerus, fought valiantly to save the Jews and rescind the evil deeds of Haman.

The legendary story of how Haman sought the genocide of his country's Jewish population is to be found in the Biblical book of Esther. Early in Jewish history this book was copied on the rolled scrolls called Megilloth. While other Biblical texts were similarly preserved, the reading of the Esther Megillah has always received special preeminence in the synagogal observance of the day.

Purim is a true holiday. The festival atmosphere predominates. As the scroll is read at the worship services, children and adults are encouraged to use noisemakers to blot out the sound of the name of the tyrannical Haman every time it is mentioned. Costume balls and parties are conducted in the religious schools and Purim plays are traditionally presented at this time.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This past week Lexington held its annual NCOJ Brotherhood Dinner. It was a grand affair (as it usually is) and many fine words were said - compliments, challenges, congratulations. The same evening, our congregation was host to the monthly Inter-Faith Dinner, and we received a very kind note from Carolyn Siegel who hosted it for us. The occasion of these two dinners bring to mind a number of thoughts which I should like to share with you.

There was discussion about having two conflicting "brotherhood" events on the same evening, one of them in our own Temple, and whether it might not be advisable to cancel or postpone the latter. After considering the matter at length, our decision was to go ahead with the dinner here. This was done for a number of reasons. Lexington is now certainly large enough to be able to have two different meetings on the same general subject on the same evening. Certainly none of us can be in more than one place at a time, but surely there ought to be enough people in Lexington interested in this vital subject to provide people to attend both functions.

Secondly, it was pointed out at the NCOJ Dinner that most of those present were over 40 - people who had "arrived" in life - who could afford the \$10.00 per couple for the evening (plus baby sitter.) Surely the preponderance of "over 40" people had some significance - perhaps the dinner was beyond the pocket book of younger people - or maybe the younger people, who tend to be more activist (as Dr. Moloney pointed out) are no longer attracted by this once a year room of comrades, at which so many people feel it socially proper to be seen, but who do nothing else for brotherhood during the remainder of the year.

Thirdly, I was a bit distressed by those in our congregation who were more concerned with "face" than with participation - that we should have representatives at the Inter Faith Dinner because we were hosts. Such sentiment is certainly admirable, but it is inadequate for this day, when concerned people want on-going participation and not mere courtesy.

Let us again offer to be hosts for this Inter-Faith Dinner at a time when there will be no conflict, but in the meantime, let us as a congregation - as Temple Adath Israel become involved in the many areas of social action within our community. This kind of concern does much more for brotherhood than attending a once a year dinner, or being a good host.

HADASSAH

LEXINGTON: NEW WAYS TO BEAT THE URBAN CRISIS

At Temple Adath Israel, 124 North Ashland Avenue on March 5, 1969 Wednesday evening at 8:00 P.M.

This program, sponsored by Hadassah, will be a forum moderated by Dr. Michael Adelman of the UK Dept. of English. There will be five participants, each of whom is directly involved in a unique project designed to assist a disadvantaged group in our community -- in the crucial areas of health, housing, education and employment. Each panelist will describe the project, discuss the community and individual needs which inspired it, its present status and future needs and goals.

The participants are: Dr. Joseph Engelberg, who will speak about a proposed neighborhood health center to serve inner city residents; Mr. Owen Cumback, who operates an on-the-job training program for the disadvantaged unemployed and underemployed under the sponsorship of GALE, Inc. and financed by the Labor Dept. Mrs. Carolyn Brodey, who launched NOW, Inc. Cooperative Kinder-

garten, to provide kindergarten experience for youngsters who do not qualify for Project Headstart; Mrs. Viola Brown, who started a Nurses' Aide training program and placement service; and Mrs. Alberta Coleman, board member of the Lexington-Fayette Housing Aid Corporation, a non-profit group formed to help low-income families become home owners.

FROM YOUR RABBI

Bar Mitzvah

About this time of year I begin to receive letters from Jewish high school students who are considering attending the University of Kentucky. Most of them have been accepted and are now in the process of weighing whether to come here or to go to another college which accepted them also. The usual questions which they ask in these letters are: "How many Jewish students are enrolled? What sort of Jewish life is there on campus and in Lexington?" And I try to answer them to the best of my information.

I also receive calls from members of the congregation, asking similar questions about colleges in other parts of the country - colleges that our young people are considering and about which they want specifically Jewish information. To help in this latter situation, we have in our Library a very fine book published by the B'nai B'rith Vocational Service entitled "College Guide for Jewish Youth." I would highly recommend it to you, if you are confronted with any questions about college for your child. It considers in detail how to choose a college, the cost of a college education and Jewish life on the campus. In addition, it has a very fine directory of selected colleges and universities across the country, listing the number of Jewish students on campus and whether there is any sort of Hillel organization available.

