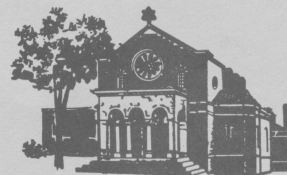

Rabbi's Message

My recent trip to Israel was most exciting and I am certain I shall be talking about it for a long while to come. I saw a great deal, from Sharm el Sheik in the south to Rosh Hanira in the north. I stayed with friends all of the time and so experienced how the Israelis live day by day also. As a result, they are very real people to me - people with warmth, people with problems, people with hopes, people with shortcomings.

And as this can be said for the individuals in that country, so too can it be said for the State. I saw many of the miracles that are being performed there - especially in two very different kinds of schools, both of which are doing marvels; in the Sinai I passed countless wrecked trucks and tanks, left behind by the Egyptians as they fled the Israeli advance in the Six Day War; I learned of the outstanding efforts being made to weld peoples of many different backgrounds into a single nation in a small time.

On the other hand, I also encountered many of its shortcomings - the red tape that makes our bureaucracy look like child's play; the disorganization which occurs when there is no history of logistics in business; the strange hold that orthodoxy has on Judaism there.

But in all of this, the positives far outweigh the negatives. Israel is a vital and exciting country.

And there is one more aspect of Israel which needs to be stated in the strongest terms. It should not only be a miracle for us, but rather we need to think of it as a country wanting to enter the world markets in the very worst way. And it is at this level that Israel deserves our greatest support.

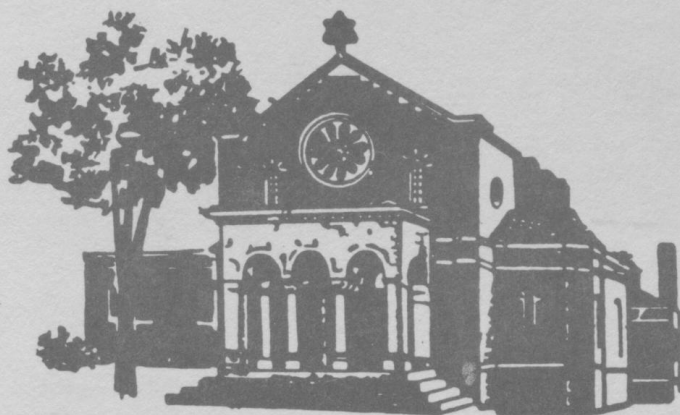

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Among the purposes for my recent trip to Israel was an attempt to make some arrangements for the tour from our Congregation which I shall be leading in late spring. In this regard, I think I have succeeded. I spent a good part of a morning with one of the directors of a travel bureau in Jerusalem and spoke of the many details of this sort of venture. I discussed the trip with friends there who made worthwhile suggestions concerning things of an unusual and exciting nature to include in the trip, as well as things to exclude. I visited and spoke with leaders of our Reform movement in Israel and will be arranging visits and programs at their institutions. In all of these my efforts were directed at making the trip something special - beyond the usual tour of antiquities and historic sights, but getting to the people of today - where the action is, as one of my friends described it.

Now there remains the task of making the plans specific, of laying out the day by day itinerary, of booking space in hotels, of making time schedules for the various visits, so that the trip runs smoothly and without unnecessary unpleasanties, if at all possible.

As things now stand, the trip will cost \$795 for the two weeks. This price will include air fare, hotel accommodations, breakfast, and supper when we are not in a city. In the city you may want to be with friends or relatives in the evening and not feel tied to the hotel dining room - or just sample the many different kinds of restaurants available.

The trip will leave on Monday, May 31, from Cincinnati (so that we do not have to transfer airports in New York). I should like to limit it to about 36 people. This is for three reasons. First, an Israeli bus will only hold about this number and a group loses a sense of unity if it cannot all be on one bus and is split up. Secondly, a group of this size can get about much more easily. There is no second bus to wait on or with which one has to keep up. And thirdly, from my own experience, a group any larger gets to be like a mob scene and they, the members of it, lose their individuality and come to feel they are being herded about. None of this do I want to be part of our tour.

I have received a number of inquiries from congregants and others who are interested. These people will be given first consideration. However, at this point, so that the necessary reservations for hotel and plane space can be made early (June is the start of the peak season), I should like to have firm commitments from members for this trip and also a deposit of \$100. This will permit the travel people with whom I am working to go ahead and complete the arrangements in which time is an important factor. Therefore, elsewhere in this Bulletin, you will find a coupon. If you wish to go, please complete it, tear it out and mail it to me today. Three dozen people are really not very many and I would hate to see you disappointed because you did not act quickly in this matter.

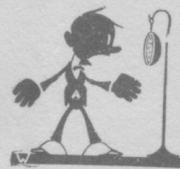

The following is quoted from the January issue of Hope, Newsletter of Lexington Association of Religious Communities:

LARC HOUSING PROJECT STEERING COMMITTEE HAS RECOMMENDATION

The LARC Housing Project Steering Committee has recommended that the LARC Housing fund be pledged as a gift to the Lexington-Fayette Housing Aid Corporation. A brochure describing Lexington-Fayette Housing Aid Corporation is enclosed for your information. This gift can be made without detracting from the LARC Housing Project since Housing Aid will immediately loan to LARC at least an equal amount for its "seed money" requirements. The gift will make the LARC money more effective by assisting Housing Aid to meet its "20% local share" requirement to be eligible for its Federal funding. Also, following the immediate needs of LARC for its project, the money would go back into Housing Aid and continue to work toward improved low-cost housing in the community. Through this procedure, the total effectiveness of the funds can be multiplied.

A representative from the Housing Aid Corporation will be present to answer any questions that you may have. We will then vote on the question of authorizing the commitment of our \$3,000.00 set aside for "seed money" to the Lexington-Fayette Housing Aid Corporation. Please come prepared to vote on this question.

We are elated to report to you that Central Baptist Church expects to become the third and final sponsoring religious community for our Housing project. The pastor, The Reverend Norman Shockley, reports that the church is very excited about this program. The project has the enthusiastic endorsement of the staff and related committees of the church. The congregational vote is expected to be taken on January 11. Therefore, we expect that by the time we have our business meeting on January 14, we will be ready to incorporate our housing project steering committee. These three religious communities, along with LARC, will name the housing project steering committee. This Committee will have eleven members. There will be two members each elected by the sponsoring religious communities, for a total of six. The other five members will be elected at large by LARC. Four of these members have been previously elected, and the fifth member will be elected at our next business meeting.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

I mentioned in last week's Bulletin that there are some special places that I should like to take the Congregational tour. But I was not specific. Let me give you some idea of what I have in mind.

I plan to be in touch with the Hebrew Union College School of Archeology in Jerusalem and arrange a lecture on the importance of archeology in Israel, and perhaps even to see their "dig" there.

I want to take the group to Ben Shemen to see the school there. NFTS is building a synagogue for the school and NFTY is sending teenagers there in the summer. But beyond this, the school is of interest because it is for culturally deprived youngsters. I spent a whole day there and was fascinated by the job of rebuilding lives which is accomplished.

I plan to arrange for a tour of the new Leo Baeck School in Jerusalem, which is still unfinished. I know the assistant director. When I spoke to him about doing this he was most enthusiastic and anxious to have us see his building and meet the students.

I spoke with the Sisterhood President in Tel Aviv and we shall have an opportunity to be with the members of that congregation on the Sabbath, to get to know them and also to hear of the problems of Reform in Israel (some of which I witnessed when I was there).

I also hope to go to an Absorption Center for new immigrants, to an industrial school run by ORT, and, if we can arrange it, see new immigrants arrive - a thrilling experience.

These things, of course, are all in addition to the many famous sights we shall visit - the Western Wall, Masada, The Galilee, and the major cities.

Once again, the coupon is in the Bulletin. If you forgot to clip it from last week's Bulletin, here is a second chance. Do it before the quota of 36 is reached.

TEN REASONS FOR STUDYING HEBREW

The late Dr. Gamoran, first Director of the Commission on Jewish Education, presented these reasons for studying Hebrew 30 years ago. That they are still vital and relevant emphasizes his perspicacity, as well as the need to fulfill them.

1. Hebrew is the language of the Bible.
2. Hebrew is the language of the prayer-book.
3. Ability to participate intelligently in the temple service depends upon a knowledge of Hebrew.
4. A knowledge of Hebrew, pursued intensively, opens such sources of Jewish literature as the Mishnah, medieval Hebrew, poetry, and philosophy, and modern Hebrew literature.
5. Hebrew serves as a bond of union between all the Jews throughout the world.
6. Hebrew is the spoken tongue of a majority of the Jews now living in Palestine (written a decade before the establishment of Israel) and of a great many others around the world.
7. Every Jewish group should provide Hebrew education for its children sufficiently intensive to develop a number who will be capable of Jewish leadership in the community.
8. Hebrew is a means of helping the Jewish people survive.
9. In every language there are certain concepts that are untranslatable, and can only be appreciated by those who know the language. This applies even more to Hebrew, for our literature concerns itself with a great many religious and ethical ideals, and thus reflects the noble spirit of our people.
10. The emotional values derived from study of Hebrew cannot be attained in any other way. They serve most effectively to integrate the child into the Jewish group.

