### From the Rabbi's Desk

This coming Sabbath is the first yahrzeit of Abraham Joshua Heschel, the great Jewish rabbi and sage whom we were fortunate enough to have had speak here in Lexington only a year or so before his death. In commemoration of this anniversary, I received a sermon memorializing Heschel, pointing out that one of his greatest ideals was human concern. This concept unified his life. He was concerned about God and our relationship to Him, he was concerned about the State of Israel, he was concerned about the covenant that we Jews had made with God and how we were fulfilling our end of this agreement.

A spirit of Heschel's greatness cannot help but leave its mark upon the world. We cannot be the same as we were before his being with us. And so, we too need to ask about our concern. What are they? For our personal comforts and convenience, for our individual pleasures and pastimes? Do we extend ourselves beyond the TV, the card tables, the cocktail parties and the golf course into the world? As I look about, as I listen to the conversations that I hear when I am with people, as I consider the lack of involvement of so many people, I am prone to wonder. I wonder what Dr. Heschel would say to us if he were to spend time here in Lexington, how he would evaluate our lives, what he would think of our concerns as weighed by his. It is worth considering on the yahrzeit of such a great Jewish teacher.

### RABBI MENITOFF TO BE HERE JANUARY 11 AND 12



Rabbi Paul J. Menitoff, Director of the Midwest Region of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, will be our second Scholar-in-Residence. He will be here on January 11 and 12. He will be joined in his visit by Mr. Ben Neiman, MOWPT Advisor and Director of Post Confirmation Classes for the Reform Congregations in St. Louis.

Rabbi Menitoff will speak with members of the Senior Group on Friday, January 11, from 4:30-6:00 P.M. on the subject, "Will You Be Jewish in Ten Years?" A Sabbath dinner with the students and their parents will follow. After dinner, he will review with the parents what he spoke about with the students in the afternoon. After our Sabbath worship, he will address the adult congregation. His topic will be, "If You Are Breathing, You Are Religious."

On Saturday, Rabbi Menitoff and Mr. Neiman will meet with our Religious School teachers as part of a Teachers Workshop. They will lead the session from 12:30 until 2:30. At 2:30, Kaye Frankel will conduct an arts and crafts workshop for the teachers. At 6:00 P.M. the TGV will conduct Havdalah followed by a dinner with the Temple Board at 6:30 P.M., with whom Rabbi Menitoff will speak after the meal.

Rabbi Menitoff has been director of our newly enlarged region since this past summer and has an area from Lexington to Denver to administer. He is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati and the Hebrew Union College, being ordained in 1970. Prior to accepting his current post, Rabbi Menitoff was the assistant of Rabbi Roland Ottelsohn of Temple Israel in Boston.

Mr. Neiman is currently completing work on a PhD in Education at Washington University in St. Louis and has an extensive background in educational work.

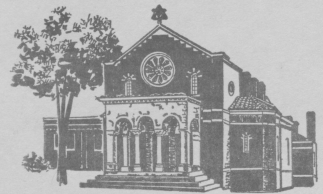

### From the Rabbi's Desk

Last month our Temple Worship Committee inserted the transliteration of many of our prayers inside the back cover of our prayer books. This was done to help many of our members participate more fully in our worship and to be able to join in the singing of some of the responses with which they may be a bit unsure.

The transliteration which was used is in the Sephardi pronunciation, the pronunciation which I have been using all along, and which our children learn in Hebrew School.

Sephardi is the pronunciation which is used in Israel today, where Hebrew is a live and spoken language. The difference between it and Ashkenazi, which we have been using, is in only one consonant and one vowel, and then not all the time with them either.

Sephardi is derived from the Mediterranean Jewish Community; Ashkenazi, from the Central and Eastern European Jewish Community, from which most of our ancestors stem.

The COAR is currently working on a new prayer book. This edition will have transliteration in it, in Sephardi. So when it appears and if we adopt it, we shall be prepared in this regard.

### From the Rabbi's Desk

On January 13, a full page advertisement appeared on page 3 in the Lexington Herald Leader dealing with the situation of the Israeli POWs captured by Syria and Egypt during the recent war. The ad was sponsored by an ad hoc group called Central Kentucky Committee for Jewish Concern and co-signed by Rabbi Schwab and me.

The ad was prominent and bold, and it was impossible for anyone to miss it. It told of the atrocities perpetrated on the prisoners and spoke in terms of human concern and inhuman treatment.

Quite truthfully, Lexington has not known this form of Jewish presence before. We have always been quiet and reserved and tended to do things in a subdued fashion. The ad was anything but that. It spoke out forthrightly of our concern for what has happened to people - to our fellow Jews.

And as we prepared the ad, we were not certain as to what kind of reaction the ad would have. To our delight, all the comments seem to have been positive. One woman called me and asked what her church group might do besides write letters. At the Lexington Seminary, a class discussed the import of the ad for almost a full hour. People I meet casually have commented to me about it and expressed their concern. The reaction seems to indicate that our efforts were most worthwhile, that Jewish concerns can strike a response in the general community, and this is heartwarming.

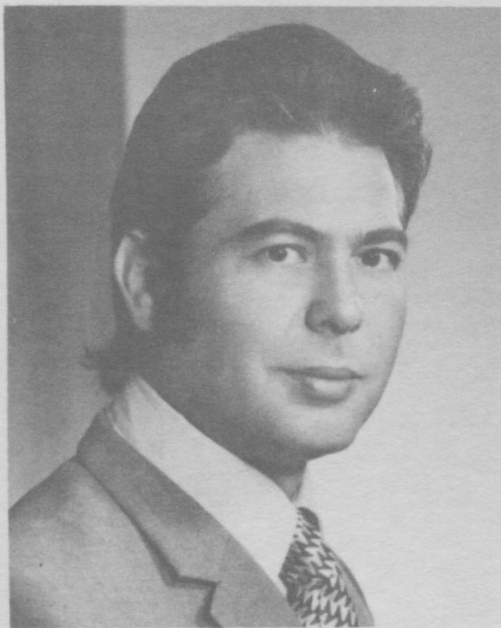

## MR. RAZIEL ZWANG TO TALK FEBRUARY 1



Mr. Raziel Zwang, Regional Director of the Israel Aliyah Center in Cleveland, will be our guest on Friday evening, February 1. He will talk to us after services, in the vestry on the subject, Aliyah and Israel Today.

The subject of immigration to Israel is of great importance. One facet of it is the absorption of Russian Jews. Another is the need for Jews from the West who can bring the technical knowledge which Israel still needs. However, only 4000 Jews migrated from America to Israel last year. This figure should be of direct concern to Mr. Zwang and his office, as well as to us as Jews.

Mr. Zwang is 37 years old, a Sabra born in Holon, a suburb of Tel Aviv. He is a graduate of the Hebrew University and has a masters degree from there also, in Political Science and Public Administration. Mr. Zwang has taught school in Holon and most recently was secretary of the Committee for Academicians Affairs in the Histadrut, which included responsibility for the absorption of new immigrant academicians and students.

Mr. Zwang's talk should be most enlightening on this important, but often overlooked aspect of modern Israel.

### Rabbi's Message

When I drive around town, my car radio is often tuned into WKY-FM. And recently this station has been broadcasting the Senate hearings on the energy crisis.

While I only hear parts of these hearings during my travels, what I do, seems to indicate how very much the average person appears to be at the mercy of these large corporations, with their multinational operations and almost quasi-government like way of conducting their affairs.

At the same time I could not help thinking about the Arab oil boycott and its supposed influence on our energy situation, and how the oil states have tried to connect our current shortage with the Arab-Israeli crisis.

However, as we read the reports and the testimony that continues to be published, it becomes more and more clear that the Mid East conflict was used as a smoke screen to fan the flames of anti-Israeli sentiment and opinion - a purpose which we see has pretty much failed.

It is at times such as these that we need to increase our awareness of the importance to know, of freedom of the press and public investigation. Even if we may not like what this process may discover, may we never sell it short.

### RABBI LIPMAN TO BE HERE FEBRUARY 8



Rabbi Eugene J. Lipman, Temple Sinai, Washington, D.C., will be our guest on Friday evening, February 8. He will talk to us after services, in the vestry, on the subject, The Jewish Community and Its Future.

Rabbi Lipman is lecturer in Judaism at The Catholic University of America. He was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, October 13, 1919. Following graduation from high school, he studied at the University of Pittsburgh, received his A.B. degree from the University of Cincinnati. He was ordained at the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati in 1943, receiving at the same time the M.H.L. degree.