I am able to answer some of the questions I receive because of this book. I am certain it should be as useful to you, if you or your children are asking these questions also.

CURRENT ISSUES IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

"Denying a Bar Mitzvah"

Accredited schools, such as ours, establish and maintain standards in all areas of religious training. As a consequence, every year several boys do not become Bar Mitzvah in our Temple. There are others who have their Bar Mitzvah date suspended or postponed.

It should be pointed out, however, that every child who fulfills the basic requirements of our Religious School in accordance with his individual ability will certainly be Bar Mitzvah. Moreover, when circumstances legitimately warrant excusing students (e.g. "exceptional" children), an abundance of understanding and compassion will be immediately forthcoming.

Several typical reasons offered by parents seeking to excuse their sons from doing satisfactory work in Hebrew are: "I keep telling him that he should do his homework. But he doesn't want to listen to me." "Does it really matter if he doesn't pass Hebrew? I can assure you that he has a good Jewish heart." "He gets an unusual amount of homework from the Public School. And he must have some free time to relax."

Not long ago I met with a father who requested that his son be excused from attending the Religious School; at least he should not be expected to do his homework regularly. While I listed attentively, I was compelled to say that I had heard no valid argument why the boy should not be required to attend all classes regularly as well as do satisfactory work in all subjects. Thereupon I was asked: "Would you prevent my son from becoming Bar Mitzvah?" And my reply, politely but firmly expressed, was: "Never! But sometimes parents do if they are unwilling to utilize effective means to correct the learning situation." Finally, the father realized that a school has a right to regard certain regulations as indispensable for the proper religious training of its students.

Children of parents who understand and accept the goals of the Religious School learn to take attendance and home assignments in their stride. Then, too, parents do not question whether their sons will be Bar Mitzvah for they come to acknowledge that attendance at the Religious School at least until Confirmation is essential for a meaningful Jewish education.

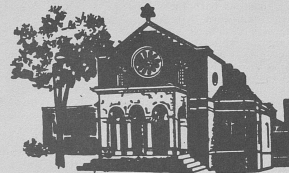

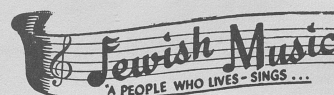

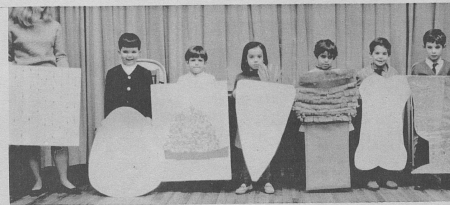


RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

3 tbsp. burghul	2 tbsp. flour
(cracked wheat)	dash of chili
2 cloves garlic	pepper
1 tsp. cumin	dash of coriander

Soak the chick-peas overnight and then grind through the meat chopper. Soak burghul one hour, then grind it. Mix with the remaining ingredients. Form into small balls and fry in very deep fat until golden brown. May be reheated. RABBI'S MESSAGE

Wednesday evening we shall sit down to Seder, in the midst of fellowship and cheer. It is the time of year when we are most aware of the warmth of family relationships and how much they really mean to us.

This sense of Jewish kinship was brought home to me recently when I had the occasion to meet and be with a "Hebrew-Christian", a young man who had suddenly "had the call" and "received Christ." His words, his attitudes reminded me so of the wicked son of the Seder, who asks what mean "ye" by this service. He had read himself out of Judaism. He had denied our lengthy history and traditions and accepted the Christian religion - as he saw it.

As I listened to his fanatical diatribe about us being "lost souls" and "damned", I thought of the wicked son, who had disassociated himself from his people. I thought also of those Jews who are "religious" in their non participation in Judaism - in worship, in education, in Tzedakah, in social concerns - in the wide gamut of things Jewish - and yet who still wish to retain their Jewish identification. While we cannot excommunicate this kind of Jew, how similar he has made himself to the "wicked son" about whom we shall read in the Haggadah. At least this "Hebrew-Christian" whom I met was more honest about it.

