### Drink up: Fans of the popular drink can buy it in 61 Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana counties

Many students who developed a passion for the Winchester, Ky.-based beverage Ale-8-One while at UK, but who couldn't find it in their hometowns now have reason to rejoice.

In April, Ale-8-One will be expanding its territory to include 61 counties in Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana, including the Louisville and Cincinnati areas, thanks to an agreement with Coca-Cola Enterprises. Its current core distribution area is within a 60-mile radius of Winchester.

This should come as welcome news to relatives of civil engineering junior Matt Curtis. Curtis, who downs an average

of a six-pack a week, said he has family in Indiana and "out west" that order the beverage from Kentucky.

While Curtis was drinking Ale-8-One long before he stepped on campus, his friend Ryan Whitman, a mechanical engineering junior, said he wasn't converted until he came to Kentucky.

A native of Dayton, Ohio, Whitman is excited about the distribution expansion. He said that Ale-8-One is addictive and lacks the bite of a cola and, for these reasons, he thinks the soft drink will do well in the tri-state area.

"A lot of people who like it, that's all they drink," Whitman

# Professors say Athletics deal 'scandalous'

'UK has overlooked the staff minimum wage while (Athletics) is getting free tickets'

Several professors are unhappy with the Athletics Department's policy of awarding its employees free season tickets, many of which are traded for cars at local dealerships.

"The tickets seem like a nice way of padding salary without a raise," said Mark Summers, a history professor. "I wish they did something like that in my department."

For years, Athletics has given more than 40 employees free season tickets. The employees take the tickets to car dealerships and trade them for cars. The dealerships then review the tickets in promotions. Athletics Director Larry Ivy defended his department's practices, saying the ticket exchange is a common practice among Division I schools.

This answer did not satisfy many professors.

"I find it hard to believe that the ticket giveaway is a standard practice. I think it's scandalous," said geography Professor Susan Roberts.

As the ticket swapping practice upset many professors, so did the news that

former President Charles Wethington gave Ivy a 10 percent raise in 2001.

"It seems wildly unfair for athletics people to have raises while faculty salaries are not moving much," said Brian Gren, an assistant professor in sociology.

Staff salaries are just as stagnant, Gren added.

"UK has overlooked the staff minimum wage while the Athletics Department is getting free tickets," Gren said. "Most staff can't even afford to get to the game."

After the NCAA released sanctions for the football team last month, President Lee Todd formed a committee to review all athletic practices, from Ivy's raise to the "tickets-for-cars" program.

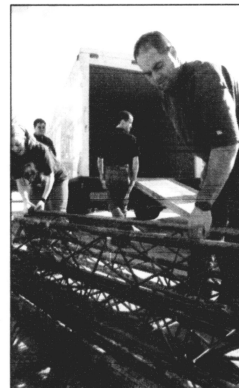
The committee will report to Todd in a few weeks.

Vernon Wiehe, a social work professor, said it's noble that Todd is reviewing the department. "I have great confidence in the committee's review. Some professors said they are not shocked at the news."

"It's not surprising," said Michael Carter, an English professor. "Nothing surprises me anymore."

### Hurry, hurry: Physical plant workers and students expect to labor into the night

Students attending inaugural festivities today and tomorrow will see the first UK presidential inauguration in almost 40 years.

What they will not see are all the people that have put their time and energy into perfecting the event.

"The unsung heroes of the inauguration are the trucking people and the physical plant workers," said John Herbst, director of the Student Center.

T. Lynn Williamson, director of human resources and inaugural committee

member, said setting up for an event with a \$100,000 budget in donated funds and an invitation list 18,000 people long takes hard work from staff and volunteers.

"We don't have rehearsals," Herbst said. "But everyone has to know what to do."

The committee spent countless hours making sure the event runs smoothly.

"I have a cue book that is about 40 pages long," Williamson said. "It includes every word someone speaks and every movement someone

### 'Consent' law impacted abortion rates

FRANKFORT — Abortions at two Kentucky clinics decreased dramatically after Kentucky's "informed consent" law took effect 11 months ago, the clinics' administrator said Wednesday. Legislation approved by a Senate committee Wednesday might drive the numbers even lower, supporters of legal abortion said. Last year, 3,057 abortions were performed, down from 3,828 the year before, at EMW Women's Surgical Center in Louisville. Executive Director Dona Wells said. About a third of the year's total (1,015) occurred in the first quarter of 2001. The law then took effect. Abortions declined to 714 in the second quarter, Wells told the Health and Welfare Committee.