After a year of service with Temple Beth El, Ft. Worth, Texas, Rabbi Lipman was commissioned as a chaplain in the U.S. Army and served in the European theater. After V-E Day, he became involved with Jewish Displaced persons and devoted himself to them until 1948, working primarily with the Hagannah.

In 1948, Rabbi Lipman became a teaching fellow at the HUC-JIR, Cincinnati, then was appointed director of the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation at the University of Washington. At the outbreak of the Korean action, he was recalled to active Army duty, and served until August, 1951.

From 1951 to 1961, Rabbi Lipman was a member of the staff of the UAHC. He served as director of Synagogue Activities and of the Commission on Social Action of Reform Judaism.

Rabbi Lipman is the co-author, with Albert Vorspan, of Justice and Judgment - The Work of Social Action, published in 1956, and A Tale of Ten Cities, a volume on interreligious tensions and teamwork, published in 1962. He has contributed frequently to books and periodicals. His latest book, The Mishnah - Oral Teachings of Judaism, has just been published by Viking Co. as the first of the B'nai B'rith Jewish Heritage series.

Rabbi Lipman has done graduate work in the fields of social psychology and individual psychology. He studied at the Institute for Individual Psychology in New York and completed the work and clinical training in pastoral psychology at Bellevue Hospital, New York.

He is married to the former Esther Marcuson of Pittsburgh. Rabbi and Mrs. Lipman have two sons. A list of some of his organizational affiliations are:

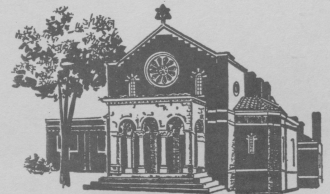

**Rabbi's Message**

As I read the literature currently being written today about the modern synagogue and its problems, one of the words which occurs repeatedly is **community**. So many critics of present-day Jewish life decry our loss of a sense of community. They complain that everything has become too impersonal. People are no longer people but numbers, statistics - even on congregational rolls. We seem to have lost a concern for one another, as individuals. For us as Jews, the Mitzvah of caring so often has been submerged by our busy schedules - and so we say, "I just don't have time."

However, in times of personal tragedy, we are suddenly reawakened to the fact that this is just not so. We have time, if we are willing to make it. We are not as shackled to our appointment books as we had thought.

The events of the past two weeks bring this out so very well. We in Lexington do care. There was never need to wait for a minyan. We could even have started early.

Furthermore in that atmosphere, the community of caring was very much present. There was a deep sense of worship. While no feeling can be completely recaptured, I should like to see whether we might experiment with worship and perhaps regain a little of that mood from time to time.

You have recently been honored by an appointment by the Governor, to a special commission of citizens charged with the responsibility of studying the question of continuing the practice of capital punishment in your state. At the first meeting, a friendly Christian minister on the commission turns to you and says: "You are a fine representative of the Jewish people in our state. It seems to me that the Old Testament requires a capital punishment when it says 'an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' Don't you think it would be wrong for us to ignore that injunction?" What would you say and what position would you take on capital punishment?

**GENOCIDE CONVENTION**

Once again the Genocide Convention is hovering on the brink of ratification in the United States Senate. According to a current roundup, we are no less than six or seven votes short of the required two-thirds vote for ratification. There appears to be approximately 60 Senators prepared to vote for ratification. However, there is the distinct possibility of a filibuster against it and this might require a separate effort to get the votes to close debate.

Your help is needed now to reach Senators Marlow Cook (R) and Walter Huddleston (D) of Kentucky who are still uncommitted to it.

Ratification of the Convention is long overdue; for 20 years the United States has stood aloof from this treaty in the drafting of which we fully cooperated, and in the purpose of which we fully concur. This situation is almost incomprehensible to other nations; it has given ammunition to our detractors and perplexity to our friends around the world. Ratification would be a concrete example of our dedication to the safeguarding of human rights and basic freedoms.

Telephone or wire your U.S. Senator urging his support for the ratification of the Genocide Convention. (There may not be time enough to write!)

Urge others to telephone or wire as well. All offices can be reached through (202) 224-3121

The Convention declares that genocide, whether committed in time of peace or war, is a crime under international law which the contracting parties undertake to prevent and to punish. It defines genocide as certain acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national, ethnical, racial or religious group "as such." Without the specific "intent to destroy," an act which results in the killing of members of the group is homicide, rather than genocide. The Convention requires implementing legislation in the United States.

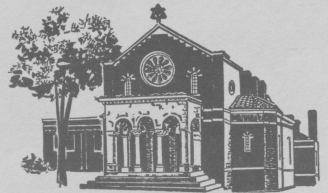

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

As a rabbi I find I am on the mailing list of many organizations and groups, many of whom seem to get my name from who knows where.

In this latter category is a new magazine called *Marriage and Divorce*, of which I received a copy recently. It is on slick paper with a number of articles, most only on unfortunate marriages and divorce and even a short story by Philip Roth.

As I read through the magazine (the initial issue and they wanted me to subscribe), I could not help being saddened by it. Marriage was portrayed as a trap, divorce was the panacea, sex, strictly a physical activity.

Totally lost was any understanding, any awareness of the sanctity of the marriage relationship. Our sense of Kiddushin, of holiness, as the Hebrew word for marriage conveys it, was utterly absent.

But perhaps most distressing of all was my wondering - what sort of view of love do young people see when it is presented in this way. It lacks tenderness; it lacks patience; it lacks compassion. It appears to be strictly utilitarian - to satisfy my own personal needs - either physical or emotional. It seems so very superficial.

I don't know what we can do about this, but at least we can begin to react by denying the publicists' view as being valid for us as individuals. It is an uphill struggle, but I feel it is a necessary one if "love" is to mean anything for us and our children.

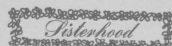

### Rabbi's Message

Enclosed in this issue of The Temple Bulletin is a copy of a letter which I received this past week from Mr. Alexander Tiemkin. As you may recall, almost a year ago Hillel at the University of Kentucky paid for a phone call to Mr. Tiemkin, who was then in Moscow and is now in Tel Aviv.

In the Bulletin of a couple of weeks ago we enclosed a newspaper which had a lengthy article in it dealing with his daughter, Marina. And here we have his first hand account of the situation as he has seen and experienced it.

The situation of persons in Russia today who oppose the Soviet regime is indeed bleak. One does not have to be Jewish to experience the wrath of the Russian government, as the recent arrest and exile of the Nobel Prize winning author, Alexander Solzhenitsyn has indicated. However, by far the largest number of individuals who experience this loss of freedom in their fight against Soviet tyranny are Jews.

Every little effort helps their cause. Share the enclosed letter with someone who might not normally see it. Write to Senators Cook and Huddleston and to Congressman Brockendegge about it. The fate of a thirteen year old girl, and of many others depends on our doing what we can to assist in getting her out of Russia.

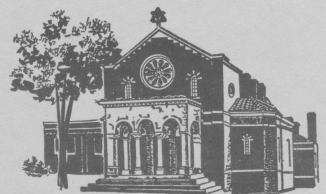

### Rabbi's Message

Purim occurs March 8 this year. It is a minor holiday for us, not because it is not important, but because its origins are not found in the Torah.

And yet as far as its message is concerned, it is a vital holiday, and one which needs our on going attention.

When we look at the story in the Megillah of Esther, everything seems to be going well for the Jews in Persia. One of their fairest maidens is selected as queen. Mordecai appears to be a person of importance in the country. Everything seems to be peaceful.

And yet the ire and rage of one man changed this situation into a potential nightmare, almost overnight, and only the alertness of Mordecai and the bravery of Esther saved the Jews of the land from imminent destruction.

As unpleasant as this message is, it is one that has been repeated over and over again for us - in Spain and Germany of the Middle Ages, and in Germany of this century. It is one that warns us that despite the seeming acceptance of society at the moment, we have no guarantees about tomorrow. We are still gerim toshavim - "resident aliens" and the venom of a tyrant can be turned upon us - on any other group for that matter - almost overnight.

Not a pleasant thought, but then history is replete with unpleasantities as well as pleasantities.

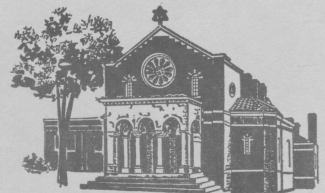

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

One of the most hotly debated subjects in national Jewish circles these days is the question - who is a Jew? The debate has been rekindled by the political situation in Israel and the efforts of the National Religious Party to have this question answered only in terms of the traditional Halachah - orthodox Jewish Law.

With this kind of an answer to the question, the only person who is to be considered a Jew is a person born of a Jewish mother or converted to Judaism by Orthodox procedure (immersion in a Mikveh and circumcision for males) and witnessed by persons acceptable to the orthodox rabbinic in Israel.

