Heather Reister decided to take a trip to Guatemala to build houses for the travel experience. But she said she returned with much more than souvenirs and snapshots.

"The residents of Jacaltenango are probably a lot happier than we are," said Reister, a journalism student who traveled to the Guatemala city with 14 other people from UK. "They're very poor, but they don't have the types of pressure for success and monetary wealth we have here."

The group, made up of people who met through a notice in the Catholic Newman Center's bulledin, returned from Guatemala a week ago, after spending 11 days there building relationships, hope and houses for Habitat for Humanity.

CHE chairman says tuition hike likely for '93-'94

State university students can expect to pay more for their education next year, the chairman of the state Council on Higher Education said last night.

At a statewide call-in show on KET, Chairman Joe Bill Campbell said the CHE likely will approve a proposal to change its tuition-setting policy and increase rates already set for the upcoming school year.

ready set for the upcoming school year.

Campbell labeled the state of higher education as a "crisis" after two straight years of severe budget cuts and said a tuition increase is "the direction we're headed.

"I think, at this day and time, it's really the most realistic approach we can take and the most responsible," Campbell said after the show.

Last night's show completed a series of hearings designed by the council to receive student input on the possibility of a tuition increase.

At the November CHE meeting,

At the November CHE meeting, the state university presidents recommended that tuition rates, already set for next year, be raised and that the council set tuition annually.

Currently, the council sets tuition every other year for the following two academic years.

Tuition for the 1993-94 school year could be increased by as much as \$60 per semester at community

colleges; \$130 per semester at the regional universities; and \$180 per semester at doctoral institutions, including UK. Tuition at UK for next year was set at the council's November 1991 meeting at \$920 per semester for instate students and \$2,760 for out-of-state students. The CHE will approve one of three options at its Feb. 8 meeting: one, to keep the current policy; two, to set tuition annually and raise rates for next year; or three, to set rates by other benchmark institutions and not by Kentucky per capital necome.

Campbell, along with council exceutive director Gary Cox and finance committee chairman J. David Porter, answered 16 questions from callers during the hourlong program. While none of the three said a decision has been made, the tone was one of an impending and inevitable increase.

"Most of the interest has been focused on option two," Cox said dur-

Clinton administration adheres to Bush policy in no-fly zone

WASHINGTON — On his first day in the Oval Office, President Clinton said yesterday his administration would not flinch from military showdowns with Iraq following a fresh challenge. The Senate rushed approval of more of his Cabinet but hundreds of senior positions semained vacant.

After partying into the early hours after his inauguration, Clinton spent all morning greeting thousands of visitors to a White House open house. Well-wishers waited out-

doors for hours on a cold winter day for a quick handshake and greeting from Clinton.

It was almost 1 p.m. before he paid his first visit to the Oval Of-fice—just a quick look around be-fore moving on to the Roosevelt Room for a meeting with senior aides.

Clinton told them, "We just have to be dominated by high standards and clear vision, and we ought to have a good time doing it."

Meanwhile, his wife, Hillary, was checking out the Oval Office. In a break with tradition, she will have an office in the West Wing, the first time a first lady has had

space there. A spokesman said she would be closely involved in devel-oping Clinton's health-care pro-gram.

Day One brought the first break in the military cease-fire extended by Saddam Hussein as a goodwill gesture to the new president.

UK unveils program to aid teaching of math

UK yesterday unveiled a new program designed to upgrade math-ematics teaching in the middle grades of Kentucky schools.

The program, known as the Kentucky Middle Grades Mathematics
Teacher Network, is a result of a recent \$2.8 million grant to Kentucky schools from the National Science
Foundation

Targeted at students in fifth through eighth grades, the teacher network seeks to provide better methods of teaching mathematics, as well as supplying classroom ma-terials to teachers statewide.

The training revolves around real-world problems and projects. Rather than memorizing and forgetting, students will understand concepts through problem solving and

He also said the program is "perfectly matched to the goals of Kentucky education reform."

By March 30, 12 teaching educa-tors, eight mathematicians, two ad-ministrators and 26 top math teach-ers in fifth through eighth grades will be elected to serve as program

They will attend a three-week teaching institute this summer.

In the fall, the coaches will return from the training session and put their knowledge to use in their own classrooms. A \$500 set of educational materials will be supplied to each of the teachers.

The 48 coaches will meet again in summer 1994 to create two new mathematics courses that will be delivered to middle school teachers statewide by spring 1996.

