The celebration of Consecration and Simchat Torah at Temple Adath Israel is always a special night. For those who may not be familiar with Conse-

cration, the ceremony is a uniquely Reform Jewish custom of celebrating the formal beginning of a child's Jewish education. At Temple Adath Israel, we celebrate this ceremony with our kindergarten class on Simchat Torah eve. The members of the class dress in special robes, stand before the congregation to recite the Sh'ma, and are presented with a variety of gifts to celebrate this special night.

Simchat Torah is the traditional celebration of the completion of the yearly cycle of reading the Torah and the beginning of the next year's cycle. The holiday comes at the end of the festival of Sukkot. The Torah scrolls are taken from the ark and, with much singing and rejoicing, paraded around the sanctuary. Adults take turns carrying the Torah scrolls. The idea of completing and starting the Torah reading cycles on the same night fits with many Jewish

concepts of continuity.

Last year, we began what I hope to be a tradition at the Consecration/Simchat Torah service. I took one of the Torah scrolls and together, and with the help of those present, unrolled it around the outside of the sanctuary. Kindergarten parents, friends and community held it. I gathered the Consecration class together in the middle of sanctuary and showed them the inside of the Torah. I told them that from Torah comes our wisdom and knowledge about living a good life and a Jewish life. I told them that we, the adults, must always hold up the Torah for the next generation of Jews and teach them what it means.

The confluence of Simchat Torah and Consecration is the icing on the cake. Not only do we rejoice with the Torah scroll, but also we rejoice in the continuity of Jewish life. These kindergarten children are our future. We must think of holding them and embracing them with the same reverence with which we hold a Torah scroll. We must work together as a community to teach these children the meaning of Torah as it has been taught and expounded for 3,000 years. They must see our enthusiasm for learning about Judaism so that they will learn about all aspects of Jewish life with vivacity and embrace them with joy.

How wonderful it would be for these children to see a full sanctuary of adults excited about Simchat Torah and about celebrating the beginning of this journey of Jewish

learning. How wonderful it is for adults to see the next generation of Jews eager to learn. Please join us on Friday night. October 1, in this celebration.







Reform Movement Biennial Convention is December 15-19 in Orlando, FL

Wouldn't you like to be part of the largest gathering of Reform Jews this century? You can be one of the 5,000 people who will gather in Orlando, FL, Wednesday through Sunday, December 15-19 for the Reform Movement's Biennial convention.

The Union of American Hebrew Congregation's five-day convention includes the announcement of major initiatives for the 21st century by President Rabbi Eric H. Yoffie, more than 160 workshops on all aspects of synagogue life, major addresses by political, religious and international leaders, the opportunity to worship in a wide variety of styles, late-night songfests, and study with leading scholars.

Delegates to the 65th General Assembly will be making decisions that affect the lives of Reform Jews throughout North America. In past years the General Assembly has voted on policies determining the role of the non-Jew in synagogue life, and has taken stands on issues such as economic and welfare reform and the separation of church and state.

And, not to be overlooked, the Biennial features the works of artists and crafts people in the largest collection of Judaica ever assembled in North America.

As might be expected, the Biennial program focuses on Reform Judaism in the 21st Century. Four keynote sessions, designed to spur debate on major issues facing Jews in the coming century, will focus on Raising Ethical Children, A Vision for Synagogue Transformation, Lessons from Twenty Years of Outreach, and Baby Boomers, Older Adults, and Our Congregations.

In addition, for the first time, Biennial participants will be able to focus on a particular area of concern over the course of the convention by following tracks devoted to issues such as the CCAR's Statement of Principals, conversion and outreach issues, adult learning, building a synagogue leadership team, social action and social justice, and formal and informal education.

Concurrent with the UAHC's Biennial, the Women of Reform Judaism will hold its 42nd Assembly and the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods will hold its convention, celebrating the 75th anniversary of the founding of NFTB.

Many of the questions involve interfaith issues, such as "What are the major differences between Jews and Christians?" and "In the interfaith marriage, can there be a ketubah?"

THE BLOOD OF ABRAHAM: INSIGHTS INTO THE MIDDLE EAST PROBLEM

By Jimmy Carter Reviewed by David M. Glixon

As Jimmy Carter reminds us in this insightful book, "The most unremitting conflicts of the Middle East are not on the battlefields but in the minds of the people who live there." The former president's interest in the Promised Land — together with America's role in the Middle East — accelerated during his term of office, climaxing with the momentous 1978 Camp David Accords that he initiated.

Though published nearly fifteen years ago, *The Blood of Abraham* remains a prescient overview of the political, religious, and ethnic conflicts that have fragmented that tumultuous area. It provides a highly readable analysis, in both historic and ongoing contexts, of each country's perspective and involvement.

