
I have been concerned lately, though, that too much happens as a matter of convenience, and I think it is time to change the conversation a little. Supporting our congregation is not and cannot be a matter of convenience. We should not rely on the gimmicks to help cajole people into doing so. So, here goes something radical.

Temple Adath Israel is doing really well. Over the last eleven years we have grown in numbers and in finances. Our sky is not falling. Rather, we are flourishing. Our programs are growing beyond our congregation's physical capacity, and the wider community regularly demonstrates the many ways in which it believes us to be relevant and meaningful well beyond the walls of our Temple home. People need cajoling and impassioned pleas to give when ships need salvaging; when an organization is unsure of its direction or mission. We do not need the coincidence of Hanukkah to seek your giving and your support. We need you to see the amazing things we are doing to touch the lives of our membership and our wider community.

I want to ask for an end of the year gift because you are a member of a great organization; an organization that does the things that our faith and tradition demands that we do in order to help heal the world. I want to ask you for an end of the year extra gift so that we can expand what we do to take even better care of our membership and our community. This is not a gift of salvation or emergency debt reduction, I am asking for a vote of confidence demonstrating that what we do matters. We are not looking to save the congregation. We are looking to grow our mission and our vision so that we can continue to lead, as we move into the future. Thank you for your love and your warmth.

Most recently he taught at the first rabbinical seminary in Germany since the Holocaust, the Abraham Geiger College in Berlin as the Jacobs Fellow. In past years he worked with the Jewish community in Australia, New Zealand, Brazil and Argentina. He is the founding rabbi of the liberal congregation in Hong Kong. Rabbi Joseph consults with rabbis, educators, administrators, communal leaders and lay leaders, supporting them as they lead their institutions and organizations. He is the author of four books and more than fifty articles in the area of education and leadership.

NOVEMBER BOARD BRIEFS - November 5, 2013

The Board met November 5, 2013. Twenty-two board members and staff were in attendance.

—Judy Engelberg was disappointed by the lack of board membership participation in the Adult Jewish Growth committee's scholar's weekend with Rabbi Joan Friedman. Rabbi Marc said that, with the first day of Hanukkah falling on Thanksgiving, we should all do something radical and say "Amen" together.

—John McDonald provided a short summary of the conclusions of the air quality report provided by Air Source Technology and said we would be engaging the services of Tri-State Roofing to address water leakage.

—Betty Nigoff gave a report on the first six months of the Temple's, Religious School's, and Pre-school's operational budgets.
—Judy circulated a sign-up sheet for Tot Shabbat, and Deborah Nelson circulated a sign-up sheet for the *oneg* on November 15 in celebration of Corey and Adam Buckman's marriage.

—Starr Gantz led the board in a series of leadership development exercises

—Rabbi Marc spoke briefly on the status of his contract negotiation. He also reminded the Board of the upcoming Moosnick lectures, November 13 and 14.

—The board voted to approve a rabbi's discretionary fund policy.

—Michael Marx has sent out for quotes from several health insurance companies to get group rates. He will ask staff to inquire about individual rates the Kentucky's health exchange, Kynect, for comparison.

—Rebecca Young reported on the recent sisterhood fundraiser at Portofino's, which was a successful social occasion but did not attain its monetary goals. The sisterhood will have to think further about its fund-raising for the religious school.

—Starr announced that there would be a call for participation in the nominating committee for the executive committee, which will begin meeting in January.

—Joe Grobstein said that he was responsible, as 1st vice president, for forming a committee to nominate congregants in good standing for board membership. He will need three board members and three congregants at-large.

—The board approved the consent agenda, adjourned, and went into executive session to discuss the Rabbi's contract.

UPDATE ON WAYS TO SUPPORT THE TEMPLE WHILE JUST DOING WHAT YOU NORMALLY DO: NOTE INCREASING FIGURES

1) Buy groceries at Kroger's with Kroger Gift Cards. We have received \$5,032.38 from Kroger scrip since May 1, 2013

Here's how it works: Get your Kroger Gift Card at the Temple from John McDonald. Cards can be charged with up to \$500 at any Kroger Customer Service counter or cash register using cash, check, or credit card. TAI receives 4% immediately. After that, buy your groceries, prescriptions, and gas, and then reload it as needed. (Hint: If you reload your Kroger scrip card with your airline points charge card, you get the benefit of accruing your airline points, as well. Such saychel!)

2) Shop at $\underline{\text{Amazon.com}}.$ We've received \$563.48 since May 1, 2013.

