# Former assistant dean receives probation

Jay T. McCoy, former assistant dean of students and adviser to UK's social fraternities, will spend the next four weekends lodged in the Fayette County Detention Center, Circuit Judge John Adams ruled Fri-

Fayette County Detention Center, Circuit Judge John Adams ruled rri-day.

McCoy, who pled guilty to three counts of possession of a forging instrument in January, will also spend two years on probation and perform 200 hours of community service the next two years for embezzling about \$15,000 from an Interfraterity Council PNC bank account—\$11,000 in checks to himself and \$3,999 in unauthorized payments.

He has also paid the court-ordered resitution of \$7,894.

The Fayette County Commonwealth's attorney agreed, with McCoy's guilty plea, to drop the other 17 counts against him, but did recommend he serve a year for each of the guilty counts.

During Friday's sentencing, McCoy's attorney Denise Davidson asked Adams to consider probation instead of a prison sentence and submitted letters written on McCoy's behalf with the same request.

Davidson said the proceedings McCoy has gone through have taught

him that his actions were wrong and have limited his opportunities. She said McCoy has much to offer the community.

McCoy also saked Adams to consider the probated sentence.

"This is very much out of my character," McCoy said during the sentencine.

"What I've done is wrong. Up to this, I had a very good job and a promising career in higher education."

McCoy said he has begun to contact "those who I hurt and who I violated by this' to apologize. He said he also gave IFC complete restitution and has a full-time and part-time job.

"I just ask for the opportunity (to make up for my actions)," he said. Adams granted the probation, saying McCoy's actions seemed out of character and acknowledged that McCoy's felony conviction had "closed many doors to him."

He said although safeguards preventing fund embezzlement were not in place, they should not have to be because administrative positions are based on trust.

"It don't think I need to send you to the penitentiary based on what you've done," "Adams told McCoy.

Dean of Students David Stockham wrote a letter in favor of granting McCoy probation.

Stockham said the restitution paid back what McCoy had taken. He said the fact that McCoy was a co-signer on the IFC account contrary to Dean of Students Office policy "was a perpetuation of past practice" that also went on with the Panhelmein council.

Stockham said Dean of Students Office employees no longer serve as co-signers on the student groups' bank accounts.

Jon Bruser, 1994 IFC president, whose signature McCoy used on the forged checks, said the court could have chosen to give a stricter sentence, so "hopefully he uses this chance."

Bruser said ultimately McCoy had the responsibility to make sure the account signatures were changed when officers changed, and for "different reasons" McCoy did not do so after Bruser left office, leaving subsequent officers unaware of the additional account.

"He saw an opportunity, and he took it," Bruser said. "I was very disappointed that I had to get involved in it."

Bill Brassine, 1996 IFC president, said "it's positive that he's not spending any time in jail.

"I think he's a good guy who just made a mistake."

### Month's events include more than just history

African American History Month on UK's campus includes much more than history.

history.

Poetry, literature, music, films and speakers — just to name a few — are also a part of the celebration.

African American History month almost definitely began as a week — not a month.

"African American History month almost definitely began as a week — not a month.

"There is a history to it," said Gerald Smith, history professor.

In 1915 Carter G. Woodson formed an association for the student of Afro-American (as it was called at the time) life and history.

This could be considered the foundation of what we now know as African American History Month, because it was out of this movement that the idea came. In 1916 Woodson launched a journal of "negro" history.

Woodson declared the week of Feb. 7, 1926, Negro History Week, the first declared time that can be traced to African American History Month. The work of Woodson, coupled with the steady achievements of the civil rights movement, probably led to the increased awareness of the subject in later decade awareness of the subject in l

American history and culture," Smith said.

But while the increased awareness of black history during February is supposed to develop a greater understanding of the race for all Americans — not only children in school — it has been said that leaving all black history to be taught in one month is unacceptable.

