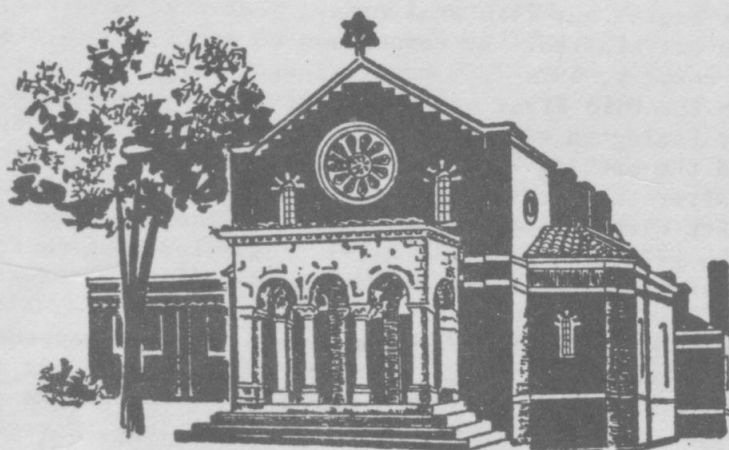

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## Rabbi's Message

This year begins our 75th anniversary year. In November, 1903, our congregation was started. By comparison to other congregations in this part of the country, ours is a young synagogue. The organized communities along the Ohio River and north date back to the 1820's and 1830's. But Lexington was not along the major trading routes between the East and the opening West. And so Jews tended to bypass this city until long after the Frontier was closed. As a matter of fact, when Benjamin Gratz died in 1884, Rabbi Isaac M. Wise, who came down from Cincinnati to officiate at the funeral, commented that there were only two Jews present - himself and the deceased.

However in the 75 years of our existence much has happened within the congregation. To mark this important milestone in our existence, we have a 75th Anniversary Committee that is planning some exciting events for us. The first of these will be on Friday, November 17, 1978, when one of our former rabbis, Dr. Jacob R. Marcus, the dean of American Jewish historians and founder of the American Jewish Archives, will be with us for a Sabbath worship service. Other programs of cultural and religious significance are being planned from that time, until May, 1979, when we hope to have Rabbi Alexander Schindler, President of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, with us to conclude our year of importance.

The plans for many of the activities marking this special anniversary are still not set. The meetings of the committee are exciting and the discussion lively. If you have any suggestions that you think would be worth pursuing, call Gloria Katz or Art Lieber, the Co-Chairpeople. We want to make our celebration a truly memorable one for all of us.

RABBI JOSEPH H. LEVINE, Director of B'nai B'rith Hillel at the University of Pittsburgh, will be our second Scholar-in-Residence on Friday, January 20.

Rabbi Levine will speak to students in the Senior Group from 4:30 to 6:00 P.M. in the Library. He will talk about Jewish student life on the campus. After worship services, Rabbi Levine will talk to the congregation on the topic "Where Jewish College Students Are Coming From and Where They Are Heading."

Rabbi Levine was born in Cleveland and graduated from Case-Western Reserve. He was ordained at the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati in 1960. Prior to his coming to Pittsburgh, he served Hillel posts at the University of North Carolina and the University of Rochester.

Rabbi Levine has taught extensively, and served on many national Hillel Commissions. He has also written numerous articles on Jewish life on campus and comes to us well qualified to address his topic.

In addition to his being our Scholar-in-Residence, Rabbi Levine will meet with the Hillel students at the University of Kentucky on January 21.

### TU B'SHEVAT-JANUARY 23rd

While we here in Kentucky experience the coldest part of winter in January, the Jews of Israel celebrate Tu B'Shevat (the 15th of the month of Shevat) - the New Year of Trees. The severe rains that characterize winter in Israel subside during this month, and subtle changes, heralding the onset of spring, are evident. Grass begins sprouting, trees start blooming, and migratory birds begin returning. The farmers of Israel were attuned to these changes and celebrate it as the New Year of the Trees.

Jews have continued to celebrate this holiday in various ways throughout the centuries. Modern Israelis have revived many of the traditions of the Jews of ancient Israel, mainly planting trees on this day.

When the State of Israel was created in 1948, one of the first great tasks was the planting of trees to conserve soil, provide shade on the desert and provide much needed wood. Since that time over 80 million trees have been planted.

We, here in the United States, observe the holiday by contributing to the Jewish National Fund, which plants young trees in Israel. This year the Department of Education and Culture of the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish National Fund have asked us to participate in a joint project in honor of Israel's 30th anniversary.

This new venture, The Children's Forest in Israel, Yaar Hayeladim, will involve American and Israeli students of all ages. The basic idea of this project is for an American and an Israeli student to get together and plant three (3) trees:

- 1 tree in honor of the student participant in the United States
- 1 tree in honor of the student participant in Israel
- 1 tree in memory of a child of the Shoah (Holocaust)

Each child will donate \$4.50 (the \$9.00 total from both students will pay for the 3 trees in the forest). Checks should be made out to J.N.F. - Children's Forest.

In addition, American students will get an opportunity for pen pals. They will receive 2-sided, bi-lingual postcards from their Israeli friends. The American student will keep one part and can use the other for a reply.

Trees can also be purchased for \$3.00 each. Several children can get together to buy one. Trees can be planted in honor or in memory of someone.

DR. RICHARD O. BRAUER DIES

Word has been received that Dr. Richard O. Brauer, a former visiting professor of Mathematics at UK in the early 1930's died recently at his home in suburban Boston. 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RECIPES

We continue presenting to you some of the mouthwatering recipes served at our Pot Luck suppers. Here is one from Mrs. Freda Lerner that people asked for:

'BRANDIED YAMS

4 CUPS YAMS, COOKED AND MASHED  
1 1/4 t. SALT      1/4 t. NUTMEG  
1/8 t. GROUND GINGER  
1/8 t. PEPPER      1 T. HONEY  
1 T. WHIPPING CREAM  
1/4 CUP BRANDY  
3 T. MELTED BUTTER  
2 t. ORANGE RIND, GRATED

Mix all ingredients thoroughly. If mixture seems too dry add 1 to 2 T. more cream. Pour into a buttered casserole. Brush top with butter and sprinkle with 2 more t. grated orange rind. Bake at 375° for 35 minutes. Serves 4 - 6.

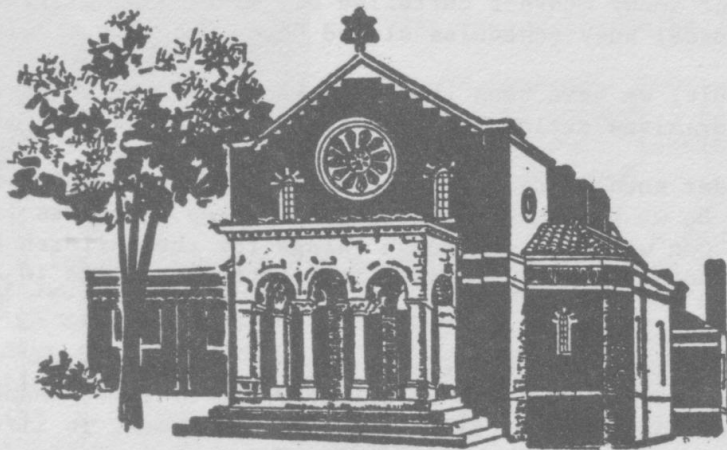

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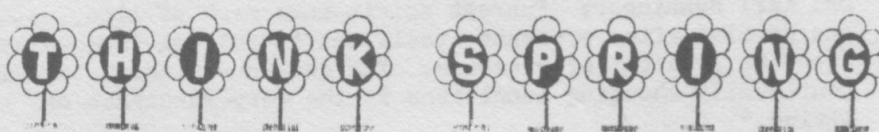

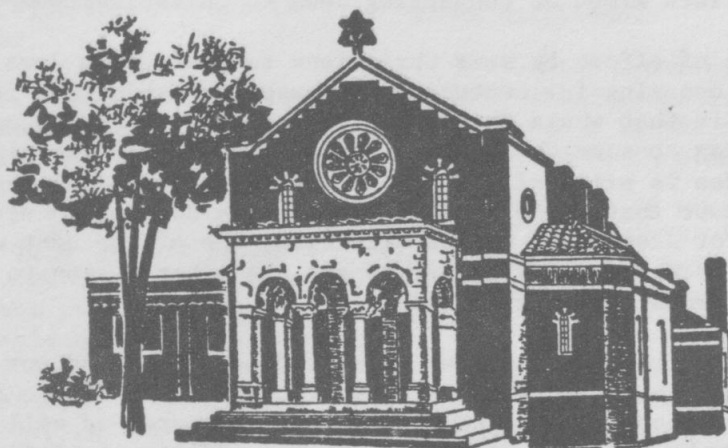

### *From the Rabbi's Desk:*

A few weeks ago I received two copies (one at home and one at the Temple) of a soft cover book entitled "Two from Eden" by Morris Cerullo. Some of you may also have received this book which is a missionary tract aimed at converting Jews to Christianity.

This sort of effort by some Christians to evangelize Jews is not new. It has been occurring for centuries. I suspect that it has its psychological basis in that where Christianity says yes, we say no, which can be distressing to some Christians. This is especially so since the Messianic idea is originally a Jewish one and there is always the lingering doubt that perhaps we might still be correct in denying the messiahship of Jesus. In such a situation, one of the best ways to overcome an uncertainty is to try to get the other person to agree with you and to foresake his prior claims.

However, psychology aside, we Jews need to understand our messianic views better. They depend on using various passages in the Bible to substantiate a hope that at some time in the future God will send a great leader who will return mankind to the idyllic situation of the Garden of Eden - when strife and contention will no longer exist and when there will be universal peace and harmony. This Messianic leader will not be a God incarnate, but a human being as well.

When we understand the Jewish messianic idea, the claims that Cerullo and his associates make do not fit. There is a God incarnate, a God become human. And we continue to have wars and suffering. Surely the messianic age is not here, as we see it!

Of course there are many more facets to this centuries old conflict of ideas. I have been talking about some of them in Religious School this year with my students. There are books in our Temple that deal with this subject. From what I read in Jewish periodicals, the efforts of people like Cerullo will be increasing within the next few years.

Every Jew should know how to respond to this kind of challenge if he is confronted by it. This is a good reason to increase your Jewish knowledge.

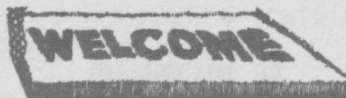

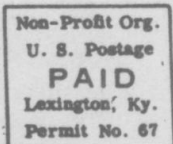

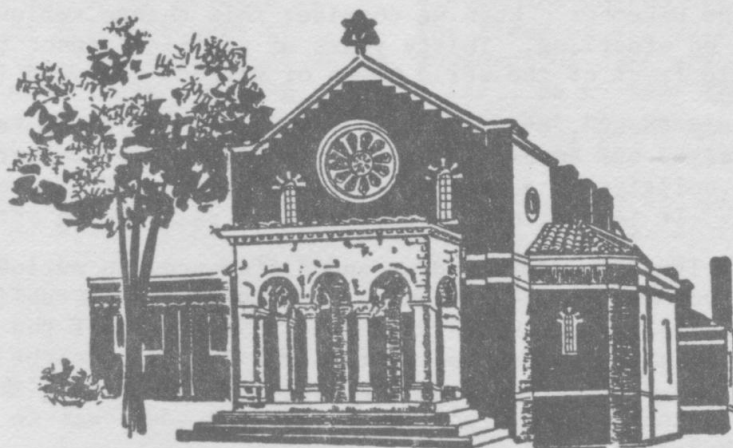

## Rabbi's Message

The talks between Israel and Egypt have lost the momentum they had in November and December. When we consider this change seriously, it really is not so startling. Thirty years of conflict cannot be concluded rapidly, in front of the world press or without untoward incidents.