This would mean that any person converted in any other fashion - what is by a Reform or Conservative rabbi and his descendants, would not be considered a Jew in the State of Israel. Thus if he went there to live and decided to marry, he would have to be converted to Judaism.

When one begins to think of the implications of this debate upon many people who think of themselves as Jews in this country, they are extensive and distressing. We shall spend time on April 12th discussing this subject at length.

## SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE



Our next Scholar-in-Residence will be Rabbi Harold D. Hahn of Rockdale Temple, Cincinnati, Ohio. He will talk with members of the Senior Group of our Religious School on Friday, March 29, from 4:30 until 6:00 P.M. in the Library. His topic will be "Dimensions of our Faith". Dinner will be served immediately after his talk. After dinner, he will review with the parents what he spoke about with the students in the afternoon. After our Sabbath worship he will address the adult congregation, his topic being "This House of God."

Rabbi Hahn received the B.S. degree from Temple University and attended the Gratz Hebrew College of Philadelphia, leaving to enter the Hebrew Union College (Cincinnati) where he was awarded the Bachelor of Hebrew Letters degree, as well as the Master of Hebrew Letters degree. He is presently a candidate for a doctorate in Hebrew Letters - in the field of religious sociology.

Upon ordination, in 1955, Rabbi Hahn entered the United States Air Force. Completing his military service, he served Temple Sholom, Broomall, Pa., Temple Beth El, Detroit, as Associate Rabbi; and Ohef Sholom Temple in Norfolk, Va.

In 1969 Rabbi Hahn was elected Senior Rabbi of Rockdale Temple, the oldest congregation west of the Alleghenies and one of the historic pulpits of Reform Judaism.

Rabbi Hahn is a member of the CCAR, serving on its Executive Board. He also holds membership in the Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis, the American Sociological Association, the Academy of Religion and Mental Health and is on the Board of the Synagogue Council of America.

Rabbi Hahn is active in the religious, educational and civic life of the general Cincinnati community, especially in the field of inter-group understanding.

The following is quoted from the Bulletin of Temple Emanu-El of Willingboro, N. J.

Is there anyone whose mother never warned them about "taking things for granted?" As I sit in my car, waiting in line for a few drops of gas, that old adage comes to mind. Who could have imagined a time when I would have to use gas looking for a station that is open, with gas to sell, on a day when I can buy it? Something, which only a relatively short while ago was an incidental part of my life, taken for granted has now become a major facet in planning my daily activities. An area of life to which little attention was paid is now a major source of anguish and pain.

I wonder if an analogy might be made to the place of Judaism in our lives. There is little question most of us take it for granted. We assume the synagogue will always be there, whether we support it or not. We believe there will always be a source to tap when it comes to the education of our children, for religious services and observances, for rituals and ceremonials. Whenever we need Judaism, as with an everflowing source of fuel, it will be there.

Yet, perhaps this fuel crisis may give us some "fuel" for thought. Judaism, unlike coal or oil, is not a finite substance. Our lack of gas is due to political and/or business manipulation. But our Judaism is passed on one generation to the next. If we do not nurture it; if we do not make it an integral part of our lives; if we pay no more than lip service to it, it may not be there when we need it. Furthermore, what will our children receive, and, in turn, pass on to the next generation? Many of us take our Judaism for granted. Maybe the gas shortage has taught us not to be so confident,

The ecology movement began this rethinking. The energy crisis will emphasize it even more. As I consider these factors, I cannot help but think of the opening words of the 24th Psalm, "The earth is the Lord's" and wonder how much attention we have really paid to these words heretofore.

**A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI**

Pesach is the time when we really begin to feel that Spring is returning to the world. Flowers begin to bloom, trees are showing their fresh new foliage, we are ready to dig in the garden and even consider moving the lawn once more. The earth is now freed from the bondage of winter.

And so the story of our liberation from the bondage of Egypt so long ago seems like a natural tie in with the liberation we feel from the drab and the restrictions of the past months. We sense a new awareness of freedom of movement. We are no longer so confined to the indoors as we were during the past months.

And yet how often we overlook this subtle change in our life situations. How often we pay little heed to the restrictions which bind our lives to routine, to ordinariness, to dullness. 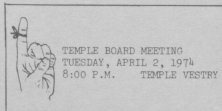
**PARENT EFFECTIVENESS TRAINING**

Letter from Yuli Tartakovsky, a Jewish Activist in Kiev, Russia:

Dear Mr. Leffler, I got your 2nd letter with the congratulation for the New Year but after New Year (Christian) I wrote an answer to you. Now my mother is alright. The most part of my friends got the permissions and went to Israel and we hope for good changes in our lives.

I'm studying English. It's very difficult to study Hebrew in such situations as mine. But I began to read *The History of Jews* by Dr. Henry Graetz. There are 11 very big volumes. It's very interesting but I wish to finish reading it in Israel.

My sister is alright. She is a student of prepare course and studies at the University of Tel Aviv. I think her Hebrew is very good. She lives alone (without us) 11 months. It's very difficult for her and for us.

It's late now, but I'd like to congratulate you and your wife with Purim, hoping it will be a healthy and happy one with your children. My best regards to all our friends.

**From the Rabbi**

My recent trip to Israel had many highlights - Golda Meir's talk to the COAR meeting, the reception at the President's House, meeting a plane load of Russian immigrants at Lod at 3:00 A.M., Sabbath worship by the Sea of Galilee, and on and on.

But of all of the exciting things I did, I think the two hours I spent with Alexander Tieskin in his room at the Absorption Center in Ramat Aviv was the most moving.

You may recollect, we called Professor Tieskin a year ago in Moscow and spoke to him for about 10 minutes. We taped the conversation and used parts of it in our worship service on Soviet Jerry. At that time, he was desperately trying to find his daughter who had been kidnaped in February, a month earlier.

In October, Prof. Tieskin was permitted to leave Russia, but without his daughter. He is now doing research in physics (his field) at the University of Tel Aviv. During my visit with him, he spoke at length of his experiences in Russia, of the desperately situation of many Soviet Jews, of the gangster type behavior of the Soviet authorities, of the fear fostered by the KGB, and of countless other facets of that distressing situation. His most telling comment was that they were like a *Ber Mishagayam* - a house of mad men. In such a situation, freedom cannot exist. He is among the fortunate ones. How many more Jews do we have to help escape from that prison state! Our efforts are not in vain - as I learned so very movingly.

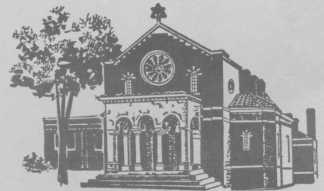

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

There is a great deal of experimentation and innovation occurring within American Judaism today. Our young people write creative worship services, following the basic outline of the liturgy, but bringing current ideas and concerns to the old forms. Synagogues are being built that do not have pews in their sanctuaries so that the seating may be varied from time to time. Films and slides are being used to augment the words of prayer. There are many "new" modes being tried.

And one of these "new" modes is that of Havurah type worship - worship in the intimacy of small groups in someone's home, rather than in the more usual setting of the synagogue. We already know this form of worship. Everytime there is a minyan service in someone's home following a death in the family, we have this kind of setting. But we have never tried it as a part of our Sabbath worship - until this coming Friday, April 19, when we shall have a Havurah service at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Jerry King, 836 Cahaba Road. This service will utilize one of the experimental worship pamphlets we have, but in most other respects will be similar to the worship occurring in the Sanctuary at the same time. There will be Kiddush, the blessing of the Shabbat candles and even an Oneg Shabbat. One of the members of the Worship Committee will have a copy of my sermon to read to the worshippers. So for the most part, only the location and the mood will be different.

This form of worship is an experiment for us. The Worship Committee and I are both anxious to know how it will be received. Will it have a different aura to it from worship in the Sanctuary? If so, how, why? Is it a form we ought to continue as a viable alternative to the regular worship in our Sanctuary? Might it even replace the worship in the Sanctuary from time to time? There are many uncertainties about it, questions we should like to consider. But we shall never really know until we try and can get some responses. Therefore, if you should like to participate in this experiment, the place is the Kings' home, 836 Cahaba Road at 8:00 P.M. this Friday evening. If not, I shall be conducting our regular worship in the sanctuary.

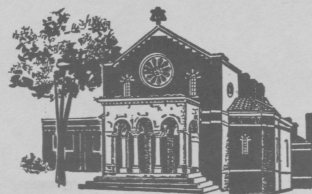

**A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI**

On April 27, Israel celebrates the 26th anniversary of its establishment. Last year at this time we rejoiced over the completion of the first quarter century of her existence. Now we are a year into the second quarter, and the mood and atmosphere surrounding Israel is quite different from what it was a year ago. There is unrest, discontent, a crisis in government, inflation, loss of faith in their military prowess and a myriad of other new situations for them to confront.