William S. Bush, a professor in UK's College of Education and the leader of the steering committee that secured the grant, voiced optimism about the new teaching methods that the program would provide.

Influence of Joseph Campbell widely felt in world

Six years ago Joseph Campbell assed away, to the remorse of the ademic community and the many tists and business people he influ-

artists and business people ne intui-enced.

Campbell was a scholar, teacher, mythologist, athlete and guru for many years. His relationships with Carl Jung, Pablo Picasso and many other greats are legendary. He went past the John Waynes status; he was a universal man.

In the mid-80s, a six-hour TV presentation was done with Camp-bell and Bill Moyers. "The Power of Myth" was Campbell's best-known work. But the real grit of the man lies much deeper. And, like all fantastic lives, you never seem to penetrate the real core. Something prevents you; something greater than the subject.

Looking for the Campbell core, I

than the subject.

Looking for the Campbell core, I stumbled across two other TV presentations, which I now recommend. The first is called "Transformations

of Myth through Time." This is a series of 13 lectures, including a one-hour show chronicling Campbell's life.

bell's life.

These lectures deal with linking the many mythologies found all over the world into one great truth—put simply, seeing the transcendent in every belief.

The record is called "loseph."

dent in every belief.

The second is called "Joseph Campbell on the Wings of Art," and it is rather difficult to locate. It deals with Campbell's interpretations of the three great novels of one of literature's most difficult writers, James Joyce.

"The Power of Myth" was rather expensitive for the public but really

"The Power of Myth" was ratiner generalized for the public but really brought across Campbell, the man. Through relaxed conversations with Moyers and stories descending from almost forgotten mythologies, Campbell brings to light some of the truths we seem to overlook in our biased views.

"The Downer of Myth" and

"The Power of Myth" and
"Transformations of Myth through
Time" also have been released in
book form. These just touch the tip

of the iceberg, as far as Campbell's contributions to literature, however.

After much study, including a five-year hiatus to a seculed wood reading nothing but the classics, Campbell began writing in the '40s. Influenced by the American Indian myths of his childhood, when "Wild Bill's Wild West Show" used to tour with real Indians, Campbell began his long search for the truth in all beliefs and their impact on the people believing them.

Campbell wrote his "Skeleton Key to Finnegan's Wake" with Henry Morton Robinson in 1944. This gave a guide to Joyce's monumental installment to his mythical novels.

This book helped Richard Adams write his great work, "Watership Down," as well as helping George Lucas complete the "Star Wars" mythology.

This was followed by "The Flight of the Wild Gander" in 1951, which of the Wild Gander 'in 1951, which explored the individual and geographical origins of myth. His four-volume work, "The Masks of God," appeared in the late '60s. The work chronicles the many faces humans place on the idea of the supreme being.

He edited editions of the huge "A Thousand and One Arabian Nights" and "The Portable Jung," breaking down the great Swiss psychiatrist's works into a volume for beginners.

"The Mythic Image," showed different cultural images from all over
the world and the significance in
every belief. It was full of pictures
—for the book skimmers out there.
Campbell was working until his
death. He almost finished his multivolume work, "Atlas of the World
Mythologies."

To people interested in digging Campbell, I suggest "An Open Life," which is a small and easily read work. This throws light on Campbell's philosophy and state of

mind more than anything. His was a very open-minded life and one receptive to change. He accepted the flow of life, instead of trying to hold back the tide with prophecies, ultimatums and organized beliefs. Campbell was a scholarly layman, if ever there was such a hing. Enlightened and impassioned about his work, Campbell gives inspiration to the person who would turn off Channel 00 and pick up a book worth reading.

turn off Channel (O) and pick up a book worth reading. For those with the strength for an open mind, Campbell will be an inspiration and a delight, opening your mind to new and interesting facts and feelings, relative to the human condition.

Van Damme takes the role of Sam Gillen, a wrongly accused escaped conflict who takes to hiding on the farmland owned by Clydie, a widowed mother of two played by a countrified Rosanna Arquette. Sam begins sneaking into Clydie's unlocked home at night — for no apparent reason but to steal a salt shaker and peep as Clydie takes a

bath in front of an open window.

Eventually, Sam is discovered by Mookie, Clydie's son (played by Kieran Culkin), who immediately sees Sam as a perfect father figure and decides not to tell his mother that this strange man is bathing in their backyard pond.