Unfortunately though, events seemed to move so rapidly a few months ago that we raised our hopes to unrealistic heights and forgot that international politics is a slow and tedious process of compromise and horse trading. It is full of false starts and painstaking struggle.

It also involves misunderstanding and differences in outlook and expectation. One of those differences is found in the establishing and expanding of Israeli settlements in the occupied areas of the West Bank and the Sinai. Israel's position on this subject seems to be counter-productive at the moment. From our American vantage point, it makes little sense to continue this policy. It merely adds salt to wounds that should be healing.

And it is precisely here that we American Jews are caught in our bind. Can we criticize an Israeli policy and not be labelled as "disloyal?" Unfortunately, it is close to impossible. In this regard, Philip Klutznick has been quoted as stating "My feeling is that there are three million Israelis who are living their lives on the front line of this dispute. Unless I'm convinced that Israel is dead wrong or something - absolutely flat-out wrong - I'm going to give them the benefit of the doubt and not go popping off everytime I don't like something."

I find myself in reasonable agreement with Mr. Klutznick. I am uncomfortable with the continuing policy of "thickening" settlements. It does not make sense to me. I am unable to defend it when questioned. And yet in the ultimate, no matter how much I pray for peace in Israel, it is Israel which has to bring it about, and I have to trust that her leaders know what they are doing. This is not a happy or satisfying response to what I see occurring, but I find no alternative for myself.

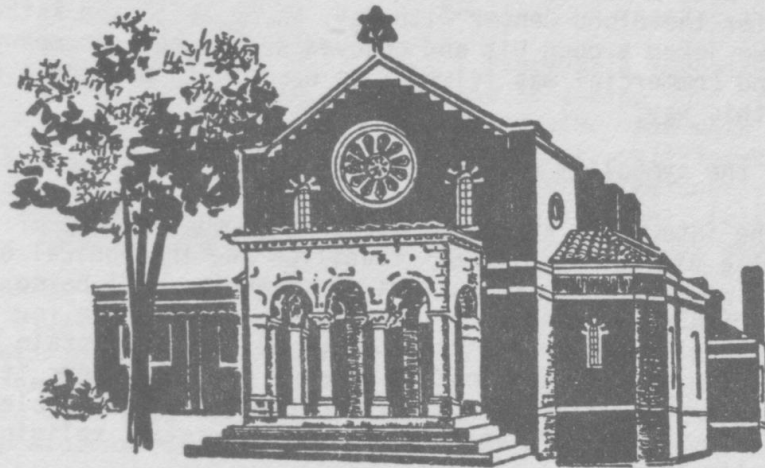

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## Rabbi's Message

This past week I was at the Central Kentucky Blood Center, taping a commercial for the Blood Center with Rev. Wayne Smith and Father Leonard Nienaber. We joked a good bit and enjoyed each other's company before the 30 second commercial was filmed. It was fun to provide a community service in this way.

However, the symbolism of what we were doing merits comment.

First, the interfaith aspect of our sharing the commercial. Each of us represent a different religious tradition and theological outlook. Nonetheless, when it comes to matters of community well being, these differences disappear. Far more important is our concern for the health of our fellow human beings, and our ability to sustain life through a gift of a pint of blood to someone else who needs it - regardless of religion or belief. As I said on the tape, "the Bible states that life is in the blood", and blood knows no racial, religious or national distinctions.

A second symbolism was also present - that in Lexington, the clergy are still of sufficient status to be used to promote this worthwhile community facility. And we Jews are included in this attitude. What we have to say is important, worth listening to. Judaism is a legitimate and accepted part of the religious community. Even if we are a small minority, we have our rightful place in the community to state our views, whether these views be to support what is being done, or to encourage change and new things be done.

I hope you get a chance to see the Blood Bank Commercial and that you give, if an when you can, and that you consider the symbolism behind this interfaith TV appearance.

## Mail

The following letter was written by Rabbi Leffler's Senior Group Class on Jewish Religious Thought and mailed to three different groups of "Jews for Jesus". The letter was a result of their discussion in class on the topic of the Messiah:

Dear \_\_\_\_\_,

We've read something about your religious movement and discovered certain points that do not make sense to us.

1. Throughout history Jews and Christians have agreed that it is an impossibility to be both Jewish and Christian at the same time. From almost the very beginning of Christianity, both Jews and Christians found that the two religions could not be combined, but must be separate. Therefore we think that your basic conception of combining both religions reflects a total lack of understanding of the history of the two religions.

2. We are also concerned that you do not consider future generations. Religion functions in society; your grandchildren will be forced to make a choice through marriage to be either Jewish or Christian.

3. Judaism and Christianity have different ideas. One of the major differences is their beliefs in the Messiah. For Christianity the Messiah has come in the person of Jesus. For Judaism the Messiah has not yet arrived. For this reason it seems impossible to combine these two religions as you attempt to do.

These are three of the more obvious inconsistencies in what you are saying, and proof for us that your views deny important aspects of both religions. Therefore we cannot agree that it is possible to be both Jewish and Christian at the same time.

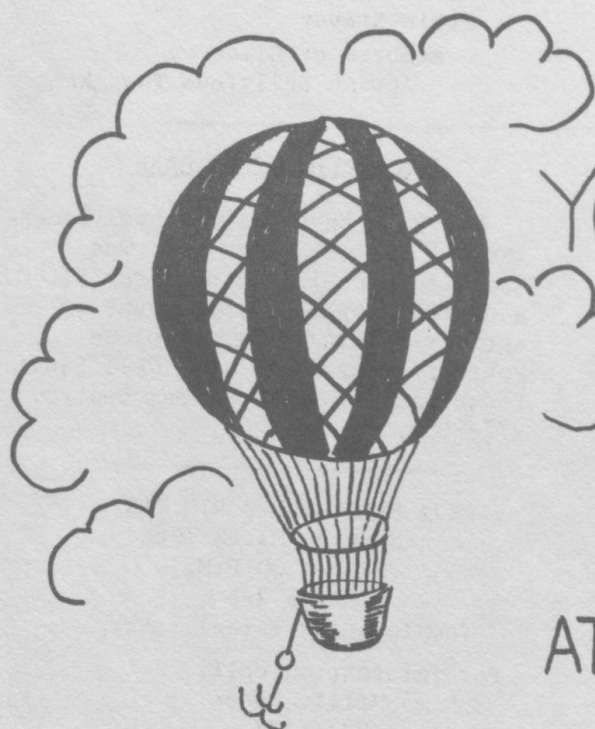

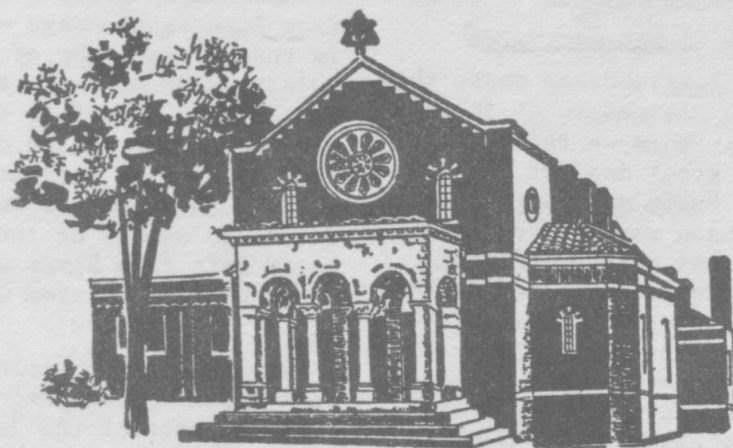

Purim means lots. Haman chose the day on which he planned to do in the Jews by chance. When we think about it, there is a great deal of "chanciness" in the Purim story. Esther's selection as queen was in a contest. Haman saw Mordecai not bowing down, by chance. Mordecai overheard the courtiers by chance. Ahashuerus learned of this incident by chance, because he could not sleep. Haman happened to come into the court at that moment, by chance. Esther took her chances going into Ahashuerus to plead for her people.

Chance, fortuitousness, plays a large role in our lives. We may be in just the right place at the right time to get the ideal job we want. Or we may be in just the wrong place at the wrong time and be involved in a tragic accident.

Our modern world is highly structured with scientific know-how and technology. As a result, we have a tendency to overlook chance. We try to arrange the details and organize our lives with great care. We rely on date books and calendars. We test for certainty and plan for every detail. And then chance trips us up. The unexpected happens. We are caught off balance.

Purim can remind us that life is not all prescheduled and orderly. The unanticipated can and does occur. And to this, I say, "Thank God", for without chance occurrences (even the bad ones) life would be routine, dull and boring. I appreciate such a reminder. Have a "chancy" Purim.

#### PESACH

Pesach--Passover--starts on the fifteenth of Nisan--April 22, 1978. (first Seder April 21st-Friday). It commemorates Israel's liberation from Egyptian bondage - a very timely thought in light of Israel's relationship to Egypt today. The festival is therefore called Zeman Cherutenu, the season of our liberty. It is also known as Chag ha-Matzot, the Feast of Unleavened Bread, in memory of the Israelites' hasty exit from Egypt when all they could carry with them was dough still unleavened.

Both the slaughtering of the lamb, commemorating the lamb blood marking the doorposts of the Israelites whom the angel of death passed over, and the unleavened bread are customs originating before and independently of Israel. Arabic Bedouins ate unleavened bread, and the slaughtering of lambs was an important feature of practically every religious and secular festivity in the Near East.

The date of Pesach, too, was long observed among Semitic tribes as a season of festivity. But out of these dissassociated customs, the Jewish people molded a unified holiday and infused the great idea of national and personal liberty, employing the concept of the "Season of Spring" figuratively as a "Season of Freedom."

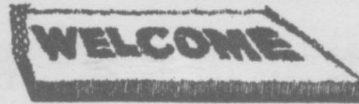

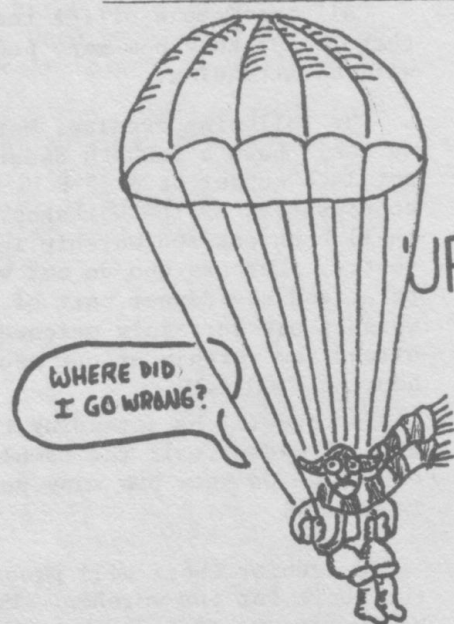

YOUR JEWISH LEXICON  
A-NEW-FEATURE-SERIES

The Adult Jewish Studies Department of UAHC has begun a series of short features designed to acquaint congregants with certain basic Jewish concepts and vocabulary.

