IN THIS CORNER

I want to begin this article by thanking all of you who supported me in my words spoken before the Kentucky State Senate. At a time when life becomes hectic, it is wonderful to look around and feel a sense of security recognizing that you, my friends share my thoughts

and support my actions.

Many of you who called mentioned the words courageous or brave. I thank you for your kind words, but the truth is that I followed my convictions. I was angry over our State's traversing beyond the wall of separation between church and state. The catalyst behind of building of the creche scene at the state capital in Frankfort was the government. Religion is not the role of government.

I appreciate the support of the Herald-Leader in the editorials written

about the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The local news coverage has been fair even though the popular feeling is very much against my convictions and my feelings and my beliefs.

All of us have convictions, areas in which we feel we must contribute or participate in order to achieve a better life and a better world. When we act on those convictions, we do justice to our Jewish values of justice and righteousness (tzedakkah) and compassion (rachmanut). Recently, Gail Cohen, president of CKJF, invited me to represent Lexington by sitting on the national board of the National Conference on Soviet Jewry. This term of one or two years will allow me to follow my conviction of getting Jewish refuseniks

The December 6, 1988 Board of Trustees meeting reviewed the standing committee's reports. Ken Freedman presented the monthly financial reports. The next meeting of the Dues Review and Building Fund Committee will discuss those members who have not made a pledge to the Building Fund.

SEVENTH GRADE CLASS

Roy Meckler, Teacher The Seventh Grade is busy learning about Judaism and Christianity. We started out this year learning about the differences between Reform, Conservative, and Orthodox Jews - their laws, historical roots, philosophy, and their current practices. We visited Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati. We learned that all Reform rabbis must attend this college or one in Los Angeles to be ordained a rabbi. We also found that anyone who is interested in scholarly pursuits concerning Judaism and Biblical history can also attend HUC. We visited the museum which is entered as though one were entering an archaeological dig in Israel. We really enjoyed our visit to HUC and hope to return there in the future to see the rare book section in the library and to talk with some of the teachers at this special place. Currently we are studying the life of Jesus from a Jewish perspective to see how the early development of Christianity grew out of Jewish traditions during the time of the Romans in Israel. We have seen a video called Jesus of Nazareth which has a long presentation of Jesus as a young boy. After the holidays we will be visiting various Christian churches in the Lexington area. 

STATEMENT ON LAW OF RETURN AND RABBINICAL COURTS BILL ISSUED NOVEMBER 11, 1988 BY A COALITION OF ALL THE SIGNED ORGANIZATIONS

We reaffirm our devotion to the State and the people of Israel. We are one people, with a single destiny. We reject any effort to divide our people by legislative action of the Knesset. All Jews, including those of us who are not citizens of Israel, are affected by the possibility of a change in the definition of who is a Jew under Israeli law, either through amending the Law of Return or adoption of the Rabbinical Courts bill.

Both Prime Minister Shamir and Foreign Minister Peres, as heads of their respective political parties, have repeatedly made clear that the issue of "Who is a Jew" should be removed from the political arena. Mr. Peres has called for a moratorium on any political action on this question for at least ten years, and Mr. Shamir has stated publicly on numerous occasions in the United States that the question of "Who is a Jew" should be decided by the Jewish people, and not by a political body such as the Knesset.

In this spirit, we appeal to the political leaders of Israel to heed the overwhelming voice of Diaspora Jewry. Changing the definition of "Who is a Jew," through amending the Law of Return or other legislative means, would inflict enormous damage, actual and symbolic, on the Jews of the Diaspora. The unique partnership between the Jewish people and the State of Israel must be preserved.

IN THIS CORNER

As a result of an appointment by the Central Kentucky Jewish Federation, I am now a delegate on the Board of Governors of the National Conference on Soviet Jewry. I represent our local Federation. On February 1 & 2, I attended my first Board meeting which was held in Washington, D.C.

The situation for Soviet Jewish refuseniks is changing. In 1988, nearly 19,000 Jews emigrated from the Soviet Union. This is the most since 1980, though far short of the 51,000 who left in 1979. The Soviet Union relaxed their emigration rules last year allowing many of the long time refuseniks to leave. At the present time, only 625 refusenik families totalling 2,700 people are still waiting for their status to change and

permission to leave. I believe most of these families will get out during the 1989 year.

Much of the success in the new emigration policy is a result of the application of the 15 year old Jackson-Vanik Amendment which tied U.S.-Soviet trade to improvement in Soviet human rights policies. The Soviet government is recognizing the benefits of the U.S. as a trading partner.

Even though 18 years of hard work by the National Conference on Soviet Jewry is finally being rewarded, it is not time to relax our vigilance on Soviet Jewry. There our other issues besides emigration that concerns the Soviet Jewish community, especially those Jews not yet ready to leave. First is recognition of (continued)

Many other Soviet nationalities have had their language approved as a national language. Hebrew is not yet the official language of Soviet Jews despite their continued petitions. Second, according to the law, parents may not teach more than three of their own children at one time about religion. Even though this law is not being enforced at the present time, the Soviet Jewish community wants this law repealed which would allow Hebrew and Religious Schools to exist. Third, some refuseniks are placed in the category of refusenik as a result of their possession of State secrets. The Soviet government must identify how long someone may be refused permission to emigrate based on this knowledge. At this time there is no policy.

The National Conference on Soviet Jewry is interested in continued Jewish travel to the Soviet Union to visit Jews, but not necessarily only to visit refuseniks. Soviet Jews want and need Jewish education. Rabbis and educators should be sent to teach about Judaism and to teach Hebrew to this culturally neglected Jewish community.


Our support is still critical in the area of Soviet Jewry. We must continue to press for freedom for those who wish to leave and for education for those who wish to remain. Only a concerted effort by the entire Jewish community in America and abroad will insure the rights of our brothers and sisters. We must not only say "Let My people go," but we must add, "Let My people be Jews."

SAUDI ARMS SALE PROPOSAL EXPECTED

In spite of assurances that sales of advanced American arms to Saudi Arabia would not occur until Saudi Arabia joined the peace process, the Bush Administration is now considering a major arms sale to Saudi Arabia. Press reports suggest that the sale may include over 100 F-18 fighter aircraft which are among the most sophisticated fighters in the U.S. arsenal. These plans could seriously jeopardize Israel's security.

