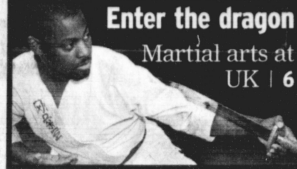

Todd names top 20 task force leaders

How to get there: Group to recommend criteria to measure UK's progress toward national goal

UK President Lee Todd announced July 5 the formation of a UK Top 20 task force.

The task force committee will focus on assessing UK's progress in defining and attaining recognition as one of the na-

tion's top 20 public research universities.

"I said all along nobody's really defined what that (top 20 status) means," Todd said.

Todd said the committee will also look at factors that measure UK's status as a university.

The group will be co-chaired by Phyllis Nash, the associate

vice president for academic and student affairs, and Mike Nietzel, UK's acting provost. The composition of the committee has not been determined, but it will have major representation from the academic deans.

Todd said success will not only be determined by the amount of federal research funds raised, but also the effect UK has on the state.

"We should be making lives better," he said.

Nietzel said achieving top 20 status is important for UK's fu-

ture.

"It is an indication that you have faculty and students who are among the very best in the nation and are prepared to advance the progress for the state," he said.

The committee will have many things to consider, said Richard Furst, the dean of the College of Business and Economics.

"I think what the president wants us to do is several things," Furst said. "To determine whether or not we're making progress towards the goal, how

we define the goal and what allocations we will have to make internally to meet the goals."

The committee will consider what sort of benefits will come, Nietzel said.

"The task force is going to need to find the right balance that, with those criteria and measures, will gauge on how good of a job we do in improving the lives of Kentuckians," Nietzel said.

The top 20 task force has until Dec. 31 to submit a report of its findings to Todd.

UK administration undergoes changes

The first major change during the transition from former UK President Charles Wethington to Lee Todd has taken place and the effects are dramatic.

Todd presented a plan for a reorganization of the UK administrative structure to the executive committee of the Board of Trustees at a July 5 meeting. The group unanimously approved the plan.

The major change between the past structure and the new one is the adoption of a provost system. The system will include a provost, or chief academic officer, who oversees the academics of the university and reports directly to the president. The plan differs from the chancellor system employed by Wethington, which called for chancellors to oversee the Lexington campus and medical center.

Todd said he believes the new system will enhance communication between all people at UK.

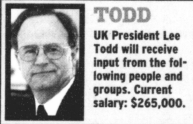
"When I sit down with this management, I want Jim Holsinger (senior vice president and chancellor of the medical center) to give us his ideas about what the whole university is doing," Todd said.

Though Holsinger, who was previously the chancellor of the medical center, will still be referred to as chancellor, the addition of the title of senior vice president will allow Holsinger to provide his input on the university as a whole.

Todd named Michael Nietzel, formerly the dean of the Graduate School, as the acting provost. A nationwide search will begin soon to find a permanent provost. Nietzel said he does not intend to apply for the

STATUS OF WOMEN
A commission on the status of women will be formed to advise Todd on "issues of particular importance to women at UK," including gender equity in employment and working environment. Membership has not been determined at this time.

DIVERSITY
A commission on diversity will be formed to advise Todd on "issues of particular importance for the UK's commitment to be a champion for diversity," including racial and ethnic diversity. Membership has not been determined at this time.

Task force formed to study insurance plans

Advising the president: Members pleased with composition, look forward to meeting

There could be more changes in university health care.

President Lee Todd announced July 3 the formation of a UK health care task force.

The committee includes representatives of all UK's employee groups and will be chaired by Thomas Samuel, an associate professor in Health Services Management.

"It is a very broad-based committee and that's good," said Bill Fortune, a committee member and the chair of the University Senate. "It has people who have been very outspoken on health care issues and many that are very knowledgeable ... it's a good start."

The committee was started in response to concerns that needed to be addressed, Todd said.

The group will issue a report with recommendations to Todd by Dec. 31.

The health care changes have affected UK faculty and staff from all areas, said Roberta Young, a Physical Plant senior custodian of supervisors.

President seeks advice about status of women

New group: Members will study gender issues such as pay, working environment

UK President Lee Todd announced July 5 the creation of a commission on the status of women at UK.