Particularly helpful is the succinct chronology of over a hundred relevant events. Beginning with prehistoric times and the early struggle between Egypt and her neighbors, Carter goes on to cite Abraham's journeys from Ur to Canaan around 1900 BCE, the exodus from Egypt some seven centuries later, and the anointment of Saul as king of the Israelites. The chronology continues up to our own time, with such crucial developments as the Balfour Declaration of 1917, which promised a Jewish national home in Palestine, its termination in the 1948 proclamation of the State of Israel, the establishment of the PLO with the goal of destroying Israel, and on to the initial withdrawal of Israel's forces from southern Lebanon in 1985.

The Blood of Abraham delves extensively into the centuries-long background and motivation of Israel-Arab hostility. One section deals with the rise of Yasir Arafat. Founder of the al-Fatah guerilla group, then chosen by the PLO to be its leader, he successfully solicited world-wide recognition of the Palestine cause, and raised funds for the support of Arabs who had left Israel either voluntarily or as refugees. But, as Carter records, the next exodus of Palestinians was not from Israel but from Jordan, after the clash between Palestinian militants and the Jordanian regular forces. Rejected by Syria and Egypt, many Palestinians wound up in Lebanon. The book provides a masterly analysis of the ensuing developments and of the PLO's efforts to improve its status.

Supplementing such details of recent trends and events are several absorbing chapters on the respective histories of Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, Egypt, and Saudi Arabia. Carter even notes such minor though fascinating points as the origin of the name of Palestine — derived from the Philistines who inhabited the seacoast of what is now Israel and the Gaza Strip, and who competed with our ancestors for control over Canaan.

Carter vouchsafes the unfortunate truth that "there is no magic answer to the Middle East puzzle." And though *The Blood of Abraham* ends in 1985, this account — besides being a pleasure to read — enables us to follow current developments with a greater awareness and understanding of all that has gone before.

As Jimmy Carter concludes, "The blood of Abraham, God's father of the chosen, still flows in the veins of Arab, Jew, and Christian, and too much of it has been spilled in grasping for the inheritance of the revered patriarch. It still cries out to God — an anguished cry for peace."





November is the in-between month. It is the month in between our holy day celebrations and (usually) the arrival of the celebration of

We feel different-and Jewishbecause of the celebrations around us.

In November, there aren't any Jewish clues in the air or lights or foods that cry out to us that we are Jews and we should remember this. Therefore, it is up to you and me to find a way to make November a Jewish experience. You could come to a Shabbat Service. Even better, come to a Shabbat morning service. That would be different and encourage that feeling of being special. You could attend an Adult Jewish Growth program of which there are any number going on. You could read a Jewish book. You could participate in a Social Action project that lends itself to the meaning of *Tikkun Olam*. You could stay at home one Friday evening and celebrate Shabbat with a special dinner, blessings, study, and family.

What we shouldn't do in November is forget who we are because the Jewish calendar has overlooked us this month. In many ways, it hasn't overlooked us, but given us great opportunities for celebration of our Jewish souls. Let us not miss the opportunity.

News About Our Religious School Curriculum

Many of you are aware that Religious School has implemented a new curriculum. However I wanted to provide you with information concerning our A.R.E. (Alternative to Religious Education) program, which covers all classes from our four-year-old class through Confirmation. I also wanted to give you more details about Sha'at Tarbut, our new enrichment program that comprises the second hour of Religious School for grades kindergarten through 5th grade.

A.R.E. Curriculum

The A.R.E. curriculum was originally developed for Temple Sinai in Denver, CO and won an award from the National Association of Temple Educators. The A.R.E. curriculum designates objectives, subject matter, suggested hands-on manipulative activities, student texts, teacher references, and evaluation ideas for each grade level. The curriculum is defined by six core areas: Holidays, Symbols, Prayer and God, Jewish Values, Hebrew, Jewish Customs and Practices, and Bible and History. This is a stepping stone process from year to year. The material will be challenging and prove to be intriguing as well. The education that our Religious School children will receive will benefit them for years to come

Sha'at Tarbut

Religious School begins for all classes at 9:45 AM in the Sanctuary, with a short worship service conducted by Rabbi Adland. Students then proceed to their respective rooms for class from 10 - 11 AM. From 11 AM to 12 PM, Kindergarten through fifth grades participate in Sha'at Tarbut - enrichment classes - one topic each from 11-11:30 AM and from 11:30 AM to 12 noon. The Sha'at Tarbut schedule for each class varies from week to week or month to month, but includes: Arts and Crafts, (Linda Noffsinger, teacher); Bible Characters, (Janet Tamaren & Jeff Davidson, teachers); Rabbinic Studies, (Alison Courant, teacher); Cooking, (Anita Mersack, teacher); Drama, (Sheryl Rade, teacher); Hebrew, (Rhoda Cantor and Starr Gantz, teachers); Hebrew Crafts, (LisaMarie Price and Bonnie O'Neill, teachers); Israeli Dance, (Stephanie Barrett and Elise Mandel, teachers); Newspaper, (Jane Grise, teacher); and Music (Sandy Adland, teacher). Debbie Masters, our four-yearold class teacher and Kaye and Al Kaplan, our sixthgrade teachers, will also have various enrichment classes provided throughout the morning.