### KKK plans March rally in Owensboro

OWENSBORO — The Ku Klux Klan has informed city officials that the group plans a rally in the city on March 23. Scott Smith, imperial wizard of the SS Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, said in a letter that the rally is set for noon to 2 p.m. Owensboro City Manager Ron Payne told the city commission on Tuesday about the rally. The letter said the rally will include speeches, music and the distribution of literature.

### Group wants stricter licensing law

LOUISVILLE — A Washington group that advocates tougher immigration laws is backing a bill in the General Assembly that would make it harder for a foreigner to get a Kentucky driver's license. Others say the bill is a paranoid response to Sept. 11, and would further alienate some minorities, like Hispanics. The Federation for American Immigration Reform, a privately funded nonprofit group, sent a representative to Louisville on Wednesday to announce its support of the driver's licensing bill.

## NATIONAL NEWS

### Waylon Jennings dies at 64

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Waylon Jennings, who defined the outlaw movement in country music, died Wednesday of diabetes-related health problems. He was 64. Jennings, a singer, songwriter and guitarist, recorded 60 albums and had 16 No. 1 country singles in a career that spanned five decades and began when he played bass for Buddy Holly. He was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame in October. Jennings died peacefully at his home in Arizona.



### Mardi Gras a success, officials say

NEW ORLEANS — Despite terrorism worries, a slow economy and competition from the Super Bowl, city officials declared Mardi Gras 2002 a success. Much of the credit was given to an increased security presence. Louisiana National Guardsmen, who stayed in the city after the Super Bowl, enabled police to station about 50 plainclothes officers at key points. Those officers arrested 207 people in the French Quarter on drug charges.

### EXPENSIVE:

Five months into her reign as Miss America 2002, the shine is coming off the crown for Katie Harman. In an eight-page letter to Miss America's Organization directors, Harman's parents said the 21-year-old collegian has been slammed with unexpected fees — including \$750 for clothing alterations and \$2,248 for a post-crowning party at Trump Taj Mahal Casino Resort.

### Black colleges ask for aid increase

WASHINGTON — Pointing to students' debt loads, presidents of predominantly black colleges asked Congress for more money for financial aid. Addressing a joint hearing of two House education committees Wednesday, several college officials said their students need more government help as costs rise higher than they can afford. Shirley Lewis, president of Paine College in Augusta, Ga., said nearly every Paine student either is working or has taken out loans. Many students end up graduating about \$20,000 in debt, she said.

## INTERNATIONAL NEWS

### U.S. troops cope with Valentine's Day

KANDAHAR, Afghanistan — One sergeant was willing to wait in line for the phone all day. Another fashioned a heart from a box of military rations. For U.S. troops based in Afghanistan, Valentine's Day meant cards, packages and a few romantic minutes on the phone — if they were lucky. Three wooden pallets overflowing with cards and packages lay on the floor of the military post office Wednesday, and cards sent to the troops from elementary school children were taped to the windows where soldiers lined up to send their cards to loved ones.

### Suspect silent on missing reporter

KARACHI, Pakistan — The key suspect in the kidnapping of Wall Street Journal reporter Daniel Pearl refused to tell police where he is being held, investigators said Wednesday. Police raided several homes in and around the southern port city of Karachi on Wednesday, searching for collaborators and clues to the whereabouts of Pearl, who has been missing for three weeks.

### Gov: Taliban used children as shields

TARIN KOT, Afghanistan — U.S. warplanes dropped bombs and fired missiles at women and children escaping an attack on a Taliban stronghold in the first weeks of the U.S.-led war, killing at least a dozen children and survivors a provincial governor said Wednesday. Jan Mohammed Khan, governor of Uruzgan province, said U.S. warplanes were apparently targeting Taliban fighters he claimed used the fleeing civilians as human shields.

"It's hard to explain to people that I am sometimes just too busy," he said. "I take as many as I can, but it's hard to not make people mad."

While some get upset because of Johnson's busy schedule, he said he tries to make the ride interesting for all of his riders.

"I think everyone likes to be the center of attention and it's nice to be comfortable in your own element, with a car full of people, knowing that everyone is having a good time," Johnson said.

Kristen Smith, a psychology sophomore, frequents Johnson's cab.

"If it hadn't been for him, I probably would've gotten into some trouble a long time ago," she said.

Smith said she likes Johnson as a cab driver because the experience is not like that of a typical cab ride — it's fun, she says.