Although most congregants have heard and even used these terms at one time or other, they may perhaps not have had the opportunity to associate them with related Jewish concepts. "Clip and Save". Over a period of months, you will be accumulating a number of basic terms which can be your "Jewish Lexicon".

1. When Jews decide to increase their Jewish vocabulary, where do they begin? At the beginning, naturally, with the very first word of the first chapter of the first book of the Torah. That opening word is *bereshit* (pronounced be-ray-SHEET), and it means "in the beginning." Every Jew needs to know that word because, in addition to opening the Torah, *bereshit* is also, the Hebrew name of the first book of the Torah. Many people call it by its English name, Genesis; but since the beginning of our history, Jews have been accustomed to using the Hebrew title, *bereshit*.

Anyone who knows a bit of Hebrew can discover in the Hebrew root of *bereshit* the Hebrew letters that spell the word *rosh*, meaning "head, chief, leader, or beginning." Rosh Hashanah, our Jewish New Year, is literally the "head" or the "beginning" of the year. Rosh Chodesh is the "first" or the "beginning" of the month. The first settlement built by the Jewish pioneers in the Land of Israel in 1882 was called, appropriately enough, Rishon le-Zion, "first in Zion."

So, if a Jew wants to begin to learn about Judaism from the beginning, the best place to begin is with *bereshit*, in the beginning.

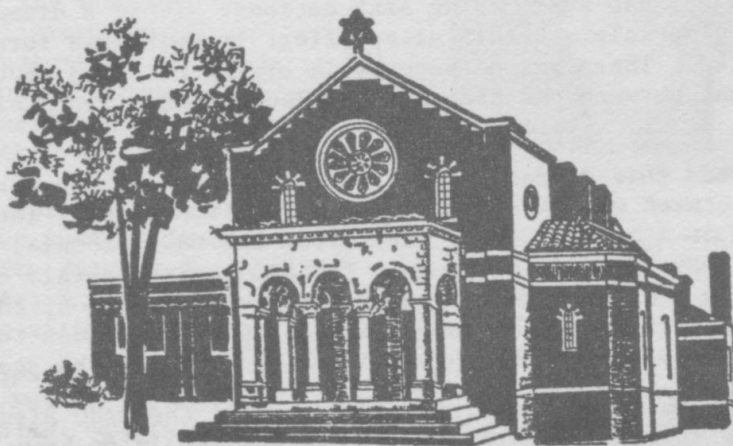

## Rabbi's Message

I recently read an article in the newest issue of The Jerusalem Quarterly, detailing the history of negotiations between the yishuv in Palestine and the surrounding Arab nations. It is a disappointing and disheartening tale. Effort after effort to seek some form of accommodation failed. There was no success in trying to bring about a peaceful arrangement between the Arab and the Jewish inhabitants of the Middle East.

As I read this depressing account, I could not help make the comparison between what was and what is. The euphoria of late November (I relive it as I listen to the tapes from the UAHC Biennial in San Francisco) has pretty much dried up. The PLO guerrilla raid on the Coastal Highway and the subsequent Israeli invasion of Lebanon; the seemingly futile trips of Mr. Begin to Washington and Mr. Weizman to Cairo have restored the old situation. Our hopes of a few months ago seem lost.

And yet, as Rabbi Borowitz pointed out at the UAHC Biennial, Jewish history is full of "nevertheless". We are people of hope. (Hatikvah means The Hope). In spite of our disappointments and set backs, we hope that Israel will continue to try for a settlement. Life continues and Jewish history abounds in miracles. We are not a people prone to giving up when things look bleak. We may still have a miracle. And if not today, perhaps tomorrow. I find the song, based on Maimonides creed, that sustained so many of our brethren in the Holocaust is relevant for us once more - "I believe in the coming of the Messiah, and even though he may tarry, nevertheless, I believe."

In the face of the current situation in the Mideast, an attitude of "nevertheless" can be most useful in giving us needed strength and patience.

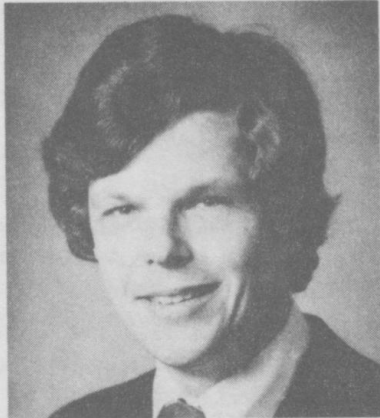

## RECIPE FROM POT LUCK DINNERS

Nicki Kaplan's Noodle Kugel

1/2 lb. medium or broad noodles  
3/4 stick butter  
3 oz. pkg. cream cheese  
1/2 cup sugar  
3 eggs                      1 cup milk  
1 cup apricot nectar

Boil and drain noodles and put 3/4 stick butter through hot noodles. Mix cream cheese and 1/2 cup sugar. Beat eggs and add to cheese mixture. Add liquids. Put noodles in well greased pan. Pour mixture over noodles.

## TOPPING

1 1/2 cup rice crispies  
(mash them fine)  
1/2 stick butter  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 tbsp. cinnamon

Mix sugar, cinnamon and butter. Add to rice crispies. Sprinkle over top. Bake 3/4 to 1 hour at 350°. Let cool. This freezes very well.

UNION OF AMERICAN HEBREW CONGREGATIONS' REGIONS

To bring the national programs and services of the UAHC closer to each of its member congregations, the UAHC maintains 13 Regional Councils and 5 Federations each of which is responsible for serving the congregations within its geographical boundaries.

Each regional council elects its own officers and executive committee, and each is under the direction of a professional UAHC staff member, who serves with the title, Regional Director. The president of each council and federation sits on the national Board of Trustees during his or her term of office.

In addition to bringing national programs and services to the congregations within their respective areas, the councils and federations also develop their own local programs to meet the needs of their particular communities. They enjoy considerable latitude but of course must conform to national policy.

Programs developed by councils and federations to meet their special needs greatly enrich the national program, just as the national program greatly enriches the regions. Member congregations benefit both ways. Programs originating in individual congregations feed into both the regional and national framework, thus enhancing the entire Reform Jewish movement. This constant interchange, operating from the congregations to the national level and from the national to the congregations, plus the cross-representation of leaders on the various committees and boards of the regions and the national body, insures the free passage of ideas in both directions, unity without unanimity, and the vitality of Reform Judaism in the United States and Canada.

Among the programs developed by various regional councils and federations over the years are the colleges of Jewish studies for the training of religious school teachers and principals, and introduction to Judaism courses attended by Jews and non-Jews alike, the latter often in preparation for conversion, regional educational programs, camp programs and others.

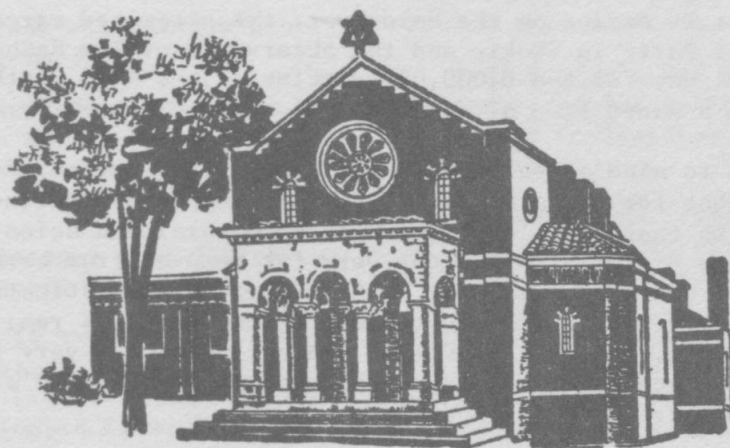

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## Rabbi's Message

The recent TV series on the Holocaust, the attempted march by the American Nazi Party in Skokie and the observance of Yom HaShoa on May 4, (the memorial day for the 6,000,000 victims of the Nazi Death Camps) all occur within a short time of each other.

They call to mind a heart-rending and agonizing period of modern history - not just for us as Jews, but for all supposed civilized peoples. They remind us that, despite our supposed cultural and scientific advances, modern civilization is not very far removed from barbarism as we would like to convince ourselves. The veneer of sophistication and refinement which we would like to present to the world is really not very solidly in place. Hatred, animosity and prejudice can very easily be rekindled. We should not forget what happened in the 1930's and 40's. It could occur again, all too easily.

In my recent Senior Group class on Jewish Mysticism we spent some time one day talking with the Hebrew alphabet. One of the letters with which we conversed was Zayin, the first letter in the word Z'chor - remember. And that was its message to us. Remember! As Jews we must remember! We must constantly recall what has happened to us in the past, so that we may be alert to the danger signs, so that the sad events of the past do not occur again. There are many ways to remember. There are three examples of them this spring.

The departments of the UAHC seek continually to serve congregations by providing needed programs which individual synagogues usually do not and sometimes cannot sponsor by themselves. In addition, the staff of the UAHC provides on-going consultation to individual member congregations.

This on-going service is further supplemented by programs designed to alert congregations to previously uncharted areas. Included are the work of the union in long range planning, futurology, bio-medical ethics, and gerontology.

## YOUR JEWISH LEXICON

The Adult Jewish Studies Department of UAHC has begun a series of short features designed to acquaint congregants with certain basic Jewish concepts and vocabulary. The first of this series was included in the last Bulletin. If you clip and save these over a period of months, you will be accumulating a number of basic terms which can be your "Jewish Lexicon". Here is No. 2:

### Shalom

A poet once insisted that the loveliest words in the English language are "cellar door." Obviously, the poet valued sound over meaning. If we Jews were asked to name the most beautiful word in our Jewish lexicon, we would rank meaning over sound because so many of our words are laden with centuries of associations, allusions and emotions. One such word is *shalom*, which, as everybody knows, is a greeting that can mean either "Hello" or "Goodbye." Another traditional greeting is "*Shalom aleichem*, Peace unto you."

The word *shalom* has multiple layers of meaning. Packed into its four Hebrew letters are concepts like wholeness, peace, security, tranquility, completeness, contentment, safety and well-being. Merely to stop fighting or to suspend strife is not *shalom* as we Jews understand it. The Psalmist bids us: "*Seek shalom and pursue it.*" Dynamic, positive and restorative action is required. Thus, when the State of Israel seeks *shalom* with her neighbors, she means not a cease-fire but a constructive peace for all the peoples in the Middle East. When we say *Shabbat shalom* after an exhausting work week, we mean for more than "have a peaceful and restful day." What we are really saying is "May you be restored to wholeness on the blessed Shabbat!"

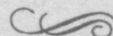

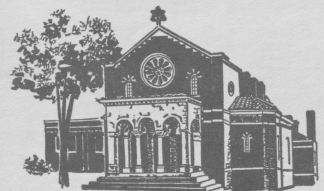

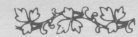

#### From the Rabbi's Desk

This past week I received a mail-gram from the White House inviting me to a reception there on May 1 in honor of Israel's 30th anniversary, at which President Carter and Prime Minister Begin were to be present. I declined to attend.

I was very angry at the telegram. It was sent to a large number of rabbis, as an apparent attempt to smooth over the differences which are beginning to come to light between Carter's plan to sell planes to Saudi Arabia, Egypt and Israel as a package deal and what we as Jews think is in Israel's best interest.