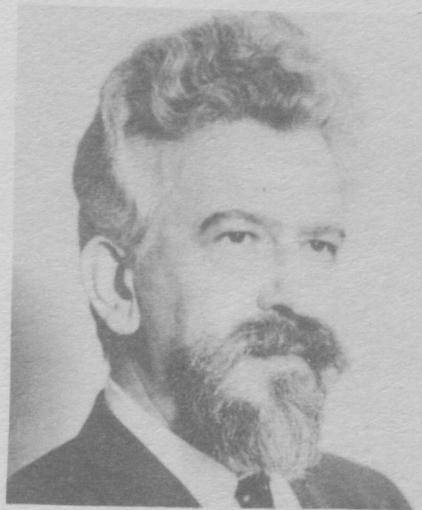
A children's concert will be given at 2.30 P.M. and the adult concert will be at 8:00 P.M., both at Ohavay Zion Synagogue.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

During the past month, and as a direct result of the Leningrad trial of nine Jews, the Jewish Defense League has rated headlines by their policies of harassment and threats. All the major Jewish organizations in our country have spoken out in opposition to their tactics. The Israeli Government has also expressed its condemnation of their terrorism. And after threat of court action against Rabbi Kahane, the JDL seems to be let up on their activities.

Many questions can be asked about this organization, its objectives and its methods. Certainly they are glamorous, as any activist group tends to be. But more important, we need to question their tactics and see whether they have really achieved any thing worthwhile.

Harassment and violence from a group as small as JDL do little but raise the ire of those who are threatened and cause them to wish to retaliate. Surely Russian Jewry does not need this.

Their behavior can also be embarrassing for the American Government. Although we do not control the political involvement and activities of our citizens as the Russians do, they still can hold our government accountable for what occurs in this country to their diplomatic personnel, as we do for ours in Russia. And as far as their accomplishments, there seems to be very little beside making a few headlines.

Violence and harassment are not usual Jewish forms of behavior. Our tradition holds it better to be among the persecuted than the persecutors - a choice that hopefully one does not have to make very often. But in this instance, where our fellow Jews are being persecuted, there are still alternative tactics of protest available to us other than the methods which the JDL has employed, and we should continue to use them, rather than descend to the level of the persecutor.

Send Out My People

Within the past month, world attention has been focused on the trial of eleven persons in Leningrad, nine of whom were Jews who had been seeking to emigrate to Israel. The much publicized reason for the trial was their alleged attempt to commandeer an airplane in order to flee the country, since their efforts to leave through legal means had not been successful.

The plight of these eleven persons brought about tremendous reactions throughout the world. World Jewry felt personally involved. We remembered all too well the events of the 1930's and 40's and though few of us reacted as militantly as the Jewish Defense League, nonetheless their slogan - Never Again - was imbedded in our hearts. Tremendous pressure was exerted by Jewish groups. American Jewish leaders met with President Nixon. The Israeli Knesset suspended all routine business, to debate their course of action. In Jerusalem I witnessed the impassioned demonstrations at the Western Wall.

Cries of concern were heard from non-Jewish circles also. Mayor Lindsay of New York City called the trials "Legalized injustice." the President of Switzerland declared that the death sentences which two of the defendants had drawn "dismayed the Swiss people;" in Chile, the Marxist President, Allende Gossens, appealed for Soviet leniency as "a highly humanitarian gesture." Even Pope Paul mentioned it in his weekly audience in the Vatican. Pallies were held in Washington, Boston, Toronto and countless other cities. We even had an emergency meeting of concerned clergymen of Lexington in our own vestry.

It would appear that all of this world reaction had some effect upon the Russians, for the two death sentences were very quickly commuted to fifteen years each, still rather a severe penalty and a form of slow death, from all reports of conditions in Soviet prisons. Continued pressure may bring additional leniency in the sentences. That is why the petitions to Premier Kosygin from Lexington, though not sent at the height of the clamor, may still carry weight. So if you have not signed one of the petitions as yet, you may do so after services in the vestry.

Despite the discouraging aspects of the trial, there have been a number of important lessons which it holds for us and which deserve our attention. One of these is the position of the Jews in Russia, which we sometimes forget. Soviet Jewry must bear a double burden of pain. Not only are they discriminated against because Judaism is a religion, and the USSR is avowedly atheistic and anti-religious, a bad enough situation for any religious group, but the Soviet Jew is also identified as a Jew by nationality. He has to carry an internal passport with him at all times as a means of identification and this passport labels him in this way. He can never escape the Anti-Semitism of Soviet life as can the religious non-Jew, who only has his national background on the passport, but not his religion. Thus the Russian Jew, wherever he may be, is known primarily as a Jew and continues to experience the sufferings which Russian Jewry has known for centuries.

This identification as both a religion and a nationality occurs because Judaism is unique. The primary identification of other groups in Russia, as their passports indicate, is national, and is bound up with some geographic area within the Soviet borders. But because Russian Jewry is listed as Jewish by nationality, it is not bound in the same way to any physical part of Russia, but feels a tie to the State of Israel. And to make matters worse for them, Israel has extended an invitation for them to settle there, and invitation which has been generally frustrated because it is an act of treason for a Russian citizen to wish to leave the Soviet Union.

Golda Meir has described the Jews who want to accept this invitation as heroes. She stated in a radio interview on December 19:

One has to be in Russia, or one has to know an awful lot about Russia, to realize the heroism involved in openly notifying the Soviet Government that they renounce their Soviet citizenship and to say in letters to the Authorities that the Soviet Union was no longer their country.

Thus the Jews of the Soviet Union are in a very difficult position. To remain means that they are subject to all forms of suppression and fear. On the other hand, to request to leave, even though there is only a remote possibility to do so, there is a ready place for them to go, and world Jewry will finance their new life in that land, is a dangerous and a treasonous request.

But as Mrs. Meir stated, 'They know exactly what may happen to them for this, and yet it goes on and grows.' The situation of the Jews of Russia is indeed a desperate one, even if the confessions at the trial are only slightly accurate.

This trial should give us pause to consider our own situation in America also. It should remind us of the insecurity which has traditionally been the role of the Jew in every age. We continue to be marginal in American society even today, as Dean Thursz pointed out this past Sunday evening in his lecture for the Jewish Community Association Forum. This very point is echoed in the December 1970 issue of Commentary, in a lengthy article entitled, "The Deadly Innocence of American Jews," in which the author discusses some of the self-delusions which plague today's American Jew. Among them he lists the idea that Jews have achieved a tripartite power status, that we have overcome our marginal status here, that we are loved by our fellow Americans, that Anti-Semitism is rooted out of America. These and other assumptions are explored and exploded. Nonetheless, the author indicates that American Jews tend to accept these ideas today in a way that he declares to be a form of 'self-destructive innocence in which it has been caught and which (is) so deadly to its identity, to its meaning, and indeed to its very existence.'

The point then must be made that just as the Russian trials have reemphasized to the Jews of that country that they are different, so too should they make us aware once more that we are different, that short of giving up our identity as Jews, we cannot assimilate into general society, no matter how much we ape it by dying our hair, bobbing our noses or changing our names. For us as Jews, just as for the Jews of Soviet Russia, Judaism is a primary historical identification. Judaism and the Jewish People came into history simultaneously, and being a member of a national group, is historically second for us. Jews - whether we live in America, Russia, or any other country, were Jews long before we were Americans, Russians, or identified with any other political entity, an order of identity which is just the opposite of all other religions. This distinction, as technical or as trite as it may appear, is of major importance for us. Whether a Jew is a person just off the boat or a tenth generation American, he is still identified as a Jew first, and can never be as fully an American as his Christian neighbor - despite all of the efforts of Jewish defense organizations, inter-religious dialogues or the assimilationists among us. We are the present-day transmitters of the Jewish heritage, who by historic accident happen to be living in the United States - and not in the Soviet Union.

The trial of the Jews in Leningrad then should serve two purposes for us. One, it ought to alert us once more to the dire situation of Soviet Jewry and cause us to react with an active concern; and two, it should serve to remind us that we are basically sojourners in this country, as we have been in every country, no matter how much we had felt at home or how long our family had been here. If we can understand these two points, then we can appreciate how fully the plight of Soviet Jewry is our plight also, for (God forbid) we in this country should at some other time in history be in their shoes, we would need the aid of our fellow Jews throughout the world in the same way that Russian Jewry does today - as we cry out with the very plea which we read in our Torah passage this evening - *חַסְדְּךָ יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ* - Send out My People.

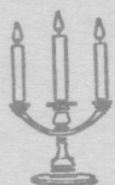

Perhaps many of you know that one of my avocations is an interest in libraries. This interest has led me in many directions. I have been most interested in building a good Temple Library and every so often, in my zealouslyness, overspend the amount in the Library Fund. However, the generosity of our congregation very shortly counterbalances my enthusiasm and the coffers are replenished.

But the Temple Library is not the only library with which I have been concerned. Public libraries are also of interest to me, and over the past years I have been involved in a number of ways with the Lexington Public Library - a facet of my activities with which I suspect most of you are familiar.

There is a great deal which needs to be accomplished, and I am most pleased that our Sisterhood has taken an interest in this needed facility. Members of the Council of Jewish Women are also working in the library of the Second Street YMCA.

This past Sunday, I was delighted to be elected president of the Friends of the Lexington Public Library, a volunteer organization of citizens interested in helping and improving the Library. I truly hope that my term in this office will be of benefit to the community, as well as speak well for our Jewish concern for learning and enlightenment.

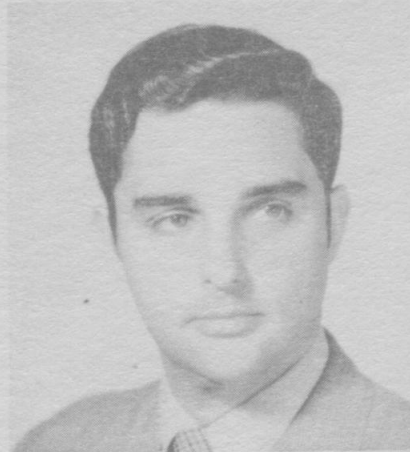

THE PITFALLS OF ORGANIZED RELIGION
Excerpt from a sermon by Rabbi Murray Saltzman
Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation

Perhaps we realized long before this time that institutions are imperfect, but we were in the past either more tolerant of imperfection or more naive in our expectations of perfectability. Whatever the case, in this generation we have more vividly experienced the inner pitfalls, hypocrisy and even fraud of institutions and causes which formerly seemed to lend stability, permanence and hope to life's undertakings.

