

We called off Sunday School last week...

The newspapers have headlined the news.. Israel has been found guilty of an act of aggression against Egypt. The Mixed Armistice Commission has so voted

The Israeli members voted against it. The Egyptians for it, A tie. The U.N. members voted for it; and Israel stands before the eyes of the world as an aggressor

Israel also brought charges against Egypt The Israeli members voted for it. The Egyptians against it .. A tie. The U.N. member abstained. and Egypt was technically acquitted.....

In the past year and a half, this Mixed Armistice Commission has censured Egypt twenty-seven times for acts of aggression. Did you read about it in the papers? Neither did I......

I hate these border incidents! I wish with all my heart. that they would not even Religious School children thanks Ethel occur. But they have .. and they will .. because they are symptoms of something else.

Egypt has declared officially that she will never rest until all of Israel is destroyed. that even if all of Israel consisted of Tel Aviv. even that must be destroyed.....

Both the domestic and foreign policy of Egypt rests in large measure upon anti-Israel sentiment.....

Against this background..it seems a little silly to treat each border incident as if it had no deeper roots than the immediate act......

These incidents will occur until there is peace in the land. And there will be no peace until the Arab world recognizes the existence of Israel...It does exist!!

Israel is desirous of sitting around a conference table with the Arab world. to work out answers. But the Arabs refuse to recognize her .. either to discuss a peace treaty..or the refugee problem.....

Let the U.N. speak of this! And let the papers tell the more complete story to the world....

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

I want to take this opportunity to explain the reason for a special Congregational Meeting. I realize how busy all of us are, and would not burden the the Congregation with a special meeting, if the Board of Directors did not consider the matter to be of utmost importance.

In the year 1950, we erected a separate wing to our Temple for the main purpose of providing adequate facilities for our Religious School. It was and is a beautiful addition, and I would like to pay public tribute to the men and women who labored to make it a reality.

The Religious School wing consists of nine rooms. One of these is the library. One of these is the Rabbi's study. And one of these is the Temple Office. During the past two years, we have been forced to use the office, as a class room; the Rabbi's Study as a class room...and in addition:

We use the stage, for a class room, the small room off the stange as a class room, and the sanctuary itself as a class-room.

Every available inch of space is used, and still we have not enough room. I would invite you to come on a Sunday morning, to see for yourself, but unfortunately there is no room for you on Sunday morning.

Three years ago, our Religious School had an enrollment of sixty-four children. This year we have enrolled over one hundred and twenty. This fact is not one to fill us with concern alone. It should also fill us with pride. The welfare of our children has always been uppermost in our hearts, and now the time has come for us, once again, to decide upon a plan of action.

Thanks to the way in which our finances have been handled, we will be able to add the additional space without a special drive. It is the feeling of the Board of Directors that the present dues structure will be able to handle the cost of the expansion on the same long term arrangement whereby we have steadily been reducing our mortgage.

On Sunday, March 20 we shall meet in the Temple Vestry at 2:30 P.M. to discuss this entire matter and to listen to the recommendation of the Board of Directors. I ask you to make every effort to attend. This is a very important matter, important enough in the lives of all of us, to warrant your attendance.

I look forward to meeting with you at that time, and I trust that when members meet with good will in their hearts, all problems can be solved.

Science..and the progress of science has been much in our minds of late...In less than seven days we saw that movie of Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer..rejoiced at the discovery of Dr. Jonas Salk..and wept at the passing of Albert Einstein.....

Oppenheimer told of his work in an unknown world. Salk promised the end of a dread disease. and Winstein showed us the stature of the true scientist. concerned with the welfare of man........

No one can say that our scientists have not performed well. the tasks allotted to them upon this earth. They have struggled against the frustrations of their profession. the ignorance and apathy of people. the resistance of nature against prying eyes and prying hands. and with it all. they have made superb progress.

Our formulae are unprovable. "It hath been told thee, O man, what is good..and what the Lord doth require of thee: Only to do justly..and to love mercy..and to walk humbly with thy God."

We can't prove it..Our only chance for success is not to prove it..and not to say it..but to live it..with all the world watching us for advice..or for mistakes..



THE FOOL

Who was it who jumped on his horse, and rode off in all directions? Whoever else it might have been..it also applies to me. This summer..I tried to do all the things I wanted to do..and in the three months between then and now..I did most of them.

This Congregation may get tired of hearing about youth..but in my book..there is nothing quite so exciting..I worked with Christian Youth in Hazel Green..with Negro Youth in Louisville..with NFTY in Oconomowoc..and with OVFTY in Ohio.

