N THIS CORNER...

Some thoughts for my friends at Temple Adath Israel while I am on my sabbatical:

- At the end of February, Temple Adath Israel will host The Hebrew Reading Marathon. This is an excellent opportunity to learn to read Hebrew. The program, run by its creator Rabbi Golinkin, is being used throughout North America to teach people Hebrew. It is only one day (with a few optional followup sessions.) Don't miss this opportunity. More information is available elsewhere in the bulletin or call the Temple office.
- This summer, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (UAHC) is sponsoring a Social Action mission. Reform Jews from all over the country are being given the opportunity to gather in one place to participate in projects that will benefit others. Rabbi Joel Soffin from New Jersey is the coordinator for this project. The interesting aspect of this mission is that Lexington, KY, will be the gathering site. This project will take place the week of July 28. The work will occur from Monday-Friday. Members of this congregation may participate as well.

In coordinating this project, I agreed that our community would also help in some of the local details. I am looking for people to chair this project as well as work on the following:

- 1. Preparing dinner Monday and Tuesday;
- 2. Arranging for home hospitality on Thursday;
- 3. Making lunches a couple of days;
- Coordinating a pot luck Shabbat dinner on Friday.

Rabbi Soffin says that we can expect 40-60 people.

• Finally, it is wonderful to know that I have so many people in this congregation that I can count on to do the necessary work in my absence. Thank you to those who lead and will lead worship, conduct Torah Study, teach my Hebrew and Confirmation classes, and visit those in the hospital.

Friday evening, March 1 - "Midrash: Our Struggles as Parents and Children" - By dealing with selected passages in Genesis which show how characters act in the context of family life, we will learn not only about the biblical narratives, but also about ourselves as family members.

Saturday morning, March 2 - "Midrash: The Process of Making the Bible Come Alive" - Midrash is the literature through which the rabbis sought to respond not only to the times in which they lived, but also to the timeless questions we all face. Dr. Cohen will discuss how we can make the Bible come alive and help us shape our family lives.

Saturday afternoon, March 2 - "Abraham's Struggle as Father and Husband" - The patriarch Abraham is usually seen as the symbol of faith, commitment, strength, and loyalty. But how successful was hi as a husband and parent? Dr. Cohen will use the texts to learn about these aspects of Abraham and, in so doing, help us learn about who we are as spouses and parents.

Sunday morning, March 3 - "Sibling Rivalry: A Fascinating Response to a Perennial Problem" - The relationship among siblings are among life's most complicated. Dr. Cohen will examine the story of Cain and Abel to provide us with guidance in our struggles with our own brothers and sisters.

THE CONTROVERSY A SOUTHERN ELEMENTARY



First of all, I must say that I am very proud of the stand that my wife took at Southern Elementary School concerning the changing of the annual Christmas Program to a Winter Program. It took a lot of courage for her to stand up, speak her mind and heart, and work for what she believes in. What she accomplished is a model for all of us.

Lest you think that Sandy's goal was to remove Christmas from Southern as a way to damage those who are Christian, let me tell you that the sole purpose of Sandy's work was to make Southern Elementary a school which values every child and conducts ceremonies which are inclusive of all children, not particular for some even if they are a majority. Enough people valued her wisdom and the wisdom of the school principal, representatives of the Fayette County Central Offices, and other parents who spoke up to make the necessary changes. According to Sandy, the program was beautiful, meaningful, and everyone had a place.

There are many people in Lexington who believe that Christmas, Christological music, and Christianity should be an integral part of the Fayette County educational experience. Some of these people expressed their views at the Southern meetings that were held to decide this issue. Others called local talk shows to fan the flames burning with intolerance. One local talk show host called The Adland's "bullies" and "the enemy". "Removing Christmas celebrations from the schools is un-American," the callers would indicate.

Maybe I misunderstand Christmas, but I see it as a holy day for Christians. It is one of their High Holy Days. The celebration of Christmas should focus on spiritual messages. These same parents concerned with the celebration of Christmas in our schools should be working to enhance the celebration of this special day in their homes and churches. They should find the spiritual message in their communities of faith. I feel sad for my Christian friends who have lost sight of the meaning of Christmas and only focus on the commercial aspect and the parties.

I am not sure where this controversy will lead. Next year, I am sure, parents will work to bring Christmas back to the winter program by getting on the important decision making committees, rallying support, and working within the system. It is only too bad that they don't realize how many children feel excluded from this program, looking at it as strangers from the outside. Sandy will continue to be on the firing line. If you believe in what she is doing, she could use your support.