Although the actual size and scope of the sale is not yet known, it is imperative that elected officials now receive our message of opposition to any sale.

Saudi Arabia has not advanced the peace process. They still maintain a state of war with Israel by refusing to recognize Israel's right to exist,



bankrolling the PLO, and continuing the Arab boycott.

In addition, at a time when the U.S. has opened formal diplomatic relations with the PLO, the U.S. should not take any action which might be interpreted as weakening support for our strongest ally in the Middle East -- Israel. On the other hand, strong congressional opposition to the proposed sale would send a clear message of ongoing U.S. support of Israel's right to exist.

Please write your members of Congress and urge their opposition to this sale. Write to senators at U.S. Senate, Washington, DC 20510; representatives at U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, DC 20515.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS

Fourth Grade Class Phyllis Russell, Teacher

Fourth Grade students have been engaged in a variety of stimulating activities as we cover the objectives of our curriculum.

At the beginning of the year, we toured our Temple and interviewed prominent people associated with the religious school. We also learned about the different services provided by our Temple.

We talked about how the Talmud is a Jewish classic and how its format differs from that of the Bible, the Torah, and a

Siddur.

We discovered our Jewish identity in discussing group membership and Jewish life experiences. Mrs. DeBenedetti taught us a Yiddish song and a song in Ladino as we studied some differences of Ashkenazic and Sephardic Jews. And we found out that most of us are Ashkenazic.

We spent some time studying the meaning of Tzedakah and reported on Jewish people and Jewish organizations that exemplify Tzedakah. As part of the Mitzvot presentation which involved most of the religious school, fourth grade made a film strip depicting the eight steps of Tzedakah according to Maimonides.

We also worked on our Tu B'Shevat program that was presented at the Family Shabbat on January 20th.

Fifth Grade Class Shlomit Elitzur, Teacher

The Fifth Grade class is doing a unit on the elderly. The class shared stories of grandparents and greatgrandparents and will see the movie 'Batteries Not Included" together. Two quest speakers, Mrs. Raven, who discussed Crystal Night, and Mrs. Fried, who discussed her son's Bar Mitzvah and was interviewed by her daughter, Emily, enlightened the class.

The sixth grade Sunday school class was polled to see how they felt about what they learned and how they learned it. When asked what they have learned so far in 5749, they enthusiastically recalled these topics: God, famous Jewish people, Hebrew words, Bible, life cycle, and Jewish identity.

They unanimously agreed that learning is fun this year, and they look forward to Sunday mornings. As a matter of fact, they said they feel more comfortable in the Temple than anywhere but home. 

On Monday, January 30, our Social Action Committee helped prepare and serve dinner at the Horizon Center of the Community Kitchen. (Our congregation serves whenever there is a fifth Monday in a month. The next date is May 29th.) Mazon began several years ago as an idea by one man. His idea was that we self-impose a 3% tax on the cost of celebrating positive life-cycle events such as Bar/Bat Mitzvah, Wedding, Brit Milah or baby naming, or a wedding anniversary celebration. Therefore, our joy is increased by sharing it with those in need of food or shelter. Mazon receives the contributions and semiannually makes allocations based on money available and money requested. This year's January allocations totalled \$330,000, up from \$250,000 last July. "Mazon: A Jewish Response to Hunger" is working. Its success depends on your good will. - 5. Selichot services in September 1989 will be held jointly with OZS at the Synagogue. Study sessions led by the rabbis will precede the midnight service.



Background

A CRISIS OF OPPORTUNITY

Dramatic International Realignments Could Help Save Thousands of Jews

Congressional Advisors Urge An Immediate Response

- 1. The Soviet Union is withdrawing aid from North African countries including Ethiopia. Ethiopia which was never strongly ideologically aligned with the Soviet Union is turning to the West for aid.
- 2. Within the last four months agricultural ministers from Ethiopia have visited Israel. Israel is now providing Ethiopia with agricultural aid and technology and other assistance.
- 3. Ethiopian Prime Minister Mengistu is making unprecendented overtures to the United States for improved ties with the hope of bringing war torn, famine stricken Ethiopia vitally needed food and technology.
- 4. Previously, through Operations Moses and Joshua, our Congress has demonstrated its willingness to both help initiate the rescue of Ethiopian Jewry and financially support it by paying over 34 million dollars towards the effort.
- 5. Grassroots activity on behalf of rescue virtually ceased after Operation Moses because the majority of American Jews falsely believed that all the Jews were airlifted to Israel.

For these reasons the leadership of the US Congressional Caucus for Ethiopian Jewry strongly urges American Jewry to:

"...immediately mobilize a massive expression of grassroots support asking Congress for its help in reuniting the 15.000 Jews in Ethiopia with their families in Israel."

IN THIS CORNER

As we approach the uplifting holiday of Purim, it is important that we take time to remember the lessons of this story which are taught not only to children, but to teenagers and adults as well. As we all recall this story, Mordecai and Esther foiled the plot of the evil, wicked Haman who wanted to destroy the Jewish community of Shushan and all of the Jews of Persia. Haman had gallows built to hang the Jews, but the evil, wicked Haman ended up hanging from his own rope. We celebrate this victory of righteousness over anti-Semitism by wearing festive costumes, listening to the story read from the megillah, the scroll of Esther, and affirming our right to exist as Jews living freely wherever we choose.

As Jews living within a small Jewish community, the scroll of Esther holds particular significance. Like Esther, we are quite proud of our Jewish heritage and identity. Many of us have homes filled with Jewish objects, symbols, and Jewish art. We come to Temple and participate in the activities; but to reveal our Jewish self in public could result in subtle forms of anti-Semitism

such as social ostracization. In Esther's case, she might have faced death.

I believe that our young adults are affected to the greatest extent. Often these young people are the only Jews in their class or in their school. certain times of the year, our Jewish youth must find that extra measure of inner strength to explain their Jewish religion, defend themselves from verbal attacks, and overcome the emotional trauma of exclusion. We know that our children should not be fearful. We want to believe that the freedom we fought for in this society exists for our children among their friends.