Here's how it works: First, go to the TAI Website (www.lextai.org). In two places on any page on the website (top and bottom) you'll find an Amazon icon. Click on the icon and this will take you to Amazon.com. When you shop and buy from Amazon USING THE TEMPLE LINK, TAI receives 4% percent of your total purchase amount.

3) Recycle and the Temple earns cash. We receive \$20 credit to spend at Quill each month from cartridges recycled.

We continue to collect old inkjet and laser cartridges. There is a drop-off box in the Temple office. The Temple will receive \$20 a month in Quill credit for each 10 cartridges that we recycle on a monthly basis. There is no cost to the Temple and it helps the environment. All cartridges are accepted. Thanks to all who continue to donate. Keep them coming and help TAI continue to profit. Quill credits are used for office and religious school supplies

The recently published Pew Study on the present state of Judaism in the United States has engendered a spate of articles, editorials and comments in many Jewish publications. Rick Jacobs, the president of the URJ, calls the study "a snapshot of our community."

If you have not yet read this report, you can find it at pewforum.org. The report shows a high rate of intermarriage and non-affiliation with any religious organization. It reveals that the Reform Movement has huge challenges ahead. One piece of good news is that we have grown in numbers over the past quarter century. Some other good news-summer camps and youth groups help to make Jewish children into connected Jewish adults. The report also shows that 96% of Reform Jews say that they are proud to be Jewish.

SIM SHALOM NEWS Volumne 2 #5

Nathan Alfred is the British born Rabbi of the International Jewish Center Reform Congregation in Brussels. It's a community of English-speaking American, British and other expats. Nathan and Sim Shalom have had a close connection for over 10 years, ever since he spent a year in Budapest between graduating from university and starting his Rabbinical studies at the Leo Baeck College, where Rabbi Kelemen also studied. Nathan was spending the year here studying and practicing to become a chess Master with some of the Hungarian chess experts. He also was an enthusiastic and energetic member of our congregation. He was very important in the formation of our first Youth Group, and also in founding an international Jewish young people's association called EuroJews, which had it's first meeting at Purim that year in Budapest.

In mid-October, Rabbi Kelemen and I were taking a much needed vacation after the High Holidays in Brussels and we attended the Friday night services of Nathan's congregation. They were most welcoming, and very interested to hear about Sim Shalom. Then last Friday, Nov. 1, Nathan returned the visit, bringing half a dozen kids from the Brussels' youth group to Budapest and to our services. Members of our present youth group were there to welcome and entertain them. After the service, we feasted on pizza and Hungarian palachinta, which are a kind of filled crepe, and sang songs till 11 PM. Young people have so much energy, and made it a great evening! A photo is attached, and the big guy on the far right is Rabbi Alfred.

Things are heating up again on the political front. One of the provisions of the law which revoked our official registration as a congregation by the Hungarian government almost two years ago was that we could reapply for our registration during the month of Sept., 2013. We finished that application by the deadline, and have started to wait for the decision. We were recently told that the papers were going through the bureaucratic mill, and would be presented to the Parliament in early December, where they must be approved by a two-thirds majority for us to again become registered. We're not sure whether to be hopeful or not. Two years ago, we were assured that our registration would not be revoked, but at the last minute it actually was.

As we wait, we're doing all we can to lobby for approval. Richard Berend, one of our senior members, has spoken personally with a Parliamentary leader he knows and was assured of his support. Andras Heisler, the new President of the Hungarian Association of Neolog Jewish Congregations (which in the past had not supported us in any way) has promised to do all he can to regain recognition for us and Bet Orim, the other Reform Congregation in Hungary. And in the recent Lantos Conference on "Anti-semitism and Jewish Life in Europe" held in Budapest, a government minister hinted that soon our registration would be restored. We've got our fingers crossed!!

AIR QUALITY REPORT by John W. McDonald, Administrator

In late 2012 the Temple utilized the services of Air Source Technology, Inc. (ASTI), a local environmental, health and safety consultant to conduct an indoor air quality investigation. Based upon their findings that low to moderate levels of airborne mold and low levels of volatile organic compounds were present, a major project was undertaken to resolve these issues. Steps taken included replacement or cleaning of all (HVAC) pipe insulation, largely above the drop ceilings, cleaning of all fan coil units and vents, and the installation of a number of "egg crate" ceiling tiles to help reduce humidity above the drop ceiling tiles and reduce the potential for condensation as well as several other site specific repairs intended to eliminate outside water intrusion. At the conclusion of the project it seemed that the problem had been resolved and we continued to monitor for signs of additional problems.

