



HIGH POINTS IN U. OF K. HISTORY



PRESIDENT F. L. McVEY

The University of Kentucky which began as Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky, had its origin in the Morrill and Grant Act, July 2, 1862, under which act Kentucky's donation was 330,000 acres of land.

The Legislature accepted lands offered under the Morrill Act and combined the new college with Transylvania, and opened a new institution to be known as Kentucky University, October 1, 1866. This connection continued with Kentucky University until 1878, when a commission was appointed to recommend to the Legislature of 1879 and 1880 a plan of organization establishing an institution including the Agricultural and Mechanical College.

The City of Lexington gave to this commission the park containing 52 acres of land and \$30,000 worth of city bonds for the erection of buildings. This gift was supplemented by county bonds to the extent of \$20,000.

July 12, 1878, a Board of Management for the institution was organized. It elected a new faculty of seven members with the late James K. Patterson as president. Degree courses in 1880 were a classical and scientific course of four years each, leading to the degree of bach-

elor of arts and bachelor of science with degrees of master of arts and master of science conferred after an additional year's study. October 28, 1880, the cornerstone of the Administration Building, accommodating 600 students, was laid.

The period between 1900 and 1908 was an era of growth and expansion. The year 1908 was also an outstanding educational year in the history of Kentucky.

The name of the institution was changed from that of Agricultural and Mechanical Arts College to that of the State University, March 6, 1908. By an act of March 16, 1900, the General Assembly appropriated to the University the sum \$200,000 to be used for the erection of a mining and engineering building, a civil engineering and physics building and additions to the chemistry bulding. The same act established a department of education.


The period from 1917 to 1929 has been one of intense building activity upon the campus. A new building to house the College of Education and a new library building to house a million volumes are now in process of construction.

In the fall of 1917 President F. L. McVey assumed duties as chief executive of the University. He launched at once upon a program of development that has challenged the interest and admiration of the people of the entire State. During his stewardship the property of the University has increased in value from \$1,750,000 to more than \$4,000,000. She student enrollment has grown during his stewardship more than 178 per cent.

In 1918 the name of the institution was changed to the corporate title of "University of Kentucky."

Governing power of the University is vested in the Board of Trustees, consisting of fifteen members, three of whom act ex-officio, and twelve are appointed by the Governor, also ex-officio chairman of the board. From 1917 to 1929 increase in the number of instructors and students at the University far surpasses that of any previous period. October 20, 1919, the student body consisted of 724 men, 298 women, a total of 1,022. October, 1929, the enrollment was, women 1,017, men 1,882, total 2,899. The increase in total enrollment over 1919, 178 per cent; increase in enrollment of women at the same time, 240 per cent.

Kentucky's Football Coach



Coach Harry Gamage, University of Kentucky's grid mentor, came to Kentucky after successfully coaching the freshman football team at the University of Illinois. While at Illinois he was assistant to the famous Robert Zuppke. At Illinois he developed some excellent players who are now on the Varsity team there. Such players as "Frosty" Peters, Judd Timm and Lannum played on the freshman team he ccoahed in 1925. Mr. Gamage taught courses in the four year coaching course and also in the summer coaching courses offered

In his first season at Kentucky his team showed a fighting spirit that made them a dangerous opponent in any game. The team did not win a majority of the games but they showed the effects of splendid coaching and training. The best games were played against V. M. L. at Charleston, whom they defeated 25 to 0, and against Centre at Danville, whom they defeated 53 to 0. This was the largest score a Kentucky team had made against Centre since 1916.

Last season the team won four games, lost three and tied one, the tie game being the last of the season and against the University of Tennessee.

Coach Gamage is an aggressive leader, who is well liked by the men who play under him. His fighting spirit is contagious and he always turns out a determined eleven on the field to fight for the Blue and White. He is rapidly building up a new fighting tradition at Kentucky and future Wildcat elevens can be banked on to carry the Blue and White colors to their share of gridiron victories.

JOHN MAURER Basketball Coach

Basketball interest is steadily increasing at the University of Kentucky. Last season was a successful one considering the teams played and the number of games won and lost. During the regular playing season the Wildcats won 11 games and lost 4. Included in that list of victories were wins over the strong Notre Dame team at South Bend, 19-16. Notre Dame afterward defeated Michigan, Big Ten champions, and Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania, the two best teams in the East.

The other important victory was the win over the powerful Washington & Lee team by a score of 31-30. This team won all of its other games during the season and averaged 47 points a game against all its opponents.

In the Southern Conference tournament the Wildcats defeated Tulane29-15 and were eliminated in the second round by Georgia 26-424. The schedule for the coming season is probably as hard a one as any ever undertaken by a Wildcat team. Two games with Georgia, Tennessee, Mississippi A. & M., Clemson, and Creighton, along with single contests with Miami, Washington & Lee, Centre, Georgetown, and Georgia Tech comprise a schedule that will force the 'Cats to be at their best at all times.

With a freshman team who were rated on a par with the Varsity last year, prospects for a good track team for 1930 are very bright. Only two Varsity men who won letters were lost by graduation. The team of last year was very weak in the sprints and hurdles, and the freshman material looks as though it should develop and fill in with some much needed men.

Hayes Owens will captain the 1930 track team and should set a good example for the squad by setting a fast pace for the opposing milers. The following letter men will be back: Captain Owens, Thomasson, Jones, Cochran, McLane, Gibson, Smithers and Urevig. Also the following freshmen and men who were ineligible last year: Kelly, Andrews, Hieber, Thorn, Hayes, Pitcock, O'Brien, Gall, Morrison, Curtis, Butner, Cavana, Williams, Goldsmith, Porter, Roberts, Yates, Twaddell, Wright, Kistner and Nielander.

This year's schedule will include Vanderbilt, Tennessee, Sewanee, Georgia Tech Relays, Georgetown College, and possible some other relay meets.

The baseball prospects for the 1929 season looked anything but promising. There were no pitchers with college experience, not even one who had pitched in a college game. Also the catchers had graduated and a number of other positions had suffered through graduation. Under these conditions the Athletic Council selected John "Pat" Devereaux as baseball coach for the 1929 season. Coach Devereaux, from what was considered unlikely material, developed one of the best teams that has represented Kentucky. Only one game was lost during the season. Rhoads and McBrayer were developed into two promising pitchers. The entire team played smart, aggressive baseball. The success of the team was due to the splendid work of Coach Devereaux. A hustler himself, he inspires his players with that same alert spirit that wins basebaall games.