What if it doesn't? What if some of our youth are afraid to be identified by their friends as a Jew. How painful it must be to hide such an important part of oneself. We must fulfill our obligation as adults and parents to instill a sense of pride and depth of courage so that when our children face the ignorant and hateful people of the world they are sure who they are, no matter what anyone says or does. Being alone is a terrible feeling. Our youth must know that we

ARZA NEWS

The recent, nearly successful effort to amend the Law of Return was the result of an intensive lobbying campaign by the Lubavitcher Rebbe and the Lubavitch/Habad movement. Lubavitch is active in communities throughout the United States, and often cultivates good relations with Reform leaders, who provide much of the movement's financial support. What these leaders do not know, however, is that in Israel, Habad is the leading advocate of amending the Law of Return, which would be, in effect, a public proclamation by the State of Israel that Reform and Conservative Judaism are illegitimate. As part of its campaign to gain support for the amendment, Habad representatives in israel have for years conducted a vicious, anti-Reform campaign.

Habad proclaims its love for all Jews. This is admirable in principle. But the protestations of love seem to mark a less noble agenda. Our money is kosher, but we are trefe. As Jews we are kosher, but our Judaism is trefe. This is the truth about Lubavitch, and every Reform Jew should be informed of the facts. 

IN THIS CORNER

On March 8th, I attended the public meeting in Frankfort of the Kentucky State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education's Committee on Family Life Education. As vice-chairman of the Fayette County Family Planning Advisory Council, I testified before the committee advocating the inclusion in the Family Life Curriculum of information on contraception. I firmly believe that every student should be fully cognizant about contraception by the end of the Middle School years.

My opinion was only one of fortyfive expressed during this raucous meeting. The opinions ranged from support of a much more conservative model curriculum as proposed by Dr. Brock to more realistic conclusions which favored the Task Force's recommendation. Supporters of Dr. Brock came in great numbers and used this majority to try and intimidate the committee into seeing that their view was the correct view. Those supporting the Task Force pointed again and again to the rising tide of teen pregnancy in Kentucky. It was noted that for white teens, we rank first in the country. A dubious distinction.

Our children's sexual activity does not begin because we have taken prayer out of schools, as some attending the meeting asserted, or because the Ten Commandments are not on the walls of our schools. The media, encompassing print and film, is rampant with unconcerned promiscuity; peer and social pressures are confusing; the break-up of the family forcing some children to look for love, and other indefinable areas, combine to teach or sway a child toward experimentation with sex . At the same time, our children ignore the medical world's warnings about the epidemic of sexually transmitted diseases and the spread of AIDS.

Those favoring the more conservative curriculum spoke about teaching our children to just say no and that by providing contraceptive information we will give our children a license to become sexually active. Though I want to believe that our children are strong enough to resist the potential disasters of early sexual activity, I know that we must provide our children with all the information and options available. As I said in my testimony, "[I believe]

contraceptive information enhances a teenagers understanding of self, selfesteem, and responsibility, as long as the information is presented in a fair, honest, and factual manner without imposing the values of guilt or inadequacy."

Finally, I agree with the needed emphasis on pre-marital abstinence and on the insistence of fidelity within the marriage. These are the only sure ways not to continue the plagues of teen pregnancy, sexually transmitted disease,

and AIDS. At the same time, just as we tell a child not to drink from a jar marked poison, we still give directions what to do if swallowed. Those fighting for the side of providing information are in an important battle. The world is sufficiently difficult without withholding from our children critical information at such a vulnerable time in their lives.

BOARD NOTES FROM MARCH MEETING

The March Board of Trustees meeting focused on the Temple's 1989-90 fiscal plan. Budget & Finance Committee Chairman, Alvin Goldman, reviewed proposals for use of funds which will be presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting. One of the key focuses is the implementation of a Maintenance Contingency Fund for the Temple's long term facilities needs.

The Treasurer's Report indicated that dues income was down slightly from last year, but total income is up due to income received from the Deficit Retirement pledges paid. Treasurer, Ken Freedman, also advised the Trustees that we have received a number of dues pledges that have increased by the requested 15%.

The job description for the Temple Office Manager/Bookkeeper was reviewed and approved. A small committee will hopefully interview the candidates during this month. This position is being filled to replace the administrator's position vacancy created when Mr. May resigned.

A workshop is being planned for those congregants who will lead services while Rabbi Adland is on vacation and unavailable.

All ballots for the new Board of Trustees nominees have been distributed. All congregants are encouraged to cast and return their ballots. The future leadership depends on the votes.

A number of items were approved by the Board. A \$100 donation from the Tzedakah Fund payable to the Winburn Baptist Church Relief Fund for the victims of the recent fire at Winburn Square Apts. was approved. Also, the Temple Board voted to participate in a fund drive for planting trees in the Ashland Avenue area near the Temple. The Temple will also join the Neighborhood Association.

Consideration of the Section 8 designation for the Temple's rental house at 125 N. Hanover is being reviewed. The Urban County Government designation enhances the opportunity to rent the property to a broader audience.

All members are encouraged to participate and attend your Temple's Board of Trustees and committee meetings. Your participation in Temple activities helps us all.

ARZA NEWS

The ARZA-sponsored Israel Religious Action Center has won the right to establish Israel's first Reform cemetery. The cemetery will be open to all Israeli Jews, Reform or otherwise, and will permit families to select the religious ritual for the burial service.

Burial in Israel's cities is completely controlled by Orthodox burial societies, which give families little or no say in the funeral service, and compel burial in shrouds rather than caskets. Last year, the Israel Religious Action Center, sponsored by ARZA, established a Reform burial society. When its application for a permit was turned down, the Center appealed to the Israeli Supreme Court. The day before the Court was to hear the case, Orthodox authorities changes their position, and approved the license. It is expected that the cemetery will be operating later this year.

On this night, we remember a fifth child. This is a child of the Shoah (Holocaust), who did not survive to ask.

Therefore, we ask for that child-Why?