Along with other contemporary forces which erode our confidence, specifically in religion, the realities of today's organized synagogue have convinced more and more of us that we can live without it. Many feel that the synagogue presented them with an out-moded spiritual structure expressive of a primitive time which we have outgrown. Others believe it fosters a separatistic identity which erects obstacles to the cause of mankind's unity. Its growing bigness on the other hand, negates identity for those who cherish a meaningful sense of belonging to a people, a faith, and a way of life. What is the relevance of the synagogue in this world of racial tension, war, and poverty, some protest.

But as with so much of life, the controversy or objections often merely skim the surface and deal with symptoms rather than underlying causes. The inadequacy or the pitfalls of organized religion are much more substantial than any of these.

Religion once spoke with certainty and authority. Now we know that the certainty which allayed our discomforts was a prison for our mind and a conforming rack for our spirit. Now we know that its authority negated our responsibility and constricted our individuality.

A God represented in the synagogue by certainty and authority was finally too small a God and perhaps no God at all.

So we are today left with uncertainty, discomfort, disordered and undirected individuality, and the burdensome responsibility of finding our own way and discovering our private truth. As for the institution, dispossessed of absolute truth and unquestioned authority, how shall it then effectively guide modern man who whirls in the dizzying confluence of conflicting, contradictory and infinite number of forces, truths, possibilities, ideas and causes?

The pitfall of organized religion is not in the imperfection of institutions, but that the institution has not really found its destiny or clarified its purpose. Nor have Jews really examined what it is that the institution means to them or their children. Fundamentally, neither have found a way to handle the new realities of uncertainty, of the absence of authority, of an open-ended freedom.

Other than that, it will be as much of a new experience for me as it will be for you. In addition, our guests that evening will be the Hillel students from UC. Do join us.

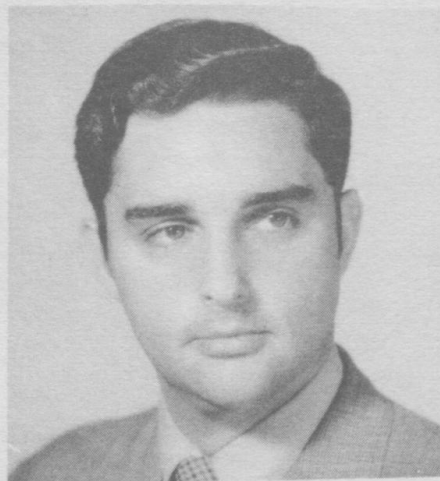

RABBI'S MESSAGE

On Friday night, February 12th, Dr. Nelson Glueck, President of the Hebrew Union College for almost 25 years died. The funeral was held in the HUC Chapel on Sunday at 3:00 P.M. Harry Miller and I attended, representing our congregation at this solemn occasion. The Chapel was full. Leading rabbis and Reform Jewish laymen were present from all over the country. HUC students, staff and faculty were present. It was a sad but historic moment in American Judaism which we witnessed. Two members of the faculty conducted the service and Rabbi Alfred Gottschalk, the already named successor to Dr. Glueck delivered a most moving eulogy.

Nelson Glueck was a remarkable man. Not only was he President of HUC, but he was one of the leading Biblical archeologists in the world. It was he who discovered King Solomon's copper mines and the ancient port of Etzion Gever on the Gulf of Akaba. He used the Bible as his basic guide and sought to verify the references to ancient sites and activities found in it. And he was usually successful in these efforts proving that the Bible was far more accurate in its accounts than earlier generations of Bible scholars had believed.

Dr. Glueck also inspired the building of the HUC School of Archeology in Jerusalem, which I visited a couple of months ago and where, starting this year, all students at HUC spend their first academic year. It is a school situated right near the King David Hotel, with a magnificent view of the walls of the Old City, which Dr. Glueck loved so very much. It is also the place to which he had hoped to retire and spend his final years - a dream which will not be realized.

Nelson Glueck was a great Jewish leader - a rabbi, a scholar, a man. He will be sorely missed. May his memory be a blessing unto us all.

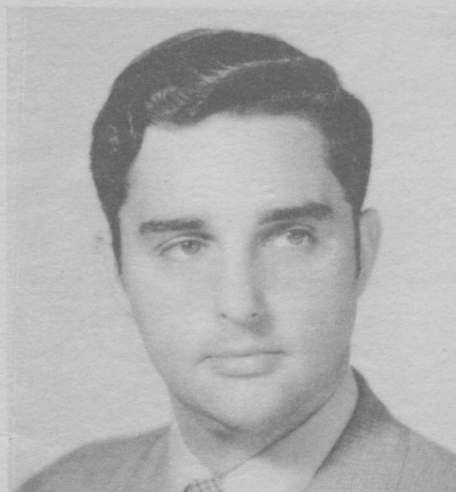

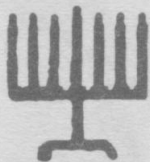

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This past week end we had six Hillel students here from the University of Cincinnati for the week end. Some of you may have met them Friday evening at the Multi-Media service. They were here for a joint week end with our University of Kentucky Hillel students. It was the first such program in many years and was a tremendous success.

We spent all day Saturday, from 10:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M. at the Narcotics Hospital, where the group had talks by different members of the staff on various facets of drugs and drug abuse. The quality of the sessions was extremely high. They had an orientation session to start with. Chuck Gorodetzky spoke on pharmacology and was excellent. Dr. Wishnie and two other men discussed treatment programs. They had an encounter session among themselves, led by the Hillel Counsellor from UC and we eventually came back to the Temple and spent almost two hours in the library discussing the pros and cons of Matrix House, the self help facility at the Hospital, with a person who is in it and a former patient who has some serious reservations about such a program. The day ended with an inspiring Havdalah service on the floor in the middle of the vestry.

Sunday, some very tired but happy youngsters met for lox and bagels at noon. The week end was over, the glow of it will linger on for a long time. Friendships had been made, and they departed with a far better understanding of the nature and problems of drug abuse than when they started. It was an exhilarating week end - even for a person over 40.

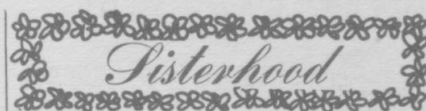
The program entitled, "Cantata For Children and Adults" will feature "What is Torah?" and "Israel - A Dream Realized."

On the thirteenth of Adar - at sundown, Wednesday, March 10 - we will celebrate Purim, the Feast of Lots. The story of Ahasuerus, his wife, the Queen of Persia, Esther, her cousin, Mordecai and the vengeful Haman is known to all.

The Talmud declares that, though traditional festivals may be neglected, Purim will never vanish because the sad events that created it will recur again and again. The holiday therefore has a special poignant meaning for us. Today we remember the Jews of the Soviet Union who can neither live as Jews nor leave, as is true of other countries behind the Iron Curtain. We think of the Jews of Egypt, not during the period of the Exodus, but today. And the Jews of Iraq.

Purim has also always been dedicated to the remembering of the poor, and to the sending of gifts to friends.

The Megillah - the story of Esther - will be read, kreplach and hamantashen will be eaten, and the whirring and buzzing of the Hamandreher or Klapper will be heard as children at the Purim plays express their opinions of Haman.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Thursday, March 11, is Purim, a minor holiday in our Jewish calendar - not minor because it is less important than the major ones, but because its basis is not found in the Torah, but in the Book of Esther, a later book of the Bible. The story deals with the tyranny of Haman and the deliverance of the Jews by the brave intervention of Esther.

This saga of hatred and persecution is one that has been repeated over and over again in Jewish history. Medieval Jewry had special celebrations in many cities. Torquemada and Hitler are but two of the names that come to mind as latter day Hamans. The ADL is still involved in this kind of a struggle.

And yet I wonder how many of our young people are cognizant of this aspect of Judaism. Just a few weeks ago, the Senior Assembly in our Religious School saw a film depicting the Anti-Semitic attitudes of some teenagers, a film which I thought did a good job in trying to portray how subtle such attitudes can be and how harsh and cruel it can make people who are ostensibly friends. To my surprise, our children found the story of this film very foreign to them. They had not really experienced any Anti-Semitism and so could not identify with the heroine of the film. Nor had we developed their sense of history so that they could imagine such a situation. Their sense of security was really tremendous - as if to convey their assumption that it could not happen here to them.

It certainly is nice to be so secure, but I wonder how realistic this sort of attitude is. Perhaps lessons of history ought not be so completely overlooked.

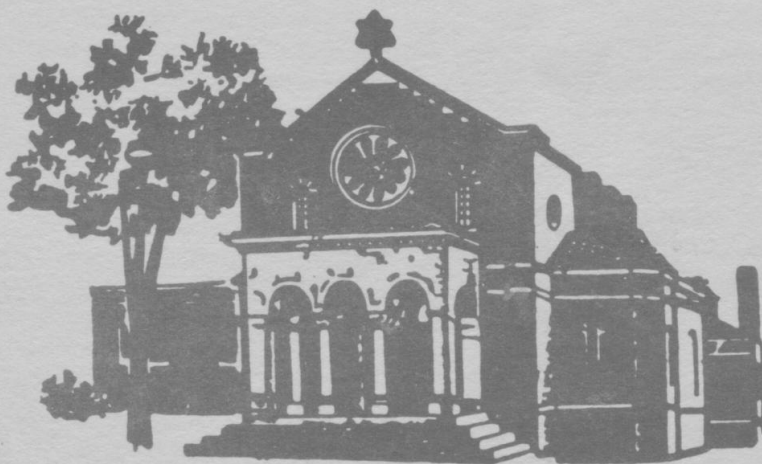

RABBI'S MESSAGE

On March 16, there will be a special congregational meeting to discuss and consider the proposed "Fair Share" dues plan for this congregation. I urge you to attend and to learn of the financial woes of our Temple and the real need to increase the income of the congregation.