In this sort of atmosphere, the celebration of Yom Ha-Atzmat this year is quite different from what it was last year. The certainty, the elation, the exaltation of the past is no longer as strong as it was. And yet, we cannot begin to think that just because the situation is not as rosy as a year ago, all is lost.

Rather is this Yom Ha-Atzmat a new opportunity for us to help Israel evaluate herself - to consider what she means to world Jewry, what she means to Jews residing within her borders, what her relations might be with her Arab neighbors. New attitudes and criteria have now come to the forefront. As we wish Israel well on the occasion of this anniversary, let us also aid her in confronting her current "crisis of the spirit". I shall consider this subject in my sermon on April 26.

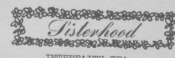

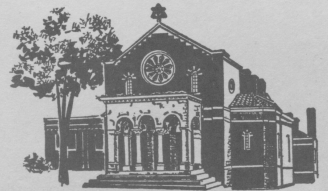

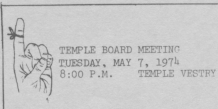

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

During this past month I have spoken about some of the problems which face Israel today - the question of who is a Jew, and the need for us to begin to increase our awareness of Israel as a social entity, and the problems confronting her on the occasion of her 26th birthday.

Israel today has become a far more complex nation than she was in the past. Such a change can be seen as a very positive one, a part of the maturing process which can be most fruitful for a young nation passing out of its early stages and beginning to be able to take a more adult kind of view of itself and of the world in which it exists.

And yet with all of these changes, there continues to remain one constant - Israel's need of additional funds from Diaspora Jewry. Funds are needed to help her economy where it has been seriously affected by the war. This kind of aid is provided by Israel Bonds.

The other aspect of our assistance is through UJA - to assist in the many charitable aspects of Israeli life which continue to be pressing needs - the absorption of the continuing numbers of Russian Jews, the rehabilitation of soldiers injured in the recent war, the community centers in new settlements and countless other projects which are the goal of charitable efforts and not supported by government money.

On Sunday evening, May 5, our Central Kentucky United Jewish Synagogue will have its opening event for this year's drive. I urge you to attend it, to learn of the current needs of Israel for our **Tzedakkah** dollar. They are still great and we cannot shirk this responsibility. Plan to attend and be generous in your support of this community wide effort - 70% of whose funds are directed to Israeli needs.

**From the Rabbi**

During the course of the year, I find I am asked many questions that catch me unprepared and unable to respond. Often these are good and valid questions but about subjects that I have no expertise or to which I have given little thought.

As illustration of this, a woman recently called me and asked why, if Pesach started on the 6th of April, Easter was on the 14th and not the 7th? A good question! Easter should be on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Vernal Equinox. It wasn't. I turned that question over to a minister, who also did not know and is pursuing the matter for us.

I also find that I become involved in things that are a bit out of the ordinary and just this past week one of them occurred - the annual service at the Medical Center for the cadavers that the medical students use in their studies. This brief eucumenical memorial service has taken place for a number of years now. It is a very simple one, lasting about 10 minutes at the most. But it is very moving because it reminds us all once more of the sanctity of human life and that bodies which medical students use in their studies were once living, breathing people with human hopes and wishes and dreams. Such a service does a great deal to restore an awareness of a common humanity in a setting in which it can be all too easy to forget this vital relationship between a student and his cadaver.

Being a rabbi has a number of interesting facets to it.

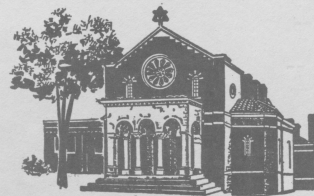

**TELEGRAM RECEIVED**

The following wire was received from Rabbi Hillel E. Silverman, Chairman of the Rabbinical Advisory Council, U.J.A.:

There can be no adequate expression of our outrage and revulsion with what happened in Ma-alot. American Jews have a special stake in the town of Ma'alot because as one of Israel's development towns, we helped to make it a haven for those who came to the State of Israel from oppressed lands. We were determined, as we are determined now, to make Ma-alot a refuge, a safe place for one to live and raise his children. That effort cannot be thwarted by the acts of cruel and cynical men who would use the lives of children as the currency of their terrorism. From Abraham to our own day, Jews have determined that their children will not be sacrificed on any altar.

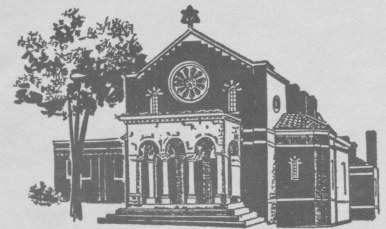
On behalf of the Rabbinical advisory Council of the United Jewish Appeal, I call upon each of my colleagues to bring the message of our relationship to Ma-alot to his congregation and to reaffirm our commitment to the Jewish People. American Jews must once again demonstrate their solidarity by their maximal participation in our humanitarian work on behalf of the Jews of Ma-alot and of all the other places where Jews seek to live lives of peace and dignity.

### RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

#### RABBI'S MESSAGE

The recent savage slaughter of 18 school children in the village of Meaot in Israel has brought home to us once more the grimness of the struggle for existence facing the State of Israel. The shock and the grief on the faces of the mourners at the funeral in Safed were far more telling than any words could describe.

This horrible event, together with the brutal attack on Kiryat Sh'moneh last month are indicative of the desperate efforts of the Palestinian guerrillas to prevent any kind of peaceful settlement in the Mideast, and perhaps also indicative of their fear that Mr. Kissinger might be successful with the Syrians and that as a result, they will have no officially recognized government willing to stand by them and plead their cause.

As I look at this situation which is tragic in so many ways, I find that perhaps the most unfortunate aspect of it is that no one seems capable of bringing the guerrillas to the discussion table and able to force them to begin to confront the realities of what has occurred. Israel will not disappear. The Arabs will not be able to get their hands back. Peace would be far more beneficial for all concerned. There has to be a better way! What is going on now achieves nothing - neither the guerrilla raids - nor the retaliatory bombings. There will have to be alternatives for both sides.

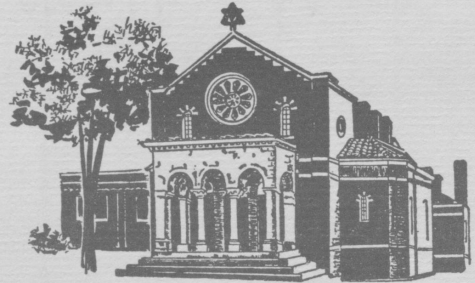

From the Rabbi's Desk

The end of our activity year is upon us. We can now look back and see what was accomplished, measure our successes and bemoan our failures. In the balance I think we had a worthwhile year, although I can see some gaps which need attention. This we shall begin to tend to in the weeks ahead, when we shall begin to do our planning and scheduling for the coming year.

On the other hand, as I look back on this past year, it has been most distressing from a different standpoint. The large number of serious illnesses and deaths has been way out of proportion to what might be expected. I visited the hospitals so frequently that I felt like a fixture in them. And I was at Milward's too often also. Let us hope that this sort of thing does not continue. It is not healthy for us!

And now for the more quiet pace of the summer months, when I can begin to gather my thoughts together and place them in some orderly fashion. After a busy year, a period of less activity is most welcome. But it is not totally quiet. Our Sabbath worship continues throughout the summer. Committees begin to be organized. There is a great deal of planning to be done. And if you wish to be part of this planning, please let Saul Rubin or me know. We'll be happy to include you.

Once more we gather to observe the High Holidays, to hear their message of confession and contrition, to examine our deeds and words against the standards which Judaism has established for us. It is a season of evaluation and hopefully of renewal.

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

The period of the Holocaust was an infamous one for mankind. Man's inhumanity to man will remain in our memories as Jews for eternity. Six million innocent persons slaughtered! Six million Jews killed, just for being Jews! How can we forget?

Poems, stories, war crimes, trials and other portrayals of this period of horror help to keep the memory fresh for us, so that we recall that man is not always glorious, that he can sink to the very depths of bestiality.

One of the means by which we can recall this period of history and what it meant is with photographs. Therefore I have made arrangements for a thirty panel display of photographs to be shown in the gallery of the Lexington Public Library for three weeks, beginning October 4. This exhibit is entitled, *The Holocaust and Resistance*, which is an outline of Jewish history in Nazi Occupied Europe from 1933-1945, and was put together by *Yad V'Zemem*, in Israel.