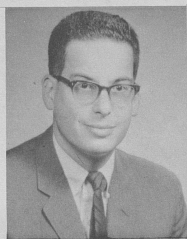

PASSOVER

At sundown, Wednesday, April 2nd, the oldest of the festivals will be celebrated. Passover is the holiday richest in symbolism and most intimately bound up with the nomadic origins of the Jewish people. Originally a spring festival, Passover became an historic and national holiday commemorating the deliverance of the Jewish people from their bondage in Egypt. Today, it symbolizes the hope for freedom and equality for all mankind.

We celebrate Passover with a ceremonial meal called the "Seder" (Order of Service) which is a home ceremony and which will also take place at our Temple on April 3rd. During the Seder, the story of the Exodus is recited, songs and prayers are performed, and the symbolic foods of Passover are eaten - the "matzos," the "bitter herbs," the roasted shank bone, and the "charose" - symbols of the Jewish flight from Egypt, the bitterness of the years of oppression, the emblem of the paschal lamb, and of the mortar which the Israel slaves used to make bricks. The four cups of wine which are taken by each person serve as a reminder that there is sweetness in the word of God and his teachings.

SISTERHOOD LUNCHEON RECIPE

The following is one of the recipes which was served to those persons who attended the Sisterhood Luncheon on Wednesday, March 19th. One of these recipes will be printed in the Bulletin weekly and by the way, they may be found in the Israeli Cook Book.

Israeli Fruit Soup

Suitable Israeli fruits for cooking in fruit soup: apples, quince, figs, grapes, strawberries, cherries, raspberries, peaches, or any dried fruits.

3 cups of any of the above fruits, Mixed, chopped
8 cups water
3 tbs. cornstarch
sugar to taste
3 cups orange juice
lemon juice to taste
chilled dry white wine, if desired

Boil together the fruits, water, and sugar (to taste, depending on the sweetness of the fruits used) until tender. Press through a sieve and return to the heat. Add the orange juice and lemon juice to taste. Dilute the cornstarch in a little water, add to the mixture, and bring to a boil. Cool, then chill. Serve very cold, with a sprig of fresh mint or a topping of sour cream, in each bowl or glass (this soup is often served as a refreshing porch beverage). Chilled wine can be added, to taste, if desired, at serving time. (Serves 6.)

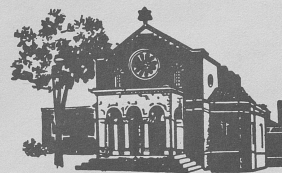

RABBI'S MESSAGE

As a rabbi, I find that I am invited to speak to many different kinds of groups, a situation which affords me an opportunity to get to know people with whom I would normally have no contact. As a result, I have developed a warm friendship with a young woman who is very active in our local Alcoholics Anonymous organization.

As with all members of AA, she readily admits her problem with drinking, which is necessary before anyone can conquer it's disease. But she is also a person who is extremely devoted to helping other alcoholics face their difficulties. And she was in to see me this past week to use the Yiddish dictionary in our library, because she has a Jewish alcoholic friend to whom she had to get through and thought a few words of Yiddish might be more successful than English.

We have spoken about the increasing number of Jewish alcoholics and the reasons for this. We have discussed the place of liquor in Traditional Judaism, our contempt for the drunk, as well as the need for a blessing before taking a drink, and that many of these former restraints are breaking down within the American Jewish Community. There seems to be little that can be done to stem the inroads of acculturation, though I think it is a pity we have to assimilate this less admirable aspect of it. But the next time you take a drink, at least be Jewish enough to say - *L'chayim - To Life!*

Her declaration led to a riot, in consequence of which a certain Moses the braider was imprisoned. After cruel torture, he was condemned to the stake by a court which had no real competence in such matters, without the privilege of appeal. With his last breath, he continued to proclaim his innocence, dying with the cry of Shema Yisroel on his lips. This event is still commemorated in one of the older synagogues of the city on the Hebrew anniversary (Adar 30, 1630) by fasting and the recitation of a special elegy.

Cold Macaroni, Hebrew Style

3 tbsp. olive oil	$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt
1 onion, Chopped	dash of pepper
1 bunch parsley, chopped fine	$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp basil
1 clove garlic	$\frac{1}{2}$ lb. macaroni (Capelletti)
6 large tomatoes	4 cups water
	1 tbsp tomato puree

Heat the oil and brown the onion, parsley, and garlic. Add the tomatoes, tomato puree, salt, and pepper. Simmer for about 1 hour. Add the basil and cook 10 minutes more. Boil the macaroni in 4 cups of water with a little salt. When tender but not too soft (8-9 mins.) Drain. Pour the sauce over the noodles, and when the dish has cooled, serve. You can also eat it hot. (Serves 4 - 6)

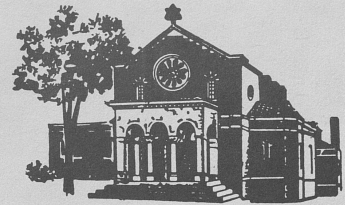

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

A couple of weeks ago I made arrangements out at NARCO to take our Youth Group out there to discuss the subjects of drug abuse with some of the Jewish patients at the hospital. It was the first time that this sort of program had been planned and I had some doubts as to what might occur.