Several weeks ago we began hearing anecdotal reports of individuals who were again experiencing symptoms associated with airborne irritants. We again engaged the services of ASTI, initially for a walk through and later some additional testing including ventilation parameters, airborne mold samples, composite dust sample analysis and measurements of airborne particulates. In summary, the results of the most recent tests were "...the air quality at Temple Adath Israel was found to be within normal ranges and recommended guidelines for most parameters. Ventilation parameters indicate adequate ventilation and comfort control in the building Generally, moderate airborne levels of fungal spores were identified indoors. Penicillium/Aspergillus spores are disproportionally elevated in the Sanctuary and indicate significant indoor amplification in that area. Moisture issues identified from roof leaks are the likely source of hidden growth. HVAC filtration efficiency measurements indicate the air handling systems are removing particles and operating efficiently.

We are currently engaged with our roofing contractor to develop a plan of action to eliminate the roof leaks in the Sanctuary (most significantly in the balcony area) on some long term basis, as opposed to the patch as needed process we have used in the past. Additionally, at the recommendation of ASTI, we have placed filtered box fans in the Sanctuary (2) and Library (1) for when those rooms are not in use to minimize airborne mold spores.

The air quality concerns present a challenging task. Different individuals have varying sensitivities to varying irritants. We will certainly do our best to stay on top of this situation now and in the future. Clearly it is our goal to maintain the Temple so that it is both safe and comfortable.

TAI on Rye is a Temple fundraiser staffed entirely by volunteers. Our immediate goal is to raise money for a new commercial stove for the Temple kitchen. So, you see, your patronage benefits you (great food) and the Temple.

Whether you're a new or returning diner, we look forward to seeing you on March 2nd.

Economics 101

Many Temple members may not be aware that most Temple Endowment Funds are restricted to the particular purpose for which they were endowed. Only the interest accrued by each fund can be used.

Here is a hypothetical example: A donor gives \$50 to the Goldberg Variations Fund which is set up to perform this piece of music. This Fund has an accumulated interest of \$3,000. Only this interest is available for the performance. The rest of the fund stays invested and keeps on growing . So, only the interest of the \$50 donation given by our hypothetical donor is usable for the performance.

Thus, paradoxically, though the Temple has a large endowment, most of these funds cannot be drawn on for the Temple's operation when economic conditions cause interest rates to drop. The Enrichment Fund, one of the endowed funds, does provide a supplement to the Temple General Fund each year. Currently. it is \$30,000. The Major Maintenance portion of this fund also pays for additional repairs over and above what is budgeted each year.

The Temple General Fund is not an invested fund. The monies in this Fund are used for the daily operations of the Temple and come primarily from membership contributions. This fund keeps the lights on, keeps the heat on, pays for staff salaries, supplies, etc. Without the General Fund and the supplements from the Enrichment Fund, the Temple would be hard put to stay open.

Please consider this, when next you give a Temple donation.



SIM SHALOM NEWS Volume 2 #6

Soon after the last newsletter, we had a visit by a delegation of about 40 members of Central Synagogue of NYC. Sim Shalom and Bet Orim put on a joint service for them in the Jewish Community Center of Budapest, featuring the best musicians of the two congregations. Central Synagogue is one of the largest and oldest Reform congregations in NYC, with an extremely active and liberal congregation. It was a real privilege to have them as our guests, and to show them that Reform is alive and growing in Hungary.

Hanukah came early this year, and was celebrated at a number of venues. The above mentioned JCC held the first one for the whole Budapest Community. There was a competition for the best video about the holiday. Sim Shalom's contribution was about a street musician (our cantor Miki Budai) playing guitar down in the Subway station. His tune was Maoz Tzur, and slowly a crowd gathered, and joined in singing this traditional holiday

song. I'd like to say we won the prize, and we probably would have, but the projection system failed during the showings, so none could be awarded. But our own celebration in the Raday Street synagogue was it's usual big success, everyone bringing their menorah to light, and a big party following after until 11 PM.

Have you ever heard of Limmud? If not, look it up and if you have, try to go to the next one near you. It's a movement that started over 30 years ago in England for people to get together to celebrate and learn about their Judaism. In England it takes place over the Christmas break; this year Dec. 22-26, with 2600 attendees, 1102 sessions, 30,000 meals, etc. Limmud takes over the whole University of Warwick for those days, and anyone who wants to present a session on anything connected to Judaism and Jewishness can do so. Some are professional educators, many are amateurs. The topics range from history to Talmud study to archaeology to demographics to cooking and music and movies to the politics of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Kati had been before, but not for years, and this was my first time ever. It was one of the best experiences of my life! I tried a little bit of everything, and found it all of high quality, and very stimulating. And the other attendees are just as interesting as the presenters, often being leaders in their communities. For me it was like being back in college, with a dorm room and place to eat all provided, and nothing to do but learn all day and party a bit at night. Over the years the Limmud movement has become international, with such conferences (usually smaller) taking place in over 30 countries. I know that they occur in Boston, NYC, Chicago, New Orleans, Houston and Atlanta. We've had 4-5 in Budapest for a weekend, and they were good, but not as good as the one in England, due to it's much greater variety. I can't wait to go next year.

