THE FURTHER ADVENTURES OF STEALTH LESBIAN

As a volunteer for the GLSO Speakers' Bureau, I speak mainly for college classes and at diversity training sessions for state government workers. In the six years I have done this, I have noticed some positive changes in both the reactions of the listeners and their questions to me. For example, I've been asked, "Is there a local bar where straight and gay people get together?" and "How can I ask a friend from high school if they are 'out' yet? I want to be supportive but I don't know how to ask."

We have been able to move away from black-and-white answers in expressing the complexity of who we are. For instance, I am always asked, "Were you born that way, or is it a choice?" I often ask for a show of hands from people who feel that their heterosexuality was a choice. Most of the audience seem to get the point.

Additionally, we talk about how "gayness" could be of complex derivation: genetics, *in utero* hormones, social conditioning, etc. For most of us, it does not feel like a choice, I say, but add that for some people it may be. Perhaps, I suggest, for those individuals who are most loudly yelling at us, it seems like a choice. Perhaps they don't want to look too closely inside. At times I throw in Robin Tyler's joke, "I'm a lesbian, but if I were stuck on a desert island with Robert Redford and Nancy Reagan, I'd have to think about it."

What also happens more frequently is that some of the audience seem to be getting to know our quirks... "Do you think gay people have more pets or perhaps get more involved

with their pets than do straight people? Maybe because they don't have children?" (No, not really. Why, only yesterday I was walking my dog, my ex-lover's dog, my current lover's dog, and my current lover's ex-lover's dog -- and I do have children!) I also hear, "Do you think Frazier and Riles will ever come out?" or more seriously, "How well do lesbians and gay men get along?" Some of their information is a tad out of date: "Do gays still wear different colored handkerchiefs or other things so you'll recognize each other?" No, now we are more likely to just ask: "I'm a lesbian and I was hoping you might be, too." Not that all of us do this; we do still have code words. But we are becoming more open, and this brings up the point that we do consider it a compliment - not an insult - to call someone a lesbian.

So we are becoming less invisible and more three-dimensional to the public. But there are still offensive questions and much need of education. After I explained (once again) that my spiritual beliefs do not conflict with my lesbianism at all, I was still confronted with, "But even Jews believe in the ten commandments.." I do not know where she was going with that, because I interrupted her. I try not to do that or to be too aggressive in my responses, but every now and then...

I did get a kick out of reading comedienne Suzanne Westenfoefer's response to a high school boy who asked, "Do you really think you can be a better lover for a woman than I can be?" "Let's see," she replied, "you're fifteen and have braces. What do you think?" ▼

A WORD TO THE WISE:

Dear GLSO Staff:

I just wanted to write and thank you for all the information you have provided to our community. I would also like to take this opportunity to warn our community of potential harassment by the local police.

One February 24, 1996 a friend of mine and I went to Club 141 to dance. We left at approximately 2:40 am. I was stopped by a Fayette County Deputy Sheriff. He said that I was "sort of weaving". Let me say that I had nothing to drink the entire evening (not even water). Of course, he ran me through the field of sobriety tests. The way he administered to the tests was not in compliance with the way police officers are taught and I couldn't have passed them. He asked me to say my numbers backwards from 78 through 43. The training given by the Department of Criminal Justice recommends a number span of fifteen numbers maximum. Police officers are taught to preface a sobriety test with a qualifying question, i.e. "Do you know how to count?" or "Do you know your alphabet?" or "Do you have any reason why you cannot take a balance test?"

I was not asked any qualifying questions. Of course, when he gave me a preliminary breath test (roadside), it showed .000. He didn't even give THAT test correctly. He let me go after he went back and sat in his cruiser for about two or three minutes. I'm not sure what he was doing; he already had all of my information from his dispatcher. I heard it come across the radio while he was giving me the test. I have to say that I feel that the only reason I was stopped was because of the pink triangle I have on the back of my truck.

The reason that I know I was not weaving and the sobriety tests were improperly administered is because I'm a police officer myself and I've had over 750 hours of training, 88 of which was spent on DUI/Field Sobriety testing.

Be careful out there. Officer Scotty Saltsman. If any of you feel you have been the target of police harassment, we encourage you to a) report it the GLSO Discrimination Project (276-5383) and b) file a complaint at the appropriate agency. Contrary to the conventional wisdom, the police, like other public servants are answerable to public criticism and while it is most certainly true the that the law enforcement officer's word will generally carry more weight than yours, establishing a pattern of abuse makes it difficult for the agency to ignore. \blacktriangledown

LESBIGAY COMMUNITY A FAILURE?Dear GLSO/Subscribers:

Having lived in Lexington for the past 19 years, and having been out for 12 of those years, I have seem our city trying to develop into a progressive community; diverse yet keeping its conservative roots. Unfortunately, it has failed. Of course, our community hasn't been the only failure in this endeavor. WE as a lesbigay community have failed also, and not just to our surrounding "straight" counterparts, but also to ourselves.

How can we as a unified group expect to be accepted if we do not ourselves accept each other. A couple of years ago, I stopped going out to clubs completely, and after having gone out recently, I know why I stopped.

I can't begin to tell you how many times I have been "out on the time" and have seen and heard other gays ridicule and belittle others for what they wear, what they drive, and who they're out with. Tell me, please, how can one expect to be welcomed as an integral part of the "normal" society if we can't even accept our fellow lesbigay peers. Does it really matter whether you have a Cadillac or a Chevette? A Tommy vs. a Wal-Mart special? Give me a break.

I cherish the fact that I am a young Gay man, with the ability to be very open with my lifestyle. My family has known about my lifestyle for twelve years, I have some very close gay friends, and I'm freely open about my

UU CHURCH DANCE/SOCIAL



pagan movements inspired by old earthbased belief systems. This video will be followed by *Before Stonewall*, or other gay-related videos.

At 9:00, we will have line dancing lessons, fun to learn and no partner necessary. At 9:30, we are particularly pleased to have the Spirit Drummers perform, which should really get you out of your seat.
