RESEARCH LIBRARY RESIDENCY PROGRAM, THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN LIBRARY

The Research Library Residency Program at the University of Michigan Library will offer recent graduates from masters programs in library science a multidimensional view of issues affecting research libraries. The Program provides a logical extension to the masters degree and an opportunity to explore options and requisite skills in research librarianship. Appointments will be for the period of August 1983-July 1985.

Four residents will be selected for 1983-84 to participate in the Program. Each resident will be placed in a beginning professional position in either a single assignment or a clustering of related functions in several library units. The instructional component of the Residency Program will consist of a continuing series of seminars stressing current trends, interrelationships of activities in a research library system, and implications for research libraries in the future. The seminars will be presented by University of Michigan Library Staff with participation of other library professionals as well.

CRL COOPERATIVE RESEARCH GRANTS

As part of its program on Professional Education and Training for Research Librarianship (PETREL), the Council on Library Resources is accepting grant applications for support of research projects undertaken jointly by the library science faculty and senior staff members of academic and research libraries. The objectives are to encourage library school faculty to work with librarians toward the solution of problems facing academic and research libraries and to stimulate research of high quality.

The Council will provide a limited number of small grants (not to exceed \$3,000 each) to fund certain costs of selected projects. The grants are to be used for incremental costs, including, for example, organization of data, cost of hiring interviewers, and charges for computer time.

Applications must be submitted jointly by a senior staff member of an academic or research library and a faculty member, typically from a library school. Proposals should be submitted in the form of a letter to the Council on Library Resources. The letter should contain the following information: a description of the project to be undertaken; a description of how the project relates to overall PETREL goals; the duration of the project; an assessment of the potential utility of research results to libraries generally; the arrangements made for leave or appropriate time away from normal duties by the faculty member; and a detailed estimate of cost.