We're still waiting (patiently?) for some word from the Hungarian Government about whether they are going to restore our "church" registration and access to the lost financial support that went with it. As I said last time, don't hold your breath, if only because this is an election year, and already all the energy and attention is turning to the elections coming in April.

I remember a poem my mother used to recite, "Spring has sprung, the grass has riz, I wonder where the birdies is?" I am looking at the weather of February and have to wonder if spring will ever be beautiful enough to undo the harshness of the winter. In conversation with a friend, I had an epiphany ... that it is spring that undoes the harshness of winter. In fact, this seasonal change reminds us that every harsh moment in life yields to healing ... naturally and organically, unless we get in the way. We can keep brooding over the ice and snow, or we can look forward to, and enjoy, the green that follows. We can stay hurt by arguments with friends/family, or we can look to the next opportunity for blessing. MARCH ONEG SPEAKER

Our Oneg speaker on March 28 will be Richard Levine. He will be speaking from the Bima during services and presenting "images" during the Oneg with a Q & A session. Dick Levine, the principal architect at the CSC Design Studio, is an environmental architect, solar energy and sustainability pioneer, and professor emeritus at the University of Kentucky. He was an early solar architecture innovator in the U.S. and his sustainable city research has been the foundation of urban development projects in China, the Middle East, Austria, Italy, and the United States. In 2010 Levine was named "Passive Solar Pioneer" by the American Solar Energy Society to honor his lifetime achievements in solar oriented design. He currently designs Net Zero Energy homes at a cost to the homeowner that is the same as for a conventional home.

Levine, along with his colleague Ernest J. Yanarella, founded the Center for Sustainable Cities (CSC) at the University of Kentucky, to study and advance the theory of sustainability. This is the subject of their recent book, "The City as Fulcrum for Global Sustainability." Levine believes that it is still not too late to prevent global collapse by following the principles of strong sustainability.

Judy Engelberg (president), Joe Grobstein (1st vice president), Rabbi Marc Kline, Ken Slepyan (immediate past president), Michael Marx, Tom Brennan (brotherhood), Joe Brill, Mickey Hernandez (Jewish Federation of the Bluegrass), Eden Myers, Susie Magill (religious school), Rebecca Young (sisterhood), Deborah Nelson, Diana Clewett, Rose Garden, Dianne Bazell (secretary), Betty Nigoff (treasurer), Rick Greenberg, Starr Gantz (2nd vice president); Steve Auer, Amy Messer, and Rick Clewett (congregants) were in attendance.

-Tom Brennan, co-chair with Scott Diamond of the interim rabbi search committee, gave an update on the committee's work to date.

-Steve Auer gave an overview of the temple's income streams and the demographics of our congregation.

-Amy Messer summarized the work of the publications committee. The new Temple web site is completed and is working well. The committee next will review the bulletin and is considering various approaches to online vs. hard copy access.

-There were no applications for membership or for resignation, and there was one request for building use, which was approved.

-Rabbi Marc will take accrued vacation and sabbatical time prior to his departure, which will entail our being responsible for leader (or finding leaders for) our Shabbat services, beginning in April. He will teach the bar/bat mitzvah candidates at whose ceremonies he will officiate and will lead the second-night congregational Seder, but will assume responsibility for funerals and other life cycle events on a case-by-case basis. He also will participate in a fund-raiser tribute dinner in his honor now scheduled for Saturday evening, April 12.

-Dianne reported on the work of the *ad hoc* group researching financial and congregational relations management database systems. The board approved the group's recommendation that the temple adopt the proposal submitted by Tammy Farley, CPA, of the accounting firm of Kring, Ray, Farley and Riddle, to design a chart of accounts and data-base for implementaion of software, install financial reports, and develop procedures of maintaining internal control of finances, with a follow-up audit. SIM SHALOM NEWS Volume 2 #7

As small as our congregation is, we seem to celebrate lots of Bar and Bat Mitzvahs. Occasionally, the celebrant is a child at the traditional age of thirteen, but more often it is an adult who is finally making a commitment that wasn't common during the Communist era, or who is just now discovering his/her Jewish roots, and is completing the first step of their Jewish journey. In January we had one of each of these celebrations. Eva Rakosi is a woman in her late 50's who has been very active in Sim Shalom for many years, being the shammes, cooking, helping with the child education programs, leading an arts and crafts group, and generally being involved in much of what is happening in Sim Shalom as well as the greater Budapest Jewish community. She has one daughter in Israel, and a son who is active in our youth group, and who assists the cantor with our musical program ever since he expropriated my drum a few years ago. So Eva has been studying Hebrew and was called to the Torah two weeks ago, reading the same portion, the Ten Commandments, as her son David did 3-4 years ago. It was a moving event, with a very large attendance.

