

Rabbi's Message

I recently participated in the brief ceremony of affixing a Mezzuzah on the doorpost of a new home of a member of our congregation. It was a most heart-warming and meaningful occasion. The young family had only recently moved into the house and the glow of its newness for them was evident in many ways. And part of the excitement of this new venture for them was the placing of this small symbol on the entry to their home.

The ceremony for putting up a Mezzuzah is a brief one, but its symbolism is evident. It is the first sign that one encounters as he enters that this is a Jewish home, that the sanctity of family life which our religion teaches is to be found herein, that that involvement and participation in Judaism is part of this family's way of living, that God is reflected in their personal lives.

We have a tendency today to down grade rituals and symbols in religion and to overlook the symbolic meaning they ought to have for us. A little metal capsule with a Biblical verse in it can mean very little - or it can indicate a great deal; we can poo-poo it as a silly superstition, or we can permit it to be a constant reminder of the ideals which are part of the brief prayer which is said when we affix it - "Praised be Thou, O Lord, Our God, king of the Universe, who has sanctified us by His commandment and bidden us affix the Mezzuzah." "How many of us, with Mezzuzahs on our doors, have a sense of sanctity within our homes? How many of us are reminded of the meaning of this symbol each time we enter or leave our homes? We ought to give this ever-present symbol some thought each time we pass it.

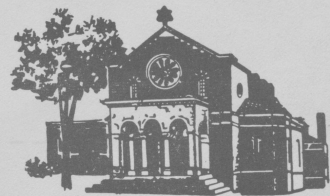

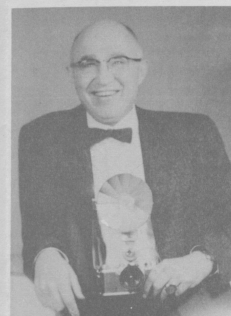

With this issue of the Temple Bulletin, we shall begin to print for you the text of some of the resolutions passed at the recent UAHC Biennial in Miami Beach. This is being done so that you may know exactly what it is that your Union is concerned about and on what it has publicly spoken out:

THE UAHC ISRAEL PROGRAM

We call upon our congregations fully to cooperate with the UAHC Committee on Israel by implementing the resolution of the 1967 Biennial Assembly authorizing that national committee to solicit from the entire constituency of American Reform Judaism, as a voluntary offering, \$1.00 per year, per person, man, woman and child, for the development and support of Reform Judaism and its institutions in Israel.

Further, we call upon each of our congregations to establish an active and effective Israel Committee whose primary purposes shall be:

1. The encouragement and advancement of the cause of Progressive Judaism in Israel in cooperation with the World Union for Progressive Judaism.
2. The education of congregational members and the members of the community at large on issues, both general and specific, affecting Israel.
3. The promotion of visits and extended learning experiences in Israel for the congregations' members of all ages, for the leaders of the congregations, both lay and rabbinic, and for the educators and teachers; all in cooperation where possible, with the UAHC's multi-faceted programs on behalf of Israel.

4. The translation of the unique Jewish values and creative spirit of Israel into the spiritual, educational and cultural programs of the synagogue.

Further, we urge the World Union for Progressive Judaism and its branches throughout the world continuously to press for the elimination of the discriminatory barriers against non-Orthodox Judaism.

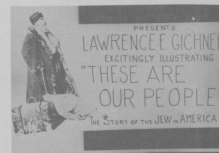

RACIAL JUSTICE A JEWISH REAFFIRMATION

The current demands made by the American Black community painfully remind us of the appalling hurt done by our nation to a long-oppressed multitude. Certainly we in the Reform Jewish community cannot allow our country to ignore the plight of America's impoverished millions. Jewish imperatives require that we be ever sensitive to the aspirations and just demands of our country's minorities.

WE THEREFORE URGE our congregations to redouble their efforts in support of those who have been exploited by our society. Synagogue programs supportive of oppressed peoples, the raising of funds for minority group use, pressure upon our government for massive action, are vehicles that we must employ to heal the deep wounds inflicted.

The Emperor Hadrian is introduced as conversing with Rabbi Gamaliel on several religious questions, with the object of casting ridicule on the Bible. Hadrian exclaims: "Why, your God is represented here as a thief. He surprised Adam in his sleep and robbed him of one of his ribs." The Rabbi's daughter, who is present, craves permission to reply to the Emperor. This is granted. "But first let me impose thy imperial protection, pleasant sire," she exclaims. "A grave outrage has been perpetrated upon our house. From the Rabbi's Desk

Among the teachings of Judaism which are frequently described as basic to our religion are the Ten Commandments. Our children are taught them in Religious School; we place them on a tablet over the entry to the Sanctuary; we hear them lauded as fundamental ethical principles. And in essence, this is so.

Thus I find it distressing to discover how we honor them more in the breach than in practice. The honor for one's parents is in a sad state today. Madison Avenue plays upon our covetousness and urges us to want more and more. Hollywood glorifies adultery in so many of its current films, films which it is all right for adults to see, but which children are forbidden to see (apparently we are already polluted but we should spare the kind for a little while).

But the commandment whose breaking distresses me greatest at this moment is - Thou shalt not steal - because of the number of purse pliftings that have occurred in our Temple building. By all rights, I should never have to mention the subject, and I wish I did not. But I feel that you need to be alerted to this sad state of affairs. Within the past twelve months, three women have told me that their wallets have either been taken from their pocket books or that only their money was taken from the wallets. For our Temple building to acquire a reputation as a place of thieves is most distressing, but at least for these families that is what has occurred. Who the culprits may be, I have no idea, and I assuredly would not want to find out. But I do hope that this short message makes them aware of our concern, as well as the moral implications of their actions. Surely Temple Adath Israel ought to be one place in which the Decalogue is still regarded as worth heeding.

INTERFAITH ACTIVITY

We have reached a new turning point in American interreligious relations. Some, effected by events subsequent to the Six Day War, now counsel retreat and withdrawal from greater Christian-Jewish involvement. Others, rabbis and laymen in our movement, regard interreligious affairs as indispensable for the achievement of understanding in a pluralistic society. What shall be the response of our national movement to these conflicting demands and to this situation?

Shall we withdraw from interreligious contact and activity? Shall we expand our efforts? Are our present facilities sufficient?

Because of recent events, our own ambivalent attitudes and the changing nature of the needs,

WE URGE that a special committee of our Board be appointed and, in conjunction with the CCAR Interfaith Committee, members of the Commission on Interfaith Activities, NFIS and NETV, immediately undertake a searching re-examination of our present interfaith structure and program. Let this committee determine whether the present structure is still viable or in need of total revamping.

From the Rabbi's Desk

This past Thursday, January 22, was Tu B'Shevat, our Jewish New Year of the trees. It is the time when the almond trees in Israel are in full bloom and when the hillsides are lovely with their pink flowers - which contrast sharply with the winter barrenness of the surrounding ground. Indeed a heartwarming sight, as spring is for us every year, wherever we live.

The holiday is also the time when Israelis, young and old, go out on the hillsides, not only to enjoy the rebirth of nature, but also to help nature, to plant young seedlings on what heretofore was only barren ground. These young shoots eventually will grow into beautiful nature trees, forming a forest to protect and hold the soil in place - a concern of vital interest to the State of Israel, whose land has been ravaged by centuries of abuse and destruction.

Our Judaism is very much tied to the seasons in Israel. And in a way this connection is very nice, since spring arrives there sooner than here and we can do some vicarious enjoying.

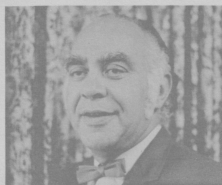

HEBREW UNION COLLEGE

IN A GREAT TRADITION

When Isaac Mayer Wise founded Hebrew Union College and while he was its president, he never tired of reminding American Jews that Reform Judaism would have no future without a flourishing seminary of its own, staffed by eminent professors. His son-in-law, the great pioneering newspaper publisher Adolph S. Ochs, was mindful of this admonition. In 1905 he accepted the chairmanship of the committee for the raising of a five-million-dollar endowment fund for the College and headed the list of contributors with a gift of \$500,000. A chair in Jewish History at the Cincinnati School bears his name. And now, Ochs' daughter, Mrs. Arthur Hays Sulzberger, the granddaughter of the founder of the College, has established, with a fund of at least half-a-million dollars, a chair in Biblical literature in memory of her mother, Effie Wise Ochs, and also in honor of President Glueck's forthcoming seventieth birthday.

Truly, the seeds of a great tradition have borne memorable fruit.

From the Rabbi's Desk

There is seemingly no end to the worthwhile causes to which one can contribute his dollars. The appeals come in the mail day after day. Nonetheless, I should like to call your attention to three appeals within our Reform Jewish movement which I feel are deserving of our support.

The first is the Reform Jewish Appeal. This drive is to provide capital funds for both the Hebrew Union College and the Union of American Congregations to expand their services. This appeal will afford additional monies so that the Union can expand its summer camp program (only six of the sixteen regions have camps - we are among the fortunate few), upgrade the religious educational program of the Union, improve the facilities at HUC, and help the Union expand its programming into areas of current needs. If our Reform Judaism is to continue, this appeal needs our support.

Equally as important, are two other funding needs of our Reform Jewish movement. One of these is the need to offer further support to the World Union for Progressive Judaism congregations in Israel, congregations which are not recognized by Israeli orthodoxy and which need additional funds from us who feel that the Jews of Israel should have alternatives to the strict traditionalism of the Judaism in their country. The request on this is that \$1.00 be contributed by each member of our congregation, a small amount for each of us singly, but a large amount when totalled up.

And the third need of Reform Judaism involves the rabbinic students at HUC. Starting this fall, every entering student will spend his first year in Israel, at the Jerusalem school, a program which I heartily support. However, this sort of venture is costly and will require a great deal of funds. Dr. Nelson Glueck has written me of the financial needs facing this program, and he states: "I shall need between \$1,000 and \$2,000 in scholarship funds on the average for all of the approximately seventy students." This is a goodly amount, but if Reform Judaism is to continue, our future rabbis need this kind of training.

I do hope you will consider supporting each of these causes. I will be happy to forward all contributions.

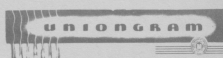

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

February is usually Brotherhood Month, but the day of the annual Brotherhood Dinner at which Christians and Jews, Whites and Blacks get together for their once a year handshake and greetings is pretty much a thing of the past. To a large degree this form of camaraderie was superficial and rather like Tom Lehrer's spoof.

On the other hand, the sentiment and ideals which fostered this annual affair are still very much relevant to our current situation. There still is a great deal of bigotry, a great deal of hatred, a great deal of discrimination in our society. The attitudes which brought about such dinners still need to be overcome, but I think we have moved beyond just trying to alter peoples' views of one another.

Today we have moved into doing things about these problems. It is no longer adequate to have an annual dinner. Action is called for. Support of programs to ameliorate slums is the thing. Efforts to educate the undereducated, that they may find jobs is now the task. The extension of economic opportunities is of vital concern.

Historically, we Jews have known discrimination, prejudice, economic disadvantage, educational quotas. Many of these barriers to our worldly success no longer exist. We are fortunate. But we ought not forget that just because we have made it, that there are those who have not been as fortunate. We cannot permit our achievements to blind us to the suffering of others.

Enclosed in this Bulletin is a statement issued by the Central Conference of American Rabbis for Race Relations Sabbath. Read it, and then consider what role Temple Adath Israel can play in making our community a better place for all its citizens.

Therefore, it is possible to "love thy neighbor" even if you thoroughly dislike him.