The commission will consist of staff, faculty and students who have a strong interest and understanding in issues of gender equity.

The committee's main function will be to advise Todd on matters of importance to women on campus. Three broad issues have been proposed — gender equity in employment, working environment and campus leadership positions.

The committee is also planning to examine gender issues involving UK's media outlets, cultural affairs, academic opportunities and awards.

Susan Scollay, chair of the Senate Council ad hoc committee on the status of women, said she is excited about the commission.

"I think it's a great first step," Scollay said.

Scollay said the necessity of the commission was evident due to two reports released by the ad hoc committee.

The studies were completed in 1990 and 2000. The first was a comprehensive assessment of the status of women employees. The second found many gender equity problems highlighted in the first report still existed.

"Both reports recommended a commission on women be appointed," said Carolyn Bratt, co-chair of the ad hoc committee.

The prior administration was aware of the evidence but failed to respond, said Bratt.

Joan Callahan, director of the Women's Studies department, said the new president's actions are encouraging.

"All the signs are very good that Lee Todd is going to take the issues of gender and diversity seriously," Callahan said.

ROAD TRIP #2

Cumberland Falls offers activities for those who enjoy beauty of nature

Making a weekend out of it: Hop in the car for two hours, pay for gas, and take time to fish, camp, ride horses, or view the scenery

This weekend's excitement could be as close as Corbin, Ky., in the Daniel Boone National Forest.

Whitewater rafting, camping, fishing, nature trails and a waterfall are just some of the features of the Cumberland Falls State Resort Park.

"It is very relaxing and it's great to go and just get away," said Valerie Long, a journalism senior.

One of the most popular sites at the park is Cumberland Falls. The 125-foot-wide waterfall drops 60 feet into the water below. It is often referred to as the "Niagara of the South."

"It's massive," Long said. "It's beautiful, especially to watch during sunset."

The park is also a great place for moonlit walks along the Moonbow Trails. These are made even more beautiful by the "moonbow." A moonbow occurs when mist from the falls create what appears to be a rainbow around the moon. It is best seen on clear nights, and moonbow dates are also posted on the park's official web site.

After a moonlit walk, one can stroll off to bed, because the park has camping to suit the rugged and cottages for the more conventional.

There are 50 campsites with electric and water hookups and cottages that feature maid services.

"It's the real deal camping kind of stuff," said Doug Heilman, a civil engineering senior. "It's just the woods and you."

Heilman said he saw places with more conveniences, but suggested that people just pitch a tent and camp out.

After sleeping under the stars, the next day can begin with backpacking and hiking along any or all of the 17 miles of nature trails.

"It's nice to just take a hike," Long said.

People can also fish in the Cumberland River.

The river is known for its bass, catfish, roughfish and panfish.

Fish aren't the only animals around, though. Guided horseback riding is offered daily until Labor Day.

"The restaurant is really good and the lodge is beautiful," said Robyn Holt, a psychology senior.

Holt said the Cumberland Falls State Resort Park "is exactly two hours from Lexington and a road trip you wouldn't want to miss."

position.

Todd said the reorganization will save UK around \$1.25 million.

"Through attrition and retirements, we've reduced the cost of administration," Todd said.

The reorganization takes advantage of the retirement of several employees such as Juanita Fleming, who served as an academic affairs special assistant to Wethington. Her position will not be filled. Installing the provost, rather than a chancellor, also eliminates the position of chancellor of the Lexington campus, which was vacated when Elisabeth Zinser, the former chancellor, left UK.

The structural changes were not without controversy, though.

Todd combined the positions of vice president for fiscal affairs and vice president of information systems. Eugene Williams, the former vice president of information systems, was given the job.

George DeBin, the former vice president for fiscal affairs, will be placed on special assignment for the next three to six months.