"Daniel is a dancing machine at the stop lights, and he always has funny things to talk about," she said. "He makes it a point to care."

Johnson said he pays \$84 a month to sublease the car from the cab company, which forwards calls to him. Customers are also welcome to call him directly on his cell phone, too.

Johnson said he loves to

help students, which often means transporting them when they are unable to drive.

He said it does not take a research study to convince him that college-aged kids are going to drink, he said the statistics are there to prove it.

"Because I don't use drugs or alcohol, this is how I party ... how I have a good time," he said.

Johnson said he knows the painful consequences that can occur when people drive drunk. He said he lost his 26-year-old brother because of a drunk driver.

Johnson said his shift typically runs from 2 p.m. to 4 a.m. He also caters to a daytime clientele of people traveling to work from work and to some who are physically unable to drive.

It is on the weekend nights — Thursdays included — that Johnson gets called to the campus area.

"Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays are the most fun time to drive," he said. "The moods are lighter, the money is flying — it's just the best time to drive a cab."

For two years, he has found taxi driving not only to be a lucrative and efficient business, but an important and enjoyable one as well.

And his yellow business card reveals his motto.

"I am the 'comes around, goes around' taxi. I just try to help people out and treat them how they want to be treated," Johnson said. "And I have found that if you keep it simple and do that, people will treat you likewise."

"Me and some friends are setting it all up around noon today," Kidd said.

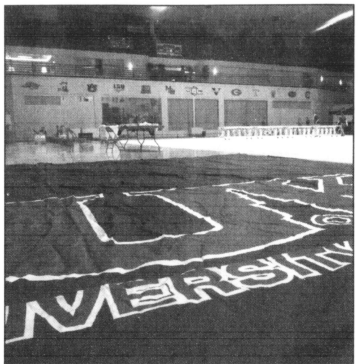
Kidd does not anticipate having time to leave again before the start of the gala.

# Horticulture students to visit gardens abroad

**Across the pond: Club selling flowers today to help fund 20-day garden party in Europe**

Flowers, gardens and greenhouses will be fresh in the minds of 14 students this May. The Horticulture Club is going to Europe for 20 days to tour the gardens of the Dutch National Garden Floriade.

The Floriade Flower Show, held every 10 years, will allow the students to visit gardens of many countries. Similar to a floral world fair, the Floriade consists of 100 acres of flowers and gardens arranged in pavilions representing many countries.

"The Floriade is a special trip for the students," said Bob McNeil, club adviser and horticulture professor. "With it occurring only once a decade, this will be a hard time students will get to go to

the Floriade." McNeil has been working with the Horticulture Club and leading trips for 21 years.

# Student holds 28 hostage at Conn. college

**Arraigned: Judge orders psychiatric exam**

FAIRFIELD, Conn. — Nicole Arrigo's class at Fairfield University was discussing the concept of time when a confused-looking young man stumbled into the room with what he claimed was a bomb.

The next few hours would seem like an eternity. Patrick Arbelo, 24, a legally blind 2001 graduate of the Roman Catholic university, announced to the class that he was a member of "The National United Federalist Socialist Party." And he was holding a box with a wire sticking out of it.

He ordered the students to put their hands on their heads. He told them to toss their book bags out of the classroom and tape up the windows. And he gave what Arrigo called a "modern-day Nazi statement."

The standoff ended seven hours later when the last of the 28 hostages were released and a jittery Arbelo gave up without a struggle. No one was injured. Police said Wednesday that the box did not contain a bomb.

"We didn't think that it was a joke, but we thought it might be some sort of drill," Arrigo

said in an interview Wednesday, when classes resumed. "Then we noticed the teacher was very nervous."

Arbelo was arraigned Wednesday on 28 counts of kidnapping. Bail was set at \$1 million, and the judge also ordered a psychiatric exam.

Arbelo's lawyer, William Neary, had no comment.

Arrigo, a 19-year-old sophomore from Boston, had seen Arbelo in the corridor of Canisius Hall on Tuesday, a few minutes before the "Voices of Medieval Women" religious-studies class, and he looked out of place.

The class' 27 students and professor were discussing the difference between normal time and the way time seems at peak moments of your life when Arbelo walked in. "It was weird. The first 45 minutes was really scary," Arrigo said.

The police arrived and Arbelo began talking with them on a two-way radio that he had brought with him. He demanded his statement be read to the media, along with a list of books that he wanted the public to read. Police refused his demands.

# Student seeks unity among organizations

**A federation: More student involvement and better resources top list of goals**

The president of the Campus Progressive Coalition wants all of the student organizations on campus to unite.

