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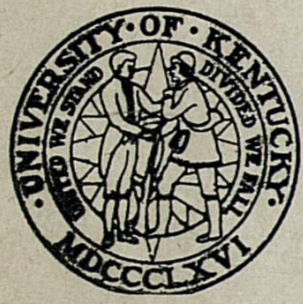

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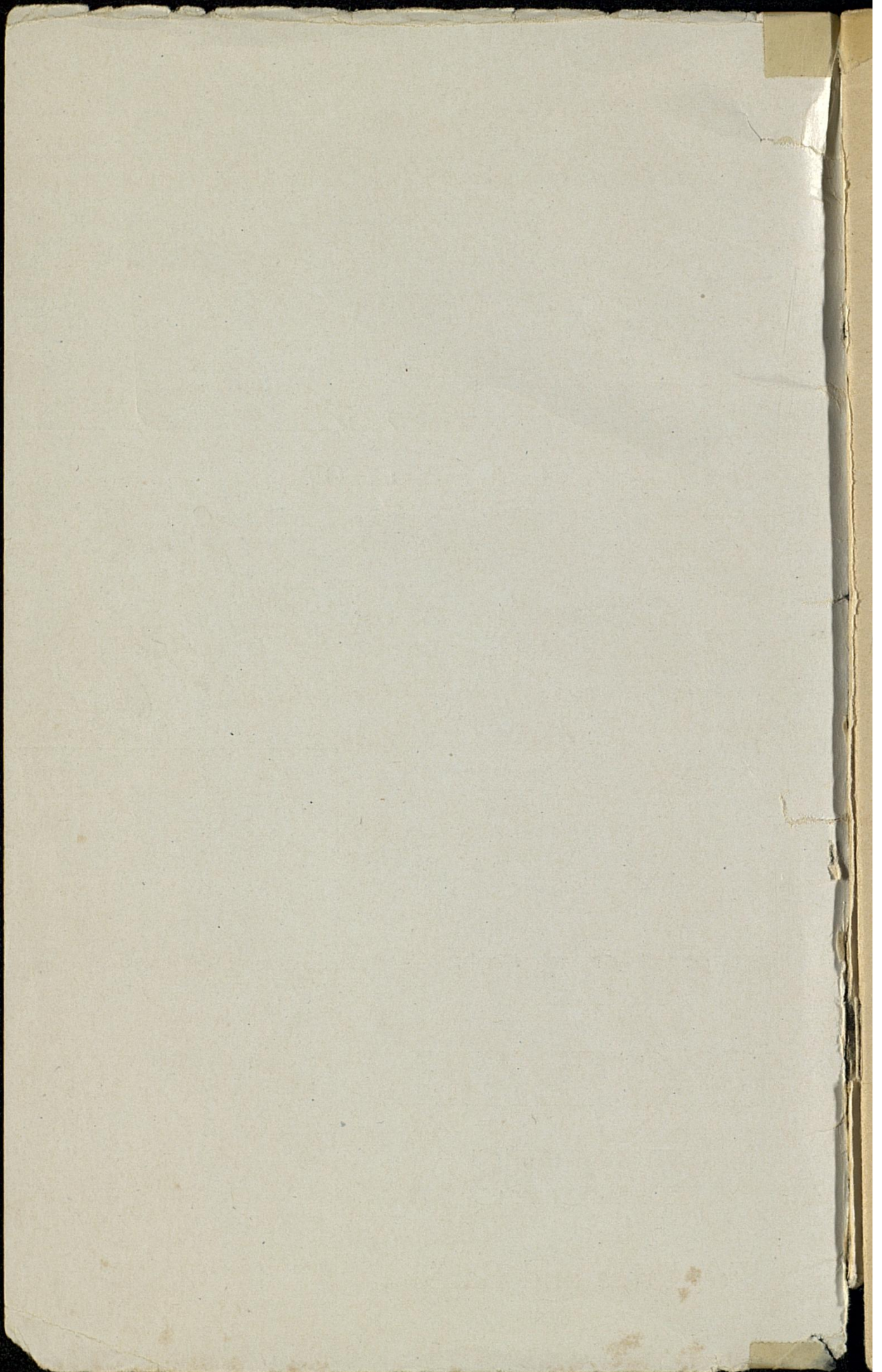

THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

The University of Kentucky is located at Lexington, an urban community of about 65,000 population. It is a state supported institution operated under the direction of a board of trustees of fifteen members. The membership of this board includes the Governor, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the Commissioner of Agriculture, ex officio, and twelve members appointed by the Governor, three of whom are alumni of the University and three members of the State Board of Agriculture. The University is one of a number of institutions known as land-grant colleges, which were established by the Morrill Act of 1862 and which have continued to receive federal assistance under the provisions of this and subsequent laws relating to the teaching of agriculture and the mechanic arts and the provision of agricultural experiment stations and extension services in agriculture and home economics.

The University of Kentucky is on the approved list of the Association of American Universities, and is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is accredited in its respective colleges or departments by the Association of American Law Schools, the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business, the American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism, the American Library Association, the National Association of Schools of Music, and the Engineers' Council for Professional Development.

The major function of the University is that of instruction. For the performance of this function it is organized into the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, the College of Engineering, the College of Law, the College of Education, the College of Commerce, the Graduate School, and a Department of University Extension. Residence instruction is given through four quarters, the summer quarter being divided into two terms.

In addition to giving instruction to its student body, the University contributes to the welfare of the state through research, experimentation, and public service. While all departments make important contributions along these lines, certain divisions and bureaus have been established specifically for these purposes. Included in this group are the Experiment Station and the Extension Division of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, the Bureau of Business Research, the Bureau of Government Research, the Bureau of School Service, the Bureau of Source Materials in Higher Education, the Teachers Placement Bureau, the Department of University Extension, and the Department of Public Relations.

The University of Kentucky began as a part of Kentucky University under a cooperative plan authorized by the legislature in 1865. The purpose of this plan was to unite sectarian and public education under one organization. This experiment was tried for a number of

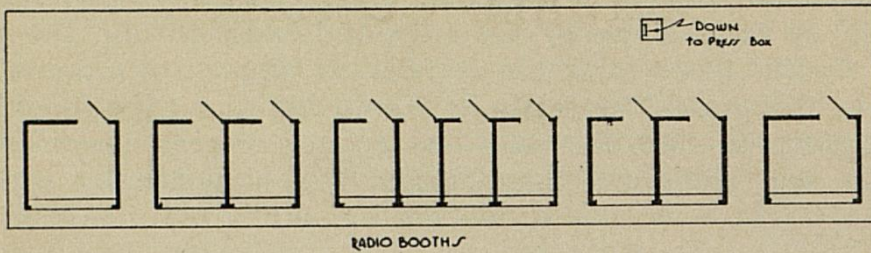
years. In the meantime, the federal funds authorized under the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanic arts in Kentucky University. In 1878, when the people of Kentucky decided to establish a state institution of higher learning, the College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts was separated from Kentucky University and reestablished on land given by the City of Lexington and the County of Fayette. Thirty years later the legislature changed the name of the institution to the State University of Kentucky, and gave it additional financial support. In 1916 the name was again changed, this time to the present title, and additional maintenance was arranged by legislative act.

President of the University is Dr. Herman L. Donovan, one of the most sports-minded executives in the United States. Under Dr. Donovan's direction the University has launched on a building program a feature of which will be the construction of a \$1,000,000 field house.