It is with profound sorrow that I announce the death of our former rabbi, Dr. Jacob Rader Marcus. He died November 14, 1995/22 Cheshvan 5756, in Cincinnati, OH. Rabbi Marcus served this congregation in 1919, returning in the late 1920's to conduct Confirmation services. Temple Adath Israel, Lexington, KY, is the only congregation Rabbi Marcus ever served. Until his death, he proudly used the pocket watch presented to him in appreciation of his service here by Skuller's Jewelers. He spent the remaining years, more than 70, as a member of the faculty of Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, OH, teaching, researching, and writing until last year. His presence will be missed by every student who studied with him and every rabbi he called one of his "boys." Zecher Tzaddik Livracha - May his righteous memory be a blessing to us all.






Participation in the B'nai Mitzvah service includes several requirements including worship attendance and a short paper, as well as Temple Membership.

With a gift \$10,000.00 gift from an anonymous donor, a new restricted Temple Endowment Fund has been created. This new fund will be known as the OVFTY-tute SCHOLARSHIP FUND. The purpose of the fund is to provide every child, whose parents are members in good standing of Temple Adath Israel, with a one-time full scholarship to OVFTY-tute, in the year they complete the ninth grade of the TAI Religious School. This one week camp institute for 9th-12th graders is held in August at Goldman Union Camp Institutetime. The granting of the scholarship is dependent upon the beneficiaries' agreement to complete the Temple's 10th Grade Confirmation program. Temple Adath Israel thanks the Temple family who provided the necessary funds to begin this scholarship program. Many children will benefit from this exciting, rewarding Jewish experience.

- Registration fees for "children in need" to attend TAI Religious School;
- Fees for travel, youth at camps, retreats;
- Scholarships or partial scholarships for Jewish or Jewish related activities;
- Sponsoring special events geared to young people/youth to bring greater perception, breadth and dynamics to their understanding and appreciation of Judaism.

TRUST FUND provides monies for programs and/or activities related to cultural and educational projects for Temple Adath Israel. This fund brought the singing duo Kol B'Seder to TAI last fall for an absolutely wonderful concert.

Many children of our congregation have received money from this fund to attend Jewish functions when they otherwise would not have been able to go.

The final fund to be established in recent years is the MAURICE HYMSON ADULT EDUCATION
TRUST FUND. This fund supports adult education programming sponsored by the Temple including, but not limited to, speakers of the faculty of Hebrew Union College. Our recent scholar-in-residence, Rabbi Norman Cohen, who presented three marvelous teaching sessions, came to our congregation under the auspices of this fund.

As I mentioned, all of the above funds were established within the last several years. Other Temple Endowment Restricted Funds include:

- The Abraham Music Fund which brings Jewish musical guests to our congregation;
- Adult Programming Fund which supports Adult Education at TAI;
- The Paritz Fund which purchases artwork including some of the beautiful artwork in the hallway and social hall:
- The Kessler Fund which supports the Religious School.

We are very lucky as a congregation to have members who care about the future of this congregation and can contribute the financial base necessary to start a restricted endowment fund. Along with some of the Auxillary Funds which include The Prayer Book Fund, Tzedakkah Fund, L'Chaim Fund, and Memorial Book Fund, we can attempt to service the needs of our membership. Whether it is programming, aesthetics, providing opportunities for our youth, or helping those in need, these funds help to insure a better future at TAI.

The work is not over though. We must all continue to contribute to these funds so that they will grow and provide more opportunities for the generations yet to come. There is a famous Talmudic story which tells about the old man who goes out to plant a fruit tree knowing that this will not benefit him, but it will benefit his children and grandchildren. We must plant the fruit trees, as well as monitor their sustenance so that our children and grandchildren will benefit.

Thank you to all who make this funds happen from the original donor to all the contributors. A ray of light is shining for tomorrow.

From the Rabbi's Library



In 1992, Rabbi Jeff Salkin wrote a book titled, Putting God on the Guest List: How to Reclaim the Spiritual Meaning of Your Child's Bar or Bat Mitzvah. Every rabbi who has read this book praises its content as it attempts to restore dignity, responsibility, integrity, and God to the Bar and Bat Mitzvah ceremony. The meaning of a child's Bar/Bat Mitzvah is not a party, but the coming of age of a Jewish adult and the inherent responsibilities that go along with this spiritual moment.

During my January Sabbatical, I finally read what I had heard about for some time and I couldn't put it down. Every rabbi has written this book in his head, as a sermon, in bulletin articles, or in his/her soul. Rabbis want the family to focus on the Erev Shabbat and Shabbat morning services. Rabbis want the meal following the service and other gatherings of friends and relatives to be filled with the spirit and presence of God, and not to reflect status in the community and wealth.

Rabbi Salkin helps us focus by teaching us what a Bar/Bat Mitzvah is. The book is divided into nine chapters. The first six chapters help us focus on the meaning of the ceremony. Chapter seven teaches us about the Shabbat morning service. Chapters eight and nine talk about family and the years after the Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

At Temple Adath Israel, we work hard to keep everything in the proper perspective. We try to make the ceremony the focus rather than the celebration. We invite the entire community to the Oneg (luncheon) after the service so that we can celebrate together as a community. We try to remind parents that what they do on the East and West coasts does not need to be the way we do it here. We try to encourage parents to remember that their child is only 13 and would like to celebrate in a manner consistent with other 13 year old children. And I believe that we maintain an air of spirituality at all times during the celebration of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

Yet, despite our successes, this book is a must read if your children or grandchildren are approaching this important day. You will find comfort and meaning in Rabbi Salkin's words.

