Iron where I

What a strange religion we have!
Each man who looks at it derives a vastly different picture. There are those who see in Judaism a maze of rituals and customs which they feel duty-bound to memorize and perform. Others view our religion as a treasure chest of knowledge through which they feel compelled to rummage.

All of us struggle with partial truths. We talk and argue about theories, concerning the attributes of God, the creation of the universe, and the cause of rain. We learnedly dispute each other's beliefs, and fail to see that all of our words are peripheral to the essence of Judaism, which has to do with man's relationship to man.

But once in a while a statement is made that cuts to the core of the matter. Rab Hisda believed that knowledge was important, that rituals were important, only if they were accompanied by kindness and humility. Therefore, he once remarked, "Concerning the man who is arrogant, the Holy One, blest be He, says; 'He and I caanot dwell together in this world'."

It seems to me that this summarizes one of the essentials of our religion.

COUNCIL STUDY GROUP





The other day, quite suddenly, some friends of ours converged upon us from Tennessee and Indiana. Our household population changed from two adults and one child to six adults and four children. Of course, the house became bedlam.

The children were deeply conscious of each other's presence, and the manner in which they reacted to this intelligence never failed to sustain our interest. As we watched them play, however, something occurred to me that changed the whole scene from one of entertainment to one of instruction.

There were times when one of them would wrest a toy out of a friend's hand in order to play with it himself. There were other times when he would take his own toy and offer it to his friend. In the first case he acquired a toy, and in the latter case he lost one,

Now, the interesting thing was this: Invariably he appeared happier when he had given than when he had taken away. After the 'selfish' gesture, he would play with the toy listlessly, but after the 'generous' gesture, he appeared to glow with happiness.

I remembered the words of a poet who said, "There are two kinds of gratitude; the sudden kind we feel for what we take, and the larger kind we feel for what we give."

Once again, I had learned a truth from little children.







SHERWOOD EDDY TO SPEAK


The YWCA has requested that the fellowing announcement be brought to the attention of our membership:






THE RABBI

From where I

Feverish, frantic February is fast upon us. For the shortest month in the year, it certainly contains a vast number of holidays. You know them as well as I.....all except one. February is also the month of my homesickness.

Without intending any slur against my whole Kentucky home, my thoughts head straight for New England, the state of Rhode Island, to the city of Newport, and to the narrow winding Touro Street where stands the oldest synagogue in the United States. There is a plaque on the cutside that tells us it was extablished and dedicated in 1763.

In my thoughts I go through the door to a wall on the right side of the entrance, to look again at a framed letter that hangs there.

It is addressed to the 'Hebrew Congregation in Newport', and my eyes search for the phrase in that letter which reads, "It is no more that toleration is spoken of, as if it was by the indulgence of one class of people that another enjoyed the exercise of their natural rights. For happily the Government of the United' States..., gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution so assistance..."It is signed G. Washington.

Our first president was known for many things, but when his birthday rolls around, my thoughts turn eastward and homeward, and to a letter on a wall. It was written by a man who was not seeking the 'Jewish vote'. He was merely laying the foundation of religious liberty as a cornerstone of the new republic.

In Brotherhood Week, I get homesick to look at that letter once more, to read his statement, and to understand the promise that was implicit within it. It is a good promise; God willing we can make it come true.



Everything would be the opposite of today. Brotherhood would be a vibrant part of our lives, and hatred only an official occasion. We would place flowers on the grave of hatred and piously murmur, "May it rest in peace."





Lexington has had the bug! For the past month all sorts of viruses have been roaming up and down our whole Kentucky home. I did not think much about it until I found myself last week holding a thermometer to the light, and reading the verdict --- 103 degrees.

My doctor tells me that this epidemic occurs wherever there has been a mild winter. Apparently, if the winter had been more severe, we would have been more careful in our dress, and the bug would have been left out in the cold.

We were so anxious to have done with winter that at the first sign of warmth we threw off our overcoats and dashed out to hear the music of spring. The song in our hearts became quickly a cold in the nose, and the malady lingers on. It would have been wiser to wear a muffler than to make believe spring is here.

We make the same mistake in all our endeavors. We are so anxious that progress be swift that we are always ready to chase after mirages. We are always willing to believe that we have progressed farther than we have.

If we can learn anything from the sniffles and the fever and the flu, perhaps it is this: In terms of the seasons or in terms of social progress, you can't wish winter away. There is no shortcut to spring.





From where I sit

by Rabbi Maurice Davis

Right now, I'm sitting high. In fact, I am at an altitude of five thousand feet. The day is warm. The sun is out. And I am travelling from Memphis to Nash-ville at three hundred miles an hour

Visibility is unlimited. Beneath us the earth appears peacefully serene. Everywhere there is beauty. Take that body of water, for example. It looks blue and cold and tantalizingly inviting.

