'One of the things that I had hoped the reorganization would do was make it possible for me to get freed up to do some more visiting around the state, and that has proven to be correct. 'Ne said.

During the visits, Singletary and Wethington have met with the directors of the colleges and members of their staffs and have toured the campuses to see the physical facilities.

They have also listened to mental.

"We have a lot of institutional cooperation in the community college system and it's good,' he said.

With the help of the advisory boards, the community colleges are continuing to grow in enrollment, at an average of 6 percent this year, while other institutions in the state are leveling off and declining, he said.

The nation's economy is a strong factor in that growth, he said, because more people are deciding to stay close to home and save money otherwise spent for room and board. The Lexington campus selective admissions policy, scheduled to take effect Fall, 1964, will not affect that greatly, Singlelary reasoned.

The growth has another side-effect—six construction projects, scattered throughout the system, are in various stages of completion. Some have started, while others are about to be bid. We like to keep a close eye on those developments, 'the president said. Sloane challenges foes' tax plans

OWENSBORO — Louisville Mayor Harvey Sloane has challenged his two Democratic opponents in the gubernatorial race to "tell the people whether they plan to raise taxes or

Sloane said yesterday at a candidates forum he had reviewed the spending commitments of former Human Resources Secretary Grady Stumbo and Lt. Gov. Martha Layne

Stumbo said in Frankfort that if elected, he would support creation of a regional jail system and increased use of community work as punishment for crimes.

Syria predicts war with Israel

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Syria said yesterday it expects to fight again with Israel, and Lebanese leaders expressed pessimism about U.S. attempts to arrange a pullout of Israeli forces from their country.

Syrian Prime Minister Abdel Raout al-Kasm told his Cabinet in Damascus an Israeli attack on Syria was "possible and expected," But he claimed the Soviet-supported nation was ready to flight the Israelis.

In Beirut, Lebanese elder statesman Saeb Salam conferred with U.S. special envoy Philip C. Habib for one hour and told reporters he was pessimistic about negotiations aimed at getting Israeli forces to withdraw.

"Israel is trying to dictate peace by the gun barrel," he said. "We cannot go on negotiating forever. The United

States should realize this and seek to rescue its credibility. I have made this position clear to Ambassador Habib."

Reagan proposes missile cut

WASHINGTON — President Reagan sent the Soviet Union a scaled-down proposal yesterday that would first reduce, rather than eliminate, the arsenals of medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe. But the Kremlins chief negotiator said, "I'm not optimistic."

The proposal still leaves room for the United States to install new cruise and Pershing II missiles on the continent late this year, while requiring the Soviets to tear down some of theirs. Reagan declined to discuss the specifics, but said "We've never retreated" from the plan.

Still, his proposal represents the first major U.S. effort to break the 16-month deadlock in the European negotiations. It was put on the bargaining table in Geneva, Switzerland, by U.S. negotiator Paul Nitze as the talks broke up for a recess until May 17.

The Reagan administration has long been urged by NATO allies to offer an interim arms deal, demonstrating the United States is not inflexible from the "zero-zero" plan originally proposed by the president. The allies also hope the new proposal will give the United States an edge in the propaganda battle over the entire issue of arms control.

After hours of discussion, the Kernel's editorial board has finally arrived at a conclusion: Based on experience, platform and record, the best team for the job is that of David Bradford and Tim Freudenberg.

The John Davenport/John Miller ticket was hard to pass up. Their pledges to promote campus safety, particularly pedestrian safety—long a sore point on this traffic-jam prone inner-city campus—and to pursue the establishment of a day-care program for adult students are indicative of their strong desire to provide practical services for students.

Also, Davenport's experience as Senate chair pro tem — a position to which he was elected by the Senate — has given him experience in a leadership role that combines both adminstrative and legislative functions.

Miller has also demonstrated his ability to lead in a constructive manner. When the Miller has also demonstrated his admity to lead in a constructive manner. When the Senate was faced with the prospect that students opposed to the mandatory health fee would call a General Student Assembly for the purpose of approving a referendum on the issue, Miller, who was opposed to the refendum, saved SGA — and ultimately, the students — a considerable amount of time and money by introducing a referendum bill, which was passed by the Senate.

But the ticket has its drawbacks — not critical, but worth noting. Davenport has demonstrated an unfortunate tendency to leap before he looks, which earlier this school year led to a Senate investigation of possible improprieties on his part in a committee appointment. He later was cleared of the charges by the investigators, who found his mistake had been innocent — a result of inexperience. But it showed he had not taken

The Cheryl Hardcastle/Jack Dulworth ticket is also appealing. Hardcastle made a point of emphasizing that she would not waste time and resources on unrealistic measures, even going so far as to say she would pay for lobbying trips to Washington, D.C., out of her own pocket.

She also has pledged to promote communications between herself and other student leaders through regular meetings with residence hall council presidents, student advisory council presidents and others. And she has promised to take every issue concerning increases in students' costs to a referendum before making a decision.

While on the surface these proposals are commendable, they indicate an unfortunate conservatism reflective of the less desirable aspects of the administrative style of current President Jim Dinkle, one of her major supporters. A president, while responsive to student opinion, also must be a leader of student opinion, also must be a leader of student opinion. Hardcastle, who plans to delegate much of the responsibility of the presidency to others in the administrative branch and Senate, does not appear to be that kind of leader.

Also, as a member of the University Senate, he was instrumental in resolving, in the students' favor, a conflict between students and faculty members over chemistry make-

up exam policies, thus correcting a serious injustice.

Above all, Bradford and Freudenberg's platform shows a visionary bent long overdue for an organization that just two years ago had its budget more than quadrupled. They reflect, in a modest way, a positive movement in student government taking place throughout the country.

With pledges to provide an interest-free student loan service, a revised (perhaps computerized) book exchange, doubled funds for the Student Organization Assistance Committee and to pursue the set-up of a campus pub, they have put together a platform that emphasizes the role of SGA as a facilitator of consumer services and campus activities; in short, as a true student union.

It may be just wide-eyed dreaming, as Hardcastle indirectly charged during the debate, but this is a time for new ideas and alternatives. Bradford and Freudenberg, with their proven effectiveness and SGA's backing and influence, may be able to succed where others have failed.

We encourage you to give them a try.



Nicaragua, Honduras scuffling in newest war

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — Hondura territory between Nicaragua and rase claimed yesterday that its army intercepted Nicaraguan troops smuggling weapons to the leftist juertillas in El Salvador.