This situation is not a new one. Rather is it one that is now so crucial that we can no longer hide our heads in the sand because too many people are kicking our posterior. Let me cite just a few examples of how this is happening.

We are an affiliate of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and as such we have a financial obligation to them of 11% of our dues this year and 12% next. As things now stand, we are not meeting our obligation this year and will not be able to next year.

-We still have an outstanding debt on our Temple parking lot of about \$14,000. Nothing has been paid on this in a number of years because we could not afford to do so.

We recently had to install a new boiler in the Temple, which cost about \$2500. No funds had been budgeted for such an emergency. But we had to pay the bill.

Financially, we have been limping for too long. When dues are discussed, too often the comparison is made with what someone else gives. This is no way to support our congregation. It should be done by a "Fair Share" method - by each person asking himself - what is my fair share - regardless of what the next person gives. Come to the meeting on the 16th. Learn of the Temple's problems and what you can do to help overcome some of them. Without this help, we can only continue to limp along; with this help, we can move ahead as we ought to do. Let's make it the latter!

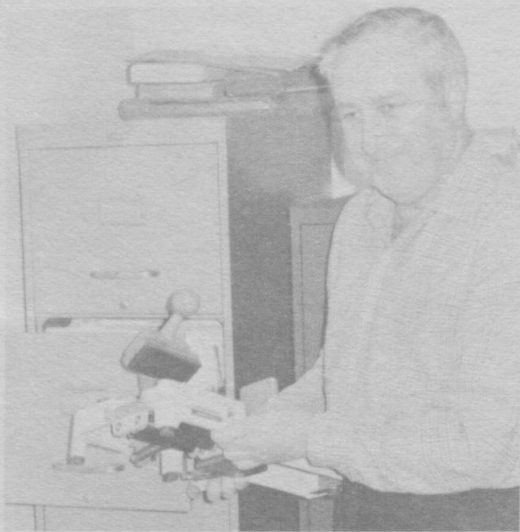

TEN SOVIET "NYETS" TO JEWS

1. No Jewish schools, either in Yiddish or in Russian, are provided for the Jewish minority.
2. No Jewish theatre exists, neither in Moscow, with about half a million Jews, nor in Leningrad, with about a quarter of a million, nor in any other city in U.S.S.R.
3. No Jew is admitted to the Military College at Frunze, the highest Red Army training center, the Soviet Sandhurst.
4. No Jew is admitted to the Cadets' School of the Party Cadres training centers.
5. No Jew holds any longer a high post in the Party hierarchy.
6. No Jewish communal or group life is permitted. There are no Jewish clubs, no libraries, no social centers of any kind.
7. No Jew is any longer appointed to the position of Ambassador in the Soviet Diplomatic Service.
8. No longer may the number of Jewish students at the Russian Universities and higher educational establishments exceed four per cent of the total figure.
9. No Jewish daily newspaper, either in Yiddish or in Russian, exists.
10. No Russian Jew is permitted to take part as a representative of the Russian Jewish community in any political, social or cultural or humanitarian organization, conference or association organized and held by Jews abroad.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Every year at about this time, spring fever seems to occur. I go out into the yard and look for the signs of the new season - the crocus with their bright colors, the daffodil leaves shooting up, the trees ready to burst into flower. And I look at the beds and consider what I want to plant where, and how much work there will be to clean away the debris from the past six months when I left them unattended.

It is a season of anticipation and expectation. I am ready to go to work; but the weather is not quite warm enough, the ground dry enough or the plants advanced enough for me to really get back to serious gardening.

However, as I consider what lies ahead, I am continually amazed at the effect that the change in season has in me. I become aware once more of the seasonal excitement that must have been behind the origins of Pesach - our spring festival. I want to start singing one of my favorite Seder hymns - "Behold it is the spring tide of the year... and clad in bud and bloom are hill and plain." Isn't it a joy that we can feel this way each year!

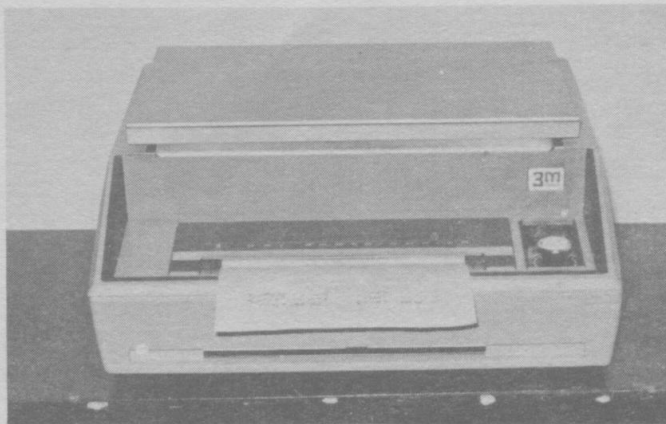

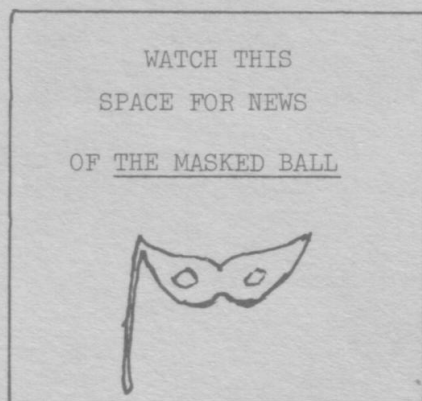

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This past Sunday our Jewish Community Forum held its fourth and final program for this year, the film "The Shop on Main Street." It was a most moving and heart-rending film, with photography that simulated the mood of 1938 and acting that was superb. The plot dealt with an old, widowed Jewish shopkeeper in a small Czechoslovakian town, and the rather bumbling young man who was appointed by the Nazi puppet government as her Aryan Controller. It was an extremely moving film and we sat rather dazed when the house lights went on at the conclusion. Each of us could see himself as potentially having been in that kind of a situation if his parents or grandparents had not immigrated to this country. Unlike most programs we have here, there was no great rush to the refreshment table after the film.

I contrast this awareness of history with what I see among our young people. They have not lived through such times. To them, 1938 is ancient history and the events of that time unreal and irrelevant to today. While to some degree I envy their feeling of security, on the other hand I have to wonder whether we have not deceived them. Other generations could not believe what was happening or could happen. They had forgotten history. God forbid that our children will have to be taught in as painful a way as was portrayed in "The Shop on Main Street".

THE ETHICAL STATE VERSUS THE WELFARE STATE

(Excerpts from a sermon by Rabbi Murray Saltzman of the Indianapolis Congregation, Indianapolis, Indiana)

The difference between a Jewish thrust for an ethical state versus the American reality of the welfare state is characterized in the "Schnorrer." Leo Rosten, in The Joys of Yiddish, defines the environment of values within which the "Schnorrer" operated. "The Jewish 'Schnorrer' was not apologetic; he did not frown nor whine. He did not so much as ask for alms or claim them."

In the Jewish environment, the "Schnorrers" believed they had a license from the Lord, and were doing His bidding. After all, they were helping Jews discharge the solemn obligations to help the poor and the unfortunate. He was an agent for the acquisition by others of "mitsvot" which was part of God's marvelous scheme for improving the human race. The Jewish environment thus preserved the dignity of the "Schnorrer" by encouraging in him a spirit of self-worth; the ability to ask for help without demeaning himself. It fostered in him "chutza" - monumental verve, and in so doing, transformed him from being an impoverished poor individual to a poor man with dignity.

The welfare system in our nation places a stigma on the unemployed. It could hardly be otherwise in a country where the work ethic is the measure of a man's worth.

Judaism is in basic opposition to the welfare state morality. No man may be placed in the position of living by the grace and largesse of others. It is not an act of charity to sustain the poor, but an act of responsibility whose benefit accrues to the giver rather than to the recipient. The welfare state which places a man on a dole is not the ethical state which insures and guards the status and dignity of every man.

I am advocating a mentality more than a specific program, a moral posture more than a precise formula. There can be no reason why this nation can't devise a system of public assistance that preserves human dignity by operation from the motivation of public responsibility over public generosity.

The Jewish moral environment gave "chutza" to the "Schnorrer." We might just find that a system which revives the "chutza" of the poor is the key to the improvement of the moral quality of American life.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This is the season of the "housewife's bustle" - Pesach - when all good Jewish wives and mothers dash about preparing the kitchen for the celebration of the Passover. It is a season of excitement and joy when we join together at the Seder table as one extended family.

But Pesach is more than just a time for "housewife's bustle", reunion and stuffed bellies. It is also a time when we stop and ponder the motifs and messages of the holiday and its ceremony. Think of some of them:

We say: "Let all who are hungry, come and eat" - ought this not remind us of the hunger and poverty still found in our midst and inspire us to a greater concern for those suffering from this never ending plague?

We speak of "freedom" and should be reminded of the suffering and fear of our fellow Jews in the Soviet Union and that they do not know freedom, though we can sit comfortably and celebrate its occurrence so many centuries ago.

We sing "Chad Gad Yo" and ought to be reminded that every one who thinks he is top-dog gets his "come-uppance" by someone else, who thinks he is top-dog for a while and that this lesson is as applicable to each individual as it is to politicians, giant corporations and nations.

Every year, we open the door for Elijah with the hope that he will enter and bring us peace. How we yearn for this still in Indo-China, in the Middle East, in Pakistan. And we have been opening the door for so many centuries now!