PURIM

A Jewish festival which combines the frivolity of Mardi Gras with the serious message of universal religious freedom will be marked with the observance of the holiday of Purim, the Feast of Lots, on March 22.

The occasion recalls the ancient story unfolded in the Megilla or scroll containing the Biblical Book of Esther. The narrative recounts the days of the Jewish queen, Esther, and her valiant efforts to free her people from the hands of Haman, prime minister to King Ahasuerus in ancient Persia.

The word Purim means "lots" in Hebrew and refers to the manner in which Haman chose the day on which he intended to destroy all the Jews. Esther, with the aid of her uncle Mordecai, persuaded the king to rescind the order and to punish Haman instead.

Ever since then, Jews associate all dictators who oppress freedom of worship with Haman. Today, Jews all over the world look with concern at the restrictions imposed on their brethren.

The holiday is celebrated as a joyous festival. Children in the religious schools present Purim plays, and are encouraged to sound noise-makers during the reading of the Megilla at the religious service in the synagogue at the mention of the name of Haman, and hold costume parties with all the trimmings.

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

As I sit here writing this week, it is the first day of the KEA teachers strike and I can hear the sound of some of the neighborhood youngsters bouncing their basketball in the Temple parking lot. The schools are locked, they cannot use the Henry Clay Gymnasium - one of the many intangible side effects of this strike.

Such a strike as we are now experiencing is not easy to confront and discuss. The problems that bring it about are multifold and the consequences which it will have upon us and our school age children are far-reaching. There surely is no one simple approach, which is what makes it so very agonizing for teachers, parents, and legislators alike.

Yet as I consider the factors which have brought us to this unfortunate turn of events, I recall when we lived in New Hampshire and the citizens were called upon to vote on a sweepstakes bill that would provide income for education. I opposed the measure, not because it legalized gambling (which the Protestant clergy discussed) but because it provided a way for us to dodge our obligation of paying for quality education for our children. This to me was a moral issue, and I believe the same issue is present here in this state. If we want good schools for Kentucky, then Kentucky money has to be forthcoming. And from all indications there still remain entangled sources of income which can be earmarked for education.

We all know from our own personal budgets, that if we want something badly enough, we can find the funds for it. Lack of money should never be accepted as the first excuse for not doing something. It is second. Attitude is first. If we want good schools, we will find a way to finance them. This strike may well indicate, in a very obvious way what our Kentucky priorities really are.

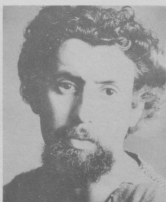

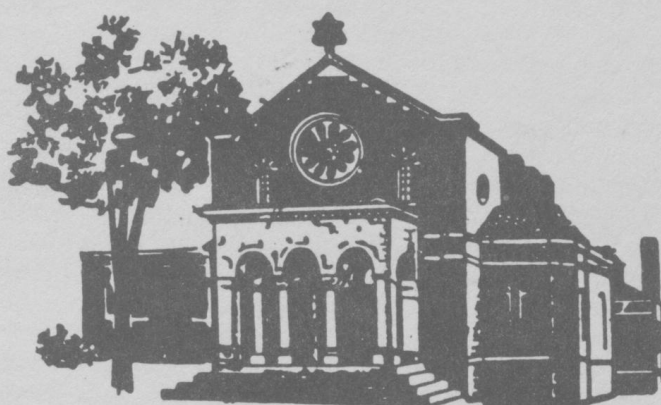

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FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

Life does not always work out as it has been planned. Contingencies occur. Unexpected events cause one to change his mind. New situations cause new courses of action. Such events may bring disappointment or pleasure, anguish or excitement. Life is full of these kinds of unforeseen changes and they prevent it from becoming routine and computerized.

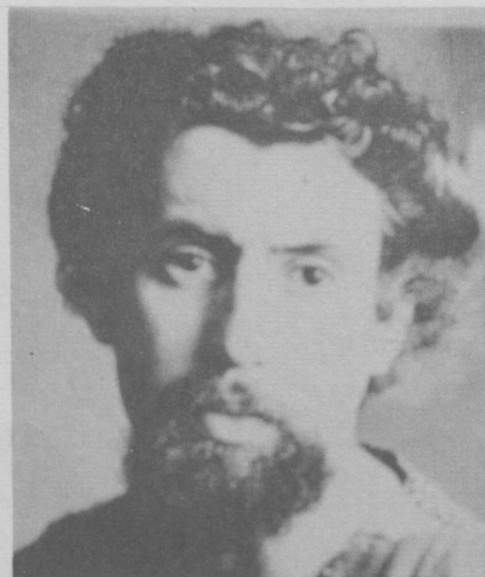
It was just this kind of situation that Alana and I faced last week regarding our plans to go to Israel for the meeting of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. When the Arab guerillas stepped up their terrorist harassment with the dynamiting of two planes bound for Israel and the ambush death of a tourist, we were forced to reconsider our trip and to answer some difficult questions. Was it worth taking the chance in flying at this time? Was not a large group of American Rabbis a possible prize target for any meshugennah terrorist? Did we want to put ourselves into this sort of position? What was our present responsibility to the children? Could we not go at a later date, when the situation was not quite as tense? We agonized over these questions for a number of days before coming to the decision that for us discretion was the better part of valor, and that we should postpone our trip. And so with a great deal of disappointment we did just that, less than a week before we were due to depart and the funds have been placed in a special account, while their disposition is considered. And we hope to go to Israel later this year, when, God willing, the present situation is cleared up and the risks will be much less.

It was a difficult week, but I think we have made the best choice for us - at least I hope so.

"WORTH QUOTING"

The rabbis were emphatic in denouncing pride. "Humility," one of the rabbis said, "is the greatest of all virtues. A person who is puffed up with an arrogant spirit is as though he had worshipped idols, denied the basic principles of religion, and committed every kind of immorality. Arrogance is not only an evil trait because it hurts other people; it is equally injurious to its own possessor, for it sends him on a road that will inevitably lead to frustration." The rabbis generalize thus: "Whoever runs after greatness, greatness will elude him; whoever flees from greatness, greatness will pursue him."

PURIM

"At the traditional reading of the megillah, Haman never has a chance. At the very mention of his name, a loud roar fills the synagogue. Minds turn to his ancient calumny and his deserved defeat at the hands of Esther and Mordecai. But no one ever turns to the inner experience of the villain Haman. He is shouted down as avaricious, bestial, and callous. He is condemned for his disregard of the humanity of the Jews he wanted to destroy.

But that is always the fate of the enemy. He is dehumanized so that we may hate and destroy him. We cannot know him as a person, lest he become more human; and we are forced to concede that there is some shred of merit to his position.

My major Purim concern is not so much a matter of defending Haman (for certainly I am pleased that his dreadful plot was foiled); but that we avoid becoming Haman ourselves. It is all too easy to fall into the blind hatred that characterized Haman's plans. Many Jews who travel to Germany come with an indiscriminate hate of Germans and things German. They have come because they have relatives or business here and cannot avoid coming. Once here, they live in continual discomfort, lest they come into excessive contact with or give too much business to the enemy. Other Jews, comfortable in America, carefully avoid travel to Germany or purchase of German products. Quoting phrases like 'remember Amalek', they advocate Jewish isolation from everything German as a matter of Jewish self-respect.

But, if we follow the counsel of these advocates of hate, we have put ourselves in the position of the villain Haman. What real or imagined harm had come to him at the hand of Jews? Why had he expanded it to a full and virulent hatred of all Jews? What had he accomplished by dehumanizing them? Many studies into the personality dynamics of the anti-semitic have concluded that he transforms dissatisfaction with self into hate of others. But we are left with the question: Is our hate of him for cause more acceptable than this causeless hate? For the Jew whose losses were close and personal, hate is an understandable reaction. But for the Jew whose hate is born of historical reminiscence, hate is a dangerous poison that can turn him into the dehumanizing villain of the future....

Though difficult to accept, we must set the goal of placing ourselves in the villain's frame of reference in order to have enough sympathy that we do not become villains ourselves. In this regard, we have an example in the restraint of the Jews liberated from the Theresenstadt concentration camp. The Allied soldiers placed the prison guards at the mercy of the inmates; and they chose not to take personal revenge! In the world of Esther and Mordecai, men were better able to afford the luxury of hate. We live in too small a world to let it be poisoned by the venom of our own hate. The villain may taint the world by acting out his frightful emotions; but we cannot live by the same rules as he...

Such is the challenge of Purim - to celebrate the victory of our people without glorying in the defeat of the misguided enemy."

Worse than foolishness is the wrong kind
of cleverness.

Printed below are other
resolutions passed at the recent
Biennial in Miami Beach. This is
done so that you may know exactly
what it is that your UAHC is con-
cerned about and on what it has
publicly spoken out:

INTERFAITH ACTIVITY

We have reached a new turning
point in American interreligious
relations. Some, affected by events
subsequent to the Six Day War, now
counsel retreat and withdrawal from
greater Christian-Jewish involve-
ment. Others, rabbis and laymen in
our movement, regard interreligious
affairs as indispensable for the
achievement of understanding in a
pluralistic society. What shall be
the response of our national move-
ment to these conflicting demands
and to this situation? Shall we
withdraw from interreligious contact
and activity? Shall we expand our
efforts? Are our present facilities
sufficient?

Because of recent events, our own
ambivalent attitudes and the chang-
ing nature of the needs,

WE URGE that a special committee
of our Board be appointed and, in
conjunction with the CCAR Inter-
faith Committee, members of the
Commission on Interfaith Activities,
NFTS and NFTY, immediately under-
take a searching re-examination of
our present interfaith structure
and program. Let this committee
determine whether the present
structure is still viable or in
need of total revamping.

GERM WARFARE

As religiously motivated men,
women and youth, we enjoin Pres-
ident Nixon to take a moral stand
here and now, that the United
States unilaterally renounce ex-
perimentation with and use of germ
warfare and nerve gases. Even
belatedly, we press for ratification

Sermon - We Are Different

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

The Book of Esther, upon which we base our celebration of the forthcoming holiday of Purim (March 22) is unique among the books of the Bible, in that it does not mention the name of God even once. God is apparently hinted at by Mordecai when he tells Esther that if she does not assist in saving the Jews from the villainy of Haman, "then will relief and deliverance arise to the Jews from another place," but this is as about as close as we can get to the indication of Divine help.

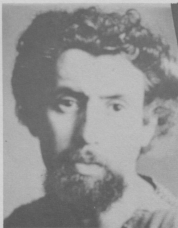
The reason for this omission is unknown to us. There are theories that the mention of Purim might profane God's name if it were there, or that Gentiles might profane the book because of the Jews' triumph. But these are theories and may not represent the views of the author, as to why he omitted the Name in the first place.

Nonetheless, this omission is very much in keeping with the rabbinic teaching that man is responsible for his own behavior - that we have free will. If we are to live responsible lives, we cannot be dependent solely on God's grace or providence alone (though it is certainly a blessing when this occurs) but rather that we need to act as if there were no God, to face life and its challenges and choices, and to do. If Esther had merely prayed, it is doubtful whether deliverance would have come. Rather, did she have to take a chance and confront the King with the evil devices of Haman. Each of us is faced with similar situations from time to time - when we have to face unpleasant tasks that will not be done unless we do them. And in these instances, we need to follow the example of Esther - whom as you recall was the heroine of the story only because she did what had to be done.

