# Find solace in **UK's own** secret garden

Sandwiched between the chaos of South Limestone traffic and the gridlock of Rose Street is one man's solace — a 100-year-old garden.

"It's a nice cool oasis, on campus, in the middle of the city," biology professor Jim Krupa said.
There are over 400 different species in the garden — including every species Dogwood, White Oak, Black Oak and Georgia Oak trees.

Branches come from every direction over the garden's entrance. Green shrubs and plants are waist-high and tree branches hang 15 feet overhead. The chipping of birds and buzzing of grasshoppers drowns out the roar of car engines, creating a small get-away in the most unlikely of places.

"I maintain it, I take care of it, I decide which trees get planted, which trees get cut out, which to be trimmed," Krupa said.

The garden is now used mainly for classes and occasional visitors.

"It's for classes, education, public education, and for an escape," said Krupa.

Rob Paratley, an agriculture research specialist, brings his classes to the garden to quiz them on the plants. Derrick Meads, who works in the College of Design, and Shane Tedder, environmental coordinator in Resident Life, both use the garden as an on-campus getaway.

Though there are not current discussions of tearing down the building and its garden, Krupa said he's been told that it's always a possibility. If it were to happen, Krupa said, His efforts don't go unrecognized.

"One of the down sides to this quest for greatness is there's a lot of building," Meads said. "One of the down sides to this quest is every time a road is widened — a building built— green spaces are taken. It's a place people can go to get away from parking lots."


"As long as I'm here I'll probably continue to head that up." he said.

# Trial in plane plot trial may wait until '08

LONDON — Suspects in an
alleged plot to bomb US.-bound
jettiness are unlikely to face trial
before 2008, a prosecutor said in
court Monday.
Prosecutor Colin Gibbs, citing the large amount of evidence
in what police describe as a conspiracy involving at least 11
people, told a judge in London's
Old Bailey courthouse that the
trial could start as late as March
2008.
Defense lawyers expressed
concern that the suspects might
be held in jail without bail for
more than 18 months before trial.

Three other suspects facing the same charges are also scheduled to appear in court that day. Police have not announced whether they will bring charges against five other people still be-ing held following raids last month.

Thirty-two Canadian soldiers and one diplomat have been killed in Afghanistan since 2002.

Jack Layton, a member of Parliament from the opposition New Democratic Party, this weekend called Afghanistan "the wrong mission" for Canada, which has 2,300 troops in the country. Most are stationed near Kandahar in southern Afghanistan, a stronghold of the Tailbian. Layton called for a return home of the troops by February.

Defense Minister Gordon O'Connor toured Afghanistan this weekend to boost the morale of the soldiers and offered an up-beat assessment for the country.

"My expectation is that over the next year the security situation will improve." he told reporters in Kandahar. "I believe support for the mission is solid among Canadians."

In a similar incident earlier in the Afghan war, four Canadians soldiers were killed in 2002 when a U.S. plane mistakenly dropped a bomb on Canadian forces as they trained. That incident easted bitter feelings for many in Canada and has lingered as a rhetorical touchstone for those who oppose the alliance of Canada with the United

The Pluto we knew "died" last month at the hands of a bunch of astronomers in Prague who demoted it to a "dwarf planet."

So people gathered here to mourn.

As with any memorial service, you stop to review the life of the dearly departed. Pluto, which is solid and small and mostly made of the ce, the only planet past or present that had never been visited by human-made spacecraft, always held a certain mystery when it was a planet. And now that it is not, the world has shifted. Reality has tipped.



# Let flag-burning teacher return to classroom

Last month, two seventh-grade Louisville social studies classes were given a lesson on free
speech they won't soon forget.
Neither will their teacher.
Dan Holden, a teacher in the Jefferson County
Public School district since 1979, burned two small
American flags in his classroom and asked students
were an opinion paper about it, according to the
Louisville Courier-Journal.
The following Monday, more than 20 parents
showed up at Stuart Middle School to voice their
disapproval of the display. Citing the district's concern with Holden's "judgment of using that type of
demonstration in class," spokeswoman Lauren
Roberts told the Courier-Journal he had been temporarily assigned to a non-instructional role.
All too often, we hear media reports focusing
on American students' lack of knowledge when it

comes to civics.

A 1998 study by the National Alliance for Crivic Education found that 75 percent of the nation's students were at or below basic levels of civic knowledge. At the eighth-grade level, while 81 percent could identify Martin Latther King, Jr. someone who was concerned with the injustice of gergetation laws, only 6 percent could name two ways in which a nation benefits from having a constitution.