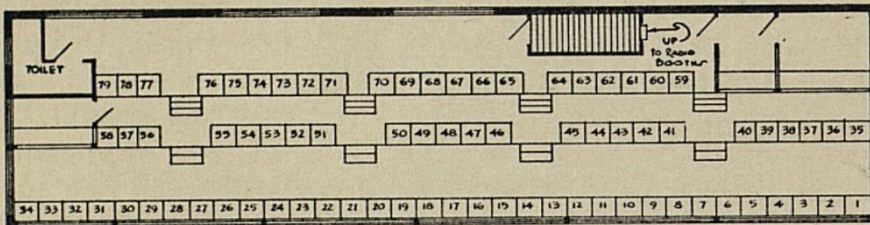
INFORMATION FOR PRESS AND RADIO

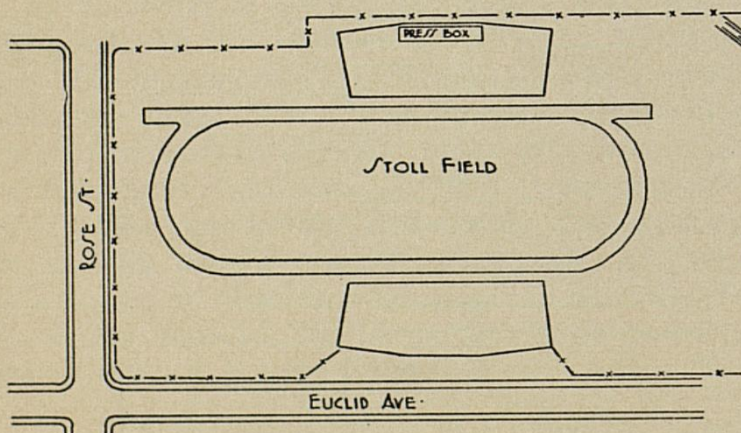
Adequate facilities to file stories from the stadium will be provided and a running statistical account of the game will be furnished to assist in the preparation of stories.

BIOGRAPHIES

Head Kentucky football coach Paul "Bear" Bryant is a graduate of the University of Alabama where he played end on Coach Thomas' 1935 Rose Bowl champions. This team was perhaps one of the most colorful, as well as one of the most powerful, in Alabama football history, having Don Hutson on the other end and Dixie Howell in the backfield. After graduation Bryant assisted Coach Thomas at Alabama for four years, then moved to Vanderbilt for two years before entering the Navy from which he was released with the rank of Lt. Commander. He comes to Kentucky from the University of Maryland where he led that team to six wins, two losses and a tie in 1945. He beat the University of Virginia after the Cavaliers had piled up an impressive string of 16 consecutive victories.

Carney Laslie, assistant coach, was a tackle on the 1930 Alabama Rose Bowl team. He was an assistant coach at Alabama and VMI before joining Bryant's staff at Maryland last year.

Frank Moseley, another Alabama graduate, was an assistant coach at Kentucky for eight years before the war. He joined Bryant's staff at Maryland after his release from the Navy last year.

Mike Balitsaris, Tennessee graduate, and Joe Atkinson, Vanderbilt luminary, are in their first year on Bryant's staff, having been signed upon their release from the armed services this spring.

Bill McCubbin graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1940 and served one year on Ab Kirwan's staff before entering the armed forces. Since his discharge he has served as an instructor in the University of Kentucky physical education department. He will coach the B squad and will serve as a scout on Bryant's staff.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE BREAKDOWN

Kentucky can move in only one direction if there is a change in standing in the Southeastern conference since the Wildcats have a firm hold on the cellar position. The all-time standings of the Southeastern conference teams finds Alabama occupying the top spot, closely followed by Tennessee. The over-all breakdown follows.