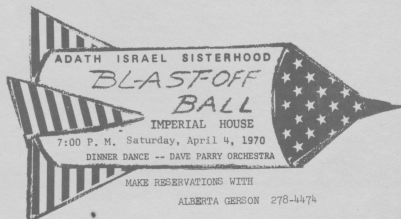

ORIGIN OF THE WORD "YARMULKE"

The London Jewish Chronicle sought the origin of the word "yarmulke" and produced a number of interesting theories after carefully admitting, "No one really knows." An important theory is that it is derived from two Hebrew words, "Yare Malka" - he fears the king. Generally it is accepted that "yarmulka" and "kippah" are derived from two Polish words. Another claims it is a Slavonic word "yarmul" which means "fur hat" with the addition of a "k" for diminutive. Credit has also been given to Russian and Turkish words. But it is neither Hebrew nor Yiddish. Originally Jews did not wear any headcovering. Much to the contrary. The practice of covering the head was gradual. It was a "reflex" instituted in Babylon, and was not generally accepted until the Middle Ages. Exchange

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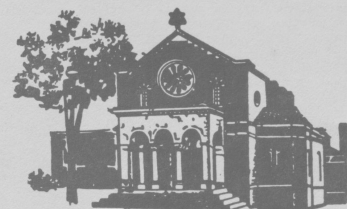

Sermon - What's So Good About This Friday?

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

This past Friday evening we celebrated Jewish Music Month by utilizing music from one of the records in the Abraham Music Library, a folk-rock service sung by members of the National Federation of Temple Youth. Quite frankly I admit that this was, among other things, in the nature of an experiment. I wanted to solicit reactions to the use of recorded music as well as some modern liturgical music, and was pleased that the Congregation was willing to make such comments after the service.

Among the comments, there was one which I feel bears additional consideration, and that was - but it is not traditional.

What do we mean when we use this word traditional which so often is used as a negative criticism? Primarily we mean that we are not familiar with it in this setting or have not ever heard it before; or maybe we mean that it is not what we were anticipating and so were rather startled by it. Now these are legitimate comments, but they seem to beg the question of tradition, for tradition is what we are accustomed to in a given situation. It is what is familiar and comfortable for us, what we think proper for the setting.

The difficulty is that we overlook the fact that traditions have to start sometime and somewhere (I always chuckle when I see the sign "First Annual..."), and that what we take as tradition today was new at some other time in history, and that it had to replace an older tradition of some kind.

And for us as Reform Jews to maintain tradition just for its own sake is to belie what we say we stand for - that we can Reform Judaism, that we are not bound to any one form or mode or ritual, but able to experiment and introduce change into our religious practice and rituals.

Tradition is great! But let us not be eternally wedded to it just for its own sake.

THE JEWISH CALENDAR

The calendar we use in our daily activity is solar, based upon the movement of the earth around the sun. The Jewish calendar (lunar) is basically lunar and is based according to the moon's revolutions around the earth. As the moon takes 29½ days to travel around the earth, the Jewish year has 12 months of 29 or 30 days each, 354 days in all. In order to bring the calendar in line with the solar year, a leap month is added 7 times every 19 years.

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

More than three years ago I participated in a Peace March of Clergy in Washington, D.C. Two years ago President Johnson initiated American participation in peace talks in Paris. President Nixon speaks of Vietnamizing the war. The marches go on. The talks are bogged down and the number of American troops in Vietnam do not appear to be decreasing in any appreciable number.

If we were not so terribly involved, if the situation were not sapping the enthusiasm for creative living which should be part of growing up, if the casualty were not shown daily on our TV sets, the whole business would be so boring that we would have long since tuned it out, but we can't. It is a cancer in the very guts of our country - sapping our ability to react to horror, draining the strength of our American youth, destroying our national unity. It is perhaps one of the saddest things which has ever occurred to us as a nation, I would dare say, far worse even than the Civil War.

And equally as sad, there seems to be no leadership to bring it to a conclusion. President Nixon's words give us no real direction. They are hedged in with "if's" or "but's". The Peaceniks demonstrate but do not tell us what they mean by "peace" nor how it is to be achieved. The whole picture appears more and more bleak and depressing - not a pleasant way to welcome the rebirth of spring, but this is the continuing reality of our world situation, nonetheless.

PESACH

Pesach--Passover--starts on the fourteenth of Nisan--April 21, 1970 (first Seder Mon. April 20th). It commemorates Israel's liberation from Egyptian bondage--a very timely thought in light of Israel's relationship to Egypt today. The festival is therefore called Zeman Cherutenu, the season of our liberty. It is also known as Chag ha-iatzot, the Feast of Unleavened Bread, in memory of the Israelites hasty exit from Egypt when all they could carry with them was dough still unleavened.

Both the slaughtering of the lamb, commemorating the lamb blood marking the doorposts of the Israelites whom the angel of death passed over, and the unleavened bread are customs originating before and independently of Israel. Arabic Bedouins ate unleavened bread, and the slaughtering of lambs was an important feature of practically every religious and secular festivity in the Near East.

The date of Pesach, too, was long observed among Semitic tribes as a season of festivity. But out of these dissassociated customs, the Jewish people molded a unified holiday and infused the great idea of national and personal liberty, employing the concept of the "Season of Spring" figuratively as a "Season of Freedom."

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

This past Sunday we had an early Spring snow and our Christian neighbors were done out of their Easter egg hunts and the opportunity to wear their new holiday finery. Fortunately for us, we were not celebrating Pesach and so did not have to feel silly as we sang, "Behold It Is the Springtide of the Year."

Usually these two holidays coincide, because Easter was originally tied to our celebration of Pesach. The Last Supper supposedly was a Seder. But when Christianity became a separate religion, the Church wanted to keep the historic connection, but not the dependency upon our Jewish calendar. And so they devised a formula for dating Easter - the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox. With a formula like this, Easter does not stay put on the calendar, but it does usually fall during Pesach.

This year, however, it does not happen, because we have a leap year. And when we do, we add an extra month - Adar II. This extra month gets our lunar months back into proper relationship with solar year, and occurs seven times in a nineteen year cycle.

Thus, the two holidays do not coincide this year, and hopefully by the time we get to celebrating Pesach, spring will really have arrived at long last.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

As perhaps most of you may know one of my on-going community interests has been the Lexington Public Library. It has attracted my attention for more than five years now and I have added my efforts to those of many other people to help it improve from the pitiful condition in which it was.

Thus, as you can well imagine, the decreasing in the city support of the Library has been of utmost concern to me, and I have worked hard along with other concerned citizens to see what could be done to prevent the budgetary cut, and of course, the resultant cut in services, which would be such a sad situation for Lexington.

What the outcome of all this political maneuvering will be cannot be predicted, but as I look at the activity which has been occurring in so many areas of the community, I find one heartening possibility that may come of it all. At long last the ordinary citizen of Lexington is beginning to realize that the running of his community is his concern also and that perhaps there is and should be something he can do to make it an even better place in which to live. The communal response to what has occurred is most pleasing. Let us hope that a now awakened community remains alert to confront the problems to which it has previously closed its eyes.

PASSOVER
Questions and Answers

Q. - What does Passover have to do with Spring?

A. - That's when Passover was originally, the welcoming of Spring.

Q. - Or was it the celebration of the deliverance from slavery in Egypt?

A. - Yes, that's what Passover became. But its earliest form was an agricultural celebration of Spring's arrival.

Q. - Doesn't Passover have other meanings?

A. - The second chapter in the history of Passover connects it with the deliverance from Egypt. And the word refers to the fact that the Angel of Death "passed over" the Jewish homes. It is described in the Bible in the Tenth Plague.

Q. - What is the purpose of the Seder?

A. - The Seder is the home celebration of Passover where the story of the liberation is told.

Q. - What does Seder mean?

A. - The word "Seder" means "the order of service."

Q. - What does Haggadah mean?

A. - It means "the story."

Q. - Is that the holiday when matzah is eaten instead of bread?

A. - Yes. When our ancestors left Egypt they had no time to bake their bread in slavery, so they took along dough and baked it in the sun while traveling. - The matzah remind us of the bread of affliction or suffering, which our ancestors ate in Egypt, and of their haste to flee from the land of slavery. - The 3 matzahs used at the Seder commemorate Abraham's hospitality to the 3 visitors who, our rabbis tell us, visited him during Passover. Said Abraham to Sarah: "make quickly, 3 measures of fine meal, knead it and make 3 cakes." The 3 matzahs symbolize these 3 measures.

Q. - How did spring festival get mixed up with a holiday of liberation?

A. - Passover came to be regarded as the spring-time of Jewish history. Just as nature is liberated from winter, so on this holiday the Israelites emerged from slavery.

Q. - When did these events take place?

A. - About 3500 years ago.

Q. - What do the special foods served at the Seder signify?

A. - The "maror" or bitter herbs are a reminder of the bitterness of slavery. We eat a bitter vegetable, usually horseradish, as a remembrance of the bitter life of our forefathers when they were slaves in Egypt. "Maror" in Hebrew means bitter.

Q. - What about the parsley?

A. - That's the touch of spring.

Q. - And the shank bone?

A. - The roasted bone - the shank bone - the lamb bone reminds us of the sacrifice on the first Passover (Exodus XII:13 - 10). God commanded each

Israelite family to make a burnt offering of a lamb. The bone of a lamb, an animal worshipped by the Egyptians is placed on the table to show that only one is powerless to help or to injure.

Q. - What does the hard-boiled egg signify?

A. - The egg is a symbol of new life and it recalls the renewal of freedom for the former slaves. The use of the egg is continued in the Christian Easter observance. - It is also a symbol of the new life the Jews are to enter. The people were about to burst the shell of slavery and enter the period of liberation. It is also the symbol of the free-will burnt offering brought each day of the Passover Feast during the existence of the Temple in Jerusalem.

Q. - What about the Charoseth?

A. - Charoseth is made of nuts, apples, raisins, cinnamon and wine. It has the color of clay or mortar. We eat it to remember the bricks our ancestors made in Egypt and the mortar they used in building palaces and temples for the Pharaohs. It is also used as a symbol for the sweetness of freedom.

Q. - What does the wine symbolize?

A. - The wine symbolizes joy: "And wine that maketh joyful the heart of man." (Psalm CIV:15). We drink four cups of wine because of the four promises made to our ancestors when they were freed from Egyptian slavery. "And I will take you out of the land of bondage." "And I will save" you. "And I will free" you from slavery. "And I will take" you to be a Chosen People.

Q. - What is the Cup of Elijah?

A. - There is a beautiful legend that before the Messiah will come to lead the Jews back to Palestine and to establish everlasting peace in the world, the prophet Elijah will appear to announce the coming of the Messiah. We express our wish and hope for the arrival of this glad messenger by providing a special cup of wine and by opening the door to admit the expected guest.

Q. - What is the Afikomen?

A. - The Afikomen is of Greek origin which means after the meal, or dessert. It too, reminds us of the way Passover was celebrated in older times. At the end of the Seder each person received a small portion of the Paschal lamb (or dessert). - When the practice of sacrifices had ceased, a piece of matzah was substituted.

Q. - Is there some relationship between Easter and Passover?

A. - Yes. Both were originally Spring festivals and the time of Easter is connected with the time of Passover, since the Christian holiday is reckoned by the Last Supper which is supposed to have been a Seder.

Q. - When does Passover begin this year?

A. - On the evening of Monday, April 28.

Q. - How long does it last?

A. - The Bible stipulated 7 days; later it became an 8-day holiday outside of Palestine; and Reform Judaism has reverted back to a seven-day observance.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

At our Seders this coming week, we shall once again participate in the events of the Exodus of our forefathers from Egypt. Each year at this time we are reminded of the importance of freedom for man to live with dignity and self respect. And certainly this is an important lesson.