IN THIS CORNER

Over the next several weeks, the Temple Adath Israel community will be presented with several opportunities to celebrate and worship together. It these moments of togetherness -- a simcha, a service, a special address -- that enhance our Jewish spiritual life at TAI and bring us into the realm of *kedusha*-holiness.

On May 17, the Temple Adath Israel Sisterhood, Women of Reform Judaism, will lead the Erev Shabbat Service. Each year we hold a Sisterhood Shabbat, but we never give much thought to the importance of this moment in Jewish life. We have taken for granted the role of women in Reform Jewish life to such an extent that women rabbis, cantors, educators, Temple presidents, officers, and leaders of the movement are accepted without question. Not that long ago women were not permitted on the bimah, to read from the Torah, to lead a service, even to sit with men during worship. Sisterhood Shabbat celebrates the important role women play in Judaism today. By joining with the women of our congregation at this service, you can affirm the wonderful new direction and opportunities for women in Jewish life.

Less than one week later is our annual ceremony of Confirmation on Thursday evening, May 23, at 7:00 PM. Confirmation is a culminating ceremony marking the completion of a child's formal religious education at the end of tenth grade. This ceremony is held on the holy Jewish festival of Shavuot, the feast of weeks, which remembers the moment of revelation on Mt. Sinai when Moses received the ten commandments, even the entire Torah, from God. Just as Moses receives and accepts the Torah, so do we ask our Confirmands to do the same.

It is very important that as a community we attend and support the children of our congregation at this moment of *kedusha* in their lives. For many of them, we attended a Bar or Bat Mitzvah ceremony when they came of age as an adult. We sent gifts to mark this moment. Yet, most of us neglect this even more important moment in their Jewish lives, the ceremony of Confirmation. We don't send gifts or attend the ceremony. It slips past unnoticed except by a few family members and friends.

Becoming a Jewish adult happens when you turn 13. Fulfilling the responsibilities of Jewish adulthood may occur continuously throughout one's life. Confirmation is our chance to say to these young adults that formal Jewish (continued on page 2)



YOU CAN'T PRAY AND CHEW GUM AT THE SAME TIME

The following is a reprint of an article written by Rabbi Dow Marmur, Senior Rabbi of Holy Blossom Temple in Toronto, Canada

This is not an assault on the intelligence of those who come to worship in our Temple. For we are all able to chew gum and do many other things at the same time. But are we willing to do it when it comes to prayer?

I have observed people chewing gum, rather than opening a Siddur. I have even seen someone "calming her nerves" with obsessive chewing in front of the Ark. It is not only visitors who do it. A lot of jaws move rhythmically during the most solemn moments of our High Holy Day services, when only our own members attend.

Piety, not dental hygiene

My concern is not aesthetic but religious. To chew gum during services is indicative of a lack of respect for what the synagogue represents. Those who have no sense of the sacred behave without dignity in places of worship. Chewing gum is a symptom.


They wouldn't do it in church. Not because they are closer to Christianity, but because they are more on their guard in the presence of non-Jews. Being a little more on our guard in the presence of God would do us all a lot of good.

Advertisements tell us that chewing gum assures a fresh mouth and thus success with people. My understanding of tradition suggests that God does not mind bad breath, as long as the mouth says the right words, dental hygiene is a poor substitute for piety.


We Need Your Help!!!!







THE OPPORTUNITY TO BUILD YOUR OWN SUKKAH IS HERE WITH THIS EASY TO BUILD, EASY TO STORE SUKKAH KIT.

Many Temple families have inquired about fulfilling the MITZVAH of building their own Sukkah. This kit makes it easy and affordable


Over the past five years, North Carolina woodworker Steve Henry Herman has developed a simple, do-it-yourself Sukkah kit. You buy the hardware for only \$36 from the Temple and purchase the lumber, approximately another \$36 from any lumber vard.

The kit includes an illustrated assembly book which has been developed with the assistance of a top instructional designer to render the project...totally klutz-proof. The kit contains all the heavy-duty steel braces and self-drilling screws. The only tool you need is a screwdriver. The length of 2-by-4's and 2by-2's you buy (8, 10, or 12 feet) will determine your Sukkah

Creating the sides is up to you. You can use tarps, burlap, whatever to finish the Sukkah and make it your own.

The Temple will have seven sets of the hardware available for purchase. As soon as the hardware arrive, a Sukkah will be built in the Temple courtyard for everyone to see.



