tomorrow night.

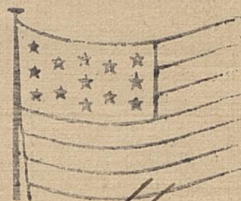

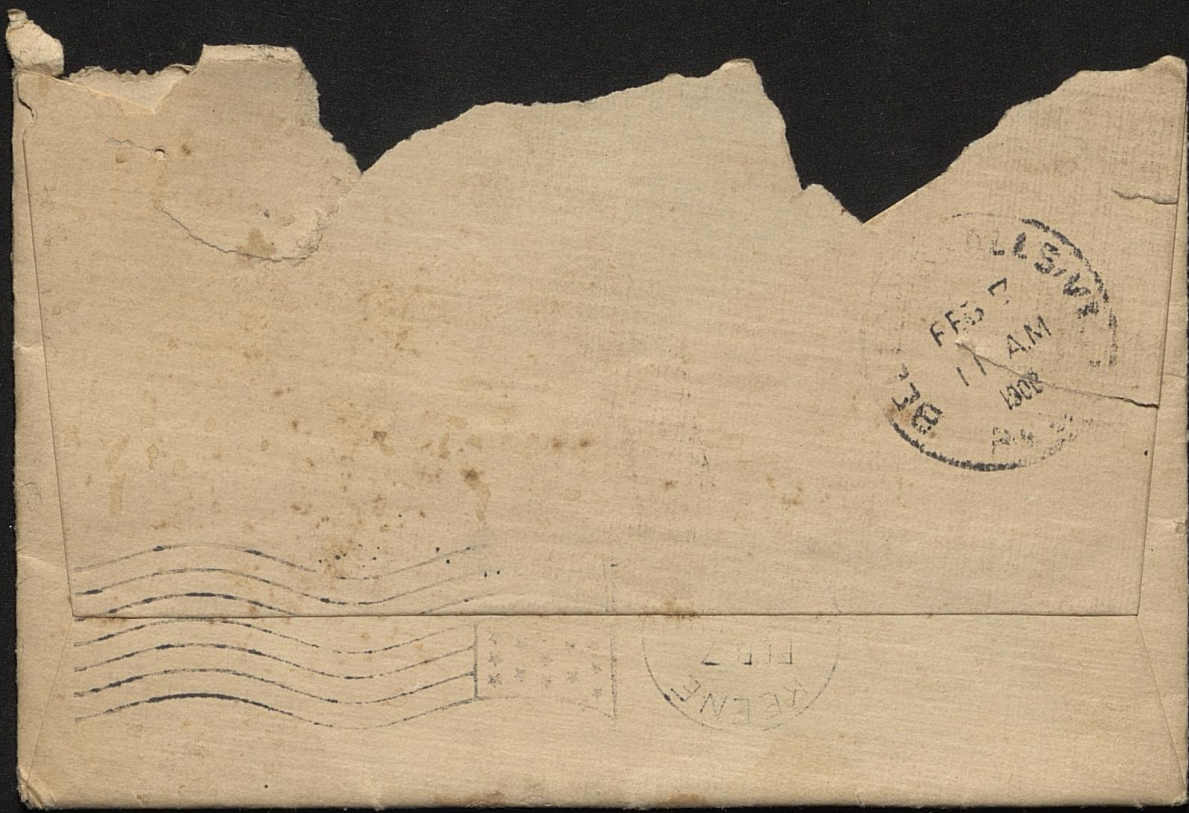
I went to bed in pretty good season. Yesterday morning it was snowing.

She did not say a word about the letter. I don't think she has any idea that I know anything about it now.

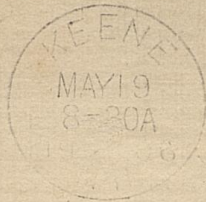
Tomorrow night at this time I shall be home.