I strongly urge that you see this exhibit while it is in Lexington. Take your children. It is not a pleasant thing to contemplate, but the lessons of history need to be learned well, so that they not occur again. Take your non-Jewish friends. It will help to explain how we feel about the very existence of the State of Israel.

It will be an exhibit that will sadden you, but one that cries out to be seen.

### Rabbi's Message

A year ago Israel was at war with Egypt and Syria. The big guns were roaring and lives were being lost on both sides. Now the big guns are silent, but lives are still being lost on both sides. Guerrillas enter Israel and attack unarmed civilians. Israeli planes retaliate and bomb guerrilla encampments. Such behavior gets nowhere, except to keep the flames of hatred and misunderstanding lit. It leads up a blind alley.

What is needed is a new course of action, the opening up of dialogue and understanding between Israel and her neighbors. There has been little of this so far.

A straw in the wind is a new book which I just finished reading and which I commend to you - *Between Enemies* by Amos Elon, an Israeli author and Sana Hassan, an Egyptian writer. The book consists of dialogues between these two people, each attempting to understand the other and to comprehend what it is that makes his "enemy" function as he does. It is a fascinating, revealing and hopeful book, which could lead the way to a greater awareness by us of the Arab stance and of the Arabs to the Israeli stance.

Surely the most revealing statement in the book is made by Mr. Elon when he says:

"Perhaps we both boxed ourselves into taking rigid positions that became self-fulfilling prophecies on both sides. The more wars you launch, the more aggressive, the more hateful, the more destructive you appear in our eyes. And the more wars we won, the more expansionist and greedy for new territories we began to appear in your eyes."

Only an open dialogue between people can prove how accurate Mr. Elon's point is and whether detente can become a factor in the Mid East as we would like to see it between the United States and Russia.

I commend the book to you as worthwhile reading. As Jews, we tend to see only one side. Here is an opportunity to see both sides and to share our experience with a sensitive Israeli.

**A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI**

As a parent, I know that during the course of the year we all have occasion to discuss with our children their plans for the future, and at times they seem to be at loose ends, not really having any idea as to what they may wish to do. And often, we as parents, feel inadequate here too, because we lack any concrete suggestions for them.

If this sort of thing should happen to you, I would be happy to assist. I continually receive information concerning worthwhile programs in Israel which might be of interest to your child. There are such things as a six month exchange program at the Leo Baeck School in Haifa, a full credit year of study in Jerusalem, while living and working on a Kibbutz nearby, summer work-study programs both on Kibbutzim and on the site of archaeological digs - all of which the UAHC has set up.

In addition, there are many others - programs of study at Israeli Universities (with Ulpan Hebrew courses first), programs of service to people, different work-study summer programs.

I am continually receiving new and updated information on these opportunities. If you think that they might even be slightly interested, do let me know and I will be happy to keep you posted on possible choices as they come across my desk.

### Rabbi's Message

At the October meeting of the Temple Board a decision was made to begin serious investigation of renovation of our current building. Such a move has been a long time in coming and in all candor, has been put off for too long. What the outcome of this decision will be in specifics is not known as yet. There is still a great deal of investigation and planning to be done.

However, I am delighted that our Temple Board has finally begun to confront the problem. It has been too long in occurring.

Our current building is not totally inadequate. We are still able to function in it. But it is a limping kind of functioning that we do. The classrooms are just too small for our needs and the women panic if we have more than 100 reservations for an occasion. For a congregation our size we ought not be so limited. The kitchen is a monstrosity. Just ask anyone who has worked in it. Our TYG is treated like a step child, with a lounge hidden away in the basement, in an area that has water seepage problems when it rains hard. Our adult programs limp along, because we lack a lounge in which we can meet informally and hold discussions. Our library is bursting at the seams. There is no proper entry into the building. And there are loads of other shortcomings that we have.

Unfortunately, we have become accustomed to these inadequacies and have learned to live with them. But as I meet with our Temple committees I am becoming increasingly aware of their unhappiness with this building as it is currently structured. They want changes to occur also.

We have a long way to go to upgrade and modernize our facilities. Let's hope this first step will be followed by many more, until we complete the task.

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

Enclosed in this issue of the Temple Bulletin is a book mark announcing Jewish Book Month. I hope you like it. It's a handy way of reminding yourself how far along you have gotten in your reading of Jewish books.

Jewish books are important for us, because ours is a religion not just of faith, but primarily of knowledge and understanding - out of which we can draw the rubrics of our beliefs. Our congregants suggest books for the library and read what we have in it. It is used for research. It is used for pleasure. It serves a most necessary function.

Thus, enjoy Jewish Book Month! Continue to patronize the Temple Library! Build your Jewish knowledge and faith through reading.

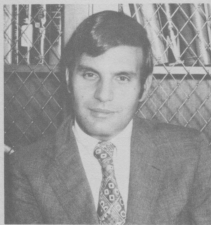

JEWISH PRAYER

In ancient religious ritual was virtually the sole form of worship. The performance of certain rites, such as the sacrifice of animals, the burning of incense, the solemn dance and the intoning of potent formulas was the prevalent mode of religious expression. In ancient Israel, however, due chiefly to the creative idealism of the prophets, religion became subjective, turning its attention from the world of outward performance to the inner world of thought and aspiration. With this deepening of the understanding, God was gradually envisaged as the one "who searches the heart" and was therefore to be worshipped not merely by outward ritual (which was never wholly rejected) but also by obeying the behest: "And ye shall seek Me, and find Me, when ye shall search for Me with all your heart" (Jeremiah XXIX, 13). The eager heart-searching of the prophets was continued in the meditations of the Psalmists whose spiritual self-revelations still serve as the biography of the soul, and even to the modern student reveals "the whole music of the heart of man swept by the hand of the Maker."

THE SACRED TONGUE

This Synagogue service is essentially the expression of the soul of collective Israel. In the Synagogue we meet as Jews, there in prayer, in aspiration, in confession of faith, so carry on the stream of spiritual effort which has flowed unbroken through the ages ever since Israel became conscious of himself. Therefore the prayers will not merely voice private needs and modern ideas, but will clearly speak of Israel. And so they will largely be in Hebrew, Israel's historic language. You may get rid of Hebrew, but with it you will get rid of the Synagogue too, of the Synagogue as a living organism, as the wellspring of Jewish feeling and the inspiration of Jewish life. Not in this all. The claim of Hebrew, though bound up with the increments of public worship, yet transcends them. It will meet you whenever you open your Jewish history, whenever you open your Bible. As long as we remain Jews and call the Bible our own, the Tongue in which it is written must be inestimably sacred to us.

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

Enclosed in this issue of our Temple Bulletin is a copy of my report to the Temple Board, which I read at the most recent meeting, November 4. After some discussion, the suggestion was made that what I had to say should not only be directed to the Board members, but that I should give it broader publicity in the congregation. I have taken this suggestion.

I think this concern for a more positive attitude toward our congregation is a vital matter for every member. This coming week we shall celebrate Thanksgiving. Friends and family will gather to enjoy one another's company, and to sit down to the traditional Thanksgiving meal.

But perhaps this meal will be less sumptuous than in the past. A few of the little extra items may be missing, not included because prices have gone up so very much.

Nevertheless, we are able to sit down to a meal and most of us will over-indulge and feel extremely uncomfortable as we leave the table. Food costs more, but we are far from hungry.

Our situation is in sharp contrast to other parts of the world which are experiencing severe starvation. Food is not merely expensive, it is almost non-existent. This is the basis for the recent world Food Conference in Rome. If we were in the place of the people of Calcutta or parts of Africa, Thanksgiving would be a hollow occasion. There would be no food on our tables.

As we give thanks for what we are blessed with, despite the rising costs, let us also think of the people in the world who have nothing on their tables for which to say thanks. Perhaps if we do, the missing items and the high costs will seem less upsetting.

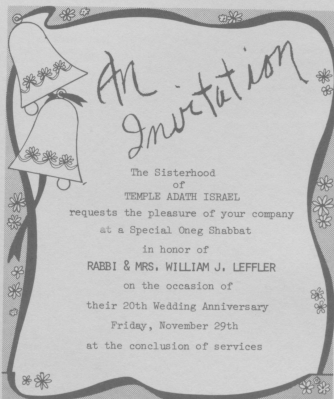

**STAMPS FOR WELLINGTON**

We just received a large assortment of foreign stamps to send to New Zealand. Many thanks.

We continue to send stamps, but are now more selective - only American commemoratives, high denominations, and foreign stamps. Their market for the usual foreign stamp is glutted.

Be sure the stamps are not torn or mutilated in any way or they are of no value.

