## ALL-CAMPUS HOP MISTAKE NOW MORE APPARENT THAN EVER

MORE APPARENT THAN EVER
Again it becomes necessary for The Kernel to
make an observation on the Ail-Campus dances.
Last year, The Kernel emphatically voiced its
sentiment against shifting the date of the hop
from Wednesday to Friday. In doing so it sincerely believed that a mistake had been made.
It still adheres to this belief.

The University Senate, in making the change, remarked that its chief objection was the fact that students could not be properly prepared for classes the day following the dance. They overlooked the sign.ficent fact that the same students who attend classes on Thursday, attend the very same classes Saturday.

Time and again it has been shown that the Senate erred in making the change. Time and again these dances, now a necessary part of a student's social life, have had to be postponed because of conflicts with other dates. This pecause of conflicts with other dates. This week the mistake is again appallingly evident. A campus hop has been scheduled for Friday. A sorority is sponsoring a guest tea dance Saturday afternoon. A fraternity is holding a formal guest dance Saturday night. Three dances in one proches. ne week-end.

one week-end.

Next week-end the state high school basket-ball tournament will be held at the University. There will be no dances.

Dean Jones, who inaugurated these campus dances, is firmly convinced that Wednesday would be a better day for them. Is it possible that the University Senate, which has entrusted with him control of student social life on this campus, now does not believe that his judgment is sound?

The advantages of Wednesday as a date for these dances is evident. The Senate has tied Dean Jones' hands in the matter. Opportunities for social contacts on Fr.days are many—on Wednesdays few. Following the fraternity and sorority meetings on Wednesdays, is it not bet-ter for the students to attend a dance—the rev-enue from which is doing noble work—rather than spend their quarters sipping "cokes" and

### NEW HOPE FOR CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS

Those who nourish honest objections to mil itary training on religious or ethical grounds may gaze into the future with a bit more optimism now that a brand new plan has been put into operation at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The conscientious objector has always been The conscientious objector has always been more or less subject to ridicule because he has had no way to show that he is conscientious in his objections, and many who had no religious or sociological qualms about the R. O. T. C. merely claimed they were objectors because they

merely claimed they were objectors because they were lazy, or because they simply wanted to 'get out of something.'

The M. I. T. plan promises to relieve the situation. The serious objector is excused from drill, but he must take a similar number of credit hours in courses of international law, political theory, diplomacy, causes of war, and programs for peace. These courses, certainly not "snaps," would give the objector an educational alternative opposed to the militaristic ideals he would get by taking drill, would satisfy his religious or ethical scruples, and at the same time, would not attract those students who fall into the dishonest objectors group.

The plan seems worthwhile. In times when

The plan seems worthwhile. In times when advocates or opponents of compulsory military training are mostly hysterical in their arguments, it offers a sane, civilized, cultural, and intellectual way out. As such it merits the closest surveillance of interested parties.

He must be entirely free from compassion, must value human life at a lower par that that of his dog, must be of the opinion that there is only one side of a question—his side, and must believe that he and the army are a god-eend to humanity. Besides this he must have a paradoxical complex so as to worship in church while clothed in full uniform.