But the results were really rewarding. Our Youth Group members really asked some incisive questions about the behavior and the attitudes which brought the patients to the hospital. And the patients, in their turn, explained the experiences which they had as addicts and which they hoped to overcome.

The problem of addiction today is one of our more "glamorous" social problems. A great deal of publicity is being given it. But much of it is either "thrill" or of a "scare" nature. The session at the hospital had neither aspect, but provided our young people with a very sobering appreciation of the damage which drug abuse can do to people's lives - people who are very much like themselves in so many ways. This sort of program should be available to more of our young people today.

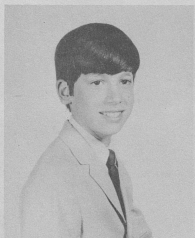
RABBI'S MESSAGE

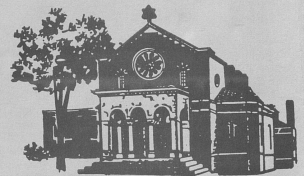

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

As you will notice elsewhere in this issue of the Temple Bulletin, LARC, of which we are members is sponsoring its first community forum on Monday evening, May 12, at 8 P.M. at Henry Clay High School.

I am fully aware that a discussion on this subject can arouse a wide array of emotions - anger, protest, patriotism - to name but a few. At the same time we have become more and more aware of new moral problems which military combat present to us. Our involvement no longer requires an act of Congress. We are presently fighting a war which has never been officially declared such and our casualties are high. We are asking our young men to fight yet many of them do not understand why and cannot understand. It is their lives, as much as their country's action which they are questioning. To seek answers, they need information.

I was involved in some of the discussions which occurred as this program was being planned and was very much concerned that it be a well balanced presentation. I think it is, with each of the discussants presenting a different aspect of the subject, a subject vital to our young men today (as well as their parents) and one which needs to be considered in depth by all of us. If you have questions or a concern for this aspect of our nation's behavior, I urge you to attend this worthwhile discussion.

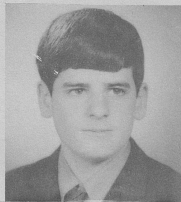

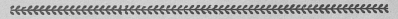

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT.....

What tremendous power the press has over our lives today! At the recent convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis held in Houston, certainly a variety of subjects were considered including their power to greatly influence the UAHC and their convention but what particularly interested me were the subjects the various newspapers around the country picked up for publication and reading by their subscribers.

For example, while our Lexington Leader on Wednesday was publishing complaints by 3 rabbis on ill-thought statements by the Pope on Jewish-Catholic understanding and lack of verbal support on the Israeli-Arab War, the New York Post was quoting Arthur Goldberg at the same meeting berating a previous speaker for saying "there is too much emphasis on the individual for the American Jewish Committee." Goldberg departed from his text to defend the Supreme Court not as "a defender of the criminal as the press has often said" but as a protector of the autonomy of the individual in keeping his wires from being tapped and his bedroom from being invaded. The Courier Journal a day later published statements by a leading rabbi calling our temples "Fat Cat Temples, with only 4% of our congregants engaged regularly in prayer and berating the rabbis for self-hypnosis of the pulpit. A two year study by specialists was to be instigated.

Truly the inner working of most organization does not make for good reading for the general public, particularly when the choice of what is printed is often left up to young adult press workers with relatively little experience.

Despite its failings, our system of freedom of the press is still far better than the controlled press of many other nations which permits the reader to know only what the government wishes him to know. Between them, I'll take our way and put up with its shortcomings.

Billy Graham Confers With Jewish Leaders....Religious News Service

New York (RNS) -- An American Jewish Committee official praised evangelist Billy Graham for breaking down stereotypes about Baptist insensitivity to social concerns.

Rabbi Marc Tanenbaum, director of the Jewish Committee's department of interreligious affairs, confirmed that the Baptist preacher had met with about 30 Jewish religious and community leaders after the evangelist mentioned the meeting in a press conference marking the end of a 10-day crusade here.