To escalate the arms race in that part of the world makes little sense. And to cover it over by saying that the Saudi's will use these planes only for defense, makes even less sense.

While I am more of a dove than a hawk when it comes to Israel's military position, I cannot be a part of Carter's effort to undermine the American Jewish support of Israel and her need for adequate military preparedness. I greatly resented the efforts of our President to use me and other American rabbis in this way.

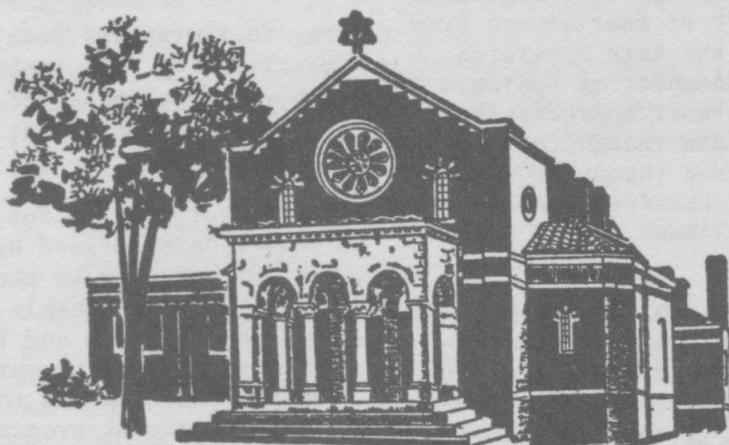

### YOUR JEWISH LEXICON

The Adult Jewish Studies Department of UAHC has begun a series of short features designed to acquaint congregants with certain basic Jewish concepts and vocabulary. We have been including these in the Bulletin for a few weeks now and if you clip and save these over a period of months, you will be accumulating a number of basic terms which can be your "Jewish Lexicon". Here is No. 3.

#### More about Shalom

The word *shalom* is not only one of the loevliest words in the Jewish vocabulary, but it is also one of the most frequently used. *Shalom* runs like a golden thread throughout our prayers and prayerbook. Open up the new Union Prayer Book, *Gates of Prayer* to pages 100-101, for example, and you will find a number of fervent and familiar petitions for the blessing of *shalom*. We not only pray for *shalom* to descend upon us and all the world, but on a personal level, within our own families, we strive for *shelom bayit*, "peace of the home."

*Shalom* or *Sholom* is a common Hebrew name, as is *Shlomo*. *Shlomo ha-Melech* was, of course, King Solomon. The feminine version is *Shlomit*. Speaking of names, many temples use *shalom* alone, like Temple Shalom, meaning "Temple of Peace;" or in combination with other Hebrew words -- for instance, *B'rit Shalom*, "Covenant of Peace;" *Rodef Shalom*, "Pursuer of Peace;" *Sha'arei Shalom*, "Gates of Peace;" and *Beth Shalom*, "House of Peace."

Scholars debate the origins of the name, Jerusalem, but in Jewish tradition, the poetic explanation is that it is the *Ir Shalom*, the "City of Peace." Would that a real *shalom* could descend upon the *Ir Shalom*!

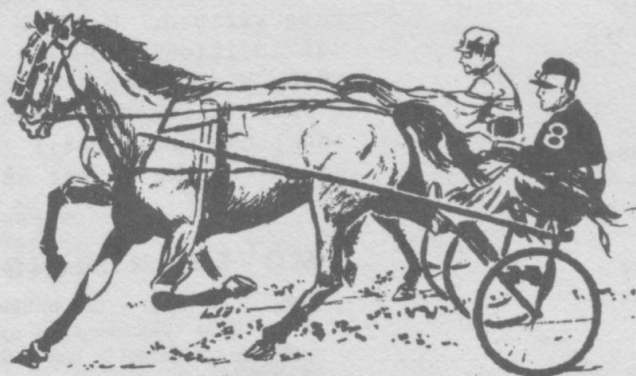

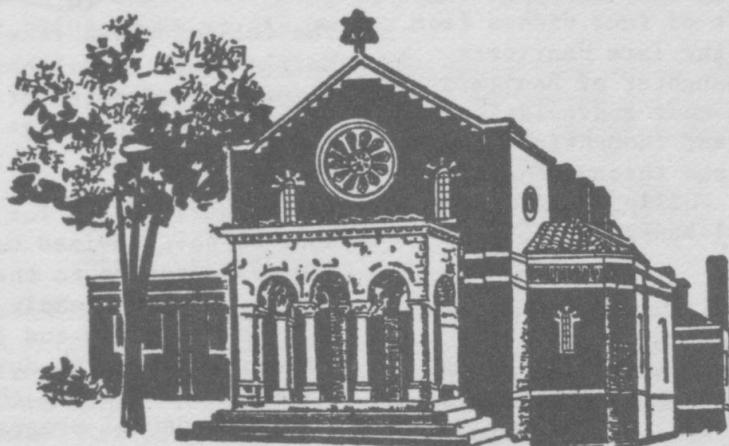

Hebrew Union College Gives  
\$10,000 Roger Joseph Prize  
To Anne Frank's Protector

The first presentation of the \$10,000 Roger E. Joseph Prize has been made by Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion to Victor Kugler, the man who risked his life to hide Anne Frank from the Nazis in Amsterdam in World War II.

Dr. Alfred Gottschalk, president of the college, said the award would be given each year to "an individual or organization whose conduct or work enhances or encourages the values and ideals which derive from religious teachings." The award to Mr. Kugler was made by Dr. Gottschalk on June 4 - the day before Mr. Kugler's 78th birthday - at ordination services of the college's New York School in Temple Emanu-El, New York City.

The Roger E. Joseph Prize was established by a grant from Burton M. Joseph and his sister, Mrs. Betty Greenberg, through the Joseph Foundation to honor the memory of their brother, Burton Joseph, president of the L. S. Joseph Company, exporters of agricultural products, of Minneapolis, is a vice chairman of the Board of Governors of Hebrew Union College and the national chairman of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith.

"We are honored to have been entrusted with the stewardship of this inspirational award and, at the same time, to have had the privilege of paying tribute to Mr. Kugler," said Dr. Gottschalk. "Motivated by compassion and a sense of moral right, this modest and courageous man confronted evil with goodness, brutality with decency and bigotry with brotherhood. He is the embodiment of the principles upon which the award was established."

Mr. Kugler was an associate of Anne Frank's father in the spice importing business in Amsterdam at the time of the Nazi occupation of the Netherlands. To enable them to avoid apprehension by the Nazis, Mr. Kugler hid Anne Frank, her sister and parents and four other Jews in an annex of his office.

After 25 months - in August of 1944 - the Gestapo found them. They were sent to concentration camps where all but Anne's father, Otto, died (he now lives in Switzerland). Mr. Kugler was sent to a labor camp. During a prisoner transfer to Germany, he managed to escape and he remained in hiding until the end of the war, when he returned to Amsterdam to pick up his life. In 1955, he emigrated to Canada and lives now in retirement in Weston, a suburb of Toronto.

Of his role with regard to the Franks, Mr. Kugler says today: "What I did I did for my friends. I only regret it was not more successful."

YOUR JEWISH LEXICON

If you have saved these you should have 4 articles which can be your "Jewish Lexicon". Here is No. 5:

Consider the Siddur - The Jewish prayer book has for many centuries been called the siddur. Why? Because the consonants in the word, s-d-r form the Hebrew word meaning "to set in order, to arrange." What is the siddur but an arrangement of prayers in a certain order, for the observance of the Shabbat, holidays and week days?

The letters, s-d-r, are familiar to every Jew in connection with Passover. The seder is the order of the home service on the eve of the festival. The order of the service appears in the Passover Haggadah.

Each Shabbat we read a set portion of the Torah. This is done in a definite, regular order week after week in the Jewish year. The section of the week is called, simply enough, the sidrah.

On a trip to Israel, you will hear an expression that everyone uses, and soon you get in the habit of saying it yourself. The expression is b'seder, and it means "in order." We say "O.K." and it means just about the same thing. A more emphatic expression is b'seder gamur, meaning "completely, absolutely, perfectly in order." We've come a long way from the siddur, seder and sidrah, but it is fascinating to see how an ancient language can accommodate modern idioms.

YOUR JEWISH LEXICON

If you have saved these you should have 5 articles which can be your "Jewish Lexicon". Here is No. 6:

People of the Book - For over a thousand years, the Jewish people have been called the am ha-sefer, the "people of the book." The phrase originated- so historians say- with the Moslems in the seventh century. The sefer, "book" referred to is, of course, the sefer ha-s'farim, the Book of Books, our Hebrew Bible, which is not one book but a collection of 24 (or 39, depending on how you count) s'farim.

Nearly every Jew knows the word sefer from the phrase bet sefer, "school or schoolhouse;" or from Sefer Torah, the precious handwritten parchment scroll containing the Five Books of Moses. The Sefer Torah is our most sacred Jewish possession. One or more copies are kept in the Ark of every synagogue.

Since we are the am ha-sefer, it is no accident that we value Jewish learning, respect s'farim, and encourage a Jewish sifriyah, library, in every Jewish home. Our attitude towards our sacred s'farim is reverential. A worn-out or damaged siddur (prayer book), for instance, is never discarded. In the Jewish tradition, either we deposit the worn s'farim and fragments in a genizah, a hiding place or storage room; or else we give them a Jewish burial.

## YOUR JEWISH LEXICON

If you have saved these you should have 6 articles which can be your "Jewish Lexicon." Here are Numbers 7 & 8:

### Multiple Houses

From birth to death, we Jews seem to be surrounded by the word bet. (Very often you see it transliterated as beth.) Bet is a form of the familiar Hebrew word bayit (pronounced bah-yeet), meaning "home, house, household." We are born, most of us nowadays, in a bet cholim, a "hospital." From birth, we are members of bet Yisrael, "house of Israel." And when we die, we are laid to rest in a bet olam, "house of eternity" or a bet chayim, "house of life" - two euphemisms for a cemetery.

In between birth and death, we go to school, bet sefer. When we are grown, we set up a bayit (household) of our own. We join a synagogue, which has multiple functions. A synagogue is a bet tefilah, a "house of assembly." Some synagogues incorporate bet or beth in their names - for example, Beth Israel; Beth El or Beth Elohim (house of God); or Beth Shalom (house of peace). The master of the household is the baal ha-bayit (in Yiddish, the phrase is balebos); but the mistress of the household is at times called the bayit. Why? The Talmudic sage, Jose ben Halaftha, one said: "I have never called my wife 'wife', but my 'home' (bayit)." Ever since, one of the meanings of bayit has, appropriately enough, been "wife."

### Lovingkindness

One of the high-frequency words in the Jewish lexicon is chesed, which means "kindness, goodness, grace, affection, love, benevolence" all rolled into one word. Perhaps the best translation is the old-fashioned but still luminous English word, "lovingkindness."

On the foundation of chesed we build the concept of gemilut chasadim, "acts or deeds of lovingkindness." These are personal acts of goodness performed unselfishly, wholly out of kindness. In practicing gemilut chasadim, we have no expectation of either gratitude or repayment. Among the acts regarded as gemilut chasadim are visiting the sick, comforting mourners, burying the dead (who certainly cannot repay us!), and generally helping others.

The Mishnah includes "act of lovingkindness among those things for which "no limit is prescribed." In giving financial help, for instance, our generosity need not exceed a fifth of our possessions. But practicing lovingkindness knows no limits. Further, anyone can perform gemilut chasadim - the young, the old, the rich, the poor, the humble and the mighty. Only some of us have the means to be great philanthropists, but all of us have within ourselves the capacity to perform gemilut chasadim without measure.