The position of vice president of research and graduate studies, formerly held by Fitzgerald

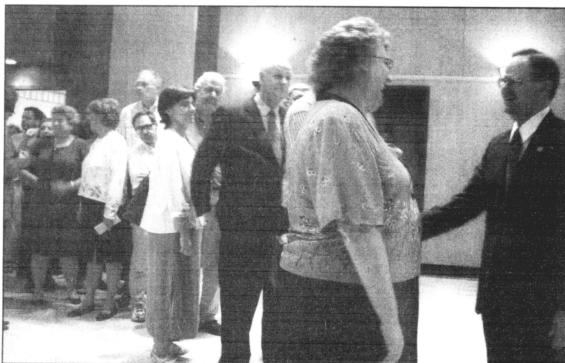

ald Bramwell, was also eliminated when the position of vice president for research was created.

James Boling, the former vice chancellor of research and graduate studies, will be the vice president for research. Bramwell was

the highest-ranking black administrator at UK. It is unclear at this time what Bramwell's future with UK will entail.

While the streamlining of the administration has left some people apprehensive, most are ap-

plauding Todd's efforts.

"I think the reorganization is going to be very effective," Holsinger said. "He's put a tremendous amount of effort into it for the short time he's had to work on it."

"I want to come out of this feeling like we have a reasonable understanding on why the prices went up, a possible solution and a variety of insurances to choose from," Young said.

Todd and Samuel agree the committee will be very open and hope it will help gather information from those the health insurance policies affect.

"I think the key thing I want faculty and staff of the university to know is that we are, in fact, going to offer a forum for them to offer their facts and

feelings so we can consider these (when) making a recommendation to the president," Samuel said.

Faculty and staff must be privy to the findings and should participate because this will affect them and their family's health care, he said.

"We want as much exposure as possible to the university," Samuels said. "We want them to understand what we're doing."

The first meeting has not yet been planned, but most seem eager to search for a solution.

"I'm sure we're going to come up with a responsible end to this," Young said. "It will be a win-win situation for everyone ... that's what I'm hoping."

Aerosmith makes for a good show on the new 'Play' tour

Going down: Tyler and company show fans both young and old they aren't losing steam

Rock and Roll Hall of Fame members invaded Indiana Monday night and made a crowd go crazy for "Crazy."

Aerosmith, one of modern rock's oldest bands, played the Verizon Wireless Music Center in Noblesville, Ind., before a crowd of thousands. The group performed a number of old favorites, as well as many cuts from their new album, "Just Push Play."

In the past, many have questioned Aerosmith's aging status and asked if the band can still bring in the people. An eight-mile backup on Interstate 69 of fans waiting to park at the concert venue is a clear answer.

The band electrified the crowd with performances of old favorites such as "Walk

This Way" and "Love In An Elevator." All the songs had the feel of a concert, due to guitarist Joe Perry often breaking into spectacular guitar riffs and drummer Joey Kramer into drum solos.

Steven Tyler was colorful as always; as Aerosmith's front man, he engaged the crowd with his usual onstage antics such as dancing. During the performance of "Crazy," Tyler began the song a cappella and sang along with the crowd, even asking the fans to go ahead and finish the verse. Another incredible moment was the beginning of the 1973 ballad "Dream On." Within seconds, the outdoor venue was awash in light from lighters held high above the heads of fans.

The fans themselves were an interesting bunch. During one portion of the show, I was sandwiched between a man in

his early 50s and a 22-year-old girl. The crowd was as diverse as possible with fans from way back and ones that are just now getting hooked thanks to the band's first "Just Push Play" release, "Jaded."

The only sour note about the concert came because of the venue. The lighting and sound were fine, though there was a great deal of reverberation at times, but the long line of cars, due to the venue's location and what some would call inadequate parking, caused many fans, including myself, to miss the beginning of the show. Fuel served as the opening act, performing a number of songs from their newest release, "Something Like Human."

One tip for future concertgoers: Take exit five on I-69 north, rather than exit 10, or try traveling on I-69 south.

Aerosmith, with Fuel, performs at 7:30 p.m. Sept. 7 at Riverbend in Cincinnati. Tickets are on sale now and range from \$30-\$75.