The other Bat Mitzvah was done by Isabella Menczer, a young woman who has been in Sim Shalom for three years and has become just as active as Eva. She teaches the youngest children in the Talmud Torah, is a leader of the Youth group, and of a volunteer choir with members from several congregations, and participates in most services and holiday events. She gave an outstanding droshe and her translation of it into English can be found on our English language website www.sim-shalom.org, which also has much other information about us, including our most recent Annual Report for 2013. I can highly recommend both documents if you want to learn

more about what is going on here.

A potentially less happy event is the upcoming official 70th Anniversary Recognition of the Holocaust by the Hungarian government. Included in their plans are several things which will effectively give a whitewash to the participation of Hungarian organizations like the Arrow Cross militia and even the Hungarian government in the suppression and deportation of Hungarian Jews to the death camps. The plans include a Memorial statue in the square in front of the U.S. Embassy and a new Holocaust museum in a railway station. If carried out as now planned, they would have the effect of transferring all the blame for those sad events to the Nazis, whereas it is well documented that many Hungarians were deeply involved. The greater Hungarian Jewish community is up in arms about these plans, and has given an ultimatum that it will not participate in any of what goes on if the plans are not significantly changed. An embarrassing aspect of all this is that is already being announced in the world Jewish press (see JTA) that the two Chief Rabbis from Israel will participate. How this will all play out remains to be seen. But it seems that any Holocaust memorial events that are boycotted by the local Jewish community would be a cause for embarrassment for the government.

In Appreciation of Renee and Cokie Hymson Written by Dianne Bazell



Once again we acknowledge with gratitude the generosity of Temple members past and present. Sheldon ("Cokie") and Renee Hymson's devotion to our Temple goes back decades.

Cokie was born in Louisville but grew up in Providence, Kentucky, where his father had started a clothing business. After serving in the U.S. Navy, he joined his older brother, Maurice, who established Hymson's Tots and Teens department store on 163 East Main Street (see September 2012 *Bulletin*). Cokie opened its shoe department.

Renee was born and raised in St. Louis and came to Lexington *via* Texas, following a first marriage whose upside was her beloved daughters, Patty Kahn and Marcy Hambleton. Renee's parents had moved to Lexington, where her father joined Al Wenneker in the men's shoe business. Renee and Cokie married in 1957, and she joined him at Hymson's, where they ran the shoe department together until the store was sold in 1979.

In his later years, Cokie chaired the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE) division of the local Better Business Bureau. Throughout his life, his debonair charisma was well-known and loved, as was his skill on the trumpet, both classical and jazz. He played with the Donovan Scholars program, locally, across the country and in Canada, and memorably blew the *shofar* over the High Holidays.

Renee's path-breaking life—a working mother and wife, well before this profile became the norm—is beautifully recounted in a section of Rosie Moosnick's book, *Arab and Jewish Women in Kentucky: Stories of Accommodation and Audacity*. Renee's commitment to supporting other women in their quest for education, agency, and self-expression began with her own children: both graduated from college—Marcy in the first computer science program at the University of Kentucky—and Patty earned a Ph.D. in art education. It extended to her treatment of her customers, her role in starting the continuing education program at the University of Kentucky, and her fund-raising for the Women Writers Conference at UK. Currently, she spends winters in Sarasota, Florida, savoring the symphony, opera, theater, dance, lectures, films, and books—schooling herself after years of work—and daily reading her beloved *Wall Street Journal*.

The Temple has been an integral part of the entire Hymson family's Jewish life. Cokie and Renee were married here, and Marcy and Patty attended and played the organ for Religious School, were confirmed here, and participated in Youth Group, of which Patty became president in 1970. Cokie and Renee each served on the Temple Board and participated in Brotherhood and Sisterhood, respectively. In addition, Cokie served as president of the local chapter of *B'nai Brith*, and Renee was active in *Hadassah* and the Jewish Federation. Today, when in town, Renee never misses a *Chavurah Chochma* gathering.

Prior to Cokie's passing in 2008, he and Renee discussed the bequest that would go to the Temple on his death. They both wanted a gift of this size to address a current need rather than simply be added to the General Fund or reserved to bear future interest, and Cokie left it up to Renee to designate its use.

