Minutes of the University Senate - October 14, 1935

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall Monday, October 14, with President McVey presiding.

The minutes of August 14, were approved.

Professors Terrell and Chamberlain were elected Senate representatives on the University Council, the terms of Professors Crouse and Adams having expired.

The Committee on Duplication of Courses presented the following new course which was approved:

Geology 121 - Economic Geology of Kentucky. Three credits. A study of the mineral resources of the State - coal petroleum and gas, flourspar, clay and the others - dealing with their geographic and geologic occurence, the factors governing their origin and distribution, geological conditions having a bearing on exploitation and problems of exploration. This is a technical study and open only to students with several years background in geology. Prerequisites: Geology 22a,b,; 9b; 15a,b; 19a,b; 106a,b; 116 (30 hrs.)

On recommendation of the faculty of the College of Education the following changes in education courses were approved:

- 1. That Education 175a,b,c, etc., Modern Educational Problems, be raised to three credits for each semester and that the following divisions of the course be authorized -- Education 175e, The Administration of Adult Education, and Education 175f, Methods and Materials of Adult Education.
- 2. That Education 195, Organization and Management of Pre-School Education, be raised from 6 to 12 credits, Education 195a and b, and that the course offered last summer as Education 195 be changed to Education 195a.
- 3. That Education 165, Problems in Vocational Education, be raised to Education 165 a and b, three credits each, and that Education 266, Seminar in Home Economics Education, be raised to Education 266a and b, three credits each.

A question was raised in regard to dances being held in violation of the Senate rule that no dances shall be given before Thanksgiving. The Social Committee explained, in brief, that they knew the dances were violating the rule, but that since dances were being held at Joyland Park and in the hotels they thought it better to allow the students to have dances on the campus. After a general duscussion the Social Committee was requested to bring in proposed changes in the Senate regulations.