Not rarely a Jew is heard to murmur that we must learn from our enemies and try to remedy our failings. He forgets, however, that the anti-Semitic accusations are valueless, because they are not based on a criticism of real facts, but are merely due to the psychological law according to which children, savages, and maladjusted fools make persons and things against which they have an aversion responsible for their sufferings. Pretexts change, but the hatred remains. The Jews are not hated because they have evil qualities; evil qualities are sought for in them because they are hated.

**REFLECTIONS**

We, in Reform Judaism, are living through a period of revival of traditional rituals. From midnight Selichot Service, to wearing the tallit and yarmulke, hundreds of Reform Rabbis are reintroducing old customs and ceremonies. This is done in the name and cause of making Judaism more meaningful and enriched, more binding and distinctive.

Ever since I began my rabbinate, more than 40 years ago, I sensed and knew that people are ritual minded. They like pageantry and costumes. They want to do something, almost anything, to mark their worship, to observe the wedding, the bris, the funeral.

While meeting with mourners before a funeral, I was convinced at times that had I told them to stand on their heads for an hour each morning for a month as a rite of grief, they would do so gladly.

Certainly, numbers of people do not feel this need. They are pleased with the Reform service as it is. They gain no lift from a yarmulke or a march of Torahs around the sanctuary. I suspect, however, that most people enjoy doing and wearing special things - are attracted to the exotic, to the unique symbols added to their worship. They feel a strong desire to dramatize all forms of religious observance.

Believing this to be a fact, I predict the constant growth of ceremonies and symbols in Reform congregations everywhere. This does not mean the end of Reform Judaism, the amalgamation with the Conservative and Orthodox movements. But, it surely means that in our day most Reform synagogues will reintroduce abandoned ceremonial practice.

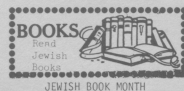

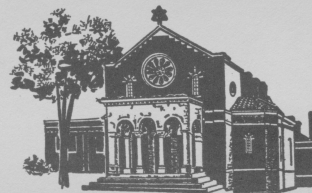

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

Six years ago the Jews of the Soviet Union were called the "Jews of Silence" by Elie Wiesel. Today this title is no longer applicable. The Jews of Russia are being heard from loudly and clearly in their desire to emigrate, most of them to Israel.

Over the course of years, you know of our concern and involvement in this cause - the programs we have had here, our phone call to Alexander Tieskin almost two years ago, my meeting him in Tel Aviv last spring and many other illustrations of the small part that we have played in the tremendous world wide effort to help our brethren there to free themselves of their bondage.

And bondage is a good word for it, for Soviet Jews liken their situation to that of our forefathers in Egypt, groaning for freedom from the oppression and tyranny of the USSR. Illustrative of this is a recent book on the struggles of Soviet Jewry since 1970, The Last Exodus by Leonard Schroeter, a lawyer living in Seattle and a member of Temple Beth Am, a Reform congregation there. Mr. Schroeter has helped defend some of the Jews on trial in Russia and so writes also from experience. His book is in our Temple library.

And enclosed in this issue of the Temple Bulletin is correspondence I received from Alexander Tieskin a few months ago, a letter telling of the plight of his daughter (who is mentioned in Schroeter's book). I have written a number of letters to high government officials expressing my concern. I do hope you will respond in a similar fashion. The outcries of concerned persons has helped get many people out of Russia. Let's hope that our voices will be successful in behalf of this teenager who is still held captive.

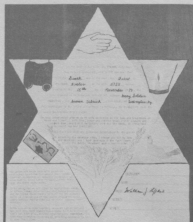
On December 8, the Junior Assembly will see the film, "Neighbors", which deals with tolerance.

Rabbi's Message

The recent speech of Yassir Arafat at the United Nations and the acclaim which he and the Palestine Liberation Organization received there is a major source of concern for us as Jews. It seems all out of proportion to his importance and the place of the Palestine Liberation Organization in world affairs. It makes the United Nations appear to honor terrorism and the shedding of innocent blood. It certainly bodes ill for the future of Israel.

In addition, this action by the United Nations has tended to isolate the United States in our support of Israel - both politically and militarily. The votes were very lopsided and our supplying Israel with weapons now becomes crucial for her as well as for us, as a New York Times article reporting on the Pentagon seems to indicate.

This new turn of events on the international scene has many distressing factors.

On the other hand, as a Jew, I think we need to search for some possible good aspects to what has occurred, for Judaism always tries to find the good in any bad situation. Perhaps the recognition of the Palestine Liberation Organization will begin to make them realize that if they want further successes that they will have to do it through negotiation and not terrorism. Hopefully their disavowal of the recent BOAC hijacking may be one such indication. We need to be alert to others, if they occur. This recent turn of events, as bad as it initially appeared for Israel, may still be a turning point that will move the recent stalemate in the Mid East off dead center and begin the serious negotiations that can bring about a real settlement of the problems.

Our concerns for Israel are certainly real and legitimate. But to panic when things seem adverse does no good. Israel has suffered reversals and set backs before, and has come out of them with time and our support. Again these are needed, and not just the condemning of the United Nations and Arafat. It is a complicated international problem with many nuances. We ought not permit one or two aspects if it discourages us. Israel is too great for this!

JOYOUS SERVICE

The easily depressed, the despondent and morose man has often become what he is from mere selfishness. It is so delightful to pity ourselves, to yield to the "luxury of woe," and sing a plaintive song of self-commiseration in a minor key. But the next step is to give your soul to the devil. Judaism is not more emphatic against the latter than the former, and I am sure that there are few wicked thoughts than this: that God made me with a despondent, melancholy heart. Shammai said: "Always be cheerful." R. Ishmael said: "Ever be joyful." This Rabbi Ishmael died a martyr's death in the second century of this era. Do you think that when he suffered he repined and said: "If I had known how my life was to end I would have wept my days away instead of joyously doing my duty? Serve the Lord with gladness, and the gladness will leave its after-glow of resignation, contentment, and peace."

EDUCATION FOR DEMOCRACY  
There is the danger of yielding to dictatorial authority. Jewish education has at its disposal a potent means of combating that danger. It has been a long-standing practice with the Jews to initiate the Jewish layman into as much knowledge as feasible of the law under which he lives, the civil and family law, as well as the ritual law. That knowledge was to consist not only of the formal rules which he was expected to obey, but of the basic premises underlying them, and of the reasoning by which they were arrived at. In Jewish tradition this study of the law is known as Gemara, in contrast with Mishnah, which is the code. The study of the law, especially when pursued in such a spirit, constituted for the Jew religion, or a means of experiencing the divine. He felt as though he himself stood at Sinai and as though God revealed to him anew what he was to do in order that he might live the life abundant. He was thus saved from falling into the habit of obeying, as Isaiah puts it, "a commandment of men learned by rote." Thus, in commenting on God's saying to Moses: "And these are the ordinances which thou shalt set before them," the Sages add, "Set out these ordinances before them like a well arranged table." That is, let them have an intelligent understanding of the laws.

### ISRAEL COMMISSION

Rabbi Ira Youdovin, who directs the Israel Commission for the UAHC, was here as a Scholar-in-Residence in November. Last year we collected funds for the work of this Commission in its efforts to aid the Reform movement in Israel. Once again we are being asked to assist in this task, one which is an uphill struggle, if we are to help provide Israeli Jews with an alternative to the strictures of Orthodoxy which is the only kind of Judaism they currently know.

To do this job, we are being asked to contribute \$5.00 per family for this effort. Checks should be made out to Israel Commission - UAHC and sent to the Temple office.

To indicate the urgency of this appeal, the following paragraph is quoted from a recent Israel Commission announcement:

"Financially, the cost of non-recognition is heavy. Orthodox institutions and clergy are supported by government revenue; Progressive Judaism receives none. While the entire concept of state-supported religion is fraught with as-yet unresolved difficulties, the fact remains that the typical Israeli is in neither the habit nor the economic position to pay sizeable synagogue dues. As a result, Progressive congregations exist in woefully inadequate facilities, and face a chronic inability to provide much-needed programming. One can imagine the difficulties in attracting new members."

Let us all do our part in this much needed program!

### From the Rabbi's Desk

In this copy of the Bulletin I am enclosing a talk on the Jewish family which I gave after worship over a month ago.

The subject has provoked much concern and discussion in Jewish circles in recent years. At both the recent regional Biennial in St. Louis and the National UAHC Biennial a year ago, sessions were held on this topic. It is an emotional subject because it affects us in a very personal way and we react from our gut when something touches us in this fashion.