But think also of the amount of inertia that Moses had to overcome to get the people to leave Egypt. The texts give us some indication of this, but leave the details to our imagination. No matter how rundown or terrible, people just don't like to leave their homes. They are familiar and a form of security for them in a world that is cold and unfriendly. We certainly see this in Appalachia or in Irish-town.

On the other hand, one can also ask: at what point do conditions become so intolerable that people will leave what they have and prize and emigrate? Throughout the centuries Jews have had to confront this kind of question - in Medieval Spain, in Russia in the last century, in Hitler's Germany. And some left; while others remained behind.

The Seder can serve to remind us of the nature of our own attachment to that which is familiar and comfortable and cause us to ask how tied are we to our present situation.

Historically, our Judaism is our first identity; our being Americans is only of recent date. We have been forced by different circumstances to leave other nations. Egypt was only the first. This too is part of the message of Pesach - not a pleasant one by any means - but it is there.

U.A.H.C. - WHAT IS IT?

Its policies are determined by a national executive board which includes congregational leaders from every part of the nation. It symbolizes the strength of Reform Judaism which it serves. The Union is you, and you are the Union. It is as strong as your support and Reform Judaism is stronger and richer through its service

This past week Alana and I started what I hope will be a yearly tradition in our congregation - a trip to New York City by the members of the Confirmation Class to see sights of Jewish interest. Since it was my first time as tour guide, I was a bit uncertain as how it would turn out, but Mike Rosenstein, the one student who joined us, was a very willing and eager traveller.

We did many things, went many places and saw a great deal. We went to the Hebrew Union College, Temple Emanuel, the Union of American Congregations and the Jewish Museum, all on one day. We toured the United Nations and went out to Crown Heights in Brooklyn, to a Hasidic section, where we also visited a matzoh factory, where each matzoh was made by hand and individually baked. We had a tour of Lincoln Center and saw the lovely Chagall murals in the new Met Building. And we went to Central Synagogue, which is celebrating the 100th anniversary of its sanctuary, built in the Moorish style of Plum Street Temple - a Synagogue with special meaning for me because it was the congregation of my great-grandparents, two of whose names I saw on their memorial plaque. We even had dinner in a kosher Chinese Restaurant on the Lower East Side.

We returned home just worn out. We had been on the go constantly. But it was fun, and more important, we learned a great deal, which is why we went. Judaism in Lexington is rather limited in its manifestations. Our children need to have an opportunity such as this to have their Jewish world made larger for them.

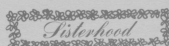

From the Rabbi's Desk

A week ago our nation celebrated Earth Day - a special day set aside on which the subject of ecology was discussed at length, when groups were seen in many places picking up the trash and litter which has cluttered up our country side, when some people rode bicycles rather than autos to reduce the pollution of the air.

All of these efforts are certainly worthwhile. They reflect the words of Ps. 24: "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof", a verse which has not been heeded to any great extent until the past few years when smog has become a major problem in our urban areas and the need to find sanitary land fill for garbage of pressing urgency.

But I wonder how serious we are about this problem, will it affect our personal behavior? Will we stop smoking; cut out dropping papers on the ground, pick up trash when we see it lying around, plant flowers and trees to freshen the air? There are lots of things the individual can do.

And what of the factories and institutions that pollute our air? We saw photos of some of this at the joint Sisterhood-Brotherhood meeting in February. This will be an uphill fight. It will take the complaints of all of us for something to occur - letters to the Air Pollution Control Board, Senators, etc.

If man is to survive on this earth, ecology cannot be overlooked. You know, here is a problem whose solution spans the generation gap, and needs the combined effort of persons of all ages. And isn't it nice to find a social problem about which young and old can agree!

It does hold meaning for them, has relevancy beyond what they are willing to admit in public. There is never any predicting when these occasions will be - a service, a program, a Mitzvah, a discussion, a private conversation. As a rabbi, I notice such moments. They add sparkle to what I do. However, sometimes there is too long a waiting period between these moments. During the coming year, how about helping to make them more frequent for both of us?

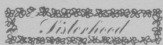

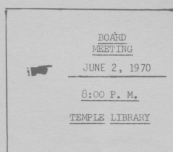

"RESPONSE FROM A READER"

Dear Rabbi Leffler,

I disagree with the premise of your Message in the May 15 Temple Bulletin.

You state that the government attitude is "The students are undermining our war efforts and need to have the National Guard control them". No responsible University or State official said or implied anything of this kind. The National Guard was brought on the scene by the Governor to attempt to safeguard the lives of students and to protect University buildings against destruction by a mob. As Federal Judge Swinford pointed out, the students have a legal right peacefully to assemble and dissent, but not to endanger lives or property by violent actions.

In my opinion, your attempt to draw a parallel between this situation and Nazi Germany is ill-conceived, inflammatory, and most unfortunate.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

The lazy, hazy days of summer are about upon us, the time when we like to take vacations, when air conditioners work over time, when the fast pace of the cooler months gives way to the slower pace of the hot sultry season.

It is a time of year which I use to plan - to work on changes which we will make in our Religious School program, to consider what we will do for our adult activities, to organize and think through the ideas I set aside last winter because there just wasn't sufficient time to devote to them.

SHAVUOT

The approach of June brings with it the holiday of shavuot and the Confirmation ceremony.

Shavuot occurs in the Hebrew calendar seven weeks after Passover (the word Shavuot means "weeks"). Its origins were that of an agricultural pilgrimage festival which celebrated the end of the wheat harvest. It retained its agricultural nature longer than any other Jewish festival. In time, however, it took on a new, historic significance and a new spiritual content.

The transformation comes as far back as the days of the second Temple in Jerusalem. At that time it took on the character of the celebration of the covenant made between God and Noah; that is, God and mankind. This symbolic character extended itself until the holiday became a symbol of the giving of the Torah, the giving of the mitzvot (the commandments). It became the day of God's revealing himself on Mount Sinai and blessing all of mankind and especially the children of Israel with a guide for life.

Through this association with the giving of the Torah, Shavuot attained a great importance and became an exalted spiritual festival; a festival no longer associated with agriculture and nature, but symbolic of the spiritual treasure and culture that the Jewish people possess.

This association with the concept of mitzva and guidance for life led the Reform movement in the 19th Century to establish the new custom of Confirmation on the day of Shavuot. The ceremony seemed appropriate for both boys and girls would be asked to express their willingness to identify with the Jewish people and with the ideals espoused by Judaism.

The word "confirm" is often misused. There really is no such thing as a Rabbi "confirming" a young man or woman. This would be impossible. The word "Confirmation" implies a reflexive sense. The young confirmand is asked to confirm his own intentions as a part of the Jewish community. He makes this decision on the basis of his studies and the act of confirmation comes when the young student has rationally committed himself to Judaism. Confirmation may not be for everyone. Certainly one who has not taken part in the studies necessary for such a decision would be unable to participate. It is possible that even some of those who do might exercise the option of not casting their lot with the children of Israel. Most will desire to do so, and we take heart in the fact that they do so out of knowledge.

The sense of commitment toward the concept of Torah (learning) and toward Israel truly captures the spirit of Shavuot, and the ideal of guidance in our search for God, and meaning in our lives.

HUMAN LIFE IS SACRED

Judaism demands recognition of the dignity of man on the strength of the exalted dignity of the Creator. Every man is infused with a spark of the Spirit in whose image man was created. To degrade man thus becomes tantamount to degrading God. Thanks to this identification of the dignity of man with the honor of God, the religious-ethical spirit gained early ascendancy in Israel. It became the mainspring of Jewish social ethics and the legislation informed by it.

Over and over again, biblical, talmudic and rabbinic literature emphasize that every human being has infinite value by dint of his endowment with a spark of the Divine in whose image all men are created. Wrong inflicted upon any man thus becomes a transgression against God, and "he who sheds blood diminishes something from the Likeness in which man is made." Lest one assume that God sorrows, as it were, only for the hurt inflicted upon the righteous, the Sages stressed that He mourns also for the blood of the sinners for they, too, are "His children."

Man as such is the highest value of Judaism. The degradation of any man to the level of "an animated machine" is unthinkable in the Jewish setting. To the Jew, every human life is sacred because every man partakes of the holiness of God. This is why all commandments of the Torah must be ignored when a human life is in the balance.

Rabbi Leffler's Annual Report

Every year at this time I begin wondering -- what can I tell you that I haven't already told you, either from the pulpit, in my weekly messages in the Temple Bulletin, or at some other meeting. And strangely enough, as I begin to set my thoughts down on paper, low and behold, there always seems to be something to say. Rabbi's just don't seem to run out of words or ideas. And if we can't find something new, then we dress up something old and try it again. So -- some of my remarks this evening may be from each category, and it will be up to you to decide which. However I am not too sure myself, since I find that I am getting rather absent minded now that I have reached the advanced age of 40.

As has been my want in the past, let me start with a few accolades. I should like to express my appreciation to Barbara Gorodetzky, without whom Sunday mornings would be ever so much more hectic. She is doing a fine job as principal of our Religious School and I truly appreciate her continuing efforts at keeping things running as smoothly as they are. Then I should also like to thank the Millers' -- of whom we have no shortage in this congregation, -- Jack who has worked tirelessly with the Youth Group (and who makes great hash brown potatoes to complement my omelets), Jo Ann who has shepherded our Sisterhood these past two years, and Harry who has finished his first year as president of our congregation and with whom I have gotten along quite well -- once we decided we could not amicably discuss Vietnam. It has been a good year, with numerous highlights -- the visits of our out-of-town speakers who were most stimulating, the great response to our Sisterhood inter-religious luncheon, the Confirmation Class, with its wonderful intellectual curiosity, which they tried so hard to hide, and so many other things.

But one ought not rest on his laurels. There needs to be new challenges, inadequacies considered, short-comings confronted -- for to stand still is to stagnate. Thus our congregation has continually to evaluate what it has accomplished, in order to improve upon things and to fill the gaps which we see existing.

Therefore, let me concentrate now on what I would consider the gaps, those areas of congregational life where I feel we are weak, where we could improve upon what we already are doing.

First, in our programming. As I survey the functions which we have, it would appear that we think Judaism is for the children. We have an excellent Religious School which we support generously. We have a fine youth group which is extremely active and is constantly going places and doing things. And of both of these we can be justly proud and pleased.

But when we consider our adult activities, our efforts take a nose dive. The programs we sponsor for our adult members pale in comparison. Our adult education and social action meetings have not been successful. More often than not, the committees have not functioned, and when they did offer us programs -- which usually were of the highest calibre -- the response of our adults was generally poor. Not only does this lack of attendance discourage those who plan so hard, but it has additional and far-reaching implications, for our young people see this also and they understand -- Judaism is not for them, because their parents deny it. It's "kid stuff" because only kids attend programs and courses at the Temple. Once they grow up, Judaism ceases to have importance, except as something to which to give money to try to educate other kids and maybe to run a few charities. Our youngsters are bright. They get the message, but I wonder whether we are cognizant of the message we are transmitting to them -- or whether this is what we really want to say.

A second consideration I should like to bring to your attention this evening is our need for open discussion of important and pertinent issues. This year, a prominent member of our congregation resigned because of a personal difference he has with me over a number of subjects. I was, and continue to be, greatly distressed by this turn of events. I do not like to see difference of opinion bring about this kind of division. We are too small a group to profit from it in any way.