Last week, an e-mail circulated through the Student Organizations listserv. Sent by Dave Newton, president of the CPC, the e-mail contained plans to connect the 314 registered campus organizations.

Newton's idea is to form what he called the Federation of Student Organizations.

Newton's hope for the FSO includes allowing organizations to gain resources that help attract UK students and that encourage unity.

"We won't have a political platform; mainly we're going for getting students more involved," Newton said.

Newton said the formation of the FSO is still a tentative venture, but roughly 20 organizations have expressed interest.

Diana Keam, president of Phi Sigma Pi Honor Society, said the FSO could potentially help her group.

"We're a fairly young organization, so it would be good to see how other, more established organizations operate," Keam said.

The proposed FSO hopes to increase student involvement by publishing and distributing a booklet with de-

scriptions and contact information for all members of the FSO, Newton said.

Leadership conferences, once held regularly by the Student Organizations Committee, would emphasize and support leadership among students.

"Support for the conference diminished due to bad turnouts," said David Hutchinson, a member of Green Thumb, an environmental organization.

Student Government President Tim Robinson expressed interest in creating a cabinet to contain the FSO, providing it with funding.

Newton said although he welcomed SG to join the federation as a member organization, he wants the FSO to be an independent group, with all member organizations having equal representation.

"If (the FSO) was to be funded by one of its member groups, that could have serious ramifications," Newton explained.

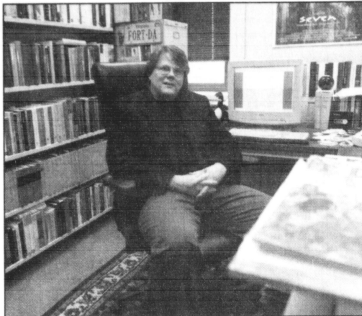

# Classes bring sex into spotlight

**Time for you to learn:** Teachers offer students courses that outline various topics concerning human sexuality, theories on sex

Though most people don't just sit around and talk about sex, it is a pretty hot topic — especially in the classes Sex Theory and Human Sexuality.

The classrooms where Michael Uebel, an associate professor of English, and Stephen Fife, a professor in the family studies department, teach take an academic approach to how sex affects us mentally, emotionally and physically.

"I'm more interested in perverse forms of sexuality," said Uebel. "My interest is looking at those forms of desire beyond their characterization as either immoral or moral, and how we work within those implications."

Fife's approach to human sexuality is somewhat more straightforward.

"I try to take a relational approach to human sexuality," he said.

"These relationships may be of varying kinds or of varying qualities," he said. "I try to emphasize to my classes that each of these types of relationships would likely result in sexual relationships that have very different meanings for the parties involved."

Uebel said his class is popular among students, and routinely fills up with non-majors who simply want to take a class that talks about sex.

"The reason (my class) became a kind of cult hit is that it does take an unabashed look at sex and desire within contemporary culture," Uebel said.

Fife agrees that open discussion about sex is one of the main reasons students take his class. He said most academic talk about human sexuality ends after sex education in high school.

"Students have an opportunity to study and explore a topic that remains relatively undiscussed in many homes across our country," he said.

In his class, Fife centers the discussion around the work and research of Martin Buber, a philosopher and theologian.

"He put forth the idea that we can see others as either objects or real people," he said.

"When we see them as objects, we see them selfishly. On the other hand, when we see them as real people we are more sensitive to their feelings."

Uebel said that Sigmund Freud has certainly had a major impact on sex theory as a whole, but Wilhelm Reich, a Marxist psychoanalyst, credits him as his greatest influence.

"He argued that if you want to eliminate neuroses you must eliminate these blockages of desires," Uebel said.

"He was a huge advocate of elimination of sexual repression."

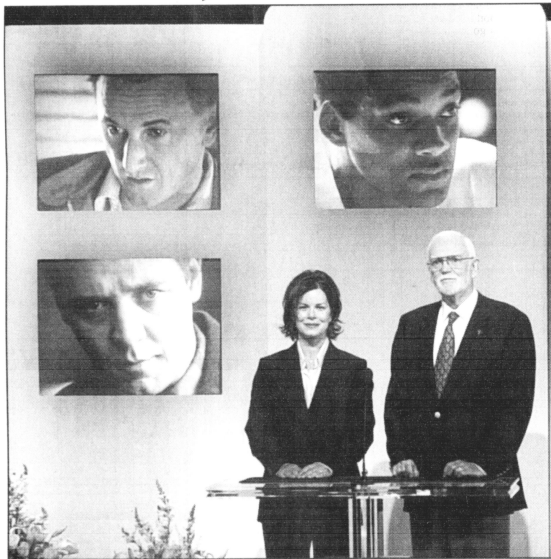
Uebel and Fife said they hope their students will learn to recognize their desires about sex as well as gain a better understanding about why they have those desires.