Some of the comments I received after the discussion in the Vestry questioned my concern for Jewish ritual, wondering whether it was an attempt to return to Orthodoxy, and pointing out that Reform had gotten along very well in the past without such an emphasis. My response to these comments is that it is not a return to Orthodoxy but rather a realization that religion (and especially Judaism) without rituals is merely an exercise in intellectualizing. Judaism without any rituals is cold and sterile. Our ideals and values are reflected in many of our rituals and the observance of them aids us in having them continually before us, for our own awareness and for our children's awareness also. Furthermore, it is the performance of such acts that brings the richness of meaning to our Jewish awareness and into our lives. And in our modern world of many shattered values, rituals and ceremonies can help us maintain some of the values we hold dear and which otherwise may get lost to us.

The choice of which rituals to observe is up to the individual. But a positive frame of reference toward them needs to be articulated also.

From the Rabbi's Desk

After a hiatus of a number of months I have started to go out to the Federal Correctional Institution (formerly NARCO) and to meet with the Jewish residents there, who currently number about 15. The prison is a minimum security institution and so the residents are persons whom the administration feels it can trust not to escape. As a result they have a great deal more freedom of movement than is usually the case and come into town regularly for work release, movies and a wide variety of other activities.

This freedom of movement, however, has begun to prove a source of embarrassment to me because they need escorts for some of their activities and so far our congregation has not responded to their request for this assistance. And so they keep asking me, "What kind of Jews are in Lexington, who are not willing to give of themselves in this way, who will not assist fellow Jews when they are asked?" And quite truthfully, I am at a loss to answer their questions. I do not know what to say, other than try to offer apologies and alibis, but these are beginning to wear thin.

Therefore I need your help! Please call me and tell me you will assume some of this responsibility. The residents (and they are really nice people) want to come to services, to attend programs, to spend an evening in someone's home. But they need us to make the first gesture. Call me. I'll tell you how you can begin to be of service in this regard.

## ADULT EDUCATION

### THE QUALITY OF OUR FAMILY LIFE

This year the Adult Education Committee will focus on family life. All families face conflict, day-to-day problems in relating to one another, failures in communication among its members. Our purpose is to offer members of the congregation the opportunity to increase the quality of their family life, to heighten understanding and communication between family members. All of us want to lead as happy a family life as possible. We hope this series will help in the achievement of that goal.

A series of five films, secured from the State Department of Human Resources, Educational Branch, will be shown on January 12, 19 and 26 and February 2 and 9 (9:45 - 11:45 A.M.) at the Lexington Oral School, 158 North Ashland Avenue, which is just down the street from the Temple. A discussion, question and answer period - a "thinking together session" will follow the film. A psychiatrist or psychologist will lead each discussion.

January 12 - Love, Susan - This film deals with parent-child misunderstanding. Its purpose is to help family members recognize and cope with parental misunderstanding and mistreatment, and to help them understand how both parents and children can unintentionally cause conflicts within even a loving family. Discussion leader - Dr. Leonard Lipton.

January 19 - But Names Will Never Hurt? This film deals with the nature of prejudice; how prejudice separates one person from another and affects the feelings of everyone concerned. Its purpose is to help people recognize situations where prejudice and discrimination exist and to help them express and deal with the feelings aroused by prejudice. Discussion leader - To be announced.

January 26 - Breakup - This film deals with the impact of divorce upon parents and children: the fear, anger, guilt and anxiety which this situation arouses in family members. Its purpose is to help people deal with family breakup in a sensitive, effective manner. Discussion leader - To be announced.

February 2 - In My Memory - This film deals with the death of a loved one. Its purpose is to explore the meaning of death and to help people develop ways of dealing with the feelings brought about by the death of a family member or a friend. Discussion leader - To be announced.

February 9 - Buy and Buy - This film deals with the impact of T.V. advertisement on our lives. Its purpose is to help parents guide their children into wise decisions in the face of conflicting emotions and group pressure. Discussion leader - To be announced.

Reserve these five Sunday mornings and plan to attend these enlightening and thought provoking family life sessions.

Dear Colleague:

Rabbi David Saperstein from the Religious Action Center asked me to convey the following message to you:

The Trade Reform Bill which contains the Jackson Amendment re Soviet Jewish immigration is in trouble, because of the lack of time.

It must be passed by the Senate and the Joint Conference Committee and repassed by the House and Senate within ten days.

Please contact your congregants and ask them to wire or call immediately their Senators and Congressman, urging them to do whatever they can in order to implement passage of this bill in this session. If the bill is not passed during this session, it will be lost for at least six months to a year.

### CONGRESSMEN LAUNCH NATIONWIDE CAMPAIGN FOR MARINA TIEMKIN

Congressmen James Scheuer and Steven Solarz have launched a nationwide campaign by the Student Struggle For Soviet Jewry on behalf of 15 year-old Marina Tiemkin of Moscow, who was kidnapped by Soviet secret police after publicly stating her desire to leave for Israel.

Congressman Solarz, noting that the campaign was being launched on Hanukkah, described Marina as one of the "Maccabees of today". Congressman Scheuer denounced the use of drugs against Marina, stating the drugs were probably the same type injected into Israeli officers by Russian advisors in Syria during the Yom Kippur War. He said that the Soviets cannot proclaim they seek detente while preventing children as Marina from leaving the USSR.

### NEW DIRECTORS FOR UCI IN ZIONSVILLE

Two qualified young men have recently been hired to direct the Union Camp Institute in Zionsville, Indiana, replacing Rabbi Julian Cook, who has taken a congregation in Florida.

## WHAT IS THE PATTERN OF THE JEWISH WORSHIP SERVICE?

Traditionally, the Jewish Shabbat and daily service have followed a basic pattern that reflects the nature of prayer for the Jew.

The service opens with the praise of God as the Creator of the universe. This portion of the service includes the "BAR'CHU" and the "SHEMA" and its blessings. The Jew affirms his belief in the unity that is God and in the eternal plan inherent in the universe.

The service then switches tones and includes an element of petition in the "AMIDAH" or, during the daily service, the "SH'MONEH ESRAH" (the 18 benedictions). The petition is expressed in the first person plural, the "we" form to express the communal nature of the worship experience. Even within the "T'FILLA" service, praise and thanksgiving are included in a corporate sense.

A third element of the worship service is one that permeates the entire service, and that is the inclusion of education. In Judaism, to pray is to study, to study is to pray. The teaching vehicles may include the reading of the Torah, or the Haftorah (reading from the prophets) or the sermon, or, simply the "SIDUR" (prayer book) itself as a resource of educational material. It is a most important element of Jewish prayer.

Finally, the service ends with the hoped for future, expressed in the "ALEYNU" which indicates that it is incumbent upon us to bring the messianic dream of peace and brotherhood to reality. The KADDISH, the praise of God, links the future to the past through the memory of those of the present to complete the universal cycle.

As we tend to experiment with new forms of worship experience, we must certainly be aware of the pattern of the service that sees prayer as a completion of the aspirations of man in partnership with God. It is a strong frame, one that has served well for two thousand years, and must be considered as we labor to make prayer real for us today.

## INTERDEPENDENCE OF JEWS AND JUDAISM

THE contrast between Jews and Judaism is, nevertheless, apparent rather than real; and not only in the obvious sense that Judaism cannot exist, for any length of time, without Jews, nor Jews without Judaism. Besides this inherent correlation which obtains between every creed and its believers, every culture and its bearers, there is a certain specific, and even more significant, connection between Judaism as a creed and as a culture. To Judaism the existence of the Jewish people is essential and indispensable, not only for its realization in life, but for its very idea; not only for its actuality, but for its potentiality. The Jewish religion without the "chosen people" is unthinkable. Neither could it, like the other religions, be transplanted from the Jewish to another people. No matter how many adherents it might gain in the outside world, the physical extinction of the Jewish people would sound the death knell of Judaism. For the Jews, as such their religio-cultural heritage is all the more vital, because they lack the other basic elements of human group life—territory, state and language. Next to the blood ties of common descent, it is primarily this heritage that makes Jews Jewish; more Jewish, indeed, when they affirm Judaism with their conscious and voluntary allegiance, than when they accept it as a sheer accident of birth. The unity of Jews and Judaism thus has a deep meaning and the interrelation between the two, the interplay of the social and religious forces throughout the entire course of Jewish history, appears to be of controlling significance.

### TORAH THE BEST MERCHANDISE

ONCE upon a time a ship carrying merchants and merchandise sailed over the sea, and among the passengers was a great scholar. The merchants began to converse about the wares which they carried with them, and what they intended to buy. Finally they asked the scholar what merchandise he had, and he answered: "I carry all my goods with me." The merchants searched the whole ship for his wares, for they thought that he had precious stones, but they could find nothing. So they jeered at him and said that he had no merchandise at all. The scholar replied: "Why are you laughing at me? The goods which I carry are of greater value than any which you have in the ship's hold."

