

The following recommendations from the College of Law were approved:

1. Legal Research Course: A course in the use of legal reference books, one hour a week for two semesters, for which one credit will be given each semester. Neither credit, however, is to be counted toward graduation unless the work for both semesters is completed.

2. No student in the College of Law will be allowed to carry more than 16 hours of class work per week. The Dean may assign fourteen hours, but permission for one or two extra hours must be obtained from the University Council.

On motion it was voted to authorize the President to appoint a program committee to arrange for the University Assembly.

MINUTES OF THE SENATE NOVEMBER 10, 1922

The University Senate met in the Little Theater Friday, November 10, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of October 9 and Council minutes of October 6, 13, 20 were read and approved.

The petition from students to be allowed to organize a local fraternity, Sigma Beta Xi, which had been recommended to the Senate by the Council, was approved.

Senate approved a recommendation, suggested by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, that one additional member representing the city of Lexington be added to the Athletic Council.

The following recommendations of the Rules Committee were approved:

1. The Rule Governing Probation. The rule excluding students on probation from representing the University in any public way, shall be interpreted to apply to the freshman athletic teams as well as the varsity

2. The arrangement of schedules for the freshman athletic teams shall be in the hands of the Athletic Council.

3. To rescind the rule prohibiting scheduling of classes in which women are students for the 5th hour Thursday.

4. To rescind the following rule as a duplication of another rule:

"When a student has been absent from a class consecutively for a number of times the class is scheduled per week, the instructor shall notify the registrar, upon a form furnished for the purpose, and the student must obtain a reinstatement card from the registrar before returning to the class.

The registrar shall report the absence to the student's dean and notify the student to report to his dean, who shall investigate the case and advise action under one of the following heads:

1. To the registrar that the student continue in the course.
2. To the registrar that the student be dropped from the course.
3. Report the case to the Committee on Attendance and Scholarship.

This is included in the following rule, which we would retain:

Reports on Unsatisfactory Scholarship and Attendance

Students who are doing unsatisfactory work, or who are irregular in attendance, are reported to the Registrar who arranges the names by colleges and presents them to the Council. Such a student is put under the special supervision of his Dean. If after a suitable length of time it becomes apparent that no improvement is being made, the student is reported by the Dean to the Committee on Scholarship and Attendance."

The following report of the Auditing Committee for Student Accounts was presented to the Senate:

October 20, 1922

"President Frank L. McVey
University of Kentucky

My dear President McVey:

The Auditing Committee for Student Accounts presents you here-with its annual report for transmittal to the University Senate.

The Committee has been in operation, under Senate rules, for the past three years. During the first two years its work was largely educational and corrective. The Committee has made some progress since its last report and the character of the reports of the student organizations has considerably improved. Students have been more careful in keeping their records and in retaining their vouchers.

Last year the Committee initiated the practice of publishing the reports of the various organizations. The published report was placed in the hands of the student body and the various organizations concerned. We think that the published report has made a good effect on the student body inasmuch as it places their accounts entirely open to the public inspection and encourages various organizations to keep their accounts in a manner which will be free from criticism.

There is one point that should be called specifically to your attention and that is that it is not always possible for the Auditing Committee to vouch for the correctness or for the fidelity of reports. The Auditing Committee merely passes upon such books, vouchers, and other material as the various organizations present to it, and it cannot undertake to vouch for the correctness of entries in the books under all circumstances. However, it always takes oc-

casation to inquire into such entries so far as it can do so. For this reason most reports are approved only insofar as is shown by the evidence submitted.

The Committee was not able to approve the report of the Freshman Class for last year because of the fact the reporting officer failed to comply with the instructions and submit vouchers for the examination of the Committee.

Attention is called to the financial condition of the Strollers. This organization has incurred an indebtedness of \$954.22. The deficit has been underwritten to a certain extent by a few loans which the organization has been able to make, but this does not alter the fact that the indebtedness has been incurred. Inasmuch as in the final analysis the University is in a measure responsible for any indebtedness incurred, and inasmuch as the University frequently has to pay debts incurred by student organizations, our Committee is inclined to recommend that some action be taken regarding the Strollers at the present time. The Strollers have requested through their faculty adviser, Professor Grahan, to be placed under the direction of the Department of University Extension. This Committee would recommend that such action be referred to the Committee on University Extension for consideration. The Committee also recommends that the Administrative authorities consider the advisability of placing the affairs of the Strollers in the hands of a faculty committee, such as is now in charge of the musical activities. Such a committee would be in a position to control the financial activities of the organization. The placing of their affairs in the hands of a faculty committee would not in any way interfere with the placing of the organization under the Department of University Extension, in case it should be desirable to do so.

The various reports of the organization concerned are attached in detail, and the Committee asks that the report be published as was done last year.

on the death of Dean W. T. Lafferty

Although Dean Lafferty's frail health was known to all members of the University community, his sudden passing came as a profound shock and filled our hearts with sorrow. For so long had he been our comrade in the work of building a University worthy of the name she bears; so unflinching have been his ambitions and his efforts and his loyalty, not only for the College of Law which he founded, but for the entire University of which he was a Trustee before a professor; so near to our hearts had he made a place for himself by his friendliness, his high-mindedness, his freedom from rancor, his unselfishness, his devotion to whatever tasks fell upon him.

We grieve over his going, yet we are glad beyond expression for his life and service.