There is something strange about it, however. There is a road that leads right up to it and disappears into it. I call the stewardess. She informs me that I am looking at the results of a tornado. The water that appears so inviting has brought death and destruction to a whole village......

I am looking at desolation. I am looking at heartache and pain. I am looking a tragedy, but all I can see is beauty.....

It is the same with all of life. If we could remove ourselves from our neighbors, we would not be aware of their troubles. If we could remove ourselves from all people, we would be ignorant of all their tragedies. Of course, being ignorant of them, we would be unable to help them.

There are two ways to see beauty in this world. One is to divorce one's self from life; to become a spectator at a distance, because distance creates the mirage of beauty. The other way is to become a part of people's lives; to see the pain and work to alleviate it.....

The first way is like flying in an airplane five thousand feet above life. Suddenly I am terribly tired of this airplane. I want to get back on the ground and be with my people. I want to create beauty. I cannot be satisfied with mirages.

I'll be back in Lexington by nightfall, and that is good. I'don't like flying high.....



Did you ever talk to members of the D. A. R.?.... Or those whose ancestors arrived on the Mayflower? All that they talk about is their genealogy. It is a great temptation to fling back some retort which says that our ancestors are older or nobler than theirs.....

We thrill to the remark that Disraeli once made in which he stated that his Jewish forbears were the first of civilized peoples. We become a sort of Jewish D.A.R. in all matters of genealogical glorification.....

I suppose that the whole trouble stems from the word, "descendant". It means offspring. It also means to come down from a higher to a lower place. If we are lower than our ancestors then we are determined that they should be quite high in the ladder of civilization....

Therefore, when Darwin talked about a common ancestor with the ape, the world was terribly agitated. No one wants to descend from an ape. Of course, Darwin meant that we had ascended from the ape, and that is quite a different story.

All of this comes to mind as I think of Passover. We set our table in its finest linen. We bedeck ourselves in our most attractive clothes. On the 14th of Nisan we sit down to a banquet, and what do we say?..........

We say that our ancestors were not noble rulers of the earth. We say that they were not the aristocrats of their day. We say simply that they were slaves. We tell of our humble beginnings. We speak of our lowly origins. We say that we have ascended from slavery.....

We glory not alone in whence we came, but also in whither we are going. That is the meaning of religion. That is the meaning of progress. That is the meaning of Passover......

I think it is very important,

don't you?

According to Agatha Weil - "I come to Services and I ought to know - Services are fun and you can learn good lessons by the stories the rabbi tells. I have. "



Soliloquy

After the Institute's Over

They asked me to tell them how old was our Passover... but how could I tell them... or make them understand? So, I said it dated back to Israel's desert wanderings... I said it was an ancient feast our nowad forbears kept.....

But in my heart there was another answer.... an answer unhistorical, but poignantly correct.....

"Passover," I should have said,
"is just as old as springtime"..."Passover," I should have said, "never really
began"

For every year, the world itself is born again in springtime... the wint'ry months of labor result in grass that is green, in skies that are blue.... and in hopes that blossom like the earth's first flowers.....

No man is a pessimist in April...
..for the pleasant days all lie ahead. I wonder if it was always so..... In the dark days of trouble when our people were victims of the hatred and fear which was an old world's sickness, did they at Passover dream dreams of freedom, see visions of better days to come?.... I rather think they did....

There are many ways to tell our neighbors of the holiday of Passover. We can say that it commemorates Israel's independence... or how an ancient people shattered Pharoah's chains... or we might say it was the way they heralded the equinox, the vernal equinox that ushers in the spring....

There are many ways to tell them, but somewhere deep within me, I have an urge to tell them exactly how I feel. Passover is spring fever which conjures up not lassitude but hopefulness, not laziness but love. Passover is spring fever, and it is just as old as spring time.....

We open wide our doors and hearts and search for brighter futures. Passover will live as long as there are people.... as long as there are people who hope.... and dream.... and pray.....



WHAT IS SIX YEARS?



SHOULD WE STAND PAT ?

Have you looked into the Senate Bill #2550 sponsored by Senator Pat McCarran?...It has to do with immigration, but it has also to do with democracy.....

Here are some of the things that would happen to immigration—and—democracy if that bill becomes law....

If a person is "attributable by as much as one half his ancestry" to Asiatic races, he receives an inferior status, and he is excluded from the quotas of the country in which he is a citizen....

If a Nazi or Communist court convicted a person of some crime, even if that crime is in violation of anti-religious legislation, the 'criminal' is barred from entry into this country.....

