After 14 years without his son, eight years sitting in courtrooms and three trips to the Kentucky Supreme Court, Mike DiGiuro said he and his family can finally begin a new chapter in their lives.

With a \$63.4-million ruling last week, the family of Trent DiGiuro, a former UK offensive lineman, ended its legal battle against Shane Ragland.

Trent DiGiuro was shot and killed on Woodland Avenue in 1994. Ragland was convicted for Trent's murder in 2002, although that conviction was later overturned. Ragland then pleaded guilty to second-degree controlled the second-degree trenced to eight years in prison. He was given credit for his previous incarceration and is no longer in prison.

Don't get settled in just yet.


Residents in newly re-opened Jewell



Liquefied-coal industry gains momentum

WASHINGTON — High oil prices are energizing a nascent liquefied-coal industry that hopes to power trains, planes and automobiles from the nation's coal reserves, using modern-day offshoots of technology that powered Adolf Hidre's war machine.

The U.S. military and commercial airlines are looking at Juquefied coal and other alternative-fuel options to escape rising energy closts. The Crow Tribe recently signed a deal with an Australian company to build a \$7 billion coalto-liquid plant in Montana.

Nearly a dozen companies are pursuing plans for starting coal-to-liquid complexes early in the next decade to tap into a potential high-growth market fed by consumers seeking relief from gasoline prices, says Corey Henry, a spokesman for the National Mining Association, a leading member of the Coal-to-Liquids Coalition.

But whether the industry grows beyond its
infancy depends largely on its ability to convince skeptics including environmentalists
and Democratic congressional leaders that liqunefied coal can be produced cleanly without
contributing to global warming.

Industry supporters say it can, promoting
technology that strips out carbon dioxide and
other impurities. But the Natural Resources
Defense Council calls liquefied coal "the
height of folly," saying it would deepen the
country's dependency on fossil fuels.

"This is the filthiest, most impractical and
expensive way you could ever dream up to
make fuel," said Julia Bovey, the environmental group's Washington spokeswoman.

The liquefied-coal industry could be an
economic boost for coal-producing states such
as Illinois, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Wyoming. The U.S. has 27 percent
of the world's coal supply 493 billion tons and

is sometimes referred to as "the Saudi Arabia of coal."

In addition to abundant natural resources, industry advocates also ette readily available technology, notably the Fischer-Tropsch process, which has been used for nearly eight decades to convert host coal and natural gas into liquid fuel.

Invented in Germany in the 1920s by chemists Franz Fischer and Hans Tropsch, it was first used extensively by Nazí forces during World War II. German synthetic-fuel plants were frequent targets of Allied bombing raids.

raids.

Today, the world's biggest user of the Fis-cher-Tropsch process is South African energy giant Sasol. Planned U.S. coal-to-liquid plants will either use Fischer-Tropsch or a gasification process that converts coal into rasoline

gastineauton process and activates coal incigascoline.

Regardless of the choice of technology, coal-to-liquid proponents say, the result is an environmentally friendly fuel devoid of pollutants that contribute to global warming. Carbon dioxide from coal is pumped into the ground the technical term is sequestered and used to force out deposits of hard-to-get oil. Sulfur and other chemicals are also stripped out and developed into marketable byproducts.

Henry said the U.S. has made two previous, but unsuccessful, "kicks at the can" to develop a synthetic-fuel industry shortly after World War II and during the energy crisis of
the 1970s, when President Jimmy Carter established the Synthetic Fuels Corp. In both
cases, the efforts evaporated when oil again
became abundant and cheap.

By contrast, he says, the price of oil is
now "sky high." Also contributing to the
bright prospects for a 21st century synfuel
industry, Henry adds, is "the growing awareness of
Americans that they need to reduce their
dependence on foreign oil."

Todd can only lose by not entering drinking debate

Last semester ended and students packed up their belongings, took final exams and headed home. But one more family didn't welcome home their son. Brian Hardin died only a week before the end of school and the University of Kentucky added another tally to the list of student deaths.

Each year around 1,700 college students die in alcohol-related incidents on campuses throughout the nation. According to the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, 600,000 more are injured as a result of alcohol. College presidents around troot on the student of the Amethyst Initiative to say 18 may be the answer.

Lowering the legal drinking age is the solution, said Michael Giuliani, executive director of Choose Responsibility, the group overseing the project. The initiative is meant to start a dialogue about this national trend, and presidents of 128 universities including Duke, Syracuse, Ohio State and Murray State have signed on in support.

Not among the names on that list is UK President Lee Todd, who says he doesn't have enough "data" to join the debate. "CThe Amethyst Initiative) must have information that they think they can bring forward in order to make a real debate," Todd said.

Glennon to start at quarterback in Virginia Tech's opener

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Frank Beamer didn't surprise too many people when he announced that fifth-year seniories Sean Glennon will be Virgnian Tech's starting ouaretrackculories in Saturday's opener against East Carolina. The Hokies used both quarterbacks last season, enroute to an ACC championship, and with both playing well during camp, the expectation was that the duo would share time under center again this fall.

Even Glennon said last week that based on the way the two had been splitting practice reps evenly, he expected to be part of another two-man rotation.

Instead, the plan now is for Taylor to prepare all season as the back-up quarterback but play only if Glennon is seriously injured. Otherwise, he'll redshirt and senior Cory Holt would relieve Glennon in any mop-up Situations.

"They've competed," Beamer said. "They've both done well. If we can get this done... for the long-term good of the program, this is a good thing.
"Tyrod wants to do this; he wants to redshirt."
Glennon followed this plan himself in 2005, after being pressed into action as a true freshman the year before. In '05, Glennon backed up Marcus Vick but never needed to play, preserving his redshirt year.