Sam soon discovers that Clydie is being threatened by a malicious business man who's trying to buy being tureatenee by a manufacture business man who's trying to buy up all of her farmland to install his new golf course. Sam, being the good-natured ex-convict that he is, takes up Clydie's fight to keep her land by busting any thugs sent to encourage her to sell.

In return, Clydie graciously allows Sam to skeep in the barn (although she eventually becomes the required love interest and invites him in one night).

"Nowhere To Run" is a different movie for Van Damme, whose earlier releases basically have been nothing but excuses for him to flaunt his well-choreographed ac-

tion sequences, throwing a plot in only to tie most of the scenes together.

This is where "Nowhere To Run" takes a step in the right direction. More attention seems to have been given to the story and character development than the body count.

It is this new direction that may disappoint many of Van Damme's fans, who took a liking to the foreign hero, not because of his sensitive acting, but because of his trademark high flying karate kicks. mark high flying karate kicks.

In fact, "Nowhere To Rum" delivers very little action compared to Van Damme's previous flicks. Van Damme sems happy to deliver a few punches here and there and then run to comfort Arquette, who always manages to brew up a few tears between scenes.

One characteristic that hasn't changed is Van Damme's dialogue, which is extremely limited, probably due to necessity rather than concern for the plot's development.
At times, Van Damme pulls off

his role well — the straight-faced,
silent hero with a heart of gold.
However, sometimes his performance comes off almost laughable,
as he's trying for an Oscar or something.

This is best exemplified in one scene in which he watches Arquette, dressed in a tight, water-soaked T-shirt, wash a horse. The effect makes the sequence seem as though it belonged in the parody "Hot Shots!"

Culkin is surprisingly less annoying than his older brother and does a good job as the "cute kid." He even provides a little comic relief, especially when his character is being chased by a couple of bad guys and he manages to hold them off by slamming doors in their faces and knocking them off ladders. (Hey, what an original idea.)

Although not as action-oriented as most of Van Damme's devotees would have it, "Nowhere To Run" still makes for a highly enjoyable movie, being a combination of "The River" and "Lionheart."

Fans may have to get used to this type of movie from the muscle-bound star whose career seems to be following in the footsteps of the great Arnold Schwarzenegger.

Pretty soon we may be seeing Van Damme and George Wendt in some kind of "Twins" rip-off.





SGA can't fight alone; students also must help to stop tuition increase

EDITORIAL

There's strength in numbers—and, if possible tuition increase is coming, the only chance of stopping it is people power. Unfortunately, students did not turn out in droves the past two weeks for the three public hearings throughout the state.

Student Government Association President Pete November should be commended for defending students in their opposition to the increase. But his voice is not enough. If students at UK really want to keep tuition low, they must let their voices be heard by the state Council on Higher Education, the body charged with setting tuition at the eight state universities. At the end of the council's November meeting, university presidents recommended tuition rates, already set for next year, be raised and that the Council set tuition annually. Currently, the council determines tuition rates every two years. The council is considering upping next year's tuition by as much as 560 per semester at the community colleges, \$130 per semester at tregional universities and \$180 at the doctoral universities (UK and U of L). There's strength in numbers

The council will vote on the Issue at its next regular meeting, scheduled for Feb. 13 at Kentucky State University.

The presidents also say the increase is not because of recent budget cuts. They say the increase would be used only to increase the quality of programs, not recoup their budget losses.

We don't believe them. This increase would not be happening if higher education had received an increase in funding in the 1992 General Assembly.

Students know this and should tell the politicians on the CHE that we're not going to be spoon fed hemlock in the form of a tuition increase. 

of the best investments you can make is a calendar (if you didn't get two or three for Christmas)? Pencil in all of your test dates, due dates for projects/papers and other activities, like basketball games, meetings and time with friends.

Classify each item into one of three categories: Things that need immediate attention, things that can be put off for a few days and things that don't require your attention for a week or more.

Work on the immediate attention items first, remembering to break down larger tasks into more manageable steps. Like, if you

have 10 chapters to read for a class discussion, read two or three chapters per day over a few days instead of trying to read all 10 chapters an hour before class

10 chapters an hour before class starts — or skipping class because you haven't read it!

Don't work on items that can wait a week unless all higher priority items are completed. Review your list regularly and reclassify as needed.

Early on, ask your professors for extra help if you find yourself getting behind. Also, consider organizing a study group.

Always set some time aside each day for quiet time or time for fun. You'll be more efficient if you're rested and if you have