Due to their generous and thoughtful philanthropy, our temple is able to secure the services of a certified public accountant to standardize our financial reports, develop CPA-recognized protocols for maintaining internal control of our finances, and conduct the first audit in our temple's history.

We are grateful for Temple members like Renee and Cokie, who remember the Temple and are so responsive to its current needs.

A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

Prior to taking leave time before moving. I wanted to write this article and offer my thanks for eleven years of blessings. We take a lot of things for granted as we move through life, but I have learned and grown (and shrunk) a lot as a result of my tenure at TAI. Despite personal tragedies, I have experienced warmth and personal support that many other colleagues have not been afforded in their settings. That said, I want to leave you with a thought I shared three years ago on Yom Kippur. If you remember, in the midst of giving this sermon, I broke down sobbing on the pulpit. I have never had a more powerful spiritual experience in my life, and it has changed my world forever. I made the statement that we were born to create miracles. The only possible purpose for our existence is to make a creation that was good, great. We have abused our power and to quote the late Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr, "we have guided missiles and misguided men." When we think that it is appropriate to wield power over another, at the expense of his freedom liberty or the inalienable rights guaranteed by our nation's Constitution and our Torah, we blaspheme against God and pervert the blessing of creation. If we are people of faith, then we know in our hearts that whatever God is, God gave us the tools to build and heal the world, not control and abuse it. Faith is the tool that helps us make miracles real. beg of you to demonstrate your faith as you move forward. Passionately love that you have the power to touch and change lives. Sagaciously use that power to do so for the good of the world and not just for the good of our immediate wants or egos. We have to know that political bantering on either side serves only to distract us from God's call to look each other in the mirror ... and into each other's eyes ... and see God staring back at us. God stares back at us when we speak to people in the boardroom, in the grocery line, in the unemployment line, and at the soup kitchen. When we decide to think less of someone because we believe different truths, we must remember that our Talmud teaches us "Aelu v' Aelu divrae Elohim khayiom ... These words and these words are both the words of our living God." Perhaps where we disagree, there is something that both of us do not understand. Perhaps when we find ourselves unable to hear or see past our own point of view, it is not because the other point is wrong, but because we are not secure enough in our own skin ... in our own ways ... to consider the validity of someone else's. Where we hear each other with openness in our hearts, the world changes ... and we grow in the process. I learned this all here, as your rabbi, and in service to our wider community. For this and so much more, I am forever grateful.

SIM SHALOM NEWS Vol. 2 #9

No holidays, no meetings, not much news to report! In the midst of all the controversy, reported last month, about whether the Hungarian Jewish Community will take part in the 70th Anniversary Remembrance events of the Holocaust, everyone here seems to be taken up with how to deal with the past. Rabbi Kelemen has become very concerned that in concentrating on the past and all its horrors, we are forgetting to celebrate the present and to plan for how to make things better in the future for the Jewish community. Many of the older generation in Hungary are still traumatized by the losses, often in their own families, and among their friends. It is often so severe that these people go out of their way not to be identified as Jews. But this preoccupation with the past is not shared by those under age 25 or 30.

That is why Sim Shalom has put so much emphasis on attracting young Jews and aiding them in finding their way along the path toward their Jewish identity. This happens in our Sunday school where children of pre-school and school age learn about Judaism, study some Hebrew to prepare for Bar/Bat Mitzvah, and become part of the Jewish community. But the biggest and most successful effort is with our young adults who meet for an evening every two weeks with the Rabbi. They have a little nourishment in the form of the Hungarian style crepes, called palacsinta, pancakes filled with jam and cheese and chocolate sauce. Then they discuss something about contemporary life from the point of view Jewish ethics, or traditions, or laws in the Torah and Talmud. The dozen or so kids have very mature and innovative ways of thinking about the problems of life, and applying what they know about Judaism to their solutions. sometimes they just have fun watching a movie or going to the theater together. Some of them are active already in the life of the congregation, helping in teaching the younger children, or participating in providing the music for our services. Some of them make the commitment of having an adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah, as Isabella Menczer did last month. If you want to read her outstanding and interesting Drasha in English, you can find it on our website at www.simshalom.org.

And by the way, the Hungarian Jewish community is still in a standoff with the Hungarian government over whether they will participate in the governments planned events to commemorate the 70th year after the Holocaust. In many ways, the events planned are a whitewash of the Hungarian government at that time, and the Jews are not going to aid that effort in any way. It's not a comfortable atmosphere in which to live.

"SUCH A DEAL I HAVE FOR YOU!"