And a 2005 study by the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation revealed that nearly three-fourths of high school students either do not know how they feel about the First Amendment or admit they take it for granted.

Ironically, the same study found that 75 percent of students believe flag burning is illegal. In all the clamor about what to do about students' civic education, one seemingly constant signestion is directly related to classroom instruction. Teachers are advised to avoid a dry, historical fact-based approach to teaching history and politics in favor of a more hands-on and visual approach. It is argued that by immersing students in the lesson, they become more interested in the subject material.

We would be hard-pressed to find a more interesting and thought-provoking lesson than the one Holden had waiting for his students last month. To be clear, we are in no way endorsing flag burning. The American flag is a symbol of the freedoms that the Founders gave us more than two centuries ago. Its burning is, well, offensive.

But offensive speech is speech nonetheless. The Supreme Court ruled in 1989 that burning the flag as a means of protest is a perfectly legal form of political speech. And the annual spectacle of the Flag Desecration Amendment rises and falls right

Flag Descertaion Amendment rises and falls right along with summer temperatures.

Seeing an American flag burning rouses passions within Americans of all stripes. By having his students write an opinion paper on the demonstration. Holden was providing his 12- and 13-year-olds with a lesson on the First Amendment that most adults will never receive.

That is the mark of a good teacher. Holden should be reinstated to his teaching position, so his students, when they reach high school, will be part of the 25 percent who have a clear grasp of the First Amendment and understand its importance to the United States.




#### Men's golf heads to Japan







# Finding the Perfect Spot

As students make their way back to UK for another fun-filled year of Wildeat sports, parties and class, parking is probably the last thing on everyone's mind. However, there have been some parking changes over the summer that students should be aware of.

If you need to visit the parking office this year, they have moved. No longer located on the corner of Euclid and Rose, they have moved to parking structure number six, a new employee lot, located on Press Ave. at the corner of Press and Virginia. In front of parking structure number six is a new commuter lot (C-4), which will hopefully ease the pain of losing other parking around campus.


"Due to UK's hospital expanding, the university is losing a number of spots on Huguelet Drive," said Don Thornton of UK Parking and Transportation Services. According to UK Parking's web site, about 130 spots are being permanently removed from the Huguelet Drive area across from Donovan and Haggin Halls and on Kentucky Clinic Drive near Scovell Hall. The elimination of parking spaces primarily impacts those with UK disability permits and residential

(R10) permits. The metered spaces on Huguelet Drive will also be removed.

Along with the loss of parking, Rose Street is due to be permanently closed between Huguelet Drive and South Limestone by the end of September. This portion of Rose Street will become an "internal traffic only" service drive, serving current and future Medical Center, hospital and academic needs only.


The new basketball practice facility has temporarily taken away some parking. "Although the project has eliminated a large number of spaces behind Memorial Coliseum, some of those spaces will exist again after the project is completed," said Thornton.

Over the summer, UK Parking and Transportation Services has also "converted a substantial number of metered parking spaces to permit parking spaces in the green and red lots," said Thornton. The green lot is located between Bluegrass Community and Technical College and Commonwealth Stadium. The red lot is for K-lot passes. "Changing these spaces will let students park closer to the dorms on south campus," said Thornton.









# Notice Student Group Health Insurance Fall 2006 Enrollment

**University Health Service** can assist students in obtaining health insurance coverage. The 2006-2007 annual plan continues with The Mega Life and Health Insurance Company. University of Kentucky undergraduates and Bluegrass Community and Technical College students who are taking 6 credit hours or more are eligible for enrollment. Graduate students taking 3 hours or more are eligible to enroll. (Certain 0-credit hour graduate students may also qualify.) The following information will assist you in understanding the plan if you are enrolling for the first time. If you have already enrolled, this will serve as a reminder to reenroll for the upcoming year.

All international students on an F or J visa are automatically enrolled in the student insurance plan. Insurance cards can be acquired and dependent coverage may be purchased at the Office of International Affairs, 203 Bradley Hall. For more information, call the Office of International Affairs, 257-4067 Ext. 238.

All degree seeking students enrolled in the University of Kentucky Graduate School who are full teaching assistants, research assistants, graduate assistants, full institutional fellows, or a combination thereof, are eligible for funded insurance and are automatically enrolled in the insurance plan. Students who do not meet these eligibility criteria will not have their insurance paid by the University. Dependent coverage is available. For more information, call the Graduate School Funding Office, 257-3261 or visit www.research.uky.edu/gs/.

