The question of proper method of appointment of extension instructors was considered and referred to a committee of five, with instructions to consider the University policy in reference to extension. The committee to be appointed by President McVey, will be expected to report at the next meeting of the University Senate.

- See letter from Dean Boyd in Senate file. ✓ (Art 18a and 18b - Problems in School Art. Prerequisite one year teaching in public schools. Two hours a week. Two credits per semester.
- 11/11/25 ✓ Art 112^{a-b} - Advanced Composition. Two credits.
- ✓ Art 202 - Advanced Composition. Two credits.
- ✓ Art 128a and 128b - Drawing and Modeling for Science Students. Two credits per semester. To replace Art 28a-b
- ✓ Art 108a and 108b. - Special Problems for Science Students. This will replace Art 8a and 8b.
- ✓ English 131a and 131b - Independent Work. Two credits per semester
- ✓ Romance Languages 113a and 131b - Independent work in Romance Languages. Three credits per semester. It is requested that this course be approved, subject to the approval of the College of Arts and Sciences.
- ✓ Ancient Languages 151a and 151b - Independent Work in Ancient Languages. Three credits per semester.

The following recommendation from the College of Agriculture was approved:

- ✓ Agronomy 1 - Soils - reduced from 5 credits to 4 credits, consisting of three lectures and one laboratory period.