It is a method of doing something for our Temple. It is having your cake and eating it too. It is referred to as a charitable trust. It is an instrument that I have used, as well as many others at the Temple. This is how it works. You have appreciated property: stocks, bonds, real estate, and so on. Under current tax law, depending on the tax bracket, the long term capital gains taxes of federal, state, and Fayette County could be over 25%, not including the 3.8% on passive income derived from investment income. You give appreciated assets to this trust. No capital gains tax, and in fact, you would typically get an income tax deduction based on the value of the gift. The charitable trust usually sells the asset, and uses the proceeds of the asset to purchase income producing property. The trust pays you and your spouse, if applicable, or you and someone else under certain circumstances, an income of at least 4% or 5% of the principle held by the trust each year. You pay an income tax on the amount received. At the death of the beneficiaries of the trust, (you and spouse) the assets of the trust go to the charity(ies) that you have designated. Hopefully, this would be our Temple. Actually, the assets can go to multiple of charities. Life insurance agents will also point out that you can buy a life insurance policy, pay for it from the income from the trust that you receive, put the policy in an irrevocable life insurance trust to keep the proceeds out of your estate, to make up for the loss of the value of the asset you have given and also reduce estate taxes if applicable. This type of trust is referred to as a charitable remainder trust. For more info. contact Ben C. Kaufmann at 859-252-8000.

A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

OK, this is actually my last bulletin article as Rabbi of Temple Adath Israel. For eleven years, we have shared our lives. Parting is never easy, and it certainly makes us do and say things to circle our respective wagons, embellish memories, and emotionally prepare ourselves for being apart. We have all been to the funeral when, after the clergy's eulogy aggrandizes the deceased beyond recognition, we have to wonder if we were at the right funeral. We have been in conversations where someone we love is so demeaned (in a divorce or such disastrous split) that we have to wonder whether we are talking about the same person. This is an unfortunate piece of human nature.

Perhaps it is time to change the way in which we leave people with whom we have shared lives. We are all good people. We are imperfect, even in our efforts to perfectly care for ourselves and for each other. At the grave, it is important to remember the full spectrum of the life whose earthly course has just ended. It is important to tell the stories of glory and the stories of challenge; it is important to laugh and to cry ... this is how we lived life with them prior to their demise. When we prepare to part from living relationships, we need to remember to accept blessings ... even from situations with which people do not see eye to eye. In a divorce, couples need to remember what they loved about each other, even if those feelings can no longer carry the day. In business partings, people need to remember that everyone has the same desires for success, even while they may lack vision or understanding of each other's path and method.

We do not say, "Good bye;" we say, "so long." In Hebrew, we say, "L'hitraot." Effectively, it means, "til we see each other again." People do not leave us, and even when their time in our company and presence is done, our time with them and the things they brought into our shared lives is not over until our days are over. Be blessed, and know that you are, L'hitraot.



ENDOWMENT NEWS BY Ben Kaufmann

Fiddler on the Roof had many great songs, and one was "Tradition". Our temple and congregation have many traditions! However, as life progresses, there are changes. We now have a new president and some changes in our board. Finally, and this is not the end of change, but a new Rabbi will soon be

leading our congregation.

In order to keep some parts of the "old" traditions, new ideas and changes have to be made to keep the old traditional ideas. There are many analogies that support this, and sometimes the new is better than the old. For example, I can remember when I first started to drive, and many cars did not have power steering or power brakes. TV was almost an experiment. and in the 50's for Lexington, Kentucky there were three channels, and now there are hundreds available. The list goes on! Some ideas and methods maybe need to be tweaked a bit, but not changed drastically in order to keep the traditions that have been created. This applies to our services, the running of the Temple, and many aspects of the congregation. One tradition of our Temple that needs a bit of work is that of providing enough annual dues to support the operation of the Temple. Everyone needs to review their concept of "fair sharing" with Temple dues in order to support our Tradition. The Endowment Fund is not in existence to catch the shortfall in dues for the operation of our congregation. The Endowment is for the expansion and supporting the growth of the Temple in spiritual and physical activities. The capital in the Endowment Fund is restricted! Unfortunately, there are many misconceptions of the use of Endowment funds, and any member of the Endowment Committee would be happy to discuss this with any member of the congregation. Tradition has set up and put in motion many funds that function in our Endowment, which has been very successful. Each member of the congregation needs to review their commitment by reviewing their support, and visions of what this congregation is and shall be. Changes do sometimes need to be made, but historically, traditional ways have always prevailed.