## YOUR JEWISH LEXICON

### 9. Le-Chayim!

When Jews offer a toast, we say "Le-chayim, To life!" The proper response is Le-chayim tovim u-le-shalom, "To a good life and to peace!" Life, chayim, is a very precious gift from God. The saving of endangered chayim takes precedence over virtually all Jewish laws, including the laws of the Shabbat.

Open up the prayer book and you will find many references to the Torah as our etz chayim, our "tree of life." On the High Holy Days, we pray to be inscribed in the sefer chayim, the "book of life."

The adjective for "living, alive, healthy, fresh" is the familiar chai, a word that is engraved upon lockets or charms worn by many Jews. All Hebrew letters have a numerical value. Chai is made up of two Hebrew letters - chet (8) and yod (10) - which add up to 18. Very often Jews make gifts of 18-dollars, hundreds of dollars, thousands of dollars-or in multiples of 18. These gifts literally express hopes for chai and chayim.

We've had many famous chayims in Jewish history, although the English spelling may vary. Some of the illustrious chayims include: Dr. Chaim Weizman, the scientist and first President of the State of Israel; Chaim Nachman Bialik, the great Hebrew poet; Haym Salomon, the American Revolutionary War patriot; Hayyim Hazaz, the contemporary Hebrew writer; and Chaim Grade, the Yiddish poet and novelist.

### 10. Remembering

We are a people with a long history and an equally long zikaron, "memory." The importance of remembering is stressed over and over again in our Torah, our prayers and our rituals. A number of critical words in our Jewish lexicon are built on the base of the Hebrew letters that spell z-k-r or z-ch-r. You already know many of them from frequent repetition.

The Kiddush on the eve of the Shabbat, for example, tells us that the Shabbat is a zikaron le-ma'aseh bereshit, "a reminder of the work of creation;" and also a zecher le-tsi-at mitzra-im, "a remembrance of the exodus from Egypt." The Fourth Commandment bids us: zachor et yom ha-Shabbat le-kadsho, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" (Exodus 20:8). The Torah frequently reminds us: Zekarta ki eved hayita b'erezt mitzra-im, "Remember, you were a slave in the land of Egypt."

In Proverbs 10:7, we see the phrase, Zecher tsadik le-vracha, "The memory of the righteous shall be for a blessing." When you see the abbreviation z"l after a name, it means zichrono le-vracha, "His memory for a blessing." "Her memory...." is zichronah.

The Yizkor prayer (literally, "May He remember..") is recited on Yom Kippur and on the festivals. Rosh Hashanah, among other things, is the yom ha-zikaron, "Day of Remembrance."

In modern Hebrew, a secretary (m.) is a mazkir (f. mazkirah). In case you cannot figure out how a secretary is connected with the idea of remembering or a memorial, look up Exodus 17:14, and you will find the clue.

### YOUR JEWISH LEXICON A MATTER OF HONOR

"Honor your mother and your father," the Fifth Commandment instructs us. The imperative verb is kabade (rhymes with "parade"). Built upon the core consonants, k-b-d, k-v-d or sometimes ch-v-d, we get a number of words that carry much weight in the Jewish lexicon.

This cluster of consonants conveys the idea of "to honor, glorify, respect" and also "to be heavy, weighty." Every week we light candles lich-vod ("in honor of") the Shabbat. During Passover, we drink special wine lich-vod Pesach. Kibud av va-aim, "respect for father and mother," is a cardinal principle in Jewish life. Showing hospitality is still another teaching. Whenever guests come, we serve them kibud ("refreshment") as a way of honoring them.

The little book called Pirke Avot "Ethics of the Fathers," contains a telling observation. "Who is honored?" the sages asked, and they supplied the answer: "Ha-mechabed (he who honors) his fellow man." But the person who pursues honor (kavode) out of vanity or self-aggrandizement had better be careful, for another Jewish scholar commented: "Honor (kavode) flees from him who runs after it, and follows him who flees from it."

One of the most widely discussed and hotly debated Jewish issues over the past years continues to be the topic of mixed marriages. It is so emotionally laden because it bears directly upon the future of Judaism, both in this country and in the world. The CCAR last debated this subject in 1973 and decided that Reform rabbis should not officiate at weddings in which both partners were not Jewish.

I voted with the minority, not because I am in favor of mixed marriages but rather because I do not want to judge people as groups or in categories. Every instance of this sort is different and unique, and I want the freedom to see a couple in this light, if this is their situation.

On the other hand, I am, in essence, opposed to mixed marriages. They pose many problems in an area of life which has sufficient inherent problems any way. Some of these problems are religious, others are more cultural or social.

Nonetheless, I never refuse to see a couple if they call wanting to discuss a possible mixed marriage. When they come in, we usually spend an hour or more talking about their situation, as well as my approach to the subject, which is what I want to share with you this week, as I know there has been discussion of this recently. In essence my approach is as follows:

1. As an officiant, I have a stake in officiating at their wedding. I am concerned for them.
2. I am not a "Marrying Sam". I officiate at weddings as a rabbi, at the start of what will be a Jewish family and not something other.
3. I spend a while detailing some of the differences between Judaism and Christianity (the similarities are no problem), as the couple ought to know where each "comes from".
4. I discuss what I mean by a Jewish family.
5. I send the couple home to discuss what we have talked about and to let me know later what their thoughts are on the subject, and whether they, in honesty, are willing to meet my criteria for officiating. If they are, we continue our discussions, if not, they will usually seek someone else to officiate.

Admittedly, the whole subject is not an easy one. It has so many facets and ramifications. Some rabbis are willing to officiate whenever they are called upon to do so. I think this prostitutes the rabbinate. Other rabbis refuse even to discuss the subject with couples in this situation. I think this response is heartless. I have been able to live with my approach.

## GATES OF REPENTANCE

We shall use the new High Holiday prayerbooks, Gates of Repentance, this year for the first time. They were published this spring and we now have over 250 copies of them, most of which were donated either "in honor of" or "in memory of" dear ones.

The services in the prayerbook are in modern English. They include a number of new readings for the Holidays, as well as a moving dramatic presentation of the sweep of Jewish history in the Ten Kippur Afternoon Service.

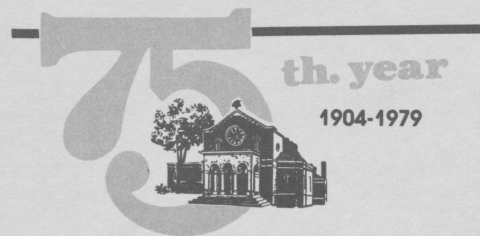

### Rabbi's Message

I ALWAYS FIND THE HIGH HOLIDAY SEASON A BUSY ONE. THERE IS SO MUCH TO DO. THE CONGREGATIONAL YEAR HAS TO BE STARTED. PLANNING FOR THE YEAR HAS TO BE DONE. RELIGIOUS SCHOOL CLASSES BEGIN, HEBREW CLASSES START.

AND ON TOP OF ALL OF THIS ACTIVITY, I INVARIABLY RECEIVE CALLS FROM THE MEDIA WANTING INFORMATION FOR HUMAN INTEREST STORIES ABOUT "OUR JEWISH NEIGHBORS CELEBRATE". THE PR ON THIS IS CERTAINLY WORTHWHILE BUT IT ALSO PERMITS ME TO SHOW COMPARISONS BETWEEN OUR RELIGIOUS NEW YEAR AND THE SECULAR CELEBRATION OF THE NEW YEAR. THE LATTER IS A BOISTEROUS, OFTEN DRUNKEN OBSERVANCE OF THE PASSAGE OF TIME. WE FIND LITTLE SOUL SEARCHING GOING ON. EVEN THE BEST INTENDED RESOLUTIONS DON'T SEEM TO LAST LONG.

BY COMPARISON, AS I POINT OUT, OUR OBSERVANCE IS ONE OF PRAYER AND INTROSPECTION. WE ARE BIDDEN TO LOOK AT OUR LIVES AND WHAT WE ARE DOING WITH THE PASSAGE OF TIME. WE ARE URGED TO CONSIDER OUR DEEDS - BOTH OUR STRENGTHS AND OUR SHORTCOMINGS. IT IS A TIME OF SOBER REFLECTION AND HONEST SOUL SEARCHING.

THE CONTRAST IS MARKED. THE DIFFERENCE IN BEHAVIOR AND ACTIVITY SPEAKS SO MUCH LOUDER THAN ANY COMMENTARY. I FEEL VERY PROUD OF OUR JEWISH TRADITION WHEN I AM ASKED TO MAKE THIS KIND OF COMPARISON.

MAY THE NEW YEAR FIND YOU INSCRIBED IN THE BOOK OF LIFE AND WORTHY LIVING.

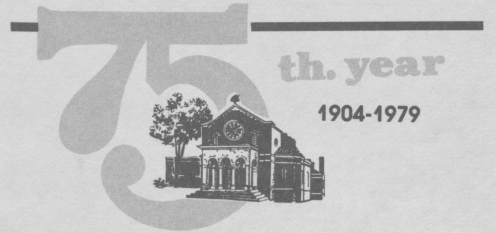

**RABBI'S MESSAGE**

The sukka is a frail and fragile shelter. It is open to the vagaries of nature and easily uprooted. It reminds us of the nature of life - it too is frail and fragile. We too can be easily uprooted.

All of us have a tendency to forget that life is tenuous. We go about in our normal routines and things seem so permanent; we are active.

And then something occurs to bring us up short. Pope John Paul, who was in office only a month has a heart attack and dies. A. J. Ekumasa, a strong and daring young man, is killed because the air bag failed to break his fall falls. Airplane disasters in San Diego and Nicholasville claim many lives.

Life, which seemed so full of promise and hope for all of these people, suddenly and tragically snuffed out.

God gives each of us only one life to live. We have opportunities to do great things, and sometimes we don't take them. We have occasions to help others in need, and sometimes we let them go by. We have invitations to grow and develop ourselves and sometimes we do not avail ourselves of these opportunities. And then it is all too late.

I look at the frail sukka and see life. In a short time it is past, gone. We appreciate the sukka while it is up, and then it is gone, only a memory. Life is of a similar nature. It too is not permanent. It too can be fragile.

Let our observance of Sukkot remind us of the comparisons, so that despite our finitude, we can make our lives as lovely as a sukka.

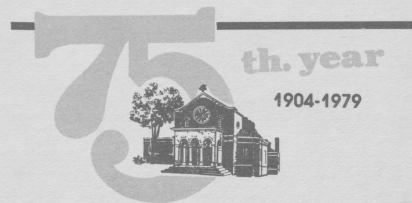

### From the Rabbi's Desk

This seems to be the year to concentrate on our Senior Citizens. Dave Nekstein spoke to the Sisterhood this month on the topic. The Central Kentucky Mental Health Association held a day long program on aging at the University of Kentucky Student Center on October 16th. Our TYG has added an "Adopt-a-Grandparent" project to its program this year - a project in which they adopt an older member of our congregation and phone the person regularly to see how he or she is, visit with him, shovel his walk in the snow, take him shopping if needed etc.

We have been blessed in our Jewish community. Most of our older persons are fairly self-sufficient. But there are many who are not. Some drive during the day light hours, but not at night or in bad weather. Some have family here; others do not. Some have many friends and get out and about regularly; others do not. Some needs of these people are taken care of; others are not.