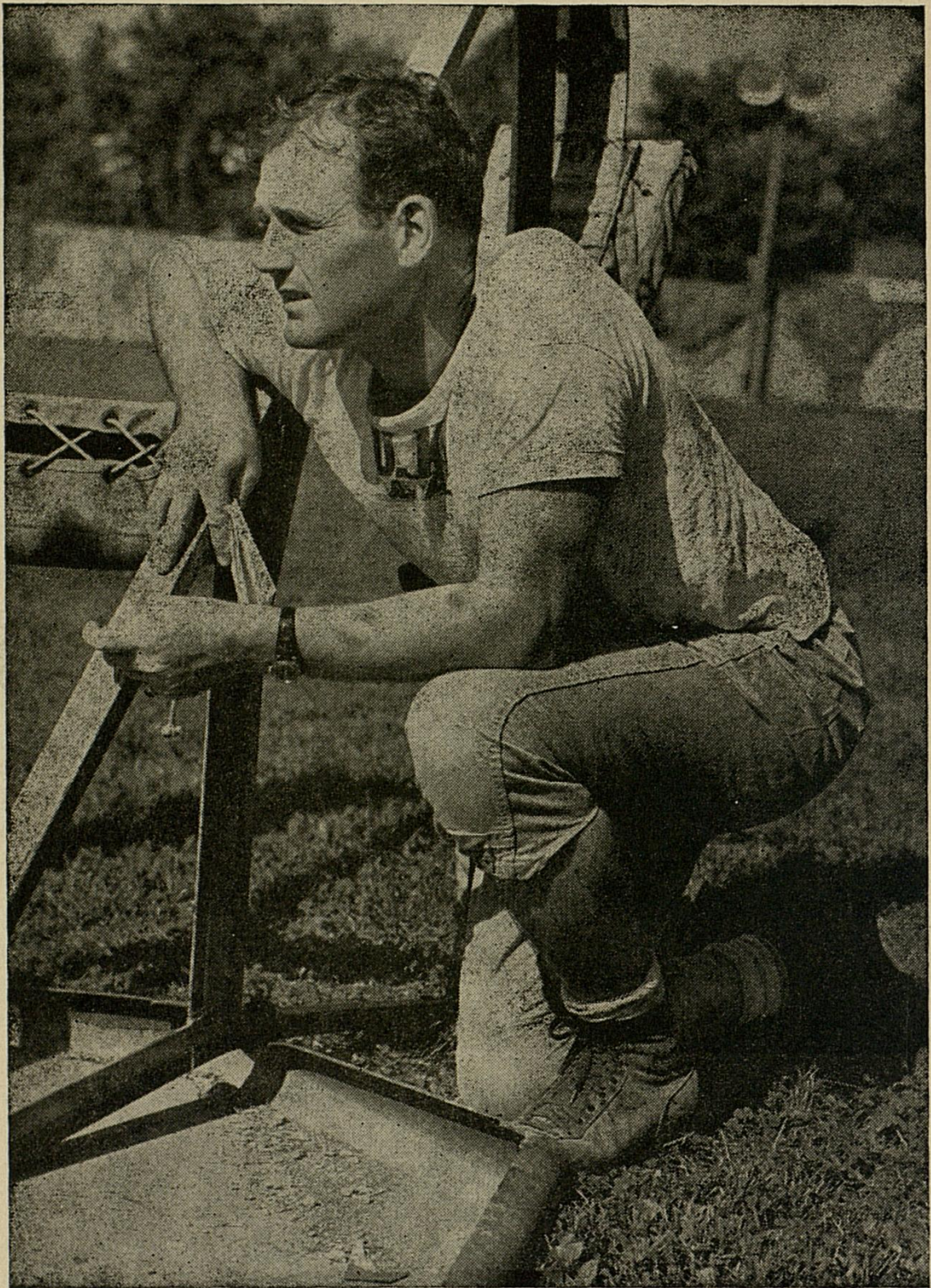

Paul Bryant thus finds himself with the toughest job in the coaching profession on his hands. Kentucky has been referred to as a coach's graveyard but the lanky "bear-fighter" has faced the odds before and he has never turned in a bad job. Victory-hungry Bluegrass patrons are sure they have the right man this time. It won't be the same old cry of "wait until next year" with Bryant though. He promises nothing until he has had a chance to instill some of his own fighting spirit into the Wildcats. He thinks 1948 might be a pretty good year.

KENTUCKY'S OFFENSE

SYSTEM

Kentucky uses the Notre Dame offense with a balance line. From the huddle they line up in a "T" formation from which they shift into the Notre Dame box.

RUNNING GAME

Though the 1945 team won but two games, they managed to score in all but one game. It is likely that the 1946 team will pass often because in most cases they will be outmanned in the forward wall and the presence of Ermal Allen, who rates as one of the finest passers in the land, will be on hand to throw to better than average receivers. Blocking from the guard posts will be a strong feature of the attack but inexperience at the quarterback and fullback positions will be a handicap. At right halfback there will be speed to burn.