On the other hand, I do not believe that we all need to agree about everything. This would be "dullsville!" Rather, do I want to see creative dissent within our congregation - a willingness to voice opposing opinions, and to consider them in public debate, for this kind of discussion can heighten the interest of our membership; it can bring to the fore those matters which each of us feels is important to Judaism, issues which are an application of our Jewish teachings upon the pressing problems of life, subjects which ought to concern us as Jews because we should be concerned persons. We need to see the religious dimension of almost every facet of life and apply our insights as Jews to these problems - not only as individuals, but as a congregation.

And lastly, I should like to convey to you a source of embarrassment to me - that I have to alibi for the congregation when non-Jews talk about what they think we do, of our Jewish support for worthy projects, of our supposed participation in matters beyond these four walls. This embarrassment occurs when I am called upon by someone requesting a representative of our congregation to join in a new community project and I cannot find a volunteer. It occurs when I am asked about your support of the functions of this congregation and I have to give an excuse. It occurs when I hear of the involvement and interest of other churches in worthy projects and have to be silent because I have nothing to contribute to their conversation.

As I consider my role as your rabbi, I find there are many functions which I am called upon to fulfill, hopefully with some modicum of ability. On the other hand, you too have a number of roles to fulfill, one of which is the care and nurture of your rabbi - to make your participation in this congregation one which will bring me satisfaction and a feeling of accomplishment. It is a two way street. Let's consider both directions this coming year in the areas of adult programs, your participation in them and creative dissent.

ADDRESS BY MORRIS B. ABRAM, PRESIDENT, BRANDEIS UNIVERSITY,
AT THE 50TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY,
UNION OF AMERICAN HEBREW CONGREGATIONS
OCTOBER 29, 1969

Inherent in the philosophy of the Jew is a passionate commitment to lawful reform and to peace -- conditions that three thousand years of history have proved absolutely essential for the security of minority groups. For the Jew, the admonition in the Ethics of the Fathers states a basic truth of existence: "Pray for the welfare of the Government -- but for the fear thereof man would eat his neighbor alive."

All of us live today under the looming disasters of nuclear war, with growing anxieties about environmental pollution, overpopulation and famine that portend the inevitable increase of grave conflicts and tensions. This time of great upheaval has produced in the United States a polarization of American society -- left and right -- and a growth of group tensions that comprise a dangerous augury for the 1970s. The largest Jewish population in the world lives in the United States, and today, as a result of intensifying conditions, these Jews face a threat from both the extreme right and the extreme left, a threat that must now be acknowledged and resisted.

History repeatedly demonstrates that while the promises of instant Utopia from the doctrinaire left tend to co-opt the idealist, they are actually a snare and delusion which inevitably spawn anti-Semitism. Whether at the tail-end of Populism in the United States or Stalinism in the Soviet Union, the outcome is the same: To such movements, the Jew eventually becomes the hated establishment or capitalist.

Today in America, we cannot ignore the portents. The radical left has been caught up in the Afro-Asian or so-called Third World web of propaganda and slogans, some of which are pure code names for anti-Semitism. Moreover, as Jews in the United States -- by dint of merit and structured education as well as various historical reasons -- have advanced in the social service and teaching fields, they have become a lightning rod for envious people who seek their jobs -- often by foul, prejudicial means. Negative discrimination has become the fad. It is no more defensible than positive discrimination, which has in the past shackled minorities in the United States and still operates viciously in the case of the blacks.

The post-Vietnam period will also contain a very real threat for American Jewry -- this time, a danger from the right. For one of the ugliest features of any war is its aftermath -- particularly the aftermath for the great power whose loss of blood is not offset by victory. The frustration level rises, the tolerance level falls, and bitter recrimination ensues. Then begins a search for a scapegoat, and Western history has a favorite: the Jew.

The national leaders of the political movement to end the Vietnam War have been McCarthy, the Kennedys, McGovern, Fulbright, and now, Goodell, and the objective history of the times will so record these facts. However, a popular and distorted version of this history may well ignore these names and focus instead upon others: the Lowensteins, the Javitses, the Goldbergs, and "the students."

The war in Vietnam is hardly likely to be resolved by a stunning victory for America. When the fighting is ended, the cry will surely be raised by the right wing that there was a sell-out to Communism. The disdain that prompted the Vice President's snide reference to "an effete corps of impudent snobs" will intensify into an angry accusation that Southeast Asia was lost by a betrayal at home. The stab-in-the-back explanation will flourish, as it did in the Weimar Republic when Germany's military asserted that the Versailles Treaty was a reflection of how the civilian authorities had sold Germany down the river.

When Nationalist China fell in the late 1940s, the right wing in America looked for traitors at home, rather than to the real causes within China. If the reaction to our failure in Vietnam is proportional to our emotional, human and material investment there -- as compared with the situation in China, where we had not invested 40,000 lives -- the outlook for the 1970s is grim indeed.

I said a moment ago that a distorted history may well seek out as targets the Lowensteins, the Javitses, the Goldbergs, and "the students." A few -- but even a few is far too many -- Jewish youths have been caught up in the Afro-Asian or so-called Third World web, and are wallowing in self-abasement amidst the anti-Semitic implications of many of its slogans.

The only antidote against minority self-abasement is -- as the black man has discovered -- pride in one's own identity, struggles and contributions. The Jew has all these in abundance, and it remains only for Jewish families and institutions to fruitfully use them, fully develop them and effectively transmit them.

Some of our children have lost their way because their parents have failed to give them a sense of identity and purpose; in the absence of those values supplied by the Jewish heritage, spurious ones have appeared. But if the parents of these students feel estranged, they should remember that these young people were not sired by college administrators. Many of them are truly foolish youngsters, wuixotic revolutionaries who mount their steeds of doom, tilt their lances of indignant rhetoric and charge in abandon at any and every windmill their immature minds perceive. They are the victims of self-deception.

I do not mean to suggest for an instant that dissent should ever be stifled, or that to protest the war is improper or wrong -- nor do I mean to imply that every student who protests is an incorrigible radical bent on wanton destruction of our society. A man must strive to correct the wrongs he perceives, but he must also use the same acute perception to define realities and separate the useful and good from the perceived wrong. Any mindless rhetoric opens the forum of rational debate to distortion and cynical lies. When this cycle is initiated by a Jew, it is tragically self-defeating, for he inevitably faces the arguments of the anti-Semites who further confuse the issues and pollute the climate of opinion.

From all my experiences on the campus, I can tell you this: the Jewish youth who values his tradition, who understands and appreciates his communal ties to Israel, is not a radical extremist. Unlike the wild revolutionaries -- who are little ships, flying big flags, full of sail but short of ballast -- he has a ballast that includes the diligent study of a culture and tradition that is invaluable in and of itself. He knows that this tradition is not just a ritual formula to be invoked in times and all places. He comprehends that something so valuable and stabilizing should never have been allowed to become the distant periphery of so many Jewish lives in the world's largest Jewish community.

There are some who will argue that the possibility that Jews and Jewish students will be sought out as scapegoats is remote in this country and in these times. They will point to the level of tolerance maintained by the nation in the face of vigorous protest against the war.

It is true that this country has been able to absorb without the loss of essential liberty the protest of the Vietnam War, but that is because of the tradition of the law, reinforced by the bulwark of an independent judiciary. However, in the final analysis, a free people cannot rely upon the courts to maintain freedom: Courts can only curb and resist temporary excesses. Essentially, free expression and democracy can be preserved only when a nation's people are committed to those freedoms to the depths of their very beings. Courts cannot consistently lead a people to freedom.

Bear this in mind: Our country is listing dangerously to the right. In the Presidential election of 1968 two candidates, Wallace and Nixon, captured 57 percent of the vote--a vote that approached the Johnson landslide of only four years before. That fact should flash a mental TILT sign in the minds of concerned individuals. The tilt is not to the left but directly to the right. And if I had to predict whether the threat to the Jew in the 1970s would come from the left of the right, I would have to point out that the country is not at present in a pre-revolutionary mood politically.

History suggests the proposition that the Jew is never really safe in either a right-wing or a left-wing society. Although he may prosper temporarily in either, he lives always at the lip of a precipice. The Jew is caught in the middle. Historically, he is the man who, in the mind of the capitalist, deserves virulent hatred because he is a communist -- while in the mind of the capitalist, it is the Jew who is targeted for singular slander because he is a communist. Doing or not doing, the Jew is damned.

The record of modern history indicates that the Jew has found security only in the moderate climate of liberal democracy; he must therefore be dedicated to its principles--not only because it alone explicitly expresses his view of the way the world ought to be governed and the way he ought to live, but because it is the only system in which the Jewish community can survive. We Jews cannot sit smugly on the cushions of the old liberal banners, but--despite anger at what some Jews regard as the excesses of former allies--we must continue to support the liberal coalition. And thus, despite the fact that the term liberal is used as an epithet by extremists of both left and right, I wear it as a badge with unbounded pride.

Evolutionary democratic governments with built-in processes of procedural reform have been exceptions in the history of the world. Jewish peace is therefore exceptional--and after three thousand years, it is far too precious to be compromised today. Let us continue our commitment to liberal causes and our support of liberal programs--and let us do so as Jews and through Jewish institutions, clearly identified.

But if, after we have done all we can to defend the bulwarks and walls that protect us, the threats do materialize and trouble comes, we can still survive. And our ultimate survival will depend upon psychological preparedness, from the knowledge that suffering is worthwhile when it is for a worthy cause. To this end, the Jew must recover his self-worth, and strengthen his knowledge of his Judaic heritage. A generation of young Jews rooted in their own values and traditions can be relied upon to have a continuing commitment to the survival of the Jewish community and to the kind of America in which all minorities will be safe.

T The recipe is not new; it was suggested more than two thousand years ago by Hillel:

If I am not for myself, who will be for me? But if I am for myself alone, what good am I? And if not now, when?

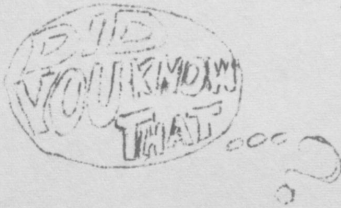

RABBI'S MESSAGE

At the OVPTV toot this past month, members of our Youth Group had an opportunity to hear a Dr. Rosenblum from Cleveland speak to them about the plight of the Jews in Soviet Russia. We heard once more their depressing saga of fear and repression and the brave efforts that some of them have made to leave that country and to immigrate to Israel. The saga of our 300,000,000 co-religionists in Russia is one which I am certain we have all heard or read about a number of times, but is distressing to us each time we hear it.

One of the questions that was asked of Dr. Rosenblum after his talk was: "What can the individual do to help the Jews in Russia?" and this time he had an answer for us. We can send Rosh Hashanah cards to some of the 400 Soviet Jews who signed appeals to their government and to the U.S. requesting permission to leave.

This idea was immediately accepted as a good one, and our TYG members decided right there, not only to do it themselves, but to offer this opportunity for personal involvement to our congregation. To this end they have obtained 100 packets of 5 Rosh Hashanah cards, each containing mailing instructions and the names and addresses of 5 of the Russian Jews who signed the petition to immigrate. They have these for sale at \$1.00 per packet, and they can be obtained from Joe Rosenberg at 266-2085.

These cards are received. Just this week I received a note from one of the men to whom I sent a card last month. He was most appreciative.