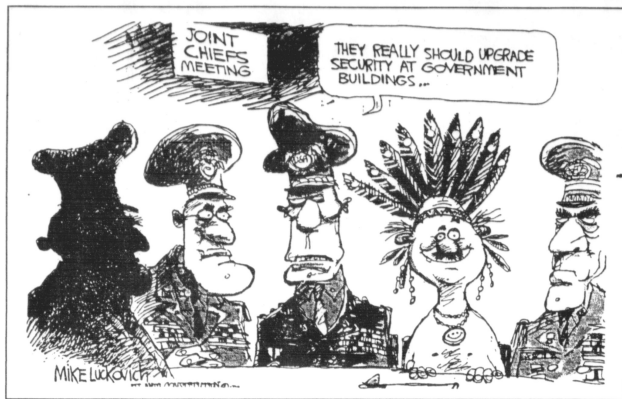

I don't believe I've ever met someone who has switched sides on this issue, at least not anyone who really cared to begin with, and I don't expect to.

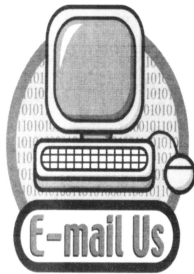
However, his column con-

Energy problems just need more time

An opinion should never be considered extreme just because it does not conform to the views of the majority. Even those ideas that can rightly be castigated are usually argued with an ounce or two of logic as well as a couple tons of passion.

Thus, I do not denounce out-of-hand the arguments of the environmental left, which perceives global warming as the gravest threat this world faces today and which sees corporations as its biggest driving force. They will look back on us and our inferiority and wonder how we even made it through the day. And, without a doubt, they too will see themselves as the end of civilization. And they will be wrong as well.

Martial arts clubs alive and kickin'

Wax on, wax off: Campus clubs looking to improve aspects of students' bodies and souls

One of the best ways to meet students at UK is through club sports.

For aspiring martial artists, several clubs are present on campus and searching for members.

The martial arts clubs at UK are designed to teach both novice and advanced members the mental and physical skills necessary to perfect a specific discipline.

The clubs, which are open to both men and women at UK and LCC, welcome students of all skill levels.

The Shaolin Do discipline is the basis for one of the more popular martial arts clubs on campus.

Jamie West, a 2nd-degree black belt in Shaolin, said that his discipline allows students to reap a variety of physical and mental benefits.

"You can get anything from it you want," West said. "Whether it's physical or spiritual, it means something different to everybody."

West said his discipline's training consists mostly of sparring, conditioning and perfecting ancient Shaolin routines called katas.

"We don't focus on the violent part of it," West said.

West, who has been active in Shaolin for eight years, said that he has never had to use his fighting skills in a threatening real-life situation.

Still, he said his Shaolin experience gives him supreme confidence should a real fight ever arise.

"It makes you confident if an attack ever occurred because you have so much faith in your balance and your health," West said.

For those students wishing to learn the fundamental skills of protection, the Kempo club should fill the void.

Jeremy Gallagher, Kempo club president, said that his group is based on the Kiyojute Ryu branch of the discipline, which was founded in Kentucky, and seeks to teach an array of self-defense skills.

Kempo students learn techniques for using body throws, blocks, joint locks, punches, kicks and weapons.

"We do all aspects of self-defense to where you are ready for a variety of attacks that come at you," said Gallagher, a 4th-degree black belt.

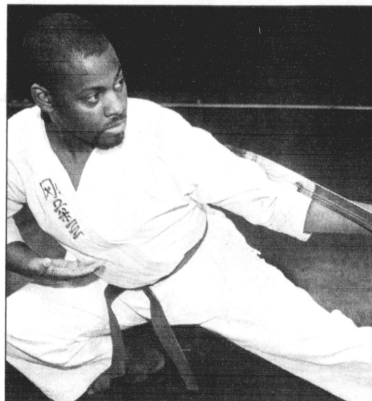
"The Kempo club stresses that the ultimate goal is not to hurt your opponent but just to protect yourself from harm."

"We use the absolute minimum force necessary," Gallagher said.

"We teach that you should be gentle, and not just go out and rough people up."

Another campus martial arts club devoted to the teaching of self-defense is the Tae Kwon Do club.

In its description, the Tae Kwon Do club said how the moniker of violent kicking and

punching as the basis of the discipline is really inaccurate.

The club said it attempts to teach students the importance of responsibility and honesty in order to gain harmony with society.

Martial arts clubs at UK are seeking to end the idea that these groups are just about violence and competition.

"The only person I'm competing against is myself," West said.