IN THIS CORNER

There are two very different issues that I want to consider in this August message. The first concerns two recent gifts left to the Temple.

The first gift of \$15,000 was from the estate of Carolyn Straus who passed away this spring. An endowment fund is being created with this money in Memory of Herman and Carolyn Straus. The money will be used to support benevolent activities at the Temple and in the community.

The second gift is a \$50,000 bequest from the estate of lifetime Temple member Jayne Bolotin who passed away in the late spring. Her money is to be used for improvements to the Temple. The early idea of an addition to the Religious School for art education, music education, and a playroom being considered. This money will certainly allow us to move forward.

It is certainly wonderful to know that these individuals cared about the Temple and the future of Judaism to bequeath this money. Let me take this opportunity to encourage all our Temple members to remember the Temple now and in their will. These gifts and others to the Temple will afford us the opportunity and means to do the important work of building a Jewish today and tomorrow.

The other concern is with the recent statements made by the Southern Baptists at their convention in New Orleans in June. Their desire to focus on homosexuality as a sin is frustrating and narrow minded. The Southern Baptists hold up to the world the notion of the inerrancy of the Bible and that in this Bible, in Leviticus, it says that homosexuality is a sin. It is hard to refute the words of Leviticus. Yet, if we are going to take the Bible as inerrant, what do we do with the following passage:

Deu 21:18-21 If someone has a stubborn and rebellious son who will not obey his father and mother, who does not heed them when they discipline him, 19 then his father and his mother shall take hold of him and bring him out to the elders of his town at the gate of that place. 20 They shall say to the elders of his town, "This son of ours is stubborn and rebellious. He will not obey us. He is a glutton and a drunkard." 21 Then all the men of the town shall stone him to death. So you shall purge the evil from your midst; and all Israel will hear, and be afraid.

I don't believe that any of us would respond to a child in this manner, yet the Hebrew Scripture tells us to do it this way.

Our Southern Baptist friends seem to find it convenient to use some passages from the Hebrew Scriptures as the inerrant words of God, but are probably more than willing to ignore the inerrancy of others if they don't fit their way of thinking. As Reform Jews, we see Torah and the rest of the Hebrew Scriptures as moral and ethical guides to life. Reading the words literally produces too many conflicts and too many inconsistencies in our thought and practice. Reading the words of Torah in a liberal, not literal fashion, allows us to find the truths the heart knows and to search out the hidden meanings of the text as it applies to us today.

Not only do the Southern Baptists have a phobia about homosexuality, but now they are refocusing their energy on converting Jews. The response by national Jewish leaders and even within our local community to this desire to convert Jews has been strong and direct. This is an attack on Jews, Judaism, our tradition and our history. We have been this route before whether it was the Spanish Inquisition with the choice to convert or die, the centuries of anti-Judaism in Europe, or the Holocaust's desire to rid the world of Jews. In the eyes of the Southern Baptists, and other Christians as well, Jews are not complete without Jesus in our lives.

So how do we combat missionary efforts like those of the Southern Baptists?? I don't believe there is any path of confrontation that will be successful. I do believe that the best response is to be a Jew. Don't just say "I am a Jew"; be a Jew. Live a Jewish life. Celebrate the holy days and holidays. Observe the ethical and moral commandments of the Torah. Teach the next generation about living as a Jew. If we are strong in our Jewish lives, then no effort of a missionary will be successful.

As we move toward another exciting Temple calendar year, I urge you to make Temple life a priority and not an after-thought. By putting it at the front end of your life, there will be no need to think about the Southern Baptist's desire to convert all of us.





THE OPPORTUNITY TO BUILD YOUR OWN SUKKAH IS HERE WITH THIS EASY TO BUILD, EASY TO STORE SUKKAH KIT.

Many Temple families have inquired about fulfilling the MITZVAH of building their own Sukkah. This kit makes it easy and affordable.

Over the past five years, North Carolina woodworker Steve Henry Herman has developed a simple, do-it-yourself Sukkah kit. You buy the hardware for only \$36 from the Temple and purchase the lumber, approximately another \$36 from any lumber yard. The kit includes an illustrated assembly book which has been developed with the assistance of a top instructional designer to render the project...totally klutz-proof. The kit contains all the heavy-duty steel braces and self-drilling screws. The only tool you need is a screwdriver. The length of 2-by-4's and 2-by-2's you buy (8, 10, or 12 feet) will determine your Sukkah size.

Creating the sides is up to you. You can use tarps, burlap, whatever to finish the Sukkah and make it your own.

The Temple will have seven sets of the hardware available for purchase. As soon as the hardware arrive, a Sukkah will be built in the Temple courtyard for everyone to see.