We are like the simple child. We have no answer. We can only follow the footsteps of Rabbi Elazar ben Azariah, who could not bring himself to mention the Exodus at night until Ben Zoma explained it to him through the verse:

In order that you REMEMBER the day of your going out from Egypt, all the days of your life. (Deut. 16.3)

"The days of your life" indicates the daylight and the goodness of life. "All the days of your life" means even in the darkest nights when we have lost *our* firstborn, we must remember the Exodus.

We answer that child's question with silence.\(^1\)
In silence, we remember that dark time.
In silence, we remember that Jews preserved their image of God in the struggle for life.
In silence, we remember the seder nights spent in the forests, ghettos, and camps; we remember that seder night when the Warsaw Ghetto rose in revolt.

(lift the cup of Elijah)

In silence, let us pass the cup of Elijah, the cup of the final redemption yet-to-be. We remember our people's return to the land of Israel, the beginning of that redemption. Let us each fill Elijah's cup with some of our wine, expressing the hope that through our efforts, we will help bring closer that redemption.

We rise now and open our door to invite Elijah, the forerunner of the future which will bring an end to the nights of our people.

We sing as they did:

Ani Maamin

This matzah, which we set aside as a symbol of hope for the Jews of the Soviet Union, reminds us of the Indestructible links that exist between us.

As we observe this festival of freedom, we recall that Soviet Jeus are not free to leave without harassment; to learn of their past; to pass on their religious traditions; to learn the language of their fathers; to train teachers and rabbis of future generations.

We will stand with them in their struggle until the light of freedom and redemption shines forth. At the seder, we drink four cups of wine for the following expression of freedom declared to the Jewish People when we were slaves in Egypt.

"I will bring you out from under the burdens of Egypt and I will deliver you out of their bondage and I will redeem you with an outstretched arm and with great judgments; and I will take you to me for a people . . . and I will bring you in to the Land which I swore to give to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob." (Exodus 6:6:8)

Tonight, when we drink the four cups, let us dedicate our thoughts to Soviet Jews.

Our work will not cease until you are brought out from under the oppressive thumb of Soviet harassment.

Our hearts and our hands stretch out across the ocean in untiring efforts to redeem you.

We pray that our labor will take you from repression to liberty.

We anxiously await the day when the expression of freedom will be fulfilled— When the Jews of the Soviet Union are brought into the Land of our ancestors.

IN THIS CORNER

On Tuesday evening, May 2, Ohavay Zion Synagogue and Temple Adath Israel will join as one community to share in worship and thought as we commemorate Yom HaShoa. This is the day set aside by the world Jewish community to remember the victims of the greatest crime ever perpetrated against human beings: the Holocaust. Yom HaShoa falls about midway between the end of Pesach and Yom HaAtzmaut--Israel Independence Day. One could make the case that between the celebration of the miraculous liberation from slavery and the founding of the modern state of Israel, we pause to remember the Jews who dreamed of Israel during their modern slavery in the concentration camps.

Last November the Jewish community observed the 50th anniversary of Kristallnacht, the night of broken glass. In many ways, the vastness of this horrific pogrom against the Jewish community of Germany began the Holocaust. The preceding five years were filled with a tremendous amount of anti-Semitic propaganda, as well as laws designed to isolate and persecute German Jewry. But in November 1938, the fury and anger of

the German regime, fueled by the propaganda, lashed out at the Jewish community in a vicious way.

This coming September we will note with solemnity the German invasion of Poland, the beginning of the end for 3,000,000 Polish Jews, men, women, and children. Over the next six years, we will experience any number of 50 year anniversaries as we reach back into our thoughts to a time that seemed without end, when the world was at war and Jews were being murdered by the thousands. Ir 1995, we will celebrate with the remembrances of liberation, but that is still many years away.

As the number of survivors of the Holocaust begins to decrease, with so few left to tell us their story, it is even more important that we, the next generation, come together as one Jewish community. It is imperative that we pray for the souls of those whose entire families were wiped out with no traces existing. It is our duty to the Jewish people to say never again will we let this happen to our people.

Recently, the Temple purchased a series of 20 posters from the Simon





IN THIS CORNER

After the Israelite community left Egypt and crossed the Red Sea, Moses led this group of recently freed slaves on a sojourn into the southern area of the Sinai Peninsula. After seven weeks of constant wandering, the Israelites, at times hungry and thirsty, often quite disgruntled, arrived at their special destination: Mt. Sinai. At this location, God told Moses to ascend the mountain.

We know what happened. Following the crash of thunder and the brilliance of lighting illuminating the sky, a sudden calm came across the land; a whisper could be heard. According to the Torah, "God spoke all these words saying, I am the Lord, your God, who led you out of the land of Egypt, from the house of bondage, to be your God. You shall have no other gods beside me." When God concluded giving these commandments to His people, they responded, "All that you say we will do and we will hearken—na'aseh v'nishmah."

Since that moment, seven weeks after the first day of Pesach, the Jewish community has observed the Festival of Shavuot. This festival reminds us of this awesome day of God when he offered to us the Ten Commandments and we accepted them. For the last 100 years, the Reform Jewish community has observed this festival through the ceremony of Confirmation, the culmination of our children's formal religious education which comes in tenth grade.

This is an important day for our Temple and even more so for the nine youth who will publicly affirm their commitment to the Jewish people just as their ancestors did at Sinai thousands of years ago. I hope that our congregational community will show the proper support for this important day by coming to the Confirmation ceremony and celebrating with our nine youths. They have worked hard studying theology, values, and holidays. They have spent years in Religious School learning about




Passover Seder

THE PROBLEM OF WORSHIP

"As we reconsider the problem of Jewish public worship, we realize that in the breakdown of Jewish loyalty a century and a half ago something was lost which we have been unable to recover. It was lost to all of Jewry and no Jewish group has been able to restore it. Historical Jewry looks upon worship, private and public, as a duty, a commandment, an obligation to God to utter his thanks and his petitions every day. To worship was a moral obligation and inescapable duty which had vanished from Jewish life."

"What we have restored is not the sense of duty but a feeling of interest. That is important, but not sufficient. We have made the service beautiful, we have added a relevant sermon, and people come because they are interested. They come in large numbers to hear a rabbi who is more interesting. They decide as to whether they should come at all, after weighing conflicting interests. In other words, the people ask the wrong question. "Will the service interest me." instead of "Is it not by obligation to be present?"