**Effective Date:** The policy effective date is August 26. If premium payment is received from a student enrolling voluntarily after that date, the date upon which the Company or designated University representative receives your payment becomes the effective date.

**How and Where to Pay:** Students wishing to voluntarily enroll must complete the enrollment information (available at University Health Service) and send it with payment to Student Insurance, P.O. 
Each staff member is updated on new English grammar, rules and handbooks by going to monthly workshops. Going to the Writing Center is voluntary but has a very high repeat rate







# Broaden Your Horizons

I know what you're thinking. At the mere mention of studying abroad, most students are quick to shake their heads. With the cost of tuition, books, room and board, rent, food ... and whatever else, students sometimes assume studying abroad is out of the question.

After poking around in UK's Office of International Affairs located in Bradley Hall, I was shocked about how easy and affordable Education Abroad really is. Even I, a student who dismissed the suggestion of Education Abroad long ago, have realized studying abroad is an option for each UK Student, and the benefits are just too great to pass up.

There are several reasons why students should study at least one semester in a country other than the United States. According to StudyAbroad.com, education abroad has a way of "broadening a student's intellectual horizons and deepens knowledge and understanding of international, political, and economic issues." Students typically find that Education Abroad matures them personally and intellectually as well

Students should study abroad not only for academic enrichment and personal growth, but also for career enhancement opportunities. Employers increasingly seek graduates who have studied abroad. And why wouldn't they? Such students are likely to have transnational competencies that graduate schools and employers value highly: cross-cultural communication skills, analytical skills, flexibility, resilience, as well as the ability to adapt to and deal with new circumstances (StudyAbroad.com). Employers are recognizing the importance of knowledge about international affairs and so is the United States government.

With increasing importance of knowledge on international affairs, the U.S. Senate has designated 2006 as the "Year of Study Abroad" (Senate Resolution 308). The Senate's Resolution asserts that "substantive research literature demonstrates that some of the core values and skills of higher education are enhanced by participation in study abroad programs." Even the U.S. government has recognized the importance of Education Abroad and is in the process of creating new federal funds to support Education Abroad programs.

Speaking of funds, how affordable is Education Abroad? Most students assume the cost is outrageous. This is one of the many misconceptions some students have about study abroad programs. During an interview with Dr. Janet Roccanova, UK's Director of Education Abroad, she informed me that one of her main goals is to "make sure education abroad is affordable to each student." Dr. Roccanova and the Education Abroad Advisors in Bradley Hall are willing to help students find the program that fits their personality and financial situation.

Not only is financial aid for education abroad accessible to all students, most all financial aid students already receive from scholarships, grants, etc. can be used for studying abroad. The education abroad advisors in Bradley Hall are very helpful in finding and financing the most suitable education abroad experience for each student. All you have to do is ask!

There are Education Abroad programs for each type of student. There are faculty-led EA programs, consortia programs like KIIS, CCSA, and ISEP, exchange programs that cost no more than paying your regular UK tuition, open programs that allow students more freedom, and even "island" programs where a student is grouped with other American students at all times. Also, if a student is worried that a semester could be too long of a stay away from home, there are also 1-8 week programs or year long programs for the reverse scenario. No matter what your ideal program is, there is something out there for you!

So why not spend one semester or simply a few weeks in Australia, Japan, Spain, or even Africa? All it takes is a little research and effort. If you have any interest in studying abroad but aren't sure about the details, take a little time out to go speak to one of the Education Abroad Advisors or visit www.uky.edu/IntlAffairs/EA. A world of opportunity is at your fingertips.

Also, be sure to stop by the Education Abroad Annual Fair on Tuesday, October 24, from 10:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. Enjoy live international music, international food and crafts, games, give-aways, and tons of important information on the walkway from Rose Street to Young Library. Don't miss out!

Other things students can take advantage of are the indoor track and the rock climbing wall. The wall staff gives instruction to beginners and makes sure that students are safe when scaling.


There are also little known activities that few people take advantage of during the school year. The Johnson Center offers free aerobics, kickboxing and yoga classes among others.

The official student identification card issued by the university is called a WildCard and can be made in room 107 of the Student Center. The WildCard Student ID Center is open Monday-Friday from 9 - 5 p.m. A photo id and a \$15 fee are required to have an id made. Replacement WildCards cost \$20. These IDs also double for plus accounts and may be used in a number of other ways.