Over the past five years, North Carolina woodworker Steve Henry Herman has developed a simple, do-it-yourself Sukkah kit. You buy the hardware for only \$36 from the Temple and purchase the lumber, approximately another \$36 from any lumber yard

The kit includes an illustrated assembly book which has been developed with the assistance of a top instructional designer to render the project...totally klutz-proof. The kit contains all the heavy-duty steel braces and self-drilling screws. The only tool you need is a screwdriver. Depending on the length of 2-by-4's and 2-by-2's you buy (8, 10, or 12 feet) will determine vour Sukkah size

Creating the sides is up to you. You can use tarps, burlap, whatever to finish the Sukkah and make it your own.

The Temple will have seven sets of the hardware available for purchase. As soon as the hardware arrives, a Sukkah will be built in the Temple courtyard for everyone to see.



IN THIS CORNER

Shana Tova u'metuka, may this new year be filled with the holiness of God, the sweetness of a life filled with the beauty of the world, and the commitment to make our world a better place. The High Holy Days are upon us. This is always an exciting time of year. Temple is cleaned and prepared to receive old friends and new into our sanctuary. The cantorial soloist and choir, and our TAI Makhela rehearse with fervor and determination to prepare the music for the holy days. I absent myself from my office a little more often to prepare my sermons. All of the above are very important in making the High Holy Days that special time of year at Temple Adath Israel.

Judaism offers many paths to walk in this inward turning. The sign posts of the rituals and commandments help guide us. Prayer and celebration of holidays and holy days nourish us. The final process on this inward journey is knowing yourself. This is the completion of the journey and we must each reach this end on our own.

The High Holy Day services are model of this journey. We start out on Erev Rosh HaShanah. We are excited about the new year. We taste the honey of sweetness and it brings a smile to our faces. search for God, search for goodness, search ourselves, and atone for what we have done wrong in order to make the year right. Although the ceremony of tashlich allows us to cast off our sins symbolically, it also admonishes us to think about how we transgressed against others and God, and about how to atone for those sins.

The days pass and Kol Nidre arrives. The melody fosters contemplation driving us further inward in our thoughts. The words of the prayers Erev Yom Kippur are contemplative and reflective.

Yom Kippur day we can spend entirely in the sanctuary or at least in Temple. We continue to walk the path of looking inside ourselves until we finally reach the service of Yizkor when we remember. We remember our parents and children, cousins and friends who preceded us in death. We think about their dreams for us. We think about the lives they lived. We ask ourselves about what we have done. The concluding service begins to bring us back. At the end of the service we recite words of God's oneness and then the final tekiah gedolah, the final blast of the shofar to awaken us to this world.

As we move to break our fast, we embrace friends feeling contented that the journey was good, the soul cleansed, the mind ready to move on. In our hearts we commit to being more faithful members and better Jews, as we look forward to a good year.

Shana Tova to all my friends in this community. May this year be as sweet as that taste of honey on the apple.

IN THIS CORNER...

No sooner did the High Holy Days conclud with the final sound of the shofar, then Israel jumped into the center of our attention. The senseless violence and needless casualties which occurred in Israel near the end of September left me, and, I am sure, many of you with doubt as to the future of the peace process in the Middle East. Since the election of Prime Minister Netanyahu, Jews and those who closely observe the State of Israel have held their collective breath waiting to see what direction Mr. Netanyahu would take. What Mr. Rabin, z"l, and Mr. Peres accomplished in negotiating and signing a plan with the Palestinian Authority was curtailed by Mr. Netanyahu's hard-line approach. Face to face talks, open lines of communication, freezing of the building of settlements, and withdrawal of troops from occupied territories gave way to deaf ears, new settlements and roads, and maintaining troop presence in occupied areas. The new government took its narrow political victory as a mandate to change and overhaul what already existed. Not surprisingly. tension mounted and finally escalated into full-blown violence.

The pretext for this violence was the opening of the tunnel that allegedly ran under the Temple Mount on which is located a Muslim shrine, the Dome of the Rock, and the Al-Aksa Mosque. It turns out that the tunnel doesn't run under the Temple Mount or threaten any Muslim holy sites; rather the tunnel now opens into an Arab business area which would certainly benefit from increased tourist traffic. Ironically, the tunnel was opened and closed several years ago as it was this past September for the same reason: the perception of human intrusion into Muslim holy areas. The business owners will forego economic gain in favor of principle. The truth of the tunnel's non-invasive nature is less important than perception. Yet, let's be honest, the riots which led to the deaths of Israelis and Arabs were not the result of this tunnel's opening. That was only the pretext to express the rage existing for many other reasons, rage which may or may not be valid depending on to whom you speak.

By the time you receive this bulletin, Mr. Netanyahu and Mr. Arafat may have reached some agreements to quell the violence and offer a more hopeful future. We can only hope and pray for wisdom.

