to me. Please forgive me for not answering
your letter that I received a year ago. It
was not because I have not thought of
you all many times. but I have some
sad news to tell you about two weeks
after I got your letter. I was taken sick
with the Rheumatic fever and for 9 weeks
I was not moved. or had my bed made and
it drew my left limb up. so I have
not taken a step for a year. the middle
of this month. and the Dr's say I never
can again. It almost breaks my

heart to think of it. I suffered terribly
as one through I could live through it.
but I was spared for something -

Every one feel bad for me and
are very kind and I have every thing
done for me to make me comfortable
but it is so sad to be in this way
with my little family

I wish I could see you all
and I often think of you. and our good
times. How is Aunt Annie and Uncle
James. How I want to see them.

Kiss them both for me.

Wont you and Willie send your
pictures to me? I want to see if you
have changed

My little children grow like
wax. Mabel is 11. Sadie 10. Georgie 8.

They are attending school and are
nice little children - and I love them -

How nice it seems to have the snow gone
but it makes me cry every day to think
I can not get out and walk. I can
ride. but have to be lifted in and out
of the carriage and I weigh 75 lbs
so you see I am helpless.

you must all be very careful

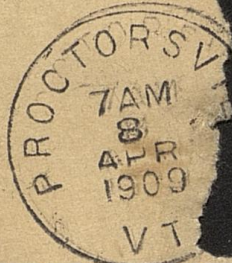

the launch and went down the lake

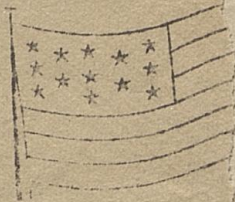
The hills are covered with flowers

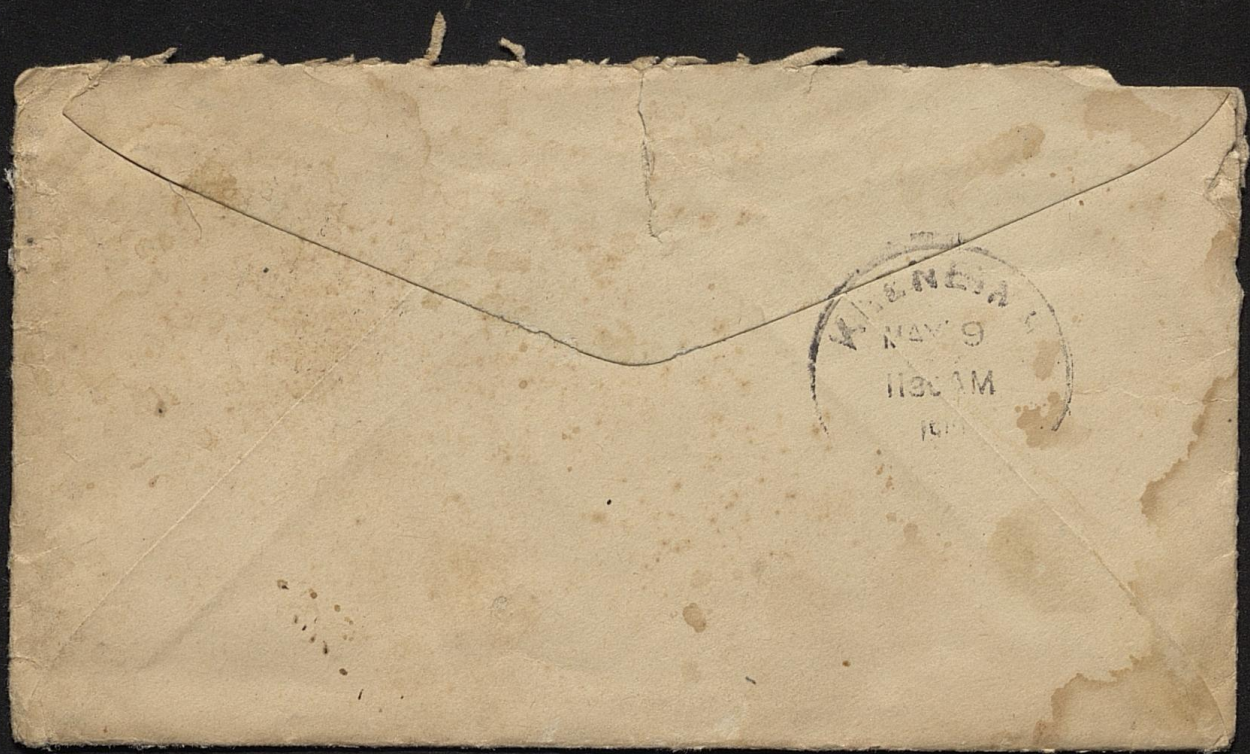

Leon and little Anniest merray

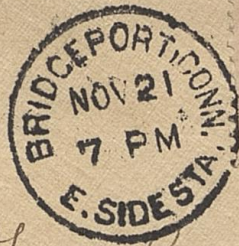

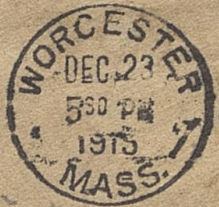

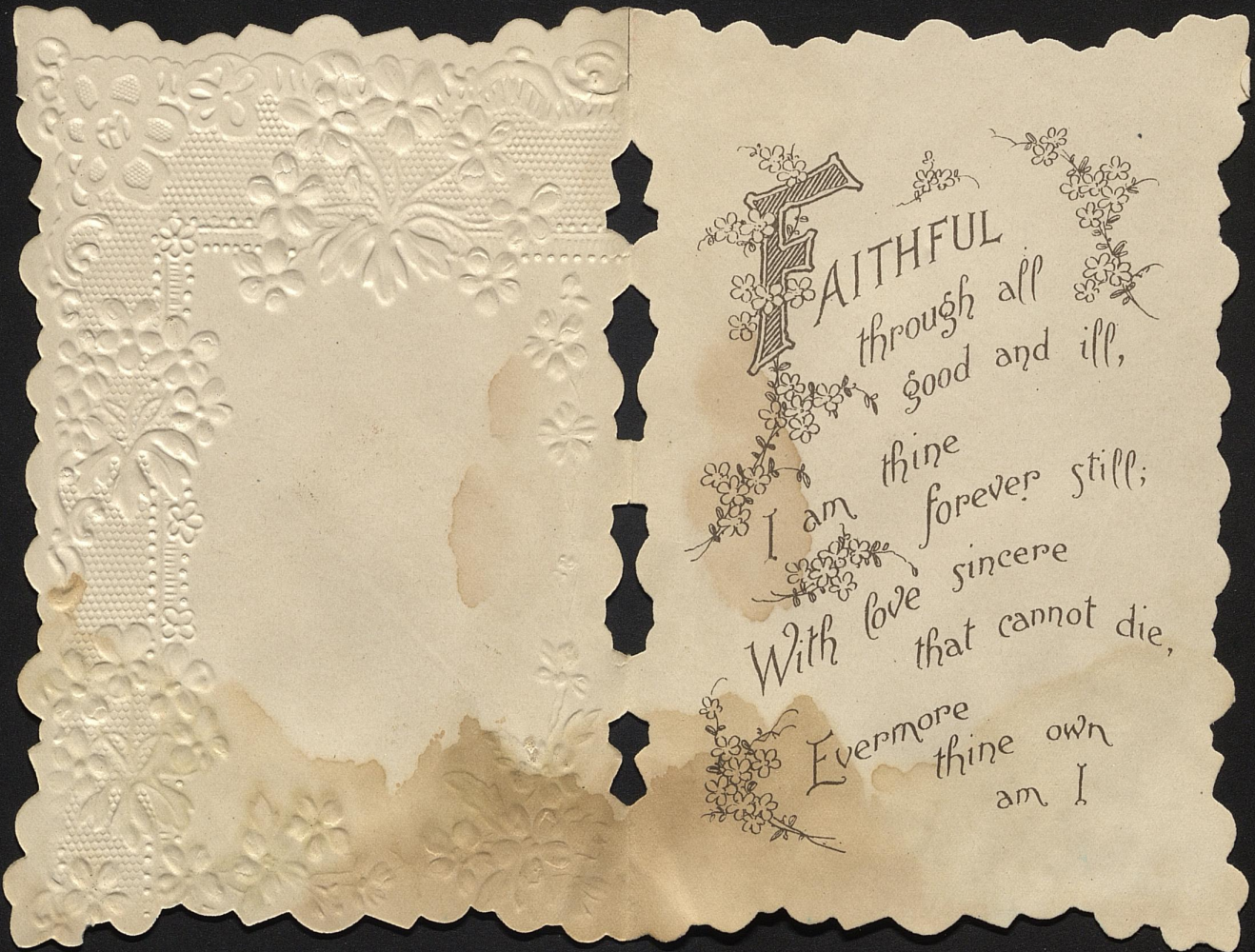
