

January 31, 1920

The Senate met in special session Saturday, January 31, at 11 o'clock, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of the meeting of December 16 and Council minutes of December 12, January 9 and 23, were read and approved.

Permission was granted the Staff and Crown, women's honorary society, to become a chapter of the Mortar Board, National honorary society.

Permission was given for the organization of the following fraternities:

Theta Sigma Phi - National honorary journalistic society
Kappa Zeta Rho - Local fraternity, with the object of becoming affiliated with the National fraternity, Phi Kappa Tau.

The following new courses in the College of Arts and Sciences to be offered next year, recommended by Dean Boyd, were approved:

- ↓ Bact. 6 - Bacteriology for Nurses. Credit changed from 3 to 4 credits.
- ↓ Ec. & Soc. 6 - Secretarial Accounting. Three credits, second semester.
- " " 108 - Insurance. Three credits, first semester.
- " " 151 - Poverty and Relief - Three credits, first semester. Replaces Social Dependence.
- " " 152 - Defective Classes. Three credits, first semester.
- " " 153 - Criminology and Penology. Three credits. Replaces Social Control.
- " " 155 a,b- Sociological Systems. Changed to year course, two hours per week.
- " " 156 a,b- Immigration and Americanization. Two hours per week, first and second semesters.

- ↓ English 19 - Speech composition. Three hours per week.

- " 7a,b - Engineering Geology. Changed to year course. Two hours per week. (changed from 3 to 2).

- ↓ Education 30 - Industrial Education. Three hours per week, first semester.

- ↓ Physics 10 - Elementary Physics. For Sophomore Agriculture students who have had no previous training in Physics. Lecture and recitations four hours, laboratory two hours a week.

- Psychology 3a,b - Experimental Psychology. Number changed from 101.
 " 4 - Psychology of Advertising. Changed from 107.
- Zoology 5 - Agricultur Zoology. For Agriculture students. Recitation three hours, laboratory two hours per week, second semester.
- Philosophy 105 - Philosophy of Religion. Three hours per week.
 " 106 - Representative Modern Philosophers. Three hours per week.

Dean Cooper offered the following new courses in the College of Agriculture, which were approved:

1. Reduce the number of credits required for graduation from 139.4 to 137.4, in order to reduce the maximum hours a student may carry to 17 in the sophomore year and to 13 in the junior and senior years.

2. Change zoology requirements from 8 credits to 4 credits for agricultural students, a new course to be given for this purpose.

3. The addition of a prescribed course of 5 credits in physics for all students who have not had a year of high-school physics.

4. The addition of Economics 1a as a required subject of all students to be taken in sophomore year or later.

5. Drop in Animal Husbandry:

Course 1, Market Classes of Beef Cattle, Sheep and Hogs.

- ✓ Course 51a and 51b, Extension Methods (2 credits each)
- " 52, Extension Seminar
- " 53, Office Administration. One lecture a week.
- " 54, Extension Laboratory.
- " 75, Special problems in cafeteria management. 1 hour, 15 hrs. lab

Extend Course 103, Food and Nutrition throughout the year.
Drop course 108, Textile Research.

The following report from the Committee on Accredited Relations, regarding the admission requirements was adopted.

CREDITS IN VOCATIONAL SUBJECTS

"A maximum of four units in vocational subjects may be accepted, with not more than two credits in any one subject, except that graduates from high schools maintaining standard courses in Smith-Hughes vocational subjects may offer as many as eight units in technical agriculture, household arts and related sciences. The agriculture offered will be in such subjects as animal husbandry, soils and crops, poultrying and dairying, farm management, farm mechanics and household arts. The related sciences will be in such subjects as sanitation and health, agricultural physics, farm engineering, economics, zoology, agricultural and household chemistry, and applied botany."

February 9, 1920

The Senate met Monday, February 9, President McVey presiding.

Minutes of the meeting of January 31 read and approved.

The recommendation of the Council in regard to credits for military service was approved. It is as follows:

"Credits in required military work may be given for service in the U. S. military or naval forces. Three months' service overseas, or six months' service in the United States, will be considered equivalent to the two years of required drill.

Candidates for such credit will submit duly authenticated copies of their discharge papers to the Commandant, who will send the credit to the Registrar for record."

The President suggested that a committee be appointed to prepare a list of one hundred names of the great men of the world and submit them to the students to select twenty-five that they consider the greatest, and that a prize of \$50 be offered.