Pesach, a holiday with countless messages for us. Consider them as you sit down to Seder on the 9th and 10th. And then get up from the table - not just to search for the Alka Seltzer - but resolved to do your part in helping bring about some of the hopes about which the Seder has spoken.

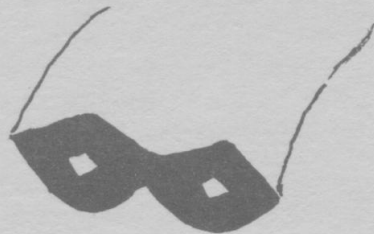
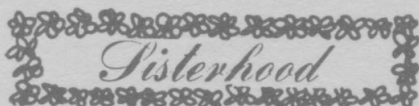

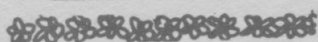

PESACH

Pesach - Passover - starts on
the fourteenth of Nisan - at sun-
down, Friday, April 9, 1971. It
commemorates Israel's liberation
from Egyptian bondage - a very
timely thought in light of Israel's
relationship to Egypt today. The
festival is therefore called Zeman
cherutenu, the season of our liber-
ty. It is also known as Chag ha-
Matzot, the Feast of Unleavened
Bread, in memory of the Israelites'
hasty exit from Egypt when all
they could carry with them was
dough still unleavened.

Both the slaughtering of the
lamb, commemorating the lamb blood
marking the doorposts of the Is-
raelites whom the angel of death
passed over, and the unleavened
bread are customs originating be-
fore and independently of Israel.
Arabic Bedouins ate unleavened
bread, and the slaughtering of
lambs was an important feature of
practically every religious and
secular festivity in the Near East.

The date of Pesach, too, was
long observed among Semitic tribes
as a season of festivity. But out
of these dissociated customs, the
Jewish people molded a unified
holiday and infused the great idea
of national and personal liberty,
employing the concept of the
"Season of Spring" figuratively as
a "Season of Freedom."

HUC STUDENT TO PREACH

Our guest rabbi on April 16 will
be Mr. Norman Auerback, a fourth year
student at HUC. Mr. Auerback is a
native of San Francisco and a gradu-
ate of Berkeley University. He
spent a year in Jerusalem studying
at HUC there, in addition to his
rabbinic studies in this country.
He has served as student rabbi in
Bluefield, W. Va. and is presently
the student rabbi in Dubuque, Iowa.
His sermon topic will be "Silver
Avenue" and will deal with the prob-
lems of the elderly in our society.

SURVIVAL MEANS SACRIFICE

In 1970 alone Soviet Russia sent 150 MIG-21J fighter-interceptors to Egypt. Russia also sent 200 trained pilots, 15,000 missile crewmen, 4000 "advisors", along with other military hardware totalling \$2,500,000. Since 1967 Russia has put \$4,500,000 worth of military aid into Egypt.

The only military aid Israel gets is the privilege of buying selected military hardware sometimes. Aggregate direct military aid by the whole world is A BIG FAT ZERO.

The Central Kentucky United Jewish Appeal, nor the World's Jewish Community, for that matter, of course, cannot hope to match this gigantic effort to eliminate the Jewish culture from the face of the earth. Survival, indeed, means sacrifice. The UJA cannot contribute to the military efforts of Israel. It can, however, relieve a small part of the load carried by each Israeli by supporting, with money, his commitment to aid oppressed Jewry throughout the world.

Recently, the leaders of the Jewish community in Central Kentucky met at the Kentucky Training Center for the purpose of kicking off the 1971 campaign. Stanley Yarmuth, of Louisville, was the speaker. In recognition of the needs for 1971, the persons invited (all of whom in the past had made large donations to UJA) increased their pledges in 1971 by more than 50%.

These leaders recognized that the time is now in terms of survival. History has taught us over and over that failure to act means destruction. Failure to recognize the omens of oppression can only mean unspeakable hardships for our people. When asked to sign a pledge for your 1971 contribution to UJA, stand up proudly at the call and make your pledge large enough to count. Survival Means Sacrifice.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This past week I visited the State Reformatory in LaGrange. It was the first time I had been there and a long while since I had been in a state prison of any sort. I went there to see a 19 year old Jewish boy who had formerly been at UK, who had been arrested for selling Pot and subsequently sentenced to the Reformatory for five years.

It was his first offense and so he really did not know what prison would be like. When I saw him last winter after his arrest, he readily admitted his guilt and seemed very nonchalant about the possibility of going to prison. He thought eighteen months there would go by very rapidly and without much difficulty. He was cocky and self assured; disdainful of his parents and all authority as he had experienced it.

The young man whom I saw this week was an entirely different person. He had been there only two months, but he felt like it had been ten years. He had been beaten, almost raped, dehumanized by his fellow inmates and by the system of which he was now a part. But he had grown up. He had had the opportunity to give some serious thought to the relationships he had taken for granted in the past, to what his life might be, to the freedom he had lost. As we sat there and talked, the contrast between his present situation and the forthcoming celebration of Pesach, the Festival of Freedom, was obvious to both of us. But I could leave LaGrange and go home; he couldn't. A hard way to learn what freedom is all about!

Va. and is presently the student rabbi in Dubuque, Iowa. His sermon topic will be "Silver Avenue" and will deal with the problems of the elderly in our society.

OUT OF TRADITION

By Rabbi David M. Horowitz

Question: WHAT DOES SALVATION MEAN IN JUDAISM?

Answer: Jews find themselves with many divergent feelings with regards to the existence of an after-life. Talmudic tradition teaches that there exists an OLAN HABA, a "World to come," where the soul of the deceased awaits the ultimate redemption of history. The vital question in Judaism is not whether or not there exists an after-life, but whether or not such a belief makes a difference to the Jew.

Ultimate salvation has consistently been seen as a "this-worldly" enterprise. The salvation of an individual soul has not been of major concern, yet the belief that the salvation of this world is possible has been vital in Jewish history. Traditional Jews see this period of peace and plenty in the era that begins with the coming of the Messiah. Liberal Judaism has talked in terms of a messianic age, brought about by man in partnership with God. Both, however, would agree that the world can be saved, and that ultimately history will be redeemed.

The hope for the salvation of the world brought with it to traditional Judaism the belief in the physical resurrection of the dead. This adds credibility to my feeling that throughout Jewish history, the belief has been that salvation means putting in order of this world, and that concern with this-world must take prevalence over salvation in an "after-life."

The optimistic expectations of a messianic era of peace exemplifies Judaism's universal character. The belief is that all the world participates in the messianic era, not only Jews. The world will either be saved, or it will not. In this sense, humanity must strive together to create a climate that makes possible the dawn of peace. To this end, the Jew feels select in his duties and responsibilities, not in any reward which may follow. The goal is not that one should do "the good" that one may be saved, but that one should do "the good" so the sum of the acts will ultimately save the world. This is the Jewish view of salvation.

SURVIVAL MEANS SACRIFICE

There will be a dinner meeting on April 18 at the Ghavay Zion Synagogue of the Central Kentucky United Jewish Appeal. Cocktails and hors d'oeuvres will be served followed by dinner. The price per person will be \$2.50. A dynamic out-of-town speaker will be presented. The purpose of the meeting - to give you an opportunity to make your annual pledge to the UJA. As usual, you are expected to increase your pledge over last year.

Does this sound familiar to you? Are you going to drag out the standard excuses and say, "No-hum, here we go again?"

If you do, you not only invite but maybe deserve the humiliation and oppression inflicted on world Jewry.

If you do, you will not be in step with others of this community who recognized the critical needs of UJA and have already increased their initial pledges by more than 50% over last year.

If you do, then you really should come and learn that "Survival Means Sacrifice." Complacency in supporting oppressed Jewry throughout the world can have but one end and it is hard to say exactly what that end will be.

If you will think about it, paying a pledge to the UJA of double last year's would be so infinitely less distasteful than the often told story...I left all of my possessions in Morocco (Algeria, Tunisia, Poland, Rumania, Russia, Egypt, Iraq, Syria).

You will be contacted and asked to pledge to UJA. When asked, remember, **Survival Means Sacrifice.**

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From the Rabbi's Desk

This past week I was in Canton, Ohio for a regional meeting of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. The keynote speaker for our sessions was Rabbi Eugene Borowitz, who teaches at HUC-JIR in New York City, and is among the most creative and productive Jewish thinkers in our country today. He spoke to the group about some of the concerns and ideas in modern Jewish thought, relating these ideas both to the wealth of our intellectual past, as well as to many of the ideas which people are discussing today.

Among the things which he pointed out so well is that it is not the specifics of one's beliefs that make a person a Jew. There are many different theologies that can be fitted into a Jewish framework. Far more important to our religion is a sense of community - that we are a group of people concerned and involved in the lives of one another - or as he put it so succinctly, "We Jew with one another."

This idea has tremendous validity for us. As a Congregation, we can Jew together - in worship, in our social concerns, in our studies, in our concern for other Jews in other parts of the world. To do this, we need a community of committed Jews - Jews who say *ven* when called upon to be Jewish. I found Rabbi Borowitz's three talks so very relevant to the situation as we encounter it in Temple Adath Israel.

YOUR FAIR SHARE

According to one interpretation of the Dead Sea Scrolls, the community life of that day was divided into two major classes - "Men of Covenant" and "Council of the Community." In order to be admitted into the "Council of the Community" one had to give up all his worldly goods. This sacrifice was made on behalf of the maintenance of organized religion.

Giving your fair share to the maintenance of Adath Israel Congregation is measured by the average costs per membership to meet the 1971-1972 budget, i.e. \$240. This budget can also be met if each membership pledges 2% of his income, a far cry from "all one's worldly goods." Maintenance of the Council of the Community was a 100% effort by its members; maintenance of Temple Adath Israel requires a 2% effort by its members.

When making your pledge for this year's contribution, be mindful of the fact that it takes money for our congregation to function and operate. Contribute your "Fair Share" and be thankful that this does not mean all one's worldly goods.

WHAT MAIMONIDES SAID ABOUT LEADERSHIP

"It is forbidden to lead the community in a domineering and arrogant manner. One should exercise one's authority in a spirit of humility and reverence. The man at the head of the congregation who arouses excessive fear in the hearts of the members thereof for any but a religious purpose will be punished. It will not be given to him to have a son who will be a scholar, as it is written: 'Men do therefore fear him; he will not see any (sons) that are wise of heart.' (Job 32:XXVII:24)"

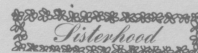
The Bible Passage for May 2 is Ps. 19:15 and we shall discuss this verse which we sing after the *Silent Prayer* and why it has meaning for us.

Rabbi's Message

Finances are an area of congregational and community activities that I prefer to steer clear of. I find it difficult to judge how much money another person makes and how much he ought to contribute to worthy causes. There are too many unknowns involved - hidden expenses that I and others do not know about, which take funds and place limits on what we can do.

Nonetheless, there are also the many instances of conspicuous consumption which indicate our financial status - new cars, lavish entertaining, expensive clothes, vacations, luxuries of all sorts, which also add up to indicate the status of one's income.

When I look at the latter, and compare them to the level of charitable contributions in our community, I find a good bit of disparity. We live like wealthy persons and contribute at a rate far below the level at which we live. By this standard, Lexington's Jewish community is not a generous one. We do not do our share.

Presently the UJA is holding its yearly appeal. Compare your contribution to it with your spending for conspicuous consumption. And after you have done this, let Jimmy Levenson know how much more you will contribute to UJA in 1971.

As I am sure you know, the Temple Board has instituted a "Fair Share" program for dues this year. It is being done to help raise the standards of support for our congregation, so that we can function properly and pay our bills on time. Before you set your dues, consider what you spend on conspicuous consumption. Then make your decision.

YOUR FAIR SHARE

As of the date of this article many of you have been contacted and have signed a pledge card in which you have made known your proposed contribution to the Temple budget for the fiscal year 1971-1972. Perhaps you would like to know that the results, so far, are gratifying. To date, the overall pledges are 26.4% above last year's. Members of the Board of Trustees, who are most familiar with Temple needs, have increased their pledges on an average of 41% to date.

This would indicate that the minimum budget recommended by the Budget Committee will be met. This is a minimum budget, not an adequate budget. Under this minimum budget the minimum dues per membership is in excess of \$240.00. Those who can, and are not pledging this amount, should seriously consider raising their pledges to \$240.00. The average member of the Board of Trustees has pledged \$412.00. The average of all pledges to date is \$289.00.

If your support continues as it has to this date, you can be justly proud of the fact that the Temple will survive and you have been a part of its survival. If you will make an extra effort on behalf of the Temple, it will not only survive but will grow, will prosper, and will be more useful to the community.

Some programs, which have been neglected in the past can be considered when money is available. One of the first, of course, is the maintenance of the existing structure and grounds. Then there is the question of refurbishing classrooms. Censens of activities should be considered for more adequate Temple support. Looking to the future, funds should be saved for the day when it will be necessary to expand or build a new facility.

Lexington is a growing city. Temple Adath Israel should be prepared to grow with it and have available the funds necessary to provide proper facilities for a growing Jewish community.

CONCERNING THE JEWS

RABBI'S MESSAGE

As you will notice in the Religious School article, Rabbi Robert Samuels, General Manager of the Leo Baeck School in Haifa was in Lexington this past week. Bob and I were at HIE together and it was really a delight for me to be with him, even if it was only from 10 A.M. till 6 P.M. I saw him last winter in Haifa when I visited the school and had a tour of their exciting and still unfinished facilities. At that time I had lunch with him and his family and so it was nice to be able to reciprocate the hospitality.

But Bob was here not just for a social visit. He was primarily here on business - to solicit financial support for his school in Haifa, and in this regard his visit was also a success. The school is a high school for more than 700 Israeli children from many different backgrounds - rich and poor, Jew and Arab, European and North African - a thoroughly integrated school with an academic program of the highest quality. For this aspect alone, the school is worthy of our support.

But in addition to its academic excellence, the Leo Baeck School is also the only Israeli school which teaches Judaic Studies in a liberal progressive spirit. Since Judaism in Israel is usually equated only with strict orthodoxy, this school is extremely important in that it can provide the Israelis with an alternative other than complete secularism.

Thus Bob's visit to us was extremely significant. It opened up a relationship with the School, which hopefully will grow, as we now plan also to host a student from that School for the fall academic semester. It sounds exciting and should be the start of something very exciting for Temple Adath Israel.

SHAVUOT

The Jewish holiday of Shavuot (The Festival of Weeks) which commemorates the gift of the Ten Commandments to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai, will begin at sunset on May 29. The holiday is observed for two days by Orthodox and Conservative Jews, and for one day by the Reform branch of Judaism.

The origins of this holiday are agricultural as well as religious, for in ancient times it marked the gathering of the first crops of the year, usually spring wheat and barley. The Jews of antiquity would bring flowers and fruits of the season to the synagogue as thanks-offerings to God. The religious aspects of the holiday were equated with the blossoming of the awareness of the Jewish people with the gift of the Ten Commandments.

In addition to special music, liturgy and sermons, the holiday is also marked in Reform and Conservative synagogues by Confirmation ceremonies in which young men and women who have completed their elementary religious education are blessed by their rabbi and considered to have graduated into adult membership in Jewish life. Usually the confirmands conduct the service.

Other traditional aspects of the holiday are the eating of dairy foods and honey, symbolizing Israel's joy in the Torah, which is compared with "Milk and Honey" that is both nourishing and sweet. It is customary, too, to read the Book of Ruth during the service for this story incorporates the two concepts of the barley harvest (where Ruth and Naomi gleaned the sheaves) and the embracing of Judaism by a woman who was formerly a pagan. It is this dual meaning, the gathering of the first harvest, and the acceptance of the law and revelation of God, which gives the poignant story of Ruth a special relevance to this holiday.

There is a parallel between Shavuot and the Pentecost of the New Testament for the holiday occurs seven weeks after the Jewish Passover.

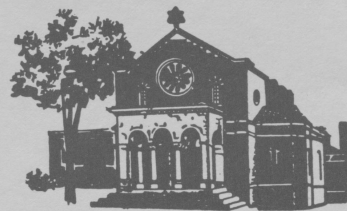

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT ROSH HASHANAH

What do the words Rosh Hashanah mean?

The word Rosh means "head" or "beginning". The word Shanah means year. Ha is the Hebrew prefix meaning "the". Rosh Hashanah, then, means the beginning of the year.

What is the purpose of observing Rosh Hashanah?

The most solemn period of our year, the ten days of penitence are ushered in by Rosh Hashanah and concluded by Yom Kippur. It is a solemn period the purpose of which it is to enable man to look within himself and seek better to understand his place in God's world. It is a time for self-appraisal and for resolving more fully to live up to our obligations to God and to our fellow man.

Why is Rosh Hashanah observed on a different date every year?

The Jewish calendar is a lunar calendar whereas our regular calendar is a solar calendar. The ordinary year of a lunar calendar contains 354 or 355 days as compared to the 365 days of the solar calendar. Therefore, although Rosh Hashanah always occurs on the 1st day of the Hebrew month of Tishri, its date in the Gregorian calendar will vary from year to year. In order to insure that the festivals and Holydays will always come in the proper season, an additional month is inserted in the Jewish calendar approximately every three years. These are leap years.

By what reckoning will the coming year be 5732?

Jewish tradition tells us that the world was created on Rosh Hashanah. According to this chronology this will be the 5732nd year since creation.

For American Jews, the past year has been one of hope as well as concern. On the brighter side, it has seen purposeful action by American Jewry undertaken in solidarity with the rest of World Jewry. Jews throughout the free world have united in protest over the persecution of Jews in Russia. Forgetting their divisions, American Jews have joined the Jews of other countries in the creation of a strong Agency to assist Israel. And there is hope that the cease-fire in the Middle East, at first seemingly hopeless and ever so fragile, might develop into a detente resembling peace.

As the new Holy Days approach, we pray that the increasing solidarity of our people will give us the fortitude to cope with the new difficulties that beset us, and the vision to see beyond them to a better world for us and all mankind.

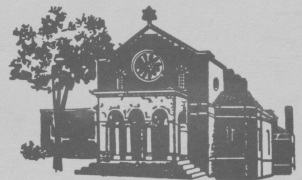

SUKKOT 5732

The ancient Jewish harvest festival, Sukkot, begins Sunday evening, October 3 1971 and ends Sunday, October 10, 1971. It is also known as the Feast of Tabernacles. It is one of the most joyous of the Jewish holidays, and immediately follows the serious penitential "Days of Awe". Sukkot is essentially a thanksgiving festival, rooted in the agricultural history of ancient Israel, in which Jews express their joyousness to God and their gratitude for the autumn harvest.

Sukkot also has a symbolic relationship to the liberation from Egyptian bondage and the long journey toward the Land of Promise. It thus has a dual purpose; an expression of thanksgiving for the liberation from Egypt, and the gratitude for the fruits of the earth.

It is observed by special prayers and rituals in the Synagogue and the home. Fragile booths called Sukkahs are built of wood and decorated with boughs of trees and the fruits of the harvest, and special prayers of thanks for the splendor and bounty of nature are recited in them. The American pilgrims, who identified themselves closely with the ancient Hebrews, consciously patterned Thanksgiving upon Sukkot.

The final day of Sukkot is spent by both Orthodox and Reform Jews rejoicing over the gift of the Torah, the holy teachings which came to the Israelites during their long, wandering journey through the desert. During this service, the yearly cycle of readings from the Pentateuch is completed and immediately resumed with the beginning of Genesis.