Joe Marrett, a journalism senior who took Sex Theory, said the class gave him a better understanding of sex.

"I think for a lot of people (classes like these) could open them up to talk about sex and remove some of the stigma and embarrassment that goes along with it," he said.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — The Oscars will have a rich fantasy life this year. J.R.R. Tolkien's fantasy epic *The Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring* led the field of Academy Award nominees announced Tuesday, capturing 13 nominations. Tied for second with eight nods were *A Beautiful Mind*, recounting the delusional fantasy life of schizophrenic mathematician John Nash, and *Moulin Rouge*, a musical fantasy that brings 20th century pop tunes to 19th century Paris. Those movies will compete for best-picture honors against *Gosford Park*, a tale of murder and class warfare on a British estate, and *In the Bedroom*, a low-budget drama about a family struck by calamity. The other best-actor nominees are Sean Penn as a retarded dad in *I Am Sam* and Tom Wilkinson as a vengeful father in *In the Bedroom*.

**Carnegie donates money**  
NEW YORK — The Carnegie Corporation of New York announced plans to distribute \$10 million in awards to 137 cultural and arts organiza-

tions throughout the city on behalf of an anonymous donor who gave the money to the corporation. The awards range from \$25,000 to \$100,000, the Carnegie Corp. said in a statement Monday. The organizations will be asked for documentation to show what their plans are for the money.

Prince plans exhibition

COPENHAGEN, Denmark — Crown Prince Frederik opened an exhibition marking the 100th birthday of celebrated Danish architect and designer Arne Jacobsen. The exhibit includes his masterpieces — the Egg armchair and his molded plywood stacking chair from the late 1950s, widely popular pieces of modern Scandinavian furniture. Jacobsen's well-known *Ant* and *Svan* chairs, as well as tables, lamps, light fixtures, cookware, door handles and clocks that he designed, also are on display at the Danish Design Center. Also featured is the slim, futuristic *AJ* cutlery in Stanley Kubrick's 1968 movie, *2001: A Space Odyssey*. In recent years, interest in Jacobsen's furniture has

been on the rise, said Ulla Hovgaard Ramlau, director of the Danish Design Center.

Painting returns to N.J.

NEWARK, N.J. — A rare oil painting by Thomas Nast has been donated to a museum in the New Jersey town where the work was created. *The Immortal Light of Genius*, which pays tribute to the noted illustrator's favorite writer, William Shakespeare, was given to the Morristown-Morris Township Joint Free Public Library last month. The site already is home to much of Nast's works in books and one other painting, the *Grand Caricaturama*. Those familiar with Nast's work said the painting probably would be sold at auction for as much as \$40,000 to \$50,000 if it was in mint condition. In the past few years, water damage has already occurred. Nast, who lived in Morristown from 1871 to 1902, gained fame as a cartoonist, caricaturist and illustrator working for Harper's Weekly, New York Illustrated News and other publications.

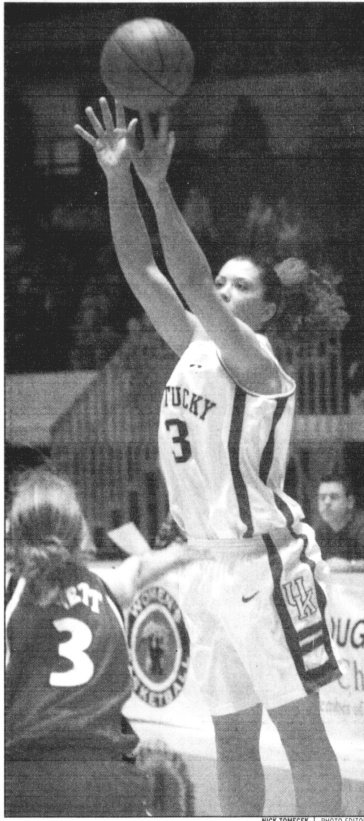

## Freshman is Potts of 3-point gold

In 2000-01, the UK women's basketball team needed a way to score.

Center SeSe Helm's post play was UK's only consistent offensive threat, and the 3-point arcs on the Memorial Coliseum floor were just meaningless curved lines painted on hardwood.