The meeting, it was explained, grew out of planning for a National Baptist-Jewish Scholars Conference scheduled Aug. 18-20 at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky. That meeting will be sponsored by the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board and the American Jewish Committee's inter-religious affairs unit.

Rabbi Tanenbaum said that in his introduction of Mr. Graham to the Jewish group he had said he was "greatly impressed by the sensitivity and concern that Mr. Graham expressed for social justice and for commitment to confront such basic issues as racial injustice poverty, war and the generation gap."

"Anyone who knows the classical Baptist heritage which emphasized individual piety and personal salvation," remarked the rabbi, "has carried around an image that certain versions of the Baptist tradition were rather insensitive to social or group concerns."

My impression is that Mr. Graham, during his recent sermons, has helped to remove that caricature, and has demonstrated that personal religion can express itself in a very genuine concern for group morality and group justice."

SISTERHOOD LUNCHEON September 17, 1969

MENU

Prepared by Mrs. Robert E. Lee (Yvonne), assisted by the ladies of Sisterhood, according to recipes used by the Jewish Community in South Central Morocco in the cities of Ait Hakim, Marrakesh, and Casablanca, Yvonne's native habitat. This menu is popular among the Sephardin (Spanish and North African Jews) in Israel.

MOROCCAN SALAD, made of fried green peppers and tomatoes with a dressing made of lemon juice, crushed garlic, oil, salt and pepper. This salad is almost always a standard dish enjoyed by Sephardic Jews of Morocco and Israel. It is simply called "salada."

MECHOUI, fresh leg of lamb, barbecued over charcoal fire completely enclosed for maximum penetration of wet smoke, basted with cumin and lemon juice. Mechoui is a delicacy among the Sephardim.

COUS-COUS, a bed of Farina (similar to Cream of Wheat) covered with soft vegetables cooked with beef and beef marrow bones. The farina is steamed over the meat and vegetables. The stock is flavored with salt pepper, parsley, celery, and bouillon. Cous-cous is of ancient North African origin enjoyed by both the Arab and the Jew. The word cous-cous is Arabic and means "pecked at," a food that one can scarcely keep one's fingers off.

FRUIT COMPOTE, "fruits," consists of fresh fruits cut into small pieces and allowed to marinate in their own juices. Coconut and raisins are added.

MINT TEA, "stay l'minta" fresh mint, loose tea, and lots of sugar covered with boiling water. Israel's secret weapon - Arabs enjoy it so much they have little time left, nor desire, to fight.

WARNING!!

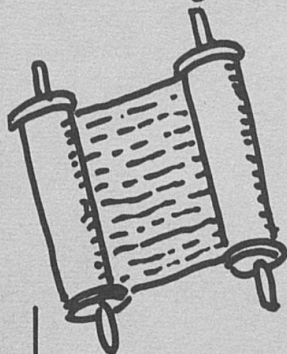

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This coming Sabbath is Simchat Torah, the Sabbath on which we conclude our reading from the Book of Deuteronomy and begin again with the story of creation in Genesis. In doing so we read of both death and birth - of Moses death on Mt. Nebo and of the creation of life on earth. The full cycle of human existence is epitomized in these two Torah portions.

It is also the Sabbath on which we consecrate the new youngsters in our Religious School - a happy and significant occasion for them and for their parents, for it represents the start of still another generation of Jewish children who will be learning the lessons of our religion.

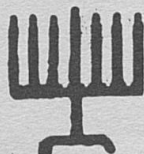

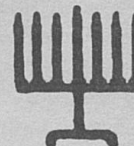

From the Rabbi's Study

After a number of years of teaching and working with Religious Schools, I have begun to realize the increasing number of gaps which we have in our program. There are aspects of Judaism which our students just do not encounter - either because these things just never happen to come up in the conversation, or because the subject is beyond the intellectual level of the students, or because we do not have adequate time on a Sunday morning to go into some of the details involved, or because we lack adequate materials to present the subject. Whatever the reason, the gaps are there and every year we try to fill a few of them as we consider the changes we want to make in the curriculum.

One of the gaps which I realized a number of years ago was that our children studied Bible stories and Bible heroes, but during the course of their Religious School education, they never really studied the Bible itself. To overcome this we did two things. We instituted a course on the Bible itself in the Third Grade, and the children purchase this book and use it as their text.

But a one year course at the intermediate level is hardly enough to bring about any familiarity with the Bible and what it has to say. Therefore we also instituted Bible readings, passages which are read by the entire school week by week. These passages are then discussed for the lesson or message they have for us - both in class and again in our worship service. The Bible is a living book. Our children deserve to know it, and these weekly Bible readings are intended to bring home to them the current relevancy of this great literary work.