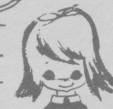

From the Rabbi's Desk

This past week there was a lengthy article in the New York Times about efforts now afoot in the U.S. Congress to overturn the Supreme Court decision of 1963 that barred Bible readings and prayers in public schools. During the same week I also received a letter from a concerned parent telling me of the special prayer room that has been set up in her son's junior high school, and in which the students can "turn on to Jesus," as one of those reporting on it stated.

The coincidence of these two bits of news brings up the emotional question of religion in the schools once more, and no doubt, as in the past, we Jews will be caught up in it. Our children will be subject to peer pressures to participate, embarrassed when they have to explain why they do not wish to participate, and uncomfortable when they are involved in this form of religious expression.

Whether the efforts in Congress bear fruit, we cannot tell. Congressman Celler is attempting to block the move, but we cannot be certain whether he will be able to do so. But religious practices are already creeping back into our local schools. They do not belong in a publicly supported institution, but in a privately supported one. This is a distinction which is difficult for many persons to understand. Let us be alert to this situation and register our complaints when necessary.

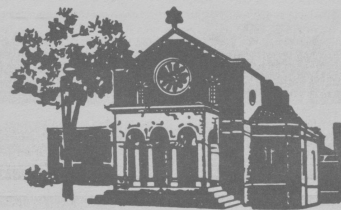

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This past month I was horrified, as I suspect many of you were, by the slaughter of prisoners and employers at Attica State Prison in New York. The carnage and the destruction of property which occurred seemed so senseless.

But rather than just bemoan the stupidity and waste of life of the whole affair, we ought to look behind it. Our prisons are supposed to be "correctional institutions", or at least this is one of the titles that is used and apparently is intended to "correct" the behavior of the inmates. More than four years ago I attended a meeting of The American Correctional Association, the national organization of penologists. They are called "reformatories", and apparently are intended to "reform" those confined to them. The state institution in LaGrange is a "Reformatory". They are called "penitentiaries", apparently because those confined in them are supposed to be "penitent".

What misnomers! What idiocy! Very few prisoners are penitent, reformed or corrected by our prison system - federal, state or local. They are brutalized, dehumanized, trained further in criminal ways, but seldom released and returned to a useful life.

Attica is only one more example of the inadequacy of our penal system. If it does nothing else, it ought to cause all of us to cry out in disgust at the barbarity of this system.

Three years ago I had an article printed in Federal Probation Quarterly, published by the Justice Department, on the need for our prisons to teach persons what it is to be a human being. The need is as great as ever, and I learned of it at NARCO, which was humane by other standards.

From the Rabbi's Desk

During the coming week, members of the Congregation and I shall be leaving Lexington for Los Angeles to attend the Biennial Assembly of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. We are all looking forward to this meeting with great anticipation.

These sessions, which occur on a national level every other year, are really very exciting for a number of reasons.

First, the business sessions of the Assemblies bring to the floor many of the pressing issues facing Judaism today, issues of organizational concern, matters affecting Jewry in other parts of the world, problems of social significance which have religious and moral overtones. These issues are usually hotly debated on the floor before a vote is taken and a decision of any sort is made. And as a result of these debates, we can see where we fit in to the picture in our activities and programming.

Secondly, the forum sessions are of great interest. At these meetings outstanding leaders present papers and lead discussions on a wide variety of fascinating subjects, bringing to us the fruit of their expertise. And here too discussion is lively and stimulating.

A third facet of the Biennial is our ability to meet informally with leaders of other Reform Congregations and to share common concerns and experiences, to learn from this perspective where our strengths and weaknesses lie.

And a fourth aspect of these meetings is the opportunity to see the many displays of Jewish art and ritual objects, of new books and new techniques, and to consider how we can apply them to our needs.

All in all, Biennials are exciting and worthwhile. And the delegation from Temple Adath Israel looks forward to attending.

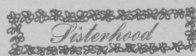

Our congregation is almost seventy years old and until this time we have never had a Confirmand of our Religious School attend the Hebrew Union College and prepare for the rabbinate. From the standpoint of Reform Judaism developing its own indigenous leadership, this state of affairs was not something of which we could be very proud.

However, we appear to be entering a new era. As of this fall, Temple Adath Israel now has its first Confirmand who is a student at the Hebrew Union College. Steve Mason, the son of Aaron and Jessie Mason, entered the Jerusalem School in September and is beginning his studies there to enter the rabbinate. After a year at the Jerusalem School, Steve will return to this country and will then have four more years of rabbinic training before ordination. It is a four course of study, but one which I have found to be well worth the effort.

I have received a number of letters from Steve already, and in each he describes a different aspect of what he is experiencing. He has spoken of his studies and the books he is buying in order to build his Jewish library. He has spoken of his travels in Israel and his reactions to what he has seen. He has spoken of his experiences as a Reform Jew in Jerusalem and his feelings about some of the insults he has received. And he has spoken of his impressions of Israel in general, and the confusion which he feels at present.

Last year Steve had a bumper sticker on his car which read, "Israel Is Real." This year he does not have a car in Jerusalem, but Israel is becoming really "real" for him as he pursues his studies at the Hebrew Union College.

I am delighted that Steve is there and sure you join me in wishing him the very best in his efforts.

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RABBI'S MESSAGE

This past week a large, enclosed van was parked in the back of the Temple parking lot. It belongs to Factory Services, and was loaned to us as a depository for old newspapers which our Temple Youth Group will soon start collecting. Watch for their scheduled times of collection, when you can bring in your old newspapers (no magazines please) to the Temple. The papers should be bundled neatly so that they can be picked up regularly by Volunteers of America and added to the other paper which they are to send to Louisville for recycling.

I am very pleased that our Temple has decided to participate in this effort to save old newspapers, even though this effort may seem so very small and insignificant, compared to the ecological problems confronting our nation today, which seem almost overwhelming. A campaign to clean up the Red River Gorge. Trash cans on Main Street. Litter bags in our cars - these and countless other things seem insignificant compared to the smog that made my eyes burn in Los Angeles earlier this month, the garbage in lakes and rivers and oceans, and the filth that we see cluttering our countryside. But the concern for doing something has to start somewhere, and it might as well be here, where we are, with little things, for from little things will come big things. If we collect papers and understand why, perhaps we won't litter; and if we refuse to litter, perhaps we will help clean up the city; and if we help clean up the city, perhaps we will join with others and work to clean up the waterways and air.

Jack Miller told me that Disneyland was so clean that he would have been ashamed to have dropped anything on the ground there. Would that such an attitude were felt by everyone about our environment. Maybe some day, but we might as well start in that direction today, for as Hillel taught - "If not now, when?" So bring in your paper and start thinking "clean."

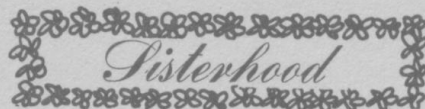

BIENNIAL NOTES

Below are Excerpts from the Biennial Digest to the recent UAHC Biennial in Los Angeles. Additional comments will be printed in succeeding weeks.

When 1,600 Reform Jewish men and women care enough to pay their own way to attend a General Assembly - we can't be all bad.

On the go from morning until midnight, shuttling back and forth between the Century Plaza and Beverly Hilton Hotels for forums and evening sessions - with several committee meetings and regional conferences sandwiched in between - the delegates from more than half of the UAHC's congregations did not spare themselves.

All of the forums held through Monday morning were well attended and generated much thoughtful and probing discussion. Despite widespread recognition of the many perplexing and frustrating problems that we face as individuals, as Americans, and as Jews, a strong motivation for changing the quality of our lives was manifest through all our activities.

In the forum on "America and the Survival of Democracy," for example, Dr. Fred Krinsky of the School of Politics and International Relations of the USCLA, mentioned three basic premises that are essential to a satisfying life: man's individual conscience which decides what is fundamentally right; a society that can harmonize a divergence of opinions; man's basic rationality. He said, however, that these three principles are suffering because many no longer believe in anything.

By way of contrast, those who participated in the forums, those who participated in the plenary sessions and listened to the opposing views of their peers; those who witnessed the dance-drama group of Temple Israel of New Rochelle; who heard Dr. Kenneth Keniston, Kenneth Braiterman, Dr. Leonard Fein, Rabbi Maurice Eisendrath, Philip Klutznick and others - clearly revealed their visceral longing to believe.

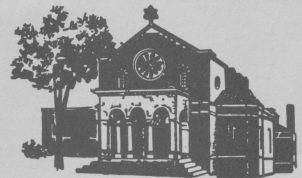

From The Rabbi's Desk

Elsewhere in this issue of the Temple Bulletin you will notice an announcement of a meeting of the Future Planning Committee on Monday evening, December 29th at 7:30 in the Temple Library. This will be the third meeting that this committee has held in the past two months and is for you to attend. They want to find out what you think about the present physical plant of the Temple and the future needs we shall be encountering. If you want to voice your satisfaction, or dissatisfaction with our facilities, that meeting is where you should do it, so that the committee can know what you think on the matter. They have already met with Barbara Gorodetzky, who described the problems of running our Religious School in our present facilities and with me. I discussed my views on the adequacies and inadequacies of our present structure. They have also had an indepth tour of the present building to see exactly what it is they are considering when they deal with this plant.

This committee is confronting a vital problem for our congregation. Ever since we acquired the property on Mt. Tabor Road we have behaved as if a move were imminent and so forgot that we were still in our present building, the oldest part of which will be fifty years old in a few years. What shall we do with it? Leave it alone? Renovate it? Abandon it? How sound is it structurally? How adequate is it for services, receptions, dinners, and meetings? What shall we do with the kitchen? Do we have enough classrooms? Are they big enough? Where will we put new books in the library? These and many other questions are being asked by the Future Planning Committee. They have not arrived at any answers yet; they are still compiling questions, suggestions and comments. Don't be left out if you have something to say. Be at the meeting on December 29th at 7:30 in the Temple Library.