PASSING GAME

The 1945 eleven had a strong passing attack because Dick Hensley and Wallace Jones caught everything which was thrown near them. With these two back and an array of six good passers, the Wildcats may well feature a wide open attack.

PUNTING GAME

George Blanda's kicking was one of the high spots of the 1945 season and though several capable kickers have reported to Bryant in the interim Blanda is still the best kicker on the squad. He will be ably assisted by Ermal Allen, Phil Cutchin and Don Phelps.

EXTRA POINTS AND KICKOFFS

John Richter, Dick Hensley and Bill Boller appear to be the most promising prospects to give the Wildcats that all important after touchdown insurance, the extra point. Either Richter or Hensley will probably kick off.

SAFETY MEN

Bryant will ordinarily have his left halfback in the safety position. Ermal Allen is an excellent pass defense man and punt returner who will always be at the safety spot when he is in the ball game.

SIGNAL CALLERS

In the huddle, any one of the backs may call the signals but the quarterback calls the signals once the team lines up for the attack. Ermal Allen or Phil Cutchin will call signals if one or both are in the game.

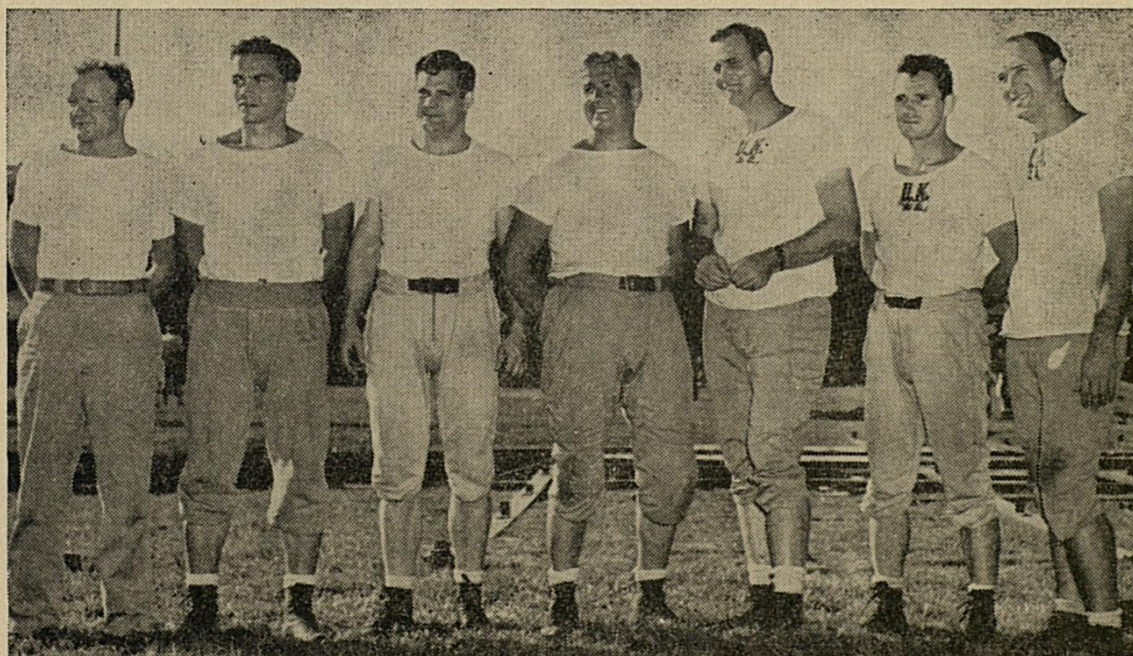

WILDCAT THUMBNAIL SKETCHES

BACKS

ERMAL ALLEN, 160 pound back from Morristown, Tenn., is back after four years in the Infantry. He made four letters in his pre-war days on the football, basketball, golf and track teams, and is being heavily counted on by Coach Bryant to do the lions share of passing this year. A graduate student, he intends to take up coaching as a profession.

JIMMY BABB, freshman from Lebanon, Tenn., weighs in at 177 pounds and is expected to develop into one of the finest half-backs on the squad. He won letters in football and basketball in his high school days and was also captain of his high school football team in 1942. A physical education major, he has decided upon coaching as a profession.