For this week's passage, I suggest that you read the Religious School column and then look up the verse in your own Bible. We shall discuss it this Sunday.

October 31 through November 30 is Jewish Book Month and therefore we are enclosing in this issue of the Temple Bulletin a book mark advertising this event.

Books are important to us as Jews. The greatest book in the world is our Bible. And our Jewish tradition is built on knowledge - knowledge written down in the books of our religious tradition. 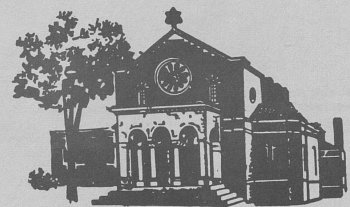

Sermon - The Search

RABBI'S MESSAGE

The recent national Moratorium and the reaction to it from different quarters points out a serious malaise of the soul which we are presently facing - the war in Vietnam and its meaning for us as a nation - for the war has been disruptive of our national unity in a way in which few of us have previously known. As I look at this situation, I find two significant points I should like to share with you.

The first is that unlike any other conflict in the memory of those alive today, we lack the one, single, unifying incident which united our country in its previous war efforts and provided the rationale for fighting. Our present conflict just "grewed" and so rather than being able to hide behind a slogan, we find people who are asking - Why war? What does it accomplish? The questions are new for us. The answers are agonizing - because in all honesty, we cannot say that war really settles the issues. If it did, we would not continue having them.

And secondly, we Americans have been criticizing Federal domestic policies for years, but have felt it patriotic not to criticize foreign military policies. But today the immunity of our military efforts to criticism is being openly challenged and we are being confronted by young people who feel no less patriotic when they challenge our efforts in Vietnam than you or I do when we criticize a domestic boondoggle. Thus we are being forced to reconsider what the word "patriotic" means. Is it any more "patriotic" to fight in Vietnam or to teach in a ghetto school? Is it any less patriotic to condemn our government for the waste of tax dollars on a domestic farm policy than to decry the loss of American lives in a seemingly endless and purposeless struggle in Southeast Asia? To confront these questions is neither easy nor pleasant. But our present situation is forcing us to do so.

Hopefully, the American people will be mature enough to consider these challenging questions with honesty and reason, so that we may recover from our current malaise and be restored to health as a unified nation with a positive purpose for existing.

This past week I was in Miami each for the 50th Biennial Assembly of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. Perhaps you read reports of this meeting in the local press, but unfortunately these articles often omit the full scope of the discussions and report only on the more dramatic events that occur.

But it is not the dramatic events that make such a meeting really exciting to attend. Rather it is other things which combine to leave the impressions - the drums at which issues of concern are discussed by knowledgeable persons and questions are asked by interested delegates - Forums on theology, on the generation gap, on religious education, on the role of the synagogue; the informal discussions with delegates from other parts of our country, the opportunity to exchange ideas on problems of mutual concern and to learn what other congregations are attempting to do; the Plenary Sessions in which debate occurs on UAHC policy and program; the opportunity to renew old friendships and to meet persons we met at a previous biennial.

And now the Biennial is over and resides in my memory. But the decisions made there will affect us in different ways. In the coming months we shall print in the bulletin some of the resolutions which were adopted, so that you may know of them and consider them within our congregational family.

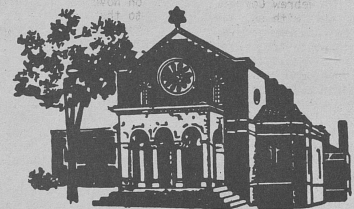

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This coming Friday evening, Rabbi Robert Blinder, the director of the Ohio Valley Council of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, will be here with us. Rabbi Blinder most recently served Congregation B'nai Israel in Galveston, Texas before becoming director of our Region, this past summer. 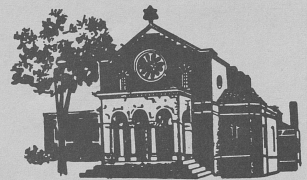

**A MESSAGE
FROM THE
RABBI**

Elsewhere in this issue of the Temple Bulletin you will see the pleas to help the two Israeli passengers on the TWA plane which was recently sent out by Hadassah. This sort of concern is very much in the highest spirit of our religion, for from the earliest of times, we Jews have always been concerned for our fellow Jews who have been imprisoned or enslaved and we have gone to great lengths to redeem them in whatever way possible. One finds examples of this kind of Mitzvah in the Bible with Abraham and Lot, in ancient times under Roman rule when Jews purchased the freedom of captured fellow Jews in the Middle Ages with the attempt to pay ransom for Rabbi Meir of Rothenburg, and in modern times with Youth Aliyah and the tremendous efforts to save you Jews from the grips of the Nazis. Thus this plea is within the finest of Jewish traditions.