As they continued traveling on the high seas, they were attacked by pirates, who robbed them of all the merchandise which they had in the ship. When they landed, they found themselves quite poor and had nothing to eat or drink or any clothes to put on. The scholar, however, went into the town and entered the bet ha-midrash. When the people heard what an important man he was, they at once brought him clothes and gave him a large amount of money. Moreover, the good people of the town followed him out of the city.

When the merchants saw the great honor which was shown to the Jew, they begged his pardon for having laughed at him, and asked him to request the townspeople to give them something to eat so that they might not die of hunger, for he had seen that they had been robbed of their property. And the scholar replied: "Did I not tell you that my merchandise was more valuable than yours? For you have lost your property, but mine is still with me. Furthermore, one who buys and sells does not always gain, sometimes he gains and sometimes he loses, and even when he gains he is not sure that the profit will remain with him, but the Torah remains forever, in this world and in the next. I was right, therefore, about the goods which I had with me."

## THE WORK OF THE RABBIS

JUDAISM and the Bible are by no means identical; the Bible is only one constituent part of Judaism, though the most fundamental one. Who taught the average Jew to understand his Judaism, to love his religion and his God? Without the zeal of the Rabbis, the Bible would never have become the guide of every Jew. They translated it into the vernacular for the people, and expounded it to the masses. They taught them not to despair under the tortures of the present, but to look forward to the future. At the same time they developed the spirit of the Bible and never lost sight of lofty teachings of the Prophets. It is the immortal merit of the unknown Rabbis of the centuries immediately before and after the common era that they found and applied the proper "fences" for the preservation of Judaism, and that they succeeded in rescuing real morality and pure monotheism for the ages that were to follow.

### THE TORAH IS ISRAEL'S LIFE

ONCE the Romans issued a decree that the Jews should no longer occupy themselves in the study of the Torah. Rabbi Akiba, however, was most zealous in spreading a love and knowledge of the Torah among all the Jewish communities. One day his friend Pappus met him and spake thus: "Akiba, art thou not afraid? Thou surely must know that thy deeds will bring thee into mortal danger?" "Stay a while!" retorted Akiba, "let me tell thee a story: A fox was walking on the brink of a stream, in the clear waters of which were a number of fishes running to and fro. Said the fox to the fishes, 'Why do you run so?' 'We run,' replied they, 'because we fear the fishermen's nets.' 'Come up on the dry land,' said the fox, 'and live with me in safety, even as my forefathers once lived in safety with yours.' But the fishes said, 'This surely is not the cleverest amongst animals that speaks thus. Water is our natural home. If we are not safe there, how much less safe should we be on land, where we must surely die!' It is exactly so with us Jews," continued Akiba. "The Torah is our life and the length of our days. We may, whilst loving and studying the Torah, be in great danger from our enemies; but if we were to give up its study, we should speedily disappear and be no more."

### WHAT IS CULTURE?

NOR what a man has—knowledge, skill, or goods of life—determines his culture, but what a man is: culture is not so much mastery of things as mastery of self. And only that nation can be called cultured which adds to or, at least, broadens and deepens the spiritual assets of mankind; which introduces some distinctive note into the soul-life of the world; which teaches humanity a new angle of vision towards the Infinite; and by its living and, if need be, by its dying, vindicates the eternal values of life—conscience, honor, liberty.

Judged by this test, some of the littlest of peoples—Judea, Greece, Elizabethan England—stand foremost among cultured nations, champions of the sacred heritage of man. Judged by this test, many a poor Jew, though he be devoid of the graces, amenities, and comforts of life, is yet possessed of culture. An ancient language, a classical language, a holy language, is as familiar to him as his mother-tongue; saturated is he with the sublimest of literatures, which hallows his life and endows him with high faith and invincible courage.

Sympathetic appreciation of this indomitable type, of this harmonious albeit rugged personality, might well be taken as a touchstone of a man's mentality, culture, and humanity.

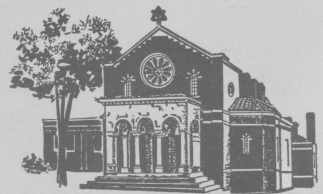

Sermon - The God Who Will Be

Synopsis - Our Jewish concepts of God are not well defined. There is good reason for this.

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

This is the season when we hear the message of good will and peace expressed by people in their greetings to one another, and yet as we read our daily papers, the sentiments seem far removed from the realities of the world. Arab guerrilla attacks continue and Israel counters with raids on Lebanese Refugee camps; the Soviet Union continues to appear intransigent toward its Jews who wish to leave; Christians shoot at Christians in Northern Ireland; the Boston school situation hardly reflects much "good will". In so many areas of life today, the message appears to be falling on deaf ears.

From a Jewish standpoint, I see this as an indication of the possibility of some difficult times for us ahead. When people lack good will, when they are frustrated by the contingencies of life as they encounter them, when the problems seem large and the solutions do not seem to be forthcoming, then they begin to seek scapegoats for their problems - alternate answers which can satisfy their anxieties, but which may not necessarily have any reality in fact.

When the search for such scapegoat solutions begins, we Jews have reason for concern. It has occurred too often in the past. It can easily bring a demagogic leader to the fore who may point a finger at us as the cause of the problems. Only a few weeks ago I received an anonymous note in the mail declaring: "Do not sell gas to Jews. They are the cause of the oil and gas shortage..." One crank letter does not make an organized movement, but we can never be certain where such activity will lead.

We have only recently celebrated Hanukkah and retold the story of the Maccabees who had to confront the might of Syria when they were threatened. Our next significant Holiday will be Purim, which recalls Esther's struggle against the evil intentions of Haman. In both accounts the determination to confront a most disheartening situation and surmount it are obvious. What we may be having to confront is possibly of a similar nature. As Norman Podhoretz pointed out to us last month, the Golden age of social acceptance seems to be over. But we ought not forget that we have passed through periods of trouble before and have survived as a People. Surely we can do so in our age.

The world situation today can easily discourage us if we let it. However, as we confront it, let us also remember that Judaism is a religion of hope, that out of the darkness of a midnight, we can emerge into the brightness of the noonday.

With these rather sobering thoughts, let me wish you a guarded Happy New Year.

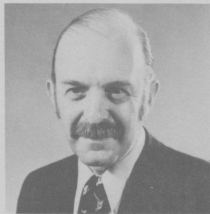

**ADULT EDUCATION**

THE QUALITY OF OUR FAMILY LIFE

This year the Adult Education Committee will focus on family life. All families face conflict, day-to-day problems in relating to one another, failures in communication among its members. Our purpose is to offer members of the congregation the opportunity to increase the quality of their family life, to heighten understanding and communication between family members. All of us want to lead as happy a family life as possible. We hope this series will help in the achievement of that goal.

A series of five films, secured from the State Department of Human Resources, Educational Branch, will be shown on January 12, 19 and 26 and February 2 and 9 (9:45 - 11:45 A.M.) at the Lexington Oral School, 158 North Ashland Avenue, which is just down the street from the Temple. A discussion, question and answer period - a "thinking-together session" will follow the film. A psychiatrist or psychologist will lead each discussion.

January 12 - **Love, Susan** - This film deals with parent-child misunderstanding. Its purpose is to help family members recognize and cope with parental misunderstanding and mistreatment, and to help them understand how both parents and children can unintentionally cause conflicts within even a loving family. Discussion leader - Dr. Leonard Lipton.

January 19 - **But Names Will Never Hurt?** This film deals with the nature of prejudice; how prejudice separates one person from another and affects the feelings of everyone concerned. Its purpose is to help people recognize situations where prejudice and discrimination exist and to help them express and deal with the feelings aroused by prejudice. Discussion leader - Dr. Aaron Mason.

January 26 - **Breakup** - This film deals with the impact of divorce upon parents and children: the fear, anger, guilt and anxiety which this situation arouses in family members. Its purpose is to help people deal with family breakup in a sensitive, effective manner. Discussion leader - Dr. Nat Sandler

February 2 - **In My Memory** - This film deals with the death of a loved one. Its purpose is to explore the meaning of death and to help people develop ways of dealing with the feelings brought about by the death of a family member or a friend. Discussion leader - To be announced.

February 9 - **Buy and Buy** - This film deals with the impact of T.V. advertisement on our lives. Its purpose is to help parents guide their children into wise decisions in the face of conflicting emotions and group pressure. Discussion leader - To be announced.

Reserve these five Sunday mornings and plan to attend these enlightening and thought provoking family life sessions.