In order to increase our awareness of the unmet needs, and often even unvoiced needs of our older members, we now have a Social Service Committee in the Temple. The purpose of this Committee will be to see what we, as a congregation, can do to be more attuned to this situation, to be more alert to their needs.

It is all well and good to say that some agencies and organizations are doing these things, and perhaps that is correct in some regard. But agencies and organizations cannot substitute for personal involvement, for a one on one contact, for a genuine human being to human being concern. It is this kind of Mitzvah about which I spoke on Yom Kippur, that no one can do for us.

If we are to continue being a congregation of concern, the work of the Social Service Committee is an area that begs our involvement. If you can help in this regard, please call me. We need as many people as possible on this committee.

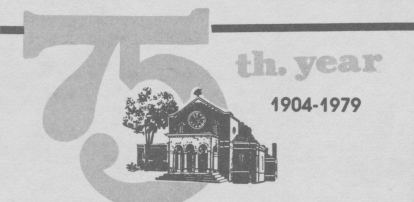

**YOUR JEWISH LEXICON**

Get the Name Right - We Jews are the an-ha-sefer, the "people of the Book," but many modern Jews unfortunately don't know the correct name of our Book. "The Bible," "the Hebrew Bible," or "The Holy Scriptures" will all do in a pinch, but the right name for Jews to use is the **Tanach**.

Where does that name originate? It is an acronym made up of the initial letters of the three sections of our Book of Books. The "T" stands for the Torah, the first section; the "N" stands for the Nevi'im, the books of the Prophets; and the "C" for Ktavim, the "Writings". Put the consonants together and you get Tanach, our name for our Hebrew Bible.

We never call our Tanach "the Old Testament." That is a Christian term having connotations that are unacceptable to us as Jews. The term suggests: (a) that the "New" has supplanted the "Old", an idea which we as Jews reject; (b) that the "Old" no longer has validity, a proposition which we Jews do not accept; and (c) that the "Old" and the "New" are equally sanctified, an idea we Jews have rejected for 2,000 years and continue to reject today.

As the an-ha-sefer, let's get the name of our glorious seter correct: **Tanach**. It is the collection of 24 (or 39), depending on how you count) sacred Hebrew books, by which we have lived and for which many Jews have died over the centuries. Memorize the name and teach it to your children: **TANACH!**

**To the Sky** - It is an honor for a Jew to receive an **aliyah** - that is, to be called up to the bimah for the reading of the Torah. The bimah is an elevated platform to reach it, the Jew must ascend the stairs. Hence the word **aliyah**, which means "ascending."

The same word, **aliyah**, is also used in the sense of immigrating to the State of Israel. Jews go there "um aliyah" or they "make aliyah." Moving to Israel is always an "ascent" on the part of the incoming **olim** (m) or **olah** (f). The fastest way to ascend to Israel is by plane. Fittingly enough, the Israel airline is **El Al**, literally "to the height" of "heaven."

Some 13 psalms (130 to 134) open with the descriptive phrase, **Shir haMa'ala** (the last syllable rhymes with "heaven"), meaning "A song of ascent." Scholars believe that these songs were sung by Jewish pilgrims as they went up to the Temple in Jerusalem on the three annual festivals of Pesach, Shavuot, and Sukot. It is also possible that in ancient times, the Levites recited a **shir ha-ma'alat** as they ascended the steps of the Temple.

Knowingly, few of us bother to ascend a few flight of steps. We prefer to take the elevator. It should come as no surprise that the modern Hebrew word for "elevator" or "lift" is related to the cluster of **al** words conveying the idea of ascending. The word for "lift" is **mal'at**.

**From the Habba**



The other day, in the course of conversation about our Temple, someone mentioned that we were a small congregation in a small community. Over the years I have heard many people say this and used to accept the opinion without comment. I no longer do!

I don't for a number of reasons:  
One. A city of 200,000 people is not a small community. It is a good size city. It is also a growing city and the current public discussions of the problems brought about by this growth attest to this fact.  
Second. A congregation of 70 or more families is not a small congregation. It is medium size and as a result can do things differently from a "small" congregation.

These changes have sort of crept up on me and I do not think that we have come to grips with them as yet, especially in the light of the nature of our congregation. Let me give some examples:  
A small congregation in a small community tends to be rather stable. Not much turn over in membership. The same people have lived in town for a generation or two. A few people may move each year, but not enough to be noticeable in overall.

In a medium size congregation in a growing city there are many non-natives, people who have come to the community for a variety of reasons and may be here a number of years, though not for generations. The continuity is in the congregation as an institution and not so much in the families who are members. The mobility factor becomes much more important.

In a small congregation most everyone knows everyone else. There is a cohesiveness of concern and involvement in each others lives. Every newcomer is welcomed with open arms and rapidly integrated into the congregation.

In a medium size congregation many people don't know one another in the congregation. There is less intimacy. Newcomers are welcomed, but are more difficult to integrate into the congregation.

In a small congregation programs are planned for everyone and everyone is expected to attend or participate. In a medium size congregation there are cliques and interest groups. Not everyone will attend every function and programming needs to take into account the variety of concerns within the congregation.

Temple Adath Israel is no longer a small congregation in a small town. We are a medium size congregation in a good size, rapidly growing city. As a result, we shall have to change a good bit of our former attitudes about who and what we are. This may not be easy, but we really have little choice, if we wish to remain a live and vital congregation.

We Jews are called "the people of the book". Love of books has been typical of Jewish life in all generations. Without a homeland, forced to wander, Jews found hope and sustenance in the companionship of books. Books were never loaned, but as necessary for life as bread itself. Today the pace of American life is so swift, the varied activities and amusements that compete for our attention are so numerous that they crowd out the quieter voices of books and the nourishment they provide - nourishment that is indispensable for significant Jewish living and for Jewish survival. In the midst of our preoccupied lives we will soon have the occasion to pause for a brief moment and renew our friendship with Jewish books.

Temple Adath Israel PTM will host a Jewish Book Fair in the Temple Vestry to bring a wide variety of children and adult Jewish books for your review. This opportunity should be welcomed so that Jewish books do not become strangers to us. October 1, 1978-Rosh Hashanah Morning

We Don't Necessarily Tell It All

Our Torah portion for this Rosh Hashanah morning describes the near sacrifice of Isaac by his father, Abraham. It has been used for many purposes over the centuries - to show that we Jews very early were opposed to child sacrifices, to show the extent to which faith ought to go, to indicate that we cannot always be sure when God is testing us and what the nature of His test may be.

As I read the chapter this year in preparation for this morning, I found some very interesting and glaring omissions in the text. Not all of the information is there. We read that Abraham knew he was to go off with Isaac to sacrifice on the mountain. God had told him. But what about Sarah? Surely the boy's mother ought to have been informed about what was going to occur. But she is not mentioned in the account at all; she apparently did not know about the test. As a matter of fact, the rabbis attribute her death in the opening verses of the next chapter to her shock at hearing about what had transpired.

Similarly, the youths who set out with Abraham did not know what was to happen on the top of the mountain. Abraham only told them that he and Isaac were going up there to worship. Nothing about a possible human sacrifice was mentioned. And so they too were in the dark.

And also Isaac, he didn't know about what would happen to him on Mt. Moriah. He even asks his father, "Where is the sheep for the burnt offering?" and his father evades the question by saying that God will take care of that matter.

And so as I reread the account here, I found three times when the whole truth was not told. Sarah didn't know that her husband and son were off on a trip. The servants did not know what the two men were going to do on the mountain top. Isaac did not know that he would be bound on the altar. None of them were able to comprehend the full story of what would occur, because too many details were missing.

I could not help contrast this lack of full information with the search for the facts that has recently been going on in the Congressional Assassination Committee. Expert witnesses were called to testify and to verify the whole truth, to try to discover what really happened in Memphis and in Dallas. Marina Oswald Porter spoke of her uncertainty about her husband, though later admitted that she now thinks he assassinated President Kennedy. Congressman Pryor asked probing questions. The Committee wants all of the facts so that the truth will be available, so that the doubts and uncertainties about those horrible events may be laid to rest.

Unfortunately, as we witness this investigation, we find that the truth is often deceptive. People have different perspectives, different awarenesses, different experiences. The same event can be understood differently by each person, and so the facts are elusive, and what the Committee will conclude still is not certain.

But truth is a problem in other ways too. Often we don't want someone else to know the whole story. Abraham didn't tell Sarah, Isaac and the servants all that he knew. And God appeared to hide the ram until the last moment, so that even Abraham was not completely certain as to what would occur. In the same way, many times we find it expeditious not to tell all of the truth.

Sex education is an example of this judicious withholding of information. We tell the facts of life to children in progressive stages. They don't get all the information at once, but only as we think they can understand or manage it. And we don't feel as if we are lying or misleading them when we do this. There just is not the need for all the facts at one time - until the child is able to understand and appreciate them.

Public officials do the same. When a special project is being developed, it is not announced until it has been worked through, until sufficient information has been garnered to say something. And even then, many times all the facts are not presented because the officials know that some of the information would work to undermine what they plan to do. And so we get selective facts, presented as the whole story in order to convince us to go along with what they want to accomplish.

Facts are also withheld because they may injure the process of negotiations. The full story of the Camp David talks between Begin, Sadat and President Carter may



never be revealed - perhaps for strategic reasons, perhaps for personality reasons, perhaps for diplomatic reasons. And so the truth of how the outcome was reached may remain unclear.

There are many other reasons for the whole story not being told. We may fear what will happen if someone knows all the details - people with serious illness often find themselves in such situations. We may not wish to confront a problem and so prevent ourselves from knowing the whole story. Partial truths are a familiar part of life.

On the other hand, there are times when we should know it all, when we should understand the whole picture, when the deceptions and avoidances need to stop.

There is a beautifully played sequence in the film "Turning Point" in which Ann Bancroft and Shirley MacLaine confront each other about their lives and how they view the future of the young ballerina. Each one of them was forced to confront the truth about herself in this situation, and it is presented in an emotionally laden scene.

Stanley Keleman, in a most interesting book entitled, "Living Your Dying," points out the need to accept the full impact of death. He states that, "Unended events must get ended before we can let the dead person...die." And as Rabbi Earl Grollman, who has become an authority on dying and death, pointed out at a rabbinic meeting a couple of years ago, many of the problems that bereaved persons have are attributable to their inability to accept the death of a loved one. They continue to hide the truth from themselves, and as a result are not able to move beyond their grief type behavior and return to living.

Financial dealings present another facet of life where the full truth often needs to be told. People who withhold income information on their tax returns can find themselves in legal trouble. Some of the members of Congress who accepted money from Tong Sun Park seem to be finding the revelation of their financial doings embarrassing. Congressmen Flood and Eilberg of Pennsylvania may have gotten themselves into problems through peddling influence. There are no "truth in lending" laws.

In all of these examples about truth, we see varying attitudes and awarenesses present. For some things we want all the information on the table. For others, we need or are given only part of the story, and are able to manage quite well with partial facts. Had Sarah, Isaac and Abraham's servants known in advance what was to occur on Mt. Moriah, we would have had an entirely different story in the Torah.

Also as we look at truth and the way we accept information, we discover that part of knowing the facts is tied to maturity, to being able to acknowledge and live with the truths we receive, to know how to handle them, as well as know what to do with the knowledge once we have it.