I think the TYG's effort on behalf of this cause is most commendable and deserves our whole hearted support. Call Joe today and participate with our teenagers in a truly life saving Mitzvah.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Our High Holidays begin this coming Wednesday evening when we shall gather in the sanctuary to usher in the New Year. As we look about at the world, we can justifiably wonder what sort of year it will be. As one news editor commented, "As a young newspaperman during the world depression I never felt the despair I am beginning to feel now about the future of our country." Riots, bombings, hijackings, drugs, crime, pollution, and unrest are daily subjects of discussion and concern. It is difficult to be other than a pessimist as one confronts this barrage of discouraging news every morning. The beauty pageants and heart transplant stories do little to alleviate the depression caused by the other news.

And yet on Rosh Hashanah, one ought to say something encouraging, something to renew one's hopes and strength for the new year. At this juncture I must admit this is not easy to do. As Jews, the Middle East situation gives us cause for fear; as Americans, both our external and our internal policies seem to be inadequate to the problems confronting us. And yet - life must continue. We cannot give up; for to do so would be to surrender to our despair, in essence to commit suicide. And this of course, we would deny with every ounce of our beings.

Thus, I am reminded of the name which a congregation of Jews, who escaped from Hitler's inferno and settled in Buenos Aires, called their synagogue - Lamrot Hakol - In spite of everything. A typical Jewish attitude, and one which needs reiterating at this time - in spite of all of the discouraging and depressing news - let me wish you a most happy New Year. Perhaps things will improve and our wishes will have been fulfilled.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

The Holidays are always a strenuous time for me. There is so much to do and to get in order - prepare sermons, coordinate the music, see to it that ushers and pulpit guests are assigned, and work through the many other details which are necessary for our services to occur with a minimum of confusion and disruption.

Unfortunately, all of these details have a tendency to overshadow the real meaning of the Holidays - the purpose for which we cease our daily routines and gather in the Sanctuary for most of the day in prayer and worship. This kind of misfocus is not unusual. We become so involved in what we are doing that we forget the underlying purpose for our activity - like social agencies that forget they are set up to help people and end up squabbling among themselves. Therefore, my presence on the pulpit the whole day of Yom Kippur helps me to refocus my attention on the reasons that I have been so busy. It is not just to see that things go smoothly but to help provide a meaningful worship experience for me so that I don't have to worry about countless details during the service and can concentrate on how I can apply the message of the Holidays to the way I live.

In the same way, as you come to the Sanctuary for the Holidays consider why you are present - not to chat with friends, or to show off a new wardrobe - but to concentrate on the worship and consider its applications to the way in which you live.

Judaism does not provide us with mediators between man and God. Each one of us confronts God on his own in worship. The message of the Holidays is for each of us individually. It is not just our physical presence in the Sanctuary that is important, but far more, how we apply the words of prayer to our lives.

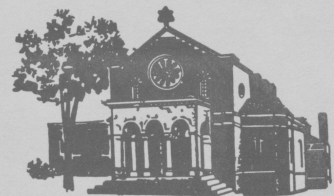

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

The nip in the air and the color of the foliage reminds us that summer has past and that fall is upon us. And with fall comes our Sukkot celebration, marking the conclusion of the growing year and ingathering of the crops - a process which was well portrayed in the October 5th edition of the Courier Journal by a half page spread of Dave Bolotin harvesting his corn.

The article to which I refer also mentioned that 20% of the crop was lost to the blight this year, a situation which could have had serious consequences if it had been much worse.

This kind of damage to a harvest is a continual threat. New crop diseases develop an immunity to the old sprays and we have to hope that we can control them before they get out of hand. In addition, too much rain or a drought could affect the harvest. Furthermore, farm subsidies and acreage allotment could have an effect on the yield. In a world whose population appears to be growing so rapidly, the control and production of food becomes a matter of great concern. A small fluctuation in the harvest can have devastating effects - not just in India or other countries where this sort of occurrence is not uncommon, but also in our country, where we are far more accustomed to a surplus and to wasting food.

Our celebration of Sukkot ought to remind us of the need for an adequate food supply, that it is not something we should take for granted, but a blessing for which we should be thankful, now that the crop is in.

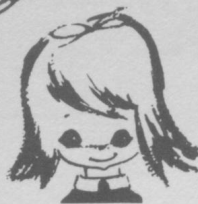
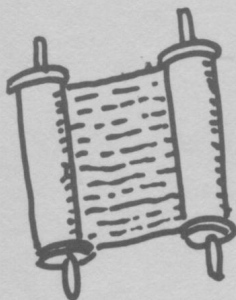

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

Next Friday evening we shall have our annual Consecration Service, a service at which we initiate young students in our Religious School into their Jewish studies with a special blessing and by giving them a small challah and some honey - symbolic of the sweetness of Jewish learning and the hope that it will sustain these young people as they grow and confront life and its problems.

Consecration symbolizes something else - the continuity of the generations of Israel, that ours is a religion concerned with the continuity of the generations, the handing down of our traditions from father to son to grandson. For this reason, many congregations involve three generations of a family in this service.

This additional meaning of the observance is also brought home in our concern that our children marry within Judaism, for all too often an exogenous marriage results in children who are not brought up as Jews and we see the continuity of the generations broken. When this occurs we are distressed. We feel the ancient covenant we made with God at Sinai has been forsaken. The grandchildren will not be Bar Mitzvah, will not participate in Seder, will not stand under the Chupah - all rituals indicative of one's being a Jew.

Thus as we observe our Consecration ceremony, we join with happy parents in this hour of joy, when we witness still another generation of children beginning to learn about the story of Judaism.

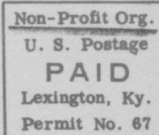

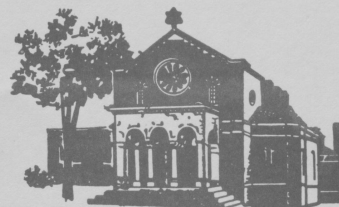

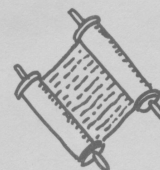

FROM YOUR RABBI . . .

We are finding more and more that Jewish Congregations realize the need to expand their areas of concern beyond the confines of the synagogue building and into the community at large. As I read the Bulletins I receive from other Temples this fact becomes more and more apparent to me. I learn of tutoring projects, trips for the underprivileged, kindergartens for ghetto youngsters and other similar projects.

However, this form of community involvement has not been a part of our program up till now. It was a gap which concerned me and about which I had given a good bit of thought as to how we might fill it. This past summer I was delighted when the opportunity appeared to do just that, when LARC, of which we are a member, needed three religious institutions to co-sponsor a low rent housing project. I made the suggestion to the Temple Board that Temple Adath Israel be a sponsor and it was approved, with a number of members noting that housing is a major community problem in Lexington and we would be filling a real need by doing this.

Our participation in this housing project will take the support of the whole congregation. It is not something that we can do half heartedly or ill-informed. It is a major communal responsibility, and needs our thorough understanding and support. Therefore Mr. Jack Reeves, who has served as the chairman of the LARC committee investigating and setting up the plans for the housing project, will be with us on Tuesday evening, October 27 at 7:30 P.M. in the Vestry to explain the details of this effort. Plan to be present to hear what he has to say, to ask him questions if details are not clear and to gain a fuller appreciation of this worthwhile undertaking.

I look forward to seeing you at this significant meeting on the 27th.

LOW INCOME HOUSING PROJECT

Our committee for developing a low income housing project continues their planning. Two sites are now under consideration for this housing project and we hope to have an announcement of the final selection in a few weeks. As was indicated in our last General Assembly, we need three individual sponsoring churches in addition to LARC to sponsor this project. We had hoped to get this sponsorship from a wide diversity of communities. We are happy to report that the Temple Adath Israel has agreed to be one of the sponsoring institutions, along with Wesley United Methodist Church. We hope to be able to announce the third sponsoring church in the near future. It now appears that we will have a sponsoring institution from our Jewish, Protestant and Catholic communities. Our black religious community is represented through Wesley United Methodist Church. We feel that this will be a great witness to the people of Lexington that our various religious, ethnic and racial groups are interested in the social problems of our city. The incorporated housing committee will be made up of five representatives at large from LARC, and two representatives each from the sponsoring churches and synagogue. We feel that this is one of the most important projects ever undertaken by LARC. A report on this project will be given at the General Assembly on Monday, November 9 at 7:30 P.M. at Quinn Chapel Church 744 Charles Avenue.

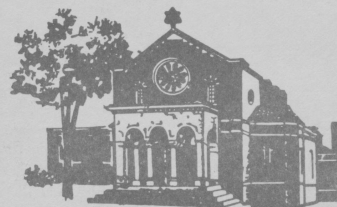

A Happy Last Birthday?

Rosh Hashanah, in Jewish tradition, commemorates the beginning of the earth; therefore the year 5731, although highly unscientific, is 5731 years after creation, according to biblical reckoning. Thus our holiday, among other things, marks the birthday of the world. And it may very well be the last birthday that this earth will observe. Next year at this time, there may be no world in which to celebrate a Rosh Hashanah - no Temple Adath Israel, not Lexington, no USA, no earth. Mankind may have destroyed it either bit by bit, or in one mighty flash of atomic power. We may very well be nearing the end of days spoken about by Amos - a day of "darkness and not light even very dark, and no brightness in it." Even now we may be witnessing the Armageddon, the final battle of the world, of which Christian tradition speaks.

All of this, of course, is most frightening. No one wants to predict the doom of mankind, the end of civilization, and yet when one looks at the state of the world today, such an occurrence is not outside the realm of possibility. And we are beginning to find serious critics of our age, such as Rabbi Richard Rubenstein of the University of Pittsburgh, suggesting that our era can be described as the time of the last days, "a term not necessarily meaning this year, but which ought to cause us to give serious consideration to the gravity of our situation."

When we stop to look about, what do we see? Frankly, not too much about which we can be overly optimistic.

We find a continuing possibility of mega-murder, of overkill, as it is more politely called - Russia and the US arming to the teeth, not to annihilate each other only once, but four or five times over - in one glorious blinding flash, destroying millions of human lives as one might step on an ant hill. We find government leaders apparently speaking of this kind of murder in rational terms, as if the annihilation of mankind can be a subject of public debate and opinion. We continue to build up a balance of terror with the Russians, willing to spend billions of dollars on a MPV system, forgetting that no balance of terror is proof against the possibility of a nation's leader becoming suicidally psychotic and resolving to take the world with him in an apocalyptic act of self-destruction. The possibility of this sort of behavior is one of the reasons that I react with fear when I hear that President Nixon has seen the film, "Patton" three times.

Or, let us consider another disquieting aspect of what is occurring, as we celebrate the last birthday of the world - terrorism. It seems to be increasing in alarming proportions. People living in our major urban centers fear for their lives. They will not go out on the streets after dark. Three policemen in California have been slain in broad daylight within the past few months. Our nation's capitol has been categorized as a jungle by those who live there. This past spring a townhouse in New York City exploded and investigation of the wreckage uncovered the remains of an immense arsenal in the basement. Last month a building on the campus of the University of Wisconsin was blown up, with loss of innocent life and as well as years of scientific research. Airplanes are hijacked to Cuba and Jordan. Day by day we read of terrorist activity throughout the world, activity which could spread in magnitude and well destroy mankind bit by bit.

And if the possibility of mega-murder and terrorism on this birthday were not enough, we are also confronted by a large number of people who say "to hell" with this world as they have inherited it, who cop out because they feel it is not worth struggling to live in it. And so they set up communes in rural areas, or flee to remote islands in an attempt to escape what we call modern civilization. But perhaps the best example of this behavior is found in the burgeoning use of drugs among our youth, drugs which are initially intended to remove the death and the terror from their consciousness, to turn our sordid world into a lovely garden of psychodelic flowers and fuzzy reality, and which may end up by destroying the addict, but you know, it is just possible that these young people enter the drug scene because they see all too clearly what the end of our world may be and have given up in despair because they do not have the blindness, or the stupidity to stay with it - or if you prefer the guts and the concern. And so they try to destroy themselves before the world will do it to them.