Coach Bernadette Mattox knew she needed another dimension in her team's attack. She needed a perimeter player.

Luckily for Mattox, she found a Potts of gold at the end of her troubles.

Freshman guard Sara Potts has given UK the long-range lift that it clearly lacked last season. The all-time leading scorer at Rochester High School in Rochester Hills, Mich., Potts has in 22 collegiate games hit just four fewer 3s (44) than the entire Cat squad did a year ago.

"(My success) is a surprise to me just because the (Southeastern Conference) is such a tough league," Potts said. "It was tough coming out here because the competition was so great. I just stepped up and it got easier once I got started."

Potts, currently fifth in the SEC in 3s made, has used her 6-0 stature, quick release and accurate aim to supplant herself in the Cats' starting lineup.

"We probably watched her for four years," Mattox said of Potts' recruitment, "watching her progress, and knowing immediately she would be a big-time player not only in Division

I but in our conference."

Potts lived in Louisville as a child before moving to Michigan. She said her constant affection for Kentucky was a factor in choosing Lexington as her college town.

"When I was little, I always wanted to come here," she said. But just as Potts began to make a name for herself on the court, her first season was threatened by a nagging December stress injury to her left foot.

With the constant pain, her minutes were greatly reduced.

"What I did to it I'm really not sure, but I couldn't walk. When I tried to run or push off the top of toes, it felt like something was jolting right up the middle of my foot," Potts said.

Mattox said the Cats (8-15, 1-10 SEC) felt the loss of its best perimeter shooter.

"(I knew) with her versatility, the team was going to miss her," Mattox said. "That was evident in December and January, and in February, having her back brings a lot more confidence to the team."

As her health has improved, so has her scoring.

Over UK's last four games, Potts has averaged 14.8 points per game, including a career-high 21 against South Carolina.

Potts' talent is a key to UK shuffling off its nine straight conference losses with a win against No. 14 Florida (16-7, 6-4 SEC) tonight in Gainesville.

"You have to have the ability to score, to post up, to shoot. She's very good at all those, and I know she's going to get even better," Mattox said.

## Moseley misses medals but steals show

PARK CITY, Utah -- Jonny Moseley stole the show with his Dinner Roll on Tuesday. Then a fellow American, Travis Mayer, came along and bumped Moseley off the medals stand.

Skating the last run of the day, Mayer won the silver medal in Olympics men's moguls, behind gold medalist Janne Lahtela of Finland.

Richard Gay of France won bronze, leaving Moseley in fourth even after pulling off his revolutionary jump without a hitch.

"I thought I stuck two sweet jumps today," said Moseley, the trendsetter who won gold four years ago in Nagano. "That was my personal goal -- to come out here and put on a good show."

Mayer's silver was something of a surprise. On the U.S. developmental team less than a year ago, he qualified for the Olympics at the Gold Cup in December, an event in which the winner gets an automatic spot in the games regardless of what he does the rest of the year.

"I was just hoping to come out and have a good time," Mayer said. "To make the Olympics was way beyond my expectations this year. I thought if I skied my best for a couple runs, that would be a great day. To end up second behind one of the greatest moguls skiers ever, it's the ultimate Olympic experience, pretty much."

Mayer won medal No. 7 of these Olympics for the Americans -- six of which have come in the new-age sports of freestyle skiing and snowboarding.

His surprise was a nice ending to an event that Moseley defined and energized, even though he didn't win anything

for his efforts.

In the seconds leading up to his historic run, the chant of "Mo-se-ley, Mo-se-ley" rang out from the rowdy flag-waving crowd that was pro-American, but really, more pro-Jonny.

Moseley smiled and pumped his fists, then pushed off from the starting line. For his top jump, Moseley executed a triple twister, flying off the ramp and moving the skis 90 degrees right, then left, then right again. That was the warmup.

The Dinner Roll was the main course -- revolutionary, controversial and exciting, and unlike anything anybody else tries.

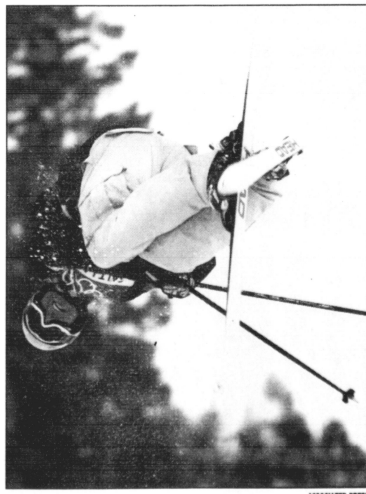
After approaching the second ramp, Moseley took off, got his body almost parallel to the ground and did two side rolls, the first with his skis crossed, the second with them parallel.