In this respect Rosh Hashanah is the time to look at truth - especially the truth about ourselves. And when we do, we notice that perhaps sometimes we give ourselves only partial information. For one reason or another we are unable to accept all the facts about us - what we really are like, our goals and aspirations, how other people view us, how we view ourselves. We may be fearful of knowing, unable to accept what we are, not able to cope with certain facets of our personality. By comparison in other areas of life, we find we are thoroughly truthful with ourselves - open and honest about who we are and what we do. And interestingly also, perhaps some areas of truth need some further reexamining. Maybe we don't have to be so critical of ourselves. There is nothing terrible about being less than candid, less than forthright with ourselves, if it is not crucial to our lives.

All of these considerations add up to the kind of person we are. Do we like what we find? Are we the sort of person we wish to be? Does the truth hurt? And if so, what can we do to change things?

Rosh Hashanah is a time of self-examination, a time to look at ourselves in the light of the truth about ourselves. Our worship is intended to aid us in this soul searching effort; our words of prayer, to help us examine our realities once more; the shofar's blast, to awaken us to the truths about our lives. May the observance of this holiday serve its purpose and bring us new blessings in the year we are about to enter.

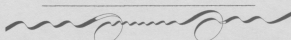
The procedure, according to the by-laws, for nominations from the floor is as follows:

**YOUR JEWISH LEXICON**  
**EXPRESSIONS OF LOVE**

Those who seek to denigrate Jews and Judaism charge that ours is a harsh and vengeful religion, dictated by a stern and unyielding deity. The charge is both false and malicious, as anyone can discover from the frequent appearance of ahava, "love", not only in our Shema, but also in our prayerbook, our Siddur. How "stern" can our Lord be when He commands us: *ve-ahavta le-r'echa ka-achav*, "and you shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Leviticus 19:18)? How "harsh and vengeful" can a religion be that insists upon calling us, "Ahavites et ha-ger, You shall love the stranger" no fewer than 36 times in our Torah!

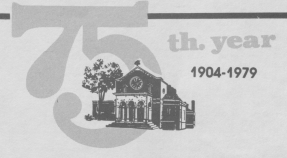
Two ancient and beautiful prayers, *Shema Rabban*, "great love" and *Ahavat Olam*, "everlasting love," precede the recitation of the Shema. (See pp. 132 and 202 of Gates of Prayer). Immediately after the Shema we read: *ve-ahavta et Adonai Elohecha...* "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your might." This supreme teaching is called *ahavat ha-Shem*, "love for God." Other basic Jewish teachings include: *ahavat ha-Shem ha-Ivri*, "God's love for the world;" *ahavat ha-Shem le-Yisrael*, "God's love for the Jewish people;" *ahavat Yisrael*, "love for the Jewish people;" and *ahavat Eretz Yisrael*, "love for the land of Israel." A "lover of peace" is an *ahav shalom*. These are only a small sampling of the frequency of ahava, "love", in Jewish teachings. It is a word all Jews should know and remember.

#### RABBI'S MESSAGE

This past week the Nobel Peace Prize for this year was awarded jointly to President Sadat of Egypt and Prime Minister Begin of Israel. The symbolism in this selection is many faceted.

After thirty years of hostility, destruction and killings, it is heartwarming to see Israel and Egypt on the brink of settling their differences with a treaty. Certainly it would be absolute mockery of the prize for the peace efforts to fall apart now. The prize is a fantastic omen to their completing their monumental task.

From an historic perspective - Egypt and Israel have frequently been at swords point. The Bible contains numerous accounts of the conflicts between our ancestors and the Egyptians (as well as other surrounding peoples). A state of friendship and mutual respect is of historic significance, something we of the words of Isaiah: "In that day shall there be a highway out of Egypt to Assyria, and the Assyrian shall come on Egypt and the Egyptian into Assyria." This treaty may, in some way, signal the start of a new highway project in the Middle East - for with greater going back and forth can come greater understanding, cooperation and will being. And to follow Israel's words even further: "In that day shall Israel be the third with Egypt and with Assyria in the midst of the earth, for that the Lord of hosts has blessed him, saying: 'Blessed be Egypt, My People and Assyria the work of My hands and Israel, Mine inheritance.'"

The hopes, the dreams, the possibilities that are embedded in the selection of Begin and Sadat are so very many. We pray that their efforts may bear fruit in countless ways and that at long last Israel and her neighbors will begin to turn their tanks into tractors and their bombers into cargo planes that they may use their energies for worthwhile human development, and not hatred and animosity, so that they may dwell together as brethren, at peace.

He studied also at the Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem, Concordia Seminary in St. Louis and Princeton Theological Seminary, where he received a M. Div. in 1976 with a Greek and Hebrew Biblical Studies major.

Mr. Hartfelder served as Assistant to the Pastor at the Lutheran Church of the Messiah in Princeton, New Jersey from 1974-1976, and has been at the Hebrew Union College since 1976, where, in addition to his doctoral studies, he has been a student staff member of the American Jewish Archives and is currently President of the Graduate Student Association.

Mr. Hartfelder stated: "There is a growing awareness among Christians to incorporate dimensions of Biblical History and Literature which focus not only upon Hebrew Scriptures and the New Testament, but also upon that fertile period between the Testaments and its importance in the development of the Church and Rabbinic Judaism. It is my hope that I will have the opportunity to teach in this area within the context of a Lutheran University or Seminary. I also see my previous and present educational training and experiences as forming a vital foundation for my making a scholarly and creative contribution in the area of Jewish-Christian relations."

Mr. Hartfelder's talk will be held in conjunction with the Jewish Book Fair at the Temple.

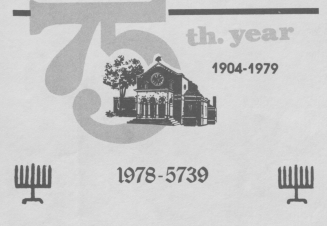

**YOUR JETISH LEXICON**

The Adult Jewish Studies Department of UACI began a series of short lexicons a few months ago designed to acquaint congregants with certain basic Jewish concepts and vocabulary. If you have clipped and saved these over this period you will be accumulating a number of bits from which can be your "Jewish Lexicon".

**The First Five**

The first part of our three-year Tanach or Hebrew Bible has several names. We call it the Torah, the "13" in the acronym, Tanach. It is also called the Chumash, meaning simply "Five" in Hebrew; or the Pentateuch (Greek is "five" in Greek); or the Five Books of Moses.

The English titles of these five s'farim are generally descriptive of their contents. Genesis (meaning "origin") gives the account of the Creation; Exodus is the "going out" from Egypt; Leviticus is a compilation of laws relating to the Levites, the priests who were members of the tribe of Levi. Numbers refers to the census of the Israelites in the wilderness; and finally, Deuteronomy (Deutera is Greek for "second") is the repetition, the "second telling" of the Mosaic laws. If you want to make an acronym to help you remember these titles in their proper order, you'd get OGLESH.

The Hebrew titles of the same s'farim are not necessarily descriptive of contents, but rather are taken from the opening words of each Hebrew book. Genesis is known as Bereishit from its first word, "in the beginning." Exodus is called Shemot from the opening phrase, "We-wah shemot, These are the names..." The third book, Leviticus, is Vayikra, after the opening word, "and the Lord called to Moses..." Numbers, the fourth book of the Torah, is Bamidbar, "in the wilderness." Finally, Deuteronomy is Devarim, "words", from the opening phrase: "These are the words which Moses spoke..." An acronym made up of the first letters of the Hebrew titles is a little trickier, but manageable: BaSh-VeShab, Try it!

**HIBERN SCHOOL**

The following is the last of the first series of Your Jewish Lexicon printed by the Adult Jewish Studies Department of UAMC. If you have clipped and saved these you should have 16. In a few weeks we shall start printing the second series of these features designed to acquaint congregants with certain basic Jewish concepts and vocabulary.

**YOUR JEWISH LEXICON**  
Round and Round

The Hebrew word, megillah, has entered the American language as a somewhat comical and disparaging phrase. For instance: "I asked him for a simple yes-no answer, but he insisted on giving me a whole megillah" - in short, a tediously long and drawn-out tale. Actually, the word megillah (pl. megillot) means a "scroll" or a "roll" that is not necessarily long. In ancient times, books were handwritten on continuous parchment and were rolled up when not in use. The famous Dead Sea Scrolls (megillot) were so fragile after 1900-odd years of storage that they had to be unrolled with exquisite care.

We reserve the term megillah for five comparatively short books of our Tanach. The five are: Shir ha-Shirim, The Song of Songs read on the Shabbat of Pesach; Ruth, read on Shavuot; Echa, Lamentations, read on Tishah Be'Av; Ecclesiastes, Kohelet, for the Shabbat of Sukot; and Esther, read on Purim. The five megillot are included in the third and final section of our Tanach, the section we call Ketuvim, the "Writings."

A related word in our Jewish Lexicon is gilgul, an esoteric, mystical term used by the Kabbalists to mean metempsychosis, the passing of the soul at death into another body. (In modern speech, perhaps we'd explain the concept as a "recycling" of the soul.) If you've seen the famous play, "The Dybbuk," you will recall that the soul of the dead hero entered the body of his young bride, with tragic results.

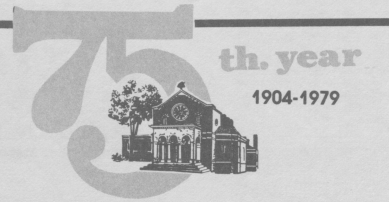

#### From the Rabbi's Desk:

I find the recent plight of the Vietnamese refugees who have been crowded into an old vessel and forbidden entry into Malaysia brings back terrible memories of the Nazi era when European Jews were fleeing for their lives and often found themselves stranded aboard ships that no nation would permit entry into its ports. What we are witnessing is a rerun of the many "Voyages of the Damed" that Jews experienced at that time.

As I hear the plight of these refugees from tyranny I wonder - has the civilized world learned anything from past experience? Where is our heart? We Americans speak of our humanitarian concerns - and are silent. Israel knows what happened both before the war and after, with the British Blockade of Palestine, and she is silent. What occurred is no secret of history. The saga has been told many times, and still these people have remained on board - without food, water or medical attention.

As a Jew, with a sense of our own history, I grieve. We know first hand this kind of treatment. Our consciences should be most attuned to their plight. I have written to President Carter urging that the United States accept these refugees. Time is of the essence.

### Rabbi's Message

I find the recent tragedy in Guyana, involving Congressman Ryan and the followers of the Rev. Jim Jones, perhaps the most bizarre illustration of a common malaise of our generation - the search for certainty in an age of gross uncertainty.

Our world is fast moving and complex. The changes which we encounter almost everyday send us reeling - new advances in medicine, new groups (often ones we never heard of) demand their rights, new nations suddenly attract world-wide attention, there are cries for more government help to solve human problems.

Out of this chaos of ideas, demands and alternatives, arises a self appointed leader - someone who can rest on the old ways, who can return certainty to life - who announces that he has the answers. As a result he attracts people who are lost in the tumult of our day. They believe him, follow him and devote their lives to his cause.

Once in a while such charismatic leaders can bring some good to our world. But more often than not, they become a Charles Manson, an Adolf Hitler, a Jim Jones - destroyers of life.