On March 8 & 15, Purim will be studied. Please mark your calendars.





FEAR NO EVIL

Early in the morning of his 30th birthday, two strangers barged into the Prague apartment of Joseph K., a bank accountant, and informed him that, by order of someone in high authority, he was under arrest, charges unspecified.

One evening, Natan S., a 29-year-old computer specialist, was seized by two strangers in the elevator of a friend's Moscow apartment house and driven to the KGB prison.

In Kafka's *The Trial*, Joseph K. had no idea why he was being arrested. But Natan Sharansky had for some time been aware of being tailed, and knew that he was suspected of being an American spy and Zionist dissident.

K.'s subsequent fate was execution; Sharansky's could have been the same. Instead, he was to undergo 16 months' detention and nine years' imprisonment, mostly in solitary confinement. And he would eventually become Interior Minister of Israel and the author of *Fear No Evil*.

Another difference is that Joseph K.'s account, though equally bizarre, lacks humor, whereas Sharansky's, despite his own horrendous experience, abounds in wit and humor.

Accused of hostile activity against the Soviet Union, he had replied to the interrogation officer: "My work as an activist in the Jewish emigration movement and as a member of the Helsinki Watch Group was directed exclusively at informing international public opinion and the appropriate Soviet organizations about crude violations, by the Soviet authorities, of the rights of citizens striving to emigrate—" The investigator interrupted him. "You are threatened with capital punishment," he cackled: "death by gunfire... and now neither Israel nor America will help you."

From the time of his arrival at Lefortovo, the KGB interrogation prison, Sharansky was subjected to thorough searches of his cell, his clothes, and his person, as well as confiscation of his most intimate belongings, including the photo of Natan and Avital taken in 1974, a few weeks before their wedding.

Sharansky's memoir provides vivid descriptions of life in a prison cell: the physical and psychological discomforts and the humiliation. He found relief in playing solitary games of chess. Using the rules of the game, he worked out the optimum method of "non-cooperation" with the authorities' countless probings into his thoughts, motives, and actions. He tried in vain to convince the interrogators that all his efforts had been centered on stopping the harassment of the refuseniks (Soviet Jews who were denied exit visas).

On July 15, 1978, after 16 months at Lefortovo, Natan Sharansky underwent the dreaded actual trial for treason. It's all set forth graphically and dramatically in *Fear No Evil* — the ominous

atmosphere, the repeated brutal questioning, the prisoner's daring and carefully thought-out responses — together with the inevitable verdict and the sentence of 13 years' incarceration in the Gulag. The final ten years of his sentence turned out to be at the Perm prison camp in the remote Ural mountains.

Though conditions there were better than in the Moscow prisons, it took all of Sharansky's bravery, humor, and indomitable spirit to make survival possible. He suffered several years of ill health, cruel restrictions, and periodic confinement in the camp's punishment cells — plus his voluntary hunger strikes — but the long ordeal ended at last on January 22, 1987, with expulsion from the USSR, reunion with Avital, and the couple's arrival in Israel. For Fear No Evil is also a love story.

Progressive Congregation Given Synagogue Building Despite Ukraine Chief Rabbi's Protest

Local authorities in Yivpratoria recently handed over a pre-Soviet-era synagogue to the city's Progressive congregations in the Ukraine. Ukraine Chief Rabbi Ya'acob Bleich had sought to prevent the building's transfer by calling Progressive Judaism an "undemanding religion" whose members worship in "luxurious temples," in a letter to Crimean officials.

ARZA/WORLD UNION, North America
Executive Director Rabbi Ammiel Hirsch asked the
leaders of the Jewish Agency, the Joint Distribution
Committee, the National Conference on Soviet Jewry,
and the United Jewish Communities to "convey to Rabbi
Bleich our movement's deep pain and disappointment."

"We find it particularly offensive, and contrary to the Jewish spirit," Hirsch wrote, "that a Jew – let alone someone who presumes to represent the wider Jewish community – would speak so ill of fellow Jews to a foreign government."

The synagogue building had been used as a warehouse during Communist rule. A 1992 Ukrainian law provides for the restitution of religious community property that had been seized by the Soviets.