"To have made the Jewish service interesting and often inspiring to those who come is not an inconsiderable achievement, but that is the whole achievement of modernization of the worship, and it not enough. We must now work to reestablish the sense of mandate, of mitzvah, of unshakable obligation to prayer in the home and in the synagogue."

PROJECT READ TO IMMUNIZE ETHTOPTAN JEWISH CHILDREN AGAINST DEADLY DISEASES

For much of this year northern Ethiopia, including the Jewish villages in Gondar, has been hit with a devastating Meningitis epidemic. Unfortunately, even though there were hopes that the disease would subside, the epidemic continues. Most medical experts fear that by late September, the epidemic will begin to grow at an even fasterpace.

the epidemic will begin to grow at an even faster pace.

For several years our Movement's Religious Action Center in Washington, DC has been sending volunteer American doctors to Gondar, Ethiopia to provide direct medical care to the Jews and non-Jews in the area. This program is called Project RPAP. Because of the tremendous need to combat the epidemic, the Center is now planning to send additional doctors to Ethiopia to assist the Ethiopian medical authorities in Gondar to initiate a large scale immunization program. This program will target the most wilnerable segment of the population — all children under two years old and women of child bearing age.

Currently only 18% of the children under two suffered the highest fatality rate (50%) of Meningitis-related deaths. The Center hopes to assist the Ethiopian authorities in immunizing the children of Gondar not only against Meningitis, tuberculosis, tetanus and diphtheria as well.



IMPORTANT REMINDER!!! FROM THE BY-LAWS

ARTICLE V Section 5

A member who fails to pay dues in full within one (1) month after the end of the fiscal year will be notified by certified mail that he or she will be deprived of all membership rights and privileges upon the vote of the Board of Trustees unless the dues are paid in full or other satisfactory arrangements made through the Dues Pledge Review Committee within one (1) month of the receipt of the letter. A member who has been deprived of all membership rights and privileges shall be ineligible for seating in the Sanctuary at High Holidays and his or her children shall not be eligible to be enrolled in Religious School. (Passed in 1986).

In addition, the first quarter's dues payment shall be paid by August 31st of each fiscal year. If not paid at that time, the member will be notified by mail that the family is not in good standing. (Passed in 1986).



IN THIS CORNER

As I write this message, it is August 31st. Tomorrow is September 1st. It is the 50th anniversary of the invasion of Poland by the German oppressors. Though I am much tooyoung to have any first hand knowledge of World War II, as a student of history and even more so as a Jew, I note with great solemnity this particular September 1st.

To me, this date is not only the beginning of World War II, but the sad end of Polish Jewry. In my office is all that is left to me and my generation of life in Eastern Europe: the books and photographs of Roman Vishniac and others like him, who had the foresight to travel through the Pale of Settlement before WW II and capture a glimpse of what was to be a faded society. He photographed what was to be the end of a great Jewish culture.

Today I look at the pictures, at the faces of the Yeshiva students enmeshed in the study of Talmud Torah. The poverty of the Shtetl is written on their faces and seen in their clothes. They are happy despite the endlessness of their dismal situation. The pictures of the villages with their mud roads, always mud roads, as if it always rained in Poland and the sun never shone to dry up the rain. The rickety houses leaning to one

The stores with the signs in Yiddish advertising tallesim, tefillin, books of Torah and Talmud and mysticism. I think of Tevye wanting to be a rich man. He wanted to be rich in wisdom so he could sit by the eastern wall.

Despite all the hardships our ancestors faced in Eastern Europe, in Poland, they rose above it all with a steadfast belief in God and an insistence on living a life filled with Judaism: mitzvot, good deeds, and love. The Polish Jewish community, like all Jewish communities, just wanted the opportunity to succeed in its quest for faith and spirituality; to be left alone by the negative outside forces constantly harassing Judaism, trying to destroy it.
After hundreds of years fueled by scholars and peddlers, the Polish Jewish community was almost entirely wiped out because they were Jewish. Each September 1st, I think about the Jews who didn't get to celebrate life because it was unfairly taken from them.

As we approach this year's High Holy Days, let us remember the thirst for Judaism that drove our brothers and sisters to continue learning and living Jewish lives. Let us make a commitment to pick up where the martyrs left off. Let us learn to love and practice and internalize the Jewish search for life and love and good deeds that is our people's heritage. As a New Year's commitment, let us make Judaism come alive in our hearts and in our souls and

in our minds.

CLASS I - INTRODUCTION TO HEBREW

7 - 8 PM

Cost \$35

As many Jews desire to add depth to their Jewish soul, Introduction To Hebrew is a step in fulfilling this desire. This course will teach the Alef-Bet, beginning reading and introduce the student to prayer book Hebrew.

Introduction to Hebrew begins by teaching the Alef-Bet in an easy to learn method. No prior knowledge of Hebrew is required. The goal of the course is to bring the non-Hebrew reader into the world of the Hebrew reader. At the end of the eleven weeks, a graduate will be able to follow the Hebrew read at services.



WARMING UP THE CONCREGATION

How do you generate a little more warmth and friendliness in the congregation?

- Greet the people whom you know, but spend time with those whom you do not know. Make a point of getting to know one or two people to whom you have never talked before.
- If you are not certain whether a person is a visitor or an old member, a work of greeting usually brings out the fact very quickly.
- Who breaks the ice? The chances are that if you do not know who he is, he doesn't have much of an idea who you are either. The best way is the direct way - ask for the person's name and give yours, and get acquainted.
- 4. Watch for unfamiliar faces standing around nursing a coffee cup and looking lost. If you show interest in meeting newcomers, they'll think we are warm to "outsiders."

IMPORTANT REMINDER!!! FROM THE BY-LAWS

ARTICLE V Section 5

A member who fails to pay dues in full within one (1) month after the end of the fiscal year will be notified by certified mail that he or she will be deprived of all membership rights and privileges upon the vote of the Board of Trustees unless the dues are paid in full or other satisfactory arrangements made through the Dues Pledge Review Committee within one (1) month of the receipt of the letter. A member who has been deprived of all membership rights and privileges shall be ineligible for seating in the Sanctuary at High Holidays and his or her children shall not be eligible to be enrolled in Religious School. (Passed in 1986).