On the other hand, if we limit our concern only to the welfare of downtrodden Jews, then our concern is not particularly praiseworthy, but is only enlightened self interest. The same sort of concern should be manifest for any person or group that is oppressed, imprisoned, or enslaved by life. This point was well illustrated in an article by Edward Ginsberg of Cleveland in the recent issue of the magazine, Dimensions, in which he discussed the relationship between the Crystal Night destruction of synagogues on November 9, 1938 and the recent reaction of French students to the French Government's treatment of Daniel Cohn-Benedict, when the students chanted: "We are all German Jews, we are all German Jews."

"But Jews responding to other Jews is not enough. Christians and Jews and blacks and whites and Orientals and Occidentals are all members of the human race and we must all respond to each other. We must all realize that so long as machinery governs morality and we are indifferent, we participate in the act of victimizing ourselves. This is the lesson of Crystal Night, and because we have not learned it yet, it is still Crystal Night."

"But I think that our children have learned it. I think that they will control the machinery of destruction which we build and which now controls us."

"Those students who chanted "we are all German Jews" have learned it. The kids who are engaging actively in the political process are learning it."

"And because of them I believe that we will one day emerge from this dark and demonic Crystal Night of our soul."

The following report of the Sisterhood House Committee Chairman is quoted, in part, for the general information of the Congregation:

"I'm afraid, as indicated by recent events, that members of the various organizations using the Temple still do not realize their responsibilities in regard to use of the Temple kitchen and when and what to pay the janitor. Richard must have help in the kitchen, the number of helpers determined by the following formula:

20 to 30 people - 1 helper in addition to janitor
31 to 60 people - 2 helpers in addition to janitor
over 60 people - 3 helpers at the least in addition to janitor

At the time the new rules were written for the Temple the minimum hourly wages set by law was \$1.40 per hour. It has since been advanced to \$1.60, so I believe this would be the appropriate pay for the janitor although it has become customary to give him \$5.00 or \$10.00 according to the hours involved. However, as you know, Richard has a heart condition, so it seems inhuman not to have adequate assistance present whenever the work is heavy or the hours long, regardless of the pay. I know that people ask Richard to obtain helpers and he sometimes says that he will. But often he cannot find anyone and is left with no help. To avoid this it must be the responsibility of the luncheon or dinner chairman to provide the workers or the proper assistants from among the committee or membership. This does not exempt any organization from the same responsibility. And these persons should remain until all dishes are washed, dried and put away. Most people simply clear the tables and feel that is the end of their responsibilities. I am sorry that it cannot be. It seems to me that these social functions will have to end if folks are unwilling to pitch in to help when paid assistance has not been provided.

HANUKKAH HOME SERVICES - On the first night of Hanukkah, at dusk, place one candle at extreme right of the Hanukkah lamp. In your hand you hold the lighted "shamos" or kindling candle. The father usually conducts this ceremony, but the honor may be given to others as the family wishes. All are gathered near the lamp. On each of the eight nights at dusk, before dinner is served, this ceremony takes place. On the first night one candle plus the shamos candle, and so on until the eighth night when there are eight candles plus the "shamos" candle. There is usually a special niche in the center of the Menorah in which the lighted "shamos" candle is placed after kindling the other candles.

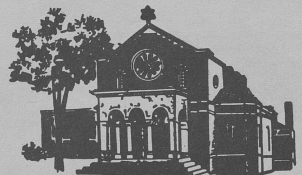

Sermon - At a Season of Joy - Sadness

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

We are in the midst of our Hanukkah celebrations when we light our candles, spin our dreidels, eat our latkes and give presents to our children. All of this activity is in sharp contrast with the events which this holiday marks - the struggle which the Maccabees of old had to overcome the might of the Syrians and to affirm their right to worship God and not the pagan idols to which Antiochus would have had us bow down.

The contrast is even more marked when one considers how lightly we get the persecutions of Judaism by the church during the Middle Ages. How easily we overlook the death struggles of the Jewish community of Soviet Russia today and the religious oppression with which they have to live every day. How blithely we fail to recall the real fight which was necessary in the early days of our own nation for Jews to be elected and hold office in North Carolina, Maryland, or New Hampshire. And the controversy over prayers and Bible readings in the public schools is still being waged, despite the Supreme Court decision on the matter. The freedom to worship God is never secure. Let us be reminded by our Hanukkah lights.