HANUKKAH 5732

(26 Kislev through 2 Tevet)

Sunday evening, December 12, 1971 through Monday, December 20, 1971

Hanukkah is the most ambiguous of Jewish holidays. Of all the festivals based on ancient historical events, we know more about the date of the occurrence - 165 b.c.e. - and the circumstances - the return of the Jerusalem Temple to worship of God from Syrian paganism - than about any other holy day. As clear as this is, the origins of kindling candles for each of the eight nights of the holiday are obscure. Even the rabbis of the Talmud were hard-pressed to make the association between the return of the Temple to Jewish worship and the rituals which had grown up around Hanukkah.

Although Hanukkah is probably the most widely observed holiday in Jewish homes, there is virtually no synagogal recognition of the festival. Even the most traditional of Jews are not required to abstain from work, or attend special worship services.

Long before Christian observance of Christmas pervaded the world of the Jew, Hanukkah held excitement and joy for Jewish children. Games and plays and special foods added other dimensions to a holiday remarkably monolithic in its purpose. Interaction with the Christian world has only added to the importance of Hanukkah as a period of special light and gladness in the darkest season of the year.

For the modern Jew, Hanukkah's meaning transcends candle lighting, gifts for children and latkes. Of central significance is the recognition that an individual's religion must be his own choice, not the choice of the government under which he lives. The Maccabees of more than 2000 years ago recognized this principle which still eludes governments all over the world today.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Hanukkah, which begins the night of December 12, marks the first time that any group of people fought for religious freedom, for the right to worship God as they chose, and not as some king or emperor dictated. It is a holiday that predates our treasured American freedom of religion by 2000 years.

At the recent Hadassah meeting, Alana and I were in the scene from the "Diary of Anne Frank" which depicts the celebration of this holiday in their secret room in 1942, in their hiding place in Amsterdam. As we went through the rehearsal, I could not help but think of their struggle to survive as Jews, even in such a dark and fearful time. The message of Hanukkah lived for them in spite of the persecution of the Nazis.

By contrast, I wonder about us today. Does the holiday still have relevance? How would we behave if confronted with a situation such as the Maccabees or the Franks? Would we be willing to bow down to other gods to save our lives, or go into hiding to try to preserve ourselves and our religion for a better day? How tensely would we cling to our Judaism? Hopefully we will not be asked to confront such a decision, but as we prepare to kindle the lights once more, as we exchange gifts and eat our latkes, we ought to ask ourselves these questions. Judaism survived Antiochus and other oppressors because Jews believed that their religion was worth fighting for. If put to the test, would we answer in the same way they did?

On December 12 we shall have guests from Ohavay Zion Synagogue. We look forward to their visit.

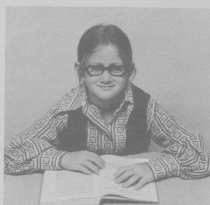

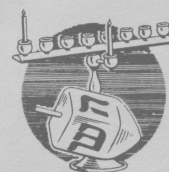

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

As I write this message we have not yet had our first serious snowfall of the winter and so I feel a bit strange talking about next summer already. But then it is never too soon to plan for a good thing, and the Union Camp Institute in Zionsville, Indiana is a good thing.

Applications for the camp are now being taken. The sessions are for two four week periods - June 25 to July 23 and July 24 to August 18, with the option of signing up for one or both of the sessions. BIENNIAL NOTES

Below are Excerpts from the Bien-
nial Digest of the recent UAHC
Biennial in Los Angeles. Addition-
al comments will be printed in
succeeding weeks.

FIRST PLEMARY SESSION OPENED
TO FULL HOUSE ATTENDANCE
The Credentials Committee reported
registration of more than 1,600
congregational delegates, alter-
nates, official visitors and ex-
officio for the 51st General
Assembly. Forty-two states and
the District of Columbia were
represented, in addition, of
course, to Canada.

In addition to the organizational
formalities necessary to assure
the smooth functioning of so
large and complex a convocation,
the delegates heard short address-
es from Archbishop Timothy Manning
Catholic Archdiocese of Los An-
geles, and Dr. Carl W. Segerham-
mer, president of the Southern
California Council of Churches.
Both men brought greetings from
their respective religious organ-
izations and Dr. Segerhammer paid
tribute to the Jewish concern for
the protection of civil and human
freights. He said that at meetings
he attends where such issues are
discussed, he sometimes sees
Protestants and sometimes sees
Catholics. But, he added, there
are "inevitably" a number of
Jews present.

Another highlight of the after-
noon was the presentation of cer-
tificates to four UAHC congre-
gations celebrating their centen-
nial year during 1971 and 1972.
Martin Kramer, president, accept-
ed the citation for his congre-
gation, Temple Beth-El of
Chicago, and Bernard Hirsch,
president, accepted the citation
for his congregation, Temple
Emunu-El of Dallas. Temple Israel
Waterbury, Conn. and Congregation
Adas Emuno, Fort Lee, N. J. had
no representatives present.
Their citations will be mailed
to them.

The assembly also heard from
Rabbi David Polish, President of
the Central Conference of Ameri-
can Rabbis, and William G. Israel,
chairman of the Pacific South-
west Council Local Arrangements
Committee.

BIENNIAL NOTES

Below are Excerpts from the Biennial Digest of the recent UAHC Biennial in Los Angeles. Additional comments will be printed in succeeding weeks.

REPORT, CHAIRMAN OF THE UAHC BOARD

At the Friday night evening service, Earl Morse, Chairman of the UAHC Board during the past four years, spoke of the changes and accomplishments during his stewardship.

Mr. Morse said that they had seen "the flowering of Reform Judaism's involvement in world-Jewish life," a direction, he said, toward which Rabbi Eisendrath has pointed us from the very beginning of his service.

The expansion of our work in Israel, with two full time staff members now working there, and the new congregations formed in Natanya, Beer-sheba and Ashdod, second congregations in Tel Aviv, Jerusalem and Haifa, and a host of religious activities, study missions and summer trips bespeak our commitment to Israel, Mr. Morse said. "In a word," he added, "a bescheed has been secured."

In America as well, the chairman reported, we have expanded our contacts with the larger Jewish community through the UAHC's membership in "every major umbrella organization." These include the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations, the Synagogue Council of America, the National Jewish Community Relations Advisory Council, and others.

He also called attention to the joint project of the Union and the Conservative movement in co-producing a multi-media educational kit on the Sabbath designed especially for the religious education of retarded children.

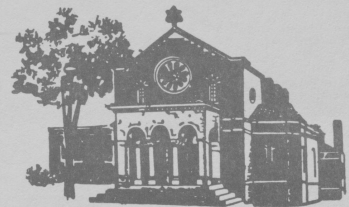

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FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

As you may have noticed on the cover of this issue, Randy Waldman will speak to us on December 24, at our annual College Homecoming Service. And his subject will be "Radical Judaism", an area of activity in which he has been involved at Indiana University.

I have just finished reading Arthur Waskov's new book, "The Bush is Burning," written by one of the national leaders of The Radical Jewish movement in this country. It is a most thought-provoking book, and while I find a number of points with which I take issue, I also find that Dr. Waskov has a great deal to tell us about Judaism - especially in the way in which we should take our teachings far more seriously than we do, that Judaism is a religion of genuine human concern and action, and not for those who want to sit back, be comfortable and inconspicuous. This kind of a message is one which we in Central Kentucky, with our rather Uncle Tom attitudes toward our being Jewish, need to ponder.

I also was given a copy of "The Jewish Radical," published by the Berkeley Radical Jewish Union. It reflected a good bit of what Arthur Waskov spoke of in his book, especially the priorities which we have placed upon our community resources as Jews in America.

What the Radical Jews are confronting us with is not just who we are, but what we stand for - an important question. We cannot dismiss them as opportunists or agitators. They are our own children, asking us to take seriously what we have taught them. Randy was president of our TYG a few years ago. Come and hear how he looks at his Judaism today.

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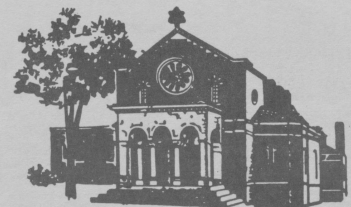

PRESIDENTIAL SERMON DELINEATES CHALLENGES TO THE SYNAGOGUE AND POINTS WAY TO FUTURE

Dr. Maurice N. Eisendrath, delivering the Sabbath sermon on Friday evening, November 5, called for radical changes in synagogue programming to meet more effectively the palpable yearning for true religious experience among Jewish youth and adults, for the formation of interest-centered groups to combat the sense of alienation among synagogue members, and greater flexibility to accommodate the spiritual needs of Jewish families as the trend toward a 4-day week and all-year around schools grows.

Referring to the Union's Long Range Planning study on the attitudes of a representative sampling of members of 12 congregations, Dr. Eisendrath called attention to the finding that the synagogue is peripheral to the lives of many Reform Jews and the "lack of a more clearly defined theological framework that distinguishes Reform from other Jewish movements."

"Our synagogues," he continued, "must likewise strive harder to counteract the paralysis of dehumanization and depersonalization which characterize our age and corrode much of the intimacy and comradeship that distinguished the historic house of prayer and assembly."

The desperate needs of congregations in withering Jewish communities from which the young flee, and congregations located far from the mainstream of Jewish resources must have more help, the rabbi stated. He then announced that, in an effort to provide such additional assistance, Rabbi Daniel L. Davis, recently retired director of the New York Federation of Reform Synagogues, will direct the Committee for Smaller Congregations, a function of the UARC's regional program. "The problem," he said, "is to de-group the larger congregations and to group the smaller ones."