"I wish (African American History Month) want necessary," said Frank Walker, program coordinator of the Martin Luther King Jr. Cultural Center, "I wish that our societies and communities had already progressed so that we wouldn't have to take special efforts to fill in the people who were left out — I think every peoples have a right to be celebrated." At the center, many special happenings occur during the month of February, but it is not considered a once-a-year celebration there.

"Our policy at the King Center is that we try to celebrate African American History Month 12 months out of the year," Walker said.

For those interested in increasing knowledge about the history of America's blacks, though, February is a good time to do so, because so many special opportunities abound — especially on UK's campus.

### STATE State recognized for education progress

WASHINGTON — Kentucky was recognized by the National Governor's Association yesterday for its progress toward meeting the organization's education goals.

Gov. Paul Patton accepted the award during the group's meeting in Washington.

Patton is one of eight governors who sits on th National Education Goals Panel, which delivers an annual report on the nation's progress in improving education.

"Kentucky was one of states that historically had one of the greatest problems educating our people," Patton said. "We're starting from a very low level but we are putting in place the vehicles we think it will take to meet the national goals."

While in Washington, Patton also addressed the Appalachian Regional Commission, and was scheduled to dine last night with President Clinton at the White House.

WATION APPEST made in Calif. bombing
VALLEJO, Calif. — Police made an arrest yesterday in the bombings that struck a courthouse and bank in the past week, and recovered explosives in a plot they believe was designed to subvert the criminal justice system.

The name of the suspect was withheld while the investigation continued. Arrest warrants were issued for two other suspects and numerous search warrants were served, Police Chief Robert Nichelini said.

"It is our belief that this was a deliberate attempt to stop the criminal justice system from operating in Solano County," Nichelini said.

Authorities said they have found no evidence that the suspects have connections to other groups or bombings in other cities.

Nobody was injured in the two bombings, which tore a 3-foot crater in the Solano County courthouse on Thursday and damaged three automatic tellers outside a Wells Fargo bank last Sunday.

KERRYILLE, Texas — The jury that convicted Darlie Routier of capital murder in the stabing death of her 5-year-old son returns to court today to decide if she'll be sentenced to death or life in prison.

Routier was convicted Saturday in the June 6, 1996, killing of her son Damon in a grisy knife attack at the family's home in the Dallas suburb of Rowlett. She's also charged with murdering 6-year-old Devon, but prosecutors haven't said yet if they will pursue that count.

Prosecutors alleged the Routier — angry over money problems and the burdens of motherbood — killed both boys, slashed herself and staged a crime scene to fool police.

Boyd fired in two three-pointers — not too shabby for someone known for her inside play.

"I gave more in this game. I was dedicated," Boyd said. "We wanted to win as a team and I was going to do that for my team."

At the outset of yesterday's game, the Cats hung with Auburn for the first 15 minutes before the Tigers pulled away for an eight-point halftime lead.

UK and the Tigers virtually traded baskets until the Cats went on a 6-0 run and cut Auburn's lead to 25-51 with 7:09 left.

Despite opportunities to take the lead, UK would get no closer.

"I think (we gave UK enough opportunities to win). Offensively we shot ourselves in the foot a couple of times," Auburn head coach Joe Ciampi said. "We were our own worst enemy the last three minutes of that game."

Auburn (14-6, 3-4) scored a whopping four points in the final four minutes. Luckily for the Tigers, UK scored only five points in that time frame.
"It wasn't a great win, but it was a win," said Auburn forward Tara Williams, who led the Tigers with 18 points.

As in most of their games the Cats were shorthanded, playing with only eight players. Shaunda Roberts missed her fifth straight game due to back problems. She was not to be found in Memorial Colseum.

The Cats (6-14, 0-8) were also without Shawn Manning. She has decided to leave the team. Earlier this season Manning was a starting forward, but her minutes seemed to diminish throughout the season.
Because of a lack of bodies, the Cats had three players play more than 37 minutes. While the Cats were outnumbered, Ciampi didn't think that fatigue was a factor.