And the pagan idols! These too still are found. We bow down to all sorts of idols - fame and fortune, movie and singing stars, the latest fashions and fads, nationalism and power. The worship of false gods is not yet relegated to the past. It continues to plague us and we are easily swayed to make the transitory into a deity, to consider the works of our hands all powerful and to bow our head and bend our knee to them. The Syrian attempts to paganize us as Jews was only one episode in a long history of attempted paganizations. It has not ceased. May our candles remind us of this struggle also.

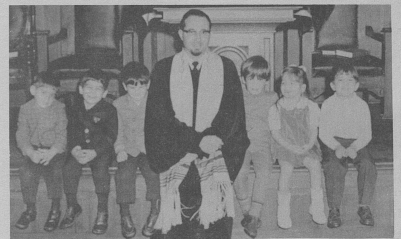

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

One of the parts of our Temple Library is the Celia F. Abraham Music Library - a collection of records and listening equipment originally started by Adolph Abraham more than four years ago and which has been growing ever since. Originally the collection included two stereo sets and a tape recorder, in addition to the recordings - and the facilities of the library were generally restricted to use in the Temple building.

However, within the past six months this Library has been expanded. I have been taping each of the records in this collection on cassette tapes. Jim Elias has been cataloging them for us, and they are now ready to be loaned out to the congregation with a cassette play back machine, in the same way that one might check out a book from the Library.

I am just delighted with this new service which we can provide the members of the congregation. Jewish music is wide and varied. There is more and more that is being reproduced for us. And it is a facet of our religion which everyone can enjoy, and now in his own living room. Come into the Library and check out some tapes. The machines are battery operated and easy to use. I am sure that you will be pleased with the variety and scope of the Abraham Music Collection which we now have available for you.

A most impressive museum collection in a most impressive book!



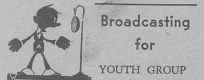

MR. LAWRENCE GICHNER TO SPEAK
JANUARY 16, 1969

Mr. Lawrence Gichner, of Washington, D.C. will present an illustrated talk to the congregation after our worship on January 16th. His topic will be "These Are Our People - The Story of the Jew in America." Mr. Gichner started as a youngster to hitch-hike with a knapsack on his back and a camera in his hand about the United States to learn what this country and its people were like. Today he searches the dust laden attics of the world's out of the way places for art objects, old maps and rare books which he brings back for the Library of Congress, the Smithsonian Institute and other leading museums in America.

Combining pleasure with more pleasure, he records wherever he goes the activities of the Jewish people with his ever-ready camera. A constantly increasing circle of eager audiences await the report of each new exploit.

His presentations are warm, intimate and exceedingly informative. They are full of surprises and fiery inspiration.

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FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Earlier this month the Roman Catholic Church issued a document on Roman Catholic-Jewish relations. Exerpts of it have appeared in print and it has begun to cause comment in many religious circles. The document is most significant, because it is really the first time that the Church has openly acknowledged that "the history of Judaism does not end with the destruction of Jerusalem" in 70 CE, and that in interreligious discussions between Christian and Jew, "all intent of proselytizing and conversion (should be) excluded." However, this is a good deal of distance between the issuance of a document by the Church and the implementing of it in the local parish. What will occur at the latter level remains to be seen.

I believe that this document is a direct result of the rupture in inter-religious dialogue which occurred as a result of the Six Day War in 1967, when the organized Churches equivocated, while we very strongly supported Israel. The Jewish leaders who had participated in the dialogues were furious at the Church reactions and felt that from our standpoint, the dialogues had been of little value and the Church leaders had as little understanding of Judaism as ever. The Church leaders, on the other hand, were distressed at our anger, and in good conscience began to try to figure out why. Hopefully, this Church document is one of the fruits of this effort. If so, we should all be delighted that great inter-religious understanding is beginning to occur.

However, on the other hand, I find the document a real challenge both to us and to Christians, for it invites us all to enter into conversation with each other. "A true dialogue must now be established. The condition of dialogue is respect for the other as he is, for his faith and his religious convictions." Such encounters sound great, but I see a major pitfall. So few Jews and so few Christians really know anything about their own religions, that we may just end up with ignorance talking to ignorance - which would in effect be futile. Our real challenge, then, is that each group educate its own adherents, so that the dialogue may proceed, not only with "mutual esteem," but with knowledgeable laymen participating on both sides.