A happy last birthday world!

But wait, Rosh Hashanah is also Yom Hazicaron - the Day of Memorial - a day of remembering. But what can we remember in a world that we might prefer to forget? Perhaps we can find an answer in our liturgy of this evening - Zacreynu L'Hayim remember us unto life, as we prayed earlier in our worship. 'Remember us unto life, O God who delightest in life and inscribe us in the Book of Life.' But what is this

life - the length of a woman's hemline, whether above or below the knee, the parties we give or attend with extravagant food and drink, the things we purchase and accumulate for our material comfort or vanity, the pettinesses that give us satisfaction each day? In the words of the song that Peggy Lee made popular this year - "If that is all there is my friend, then let's keep dancing, let's break out the booze." For if that is all there is to our life, as we confront this Posh Hashanah, then let's keep dancing, let's have a ball for life is not worth saving. The end of the earth will have little significance because our life had little significance.

On the other hand, when we say, *remember us unto life*, if life means something more than hemlines, parties and the accumulation of wealth, if it means that we give serious consideration to what we are doing with the one life we have, whether we are making it count for something worthwhile in our relationship to others, whether we are reaching out beyond our petty satisfactions and good times, whether there will be anything to say in our eulogy, whether we are at least trying to ask ourselves the embarrassing (though) unanswerable questions about ultimate purpose in our lives, then and only then perhaps we may be worthy of a prayer asking that we be remembered unto life - for our life will be worth remembering, because of how we lived and what we stood for.

The late Protestant theologian, Paul Tillich spoke of this when he wrote about man's "ultimate concern" as something beyond himself, that it is "not a movement of a special section or a special function of man's total being... (but) it transcends every special impact as well as the totality of them and... has a decisive impact on each of them." This concern points to the ultimate which is beyond all of man's earthly strivings - to life in its very broadest terms. In large part it is our need for a reawakened awareness for the ultimate concern in our own personal lives that is involved in our plea, *remember us unto life*, for each of us wants his life to have meaning, purpose - something more than the trivia which seems to confront us each morning as we check our calendars. How can this be achieved? This is one of those unanswerable questions, for there are no simple answers, no facile solutions that will satisfy each of us. But at least we can begin by asking ourselves what are the ultimate concerns in my life which I should reflect as I live day by day, and how do I communicate them to those with whom I work and with whom I live. If we do this, perhaps the *Hayim*, the life, which we seek will begin to reflect the ultimates for which we strive.

On this, quite possibly the last birthday of our world, and in typical Jewish fashion, we have prayed for life in the face of the cataclysm which might end it all. Therefore let each of us consider what life ought to mean in its fullest sense, so that if we survive this year, we will be remembered unto a life that has some meaning and value, that reflects a concern far beyond our personal satisfactions, a life that bespeaks the ultimates of life, for which we yearn, even though we never achieve them.

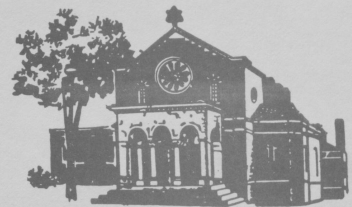

This coming month is Jewish Book Month - an annual event intended to make us aware of the nature and extent of Jewish literature. As part of our celebration of this month, Leona Stern, our Temple librarian has posted a display of book jackets from some of the new books which have been purchased for our Temple Library. In addition, the program of the forthcoming Sisterhood meeting will be a book review by Marcia Blacker of John Updike's latest novel, "Beck: A Book," which is a fictionalized account of an American Jewish novelist - of whom there are a great many today.

The nature and scope of Jewish literature is vast. It includes such diverse works as "Portnoy's Complaint," and "The Tales of the Hasidim" by Buber, "The Ben Shimon Hagadol" and Steinberg's "Basic Judaism," which we use in Confirmation Class. It reflects the experiences, the outlooks, the history the hopes, the ideas, the rituals of an historic people - the Jewish people - of which you and I are a part. It tells us where we have been and what we have done. It informs us, it inspires us, and it can confound us.

Literature has been the major vehicle for the transmission of Judaism throughout the ages - the Bible, the Mishnah, the Talmud, the Midrash, the Codes and coming right down to our day. These works have never been the exclusive property of any one group in Judaism. All Jews were urged to be familiar with them and Jewish literature is still the property for all Jews. Read some Jewish books this month. We have a goodly number from which to choose in the Temple Library. Do so!

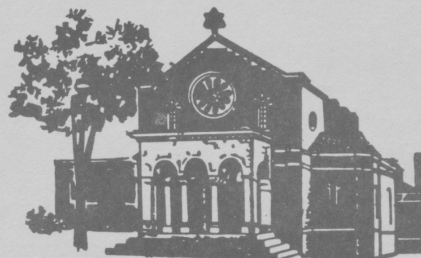

Rabbi's Message

Drug abuse is becoming an increasing problem in this country. One merely has to read the newspaper to become aware of this fact of modern life. However, it is not a new problem. Don't forget that the Narcotics Hospital (for which Lexington is famous) was built 35 years ago, and the Federal government must have considered it sufficient a problem then to have spent the money.

As Jewish chaplain at the Hospital, perhaps I am more aware and involved in the problem than the ordinary citizen. For this reason, we have had two OVFTY Conclaves here within the past six years dealing with the subject. I feel it is one that our young people need to confront in its least glamorous forms.

My work out there has involved me with Dr. Gorodetzky and Dr. Christian, in the book on drugs which they have recently published, and for which I am presently preparing a Teachers' Guide with the help of Barbara Gorodetzky, for publication by The Union of American Hebrew Congregations, so that the book may be used in Jewish Religious Schools or by Temple Youth Groups, not just for drug education, but for attitudinal development.

I have also become involved with drug problems on a state level and served on a committee of The Commission on Children and Youth which discussed the subject. As a partial result of our efforts, there will be an all day, statewide Conference on Drug Abuse on December 3 at the Conference Center in Louisville which will consider the matter in detail and this conference is open to every citizen of our state and points up the urgency of the problem for us.

And as an additional note on this serious matter, I am enclosing in this issue of the Temple Bulletin, a copy of a letter I received from a former patient at the Narcotics Hospital, a nice Jewish boy from a good Jewish home. It is a heart rending letter, but one which says more than I could ever say, to convey the tragedy of drug abuse. The boy he speaks about was one of the patients from the hospital who participated in our Conclave last spring. I do hope you will read it and share it with others. It deserves wide circulation.

October 19, 1970

Dear Rabbi Leffler,

I hate to be a bearer of bad news but I knew you'd want to know. This morning (Monday) at 5:30 A.M., Stanley Berg passed away. He died at his home from an overdose of heroin. He just got out of jail this past Friday and I guess he started shooting-up as soon as he hit the street.

I'll not pass judgement on Stan. As you know, he and I were the best of friends for years and I am very shaken up over his tragic death.

His life was too short - only 22 years, and he didn't get a chance to learn anything about the world. The guy was always begging (in his own way) for love, but for some reason was never able to find any. His parents couldn't give him what he needed, nor could his brother. I'm not sure if I could have or not. I'll never know because I never gave him the chance. I was always so concerned about myself that I completely ignored Stanley when he needed me most. Had I not been so selfish thinking he would hinder my plans, I might have shared some of the breaks I got, such as jobs, school, etc. I'm not blaming myself for his death, but I'm just wondering if things wouldn't have been different if I would have taken the time to understand him. It's too late now, I know, but I wish when we (Stan and I) first started smoking grass we would have stayed with grass. Or when Stan first started using heroin, I wish I would have been strong enough to reject him for it rather than going along with him like I did do.

Sure, during my four years of using drugs, I suffered. I suffered a lot! I spent much time in jail, Lexington, etc., I lost a fine wife, a beautiful home, and all respect from my family and friends. These things I can have again if I work hard enough, but now I am suffering more than I ever did - or ever will! I lost the best friend I ever had because of drugs. Stan's friendship, no matter how much trouble we both got into, was truly sincere. Before heroin, we would have done anything for each other. This friendship, no matter how hard I work or how long I look, can never be replaced. I knew Stan in ways no one else did, just as he knew me. I knew him so well. I could almost predict his every move. Now, Rabbi Leffler, Stan is gone, and all of a sudden I feel kind of incomplete. I could always go to Stan when I was lonely and he would always be there. No more though. Now he won't be here physically, that's for sure, but I assure you that he will always be with me in spirit. He's gone and now I have to carry on for the both of us.

I I have already started doing good. I've been working in the mail office at The American University in Washington, D.C. and I've been going to classes two nights a week also. I get two courses paid for by the University as a benefit from working there. Each Monday night from 6 P.M. to 8:45 P.M. I have my "Introduction to Philosophy" course which I enjoy a lot and every Thursday night from 7:30 P.M. to 10:15 P.M. I have my "Juvenile Delinquency and Youth Crime" course. So with working 8 hours a day and studying every night I don't have too much time for anything else. This much time consumed surely helps to keep me away from and my mind off of drugs. I've been working very hard trying to make something of myself and now I'm even going to work harder for Stan as well as myself. I know he wants to see me do good in this world and I won't let him down. We grew up as a team, so even though he's gone I still am carrying the ball for the two of us. When I succeed - we both will succeed! I will succeed too!!!

I doubt seriously after the tragic way Stanley died, if I could ever look at a needle again - least of all stick one in my arm. Never again, Rabbi Leffler. If I had any doubts before about going back to drugs, I damn sure have none now! It's unfortunate, but maybe this shock is what I needed to face reality.

Please pray for Stan, Rabbi Leffler, as I will every day. Whenever you hear his name mentioned or whenever you think of him let those words and those thoughts be good. He paid dearly for his mistakes and now that he's gone I feel anytime he is thought of he should be thought of for the good things he's done - not the bad

things. That's how he was thought of when he was alive. There was a lot of good in that kid - only you had to know him to see it.

He wasn't bad - he just never had the love and understanding necessary to give him any security. The most secure I've ever seen him was in Lexington. At least there were some people who really did love him - me, you, Toye, and a lot of other people who got to know him well.

Please let Toye know about Stan. He often talked about how much he cared for her.

Thanks for letting me cry on your shoulder, Rabbi. I'll keep in touch with you and let you know what's what. The funeral is tomorrow morning so I'll close now and try to get some sleep.

BETWEEN YOU AND ME

The 1970 political campaign was a failure. It's not that the wrong men won; more than this, the spirit of Democracy lost.

Democracy requires the periodic reformulation of purpose, and the careful examination by free men of the issues which confront them. This is the intent of elections. The ultimate end of an election is the marshalling of the public will for the solution of our public problems.

Certainly men more easily respond to slogans which arouse emotions. And this past election demonstrated how readily office seekers will use this expedient in place of engaging themselves in the more challenging effort of speaking to the issues.

We are no better prepared today to face up to the problems of violence, pornography, war, ecology, unemployment, drugs, etc., than we were two months ago. In this respect, Democracy lost, and the political campaign was a failure.

The election merely served to divide the country further on a partisan basis when the issues have little to do with political parties.