It is not only the political situation in Israel that concerns me, but the increasing power and visibility of the Orthodox Jewish community. Reform and Conservative Judaism have a presence in Israel, albeit a small one. The liberal Jewish communities continue to fight for religious rights. The courts seem disposed toward religious pluralism, but the acceptance and implementation of religious pluralism areslow or blocked by the Orthodox controlled Religious Authority at every opportunity. Prime Minister Netanyahu and the Orthodox Jewish community are wedded to each other on a political level. This may lead to restrictions on any type of religious pluralism, as well as a reconsideration of the question of "Who is a Jew?". Right now, any person who is Jewish, whether by birth or by choice -- regardless whether the conversion is Reform or Conservative -- may move to Israel (make aliyah) and receive citizenship immediately. The Orthodox Jewish community would like to amend the law to make it fit their legal perspective, cutting out those not converted by Orthodox Rabbis.

I am very concerned about this direction. It is important that we watch the developments carefully. It means watching the allocations of the United Jewish Appeal to Israel so that everyone in Israel benefits equally without supporting communities that seek or call for the death of Reform Jews. It may mean, at some point, encouraging direct support of Reform Judaism in Israel. It certainly means joining ARZA -- Association of Reform Zionists of America. (Contact John McDonald at the Temple office to arrange for this membership.)

Israel is a significant part of my life. I love hearing that people want to go and visit. I love hearing that our youth want to travel there to enhance their Jewish lives. Israel, the State and people, is a part of us. May the coming months find a return to peace, enlightened wisdom by our leaders, and a toleration of a variety of beliefs that are a part of the big picture we call Judaism.







A WORD ABOUT ROSH CHODESH.....

Rosh Chodesh, the celebration of the new moon, is a biblical holiday that greets the return of light to the night heavens. Not only did Rosh Chodesh mark the calendar, but the first sliver of moon from the mountaintops was considered a symbol of renewal and hope. Modern Jews had all but forsaken this ritual, but it being reclaimed in our time, flowing back into the collective Jewish consciousness. Rosh Chodesh has been claimed as a woman's holiday, although not to the exclusion of men, because the commandments granted more leisure to women than to me. Midrash has it that this was a reward to the women who refused to contribute their jewelry to the making of the golden calf.

For the past two decades, women have begun to gather on Rosh Chodesh to celebrate, study, and talk about their relationship to Judaism, to their families, and to all humanity. To date, there are more than 100 such groups, and the numbers are constantly growing. As reform Jewish women we have taken our place in the re-emergence of this age-old rite, to mark the cyclical nature of our lives and to refresh ourselves with hope and commitment.

This year at TAI, our Rosh Chodesh Women's Spirituality Group will meet on Wednesday evenings at 7:30 PM in the Temple library on the following dates: November 13th, January 8th, February 5th, March 5th, April 9th and May 7th.







IN THIS CORNER...

There are several things that I want to share with you in this month's message. The first is the announcement of new staff position at Temple Adath Israel. As a result of a very special yearly gift from Alan Bloomfield and his family, we are creating a new part-time position which for the present time is called, "Program and Activities Coordinator." For a further description of this position as well as the application procedure, please see inside the bulletin. Suffice it to say that the position this gift is funding will make a tremendous difference in the quantity and quality of programs held at this Temple. On behalf of this congregation, let me say thank you to Alan and his family for their generosity.

As you will see in the flyer inside this bulletin, on November 27, at 7 PM, at 2nd Presbyterian Church, Temple Adath Israel will participate in the 4th Annual Interfaith Thanksgiving Eve Service. We ask every family coming to bring canned food items for God's Pantry and during the service a collection will be taken for the HOPE Center.

Though the service is well-attended and successful, the largest number evident among the congregations each year is always from the host congregation. I hope that this year, more of our community, beyond the usual 10-15 people, will decide to come to this spiritual and meaningful service. We all have so much to give thanks for in our lives. Thanksgiving is a time to be thankful with people not only from our own community, but from other faiths as well. Without question, the service does not have a Jewish feel in its style, but the message of the service is certainly Jewish -- Tikkun Olam -- helping to repair God's world. Please mark the date on your calendar and make an effort to attend.

The next item is a continuing source of irritation to me. Over the last couple of years at Hanukah, the leader of the Kentucky Hasidic group known as Chabad (Lubavitch) has come to Lexington and held a public lighting of the menorah at Lexington Mall. What bothers me is not the idea of a community gathering to light the lights of the Hanukah menorah, but that Chabad, which doesn't have a real presence here, comes in from Louisville and does this ceremony in a shopping mall. belong in shopping malls. They belong in our homes, in our front windows for all to see. They belong in our Temple, in the sanctuary on Shabbat to enhance the celebration of Shabbat Hanukah. If we had a JCC, then it would be appropriate to light the menorah in a public place, but certainly not in a shopping mall which only reeks of commercialism. Some of you may disagree with me, but I certainly won't be present if they choose to do it again this year. I will be in my home or a friend's home. I hope that you won't be present either.