In addition, the first quarter's dues payment shall be paid by August 31st of each fiscal year. If not paid at that time, the member will be notified by mail that the family is not in good standing. (Passed in 1986).



IN THIS CORNER

The recent issue of Inside Reform Judaism, formerly Reform Judaism, dedicated a significant amount of space to "Choosing Judaism," and Reform Jewish Outreach. Among the several articles was one by Rabbi Steven E. Foster of Temple Emanuel, Denver, CO. In his column, Rabbi Foster discussed the extensive program in Denver that leads toward conversion.

At the conclusion of the article, a fascinating list appeared. This list contained what is expected of the wouldbe Jew-by-Choice to accept as a basis for entering communal Jewish life.

1. Lighting Shabbat and holiday

1. candles.

2. Fasting on Yom Kippur

3. Placing a mezuzzah on the doorpost of one's house.

4. Giving tzedakah.

5. Observing, at least partially, dietary laws. (For some converts, this may mean keeping a kosher home; for others, it may mean eating matzah on Passover.)

6. Affiliating with a synagogue.

7. Worshipping regularly.

8. Continuing Jewish study.

9. Supporting the State of Israel.

10. Raising children as Jews.

To the Jew-by-Choice, this list is real and alive. Many Jews-by-Choice hunger for a Jewish regimen to their life. These individuals want to act and think and feel Jewish, and this list provides the Jew-by-Choice with a method for being a Jew.

As I read the list though, I wondered how many of us born Jews would take this list seriously. We feel a part of the Jewish people as a birthright. Who needs to link themselves to the rest of the Jewish community through symbolic acts such as this list espouses. Yet, if we take time to look at these 10 commitments to Judaism, they are not burdensome or filled with affliction. Rather each of the 10 commitments is a positive way to identify oneself as Jewish.



IN THIS CORNER

Simchat Torah/Consecration is a wonderful opportunity for the congregation to celebrate the coming of age of this year's Kindergarten class. On Friday, October 20, at 7:30 P.M., we will rejoice as we conclude the yearly reading of the Torah with the final verse of Deuteronomy and begin reading the first verses of Genesis.

Torah is part of the life of every Jew. In the narrower perpsective, Torah is the first five books of TaNaCh, the Hebrew Scripture. These books teach us about creation, the partriarchs and matriarchs, the covenant, Moses, the Exodus, revelation, the wandering in the desert, and the laws, statutes, and ordinances as understood by the Jewish people in the earliest part of our history. In a much broader sense, Torah is all Jewish learning from Abraham to Buber, and Midrash, Mishnah, and Talmud. This understanding includes, rabbinic commentaries, liturgy, responsa,

folktales, and fiction. This idea of Torah allows every Jew, of every age, of every period in Jewish history to participate in the progressive revelation of God's word.

The difficulty is not in God continuing to reveal God's self, but are we listening. Listening is an aspect of ourselves that we must develop. To hear someone's words is different than listening to what they are trying to say to us. Are we listening to their emotions? Are we understanding the subtle nuances of the words? As we listen to others, we learn more about ourselves.

As we prepare to celebrate this year's Consecration Class, we pray that they will be able to listen to the wise words of Jewish sages past and present. We hope that some day they too, will take their place in the Jewish tradition of adding wisdom to Torah.

ARZA NEWS



VICTORY ON LAW OF RETURN

Israel's Supreme Court ruled this summer that the Ministry of the Interior must enforce the Law of Return. The ruling, which came in response to a suit filed by the ARZA-sponsored Israel Religious Action Center, was a major victory for the Reform movement and for the rule of the law in the Jewish State.

Since 1984, Israel's Ministry of the Interior has ignored the Law of Return and has refused to register Reform and Conservative converts who immigrate to Israel as Jews. The Israel Religious Action Center, appealed to the Supreme Court on behalf of five Reform converts who were denied registration. In its ruling, the Court said that the Ministry must register as Jews all converts who come to Israel, and it has no power to make judgments on the validity of a conversion ceremony performed abroad.

Reform leaders hailed the decision as a major victory for religious liberty and religious pluralism in Israel. You can help further the cause of religious rights in Israel by joining ARZA, which is financing a series of court cases on behalf of Israel's Reform movement. Contact the Temple office for more information about ARZA membership.

"ARE WE BECOMING ORTHODOX: THE PROBLEMS AND POTENTIAL OF REFORM JEWISH HALACHA"

Dr. Walter Jacob has been Rabbi of Rodef Shalom Congregation in Pittsburgh, PA since 1955. He became the Senior Rabbi in 1966. Dr. Jacob is the author or editor of twelve books; among them are: Contemporary American Reform Responsa (1987); Liberal Judaism and Halakhah (1988); The Pittsburgh Platform in Retrospect (1983); Books of Fifty Years (1984); Christianity Through Jewish Eyes (1974, 1979). In addition, more than eight hundred essays and monographs have been published.



IN THIS CORNER

Over the last several weeks, I received many requests for the name of a prayerbook for use in the home. As we begin to enhance our awareness of Jewish home life and celebration, there is a desire to supplement this experience with liturgy and ritual. In 1977, the Central Conference of American Rabbis, the national body of Reform Jewish rabbis, published Shaarei HaBayit, Gates of the House: The New Union Home Prayerbook. I highly recommend the purchase and use of this book. Copies are available in the gift shop.

Gates of the House is divided into eight sections which are easy to use and understand. The first section contains prayers and readings. This includes daily prayers, blessings recited around meals and in praise of life.

The second section is the most significant one in regards to the requests I have received. Holidays and Holy Day readings found in this section cover the areas of Shabbat, Yom Tov, Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, Havdalah, Sukkot, Channukah, and Purim.

The remaining sections include readings for the cycle of life, weekday services, prayers for those in mourning, poetry, and a table of the scriptural readings.