Now we are at our Thanksgiving Holiday. We can be united as Americans on this occasion because we all cherish the spirit of freedom and justice upon which this nation was founded. May this Thanksgiving represent a deeper understanding of the responsibility imposed upon free men than did the election. If freedom is to prevail, Democracy must function creatively, and morally, to confront and redirect the destructive forces at work in our society.

From the Rabbi's Desk

This past week was Thanksgiving vacation from college and it afforded me an opportunity to spend time with some of our students who were home for the elongated week end. It was a delight to be with them, to hear them talk of their experiences and to try to answer some of their questions about a Jewish view of what they are experiencing.

As I spoke with them I tried to relate what they were saying to some of the subjects we had discussed in Confirmation Class and my efforts there to give them a Jewish background adequate for some of their college experiences. But unfortunately, tenth graders had difficulty in playing the "academic leap-frog" which would be necessary for this sort of religious preparation. Nonetheless, as I tried to reexplain some of the things about which we spoke then, it was a great deal easier than when they were in the tenth grade.

All of this points up once more, one of the difficulties which the Jewish student (and I suspect the Christian student also) faces when he arrives on campus. His understanding of his religion is pediatric. He has a reasonably mature outlook on science, history, social science, math, etc., but his views on his religion are at about a fourth grade level. Part of this is due to inadequate Religious School training (a problem on which we are working), part of it is due to the attitude of "I dare you to teach me any thing" with which he came to Religious School, and part due to the fact that it is difficult to teach youngsters how to understand a religion such as Judaism, which requires a modicum of maturity to comprehend.

And so when these young people return and ask questions as they did, one can say: "It wasn't a total loss. There is hope."

The temptation is almost irresistible, particularly in light of current events in the Middle East, to emphasize the military aspect of the Maccabean victory over the Syrians in 165 B.C.E. Physical prowess, a primitive hang-over from the days when man was judged by his ability to subjugate nature and his enemies by brute force because he knew no other way, still outranks moral prowess as the measure of virility. But it has never been the Jewish criterion of manliness, and even today the hard-pressed Israelis deplore the need to destroy rather than to build.

Antiochus was not so much bent upon the physical destruction of the Jews; he had a greater goal. He wanted them to forsake their Judaism in favor of paganism. He was not the only enemy of the Jewish religion; he was only among the first. For he, and many after him, clearly recognized that as long as Judaism survived, its moral teachings would make the world unsafe for pure greed, cruelty, physical power, ignorance and dictators to thrive unchallenged.

His armies, of course, like those of others later, could not kill the idea so powerful, so compelling, so passionately central to its adherents, that to die for it was the least of their worries. The Jews suffered ridicule for it, poverty, ostracism, and every other form of death-in-life that ugly minds could contrive. The Jews lived for their idea.

That is why, when some people say that they can be Jewish without knowing Judaism, they are wrong. Our enemies of the past and the present have sought to kill our idea, of which our persons are merely the visible symbol. They have yet to learn what we know: that if Judaism dies, the light of the world dies with it.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

One of the facilities of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations which is available to members of our congregation is the Union Camp Institute in Zionsville, Indiana, a suburb of Indianapolis. The camp is operated by the Ohio Valley Council of the Union and is primarily intended for the use of congregations in this region. During the past summer we sent more than a dozen young people to the camp for different activities. They all returned home most enthusiastic about their experiences.

Jack Miller and I both serve on the committee of our Region which is charged with overseeing the operation of this camp, and we were in Cincinnati this past week at a meeting for this purpose. Among the subjects we discussed were the schedule for the coming summer, programming, and of course, the ever present subject of the budget.

I mention all of this to you because the Camp-Institute is a function of this Region which deserves our fullest support. It provides a summer living experience for our youngsters in a Jewish setting, where the emphasis is not only on play, but also on study and the broadening of their Jewish knowledge and background. The camp also hosts the OVEY-toot, which our teenagers attend with great gusto and enthusiasm.

Unfortunately, this very fine facility is very much in need of funds to pay off the debt on a fine building program which was undertaken a few years ago. About \$8,000 a year is spent to cover the interest on this indebtedness, a sum which could be far better spent on giving our children additional supervision and facilities. The only way in which this indebtedness can be decreased is by contributions from members of the congregations of the Region. Members of our congregation have made, and even paid up, some of their pledges. But I think we can do even better. If you agree with me, I'll be happy to forward your check to the Camp-Institute Office in Cincinnati. It is a worthwhile cause (and you may be looking for a few extra at the end of the tax year.)

JCA STUDY

The following is a summary of the JCA Study of our Lexington and Central Kentucky Jewish Committee accomplished during the past year:

Methods

Participation in Jewish and non-Jewish activities was tabulated for adults (over age 17), male and female, and children. Non-Jewish activities were broken down as action (e.g. civic groups) and social. Jewish activities were tabulated as congregational participation, adult male, adult female, and children. In addition, cross tabulations were done by age and length of time in the community.

Results

1. The Jewish community as a whole is an active group, encompassing a broad spectrum of activities both Jewish and non-Jewish.
 - a. Women are more active than men in Jewish activities.
 - b. Participation of all groups tends to be higher in non-Jewish activities, excluding congregation membership (and, therefore, possible attendance at services, which was not specifically asked for in the questionnaire). This is especially seen in the social and recreational areas.
 - c. The least active group in Jewish activities of all adult classifications is the 30 to 40 year old male and/or those males who have been in Lexington less than 5 years. However, this is true only for Jewish activities, since this group is active in non-Jewish activities and is the most active group in the action category.
2. Except for Sunday or Hebrew School, children are not actively participating in Jewish activities. The heaviest participation is in the Youth Group, in which 56% report participation.

Conclusions

The target populations for new activities would seem to be (in order of priorities):

1. Children
 - a. Under age 6
 - b. Between ages 6 and 14
 - c. Over age 14
2. Young male adults and/or newcomers

With regard to the children, the availability of activities may be of prime importance. The only group for which no specific Jewish activity is available is the pre-Sunday schoolers. For those in Sunday and/or Hebrew School these religious activities may suffice for the time being, although the Young Judea experience appeared successful. The 14 and older group has the Youth Group, although it might be noted that a strong minority (44%) do not participate.

For the younger men activities such as B'nai B'rith and Men's Club are available, yet there seems to be relatively small participation. The data does suggest that the 30-40 age group is active in non-Jewish affairs, especially in action organizations (compared to other age groups). This suggests an orientation of action that might be incorporated into currently constituted groups or the formation of a new group.

There is great activity of all groups in non-Jewish social and recreational areas. This suggests a possible avenue of participation which is specifically Jewish, but serves the social and recreational needs of the Jewish community.

No doubt Rabbi Levi told you that we are a small new congregation here. We have about sixty five families (or units) and no resident minister. However Melbourne which is five hundred miles away, is very good to us and we look forward to about three or four Rabbinal visits annually, one of which will be Rabbi Levi himself, for Chanukah. We hold Friday night services fortnightly but manage to have a fair attendance at these services and at all the Yomtovim. Our school is run by voluntary Staff and has a high standard. Somehow we have a solid backbone of interested and hardworking members and are proud of what we have achieved. There is a small Jewish Community in this State and very few of them are anywhere near well-to-do. Most of our young people go inter-state to study and we have an uphill struggle. I tell you all this so that you can realize how much appreciated your generous gesture was and we shall always be glad to have anything that you can no longer use.

I wish you and your congregation every success in the future."

From the Rabbi's Desk

Hanukkah begins this year with the lighting of the first candle on Tuesday evening, December 22.

Elsewhere in this issue of the Bulletin, you will find the blessings transliterated and translated for you. There are three on the first night and two thereafter.

The celebration of Hanukkah marks the struggle of the Maccabees against Antiochus Epiphanes, the first time that any group of people stood up and fought the government to worship as they chose and not as the government dictated and so the concept of freedom of religion was born - almost 2000 years before it took root in western culture.

We take this freedom for granted today in America. It is pretty much assumed. But I wonder, how would we react if this were no longer the case, if the government required us to worship as it dictated. I asked this question of the Confirmation Class recently and received a number of answers - that they might become Marranos, that they could just as easily be something else, and that they would leave this country, since it would no longer stand for what they believed in. Not a pleasant subject to consider, but one that is relevant to our Hanukkah celebration. Let us hope we never have to face it as a reality.

HIGH HOLY DAYS IN LIBERAL SYNAGOGUE IN ISRAEL

Rabbi Tovia Ben-Chorin, Sabra HUC-JIR graduate writes the following about the High Holy Days at Ramat Gan:

The Ten Days of Repentance are behind us and we can once more take a deep breath and say: It was a moving experience and even awe-inspiring experience.

This year, as previously, we have proven once again that an esthetic Israeli service can attract a large public. However, one must be realistic: There is still a vast gap between attending a once-a-year service (when the whole country is in the appropriate mood) and an active commitment to Progressive Judaism in general or to a congregation or any other type of framework in particular.

What is particular about an Israeli High Holy Day Service? There are four types of people attending our High Holy Day Services: those who have some recollection from far in the past of a traditional service; those who have never been to services; those who have occasionally attended an Orthodox service, but never tried to familiarize themselves with the traditional prayer book; and last, but certainly not least, the hundred-odd families who comprise our Congregation and their relatives. (In our community there are only a handful full of people, American and European, who have any previous experience abroad with Liberal services.

In addition, one has to take into account the various customs which vividly prevail in Israel, of which the accepted "Minhag Ashkenaz" and the Minhag Sephardi are only two among many.

The availability of material which can be used in the service, which does not come from the traditional sources, has a great impact on the Services in Ramat Gan. This year I was fortunate enough to receive material prepared for Rosh-Ha-Shana and Yom Kippur by the Cultural Committee of the Ihud Hakevutzot V'Ha-Kibbutzim and by the Inter-Cultural Committee of the Kibbutz Movement, both of which I used in my Sermons and Services.

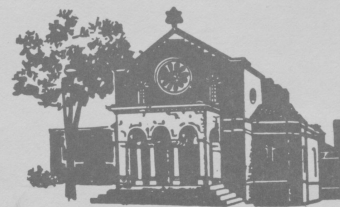

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

One of the purposes of my current trip to Israel is to try to make some special arrangements for the tour I plan to lead in the late spring. There are special activities in that country which the World Union for Progressive Judaism supports - a Youth Village in Ben Shemen which is a new project of NPTS, the HUC School of Archeology in Jerusalem, the Leo Baeck in Haifa, and a number of congregations that are affiliated with the World Union. We know very little about these institutions, and I think this is not good. Therefore I plan to visit some of them and also see whether I can plan programs or tours of them for later this year.

The World Union has many facets, about which, unfortunately, most of us know very little. This will be one way of making its work more vital for us.

But there are other ways, that require less effort and which can be just as worthwhile. One of these has become a Sisterhood project, the sending of old, no longer used Religious School textbooks to a congregation in Australia. A couple of weeks ago we printed a letter from the secretary of the congregation, Mrs. Bellon, expressing their appreciation for our efforts. As we continue to clear our shelves of these books, additional parcels will be sent.

There is a second project, for a congregation in Wellington, New Zealand, which I should like to institute, and that is to send them cancelled stamps which they can sell as a fund raising project. They would prefer commemorative, or stamps of higher denominations with a light postmark and no tears or creases. Just clip them, leaving about a half inch of envelope on all sides. When you have a reasonable number, either bring to the Temple, and I will forward them, or perhaps you might like to forward them yourself to Mr. W. G. Minn, 4 Rangiora Avenue, Wellington 4, New Zealand, and strike up a pen pal relationship with him.

We need to know more about the World Union. Here are some ways in which this can be accomplished.