We Jews have seldom sought easy answers. When we did, often under the leadership of a false messiah, we suffered greatly. Life's struggles demand constant attention, so that each moment, each action may be sanctified. The Messianic Age has not yet arrived; we must continue to look upon anyone who attempts to convince us otherwise as a charlatan and a deluder. The horrible events at Jonestown remind us once more of how easy it is to succumb to false prophets - which leads to tragedy and not salvation.

### UCI DEVELOPMENT FUND

The Union Camp Institute at Zionsville is currently undertaking a Development Fund Drive. The drive was started twenty months ago with a goal of \$300,000.

This is the first appeal to the Lexington community to join with the other congregations in the Midwest region to support this fund raising effort. A new dining hall was constructed last year and many other improvements were completed. As of this date, \$110,000 has been raised in cash and project donations and a balance of approximately \$300,000 is owed to the bank. Not only does this debt need to be paid off, but the major older camper complex cannot be started until funds are raised. UCI has had to turn away over 50, fifteen and sixteen year olds the past three years due to a lack of facilities for programming. These are the same children that will leave for college shortly who could have used all the support systems available.

Our congregation is very much involved in this camp. Many of our young people do attend this camp and Jack Miller is the Chairman of the Joint Camp Authority. Rabbi Leffler has been on the staff of the OVVYtoot there for a number of years. The camp has become more and more a part of our congregational life.

Very shortly you will receive a letter from our President, Dr. Kaplan about this drive. Read it thoroughly and give it your support.

### HANUKKAH RECIPE FROM BOB ROZEN'S FILE

Zucchini Latkes - 2 eggs  
1 small carrot 1 small onion  
2 small fresh zucchini  
2 T matzo meal 1/2 t salt  
1/2 t pepper oil for frying,  
preferably safflower or corn oil

In blender mix eggs, carrot and onion until finely ground. Add zucchini in small chunks and blend only until shredded. (Squash may be shredded on a grater and added to the egg mixture.) Add the matzo meal and seasonings and fry by tablespoonfuls in hot oil until brown on both sides.

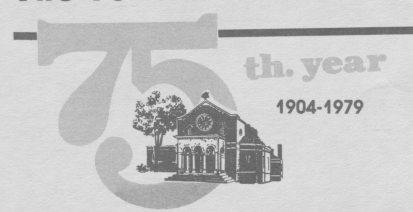

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**From the Rabbi's**



Sunday night, December 24, is the first night of Hanukkah. Rather late this year. Its coinciding so closely with Christmas is apt to confuse our Christian neighbors once more into thinking it is our "Jewish Christmas." Just because people have the same birth date doesn't make them twins!

This past week I learned of a recent incident in one of the counties adjacent to Fayette, in which the Gideons were distributing Bibles to 4th and 5th grade students in the public schools. They seem to have forgotten the First Amendment!

The local NCCL chapter is concerned about the overemphasis of Christmas in the Fayette County schools. They are looking into the matter. It is not only a Jewish problem!

Hanukkah commemorates the first struggle for freedom of religion. For us it is a minor holiday because it is not mentioned in the Torah, but is from a later period in our ancient history. It has taken on major diversions for us though, because of the commercial overemphasis of Christmas, as well as our growing awareness of the separation of Church and State.

Religious freedom is a precarious freedom. It can be easily tread upon. It can be abrogated in so many little ways that we often are not aware of them as they occur. Hanukkah - which literally means dedication - is a holiday whose message took almost twenty centuries to be accepted in some nations. Ours, fortunately, is one of these countries. We cannot assume that this freedom will remain. Just as the Maccabees had to struggle to achieve their goals, so too is there a necessary struggle to maintain this freedom. As Jews we can never afford to be complacent. We need to be "dedicated" to preserving the right of all persons to worship - or not worship - as they so choose. This is a vital aspect of the securing of Hanukkah.

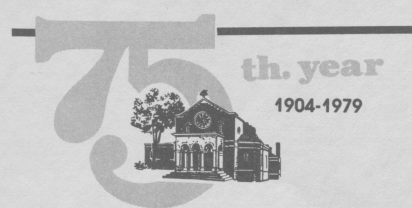

**From the Rabbi's**



A number of weeks ago, I wrote in my message about the growth of Lexington and of our congregation. I received a number of favorable comments about what I said. Many of the people had not thought in such terms before and remarked that they agreed with my concern for a re-thinking of whom and what we are as a congregation.

In this regard, I was very pleased that our Temple Board, at its December meeting, voted to accept my request that we have an HUC student from Cincinnati here next year, on a bi-weekly basis. This student - he or she - will be with us every other weekend from Friday afternoon to Sunday afternoon to assist in Temple programming.

Admittedly this new aspect of our Temple life will be experimental. We cannot select the student whom we receive, but I have written a job description for the College and hope that whomever we receive will meet those qualifications. I can see this person being of great benefit to us. I hope that he/she will be able to develop a stronger Jewish music program for us. We should be able to have a wider variety of programming on weekends - Youth Group retreats, Sabbath study programs, Family Havdalah, Family suppers, and other activities which we have not been able to manage heretofore. I see a wide possibility of services that an additional staff person can provide for us.

This new facet of Temple life will start in September and go through May/June. The student will be here as a part of his/her rabbinic training. I shall work closely with him/her, helping to develop and direct programming, guiding him/her in working with our congregation in whatever areas we think necessary.

In order to fund this new aspect of our functioning, which will cost between \$5,000 and \$6,000 for the year, I have been asking members of the congregation to make special contributions to the Temple in order not to burden the Temple budget. A number of members have already been most generous and I believe that well over half of the money needed for honorarium, travel and other expenses has been pledged. I still need a little more though, in order to be certain that we can cover all of this additional expense, especially room and board which cannot be accurately predicted. If I have not asked you to assist in this new facet of our Temple, and you wish to do so, please feel free to let me know. I'll be happy to explain it further and also accept any contribution you wish to make.

I look forward eagerly to this new part of our Temple life. I hope it will prove worthwhile and that it will be something we will want to continue in the years ahead.

**NATIONAL FEDERATION OF TEMPLE YOUTH (NFTY)**

A varied program in the areas of worship, study, service to community and congregation, leadership training, and artistic endeavor is conducted by the National Federation of Temple Youth for its approximately 30,000 Reform Jewish members between the ages of 15-1/2 and 18. It functions through more than 500 temple youth groups, each of which is affiliated with one of the 21 NFTY regional federations in the United States and Canada.

NFTY congregational youth groups may range in size from two to more than 350 members. Youth groups have one or more adult advisors, but their programs are planned and executed by the young people themselves. Their activities range from serious Jewish study to purely social events, from volunteer work with underprivileged children to Jewish art festivals from creative worship services to projects to aid a variety of causes, both at home and abroad.

NFTY regions (OVFTY and MoVFTY in our region) help congregational youth groups build their activities and also sponsor intercity weekend conclaves featuring creative worship, cultural and social events. Throughout the year, caravans of regional leaders visit new or isolated youth groups, outstanding rabbinic scholars guide groups of 30 or 40 NFTYites in Kallah study retreats, institutes, workshops, and other events develop leadership skills. Rabbi John H. Spitzer is the MoVFTY advisor, and Michael Weinberg is the OVFTY advisor.

An extensive summer program is sparked by national events at the UARC Kutz Camp-Institute at Warwick, New York and enhanced by our regional camp in Zionsville, Indiana. Programs at the Kutz-Camp-Institute offer high school students a wide range of Jewish interest to explore through song, dance, drama, the arts and the Hebrew language.

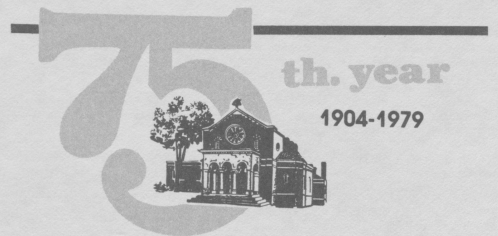

**From the Rabbi's Desk**

As I read the headlines each day, I must admit to feeling depressed - OPEC raises its oil prices, the Israeli-Egyptian peace talks seem to have failed at last, Iran is in a state of turmoil, floods in Kentucky. The news is most distressing and disheartening. The future looks bleak in all sorts of ways.

And now we are set to start a new year. I wonder - will it be worse? Can it get better? How much more upsetting news is in store for us this year? Not very comforting thoughts!

Yet I also know that Judaism is a religion of hope - that despite hard times, we Jews have never succumbed to pessimistic predictions or doom-sayers. In the very death camps of the Holocaust we sang "Ani Maamin" - I believe in the coming of the Messiah, even if he tarries. Throughout the centuries we have lifted our glasses and toasted one another with L'Chayim! - To Life!

Perhaps we have become overly spoiled. Life has become so comfortable and convenience oriented that we have forgotten what inconvenience is like, what a little hardship can do for us (and not just to us). God works in mysterious ways. His doings are often beyond our immediate comprehension. Sometimes what initially looks disastrous can be salvaged for a blessing. The misfortune of the here and now may not be that with the perspective of time.

There are no simple responses to life's challenges. Each one requires us to confront it and to react in some way. Sometimes our privileges are put in jeopardy. Sometimes we are forced to rethink our outlook on certain matters, to question our assumptions. Sometimes our comforts are denied.

Life is never guaranteed. It is constantly fluid and changing. But regardless of what it is, Judaism urges us to sanctify our days as we live them - asher kid-sha-nu b' mitz-vo-tav. (Who has sanctified us by the Mitzvot he has placed upon us.) It is easy to forget this injunction, even though we often hear it in our blessing.

I pray that these words will have renewed meaning for us as we confront the new year and its trials, for how we respond to them is the true measure of our ability to infuse a sense of holiness into our lives. May it be a "holy" year for us all.

YOUR JEWISH LEXICON

The following is the first of the second series of Your Jewish Lexicon sponsored by the Adult Jewish Studies Department of UAHC.

Have a Good Day!

Two expressions in every Jewish vocabulary are mazal tov, "good luck, congratulations," and yom tov, a "holiday" or literally, "a good day." Now, consider how many more phrases you can build from just two short Hebrew words, tov and yom.

Everyone knows Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement. American Jews are familiar with Yom ha-Atzma-ut, Israel's Day of Independence. Prior to Yom ha-Atzma-ut, Jews the world over mark Yom ha-Sho-ah, the Day of the Holocaust. There is an equally solemn day, Yom ha-Zikaron, the Day of Remembrance (Memorial Day) for those who fell while fighting for Israel's independence. The plural of yom is yamim. Every fall, we hear the phrase, Yamim Nora-im, the Days of Awe - that awesome 10-day penitential period between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Coming back to tov, "good," you hear it dozens of times in Israel during the course of a single yom. "Good morning" is boker tov, and "good evening" is erev tov. Tov by itself means "Good! Fine!"

The place where you will find yom and tov repeated again and again is the opening chapter of Bereshit (Genesis). God created the light and saw "how good" - kee tov - it was. "And there was evening (erev) and there was morning (boker), a first day (yom)." The refrain, kee tov, keeps recurring through the yamim of Creation until on yom ha-shishi, the sixth day, after He had created humankind and surveyed all His work, God found everything to m'od, "very good." Open Bereshit to chapter one and pick out the Hebrew words you now know: tov, yom, boker, erev. It's like recognizing old friends!

**SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE**

RABBI STEVEN M. REUBEN, Associate Director of the Department of Education of the UAHC, will be our next Scholar-in-Residence on January 5. He comes to us under the auspices of the Midwest Council of the UAHC, of which we are a member.
