Dear Brother

Your letter rec'd a few days ago requesting me to buy ~~you~~ a lower wind shield (glass) for your 1917 Auto, I have seen a number of supply people in auto fixtures and they tell me you can do better there than here as none of them will cut the glass and guarantee it to fit. They will sell the glass and you can have it cut there, but they say that if you get the glass where you have it cut it will cost you less.

Getting glass from junk shops now is next to impossible at junk prices.

If you have an opportunity to sell your machine, don't hang on the glass; but the price \$10 or \$15, or \$25 or \$50 or if you make a quick deal. You have no use for the machine and charge the loss to lessons in the auto business and call it economy. You can get the glass set in at Glasgow and that beats doing uncertain business this far away.

It will not be long until you will be able to get machines at any price. If you have a chance to sell dont let the opportunity go by.

Machines are breaking up more people than any one thing.

If there were more wheel-barrow and fewer machines the Country would be better off.

Hope all are well. Write me all the oil news. Hope Grover will strike a gusher in the deep well.

Dont buy any thing unless you have to have it. Unless it is good land at a reasonable price. There is going to be a big drop in every thing except food which will be high.

Cows & Horses are very low and will be lower.

Merchandising has dropped about 25% since you were here. There will be jobs on the market this fall at a reasonable price.




My dear Mr. Railey:


