Dole touts GOP's plan

GEORGETOWN — Speaking on the same cam-pus William Henry Harrison did when he was elect-ed in 1840, Republican presidential candidate Bob Dole addressed a large crowd of Georgetown Col-lege students and Republican supporters yesterday

lege students and Republican supporters yesterday morning.

"Strom Thurman introduced (Harrison) that day, and he was elected president. He didn't serve long, he developed pneumonia. I don't think he got it here," said Dole, referring to the 93-year-old senator from South Carolina. In his speech, he went to great length to explain the GoP's 15 percent tax cut plan, as well as take some shots at incumbent opponent Bill Clitton, calling the rally a "retirement party for President Clinton."

ton."

Dole warmed the crowd up by talking about his love for Kentucky, referring to his days at Camp Breckinridge during World War II.

"I can properly claim Kentucky as my home state," said Dole, a Kanssa native. "And I know that you want to support your home-state candidate, and I'm a Kentuckian. I like the (Georgetown) Tigers and I like the Wildcats."

Dole addressed several issues during his speech to

Dole addressed several issues during his speech to the largely pro-Republican crowd. He said the economy has struggled since Clinton's election in 1992, which is contrary to Democrat's claims.

"He says that the economy's the best that it's been in 30 years," Dole said. "But a recent study by the Joint Economic Research reports that last year, 66 countries had economic growth which surpassed ours.

"Now Bill Clinton may think that finishing 67th is OK, but Bob Dole does not."

Ernie Gibble, press secretary for the Clinton-Gore reelection campaign in Kentucky, said Dole is slightly mistaken.

"Dole must think that quadrupling the deficit is OK," he said. "Bill Clinton has created 10 million new jobs in this country, 135,000 in Kentucky alone."

Dole then talked about his economic plan, which includes a 15 percent acra cut as well as credit on taxes for each child.

"With a pro-growth plan which starts with a 15 percent across-the-board tax cut for every American," he said. "We're going to end the (Internal Rev-

Under the proposed plan, a family with one child will get a \$500 credit on their taxes, \$1,000 for two children, and so on.

"If you have 10, you're probably too busy to file your returns," Dole said, "but that's \$5,000."

McCoy case to grand jury

UK police filed a criminal complaint yesterday against Jay T. McCoy, former assistant dean of students and financial adviser to UK's fraternities. According to UK Police Chief W.H. McComas, the complaint filed against McCoy consisted of 10 counts of forgers and 10 counts of possession of a forging instrument.

"That's just the initial charges," McComas said. The complaint against McCoy stems from an investigation into fis use of an Interfraternity Council bank account. A University audit states he misappropriated more than \$11,000 from the fund.

A judge was not in session yesterday to review the complaint, but it should be reviewed by Monday. After a judge reads the complaint, a criminal summons or an arrest statement will be made.

"That gets it in the system," McComas said. Once it gets there, the case goes to the grand jury,"

In a paral jury will then investigate the charges and determine if the charges constitute a felony. If so, the case will be referred to the Commonwealth's attorneys office, McComss said.

When asked about the complaint filed yesterday, McCoy said he had no knowledge of it.

"I am not aware of anything at this point," McCoy said.

McCoy, 35, resigned from UK July 15, citing

McCoy, 35, resigned from UK July 15, citing personal reasons. He had been supervisor of 25 to 30 agency accounts for student organizations and served as financial adviser for the Interfraternity Council and Greek Activity Steering Committee. According to a UK audit, McCoy wrote 30 checks to himself from the IFC bank account from Jan. 20, 1995 and May 5, 1996, totaling \$11,107.91. The problem came to light when PNC bank, which holds the IFC's account, notified the dean of student's office that the account was overdrawn, according to a management review commissioned by James Ruder, vice chancellor for student affairs. The review also stated that McCoy admitted to forging the signatures of the IFC president and the vice president of internal relations, which he needed to gain access to the

nal relations, which is recovered account.

The university audit cited other instances when McCoy wrote checks to himself on the IFC account and but later billed UK for meals, lodging and airfare, constituting a double reimbursement.

Following completion of the audit, the dean of students turned the matter over to UK police for investigation and appropriate action.

CAMPUS Pitino, Newton dismissed from lawsuit

A judge dismissed UK basketball coach Rick Pitino and athletics director C.M. Newton as indi-vidual defendants yesterday in a discrimination lawsuit filed by former men's basketball trainer JoAnn Hauser. Hauser filed the suit last summer against the

Hauser filed the suit last summer against the two men, the university and the UK Athletics Association.

wo men, the university and the UK Athletics Association. She contended that she was discriminated against when Newton asked her to move from trainer of the men's team to the same position with the women's team. Hauser, the men's basketball trainer from 1991-95, left the university last year. According to the suit, Hauser considered the switch to be a demotion and thought it was being done to make room for Pitino's firend, Edward "Fast Eddie" Jamiel, whom she thought was less qualified. The summary judgment Thursday by Fayette Circuit Judge Mary C. Noble does not pertain to Pitino or Newton's guilt or innocence, only their personal liability should Hauser win a judgment. Hauser is seeking more than \$2 million in damages, lost wages and legal fees. The university has sought a dismissal of the suit, but Noble has yet to rule.

NATION IPAQ, U.S. head for showdown
BAGHDAD, Iraq — Iraq and the
United States moved closer to a showdown yester-day, with more U.S. firepower sent to the Persian
Gulf, Iraq claiming missile attacks on American
jets and both countries spitting harsh rhetoric.
After almost two weeks of conflict, each side
seemed willing to raise the stakes but neither
looked prepared to make a decisive move.
Iraq said it fired missiles at U.S. warplanes over
a no-lly zone for a second straight day yesterday,
hours after accusing Kuwait of an "act of war" for
agreeing to open its airfields to American jets.
Pentagon officials confirmed that Iraq fired
three surface-to-air missiles yesterday, but said
they were aimed at an area near the southern "nofly zone where allied aircraft were not flying.
For days, Iraq has reported firing on U.S. and
allied aircraft in the no-fly zones in the north and
south.

The binge and purge cycle

There are several misconceptions about bulimia

nervosa.

First of all, bulimics do not come in any particu-lar shape or size — they can be overweight, under-weight or normal. If bulimia accompanies anorexia, the individual can be drastically under-

weight or horizan. In dumina secondaries and reversible individual can be drastically underweight.

People are classified as bulimic if they have eating binges in which they consume the calories in less than two bours, and the calories in less than two courses and the calories in less than two courses are consistent of the course of the course of the calories in the calories and they purge the food out of their systems, either by forcing themselves to womit or by abusing laxatives or diureties.

In advanced cases of the disorder, bulimics may follow this binge and purge routine five times a day, and their lives may revolve around finding times and places to eat where they will not be discovered. This obsession with eating can take its toll on a bulimic's social activity.

"I see that women that are caught up in the bulimia trap are incapable with mutual relations to the commendation of the commen

bulinies fear of becoming overweight. Although bulimies consume large amounts of food at one time, they do not always enjoy eating — it is merely satisfying an addiction.

Although bulimia begins as a mental obsession with weight control, in its advanced stages it becomes a physical problem. The body begins to reject even normal amounts of food, forcing the bulimic to throw up even if they do not want to. In addition, serious cases of bulimia nervosa can cause dehydration and imbalances in electrolytes and minerals, which help the muscles and nerves function. In rare cases, bulimics have ruptured their stomachs or esophagi and died from peritonitis.

Women plan to 'Take back the night' from violence

UK's chapter of the National Organization for Women will participate in "Take Back the Night" this weekend to protest violence against women. UK NOW will hold a pre-rally in the free speech area near the Student Center before walking to the rally in Triangle Park on Sunday. The pre-rally begins at 5 p.m., the event begins at 6 p.m. UK NOW President Laurie Warnecke said that while Lexington may seem safe compared to other parts of the nation, "there still is the need to keep people aware."

The rally will "call attention to male violence against women and ... protest the widespread murder, rape and physical abuse of an entire class of people," according to a Bluegrass NOW press release. The release cited

Runner raises funds for leukemia

This January, Brian Bailey, an accounting senior, will run a marathon for life in Bermuda.

Thirteen-year-old Jonathan Turock (known to his friends as "J.B.") is counting on him.

J.B. was diagnosed with leukemia at age 12, only a month before he was to enter that mystical period, the teen years.

He is now 13 and perhaps more mature than his seventh grade classmates at Morton Middle School in Lexington.

Bailey, a runner since February 1994, ran his first marathon after his grandmother died of heart disease.

his grandmother died of heart dis-ease.

After her death, he began his own fund-raising campaign, pre-sented the results to the American Heart Association, and ran in the Disney World Marathon for AHA's benefit.

Bailey made it a goal to run two marathons a year, but after the Columbus Marathon and April's Boston Marathon, and April's Poston Marathon, and when began to realize that he was losing focus.

His fastest time was the Disney World Marathon, in which he had a cause. He needed to run for a reason.

reason.

When Bailey saw the Leukemia Society of America's commercial asking for runners, he "saw an opportunity to put meaning behind the miles."

After seeing the commercial on television, Bailey called the chapter in Kentucky for more information.

Running Shop brought them together.

Bailey and the youngster's meeting and relationship since have left Brian with a sense of "realpase".

have left Brian with a sense of "realness."
Bailey commented on J.B.'s assertiveness, realizing how trivial our day-to-day trials seem when faced with a situation like his. "You think you have it rough," Bailey said about college students, 'but it's real, and it's happening right here in Lexington. Don't get down on yourself."

J.B. was diagnosed with acute lymphocytic leukemia, which causes the body to create immature white blood cells.

Those cells are unable to fight infections as well as normal white blood cells, resulting in a reduction of the body's red blood cells, resulting in a reduction of the body's red blood cells.

tion of the body's red blood cell production.

This type of leukemia is acute, meaning it is mostly seen in children, while lymphocytic means the cells in the lymph nodes and spleen are affected.

The Leukemia Society of America has deemed their project "Cure 2000," because leukemia has no known cure.

J.B. has undergone chemotherappy and radiation treatment, and for the time being, the disease is in remission.

He is still undergoing treatment at UK's Children's Hospital.

The disease is like a haunted house, and J.B. said he never knows what is around the next

After seeing the commercial on television, Bailey called the chapter in Kentucky for more information.

The goal for Bailey and the other 55 runners in Kentucky is \$3,500.

Almost 76 percent of the money goes to support the Leukemia Society of America, and 24 percent covers the cost of Bailey trip to Bermuda for the marathon.

The Leukemia Society of America, and John's Merica paired him up with Jonathan Turock, and John's made him more mature.

registration process, your county clerk's office must receive the application at least one week prior to the election," said Marilyn Smith of the voter registration department at the Fayette County

Once the clerk's office receives the completed application, the office will send a ballot that must be sent back by 6 p.m. on election

"This type of voting is a convenient and efficient way of helping college students contribute in elections without burdening their schedules," Smith said.

If students will be in their home districts prior to election day, they can visit their local

county clerk's office, fill out the application and have the ballot sent to them just before the elec-

application and have the ballot sent to them just before the election.

Absentee ballots can be used to vote in all types of elections, ranging from county commissioners to the Senate races. A separate application, however, must be filled out and processed each time.

Call or write your county clerk's office and get an application to be included in the 1996 presidential election.

"College students are among the smartest of the voting population," Smith said.

"It would be a shame not have such a group vote in any election."

"I'd rather start off with them because it shows us where we're ar," said UK senior defender Amy Buerkle. "It gives us a chance to

see what the rest of the competi-tion is going to be like."
This is only the second match between the schools. Last year, Florida defeated the Cats 2-1 in Lexington.
Understandably, then, the Cats

Understandably, then, the Cats have revenge against the Gators on their minds, but UK feels less pressure than before.

"We're ready to come out and show them what we can do and what we should have done last year," said UK senior forward Beth Raynolds.

"With them as the favorite, there's not as much pressure on us."

The Cats come into the game with an unblemished record. On Monday, UK (2-0) hammered Dayton 5-1.

That thrashing and a win over North Carolina-Greensboro last Sunday has UK ready to take on the Cators.

"I think we're ready to go," Lipka said. "If it was our first game of the year, I'd say I'm not ready for anyone."

Like the Cats, Florida also comes in with a perfect 2-0 record. They also come in with a huge momentum lift. Last week in front of 2,710 fans, the second-largest home crowd in Florida history, the Gators defeated No. 9 Virginia 1-0.

To make the win even more

impressive, Florida won without their main scoring threat, junior All-American forward Danielle Fotopoulos, who sat out with a sprained right ankle. She is questionable for this afternoon's game. Playing at Percy Beard Sadium in Gainesville, Fla., will be a challenge for UK. Not only did the Gators average over 1,600 fans a game last year, but their field has smaller dimensions than most soccer fields.

Lipka said the size of the field can make a big difference.

"A mistake on a smaller field can be very costly where you could make up for one here," he said.

The next challenge for the Cats will be on Sunday, when UK will be in Columbia, S.C., to take on South Carolina.

Last year USC went 0-7-1 in the SEC and finished at the bot-tom of the conference. One of those losses for the Gamecocks was to UK; the Cats defeated USC 2-9 in Lexington.

Between work, school and leisure, sleep is hard to come by for the average college student. And spending two hours of the day watching an excrueiatingly boring film leaves you with the feeling you just wasted something valuable. The acclaimed French film Nelly and Monsieur Arnaud manages to be a waste of time and talent.

Like Merchant/Ivory's Remains of the Day, this film attempts to tell a story of suppressed love between an unlikely pair. The difference, however, lies in the fact that the two leads fail to generate enough sparks to cause viewers to care.

The title characters begin their relationship during a conversation about Nelly's marital and financial problems. The elderly gentleman, Mr. Arnaud, immediately offers to pay her back rent with nothing in return. Nelly declines the offer but later accepts a job typing, Arnaud's drafted autobiography.

The two become closer as he

dictates the memoirs of his exotic career as a magistrate. Tension arises when Nelly begins seeing his publisher as a love interest. From there the relationship takes a rocky course as they struggle to express hidden feelings. The lack of chemistry between leads makes their ultimate departure less than heartbreaking. Emmanuele Beart (Mission Impossible), Michel Serrault (La Cage Aux Folles) and Jean-Hugues Anglade (Killing Zone) give the film top billing but can't seem to add any life to their inherently flat characters. Director Claude Sautet (Un Coeur en Hiver) contributes to the melancholy look by making the film as visually dull as any film in recent memory. The camera remains uncompromisingly still froughout, with few tax venturing outside a standard meditureshot.

Nelly and Monsieur Arnaud seems to drift aimlessly, never quite putting together a series of inspired events. If it wasn't for my obligation to write this article, bednime would have come about two hours darlier. I reccomend this film only to insomniacs.