Coaches had initially hoped to redshirt Taylor last season, but that plan was scrapped in Week 2 against LSU, when the Hokkes' offensive line couldn't protect Glennon. Taylor's quick feet and elusive moves provided a spark for Tech's offense while the line was developing.


He started five games last season — all Virginia Tech victories — and played in 11. Taylor completed 53.7 percent of his passes for 927 yards, 5 touchdowns and 3 interceptions. He also ran for 429 yards and 6

Quarterbacks coach Mike O'Cain said last week that Taylor's grapp of the playbook and his feel for opposing defenses have improved dramatically since last season, but that Glenon remained ahead of him mentally. Taylor just turned 19 at the start of fall camp.

Glennon, meanwhile, has started 22 games and played in 30. He has thrown for 4.124 career yards, 25 touchdowns and 16 interceptions. He played well down the stretch last season, earning MVP honors in the ACC championship game.







Cobb leads class of impact freshmen

Rich Brooks has never been shy about playing true freshmen. Around the country, coaches have differing opinions on playing kids fresh from high school campuses, but in re-building the UKP, program, true freshmen like running back Rafael Little and line-backer Wesley Woodyard have played key roles from their first days in Lexing-ton.

That's why, with UK facing a small-section.

That's why, with UK facing a small-scale rebuilding year in 2008, much of the offseason buzz has been about new-comers Randall Cobb, Auron Boyd and other young freshmen. As soon as one player leaves, his replacement is often searched for, leading fans and coaches looking for the next Keenan Burton and Andre Woodson.

Being a new face on a college cam-pus is a difficult task for almost all stu-dents, with classes of more than 200 stu-dents in unknown buildings. But at least two newcomers to the UK football team are looking to make an atypical splash this season, even if they re still nervous.

"I didn't get much sleep at first," said Cobb, who is expected to see time at quarterback, wide receiver and on special teams. "I had lots of excitement, looking around and remembering all the

fans I saw."

Cobb is one of a handful of incoming freshmen looking to make a quick impact for the Cats this season.

Aaron Boyd, Matt Roark, Gene Mc-Caskill and Eric Adeyemi are all vying for a spot at wide receiver, where the depth chart is wide open after senior Dicky Lyons Ir, and junior DeMoreo Ford.

Cobb is already slated as sophomore quarterback Mike Hartline's clear back-up, possibly even seeing significant

up, possibly even seeing significant snaps at that position vacated by the dis-missal of Curtis Pulley. When Cobb isn't practicing at quarterback, coaches are working him into the rotation at wide re-

practicing at quarterrack, coaches are working him into the rotation at wide receiver.

Brooks has said that he expects to play between seven and 10 true freshmen and so far, UK's newcomers are making the progress necessary to see the field.

Other impact freshmen include Matt Smith, who was moved to center in order to back-up starter Jorge Gonzalez, and Cartier Rice, who could see time at defensive back.

Reports out of fall practice have indicated that freshman linebacker Danny Trevathan has pushed his way into the conversation at middle linebacker, where defensive coordinator Steve Brown is still trying to build depth after Braxton

Kelley's switch to the outside.

Boyd and Cobb are the headliners out of the current freshmen class. From the moment each stepped on campus, they were pegged as impact players. That's led to high expectations from both fans and coaches. And that's OK with Cobb.

"You always have to put high expectations for yourself anyway." Cobb said.

Preseason magazines and national media list Boyd as one of the top-10 impact freshmen in the entire Southeastern Conference. Boyd knows about those lists and is pushing himself to become better to live up to the expectations.

"I expect nothing less than great from myself." Boyd said. "Looking around the Internet, I've seen myself as an impact player and le expect that."

Boyd missed part of fall practice after suffering from mononucleosis. He returned to practice last week, but only participated for non-contact drills. His status for the Louisville game is unclear.

While the expectations, both for themselves and those put on them, may be high, the goal for the talented freshmen remain the same as the rest of the team.

"I'm coming in to help the team get an SEC championship and a (Bowl Championship Series) bid." Cobb said.

Recycle: To sort or not to sort?

MINNEAPOLIS — The thought is a natural one for those going through the chore of sorting their recyclables. Do I have a fine the control of th

tions, but all those materials get smashed together inside, making them unusable, they argue.

The disagreement resurfaces periodically, as local governments bidding out the pickup contracts get thi with both sales pitches. And last month, Allied Waste said it's sweetening the pot by offering store coupons as customer rewards, which it's testing in three markets across the country, including the Twin Cities. The more a household recycles, the more coupons it wins, redeemable at scores of retailers as varied as grocery stores, Ikea and Target.com.

Looking for advice, cities went to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency as long as two years ago. The agency commissioned a report, by Tim Goodman & Associates in St. Louis Park, Minn., but by citing pros and cons for each it resolves little.

"Right now, personally, I would have to give the edge to two-sort, in terms of the quality of the actual recycled materials," Goodman said. "But people still have disagreements, and they feel very strongly one way or the other."

Americans produce an average of 4.6 pounds of trash per person per day, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Minnesota is near the top of the states in recycling its trash — at 45.2 percent of its solid waste, it is second



only to Oregon. Market forces may start bumping up rates everywhere, however.

Popular coupons among customers include local grocery stores, saving families as much as \$20 a month on their food bills, said Ron Gonen. CEO of the Penn-sylvania-based company.

Randy's Environmental Services just bet \$8 million on double-stream recycling with a trash hauling and recycling facility it opened last summer. "The value of the commodities is better protected with the two streams," said Jim Wollschlager, operations director. "We just feel it's the better way of recycling."