GEORGE BLANDA, 187 pound back from Youngwood, Pa., is one of the few players left from last year's squad. A quarterback, he is known for his ability to kick and run with devastating sureness. He holds college letters for football and track along with ten letters garnered in high school days.

BILL BOLLER, a Pennsylvania product, is a 170 pound freshman left half quarterback and is being looked upon as one of the best prospects on the squad. Captain of his high school team he won letters in football, baseball, and track.

BILL CHAMBERS, a Junior from Huntington, W. Va., was born in Pikeville, Ky. Bill is already known in Kentucky circles as a fine back who is especially apt at broken field running. He has won college letters in football, basketball, and baseball. He expects to go into the insurance business.

JOHN CHIEPALICH (rhymes with Flip-a-lick), a freshman back from Mobile, Ala., weighs 175 pounds. Chip is a hard hitting, spirited and determined athlete who has the attitude Coach Bryant desires in all his players. He has shown up well in all practice games, and is expected to be prominent in the Wildcats games this fall.

JERRY CLAIBORNE, a freshman back, hails from Hopkinsville, Ky. Weighing 170 lbs., he is another of Coach Bryant's comparatively light but fast backfield aspirants. A high school star, Jerry made letters in football and basketball and was captain of the football team.

PHIL CUTCHIN is a vet on the U. K. gridiron. A senior weighing 172 lbs., he won two football letters before he went into the service. His 18 months overseas seems to have had no effect on his playing ability and he is expected to carry a good part of the backfield duties with considerable success. He intends to be a coach.

CARL GENITO, known as "Cow" to his team-mates, is a 169 lb. freshman from Duquesne, Pa. He comes to U. K. well recommended as he made four letters in high school in football, basketball, track, and baseball. He made all-state in football. He is the younger of the Genito brothers, his brother Ralph being three years older.

RALPH GENITO, big brother of the aforementioned Carl, is also a freshman at U. K. Ralph tips the scales at 168. Speed and natural ability as a football player are the qualities that will make them invaluable to the Wildcat squad.

DOUGLAS HODGES, freshman from Williamson, W. Va., has 197 lbs. well distributed over his 6'1½" frame. The big boy plays quarterback and has a previously earned college letter he won at the Univ. of Wisconsin. It appears that he will have little trouble picking up another letter this year at U. K., as he has shown up well in practice and has all the requirements necessary to make him a member of the team. He is studying law at U. K.

JAMES KENNARD, 176-lb. sophomore from Ashland, Ky., is a former all-state fullback, and was also captain of Ashland Sr. High's football team. Kennard has been injured slightly this year and hasn't been able to participate in all the scrimmages but he has shown his ability here as well as he did when he made a letter playing for Duke. He is majoring in business administration at the University.

NORMAN KLEIN is another of the Louisville boys that have cast their lots with the Blue and White. A 168-lb. freshman, he is one of the fastest men on the field and has shown up exceptionally well in practice games. He is a former all-state back from Louisville's duPont Manual Training High School, spent seventeen months in the Navy, and expects to be a chemical engineer.

CHARLIE KUHN, a senior from Louisville, weighs 182 pounds, and is one of the best of the host of passers Coach Bryant has assembled. He has earned two football letters here at the University and has returned to play his last year after being in the service. A former all-state from Male High of Louisville, he was also captain of his high school basketball team. He will enter the coaching profession after graduation.

JOHNNY MEIHAUS, a junior from Louisville, carries 160 pounds with enough speed and drive to elude most would-be tacklers. He is one of the best broken field runners on the squad and is a fine passer although he probably will not be used extensively because of the wealth of passers on hand. Called "Mouse" by his friends, he seeks a coaching position.

BILL MOSELEY, an Alabama product, is a fine running back. He has been showing up well in practice as a broken field runner and has consistently broken away for long gains from straight power plays through the line. A graduate of Sidney Lanier High School in Montgomery, Ala., he won letters in football and basketball while there. He hopes to be a coach.