On the other hand, let me wish all of you a **Happy Hanukah**. I hope that the celebration of this minor, but important holiday will bring you as much joy as the shining lights of the menorah and an opportunity to remember how our ancestors fought and won their religious freedom.

Finally, I want to announce the dates of my Sabbatical for this winter and what I plan to do with the opportunity this congregation has granted me. I will be on my Sabbatical from Dec. 29 - Jan. 20. Last year, I spent the time studying and reading. This year will be very different. I will spend the time preparing for a class that I will be coteaching at Lexington Theological Seminary, with Dr. Michael Kinnamon titled, "Christian-Jewish Dialogue." The class will begin January 7 and conclude January 24th. The class runs from 8:30 AM - 12 noon, Tuesday-Friday for the three weeks.

Since 1988, I have been an Adjunct Professor at LTS teaching a course titled "Contemporary Judaism." I feel very privileged to have this position on the LTS faculty. In my nine years there, I have taught basic Judaism to over 150 students. Most of these men and women were preparing for lives as ministers. It is a great responsibility and challenge to teach these future spiritual leaders. I hope that the students have benefitted as much from the experience as I have learning from them.

For several years, Dr. Kinnamon, dean at Lexington Theological Seminary, and I have discussed co-teaching a course on Christian-Jewish dialogue. About a year ago, we settled on this January as our first experiment. I am very excited. The first week of my Sabbatical will be spent in preparation for the course and then the teaching itself. In the long run, I hope not to teach the late May/early June period, but to switch to what they call they "J" or January term, teaching Contemporary Judaism one year and the dialogue course the next.

As I did last year, I ask your indulgence during my Sabbatical. Temple members will lead services and fill in for other duties. Last year, as I asked, almost no one called me, allowing me much needed time with my family. I hope that this will be the case this year. If you need something call the office. If you have a problem, contact a Temple officer or board member. Otherwise, I will be teaching, enjoying my family, and nourishing my soul.

A HANUKKAH GLOSSARY

HANUKKAH - A Hebrew word meaning "dedication". When the Jews had sent the Syrians down to final defeat, their first act was to cleanse the Temple in Jerusalem and remove the various pagan symbols and idols from it. They then held a ceremony dedicating the Temple once again to God. The holiday derives its name from the ceremony.

JUDAH MACCABEE - The name comes from the first letters of the Hebrew prayer Mi Kamocha Baelim Adonai ("Who is like Thee, O Lord!") inscribed on the Maccabean battle banner. Another reason that Judah was called the Maccabee is that he struck with the force of a mighty hammer. The Hebrew word for hammer is "makav". Judah became known as "The Hammer" or The Maccabee.

MACCABEES - Hebrew soldiers who fought the Syrians. Named after their leader, Judah the Maccabee.

MENORAH - Hanukkah candle holder. Contains places for 8 candles and a 9th candle, the shamus, is raised above the others. Each of the 8 candles represents one of the 8 days of Hanukkah.

DREIDEL - A four-sided top used on Hanukkah. Each side has a different Hebrew letter: nun, gimmel, hay, and shin. This stands for "Nes gadol ha-ya sham" ("A great miracle happened there").

SHAMUS - Helper candle used to light all the other candles.

LATKES - Potato pancakes. Traditional Hanukkah delicacy.

MATTATHIAS the Hasmonean - Priest who started revolt against the Syrians. Father of Judah Maccabee.

THE STORY OF HANUKKAH

After the death of Alexander the Great (323 B.C.E.) his Empire was divided into two smaller kingdoms - Egypt to the south and Syria to the north.

In the year 175 B.C.E. there arose a new king in Syria - Antiochus IV. He was a harsh ruler and treated all those whom he conquered cruelly.

Antiochus sent officers to the cities of Judea to proclaim, "The king has ordered all his kingdom to become one people and that everyone should forsake his own laws and his own religion." The king commanded the people to break the Sabbath and ignore the holy Jewish festivals. He instructed the Jews to ignore their prayers and religious practices. An idol was placed on the altar of God and incense burned in its honor.

The kings' officer came to the city of Modin and said to Mattathias, a priest who dwelt in Modin, "You are a great man and well-known in the city. Come and fulfill the king's command and you shall be counted among the king's friends." But Mattathias turned to the officer and answered in a loud voice, "Neither I or my sons nor any faithful Hebrews will ever worship an idol."

The Syrian officer called for another volunteer. When, in the sight of all the people, one of the Jews came forward to sacrifice to the idol, Mattathias was filled with anger, and struck him down.

Then Mattathias leaped to the top of the altar and shouted, "All those who are faithful to the Lord, follow me."

One of Mattathias' sons, Judah (called "The Maccabee"), became the commander-in-chief of the Hebrew army and led the people into battle. Never did people fight more bravely against such odds. Because they were dedicated to their religious heritage and to the principles for which it stood, they were filled with the courage and strength to achieve the final victory.