UPDATE ON WAYS TO SUPPORT THE TEMPLE WHILE JUST DOING WHAT YOU NORMALLY DO: NOTE INCREASING FIGURES

1) Buy groceries at Kroger's with Kroger Gift Cards. We have received \$7,699.79 from Kroger scrip since May 1, 2013

Here's how it works: Get your Kroger Gift Card at the Temple from John McDonald. Cards can be charged with up to \$500 at any Kroger Customer Service counter or cash register using cash, check, or credit card. TAI receives 4% immediately. After that, buy your groceries, prescriptions, and gas, and then reload it as needed. (Hint: If you reload your Kroger scrip card with your airline points charge card, you get the benefit of accruing your airline points, as well. Such saychel!)

2) Shop at $\underline{\text{Amazon.com}}$. We've received \$1,239.27 since May 1, 2013.

Here's how it works: First, go to the TAI Website (www.lextai.org). In two places on any page on the website (top and bottom) you'll find an Amazon icon. Click on the icon and this will take you to Amazon.com. When you shop and buy from Amazon USING THE TEMPLE LINK, TAI receives 4% percent of your total purchase amount.

3) Recycle and the Temple earns cash. We receive \$20 credit to spend at Quill each month from cartridges recycled.

We continue to collect old inkjet and laser cartridges. There is a drop-off box in the Temple office. The Temple will receive \$20 a month in Quill credit for each 10 cartridges that we recycle on a monthly basis. There is no cost to the Temple and it helps the environment. All cartridges are accepted. Thanks to all who continue to donate. Keep them coming and help TAI continue to profit. Quill credits are used for office and religious school supplies.

4) Getting rid of your old car? Donate it to the Temple and take a tax break! Contact John McDonald to find out how.

We came together as a larger Jewish community as we celebrated Yom Ha Shoah at OZS and Yom Ha'atzmaut at TAI. The Jewish Federation organized these events and involved a diverse group of people in the preparation. Both events were educational, inspirational, and well attended. We really are one community with many interesting facets.

The Religious School closed its school year with an Israeli "street fair". The students participated in arts & crafts, face painting, Israeli folk dancing, the lone soldier project, music, and more. The Brotherhood manned the grill for a barbecue. We have a wonderful new curriculum and are looking forward to its implementation.

My first official Board Meeting as chairman went without a hitch (why was I so worried). This is a great board. The discussion was friendly and productive, and no one got hurt! Early indications are that a lot will be accomplished this year.

Our interim Rabbi is communicating well with us. Rabbi Roberts will be here in mid May to secure housing. He has asked to meet with the fall Bar/Bat Mitzvah students and families. He will hopefully meet more of the congregation as he prepares to relocate here. He is already helping us to get organized and he's not officially here. I find his assistance by phone and e-mail to be very comforting.

We (Board of Trustees) are at work considering a research plan to use in our permanent rabbi search. We are pretty excited about this because we are coming to the members of the congregation for the answers. You will hear more about this as we move along in the process. So until next month....

SIM SHALOM Volume 2 #10

It's been an active month. We started with a big congregational Seder with about 120 people attending, including 20 or so from the U.S. That's the most visitors we've ever had as long as I've been here. From the amount of correspondence so far, it looks like the number of visitors will be very large this summer. Every other weekend at least one family is coming.

Just last weekend we had Rabbi Joel Abraham of Temple Sholom in Scotch Plains NJ making his annual visit with his Confirmation class. It's always a great pleasure to have them with us, since the kids actively participate in the service and are outgoing as they talk with our young people during dinner afterwards. For them, it's good to see a lively congregation practicing Judaism after the downer of visiting Auschwitz and other camps. This time they brought us a beautiful Seder plate that was given to them by one of their most faithful congregants before she passed way.

The next morning we celebrated our third adult Bat Mitzvah of the year with Dora Mikes. Dora is a teenager whose family does not practice Judaism. But she decided 5 years ago that despite her family's indifference, she wanted to build her own Jewish identity, and she started coming regularly to services and holidays. She's always there on Friday night sitting in the front row. She's active in our youth group, and is now attending the Budapest Jewish University studying social work. It was a joyous occasion with her parents and grandparents there, and much of the congregation.

On the religious, political front there is some potentially very good news. The European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg rendered a very positive decision on our case appealing the taking away of our official registration as a religious institution by the Hungarian government more than two years ago. The court said that that action was unconstitutional, that our registration should be restored, and that furthermore we were entitled to a large amount of money as compensation for the loss of income that we have suffered due to the loss of registration. The Hungarian government has 6-9 months to respond to the various points of their decision. Our lawyer is quite confident that the compensation will be paid. Regaining the registration is considered to be more difficult, needing a vote of 2/3 of the members of parliament, in what has now become a very political process. For now, we can only wait and see what the government will do.