Perhaps I tried to do too much..I did get tired at times..Perhaps I was a fool.. not to have rested this summer...But whatever I was...I did see great beauty.. I did see the meaning..and the relevance of religion..I did peer into the future..and it is good future..If that is being a fool I'm glad.





When I was a kid, I went to Temple Beth El in Providence, Rhode Island. In those days it was at the corner of Broad & Glenham Streets, and my Rabbi was William G. Braude.

We used the old Union Prayer Book (Revised), and I remember when we switched to the more modern Union Prayer Book (Newly Revised). Some members of our Congregation considered this to be an extravagence. Some members wondered what we could do with our old books. There isn't much of a market for old Prayer Books, even in good condition.

But my Rabbi was a man who saved books. It was (and is) almost impossible for him to throw any book away. The printed word, and especially the printed word of God, is not a dispensable item for him.

Well, time passed. I left Providence to begin my wanderings. The old Temple on Broad and Glenham was sold, and a magnificent new building was erected.

In this modern House of Worship, everything was sparklingly new. There were new rooms, new supplies, new materials. But deep in the hidden recesses of the new library, were those old Union Prayer Books (Revised). My Rabbi still kept them.

Last summer I visited with my Rabbi. We talked of many things. And when I told him about my patients at the Narcotics Hospital, and how our Prayer Books are tattered and torn, he had the answer.

My Rabbi has sent me all of those old Union Prayer Books (Revised) that he had been saving these many years. And now my patients in Lexington pray from books I used twenty years ago, and a thousand miles away.

This column is dedicated to Rabbi William G. Braude, with my very sincere thanks.

I left Providence over fourteen years ago, but Temple Beth El is still my Temple, and William Braude is still my Rabbi. And the tie that binds, is symbolized among other things, by some old Union Prayer Books (Revised), that my Rabbi saved.....for me. When I was a kid, I went to Temple Beth El in Providence, Rhode Island. In those days it was at the corner of Broad & Glenham Streets, and my Rabbi was William G. Braude.

We used the old Union Prayer Book (Revised), and I remember when we switched to the more modern Union Prayer Book (Newly Revised). Some members of our Congregation considered this to be an extravagence. Some members wondered what we could do with our old books. There isn't much of a market for old Prayer Books, even in good condition.

But my Rabbi was a man who saved books. It was (and is) almost impossible for him to throw any book away. The printed word, and especially the printed Word of God, is not a dispensable item for him.

Well, time passed. I left Providence to begin my wanderings. The old Temple on Broad and Glenham was sold, and a magnificent new building was erected.

In this modern House of Worship, everything was sparklingly new. There were new rooms, new supplies, new materials. But deep in the hidden recesses of the new library, were those old Union Prayer Books (Revised). My Rabbi still kept them.

Last summer I visited with my Rabbi. We talked of many things. And when I told him about my patients at the Narcotics Hospital, and how our Prayer Books are tattered and torn, he had the answer.

My Rabbi has sent me all of those old Union Prayer Books (Revised) that he had been saving these many years. And now my patients in Lexington pray from books I used twenty years ago, and a thousand miles away.

This column is dedicated to Rabbi William G. Braude, with my very sincere thanks.

I left Providence over fourteen years ago, but Temple Beth El is still my Temple, and William Braude is still my Rabbi. And the tie that binds, is symbolized among other things, by some old Union Prayer Books (Revised), that my Rabbi saved......for me. What does that announcement mean to you? I'll tell you what it meant to me. I was once asked who was the most important Jew in the United States, and I answered "Eddie Jacobson".

I first met him a few years ago in Somerset, Ky. He had come to a wedding at which I officiated. When I told him of the statement I had made, he protested. He said, "I am only a simple haberdasher."

Perhaps it was the finger of destiny that tapped his partner on the shoulder. His partner's name was Harry Truman.

When that happened, Eddie Jacobson became the back door to the White House, and many of us believe that this had more to do with the establishment of the State of Israel than many other more publicized events.

Mr. Jacobson denied this, but the State of Israel thought so, and so do I.

Mr. Truman has always been a man of strong friendship and strong enmities. His love for Eddie Jacobson was very powerful, and his attitude toward Israel and related subjects was flavored by his friendship.

Mr. Jacobson said to me, "I am only a simple haber-dasher." But what might have happened if that partner-ship had ended in bitterness, in accusations, in recriminations?

It is not given to every man to become the confident of Presidents. But Mr. Jacobson has shown us by his life precisely what we can do. We can, in our separate occupations, strive to represent to all the world, the highest dictates of our religion.

In the final analysis, the greatness of Mr. Jacobson rested upon...the goodness of Mrs. Jacobson. In this may his bereaved family and friends, find comfort.
