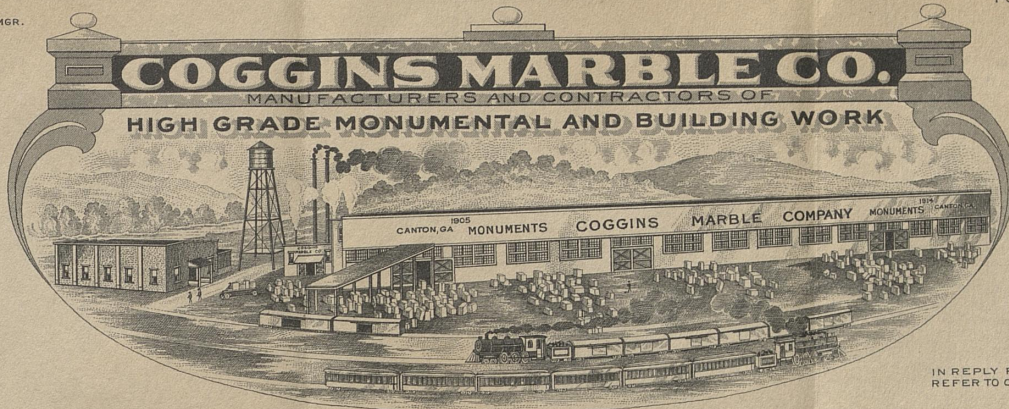

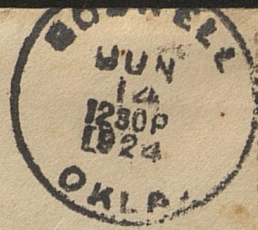

Dear Brothers:

We got a letter from both of you to-day. We are sorry to hear about May's being sick and in the Hospital, but we cant help it---we dont know a thing to do--bcause we dont know what the matter is---it may be physical-trouble, and it may be mental-trouble-- I dont know AT LONG RANGE what it is. But one thing I want you to do Grover, and that is find time to go round to see J.P. and let him know that you are there---abd that the rest(May) is there.

It is so important in a great City, where danger hourly lurks, to let all the folks know just where we are all the time----it is the successful-road through life----you never know when an accident or a death may come to either you or some of your folks--then if we know where evry body is all the time, we know just what to do in such cases-----so, therefore, just as soon as you can get a minutes-time----after you get this letter----go round to see Jesse and tell him WHERE you can be found most any time---this is very important now.

However, I am now paying no attention to Politics---looking all the time after my little Farm and Garden Business here, where I get my living. Write soon both of you.