The celebration of Jewish life in the house and home, is one the strongest areas in Jewish life. This is where Judaism begins; this is where Judaism endures; and this is where Judaism must continue to grow. During the lifetime of a child, only a minimal number of hours is spent in the Temple building. The Religious School tries to offer children the best Jewish education possible. Without the support and nurturing of a Jewish home, our children will walk away from here each Sunday morning storing Judaism away until the next week. Gates of the House, in its simple and beautiful manner, offers to each family a means into the world of Jewish home life.

This is only one of many books on Jewish life which I could recommend for the home. There are many others which

ARZA NEWS

JERUSALEM REFORM SYNAGOGUE WINS RIGHT TO EXPAND

A Supreme Court suit brought by the ARZA-sponsored Israel Religious Action Center has brought to an end efforts by Interior Minister Arye Der'i to block expansion of a Reform synagogue in Jerusalem. The suit was filed on behalf of Congregation Kol Haneshama in the Bakaa neighborhood of Jerusalem, where 200 people regularly attend worship in a building that holds 85. The Municipality of Jerusalem agreed to lease the synagogue an adjoining lot for building expansion, but the papers required the signature of Der'i, who represents the ultra-Orthodox Shas party. When Der'i refused to sign without giving an explanation, the Israel Religious Action Center went to the Supreme Court. Der'i finally signed the day before the Court was to hear arguments, thus making the expansion possible; he obviously was aware that there was no legal basis for his refusal, and the judges would have ruled against him. As it was, they required him to pay the Center's court costs. ARZA leaders and Reform leaders in Israel expressed satisfaction with the victory. American Jews can support the Center and the struggle for Reform rights in Israel by joining ARZA. Membership information can be obtained from the Temple office.

IN THIS CORNER

All of us are aware that Temple Adath Israel is a Reform Jewish congregation. What many of us are not aware of is that our Temple is part of a much larger network of Reform congregations called the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

Established in 1873 by Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise, the UAHC is now comprised of over 800 congregations representing 1.5 million Jews in North America.

Every other year, the UAHC holds a Biennial convention, inviting and encouraging member congregations to send delegates, alternates, and more to share and discuss issues of common concern. November 2-6, nine adult members and two high school youth traveled to New Orleans for the 1989 UAHC Biennial. While at the convention, we attended workshops, meetings, services, and programs designed to bring us more in touch with the direction of Reform Judaism.

The first reaction by any delegate, especially those coming for the first time or those traveling from a small Jewish community is the incredible number of people, over 3,000 Reform Jews from

all parts of the continent. The impact is felt the strongest at the Shabbat morning worship when all three thousand plus say the shema. At that moment time and space are suspended. We are all one: one people, one religion, one God. This impression is felt every time one walks into the lobby and almost everyone you see or meet is a Reform Jew.

Each of us attended several different workshops over the weekend. Members of the Temple Executive Committee went to workshops that dealt with Temple management and membership recruitment and retention. Others went to learn about program needs and developments. I observed several workshops. One considered the participation and integration of the non-Jewish spouse into the Temple. On December 13, the Temple Outreach program will spend an evening discussing this issue. I learned that some congregations have become more restrictive with regards to the non-Jewish spouse, while others, like ours, seem to be more flexible in their approach. The greatest areas of concern were Board participation, chairing continued



IN THIS CORNER

Hanuka is our festival of the internal spirit's quest for freedom in controlling all aspects of our lives: emotional, physical, and metaphysical. When Mattathius, his son Judah, and Judah's brothers rose up in revolt against the Syrian-Greeks, they fought for personal dignity and integrity. Through their actions they taught that our God is a God for all people, not something which can be imposed on another human being against their will. We learned that our ancestors felt compelled to display their Judaism by resting on Shabbat and praising God, and adhering to the rituals of our tradition.

Judah Maccabee and his followers believed, fought and died to affirm Judaism's authenticity in truth and righteousness, and they affirmed that Judaism was their path to God, even though it might not be the alternative for everyone.

The story of Hanuka continues to be our story today. Last year at this season, I spoke in front of our State's Senate pleading for religious pluralism and tolerance of minority religions. The creche standing in front of our State Capital building symbolized to me endorsement of Christianity as the State religion. By the time you read this article, we may be faced with the same issue again. When will others stop imposing their religious will on the minority? As Jews, for more than 2,000 years, we have faced this issue everywhere we lived.

Religious oppression manifests itself in many ways. The issue of prochoice versus anti-abortion is partially an issue of religion and religious freedom. Many men and women base their choice position on religious teachings of their denomination. Since the question of when life begins and even more so when



The Following blessing is added on the first night of Hanukah only:

Blessed is the Lord our God, Ruler of the universe, for giving us life, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this season.

As the Shamash (servant) candle is kindled, we say each day:

As one candle may kindle many others and yet lose none of its own light, so Judaism has kindled the light of truth for many religions in many lands and still shines brightly through the ages.

First Night - FREEDOM

We kindle these Hanukah lights in memory of the dedication and courage of the Maccabees. Believing that they should be free to worship God as their hearts and minds dictated, they willingly gave their lives for freedom. Now, kindling these candles, we rededicate ourselves to work for the equal rights of all people, and for the realization of a society of democracy and freedom.

Second Night - FAMILY

Tonight as we celebrate Hanukah together we are conscious of our precious gift of family. So often we take one another for granted, forgetting to express our love and devotion. Let us, now, as we kindle these festive lights rededicate ourselves to sharing our interests and time with one another. Like the Maccabees of old, let us always face the tribulations and the joys of life united by our family bonds. Kindling these lights, we pray that through kindness and thoughtfulness, our love for one another will increase from strength to strength.

Third Night - TORAH

On this third night of Hanukah, we rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition. As the Maccabees courageously fought to preserve our faith, we, too, are duty-bound to sustain our heritage by deepening our understanding of it through study. By increasing our knowledge of Judaism we have become more sensitive to its abiding values, more aware of our responsibility to realize these values in our society. Study opens our minds and fortifies us against tyranny. Learning secures our freedom. Let us, then, as we kindle these candles rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition.

Fourth Night - HOPE

Our ancestors have taught us that in hope a person's future is illumined and made creative. Ours are times when many people live in fear and great despair. Like the Maccabees, we need to build our lives on hope. Hope that ultimately truth will triumph over superstition and confidence that trust and understanding will finally depose superstition and tyranny. Now as we kindle these Hanukah lights, may our eyes be directed to the loftiest visions of our faith.

Fifth Night - CHARITY

Our tradition tells us that during the Maccabean war for freedom, all Jews, both children and adults, contributed toward the cause of defeating the oppressor. There are many forms of oppression still existent in our world today. There are people afflicted by sickness, hunger, ignorance and prejudice. Tonight we, like our ancestors, put aside gifts of Tzedakah in order that we, too, may help to bring an end to oppression. We pray that the humble gifts we offer will provide food for the hungry, medicine for the sick, knowledge for the ignorant, and equal opportunity for those afflicted by prejudice. Now as we kindle our Hanukah lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the ideal of Tzedakah, righteousness and justice, found in our Jewish tradition.

Sixth Night - SHALOM

The candles of Hanukah remind us of our chosen mission as Jews. Like the Maccabees we seek to rededicate ourselves to the service of God. Today one of our foremost tasks is to secure peace in our troubled world. When we end disagreements through mutual understanding, when we seek to mend hurt and wounded feelings, we make peace a living idea. Then let us, as we kindle our Hanukah candles, rededicate ourselves with renewed strength to the task of securing peace.

Seventh Night - BROTHERHOOD

Brotherhood and Sisterhood is founded upon a total respect for the liberty and freedom of all people. The Maccabees of old sought to protect themselves when their rights were violated. Our Hanukah lights serve as a reminder that peace is secure only when we honor the precious liberty and property of our fellow neighbor. As we kindle these lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the cause of peace which alone can bring dignity to all everyone.

Eighth Night - FAITH

Tonight we kindle all the candles of our Hanukah Menorah. Throughout the centuries the Menorah has been a symbol of our Jewish faith. Like the Maccabees, when they celebrated this festive holiday, we rededicate ourselves to the living of a more meaningful Jewish life. We pray that throughout this coming year, we may fulfill the ideals of freedom, Tzedakah, family, study, hope, shalom and brotherhood, all of which re symbolized by the candles of our Menorah.

IN THIS CORNER

Immediately following the Thanksgiving weekend, the wonderful Israeli who was the tour guide for the Temple Adath Israel 1988 Israel trip came to Lexington. As he visited with his friends from that tour, which was just about two years ago, Doron, our guide, and I discussed the next TAI Israel trip which will occur in June 1991.

There is no question in my mind that a trip to Israel can change or enhance an individual's Jewish identity. To walk back into the ancient past at any of the numerous archeological excavations, or to relive the 20th century as the land of Israel was reclaimed from swamp or desert to become farm land or new towns and villages is anemotional exciting experience. These same comments can be heard from almost any person who has made the trip.

For adults, a tour of Israel can help recall bitter or sweet memories for the Jewish people of this century. For teenagers, a trip to Israel can be the beginning of a wonderful voyage through Jewish history ending with a more solid understanding of the meaning of the State, the meaning of living a Jewish

life, and how Jews are bound together across time and space.

Through our contributions to the Central Kentucky Jewish Federation, of which 70% is sent on to the United Jewish Appeal, as well as contributions from every other Jewish Federation in this country, the State of Israel continues to receive tremendous financial support from the American Jewish community. Yet, I am convinced that if we don't make bolder attempts to send more of our high school youth to Israel, the message and importance of the State of Israel will be lost on the next generation.

I believe that it is now time for our local Federation to rethink its policy of a 70/30 split and use some of the 70% to help finance youth tours of Israel. There is no question that these trips are costly. Families need financial assistance to get their children to Eretz Yisrael. At this time, a total of \$1,000, two \$500 Israel scholarships, is available. The Federation instead should reserve \$5,000-\$10,000 of the WA allocation and thus increase to \$1,000 per youth the

If a high school youth from our community chooses to spend the summer in Israel on a legitimate program, we should support that youth's decision by helping to send the individual. We should give the money to the youth with our blessing. The Lexington Jewish community will feel pride in the youth's choice of spending a summer in Israel and we will benefit from a more intense Jewish identity. Israel will still get their share of the Federation pie, but this money will go to Israel in the form of tourist dollars e.g. air fare, gifts, food, tour guides, bus drivers, and so

This concept of redistributing the CKJF-UJA allocation will take a bold initiative on the part of the CKJF board. In the short term, certain conflicts may arise, but in the long term, all of the Jewish community will reap the rewards of this action.

HOW WE FINANCE OUR TEMPLE

(This is the first of a series explaining both the income and expenditure aspects of the Temple's finances.)

The Temple's financial support is met from six categories of sources: annual dues, special donations for current use, fees for special activities, income from endowed funds, and income from Temple properties.


Annual dues are paid by each membership unit--whether family or individual. the amount, based upon the member's financial ability, is established periodically through the joint efforts of the member and the Dues Review committee. Because the Temple follows the Jewish tradition of granting membership regardless of financial ability and because a number of members have very limited financial means, the remaining members have a responsibility to demonstrate an extra degree of generosity in responding to dues assessments. A little under 60% of the Temple's current expenditures are paid from annual dues. The Budget & Finance Committee chairman estimates that a sound financial structure requires that annual dues provide at least 70% of our current level of expenditures. The second largest source of the Temple's finances, about 25%, is paid from endowed funds predominantly the Levy-Mt. Tabor Fund.

Fees for special activities such as the pre-school, religious school, and adult education classes help to defray the costs of those specific activities. These fees constitute about 12% of the total costs of the congregation's entire program.

Special donations for current use-e.g., flower fund, library fund, unrestricted donations, and fund raising activities by Sisterhood--are used to help finance special aspects of the Temple's environment and programs but pay less than 5% of the total expenses.

Finally, the Temple receives a small amount of income from its rental properties, usage fees for the auditorium, and interest from bank accounts holding funds available for current use. Of this money, only the rental fees are substantial but this income is largely (sometimes entirely) offset by the expenses of maintaining the properties (which are being held to meet future expansion needs).

1ST GRADE