DAN "DOPEY" PHELPS, freshman from Danville, Ky., is one of the most highly publicized prospects to enter the University. An all-state half-back, he was one of the most sought after freshmen in the country. His ability to field punts and his speed are the things that make this boy outstanding. Coach Bryant has named him as the best prospect he has encountered. Dopey intends to make some phase of athletics his life's work.

LEE TRUMAN, a freshman who weighs 182 pounds, is a hard hitting fullback. Lee has been a much sought after young man since his graduation from Owensboro Senior High, and U. K. has been fortunate to get this boy. He was captain of his high school football team and also won letters in basketball.

JESSE TUNSTILL, senior from Russellville, Ky., brings the pointer to 182 pounds. This is his last year at U. K. and Jesse seems to be in better shape than ever before. Tunstill received nation-wide fame as a high school player and made Tilghman high of Paducah one of the most feared combines in the South. His play this year seems to show more spirit than at any previous time in college. He is another future coach.

"BIG HARRY" ULINSKI is a freshman back from Ambridge, Pa., who is well deserving of his nick-name for he stands 6'4" and has 200 pounds well distributed over that elongated frame. A natural athlete, he stacked up letters hand over fist while in high school and was all-state in football. An old injury has hampered him a bit but isn't expected to seriously interfere with his playing this fall. Business administration is his major.

ENDS

CHARLES BENTLEY, known as "Hot Shot" among his team mates, is a 180 pound end from Gadsden, Ala. This is Bentley's first year in college competition but he has shown in practice that he is an outstanding prospect. He holds six letters in high school sports, three in football and a like number in basketball. He, too, aspires to the coaching profession.

DOMINIC FUCCI, 172-pound freshman from New Village, N. J., is one of the most spirited boys on the squad. As an end he shows ability at getting behind opposing backs to receive long passes. His ability to catch some passes and to then outspeed any pursuing backs makes him an integral part of Kentucky's squad which is expected to depend upon passes a great deal this season. Dom hopes to teach Physical Education.

DICK HENSLEY, sophomore from Williamson, W. Va., stands 6'3½" and weighs 193. Dick played here last year and has shown his ability to snag any and all sorts of passes as well as being able to break up more than his share of the plays on defense. He won letters in football, basketball, and baseball in high school and made all-state in football.

WALLACE "WAH WAH" JONES, 195 pound sophomore from Harlan is perhaps better known to sports fans as a basketball player. He broke all national records for scoring in high school, and was a member of the 1946 U. K. basketball team which won the national title. Wah Wah played some very good football last year and is expected to do a large share of the pass receiving this year. He was all-state two years in football and three years in basketball while in high school. He intends to coach.

DON RIDGE, another of the Louisville contingent, is 6'2" tall and weighs 190. Don is a freshman who was captain of his Manual high team, and all-state in 1942. He is another of Coach Bryant's rangy group of ends and has shown up well at both offensive and defensive play.

GEORGE "CHINK" SENDEL, from Louisville, is a Junior. Sendel's play in practice has made many of the practice kibitzers state that he will be a hard man to keep off the team. "Chink" intends to coach.

NICK WANCHIC is a freshman from Toronto, Ohio. He is 6'1½" and balances the scales at 193. This boy is one of the best defensive ends on the squad and is bound to see plenty of action before the season is over. He has college letters in football and basketball, and was captain of his team in these same sports in high school.

LINEMEN

BILL "BULL" DAWSON, Louisville freshman, has his 202 pounds chunkily appointed along his 5'10" length. As a tackle he seems to do most of his duties correctly for he is rarely moved from any place he wishes to occupy. Bull played two years with the Fleet City Blue-jackets of Shoemaker, Calif., and brings with him a good record that will probably be bolstered here.

"DOC" FERRELL, from Richmond, is a 200 pound freshman tackle. Coach Bryant seems to like his tackles fairly big and "Doc" can fill the bill there as well as in all the other requirements for a good tackle. He has one college letter in football and three high school letters in the same department. He was also captain of his team and all-state in football. He is taking business administration.