The crowd gasped, then went wild after the smooth, successful landing.

Always the showman, Moseley headed straight toward the stands when he finished, where he started high-fiving everyone. He even thought about jumping the fence to celebrate, before an Olympic worker talked him out of it.

For 15 magical moments, Moseley was in first place with a score of 28.78, and his quest to push this sport into the future with the unheard-of jump looked like it would pay off with more than just good publicity.

But Gay, who had never finished above fourth in world-class competition, knocked him out of first with the help of a triple-twister spread and a little bit faster time. Then, came Lahtela, the

1998 silver medalist, who is more technically precise than almost any skier in the world. He goes faster, smoother and more upright between the bumps. A quad-twist at the top and a triple-twister spread -- both conventional jumps, but very difficult to pull off success-

fully -- put him over the top.

He was the winner, but like everyone else, he knew the Dinner Roll was the talk of the slope.

"It's a great jump, no doubt about that," Lahtela said. "But you need a lot more than one jump to win the competition."

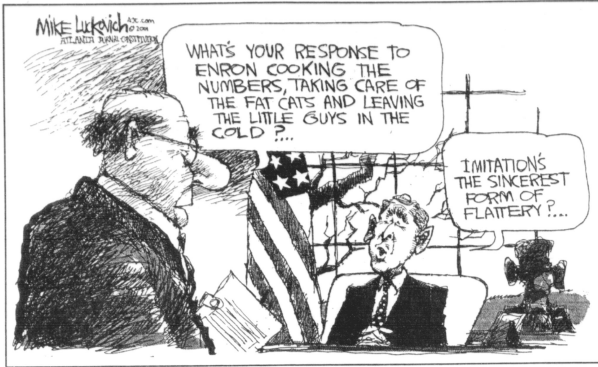
## Valentine's Day

# Motivate students to head downtown

*Todd wants to make Lexington a college town, though it'll take more than just a few shrubs*

Ever wonder what life would be like in a college town that actually resembled a college town?

So have President Lee Todd and Lexington Mayor Pam Miller, who recently announced a plan to give UK and surrounding areas the "college town" atmosphere that is so prevalent in many other cities with major universities.

The mold, apparently, is Yale University in New Haven, Conn. Michael Morland, the vice president of Yale University for New Haven State Affairs, said that to create a stronger New Haven, Yale focused on economic development, strong neighborhoods and a vital downtown.

UK should do the same. For years, Rupp Arena has been the only thing in downtown Lexington to draw students. UK should work with the city government and business groups to try to draw student-oriented businesses to the downtown area.

This does not mean simply more bars, of course. If UK students need anything besides groceries, they often have to travel down Nicholasville road or further just to do their shopping. A few well-placed stores would certainly tweak the interest of many students.

But Todd cannot bring life to the area surrounding campus on his own. Lexington needs entrepreneurs to spark a revival of campus and plan out an agenda that will work with what exists now.

Many of the proposed changes are cosmetic, consisting of sketched-in grassy boundaries and walkways. A pretty campus is always nice, but it is not the hook that will keep students on campus for more than two years.

A strong step might be to improve or replace existing dorms so students will stay on campus after their sophomore year. Many students move to apartments or other off-campus housing as upperclassmen. Air conditioning and carpeting of certain dorms and a relaxed visitation policy would encourage them to stay in university sponsored housing past their first two years at UK.

To accommodate students staying on campus longer, UK and SAB should look into providing activities on and around campus on the weekends. The desolation of campus on weekends certainly does nothing to make students want to stay in the dorms longer.

With Todd's leadership, and the cooperation of the downtown area, UK can develop a successful relationship with surrounding areas of Lexington. Maybe then this college town might actually have something for those in college.

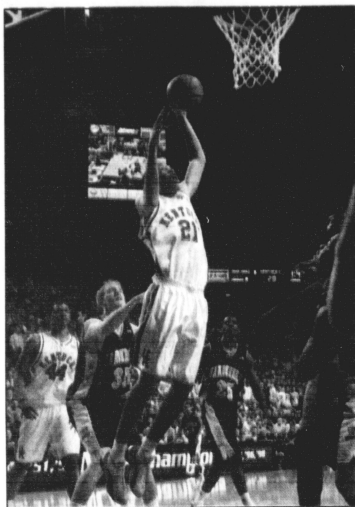

### Bogans, Carruth return to UK lineup

It's been 11 days since UK freshman guard Rashaad Carruth saw the hardwood in a game situation, and it showed. Carruth, who had been benched the last two games for missing curfew and skipping a practice, returned to action at the 12:36 mark of the first half in UK's win over the Vanderbilt Commodores, which delighted the Big Blue faithful in Rupp Arena Wednesday.