Judah, his brothers and all loyal Jews came to rededicate the Temple in Jerusalem. However, when the people gathered to celebrate the "rededication" the High Priest could find only one small jar of Holy oil with which to light the Ner Tamid (the Eternal Light). This was just enough oil to burn for one day. Then it was that a wondrous thing occurred. For the oil in the lamp burned for eight days!

In remembrance of this great occasion, Hanukkah - the Feast of Dedication - is observed every year for eight days, beginning with the twenty-fifty day of the month of Kislev.

Since the time of the Maccabees the battle

for religious freedom has been fought over and over again throughout the world. After each victory, grateful men, women and children have dedicated themselves to their traditions and kept alive the remembrance of the struggle for religious freedom. As we celebrate the festival of Hanukkah, this year and every year, let us always give thanks for the freedom which our ancestors won so bravely. May we always treasure this precious possession, and ever seek to build a world in which all people may live in freedom and peace.

The candles are placed in the Hanukkah Menorah from right to left and kindled from left to right.

As the Shamus (servant) candle is kindled, we say each day: As one candle may kindle many others and yet lose none of its own light, so Judaism has kindled the light of truth for many religions in many lands and still shines brightly through the eyes.

FIRST NIGHT - FREEDOM

We kindle these Hanukkah lights in memory of the dedication and courage of the Macabees. Believing that they should be free to worship God as their hearts and minds dicated, they willingly gave their lives for freedom. Now, kindling these candles, we rededicate ourselves to work for the equal rights of all people, and for the realization of a society of democracy and freedom.

SECOND NIGHT - FAMILY

Tonight as we celebrate Hanukkah together we are conscious of our precious gift of family. So often we take one another for granted, forgetting to express our love and devotion. Let us, now, as we kindle these festive lights rededicate ourselves to sharing our interests and time with one another. Like the Maccabees of old, let us always face the tribulations and the joys of life united by our family bonds. Kindling these lights, we pray that through kindness and thoughtfulness, our love for one another will increase form strength to strength.

THIRD NIGHT - TORAH

On the third night of Hanukkah, we rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition. As the Maccabees courageously fought to preserve our faith, we, too are duty-bound to sustain our heritage by deepening our understanding of it through study. By increasing our knowledge of Judaism we have become more sensitive to its abiding values, more aware of our responsibility to realize these values in our society. Study opens our minds and fortifies us against tyranny. Learning secures our freedom. Let us, then, as we kindle these candles rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition.

FOURTH NIGHT - HOPE

Our ancestors have taught us that in hope a person's future is illumined and made creative. Ours are times when many people live in fear and great despair. Like the Maccabees, we need to build our lives on hope. Hope that ultimately, truth will triumph over superstition and confidence, that trust and understanding will finally depose superstition and tyranny. Now as we kindle these Hanukkah lights, may our eyes be directed to the loftiest visions of our faith.

FIFTH NIGHT - CHARITY

Our tradition tells us that during the Maccabean war for freedom, all Jews, both children and adults, contributed toward the cause of defeating the oppressor. There are many forms of oppression still existent in our world today. There are people afflicted by sickness, hunger,

ignorance and prejudice. Tonight we, like our ancestors, put aside gifts of Tzedakah in order that we, too, may help to bring an end to oppression. We pray that the humble gifts we offer will provide food for the hungry, medicine for the sick, knowledge for the ignorant, and equal opportunity for those afflicted by prejudice. Now as we kindle our Hanukkah lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the ideal of Tzedakah, righteousness and justice, found in our Jewish tradition.

SIXTH NIGHT - SHALOM

The candles of Hanukkah remind us of our chosen mission as Jews. Like the Maccabees we seek to rededicate ourselves to the service of God. Today one of our foremost tasks is to secure peace in our troubled world. When we end disagreements through mutual understanding, when we seek to mend hurt and wounded feelings, we make peace a living idea. Then let us, as we kindle our Hanukkah candles, rededicate ourselves with renewed strength to the task of securing peace.

SEVENTH NIGHT - BROTHERHOOD & SISTERHOOD

Brotherhood and Sisterhood is founded upon a total respect for the liberty and freedom of all people. The Maccabees of old sought to protect themselves when their rights were violated. Our Hanukkah lights serve as a reminder that peace is secure only when we honor the precious liberty and property of our fellow neighbor. As we kindle these lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the cause of peace which alone can bring dignity to all everywhere.

EIGHTH NIGHT - FAITH

Tonight we kindle all the candles of our Hanukkah Menorah. Throughout the centuries the Menorah has been a symbol of our Jewish faith. Like the Maccabees, when they celebrated this festive holiday, we rededicate ourselves to the living of a more meaningful Jewish life. We pray that throughout this coming year, we may fulfill the ideals of freedom, Tzedakah, family, study, hope, shalom, brotherhood and sisterhood, all of which are symbolized by the candles of our Menorah.