### The Russians came, caused a ruckus

Russia's oldest orchestra brought the first leg of its U.S. tour to the Singletary Center for the Arts Saturday night as part of this year's University Artist Series. Included in the program for Saturday night's concert was a sheet of definitions of common musical terms. Allegret to (somewhat fast), allegro (fast, but not hectic), presto (hectically fast) and prestissimo (as fast as possible) topped the list, and appropriately so, for these were the tempi favored by Peter Feranec, the Slavic conductor of the Russian orchestra.

The all-Russian program began with a violent interpretation of Mussorgsky's "Night on Bald Mountain." From the first quiet trills and brassy introduction to the final serene clarinet and flute solos, the orchestra brought this dark tone poem about Satan worship to life.

Next up was Rachmaninoff's
Concerto No. 2 in C minor for
Piano and Orchestra," a mood work in three connected movements. While the first movement began well, early in the second movement the orrelestra and the soloist, Mikhail Petukhov, seemed

to lose their sense of musical purpose, so important in that movement of long arcing themes.

Thankfully, Petukhov's cadenza near the conclusion of the third movement restored some of the lost meaning, and allowed the orchestra to bring the concerto to a successful close. In response to a two-minute standing ovation, Petukhov returned to the stage to perform the "Star-Spangled Baner" arranged in Rachmaninov's style.

Following the intermission, the audience was treated to a superb performance of Tchaitovsky's "Symphony No. 4 in F minor," one of the greatest Russian symphonies. In the lengthy first movement, described by UK Orchestra Conductor David MacKenzie as "unrelenting in its ansiety," the orchestra set the tone for the entire symphony, the strings forcefully attacking the nine-eight section and the horns and trumpets blaring in well-balanced fortissimo chords.

The orchestra masterfully built the movement to its conclusion, with added tempo changes and a great dependent of the same proposed in the surpose of the surpose

section added a thick sound to the string sections.

The third movement, a scherzo in which the strings play pizzicato throughout, contained an interesting interpretation of the woodwind theme which was much louder and rougher sounding than it is usually played. However, the string theme, a dominating characteristic of this movement, was excellently played with an impressive dynamic range.

There is very little to be said about the fourth movement, beyond that it was played blindingly fast and deafeningly loud, just the way it ought to be. The audience responded to this prodigious performance with a three-minute standing ovation, which the orchestra rewarded with a performance of Khachaturian's "Sabre Dance" from Gayane. This loud and fast piece simply incited the audience farther, resulting in five more minutes of raucous cheering of the kind more commonly found at rock concerts, and two more encores, Rimsky-Korsakov's famous "Flight of the Bumblebee" and the finale from Polevetsian Dance by Borodin.

In the end, there was nothing for the musicians to do but leave the stage en masse, the crowd still calling for more.

Fortunately for fans of Tupac Shakur, The Don Killuminati: The Ton Killuminati: The Tony Theory, wasn't the last unreleased work the controversial but gifted rapper left behind.

Unlike that album, released under the alias "Makaveli," the brief snippets of Shakur on the Gridlock'd soundtrack will leave fans with a bit tersweet taste and a bit of a warm glow.

Gridlock'd gets off to a bumping start with "Wanted Dead or Alive," a Shakur/Snoop Doggy Dogg duet that has what too many tracks from Snoop's latest album lacked — a head-bobbing beat and a sense that Snoop was having some fun.

It's a track that can't match up to the best work off Shakur's magnificent "All Eyez on Me," but it is one that surpasses most of his Makaveli release.

His rage only slightly tempered by the softness of the beat, Shakur rips through lyrics both provocative ("They never wanted us to make it Everything that we possess we had to fight and take it's and fun ("I think the president is smokin' weed bumpin' this beat

...").
Unfortunately, that's the only one of the rumored 150 or so unreleased songs that made it to the Gridlock'd soundtrack. When the disc strays from Shakur's songs, it struggles to gain any continuity.