While his final stat line wasn't impressive, two points on 0-of-3 shooting in nine minutes, Carruth said he was just happy to get back out on the floor. "It was like a blessing from God," he said. "It's a good feeling to be accepted by the fans and accepted by my teammates. It makes me just want to play more."

For that to happen, Carruth knows he has to stay on Coach Tubby Smith's good side.

"Me and Coach are just trying to understand each other," he said. "I was wrong, but I just have to learn from it. As long as I'm going in the right direction, I think he'll be willing to help me out."

Another Cat who found himself up Tubby's tree this

week was junior guard Keith Bogans. After being benched for the final 18 minutes of last Saturday's game against LSU, Bogans came back and had a solid performance against Vandy, finishing with 12 points on 3-of-6 shooting, in 27 minutes.

As solid as Bogans' numbers were on the offensive side of the ball, it was his defense that had Smith singing his praises.

"I thought Keith played well tonight," he said. "I thought he was very active defensively. If I had to give a best defender award tonight he would get it."

Bogans said that all he wanted to do against Vanderbilt was let Smith know he had his head on straight. "I just wanted to let Coach and I know that I was ready to play after sitting that long," Smith said. "I hope it doesn't ever happen again, but I just wanted to let him know that I came to play."

With what transpired on the floor Wednesday, the Cats would seem to be coming together and Smith confirmed that assumption.

"I like the way we're coming together," he said. "We all seem to be on the same page now."

### Stoppers: Cats struggle to rebound, score; but able to throttle SEC's best 3-point team

UK can thank its defense for Wednesday's 67-59 victory against Vanderbilt.

The No. 10 Cats (17-6, 7-4 Southeastern Conference) made only 20-of-51 field goal attempts (38.2 percent) and were outrebounded 35-33 by the Commodores (14-10, 4-7 SEC), who have been outrebounded by 2.3 rebounds per game this season.

"Tonight no one's shot was falling, we were struggling at the line and the 3s weren't falling," senior guard J.P. Blevins said. "On nights like tonight you have to have a great defensive effort."

Vandy, the SEC's leader in 3-point shooting, made 7-of-22 3-point attempts (31.8 percent) and shot 21-of-59 (36.2 percent) overall. Senior forward Tayshaun Prince scored a game-high 20 points and junior guard Keith Bogans, who Coach Tubby Smith benched for the final 18 minutes of UK's game against Louisiana State Saturday, added 12.

Freshman sharpshooter saw his first action since UK's Feb. 2 game against South Carolina but didn't cure UK's shooting woes. He was 0-of-3 from the floor.

The Cats led for the entire second half and the final 13:53 of the first half but couldn't put the 'Dores away despite their defensive effort, which forced 17 Vandy turnovers.

"We didn't really capitalize on the opportunities we had, and we're struggling to score in transition," Smith said.

A Bogans 3 with 15:24 left in the game put UK up 44-30, the Cats' biggest lead of the night, but UK made only three field goals the rest of the way.

A 3 by senior guard Chuck Moore cut the Cats' lead to 56-52 with 2:59 left, but the 'Dores got no closer.

Junior center Jules Camara made two free throws on UK's next possession and a free throw by sophomore guard Cliff Hawkins with 1:49 left pushed the lead to 59-52.

On Vandy's next possession UK's defense tightened and forced Vandy freshman center David Przybyszewski to take a contested jumper as the shot clock expired.

Bogans secured the rebound and sophomore guard Gerald Fitch was fouled. Fitch made two free throws to give the Cats a 61-52 lead and put the game away.

Prince said careless ballhandling inhibited UK's play. The Cats had 11 turnovers against Vandy, and Prince said UK has a knack for losing it at the worst possible time.

"The turnovers we do make are at the wrong time — when teams are coming back or when teams are making a run."

UK's defense may have been the sole positive from the game, but Smith said he's pleased with his team.

"We really seem to be all on the same page now — we just need to make shots," he said. "Tonight was one of the better family, pulling together for one another, working together defensively (efforts of the season)."