BILL GRIFFIN, tackle from Mayfield, certainly fills all of the measurement requirements for his position. Bill, a junior, is 6'6" and weighs in at a tidy 220. He was a First Lieutenant in the Infantry while in the service and in prep school days made the Tennessee all-state team in both football and basketball. Bill looks as if he will be a lot of trouble to opposing linemen this season.

PHILIP HAAS, a 183 pound guard from Ironton, Ohio, has two college letters to his credit to date and from his showing in scrimmages thus far he'll have another at the close of this season. "Leo," as he is known to his cronies, has been another victim of the spirit that has invaded the Wildcat camp this year and has been putting out everything he has. This will be sufficient to insure trouble to anyone in the opposing forward wall.

DICK HOLWAY is another of Coach Bryant's freshmen who has shown plenty of promise this year. The Youngstown, Ohio boy carries 185 pounds in a most destructive way as far as opposing linemen are concerned and is expected to see plenty of service this year. He won letters in prep school football playing for Ursuline high of Youngstown.

ROSCOE "HUT" JONES, 197-lb. tackle, is a junior from Corbin and has all but cinched a starting berth in the Blue and White line. The manner in which Jones consistently breaks up line plays has made him one of the most talked about players on the squad. He has previously earned a football letter in college as well as many picked up in high school. "Hut" wants to coach after he graduates.

MATT LAIR, 190-lb. junior, has been transferred from back to guard and seems to have made the change with no ill-effects. As a fullback, he captained the high school team in nearby Paris, Ky., but his services are more valuable to U. K. as a guard. As a guard he has been one of the outstanding linemen in practice games and will see a majority of the service this year. He intends to be a farmer.

LLOYD McDERMOTT is known as "Big Mac" which is a suitable name for a boy who is 6'1" and weighs a cool 228. The Covington freshman is a lot of man to try to move and very few can accomplish that feat without the co-operation of Mac. He is a former all-state man and played two years with service teams in California, the El Toro Marines in '44 and the Santa Barbara Marines in '45.

LEN PRESTON is a 200 pound junior guard from Louisville. He made all state as a high school player for duPont Manual of Louisville. Len shows up well on plays where he pulls out to block as well as on the defensive. His defensive play is probably his strongest point for he can hold his ground against most opponents with comparative ease.

JAY RHODEMYER, 200-lb. junior from Ashland, has been named by sports writers as one of the best centers in the Southeastern Conference. He has shown himself as a steady dependable center and seems to have a sixth sense as to where the next play is going when he is backing up the line. Jay had two brothers and one sister preceding him at the University. He is taking Engineering.

JOHN RICHTER, sophomore from Louisville, is another of Bryant's big tackles. Rick weighs a handy 223 and is 6'2". He can pull

out and block with great effectiveness and has the spirit to make a great tackle. He lettered in football, baseball, and track at Manual High in Louisville and was a captain of the basketball team. He has picked coaching as a profession.

WASHINGTON SERINI, junior from Tuckahoe, N. Y., gets a big penny's worth with 220 pounds and has demonstrated that he uses this weight in the proper way by being selected as one of the best tackles in the Conference. Wash lettered in '44 and '45 and will probably be one of the mainstays of the team this year. He is another prospective coach.

PAUL TROUP is a 192-lb. freshman from Ambridge, Pa. The fact that he has been named as a person who could possibly beat out Jay Rhodemyer for the center position testifies to his ability. Buck, so named because of an unfortunate encounter with a shotgun, lettered in three sports in prep school and was captain of the baseball team. He is in the commerce college at the University.

JESSE WILLIAMS, a freshman from Nashville, Tenn., weighs 184 lbs. Known as "Red" he is a versatile addition to the squad being able to play guard, tackle, or end. He will probably be used more as a guard. He is a former Marine who won four letters in prep school football.

LEO YARUTIS, 176-lb guard from Gary, Ind., is a junior and has previously won a college football letter. Leo has been the cause of much happiness to local grandstand quarterbacks because of his play in practice games this year. He is one of the best guards to ever don the Blue and White and is expected to be a considerable aid in U. K.'s fight to attain football greatness. Leo is a Medical Student at the University.