The middle of Gridlock'd, including 'Out the Moon (Boom, Boom, Boom)," another Shakur/Snoop pairing, is muddled, and little of the material rises above mediocrity.

Among the new acts featured, only J. Flex shows promise. Lyrically, "Lady Heroin" matches up to some of Death Row's better singles, but sylistically, the rappers on the cut can't reach the level of Snoop, Shakur or Dat Nigga Daz.

And though nobody's ever doubted that Danny Boy, Death Row's most notable R&B crooner, can sing with the best of them, even his soulful pipes surprisingly fail to lift the Babyface-penned "It's Over Now" above the stan-

dard Babyfac

and Balyrace-produced cooker-cutter sound.

More fun is "I Can't Get Enough," Danny Boy's bouncing, hip hop, mid-tempo jam that could be even better without its beat-by-Casio synthesized sound.

The album really picks up as it fades out. The final song, Anony-mous' "Deliberation," with its warm mixture of gospel themes and its hint of African rhythms, makes for a wonderfully uplifting note on which to leave the sound-track.

You can't help but think of Shakur as the song begins, "We don't know why the night falls upon us and we don't even know why we wanna know."

But it's not necessarily the set he album has to offer.

That honor belongs to "Life Is a Traffic Jam," a jazz/spoken word/rap fusion performed by Eight Mile Road, the band Shakur's character is a member of in the film. It's fascinating if only for its exploration of Shakur's gift as a poet.

Shakur pours out his soul the way he did in the best flashes of his best albums ("Don't try on hopeless/Victim to the games we play, stay focused") in a mixture of spoken-word poetry and his rapid-tire, staccato rap style.

It's a combination that will truly tug at the heartstrings of those who saw Shakur for what he was — a wonderfully gifted young artist who never got a chance to show the versatility he so obviously possessed.





Get to know someone who has had an unplanned pregnancy, get a cup of coffee, and have a chat with her before you come here angrily to spit your words.

This is about hearts and spirits, not politics.

### **Show portrays Johnson**

Lyman T. Johnson was the first black person to attend graduate school at UK.

A documentary, "Great Lead-rs: The Black Odyssey of Lyman
, Johnson," will air on Louisville
ublic television station WKPC-V, channel 15.

public television station WKPC-TV, channel 15.

It will have its premiere tomorrow at 8 p.m. and will be shown again at 9 p.m.

Subsequent airings will be on Saturday, Feb. 16, at 11 p.m.

Based on the 1988 book, "The Rest of the Dream" by Wade Hall, Professor Emeritus of English at Bellarmine College, the story is told in the present time, with flashback vignettes to incidents in history dating back to 1872.

A portion of the production is narrated by Johnson.

Growing up with the hardships

narrated by Johnson.

Growing up with the hardships of dealing with racial discriminations, he spent his time advocating the equal rights of the disenfranchised.

It was during the 1940s when Johnson was encouraged by a group of educators and civil rights activists to test the public laws governing segregation in state institutions of higher education.

In 1948 Johnson applied to graduate school at UK but was denied admission. He took his battle to federal courts and sued in what became the first legal challenge to state-sanctioned segregation. The court ruled in his favor in 1949, resulting in a landmark decision that outlawed segregation in Kentucky colleges and universities.

Hall said scenes taken from
Johnson's life will vividly show
how much impact for decency and
equality one man can have.

"Lyman Johnson is probably
the most truly American person
I've ever known — racially mixed,
cussedly independent, progresssive, fearless, plain-spoken and
eloquent," Hall said.

Not just seeking a higher education for himself, Johnson wanted to carve the path for others.

Lauretta Byars, UK vice chancellor for minority affairs,
described Johnson as a "daring,
committed activist."


She said Johnson traveled to
Louisville to try to recruit top

UK.