If a new-comer to this country goes to a mental institution, even if his family pays for such care, that person must be deported.....

A person may be deported for alleged acts fifty years past, concerning which there are no witnesses or documents.....

There is a great deal more to the bill....but it is no better... It seems to me that you cannot defend democracy by destroying it at home...

Our country has survived other threats in the past, and it will survive this threat, also.... if you will do something about it.

Something like writing to Senators Tom Underwood and Earl Clements (Senate Office Building, Washington), and telling them quite simply that you don't like S. 2550.....

Incidentally, if you write these men, drop a postcard also to Sen. Ernest McFarland, and tell him what you have done... He'll appreciate it.... and so will democracy......







The belief that no man is alone is shown in the new curriculum which was devised for this year. The purpose is to show the youngsters that they are a part of something great and beautiful.



THE STUDENTS SPEAK

"God, in my opinion, is not a man but a Spirit that exists in your mind. He is Someone you can talk over your problems with, something like a big brother, except that.... He is higher than any other person or thing.

"The previous statements are my feelings at the present moment... This feeling may change after further discussion." "God, to me, means Something that is above us. He is Someone who makes us have a conscience... He is an ideal, and Someone whom we pray to and have lots of confidence in."

".......... God is everything to me that is beautiful. God, to me, means a great Something, who gives us something to live for. Without Him, there wouldn't be much.

"..... It scares me to think that there might be no such thing as God. I think about it a lot... but I always come back to the same thought, there must be a God."

"I believe that God has power over all the forces of nature and over us. I believe that He put us on the earth with a mission, something to accomplish, be it to guide a country or to raise a child.

"He gave us certain qualities with which to accomplish this job."

"God, to me, is near, but you can't quite touch Him....."

The Third Grade with Janet Lee Cohen reporting announces that they had a very enjoyable class, the main feature of which was making pictures of what they liked most about Chanukah.


Grade Six, Paul Levy reporting.



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR (Perhaps you recall a few issues back I wrote a column entitled JANGLE BELLS? In that column I voiced my protest against the general practice of stores being open on Friday evening. Below are some of the responses to that column.) The first response was a phone call from Jim Strauss. The gist of that conversation was this: The Friday night rule was adopted mainly due to the insistence of the very large number of chain stores in Lexington. The local merchants were not at all anxious to keep open on Friday night. After Jim's call, I received the following letters: Dear "Bewildered", Your point about the stores being open on Friday nights is well taken. Much of the business we are doing at night is undoubtedly normal daytime business which is being diverted to evening hours --- a national trend, incidentally, which Lexington has fallen in step with. The reason for Friday being selected as one of the two nights of the week to stay open was this: Friday is "pay day" in many industries, and it was felt that more customers would have more money available to spend on Friday than on any other day. However, I agree with you that it ill becomes the Jewish owned stores to pre-empt the Sabbath, and next year when the Merchants Association gets together to decide this momentous question for 1953, I shall plug for Thursday nights instead of Friday.

Dear Rabbi Davis:

I was reading your usually very good column, "From Where I Sit" just a few minutes ago, and let me tell you something, Rabbi, from where I sit you're asking for trouble. It's men like you in the cloth who don't appreciate what men like me have to do to make a living to pay men like you. Sure, we keep our stores open on the Friday nights before Christmas. Doesn't everybody else? You know, Rabbi, we don't make the laws. We just follow them. When the Retail Merchant's Association says stay open, we stay open. If it's Friday night, it's Friday night; they say it, we do it. What do you want, Rabbi, that we should be different? As far as we're concerned, whatever the Association says, goes. If they should want that we stay open on Sunday all day, we'd Say, Rabbi, you know what? They'd never ask us to do that. Not on THEIR sabbath. Why, I'll bet that they never think about Friday night being so important to us. Why should they think about it; we've never told them. You know what I'm going to do. Just as soon as things settle down again here, I'm going to get up right on the floor of the Association meeting and I'm going to say, "Gentlemen and Fellow Retailers, (and, Rabbi, I'm going to practice this little talk until I know it by heart) would you please consider for the future that we Jews in this Association cannot attend our Sabbath services on Friday evenings so long as our stores have to be opened. And furthermore, Gentlemen, has it occurred to you as it has to me that our employees would be better able to take care of the Saturday trade if they could get off regular time on Friday and not be so tired from two long days that they fall off their feet? (Nice suggestion, Rabbil) Gentlemen, I propose to you that we keep open only on Thursday nights from now on if we have to keep open at all." That's what I'll tell them, Rabbi; and they'll listen. And just between the two of us, I called you a man of the cloth before. From where I sit now, it looks like a pretty good quality cloth, believe me.
